Buildings, budget highlight State of Schools presentation

Approximately 50 people listened to Wayne Schools Superintendent Mark Lenihan deliver the annual State of the School address on Monday evening.

Lenihan spoke on a number of areas, including the academic achievement and assessment of students in the school system; communication improvements taking place within the district; the fiscal status of the district and the facilities available to the students.

Lenihan said testing of students takes place throughout the year, and presented a number of areas of comparison between students in the school system, those in the rest of Nebraska and nationwide. He explained that online testing takes place in the areas of writing, reading, math and

"Our students do very well on the ACT tests. In fact, we are No. 2 in schools our size. One thing that helps in this area is that our students are encouraged to take the John Baylor ACT Prep test, which is beneficial when it is time to take the ACT," Lenihan said.

After board and community meetings, and with the availability of Build America Bonds as part of the federal stimulus package, the Board of Education voted to move forward with a plan to merge the three buildings into two. The district will have kindergarten through sixth grade in the current middle school and seventh through 12th grade in the current high school.

Hammond to serve as PMC's interim administrator second dip in three months

For just the second time in 11 months, sales tax receipts in Wayne showed a decline from the same period one year ago.

Receipts for March, which includes sales made during the month of January, were at \$35,647.72, down more than \$2,500 from the previous year's total of \$38,215.18.

City finance director Nancy Braden said a refund of more than \$4,900 was made, which had an effect on the final numbers for the month. Braden said the refund could have resulted from any one of a number of factors, including a mistake in remitting the wrong amount, or a tax-exempt sale that was incorrectly recorded.

For the year to date, the city has received \$268,429.23, averaging \$44,738.21 per month. That average is well above what the city had projected, based on 2 percent growth of last year's total. Importance of colorectal cancer screening discussed

Excluding skin cancers, colorectal cancer is the third most common cancer diagnosed in both men and women in the United States.

March has been designated Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month and the American Cancer Society has published the following information in regard to colorectal cancer and available screenings.

The American Cancer Society's most recent estimates for the number of colorectal cancer cases in the United States are for 2011:

101,700 new cases of colon can-

·39,510 new cases of rectal can-

•the lifetime risk for developing colorectal cancer is about 1 in 20 (5.1%). This risk is slightly higher in men than in women. A number of other factors may also affect a person's risk for developing colorectal

Colorectal cancer is the third leading cause of cancer-related deaths in the United States when men and women are considered separately, and the second leading cause when both sexes are combined. It is expected to cause about 49,380 deaths during 2011.

The death rate (the number of deaths per 100,000 people per year) from colorectal cancer has been dropping for more than 20 years. There are a number of likely reasons for this. One is that polyps are being found by screening and removed before they can develop into cancers. Screening also allows more colorectal cancers to be found earlier, when the disease is easier to cure. In addition, treatment for colorectal cancer has improved over

the last several years. As a result, there are now more than 1 million survivors of colorectal cancer in the United States

Regular colorectal cancer screening or testing is one of the most powerful weapons for preventing colorectal cancer. Screening is the process of looking for cancer in people who have no symptoms of the disease.

From the time the first abnormal cells start to grow into polyps, it usually takes about 10 to 15 years for them to develop into colorectal cancer. Regular screening can, in many cases, prevent colorectal cancer altogether. This is because some polyps, or growths, can be found and removed before they have the chance to turn into cancer. Screening can also result in finding colorectal cancer early, when it is highly curable.

Several tests are used to screen for colorectal cancer in people with an average risk of colorectal cancer. Ask your doctor which tests are available where you live and which options might be right for you.

People who have no identified risk factors (other than age) should begin regular screening at age 50. Those who have a family history or other risk factors for colorectal polyps or cancer (see section, "Risk factors for colorectal cancer") should talk with their doctor about starting screening when they are younger and/or getting screened more frequently.





The Leonards' son, Mason, was

born May 18, 2010 and shortly thereafter began having trouble The family was sent to a pedia-

trician in Omaha, who referred the family to an ear, nose and throat specialist. There he underwent a sleep study and was diagnosed with laryngomalacia. The sleep studies showed Mason quit breathing 11 times within a onehour period.

On Oct. 8, he was rushed by ambulance to Omaha because he had stopped breathing at home. He underwent surgery for removal of his adenoids and a mandibular extraction.

After spending 28 days in the hospital, Mason was discharged. and since that time has been breathing completely on his own.

While the family was dealing with Mason's health concerns, Melanie was hospitalized to have her gall bladder removed.

On Sept. 15, Brent was involved in an accident at work and burned on both of his arms, his face, neck and ear. He was transferred from the West Point Hospital to the burn unit at the University of Nebraska Medical Center in Omaha. His injuries caused him to be off work for a month.





Four years ago, the company embarked on an expansion project which would mean more factory space, an ability to complete more orders, and more jobs for local workers. Kucera played a crucial role for the business coordinating an SBA loan package and grant applications.

The company was approved Oct. 3, 2008, for a loan from BankFirst in Norfolk to purchase a plant in Wayne and add a separate lean-to for building doors and windows for their kits. Around the same time, the firm earned a community development block grant to build a second plant facility on the Wayne property.

District allowed the company to Alberta, even people from Australia acquire an abandoned bank for its office building.

From 2006-2009, the company grew from \$1 million to \$5.1 million in revenue, and to 37 employees. Inc. Magazine recognized the firm by naming it the 218th fastest-growing company in the country in 2009. Goeller estimated revenues for 2010 to be between \$6 and \$7 million.

Among the moves being made is the elimination of a wrestling program that has won eight Div. II championships in the last 10 years. leaving one of the most respected and revered coaches in the sport

While athletic director Trev Alberts has said that the decision was to streamline UNO with the other schools in the Summit League, it should be noted that two Summit League schools – South Dakota State and North Dakota State both have wrestling programs that compete in a Div. I conference (Western Wrestling Conference) with schools like Air Force and Wyoming.

There has also been several moves made by some of the people who donate large sums of money to UNO to pull their funding from the athletic department because of Alberts' decision to drop wrestling. And if UNO is cutting programs to save money, why would they add men's soccer and men's golf, programs that will cost more money to start up than would be needed to maintain a Div. I wrestling program that could compete in an affiliate conference (those above-mentioned schools also play football in the Missouri Valley Conference, by the

Why, also, is Alberts under the assumption that a basketball program that, currently, is barely competitive in a middle-of-the-road Div. II conference and draws fewer paying customers than a swarm of flies to a pile of steaming cow chips, can be a revenue-positive program in a nowhere conference whose marquee team is a teenvtiny institution of higher learning hidden somewhere in Detroit?

If the Board of Regents have a clue (and, for some strange reason, the politically-inclined cynic in me doesn't believe they do), they will approve the move to Div. I with the stipulation that wrestling be included as part of the move.

Granted, UNO won't win a Div. I title anytime soon going up against kingpins like Iowa, Oklahoma State and new champion Penn State. But as a small Ivy League school (Cornell) has shown the past two years, the little guys can mix it up with the big boys of the sport and more than hold their own.







Sexual predator bill is introduced

Judiciary Committee on Wednesday, March 16. LB508 seeks to amend the Sexual Predator Residency Restriction Act, allowing political subdivisions to adopt regulations restricting sexual predators from living within five hundred feet of a park. Under current law, the Sexual Predator Residency Restriction Act predators from living within five hundred feet of a school or a child care facility. This bill simply adds parks to the list of places where sexual offenders may be restricted.

The Sexual Predator Residency Restriction Act was adopted in 2006. Iowa and other states have since adopted more strict residency requirements for sex offenders. Those restrictions have caused sex offenders to leave these states and move to states such as Nebraska with fewer restrictions. Lintroduced LB508 on behalf of the children who live in Nebraska, especially those that border Iowa. It is my intent with this bill that we do at least something to restrict people who have harmed children in the past from areas where children congregate and play. The fourth annual Nebraska Wildland Fire Academy will be April 9-17 at Ft. Robinson State Park near Crawford.

The academy offers wildland fire and incident management training using the expertise of local fire officers to ensure the fire training needs of western Nebraska and the surrounding region are met, said Casey McCoy, wildland fire training manager at the Nebraska Forest Service.

The mission of the wildfire academy is to provide high-quality training at little or no cost, he said.

Preregistration is required and early registration is strongly encouraged as class sizes are limited. Registration cost is \$30 per student, per class.

Courses offered are: Fire Prevention Education I; Followership to Leadership; Wildland Fire Observations and Origin Scene Protection for First Responders; Basic Firefighting; Advanced Firefighter Training; Look Up, Look Down, Look Around; Initial Attack Incident Commander; Portable Pumps and Water Use; ICS-300 Intermediate ICS: ICS for Supervisors and Expanding Incidents; ICS-400: Advanced ICS: ICS for Command and General Staff and Complex Incidents; Fire Ops in the Wildland/Urban Interface; Interagency Incident Business Management; Annual Fireline Safety Refresher, Ignition Operations, Basic Air Operations and Tactical Decision Making in Wildland Fire. Classes meet the National Wildfire Coordinating Group standards and begin at 8 a.m.
