## Relay For Life coming June 10 at WSC

With just eight days to go, those involved with the annual Wayne County Relay For Life are continuing to solicit donations in the fight to one day eliminate cancer.

The 2011 event begins with the Relay For Life committee hosting the Chamber Coffee at 10 a.m. on Friday, June 10 at Memorial Stadium on the Wayne State College campus.

Survivor registration begins at 5 p.m. and a Survivor meal will be served at 5:30 p.m. at the Wayne State College student center, provided by Chartwells.

The opening ceremony will be held at 7 p.m. on the track and will include a Celebration of Cancer Survivors. Survivors will be asked to take the first lap, joined at the half way point with their caregivers.

Beginning at 7:30 p.m., food will be available in the tailgate area of the track, provided by Northeast Cattlemen's Association and Pizza Hut. A free-will offering will be accepted for Relay For Life.

The kid's carnival will last until 9 p.m. and will include magician Joe Brogie.

Among the favorite events of the evening is the Miss Relay Pageant, which starts at 8 p.m. Each participating Relay For Life team is encouraged to have a "contestant" dress for the occasion. Those in attendance will be able to vote for his or her favorite candidate by making a donation.

A 9 p.m., corporate sponsors will be recognized and an awards ceremony will be held.

The traditional Luminaria Ceremony begins at 10 p.m. and is a quiet time to remember those who have battled cancer. Luminarias are available from any team or committee member and the Night of the event.

A Scavenger Hunt, hosted by St. Mary's Fighting For Life team will be held at 11 p.m., and will be followed by a Fight Back Ceremony at midnight.

More games continue throughout the night and will continue until the closing ceremony at 6 a.m.

This year's Relay is composed of 14 teams. They include Ameritas, Careage of Wayne, Denise's Angels, Gail's Little Angels, Herman Chiropractic, Wayne County Jaycees, Kaden's Klassmates, NorthStar Services, Our Savior Walkers, PMC Wellness, St. Mary's Fighting For Life, Mayor's Youth Council, Wayne Motors/Winning Finish, The Wizards and Zeta Tau Omega.

A Norfolk woman was taken to the hospital after high winds forced her car into a ditch west of Wayne late Monday afternoon.

According to the Wayne County Sheriff's Office, Matraca Schnee was headed west on Highway 35 about seven miles west of Wayne when strong winds forced her to lose control of her vehicle. The vehicle went into the south ditch and rolled, coming to rest on its top.

Schnee was taken to Faith Regional Medical Center by the Winside Rescue Unit. Carroll Fire and Rescue assisted authorities at the scene.

The sheriff's office said seat belts were in use at the time of the accident.

## Bloomfield not happy with redistricting

If Dave Bloomfield is going to run in 2012 for the seat in the Nebraska Legislature that he was appointed to last year, he's going to have to shake some unfamiliar hands on the campaign trail.

The Nebraska Legislature voted to approve new boundaries for the 49 legislative districts late last week as the 2011 session of the Unicameral completed its duties. The new boundaries create changes for District 17, with Dixon County moving to District 40 - represented by Tyson Larson of O'Neill - and Thurston County coming into Bloomfield's district.

Bloomfield voted against the proposal, saying there was no justifiable reason to change the districts in question.

"I had a map drawn and presented it, and it was totally ignored," he said. "My map would have left District 17 as it stands, and given Sen. Lydia Brasch Thurston County. We had the numbers there, and it's not that I don't want to serve Thurston County, but I didn't think the change needed to be made."

Bloomfield said it will be a challenge for him because of his familiarity with Dixon County. He said he has a number of personal relationships from his days growing up in Jackson - located just across the county line in Dakota County - but he looks forward to the challenge of introducing himself to

voters in Thurston County. Bloomfield said he thinks the new boundaries will make a 2012 election bid a challenge for him, as well as Sen. Lydia Brasch, whose district is just to the south of Bloomfield's new boundaries.

The bill, LB703, was one of two bills passed by the Legislature that changes political boundaries. The second, LB704, shifted the three Congressional districts around. Wayne County will be represented by Third District Rep. Adrian Smith, rather than First District Rep. Jeff Fortenberry.

"Fortenberry has a small part of Dixon and part of Emerson, and they chopped that up in spite of my howling protest," Bloomfield said. "I don't think it had to be done that way."

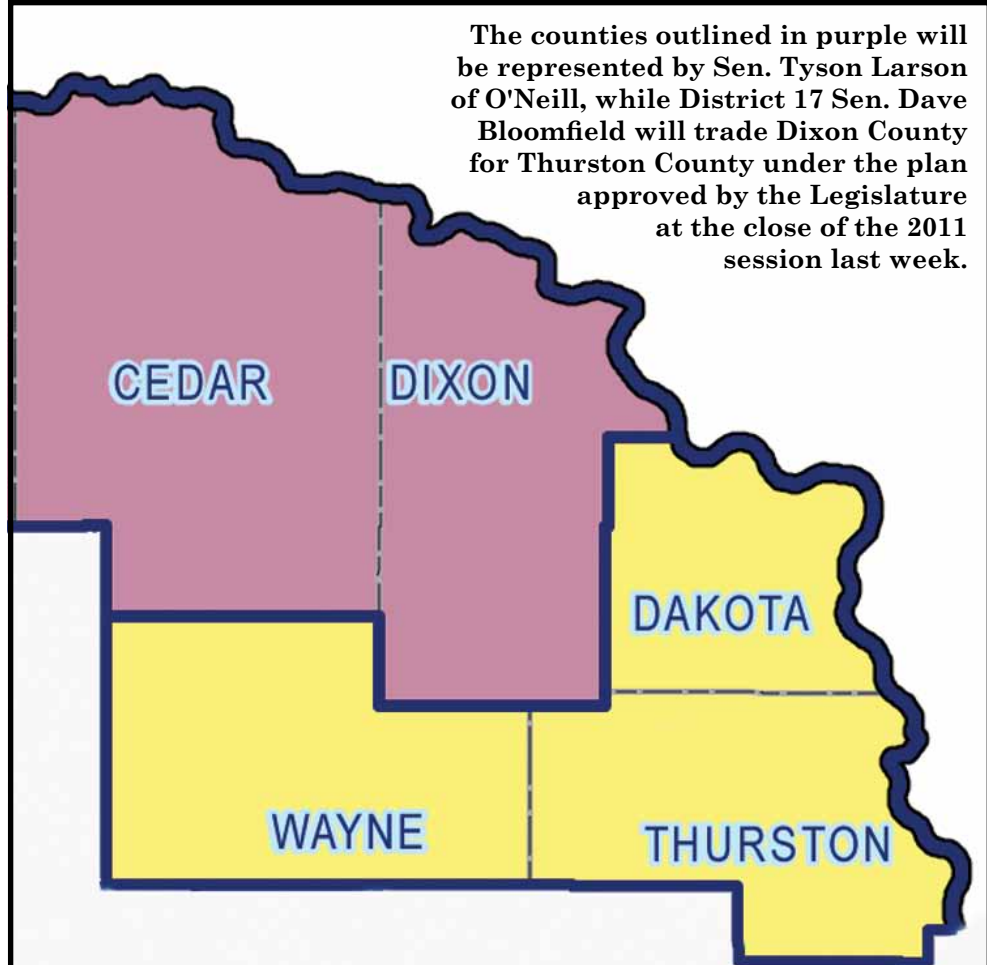
The redistricting plans were signed into law by Gov. Dave Heinemann on Thursday and went into effect the following day, meaning Bloomfield will have to get to work meeting people in his new district.

"I've done some business in Thurston County over the years, and I'll be looking forward to getting to know more people there," he said. "I'll just need to get acquainted with people."

With the flooding taking place along the Missouri River in eastern Thurston County, Bloomfield said he'll get an opportunity to do just that.

"With all the water coming down the river, I'll have ample opportunity," he said.

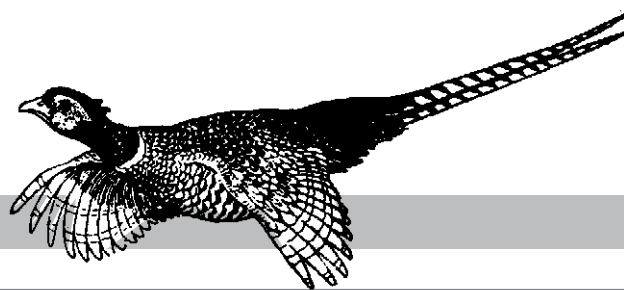

Survivors include 13 nieces and nephews and numerous other friends and relatives.

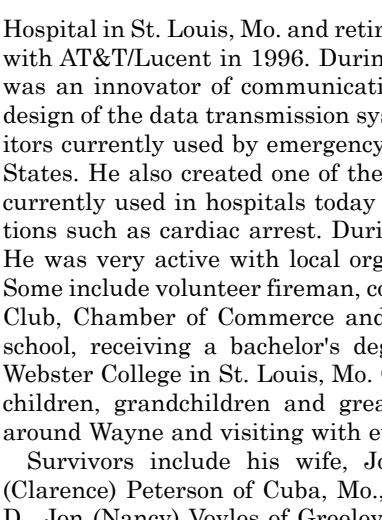

### Looking Ahead in Wayne

#### City Council Meetings

Regular City Council meetings are at 5:30 p.m. on the first and third Tuesdays of each month in city hall at Third and Pearl Streets.

#### Budget Time is Here

The City of Wayne Budget has two major parts:

- 1) Utility Departments for water, sewer and electrical service;
- 2) Government General Fund for streets, fire and police departments, library, senior center, city recreation, activity center, building code, nuisance and zoning enforcement, and parks.

#### General Fund budget assumptions we have been using in the past

- 1) Personnel and operating costs for the General Fund are about \$2.6 million per year with \$1.6 million of that being personnel costs.
- 2) The mayor gives city staff a range of Cost of Living increase from 0-2 percent he wants us to present to the council for their consideration.
- 3) City of Wayne job descriptions are all assigned a pay range from beginning wage to maximum wage each year by the city council.
- 4) City hourly wage job descriptions are all listed on a pay grid that provides for a 2.75 percent

"years of service" pay increase for each of the first nine years of successful employment on the job;

5) Employees and their families are eligible for \$500 deductible group health insurance and after the deductible is met, the city self-insures 80 percent of eligible medical costs up to \$10,000 each year;

6) We expect an 8-12 percent increase in city group health premiums each year;

7) We anticipate a 5 percent annual increase in the city property and casualty insurance premiums each year;

8) We choose to request either the same property tax amount as the previous year or the same mill levy as the previous year and work the spending budget backwards to slowly reduce the city's portion of the property tax amount on each property;

9) The city property tax asking to cover General Fund operating costs in the current year is \$611,000. Property tax generates about 24 percent of the revenues needed to operate the government at our current level of staffing and operation. The rest comes from occupation taxes, fees and state government allocations.

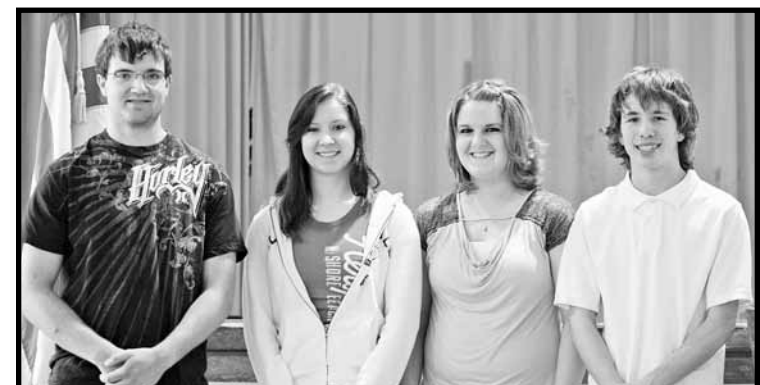

## Fletcher represents Wayne at national conference recently

Irene Fletcher attended the 2011 National Main Streets Conference May 22-25, in Des Moines, Iowa.

Attracting more than 1,000 Main Street professionals from across the country, the annual conference is considered the premier event for preservation-based commercial district revitalization. The conference focused on the various means of growing downtowns, from weaving sustainability practices into Main Streets, to recruiting and strengthening local businesses.

Fletcher, who serves as the assistant director of Wayne Area Economic Development and program manager for Revitalize Wayne Main Street, was provided with strategies and skills that capital-

ize on the economic impact of cultural tourism, historic preservation and local entrepreneurship. There were more than 50 educational sessions, workshops and field trips that focused on successful strategies for revitalizing downtowns and neighborhood commercial districts.

This is the first time a representative from the Wayne Main Street program was able to attend the National Conference.

"I appreciated the opportunity to network with my peers from across the states working on historic preservation through economic development," Fletcher said. "Our Iowa hosts provided an excellent series of local tours that enhanced the educational seminars."

The conference provided the chance to showcase the billions of dollars in reinvestment, millions of volunteer hours, hundreds of thousands of new jobs and new businesses and thousands of revitalized communities that are realized using the National Trust Main Street Center's Main Street Four-Point Approach methodology.

Conference highlights included:

- A keynote address by Edward T. McMahon of the Urban Land Institute in which he talked about the death of the suburban strip mall and forecasts a bright future for Main Street;

- The annual "State of Main Street" report, with its summary of economic trends that reveal how Main Streets nationwide are surviving and thriving;

- The announcement of the prestigious 2011 Great American Main Street Award winners;

- The presentation of the Main Street Leadership Award to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, represented by Under Secretary for Rural Development, Dallas Tonsager;

- Conversaciones, a forum for Hispanics and Latinos to discuss preserving their heritage and involving Hispanic and Latino business owners in Main Street revitalization; and

- Four days of educational and networking opportunities with colleagues who are experiencing similar successes and challenges in their communities.

"Main Streets are the heart and soul of America and the Main Street program has had unparalleled success in guiding their revitalization while saving places that are important to local communities," said Stephanie Meeks, president of the National Trust for Historic Preservation and the conference's closing keynote speaker.

"This year's conference provided a chance for policymakers, practitioners and planners to take a closer look at how Main Streets are powerful centers for innovation and economic growth, including creative business models, cutting-edge sustainability practices and unique public-private partnerships."

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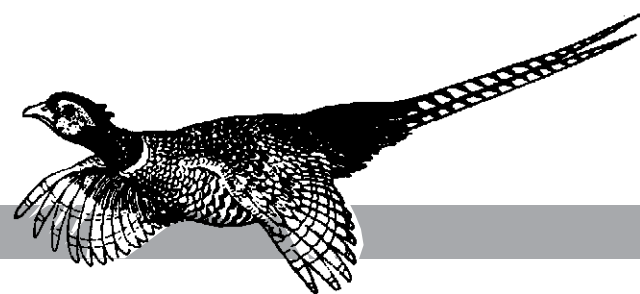

## Lot of great moments in sports year

Whew – what a year.

Now I realize we're still a full six months away from the end of the calendar year. But as you know, the school year runs on a little different schedule, and that includes the local sports scene.

June is the new year for the sports department here at the Wayne Herald. It marks the end of the school sports year for the area high schools and Wayne State College, and gives us an opportunity to reflect on what a year it was.

There were a lot of great moments during the 2010-11 sports year, more than we could possibly list in this space. Allow The Bleacher Bum to try and remember, off the top of his shaven head, some of the big moments of this past season:

**We're No. 1 . . . times two** – The development of the Wayne State volleyball program under Scott Kneifl was highlighted when the Wildcats were ranked as the No. 1 team in the nation twice during the 2010 fall season. While their time at the top was very short – they suffered losses both weeks they were at the top – it's still a nice feather in the caps of these young ladies to have taken Wayne State College someplace it had never been before in any sport.

**Down and out at state** – Area high school teams that made the state tournament, unfortunately, didn't have very long stays. Wayne High's football team had the dubious distinction of drawing Norfolk Catholic in the first round. Winside's volleyball team ran into the eventual state champions for the second straight year. The Wayne High softball team lost its season opener, rattled off 28 wins in a row, and then got the two-game hook. And the Wayne High boys basketball team avenged its football defeat by beating the Knights, only to draw the top seed from Grand Island Central Catholic and finishing with a one-and-done. Winside's football team was the only area team to get out of the first round, making it to the round of 16 before losing at Osmond. While not getting a shot at the finals is a disappointment, those teams can be proud of their efforts in making it to state, which is sometimes a tougher gig than the state tourney itself.

**But making it to state wasn't ALL bad** – In the sports of golf and cross country, Wayne High had a very good season, capped off by solid efforts at state. The Wayne High boys finished fourth and were very close to being in the hunt for a trophy, while the Blue Devils girls finished eighth. On the links, Wayne didn't have a single medalist, but had a solid effort up and down the lineup to finish in fourth place. Individually, Collin Preston gave the Blue Devil boys linksters a spot in the state tournament, qualifying as an individual.

**We are the champions (regular season edition)** – Last year, the Wayne State women's basketball team came through and won the NSIC tournament title. This year, they took care of business in the regular season with an amazing 21-1 record. They had hopes of hosting the Central Region tournament, but an upset loss in the semifinals of the conference tournament left them with another road trip to Colorado. They reached the semifinals, but were unable to make it to the Elite Eight.

**We are (almost) the champions** – Nothing like a little drama to close out the sports year. The Laurel-Concord/Coleridge girls were oh-so-close to winning a fourth straight Class C title in girls track. They were within striking distance heading into the final two events, and three inches was the difference between a fourth consecutive championship and the runner-up trophy. The Lady Bears finished above their district placings in more than half of the events they scored in and made the most of their talents despite having just seven girls competing. And just

## Rager posts three-stroke victory in Men's Open

Despite cool and damp conditions, the Wayne Men's Amateur Golf Open was held Sunday in its traditional Memorial Day weekend slot.

The turnout for the annual event was up from recent history, as nearly 120 players took to the links at Wayne Country Club. When the fog cleared, it was South Sioux City's Chris Rager coming into focus as the champion of 2011 with a 27-hole score of 106 (two-under par).

The 26-year-old Morningside graduate said he enjoys the Wayne course from playing it in college and high school, where he participated from South Sioux City High School.

"I think I played this course about five times total," Rager said. "I like playing here because every hole presents something different."

Rager polished off his first 18 holes with an even par 72 before dipping into the red numbers for the final nine holes with a 34. He birdied No. 2 and No. 9 and posted seven pars over the championship nine holes.

Despite being tied with Wayne's Mike Varley after the first 18 holes at even par 72, Rager said he didn't change his gameplan over the final nine holes.

"I didn't try and play conservative or take chances I ordinarily wouldn't have taken," he said. "I just played to my strength, which is chipping and putting. I had a lot of up-and-downs today. I think I only hit a handful of fairways."

Wayne State graduate Adam Fields came from a couple shots back to place runner-up with a one-over par 109 after posting a one-under 35 over the final nine holes, while Alex Carritt of Wahoo placed third with a 111. Carritt and Rager posted the best score in the final nine holes as each carded 34's.

Varley settled for fourth place at 111, falling to Carritt by tie-breaker while Bode Hill of Fremont rounded out the top five with a 113. Wayne's Joey Baldwin placed 15th with a 117. Former Wayne graduate Ryan

Sturm, now of San Diego, Calif., placed eighth with a 114.

In flight play, Sam Prue captured top honors with a two-under par 70 in the first flight while Shane Schuster fired a 74 for second place. Mike Petersen was third at 78 followed by Wayne's Brad Hansen with a 79.

David Claussen edged his brother, Jason Claussen of Wayne in the second flight by way of tie-breaker as each fired 78's. Tim Carlson was third with a 78 and Dave Anderson, fourth with a 79.

Troy Meade won flight three with a 77 while Wayne's Kelly Hansen was second with a 78. Bill Ellis was third with an 82 and Ben Martin of Wayne was fourth at 87.

Wayne's Joel Ankeny won the fourth flight with an 80 followed by Rod Doenhofer with an 81 and

Wayne's Kevin Peterson at 86. Jeffrey Reichs was fourth at 87.

Bill Rager won the fifth flight with an 86 while Craig Sharpe of Wayne was second with an 86 and Burke Noonan, third at 90. K.C. Belitz was fourth with a 91.

Anthony Earth captured flight six with an 85, while Matt Blomenkamp fired an 86 and Dave Dunn, 87. Scott Metzler was fourth with a 93.

## Bunchek is All-American at Div. II national meet

TURLOCK, Calif. – Ross Bunchek of Wayne State earned All-American honors with a seventh-place finish in the men's hammer throw at the NCAA Div. II Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

Bunchek recorded a top throw of 196 feet, 1 inch on his third and final throw in prelims to advance into the finals. He entered the national meet ranked fifth in NCAA Div. II with a top regular season mark of 206 feet, 6 inches at the Drake Relays in Des Moines, Iowa on April 30.

It's the second All-American finish for Bunchek with the Wildcats this season after placing sixth in the 35-pound weight throw at the NCAA Div. II Indoor Nationals in Albuquerque, N.M. in March.

John Kern and Carly Fehringer competed Friday evening. Kern was 12th in the finals of the men's

3,000-meter steeplechase, while Fehringer, a native of Wayne, was 18th in the women's shot put.

Kern recorded a time of 9:11.20 in Friday evening's finals. He needed to run at least a 9:03.27 to finish in the top eight and earn All-American honors. He entered the national meet ranked 12th in the event with a season-best time of 9:03.14 at the Drake Relays in Des Moines, Iowa on April 30.

Fehringer finished with a top throw of 41 feet, 7 inches. The freshman entered the national meet ranked 17th in the nation in the shot put after recording a top throw of 46 feet, 7 1/4 inches at the Nebraska Open in Lincoln on May 1. She was the lone national qualifier for the Wayne State College women's track and field team.

# Bisenius is third-team All-American

Wayne State outfielder Mike Bisenius was named to the Rawlings/American Baseball Coaches Association 2011 NCAA Div. II All-American Baseball Team, earning third-team honors.

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# Goetzinger earns three All-Americans

Wayne State softball pitcher Katie Goetzinger was awarded three All-American softball honors last week.

The senior was announced as 2011 Louisville Slugger/NFCA Div. II third-team All-American pitcher by the National Fastpitch Coaches Association at the NCAA Banquet of Champions in Salem, Va.

She was also named to the 2011 Capitol One Academic All-America softball team, earning first-team Academic All-American honors as selected by the College Sports Information Directors of America, with a 3.75 grade-point average majoring in Applied Human and Sport Physiology; and received third-team Daktronics All-American honors as voted on by sports information directors from across the country.

It's the second straight season Goetzinger has earned All-American honors. Last season she was second-team ESPN the Magazine Academic All-American, and was third-team All-American pitcher by Louisville Slugger/NFCA.

Goetzinger was named NSIC Pitcher of the Year for a second straight season and finished 2011 with a 30-10 record and a 1.31 earned run average. In conference play, she was 19-2 with six shutouts and a 0.76 ERA. Goetzinger had 12 shutouts and 24 complete games while striking out 316 batters in 256.2 innings pitched. This season, Goetzinger had two no-hitters and one perfect game, and ranks in the top 10 in NCAA Div. II in five different categories. She was also named the Wayne State College Female Athlete of the Year at the season-ending Wayne State College Athletic Honors Banquet.

Goetzinger holds virtually every pitching record in Wayne State softball history, finishing her career with a record of 116-49 will 11 saves. She had 1,163 strikeouts in 1,050 innings pitched and had 40 career shutouts with five no-hitters and three perfect games.

# Wayne State sixth in NSIC all-sport results

Wayne State finished sixth in the 2010-11 Northern Sun Conference/US Bank All-Sports Award competition.

Augustana captured the All-Sports Award with 145 points, winning seven conference titles, finishing 21 points ahead of two-time defending all-sports award winner Minnesota State with 124 points and three conference titles. St. Cloud State was third with 100 points, followed closely by Minnesota Duluth and Winona State tied for fourth with 98 points. Wayne State was sixth with 91.5 points while Concordia-St. Paul took seventh with 84 points. The University of Mary (75), MSU Moorhead (70) and Northern State (57) rounded out the top 10.

Wayne State College had one conference championship in the 2010-11 school year, women's basketball, while seven other sports collected top four finishes in their respective sports. Softball and men's golf each placed

second, volleyball finished third while men's cross country, men's indoor track and field, women's indoor track and field and baseball each collected fourth place finishes this season.

The winner of each title in a conference-sponsored championship receives points totaling the number of teams in that sport plus one. The next place finisher receives points totaling the number of teams less the number of places from first place. Ties in the standings at any level shall result in the totaling of points and distributed equally. Indoor and outdoor track and field are computed at half the total points listed in the previous mentioned categories.

The sixth place finish is one spot better than last year's finish of seventh out of the 14 teams that compete in the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference.

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# Northeast part of exchange program

Administrators at Northeast Community College have recently been informed that Northeast is one of four, two-year colleges in the country invited to participate in the International Student Exchange Program (ISEP).

Northeast was recommended for inclusion in the program by the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC). A committee made up of ISEP and AACC representatives chose the two-year colleges invited to participate. Until now, ISEP opportunities were available only to students from four-year colleges or universities.

Other community colleges invited to participate are Fullerton College in Fullerton, Cal., Fox Valley Technical College in Appleton, Wis., and Eastern Iowa Community College District in Davenport, Iowa. ISEP is a network of over 300 colleges and universities in approximately 50 countries that cooperate to provide affordable access to international college education. Exchange opportunities are available for a four- or eight-week summer session, winter semester, or entire academic year. Student participants pay the cost of their own tuition, housing, and meals at the home institution.

Northeast's collaboration with ISEP is just one of a three-phase, study-abroad initiative that is being developed at the college. Another phase is a two-week study trip to England and France in May of 2012

led by Speech/Theatre Instructor Adam Peterson, who earned his master's degree in England and has also studied in Moscow and Bali. The study trip will follow completion of a three-credit-hour Intercultural Communications class taught by Peterson. The class is a prerequisite for the one-credit-hour England-France trip.

Facilitation for both the short-term study abroad trip and the longer-term ISEP program is being done by the recently-formed Northeast Global Opportunities (GO) committee, with Pam Saalfeld, associate dean of humanities, arts and social sciences, as chairperson. Saalfeld will also serve as the ISEP coordinator for the college.

The final phase and goal of the GO committee is a faculty exchange, a process that may also be brought to the forefront by Northeast's involvement with the ISEP program.

Northeast President Dr. Bill R. Path has included international exchange programs in Northeast's 2010-2015 Strategic Plan following his 10-day visit to China last October. He visited China at the invitation of the AACC to attend the International Forum on Vocational and Technical Education in Beijing. After the conference, he visited vocational college campuses in Beijing and four other Chinese cities.

# Game and Parks board approves regulations

LINCOLN – More deer hunters will be required to earn their buck this fall.

The Nebraska Game and Parks Board of Commissioners adopted expanded Earn-a-Buck restrictions, along with other 2011 big game (deer, antelope and elk) regulations, at their meeting May 27 at Ponca State Park.

Earn-a-Buck was created in 2010 for the Elkhorn and Wahoo firearm units to help control the white-tailed deer population in eastern Nebraska. The Earn-a-Buck restriction requires hunters to check in a doe before or at the same time they check in a buck – earning a buck by first shooting a doe. It helped. Hunters harvested a record number of antlerless white-tailed deer throughout the state last year.

This year, Earn-a-Buck is expanded to include the Missouri, Blue Northwest and Blue Southeast units.

Another change this year limits the number of permits a person may have that allow mule deer harvest in the Mule Deer Conservation Area to one.

Other deer regulation changes include limiting Youth Deer permits to one per person, creating a Youth Whitetail permit, increasing bonus antlerless whitetail tags in the Loup East and Calamus East units by 3,100, and restricting antlerless mule deer harvest on public lands in the Pine Ridge Unit.

To accommodate the increasing elk population, the board voted to expand landowner zones in the Hat Creek, Bordeaux and North Platte River units. An additional 15 bull and six antlerless tags are authorized for elk hunting this fall.

Three additional late season antelope units were created in the North Sioux, Dismal and Box Butte East units, with 138 doe/

fawn permits, due to increasing populations and increasing landowner complaints. The Box Butte Unit was split into East and West units to better manage the population. A statewide youth archery antelope permit is created for residents and nonresidents age 12-15.

## Winside students make trip to Black Hills

Eighteen Winside Students, recently completed a five day tour out west. The group departed Winside High School on May 23, stopping for the day at Fort Niobrara north of Valentine.

While at Ft. Niobrara Park, ranger Steve Hicks gave a brief talk concerning bison genetics at the park and throughout the United States. After the discussion, the class proceeded on a hike around the Ft. Falls area and took a walk down to the Niobrara River. Mid-morning activities found them at the Bowring Ranch north of Merriman. The group was engaged in a tour of Arthur Bowring's original sodhouse, then proceed to view Eva Bowring's vast collections of silver and glassware. The morning concluded with a fried chicken lunch by the ranch operator Diane Burress.

After the noon meal, the class then headed west over to the North American Museum of Fur Trade in Chadron for a video presentation and walk through tour of the historic fur trading post. Museum curator Gail Dubois then gave a guided tour of the reconstructed Bordeaux Trading Post on the site. Then it was off to Hot Springs, S.D., for some more adventure as the group hit scenic Cascade Falls and had a chance to cool their feet in the stream.

After the brief stop the students proceeded to the Wild Horse Sanctuary about 15 miles south of Hot Springs. They took a two-hour tour of the ranch and were able to see Spanish and American mustangs, mule deer, and the ranches own Quarter horses. The ranch was also the site of a little film activity in the past. The movies, Hidalgo and Crazy Horse, were filmed on site along with a couple of the old Marlboro commercials. Then it was time for a little relaxation and a swim at the historic Evan's Plunge site. The group spent a couple hours swimming and then viewed some of the old brownstone structures around the town before turning in for the evening.

Tuesday was a day filled with travel and adventure as the group shuttled between the Mammoth site and Wind Cave National Park. They have a chance to view the workings of the Mammoth site along with several mammoth skeletons and a mockup of a primitive, native dwelling. At Wind Cave the group took a walking tour along with a wild cave spelunking tour with the hard hats, head lamps, and knee pads. This was followed up with a mile hike to the Rankin Ridge Fire Tower and an evening meal at the Bavarian Inn in Custer, S.D. The remainder of the evening was spent at Mt. Rushmore for the night lighting. Unfortunately, it was raining and foggy which prevented the group from seeing

the memorial.

Wednesday morning was another early start with a short hike through the Gordon Stockade Fort outside of Custer State Park. This was one of the first army forts in the Black Hills region. The class then took in a guided tour of Jewel Cave which was followed up with a short drive to the original, natural cave entrance west of the park facilities. The class then took off for a scenic view of the Black Hills at the Coolidge Ranger Lookout Tower in Custer Park. This was followed up with a noon meal at historic Blue Bell Lodge and then a drive through Custer State Park, where they were able to see a number of bison, deer, pronghorn, prairie dogs, and burros.

Then it was off to the Grace Coolidge General Store where some of them met Lane Kendrick, an Oklahoma artist who spends much of the summer in the Black Hills painting on a variety of media (Currently, she was working on a quarter scale model of an American bison). This was followed up with a drive through the Needles and Cathedral Spires region. Ten of the students took a swim in the frigid waters of Sylvan Lake, before all of them took a short hike around the lake. The group finished up the afternoon activities with just enough time to buzz up to Mt. Rushmore for an afternoon viewing. It was then a quick ride down to the Crazy Horse Memorial. The students watched an informative video about the construction process and were able to take a bus tour to the base of the memorial. The evening was spent with a little swimming at the Bavarian Inn before getting ready for a big tour day on Thursday.

Thursday came, and it was another early start for the group as they tried a little gold panning at Wade's Historic Gold Mill near Hill City. Host Robert Wade and his cousin, Jim Wade, gave a

guided historic tour of old mining equipment and allowed them to view his own mining operation. Later on the tour was completed as they instructed the group in the art of gold panning. Everyone collected numerous samples of garnet crystals but only one (Elysia Wagner) had any luck finding a bit of gold after the demo. After the panning expedition, the group visited the Black Hills Institute of Geological Research in Hill City. They had the opportunity to view several examples of T-rex fossils. The museum owners (brothers Neal and Pete Larson) are world famous for their discovery of the near complete T-rex fossils "Sue and Stan" in the early 1990's. The students were fortunate to have chief curator give a tour and explain the inner workings of the business of paleontology. After this, the group headed north to Rapid City to the world famous Reptile Gardens. While on site, the students viewed a number of exhibits and were able to take in the snake show.

Next, the group toured the Black Hills School of Mines geology museum to view various fossils and crystals along with having the opportunity to see replicas of the worlds largest gold nuggets and a number of fluorescent mineral displays. It was then off to the Journey Center Museum. Shortly after arriving, the students were engaged in a film presentation and guided tour of the center. Jim Minor, a local docent for the museum, offered them an historical outlook of the Black Hills region. Then it was off to Wall, S.D., where the group toured the Wounded Knee Memorial Museum and viewed a variety of historical documents and photographs dedicated to the memory of those who perished at Wounded Knee in the late 1800's. The group hopped back on the vans and zipped down the interstate to a historic sodhouse, homestead outside of the Badlands. Heidi Porch gave an informal tour and the group had a chance to view the internal dwelling, farm buildings and some of the white prairie dogs native to the area. The homestead was developed by three families

from Pierce County in the late 1800's. Next, the group entered the Badlands National Monument south of the prairie homestead. They had a chance to hike around and take pictures of the scenic, eroded landscape. Due to the excessive rain in the area during the week they didn't have a whole lot of time to go hiking in the area.

Friday was off to a bright and early start with a self guided tour of the "Original South Dakota 1880's Town. The group spent an hour and a half viewing numerous old buildings and displays portraying activity around the latter part of the 19th century. Then it was off to one final stop on the tour. The class arrived in Mitchell, S.D. shortly after noon and was led on a guided tour of the Mitchell Prehistoric Site north of town. This was an area discovered in the early 1900's took in 20 acres of an ancient Mandan Indian village. The group was able to see the actual excavation site, a mockup village, and a replicated Mandan earth home. On the way through Mitchell the students got a nice view of the popular "Corn Palace" before leaving to go home.

Students taking part in the trip were Hannah Clocker, Megan Skokan, Brady Wurdeman, Abbie Thies, Tina Nelson, Kourtney Frederick, Kirstie Koch, Alec Sindelar, Erin Gray, John Hansen, Morgan Benck, Forrest Jones, Elysia Wagner, Tarrin Quinn, Morgan Petzoldt, Tanner Woslager, Mandi Benck, and Tyler Jaeger along with instructors Paul Sok and Mark Tonniges

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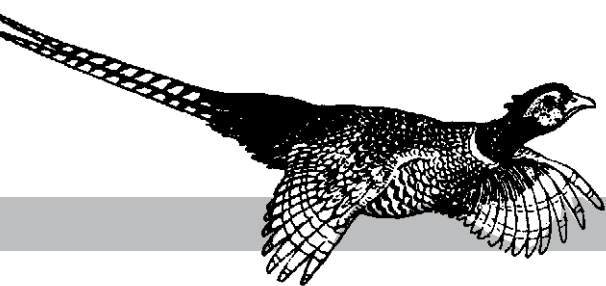
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## Don't get me started

# Legislative session not so bad

LINCOLN – It could have been worse!

In fact, it could have been a lot worse.

The 2011 Legislature came and went. There were no increases in the state sales and income tax rates.

Facing a potential revenue shortfall of up to \$1 billion, lawmakers cut funding for most stage agencies.

There were no wars over where the money went. A skirmish or two, but no political bloodshed.

Direct financial aid to local governments was eliminated, and there are more restrictions on local taxes. Senators also denied cities, specifically Omaha, the right even to ask local voters a half-cent increase in the maximum sales tax levy.

Elimination of that direct aid represented state government going back on a longtime promise to the locals. Fair is fair. Reality is not.

Legislators took action on two important, perhaps historic, issues.

Despite Gov. Dave Heineman's vocal opposition, lawmakers decided to make a first-ever commitment of state sales tax revenues to fund state, county and city roads projects.

Beginning in 2014 there will be some \$65 million less available each year for other programs, ranging from state aid to schools to social services. Roads projects have traditionally been funded through user fees – taxes on fuel and motor vehicles.

Enactment of the law was seen as a personal accomplishment for Sen. Deb Fischer of Valentine. She is being mentioned as a candidate



for the Republican nomination for the U.S. Senate.

State and local government got their way in revising the Commission on Industrial Relations, the panel that settles wage disputes among unionized public employees and state, county and municipal government.

The changes give government the upper hand in future negotiations. Workers keep their right to collective bargaining.

There were other important, but

predictable, decisions.

So-called telemedicine abortions were outlawed. Those involve early-on pregnancies where a woman takes a couple of pills to induce abortion. A doctor supervises the procedure via a private, onscreen computer connection. The procedure is available through Planned Parenthood in Iowa.

Using results from the latest federal census, senators redrew political boundaries, including those for the three congressional districts

and the Legislature. Things went as expected. The overwhelming Republican majority had its way.

The Omaha-dominated 2nd District was reconfigured so that Democratic presidential candidates aren't likely to carry a majority of the vote and, with it, one of Nebraska's five electoral votes. That happened in 2008 and the GOP succeeded in making a recurrence all but impossible.

## Legislative Update

# Many highlights to legislative session

The Nebraska Legislature has adjourned sine die.

Sine die is a Latin word for "without day." According to Wikipedia, "A legislative body adjourns sine die when it adjourns without appointing a day on which to appear or assemble again." The 90-day, or long session, has been completed. Unless the Governor calls us back into special session for a specific purpose, the Legislature will not meet again this year. (The Legislature actually adjourned sine die on day 87, as we completed all the work necessary for this session. The Legislature can adjourn before the 90th day, but cannot exceed the 90 days without being called into "special session.")

The Legislature addressed many topics this session. First and foremost, we passed a budget for

the next two years. We started with a \$986 million deficit, and ended the year with a balanced budget without raising taxes. We passed two bills dealing with abortion: (1) my priority bill (LB521) which prevents webcam abortions by requiring a doctor to be physically present when an abortion occurs. (2) Senator Lydia Brasch's LB690 requires written parental consent before an abortion can be performed on a minor under the age of eighteen.

The Legislature passed LB305, which will require the Department of Agriculture to study the feasibility of creating a statewide meat and poultry inspection program. Senator Bob Krist's priority bill was LB284, which increased the distance for groups to legally picket funerals from 300 feet to 500 feet. (500 miles

would have been better, but 500 feet will stand up to court challenges.)

The Legislature passed LB629, a bill that creates the Oil Pipeline Reclamation Act. The bill requires that a pipeline carrier owning, constructing, operating or managing a pipeline through the state for transporting oil be financially responsible for reclamation costs related to construction, operation and management of the pipeline. We also passed two bills (LB675 and LB667) that increase penalties for driving under the influence of alcohol. Major changes were made to the Court of Industrial Relations (LB397), which I think will be very

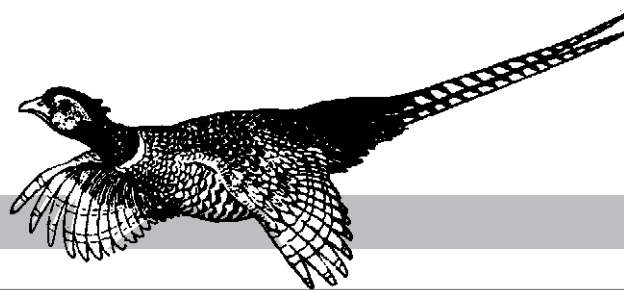

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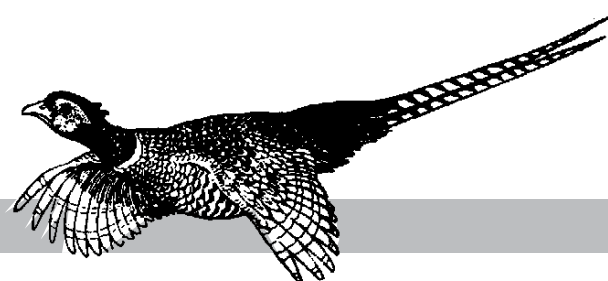

## What is your learning style?

"It's not how smart I am, but how I am smart."

Individuals process information in different ways, and those who are able to identify which learning styles work best for them may be able to improve their learning experiences.

The theory of multiple intelligences was developed in 1983 by Dr. Howard Gardner, a professor of education at Harvard University. Gardner proposes eight different intelligences to account for a broader range of human potential in children and adults.

- Linguistic intelligence (word smart)

- Logical-Mathematical intelligence (number/reasoning smart)
- Spatial intelligence (picture smart)
- Bodily-Kinesthetic intelligence (body smart)
- Musical intelligence (music smart)
- Interpersonal intelligence (people smart)
- Intrapersonal intelligence (self smart)
- Naturalist intelligence (nature smart)

In the past, many assumed that our intelligence was more or less set at birth by heredity and could be quantified by I.Q. testing. However, these tests do not take into consideration different environmental and cultural factors which affect the development of our intellectual capabilities. Intelligence can be taught, learned, and improved at any age and at almost any ability level.

Most of our culture focuses their attention on linguistic and logical-mathematical intelligence. Dr. Gardner says that we should place

equal attention on individuals who show gifts in other intelligences: the gardeners, therapists, architects, artists, entrepreneurs, and many others. Unfortunately, many children who have these gifts are not receiving much reinforcement.

However, 4-H offers youth over 150 different developmentally appropriate projects which foster the extension of their multiple intelligences with researched based curricula and procedures. Each child has the opportunity to learn in ways harmonious with their unique minds.

Gardner's theory of multiple intelligences had created an evolution in the way that lessons are being presented to our youth. Effective youth development professionals are being encouraged and trained to include a wide variety of learning strategies into their lessons that collectively appeal to all learning styles. Some of the successful teaching tools include incorporating music, multimedia, role play, cooperative learning, inner reflection, field trips, and much more.

We are ALL smart in many ways, not just one. All of the intelligences

are different, but they are also equal. The different intelligences work together in almost everything you do.

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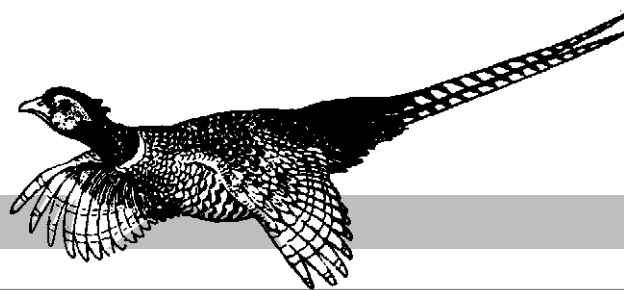

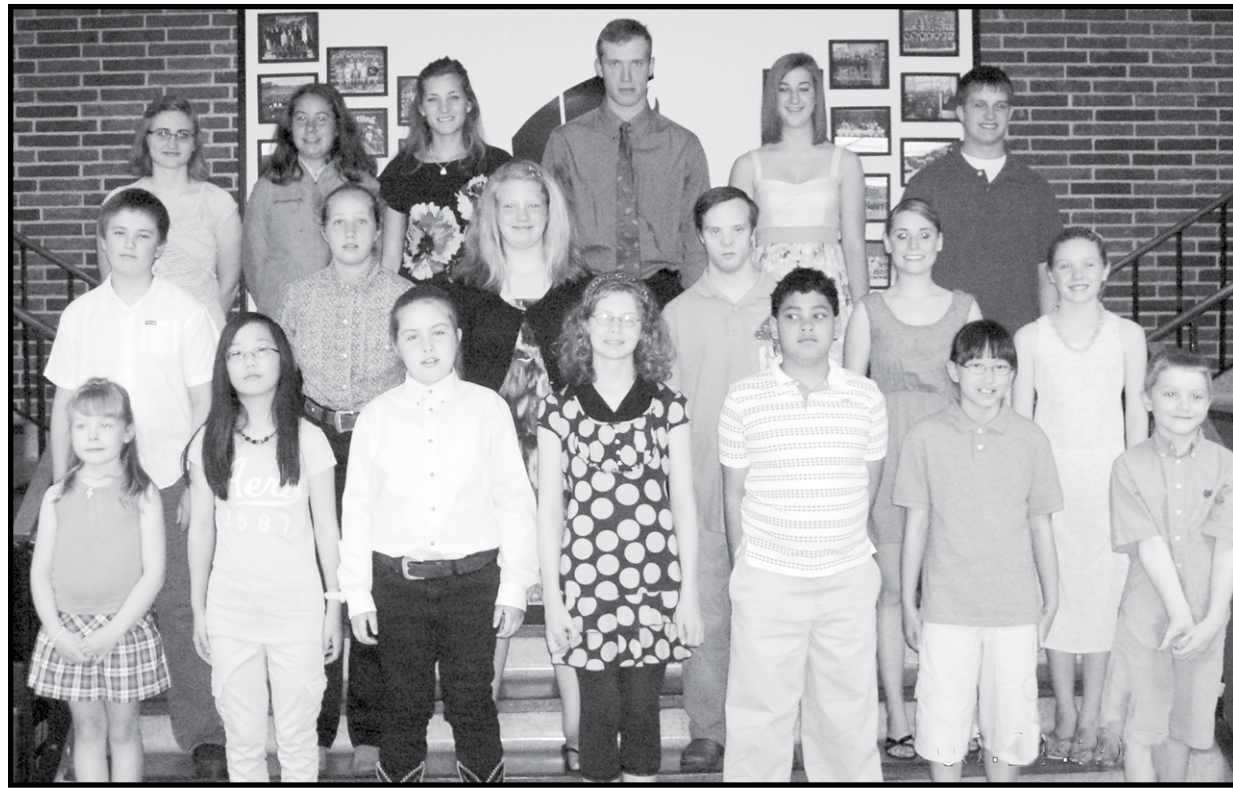

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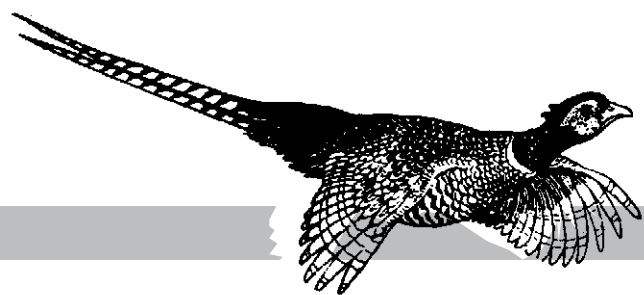

It's very well done, and rather refreshing; there are only kisses between the lead couple, and only one scene involving foul language, and it's very appropriate there. What's more, I found myself recalling some of the fallout from the Duke of Windsor's decision to marry a divorced woman and abdicate the throne.

It ends with the new king's first wartime speech, and reminds us of the tremendous stress the Brits endured during that war. There was a scene with the air raid warnings, and some newsreel of the Nazi troops goose stepping in Berlin. I thought it was fascinating to watch history being made.

Anyway, it was a fitting way for us to remember never to forget. Especially when our troops are still being killed or wounded in far away countries. God bless our men and women in uniform, and the loved ones waiting for their return.

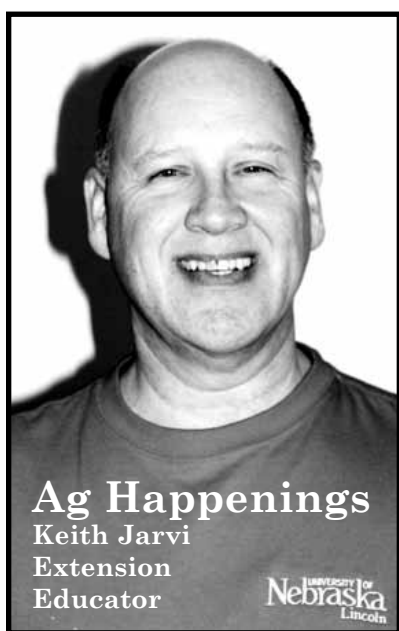
## SoyWater helps optimize irrigation and energy usage

A new UNL website offers soybean producers an easy-to-use decision aid for optimizing irrigation efficiency and energy use.

SoyWater, available at soywater.unl.edu, asks a few, simple questions specific to the field and then provides daily estimates of crop water use and soil water status.

Users log on and after just a few mouse-clicks, SoyWater provides a table of real-time, actual daily weather data for computing daily crop water use from planting (or emergence) to the day before producer log-in. It then uses historical weather data to compute daily crop water use from the day of log-in to the day of expected crop maturity.

The daily weather data is from a weather station of the Automated Weather Data Network (AWDN) maintained by the High Plains Regional Climate Center (HPRCC). (SoyWater automatically identifies the weather station nearest the producer's field.) During the season, the producer will log in to SoyWater to input the date and amount of local rainfall and any irrigation applications.

Based on this information, SoyWater will highlight the projected date when the first (or next) irrigation should be scheduled and projects the dates of specific soybean vegetative (V-) and reproductive (R-) growth stages.

SoyWater can be useful to both

rainfed and irrigated soybean producers interested in predicting the date of a V- or R-stage. This information also can be useful when making other crop management decisions for a particular soybean field, such as when the effectiveness of a herbicide or fungicide depends on application at a specific growth stage.

Give it a try.

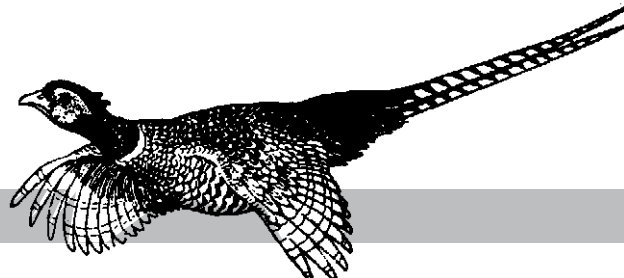
