For most soldiers, the choice on when to take leave

from the military is not an option. However, for Dan Reinhardt, an active member of

the U.S. Army currently serving in Afghanistan, his 15 days of leave was scheduled so he could be in Nebraska for the birth of his son.

Things did not work out completely as planned, as Carter Daniel Reinhardt made his appearance on Feb. 23, before his father's leave was scheduled to begin on

"I was out flying a mission when I got a text message that my wife Lisa had a C-section and that Carter was

born and was healthy," he said.

Reinhardt is now in Nebraska spending time with his wife and new son until his return on March 19. This will be the only time Reinhardt will be home until his one-year tour of duty is completed in November.

School closer to move to consolidate buildings

The Wayne Community Schools is one step closer to consolidating the three school buildings into two after approving plans Monday to move forward with bid documents for the project.

Jon Carlson, with Carlson, West, Povondra Architects, was at Monday's meeting and presented information and drawings on the new construction and renovations to take place at both the Middle and It is anticipated that by the start of the 2012-2013

school year, students in grades kindergarten through sixth grade will attend classes at the current Middle School and students in grades 7-12 will attend classes at the current high school. Three additional classrooms will be constructed at

the middle school, several classrooms will be adapted to become kindergarten rooms and restrooms will be installed for both the new construction and for kinder-

At the high school, a kitchen facility will be constructed, as will a vocal music room, media center and a number of classrooms.

The project includes 27,500 square feet of new construction, as well as renovation at both the middle school and high school. Anticipated cost of the entire project is approximately \$4.2 million.

Prior to Carlson's presentation Board of Education President Carolyn Linster told those in attendance, "We want to publicly thank Mr. Carlson and those on the building and design committee for all of the time and input they have had into this project. I see this (approval of the contract documents) as the beginning

of where we are going."

Also during Monday's meeting, the Board approved the hiring of Chelsee Marvin as a middle school instructor and Tucker Hight as a special education

The bid for the school's annual audit was awarded to Michael J. Pommer, CPA.

Gifts to the district included \$2,000 from the Pamida Foundation and \$200 from the Wayne Basketball Association.

The board listened to reports from the three building principals and Misty Beair, director of special education on activities planned in each of the areas in upcoming weeks.

City Council gives approval to update of building ordinance

The amount and the necessity of cash deposits in low-interest loan with LB840 sales tax funds were debated during Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City

The city code, in regard to cash deposits connected to building permits, was changed in 2007 as a way to ensure that those involved with building projects obtained the necessary inspections throughout the project. As the ordinance was originally written, city officials had the option of waiving the deposit to certain contractors or building owners who had no violations of the requirements in the previous 12 months.

If all inspections are completed in a timely manner, the deposit is returned after the final inspection of the project.

City planner and inspector Joel Hansen told the council that during the time he has been in his current position, he has had two requests to waive the fee, which he denied, stating he felt the waiver would create the appearance of "playing favorites." He requested the ordinance be re-written to take out the option of waiving the deposit.

B.J. Woehler, representing Robert Woehler and Sons Construction, told the council that the fee "is a burden that doesn't make sense and is like charging a fine ahead of time. It punishes reputable contractors."

Council member Doug Sturm noted that if the inspections are completed and the deposit returned the money is not spent.

"Where is the cost, if the money is returned. You are conjunction with building permits and awarding a not losing money if you get the inspections," Sturm

Following debate, the council voted 5-2 to approve the ordinance on first reading. Council members Kathy Berry and Brian Frevert voted against the

The ordinance will be read again at the council's next meeting.

In a related item, the council voted to lower the amount of the cash deposits. In the future, a building project of less than \$50,000 will require a \$100 deposit, and a project over \$50,000 will require a \$250

Dr. Dennis Jensen spoke to the council on his request for a \$43,019 low-interest loan to DJR LLC. Inet Library for start-up costs for the business.

Dr. Jensen told the council that he had originally started the business in Wayne in 1992, and at one time it employed 144 people. The company was sold in 2002 and later bought back by Dr. Jensen in 2008.

He explained the nature of the business and told the council that he is awaiting contracts to provide services to Nigeria. He anticipates the hiring of 15 people initially for the business and five additional

County board gives nod to new carpet, computer

New carpet and an updated computer will soon be found in the county courthouse after the Wayne County Commissioners gave their blessings to those purchases

The board approved the purchase and installation of new carpeting to replace the worn and outdated carpeting in the offices of the county clerk and county treasurer.

County Clerk Deb Finn and County Treasurer Karen McDonald told the board that \$10,000 had been budgeted this fiscal year to take care of the carpeting. Both offices and the floors of the vaults in each department can be covered at a cost of just more than \$6,000, and the carpet could be laid during the first two weekends in May after the close of business on those respective Fridays.

The board also gave its blessing to the purchase of a new computer to replace a credit card payment system in the county treasurer's office that is outdated and can not be upgraded.

McDonald said the credit card system is_used_often by taxpayers to take care of

motor vehicle licensing payments, as well as property taxes, and is too slow in processing payments. A computer McDonald now uses at her desk will replace the old system, with the new computer going to McDonald's

In other action, the board:

 approved a lease agreement for the postage meter at the courthouse, an upgraded system that connects directly to the Internet and allows for easier downloading of postage by the county.

- heard a report from emergency manager Nic Kemintz on an upcoming storm-spotting training event scheduled for Monday, April 4 at 7 p.m. at the Wayne Fire Hall.

- approved a lodging tax application of \$100 for the Carroll Q125 Spring Fling.

received a memo from the state regarding bridge load posting signs that are needed on several bridges that were sampled at random by the Nebraska Department of Roads. The county approved bid specifications and authorized the solicitation of bids for those signs.





State treasurer looking to return unclaimed property to Nebraskans

Andersons and Johnsons and Petersons who populate Nebraska's 93 counties, some other big names are showing up in the 2011 list of unclaimed property owners, to be published in 16 Nebraska newspapers in March and April.

There are institutions of higher learning, major health care centers, banks and insurance companies, public and private entities, and the biggest businesses in the state. As well as hotels, restaurants, doctors' offices, and ordinary citizens. In all, the Unclaimed Property Division of the Nebraska State Treasurer's Office is holding property valued at more than \$100 million for more than 350,000 Nebraskans or former Nebraskans.

"One of my priorities as State Treasurer is to return unclaimed property to its rightful owners. I encourage all Nebraskans to look for their names in our newspaper publication or check our website at www.treasurer.org," State Treasurer Don Stenberg said.

Meaghan Aguirre, director of the Unclaimed Property Division, said that unclaimed property could be in the form of stocks, dividends, utility deposits, mutual funds, lost IRAs, matured CDs, and unused gift certificates. The property also could be in the form of court deposits, payroll wages, refunds, commissions, dormant accounts, and safe deposit

The 2011 list includes names of people and organizations with funds reported to the Unclaimed Property Division during the past year; most entries were only recently added to the list. This year's list includes an estimated 25,000 names and represents almost \$20

million in unclaimed property. 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Officers' attorneys receive accusation details from city

Attorneys for two Wayne police officers who were suspended for a variety of accusations made by the city administrator have received details of the allegations that led to their suspension one month ago.

Chief Lance Webster and Lt. Phil Shear were both placed on paid suspension by city administrator Lowell Johnson on Feb. 17 for a variety of charges, including inappropriate conduct, unauthorized use of city recording equipment, excessive use of city-owned computer and cell phone equipment and fostering a negative environment within the police department.

Details of those accusations were not available, but Lincoln attorney Jerry Pigsley, who is representing the city in this matter, told the Herald late Wednesday afternoon that attorneys for both Webster and Shear received the materials last Tuesday, March 8.

"At this point, it's up to Mr. Shear and Mr. Webster and their attorneys to get in touch with Mr. Johnson as far as when they want to present their side of the

story," he said.

Pigsley said it was not known when Johnson would meet with the two suspended officers, but once the meeting is held and Johnson renders a decision, the officers would have 10 calendar days to appeal the decision. If an appeal is filed, the Civil Service Commission would hold a meeting 10-20 days after the appeal is filed to hear all the evidence and provide the final decision to the issue.

"The hearing would be a public meeting, and witnesses and documentation will be presented by both sides and a decision would be made by the Civil Service Commission," Pigsley said.

Until that happens, Pigsley said the city would not comment further on the matter, citing a desire to protect the rights of all individuals involved, as well

Attempts were made to contact Sean Brennan, Webster's attorney, and Steven Delaney, who is representing Shear, but those attempts were not successful at press time.

UNO decision could send football players to WSC

It was an unexpected buzzing of the cell phone that surprised Wayne State football coach Dan McLaughlin.

On the other end was a member of the Nebraska-Omaha football team, calling to ask if McLaughlin had any possible opportunities to play football at Wayne State next fall. The student-athlete called hours after finding out the UNO football and wrestling programs were being cut as part of a cost-cutting move that would allow the school to move to the NCAA Div. I level.

McLaughlin said the move was a shocking one that was going to affect a lot of students and coaches.

"It involves 100 kids and 10 coaches in football, and another 30 wrestlers and three coaches in wrestling," he told a gathering at Tuesday's Catbacker lunchoen at The Max. "One of the assistant coaches is one of Scott's (assistant coach Scott McLaughlin) best friends, so it's a really tough deal."

McLaughlin said he got the phone call from the UNO player at around 11 a.m. Sunday.

"We have talked to some kids that have called us,"

he said after the luncheon. "When, all of a sudden, you don't have an opportunity to play anymore, you have to look at other options.

Some of the players McLaughlin has talked to are kids who he and his staff recruited. Some of the players had ultimately had to choose between UNO and Wayne State and opted for the Mavericks.

"Some of these kids are kids that we've recruited and ultimately it came down to either us or UNO and they chose UNO, so they are familiar with us," he said

Word of the sudden move by UNO has exploded nationwide, and McLaughlin said it's like a feeding frenzy as schools look to bring in UNO players looking for a new place to play and finish their college degrees.

"I talked to their director of football operations Sunday, and he said they've had 85 schools from all over the country call, so we're certainly not going to be overrun by UNO students," he said. "These kids are immediately eligible, so there's a lot of interest in these players and whether or not we get any of these kids, I don't know.

"It's a sad situation, though," he added. "I feel for those people. We'll just have to see how it shakes out."

In Afghanistan, Reinhardt flies an Apache Low Bow (AH64 Delta) helicopter on what he terms "quick reaction missions.

"We respond to troops under fire, provide security for medi vac helicopters and fly on reconnaissance mission, looking for the enemy. We are the security force and our helicopters are very intimidating" he

Reinhardt said he works 14-hour

 While it was a disappointing end to the season, the Wayne State women's basketball team have had a fantastic season in 2010-11, and it's been quite a run for the four seniors who played their last game Saturday in Colorado.

The three four-year seniors -Alyssa Fischbach, Julie Ann Wagner and Mara Hjelle – have been a part of three NCAA tournament teams and had a hand in both tournament wins in the program's history. Renee Wood, who transferred here after her sophomore year, never lost a game at home. The team won an NSIC tourney and regular-season title and went 52-9 during the past two seasons.

While the team's aspirations are much higher – what they've accomplished these last two years is certainly nothing to sneeze at. And while they lick their wounds from Saturday's loss, you can bet this is a program that isn't going to rest on these already-lofty laurels and will be in the mix for a national title

- Don't know if you realize this or not, but the Wayne High boys basketball team pulled off a rare double this season.

The Blue Devils beat two teams that went on to win state titles last week at the state boys basketball tournament, and beat them both soundly. Wayne knocked off Norfolk Catholic by 20 points in the district finals, and enjoyed a 41-point blowout of West Point Central Catholic, who won the Class D-1 title, late in the regular season. Both wins, oddly enough, avenged losses earlier in the year.

- Imagine, if you will, Chris Kielsmeier leading the Wayne State women's basketball team to a national title, then getting a phone call just hours after the big win from athletic director Eric Schoh, informing him that the girls basketball program is being eliminated.

That's exactly the phone call received by the wrestling coach at UNO after he led the team to its third straight Div. II national title this past weekend in Kearney. The Mavericks' wrestling program - winners of six of the last eight NCAA Div. II titles - and the football program are being gutted in an effort to move UNO to the Div. I level, where they would play in the Summit League (a conference that features South Dakota, South Dakota State and North Dakota State, among others).

Believe it or not, this controversial move could have an impact here at Wayne State, although none of the programs have to worry about elimination. At least one current UNO football player has contacted Wayne State coach Dan McLaughlin about transferring here, and more could be on the way, depending on how much scholarship money the school has available.

It should be noted, though, that there are more than 100 football players at UNO looking for a new home, and at Tuesday's Catbacker luncheon, McLaughlin said more than 85 schools are going after the currently-homeless players.

Wayne State is taking the classy approach to what has been a classless move by the UNO administration. If only Wayne State was in a position to start a varsity wrestling program – they could inherit an instant national championship-caliber team representing the black and




We've got some amazing numbers and a lot of talent, so I think we have a good program going."

Along with that ad is an ad for a movie starring Fatty Arbuckle in Dave Heineman's plan to eliminate "Brewster's Milions" from 1921. An \$44 million in state aid to cities, interesting story just on its own. Actually, this movie – and others with Arbuckle - were never shown years. in Wayne and were banned in many theaters across the country. Fatty was involved in a murder plus scandal in San Francisco that ended his career. Elmer Gailey, the owner of the Chrystal at the time, cancelled all the movies that had anything to do with Arbuckle. The Chrystal was renamed the Co-Ed about 1941, and the last movie advertised at the Co-Ed, that I have found to date, was in 1953, a double feature: "Rex, King of the Wild Horses" and "The Harlem Globetrotters."

In the picture of the Co-Ed theatre, the marquee says "closed The picture of the theatre was for the season," probably because incorrectly dated 1937. The movie the Dude Ranch Drive-In was open for the summer in 1952

Legislative Update Legislative session is at halfway point


The Legislature is halfway hundred priority bills selected all committee hearings. Nebraska's unicameral system requires a hearing for every bill introduced. We are just finishing the 698 hearings, and will soon begin all day debate on bills that have been advanced from the various committees.

Senators and committees were asked to choose priority bills, which are the bills designated as the most important of all those introduced. There are approximately

through its annual legislative every year: each senator selects one session, and we will soon finish bill (49); each standing committee picks two bills (28); and the Speaker of the Legislature selects 25 additional bills. This year, I introduced one bill (LB508), which will be heard before the Judiciary Committee next week. Since my bill has not been heard yet, I decided to select another bill that I believe to be very important.

My 2011 priority bill is LB521, a pro-life bill introduced by Sen. Tony Fulton of Lincoln, which would prevent abortion providers absently administering chemical abortions through use of webcams. Planned Parenthood currently uses webcams in sixteen Iowa satellite facilities to perform chemically induced abortions. Because Planned Parenthood of the Heartland serves residents in both Nebraska and Iowa, there is a concern that webcam abortions will become available in Nebraska, too. I am a very strong believer in the right to life, and want to do all I can while serving as a state senator to stop abortions in this state. This bill is a step in the right direction, and I am hopeful that it will pass this year. The bill received a public hearing on March 9, and will be discussed by the Judiciary Committee soon.

One bill that was debated on the legislative floor this week is LB419. The bill is Sen. Dave Pankonin's of Louisville's priority bill, which would increase the Nebraska Game

and Park Commission's annual park entry permit fees. Annual permits would increase to \$25 from \$20, and daily and duplicate park permits would go to \$5, up from the current \$4 fee. All of these increases are 25 percent increases. The bill advanced to Select File (second round) by a vote of 29-4. I was one of the four who voted against the bill. At a time where we are asked to tighten our budgets and cut programs, I cannot support

significant increase, especially

considering the fact that fees increased five years ago. (That is a four percent annual increase.) A representative from the Game and Parks Commission has said that if the fee increase does not pass this year, some state parks may have to be closed. If we cannot maintain the state parks we have perhaps we should stop spending money to acquire more land that the state cannot afford to take care of. Perhaps there are parcels of land that could be sold back to private owners either for development or other use. Returning some of this property to private owners could also return it to the tax rolls. There are some real questions in my mind as to how once irrigated farmland has been converted to a weed patch for wildlife. I don't believe the public ownership of real estate is in Nebraska's best interest especially if we can't take care of what we already have.
