Rubeck's road is hot topic for County board

Dean Janke came to the board looking for an update on the Rubeck road situation.

County Commissioner James Rabe told that road up. We will leave the Janke that the Sheriff's Department is now

"If they plow that road, they'll be in trouble because that's our road. They have no right to tear that road up. We will leave the road closed sign out and people will go on it at their own risk," said Rabe.

Both the sheriff and Rabe have called the Rubecks about the situation, but they are left with no answer from them.

However, County Commissioner Kelvin Wurdemann thought otherwise.

"The land is the road, so it's not ours; it's theirs. They could get someone for trespassing. I just can't see how we can have the road when it's theirs. They took away our easement," stated Wurdemann.

Rabe hopes that, by harvest time the road, can be left open and he told Janke that he will keep him informed on what will happen with the road.

Emergency manager Nic Kemnitz told the board that he and Sheriff LeRoy Janssen are working on a continuity of operations plan should the courthouse be forced to relocate due to disaster. Various options in Wayne, as well as in the county's villages, were discussed and will be listed as potential sites.

The board approved one application sent in by Cable One. They would like to bury all utility line in county road right-of-way. The board also approved a change to the 4-hour Stop Program curriculum and a county "It's a lot smoother now and helps with

The board chose to wait on approving a resolution from the Northeast Nebraska Health Department. This resolution would adopt rules and regulations to prevent the spread of communicable disease.

At their last meeting, Sheriff LeRoy Janssen approached the board that this resolution would have problems with some of the police department protocols. Janssen said he would contact the Northeast Nebraska Health Department and sort out the details with them. Janssen was called and told the board he would like to hold it for the next meeting. However, the resolution was approved by county attorney Mike Pieper.

The board was notified of completion of a project for milling existing asphaltic concrete overlay of a county road beginning 1.5 miles west and 1.3 miles north of Sholes, extending 1.9 miles southwest to the western edge of Sholes.

County Commissioner Dean Burbach has overseen the project from start to finish.

Council approves traffic changes around Wayne Middle School By MICHAEL CARNES

With the start of the school year today and the added construction taking place at Wayne Middle School, residents will have to get used to some new driving patterns around the school.

At Tuesday's City Council meeting, the board approved a resolution establishing one-way and two-way traffic in the city and approved ordinances that restrict parking along Sherman and Douglas streets during two different time periods each day during the school year.

Traffic will run one way going south on School View Drive between Fourth and Fifth streets and east on Fourth Street between School View Drive and Sherman Street. There will be two-way traffic on Fifth Street between Sherman Street and School View Drive.

One-way traffic will also be in place on Douglas Street between Third and Fourth streets going south, and on Sherman Street

The Council sent three ordinances through and waived third readings that amended areas in the southwest quadrant of the city where parking will be prohibited in certain areas at certain times, particularly around the middle school.

The Council also gave its blessing to a new agreement with Wayne State College on the college's use of the city's law enforcement resources, which will include fewer weekly hours at a reduced cost to the college.

Jeff Carstens, Dean of Students at the college, said that budget restraints was the reason why the college wanted to amend the annual agreement, reducing the number of hours from 30 per week to 22. The college will pay the city \$30,000, down from \$42,000 a

Cause of downed Veterans' monument still in question


How one of the six 5,000-pound granite tablets at the Wayne County Veterans Memorial was toppled over remains a mystery, according to county officials.

The tablet, and a second tablet that was found to have come loose from its base, were taken back to Luken Memorials in Yankton S.D., for repair work. The second tablet did not have any damage, but was discovered to be loose on its base and was removed for

repair work as a precautionary measure. Damage estimates were not available, although the cost of each tablet, before was found.

engraving, was about \$5,500. Severe storms with 60 mile-per-hour winds blew through the Wayne area Sunday night, and one of the tablets was found tipped over Monday

Wayne County Sheriff LeRoy Janssen said an investigation as to the cause of the toppled-over tablets had yet to result in a determination whether the tablets' toppling was the result of Mother Nature or an act of vandalism. 



Sales tax figures are back up for August

After last month's unusual dip, sales tax figures are back up this month, according to figures released Tuesday from the city office.

Wayne's city sales tax revenue, based on receipts from the month of June, was \$43,896.96.

While that is down from last year's then-record amount of \$51,113.69, it is up significantly from the \$22,563.79 received a month ago.

"City sales tax is back on track," said city finance director Nancy Braden. "It's down from a year ago, however, it's about even with the prior year. Last year was an exceptional year."

Even with the bounce back, Wayne's average monthly city sales tax intake is still below the projected average of \$43,395.44. With one month to go in the fiscal year, the city has

collected \$457,823.81, an average of \$41,620.35. Last year, the city received more than \$521,000 in local sales tax revenue, averaging more than \$43,400 per month.

Construction almost complete, wastewater plan ready to go

\$6 million project largest of its kind in United States

After several years of discussion, evaluation and consultation and more than a year of construction, 40the city of Wayne's new wastewa-2.ber treatment facility is just weeks 89.**3w**ay from going on-line.

96.96"Starting the week of Sept. 5, we will begin routing wastewater **5823:81** the new plant. We will do 52035 stant testing for some time as it will take several weeks for the system to become fully operational," said Garry Poutre, public works superintendent.

Wastewater will come to the facility from throughout the city and be pumped into what is know as a headworks building. There a series of screens will filter out any in-organic matter greater than one millimeter in diameter.

From that point, the water will be gravity feed into the next portion of the facility, the Aquaris plant.

Central to the facility, the Aquaris plant uses bacteria to eliminate organic waste. The underground facility sometime this fall.

Air will be pumped into the system constantly as the bacteria need air to survive.

The hold time for the water being treated is 24 hours and at that point Poutre said the water is clean enough to drink.

"As time goes on, the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) standards are becoming more stringent. We need to constantly monitor the water that goes into Logan Creek. This plant will help us meet these requirements," Poutre said.

The project is a two-phase one, according to Poutre. The first is to get the plant on-line. This should be accomplished in the near future and then portions of the current plant will be demolished. Next spring, sidewalks will be poured.

Poutre anticipates an open house type event to be held for the new

Late start is no problem, Lawdawgs roll to 77-12 win

The last time the Nebraska Lawdawgs played a game at Wayne Elementary School, they were the

On Saturday, the Lawdawgs were able to take the field as the home team, but had to wait for the visitors to show up, as the Iowa Eagles encountered road construction on their journey into Wayne.

The late start only delayed the inevitable, as the focused Lawdawgs pounded the outmanned Iowa Eagles in the first half, racking up 61 points in the first 30 minutes and running away with a 77-12 win in Alliance Football League action.

The 30-minute delay did nothing to slow down the Lawdawgs' offense. Wayne native Sam Kurpgeweit opened the scoring with a 9-yard touchdown run, threw two more touchdown passes and caught another from Chuck Wright to help the Lawdawgs light up the scoreboard in the first half.

Kurpgeweit's 51-yard touchdown catch early in the second period started a 28-0 run for Nebraska that gave them a 61-12 halftime lead against an outmanned Eagles team that only suited up 17 players.

It would have been easy for the Lawdawgs to lose their focus, but coach Jordan Taylor said he was proud the team stayed with the program.

"It's always difficult for guys to get focused in situations like that, so it took us a little bit defensively, but we were able to get after it and I was happy with our performance overall," he said.

The Lawdawgs were particularly dominating in the ground game. The Nebraska offense churned out whose 230 yards on 26 carries was that, allowing the Eagles only one

Welcome rains benefit soybeans

Crop conditions were slowly (or rapidly, depending on whom you talked to) deteriorating and some more wide general rain really is going to be very welcome, especially

Soybean aphid populations have been increasing over the past couple of weeks; growers who have kept a close eye on their fields have been able to make good decisions. This has been a "normal" year for aphids, peaking in mid-to late August, with some fields at treatment threshold and some below.

Speaking of soybean aphids, in an age when farming continues to go high tech, it was only a matter of time before scouting for soybean aphids went digital.

That means you won't have to make use of paper sheets or keep track of your writing utensil in the

Two recent offerings from UNL provide that opportunity. The first is Aphid Speed Scout. It is an application or app for the iPad, iPhone,

Both the spreadsheet and app utilize the speed scouting method for determining whether soybean aphids have reached the treatment threshold of 250 aphids per plant. Scouting this way relies on the number of "infested" plants rather than estimating the number of aphids on each plant. Plants are and Farmstead Shelterbelts. considered "infested" if there are 40 or more aphids on the plant.

When using the spreadsheet or app they will let you know whether you need to "Re-sample in 7-10 days," "Re-sample in 3-4 days," "Sample 5 more plants," or "Treat, confirm in 3-4 days."

FCA assisting producers along river

"The Nebraska Farm Service Agency (FSA) is implementing the ECP to assist producers in rehabilitating farmland and conservation facilities damaged by the Missouri River flooding," according to Dan Steinkruger, State Executive Director of the Nebraska Farm Service Agency.

The following counties have been approved for the ECP to help in assisting producers to rehabilitate farmland and conservation facilities damaged by the flooding: Boyd, Burt, Cass, Cedar, Dakota, Dixon, Douglas, Knox, Nemaha, Otoe, Richardson, Sarpy, Thurston and Washington.

Producers can file applications for the ECP at their local FSA office from Sept. 1, 2011 through Oct. 31, 2011. The ECP is available to provide cost share assistance to agricultural producers who have suffered severe damage to their farmland as a result of a natural disaster and the damage is of such magnitude that it would be too costly to rehabilitate without federal assistance.

Producers may be eligible to receive 75 percent of the eligible cost of restoration not to exceed \$200,000 per natural disaster occurrence. Eligible practices include Debris Removal, Grading, Shaping, Re-leveling or similar Measures, Restoring Permanent Fences, Restoring Conservation Structures, and Field Windbreaks

ECP application approvals are subject to the availability of funds and will depend on future dollars when determining full application

For producer's land to be eligible, the disaster must create new conservation problems that, if untreated, would impair or endanger the land and affect its productive capacity. Conservation problems that existed prior to the applicable disaster are ineligible for ECP assistance.
