Civil Service Commission set to hear appeals

Hearings to begin Monday on two terminated WPD officers

Two members of the Wayne Police Department who were fired last month will have their appeals heard before the Wayne Civil Service Commission beginning next

Chief Lance Webster and Lt. Phil Shear were terminated by city administrator Lowell Johnson on April 28 after being put on paid administrative leave for 10 weeks. The officers were suspended for a variety of accusations made by Johnson.

The officers' appeals were received Friday by City Clerk Betty McGuire, so the matter will now be heard by the local Civil Service

The three-member panel – Galen Wiser, Darrel Heier and Marci Thomas - will meet in a public hearing in the Wayne City Council chambers Monday, May 16, at 10 a.m. No evidence will be presented during this meeting, as it is more of an organizational meeting to approve special counsel and set a timetable for the hearing itself, according to McGuire.

The commission will appoint a special counsel for the hearing, which will be recommended by city attorney Mike Pieper. A timetable for the hearing itself should be decided at this meeting.

by Johnson has been a cause for concern by the president of the Nebraska Fraternal Order of Police, who questioned the validity of Johnson serving as the accuser, judge and jury in the case of the two terminated

"It was very questionable how it was being handled," said John Francavilla, president of the state FOP lodge. "As we looked at the hearing.

procedural process, I don't think (Webster and Shear) got a fair shake. The way the process was handled would lend doubt to

what's going on." Francavilla said, in his discussions with other members of the department, he got the impression that the entire department was being investigated, but nobody knew what the investigation was about.

"In our discussions, (Johnson) was doing an investigation on the department that was very broad and reaching, as if the whole department was under investigation, and nobody was getting an answer as to what the scope of the investigation was."

Francavilla sent a letter to Mayor Ken Chamberlain on Dec. 8, 2010, expressing concerns about Johnson's investigation of the police department, encouraging the newly-elected mayor to look into the matter.

"We sent a letter to discuss the process," Francavilla said. "Every member of the department that we talked to felt they were the target of an investigation without probable cause. Every one of them felt they were guilty of some sort of charge, with the way they were being treated."

Francavilla hopes the Civil Service Commission will take an unbiased look at the information that will be presented by both sides.

There needs to be a fair and impartial group to take a look at it and weigh it out," he said. "Some of the issues seem to border on unfair labor practices and a hostile work environment on the part of the administrator.

When contacted by the Herald, Johnson said he advised not to comment on the case, pending the Civil Service Commission

Redistricting plans highlight changes


LINCOLN - The mood in Wednesday's Redistricting Committee hearing was relaxed with senators rocking in their chairs and only the occasional small spat of pointed disagreement.

The May 4 vote on legislative districts, in which all voted "yes' except Sen. Heath Mello of Omaha and Sen. Annette Dubas of Fullerton, both of whom abstained, indicates the senators have generally reached consensus on proposed changes to district boundaries.

In what was essentially the final committee vote on changes to legislative boundaries for the state, the lawmakers voted to merge separate maps with changes to Lincoln, Omaha and western Nebraska districts into one statewide map that will be presented for public review.

The finalized district map includes moving District 49, which encompasses a large swath of the Nebraska panhandle, into Sarpy County, which is part of the Omaha metro area. The current District 49 counties will be incorporated into districts 43 and 47.

The Wayne State track and field teams set five new school records with three NCAA provisional qualifying marks Friday and Saturday at the Howard Wood Dakota Relays in Sioux Falls, S.D.

Nicole Brungardt and John Kern each set two new school records, with Brungardt recording two NCAA provisional marks while Kern had the other.

Brungardt took first place in the 100-meter dash with a new school record time of 11.89 seconds, eclipsing her own school record set two weeks ago at the Nebraska Wesleyan Invitational of 12.06 seconds. She

also set a new school record in the 200-meter dash with a time of 24.50 seconds, good for second place. The old school record held by Marian Borgmann back in 1983 at 24.80 seconds. Both times in the 100

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
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




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
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
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Wildcats riding high into postseason



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



Did you know that the house located at 510 S Clark Street in Allen (next to the Allen School tennis court) used to be a St. Michael's Catholic Church?

In a letter written by Phyllis Magnuson, Janice Taylor, Jim (Jones) Swanson (whose family Woodward, Court Roberts. bought the house in 1919), she says: "I've been asked to write a story, as remember it, about this house. I do want to say that before this house was in our family, it was a Catholic Church. As time passed the church was closed.

Following the closing, a man named M.M. Nielson, an Allen jeweler, bought the church building and by adding a kitchen and a bedroom above the kitchen, the building became a residence. Two screened porches were also added to the house.

In 1919, Mr. Nielson sold this house to my grandparents - Evan and Floy Jones. My grandparents moved into this house from their farm southeast of Allen."

In this process, high pressure water is forced through the sewer pipe to clean it. This pushes solid materials to the manholes so they can be removed by vacuuming. This entire process is necessary to keep obstructions out of the sewer system and to insure proper drainage of waste.

Residents should be aware that when this process is done, the high pressure water pushes the air in the sewer line which occasionally enters the private sewer lines into homes and businesses. If this happens, it usually results in the air exiting through toilet bowls, shooting the water out of the toilet bowl. This air should exit through the sewer vent of the building, but inadequate venting or location of toilets can cause the air to exit through the toilet. This is a rare occurrence, and keeping the lid closed on the toilet during this time will keep most of the water in the bowl rather than on the floor.




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

- Resist the temptation to sample raw or uncooked foods, like cookie dough. The raw eggs in the uncooked dough may host Salmonella, which can cause food-

- Close the door. Encourage chil- extension.unl.edu.

dren and family members to open the refrigerator door to get what they want and then close the door promptly. Holding the door open unnecessarily – or not getting the door closed completely - can jeopardize the safety and quality of the food inside.

Wrap foods well (or cover) before storing them to prevent cross contamination in the refrigerator or picnic basket.

- Wash fresh fruits and vegetables thoroughly. Take watermelon, for example: organisms that may be present in the soil where the watermelon was grown can contaminate the skin of the melon or other produce. If the melon is cut without being washed first, organisms that are present on the melon skin can be transferred to melon slices that will be eaten. This, and other cross-contamination (like using the same knife to cut raw meat and salad greens) can lead to foodborne illness.

- Opt for a dishcloth that can be sanitized instead of a sponge that may attract bacteria.

- Choose pasteurized juices, including fruit juices and apple

 Test ready-to-eat temperatures with a food thermometer. Children can be intrigued by watching a digital thermometer climb to the appropriate temperature.

- Keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold.

Producers urged to keep sign-up deadlines in mind

Dan Steinkruger, State Executive Director of USDA's Farm Service Agency in Nebraska reminds producers that enrollment for the 2011 Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP) and Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) will end June 1, 2011.

Farm producers must apply for DCP or ACRE on an annual basis. If a producer misses the June 1, 2011 deadline there is a late-filing time period from June 2 thru Aug. 1, 2011. Producers may still enroll in DCP or ACRE during the latefiling time period.

All owners and operators who will share in the DCP or ACRE payments on the farm must sign the CCC-509 by Aug. 1 to remain eligible for 2011 program benefits. Faxed signatures are also acceptable on a DCP or ACRE contract. Changes that affect DCP or ACRE the local office by Sept. 30, 2011 because changes may cause a refund of all 2011 program ben-June 1 is also the deadline for

producers to elect (ACRE) for 2011-2012. ACRE is an alternative to the counter-cyclical component of DCP. Election of the ACRE option does not enroll the farm for 2011. Enrollment is a separate and subsequent step – even if the farm was enrolled in DCP previous to the election. There are no late filing provisions for electing to be in the ACRE program. If an election is made after June 1, the election will not take effect until the 2012 crop

Producers can visit any USDA Service Center to complete their 2011 DCP or ACRE contract. "We also urge producers to make use

program need to be reported to of the eDCP automated website to complete the annual signup for DCP or ACRE," said Steinkruger. The electronic service saves producers time, reduces paperwork and speeds up contract processing at their local FSA offices. All producers who are eligible to participate can access eDCP at www.fsa. usda.gov/dcp.

> To use this service, producers must have an active USDA eAuthentication Level 2 account, which requires filling out an online registration form at www.eauth. egov.usda.gov followed by a visit to the local USDA Service Center for identity verification.

Steinkruger stressed it is critical that producers who have not enrolled all farms or obtained all necessary signatures take immediate action. Producers should contact their local FSA office to enroll.



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

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
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Many new windbreaks, wildlife habitat plantings, woodlots and other conservation tree and shrub plantings are planted each spring by enthusiastic tree planters. An important consideration in establishing seedling trees and shrubs is removal of weed competition. The first year is extremely critical. Young trees depend on surface moisture to survive. Competition for moisture, light and nutrients by aggressive weeds and grasses may severely stunt or kill newly planted trees and shrubs.

Methods of controlling weed competition include cultivation, mowing, herbicides and natural or fabric mulch. The best time to control during their seedling stage. Newly germinated weed seed can be killed easily by cultivation or chemicals.

Removal of competing vegetation about two feet on each side of the tree row or in a 4-foot diameter circle around each seedling is most critical. Cultivation, herbicides and mulches are all effective. Preemergent herbicides (e.g. simazine) applied to mineral soil just after planting will usually control most weeds for the growing season when applied in the proper amount and at the right time.


Cultivation is the surest method to control weeds and retain moisture for the seedlings. Cultivation should not be too deep and should

never ridge soil against the trees. Natural or fabric mulches do a good job of weed control and moisture conservation, but initial cost is often higher than cultivation or herbicide treatment.

Where moisture is sufficient and a cover between rows is desirable to prevent soil erosion, mowing vegetation between tree rows is often recommended.

People often want to plant aggressive grasses such as bromegrass or fescue between rows of trees. This is generally not recommended. Such grasses will smother out annual weeds, but will give young trees the worst kind of competition for moisture and nutrients. If perennial grasses must be planted, less competitive cool-season grasses, e.g. blue grass, rve grass or short warm-season grasses, e.g. blue grama, side-oats

grama, should be considered. New tree and shrub plantings should receive adequate weed control for at least three years until the roots have become established.
