



Bloomfield not happy with redistricting

If Dave Bloomfield is going to run in 2012 for the seat in the Nebraska Legislature that he was appointed to last year, he's going to have to shake some unfamiliar hands on the campaign trail.

The Nebraska Legislature voted to approve new boundaries for the 49 legislative districts late last week as the 2011 session of the Unicameral completed its duties. The new boundaries create changes for District 17, with Dixon County moving to District 40 - represented by Tyson Larson of O'Neill – and Thurston County coming into Bloomfield's district.

Bloomfield voted against the proposal, saying there was no justifiable reason to change the districts in question.

"I had a map drawn and presented it, and it was totally ignored," he said. "My map would have left District 17 as it stands, and given Sen. Lydia Brasch Thurston County. We had the numbers there, and it's not that I don't want to serve Thurston County, but I didn't think the change needed to be made."

Bloomfield said it will be a challenge for him because of his familiarity with Dixon County. He said he has a number of personal relationships from his days growing up in Jackson – located just across the county line in Dakota County - but he looks forward to the challenge of introducing himself to river, I'll have ample opportunity," he said.

voters in Thurston County.

Bloomfield said he thinks the new boundaries will make a 2012 election bid a challenge for him, as well as Sen. Lydia Brasch, whose district is just to the south of Bloomfield's new boundaries.

The bill, LB703, was one of two bills passed by the Legislature that changes political boundaries. The second, LB704, shifted the three Congressional districts around. Wayne County will be represented by Third District Rep. Adrian Smith, rather than First District Rep. Jeff Fortenberry.


"Fortenberry has a small part of Dixon and part of Emerson, and they chopped that up in spit of my howling protest," Bloomfield said. "I don't think it had to be done that way.

The redistricting plans were signed into law by Gov. Dave Heinemann on Thursday and went into effect the following day, meaning Bloomfield will have to get to work meeting people in his new district.

"I've done some business in Thurston County over the years, and I'll be looking forward to getting to know more people there," he said. "I'll just need to get acquainted with people."

With the flooding taking place along the Missouri River in eastern Thurston County, Bloomfield said he'll get an opportunity to do just that.

Lot of great moments in sports year

Whew - what a year.

Now I realize we're still a full six months away from the end of the calendar year. But as you know, the school year runs on a little different schedule, and that includes the local sports scene. June is the new year for the sports

department here at the Wayne Herald. It marks the end of the school sports year for the area high schools and Wayne State College, and gives us an opportunity to reflect on what a year it was. There were a lot of great moments

during the 2010-11 sports year, more than we could possibly list in this space. Allow The Bleacher Bum to try and remember, off the top of his shaven head, some of the big moments of this past season:

We're No. 1...times two - The development of the Wayne State volleyball program under Scott Kneifl was highlighted when the Wildcats were ranked as the No. 1 team in the nation twice during the 2010 fall season. While their time at the top was very short - they suffered losses both weeks they were at the top – it's still a nice feather in the caps of these young ladies to have taken Wayne State College someplace it had never been before in any sport.

Down and out at state - Area high school teams that made the state tournament, unfortunately, didn't have very long stays. Wayne High's football team had the dubious distinction of drawing Norfolk Catholic in the first round. Winside's volleyball team ran into the eventual state champions for the second straight year. The season opener, rattled off 28 wins in a row, and then got the twogame hook. And the Wayne High boys basketball team avenged its football defeat by beating the Knights, only to draw the top seed from Grand Island Central Catholic and finishing with a one-and-done. Winside's football team was the only area team to get out of the first round, making it to the round of 16 before losing at Osmond. While not getting a shot at the finals is a disappointment, those teams can be proud of their efforts in making it to state, which is sometimes a tougher gig than the state tourney itself.

But making it to state wasn't ALL bad - In the sports of golf and cross country, Wayne High had a very good season, capped off by solid efforts at state. The Wayne High boys finished fourth and were very close to being in the hunt for a trophy, while the Blue Devils girls finished eighth. On the links, Wayne didn't have a single medalist, but had a solid effort up and down the lineup to finish in fourth place. Individually, Collin Preston gave the Blue Devil boys linksters a spot in the state tournament, qualifying as an individual.

We are the champions (regular season edition) - Last year, the Wayne State women's basketball team came through and won the NSIC tournament title. This year, they took care of business in the regular season with an amazing 21-1 record. They had hopes of hosting the Central Region tournament, but an upset loss in the semifinals of the conference tournament left them with another road trip to Colorado. They reached the semifinals, but were unable to make it to the Elite Eight.



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

along with other 2011 big game (deer, antelope and elk) regulations, at their meeting May 27 at Ponca Earn-a-Buck was created in 2010 for the Elkhorn and Wahoo firearm units to help control the white-tailed deer population in eastern Nebraska. The Earn-a-

Buck restriction requires hunters to check in a doe before or at the same time they check in a buck – earning a buck by first shooting a doe. It helped. Hunters harvested a record number of antlerless white-tailed deer throughout the state last year.

This year, Earn-a-Buck is expanded to include the Missouri, Blue Northwest and Blue Southeast

Another change this year limits the number of permits a person may have that allow mule deer harvest in the Mule Deer Conservation Area Other deer regulation changes

include limiting Youth Deer permits to one per person, creating a Youth Whitetail permit, increasing bonus antlerless whitetail tags in the Loup East and Calamus East units by 3,100, and restricting antlerless mule deer harvest on public lands in the Pine Ridge Unit.

To accommodate the increasing elk population, the board voted to expand landowner zones in the Hat Creek, Bordeaux and North Platte River units. An additional 15 bull and six antlerless tags are authorized for elk hunting this fall.

Three additional late season antelope units were created in the North Sioux, Dismal and Box Butte East units, with 138 doe/

increasing landowner complaints. The Box historic fur trading post. Museum Butte Unit was split into East and West units to better manage the population. A statewide youth archery antelope permit is created for residents and nonresidents age

The Legislature addressed many topics this session. First and foremost, we passed a budget for

a \$986 million deficit, and ended Sine die is a Latin word for the year with a balanced budget "without day." According to without raising taxes. We passed (1) my priority bill (LB521) which prevents webcam abortions by requiring a doctor to be physically present when an abortion occurs. (2) Senator Lydia Brasch's LB690 requires written parental consent before an abortion can be preformed on a minor under the age of eighteen.

> The Legislature passed LB305, which will require the Department of Agriculture to study the feasibility of creating a statewide meat and poultry inspection program. Senator Bob Krist's priority bill was LB284, which increased the distance for groups to legally picket funerals from 300 feet to 500 feet. (500 miles

would have been better, but 500 feet will stand up to court challenges.)

The Legislature passed LB629, a bill that creates the Oil Pipeline Reclamation Act. The bill requires that a pipeline carrier owning, constructing, operating or managing a pipeline through the state for transporting oil be financially responsible for reclamation costs related to construction, operation and management of the pipeline. We also passed two bills (LB675 and LB667) that increase penalties for driving under the influence of alcohol. Major changes were made to the Court of Industrial Relations (LB397), which I think will be very

My biggest regret was that the Legislature passed LB628, a bill that authorized governing bodies to give away vehicles to charities, which can in turn give them to individuals. (The vehicles must be at the end of their so called "useful" life.) I intend to bring a bill next year to try to remove this language from our state statutes. LB421 was another disappointment to me, which was a bill to increase state park fees. I think this is as

close as we came to raising taxes.

I also voted against legislative redistricting (LB703)congressional redistricting (LB704). I was especially unhappy with LB704 after the Legislature voted to divide Dixon County into two congressional districts so that all of Gage County could be in the Third Congressional District. I am honored to now serve the good people of Thurston County, though I must admit I hated to "lose" Dixon County. There are many good people there that I have known for a lot of
