Drive-through coffee house gets go-ahead at City Council meeting

A new drive-through coffee shop received the go-ahead from the

Wayne City Council during the board's meeting Tuesday evening. Miss Molly's Coffee Company announced plans to build a drivethrough coffee shop on the corner of Seventh Street at Dearborn Avenue. The company received a zoning use by exception permit after a public hearing where no opposition was heard to the proposal. Joel Hansen, city inspector, told the Council that the proposed layout of the property must allow for three vehicles to be 'stacked" behind the vehicle that would be served at the window, and the design of the property meets that criteria.

Molly Younts, the owner of the new shop, said her hope with the new business is "to wake up Wayne, America with our drivethrough coffee shop." She said the shop will cater to early-morning commuters, and would also offer all-natural fruit smoothies,

breakfast pastries and sack lunches that can be taken to work. Younts said she is working with Sand Creek Post and Beam on the design and building of a new structure that would go up in the empty lot to the west of Pamida. She told the Council that research on the business concept was done between her and her mother,

Melody, and took about a year to complete. Younts is an advanced barista with previous experience working for Caribou Coffee. The company will have its own roasters to make the coffee, and she is excited about having the business up and running by early 2012.



One heck of a season for softballers

When a team fails to achieve its ultimate goal, sometimes the journey to their final destination and all that was experience to reach that point are forgotten.

Wayne High softball program are very high, and with good reason. This team has missed the state tournament only once in its 10-year history. This year was the first time in those nine trips where Wayne High went without the benefit of a district championship.

But when you're 30-0 in the regular season and have a win over the three-time defending state champions in your back pocket, it's always nice to have that wild card to fall back on in the unlikely event of a late-season stumble, which is exactly what this year's team had to

They went 1-2 at state, but the Blue Devil softballers had what could, in an understated way, be described as one heck of a season.

This year's senior class leaves the program having won 113 of 132 softball games. In a sport where a 60-70 percent rate of failure in the batter's box is considered outstanding, the Blue Devil seniors were part of a program that won an amazing 85.6 percent of the time over the past four season. Included in that are this year's 30-0 undefeated season, three Mid-State Conference titles (a conference tournament did not exist until 2009), three district championships, four trips to state and a Class C runner-up trophy.

I don't know about you, but for a team that ended with an unfortunate four losses in its last five games, that's still one heck of a run. If winning 85.6 percent of their games isn't enough to call this Wayne High's best senior class in any sport, I'm all ears as to who has

This team set a ton of individual and team records this season, records that are going to be tough to improve on in years to come.

Cassy Miller will be known for her pitching prowess, but she swung one mean bat as well. This year, she recorded school records for batting average (.510 - bv comparison, thebest hitters in big-league baseball hit in the .320-.350 range) and had a team-record 53 hits.

Caitlin Fehringer had a hot-andcold year at the plate this season. but she finishes as the team's most prolific hitter, batting .424 over the course of her carer with 170 hits, and she owns the state record for career RBI's with 141, runs scored with 150 and has the all-class mark with 24 career triples, eight of those coming this season (a team mark she shares with her older sister, Carly, a 2009 graduate).

Kristin Carroll also put her name in the team and state record books as well. Her two home runs in a late-season matchup against West Point Guardian Angels tied a Class B record for most round-trippers in

Fifth meeting with Blair not a good end at state

HASTINGS – It wasn't the way the Wayne High softball team wanted their season to end, but there was little they could do about it.

Meeting Blair for the fifth time this season - and the fourth in seven days - proved to be too much for the smallest school in the Class B State Softball Championships to handle. The Bears cranked three home runs off senior pitcher Cassy Miller and the usually-dependable defense came unraveled in a 10run fifth inning that turned a two-run lead into a run rule-shortened 13-5 defeat that brought Wayne's season to an end Thursday at the Smith Softball Complex.

The Blue Devils had hit two home runs of their own in building a 5-3 advantage over the Bears in the losers bracket matchup, but Blair finally figured Miller out in the fifth and launched a trio of two-run homers in an inning that ultimately ended Wayne's 2011 softball

"We just couldn't get anybody out," a disappointed coach Rob Sweetland said after the game. "We had some chances, but it's not the way we wanted it to end. Cassy just ran out of gas and we didn't make plays for

The loss was the second of the day for the Blue Devils after they started the tournament last Wednesday with an easy 8-0 win over Scottsbluff in the opening round.

Wayne jumped on the Bearcats - who were making

their first-ever appearance in the tournament - right

out of the gate. Cassy Miller reached on a fielder's choice, and after Caitlin Fehringer single, Kristin Carroll lined a single to left to score Miller. Fehringer came home on a sacrifice fly by Emily Leeper, and Victoria Kranz lashed Wayne's fourth hit of the inning, bringing Carroll home to make it 3-0.

The Blue Devils added to their lead in the second, scoring four runs. Leeper had a two-run single in the big inning, Carroll added an RBI single and Leeper scored another run on a groundout. A fourth-inning run by Jalyn Zeiss, who doubled and scored on an error, helped Wayne end the game on the eight-run rule.

"We talked a lot about getting off to a good start," Sweetland said. "We had the experience of being down here, and I think the kids were a lot more comfortable and confident."

Miller pitched well in the win. She struck out nine and allowed two hits in five innings. Carroll finished 3-for-3, Zeiss and Fehringer each had two hits and Miller and Fehringer each scored two runs in the win.

At its last meeting, the Council decided against allowing extended during homecoming weekend. The Wayne City Council should grant bars the ability to stay open the additional hour yearround. Keeping a Watchful Eye on Aging Parents

As your parents enter their twilight years, you may feel as though you don't want to meddle in their affairs. But when it comes to their health and safety, try not to stay in the dark. By paying attention to any warning signs, you'll be in a better place to take steps that can help them stay independent as long as possible.

Here are a few things to watch for. Parent trap? Has a parent suffered a fall at home? Or, is one of them about to undergo surgery such as a hip replacement? 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Tips shared for fall lawn care

Well, it's getting cooler and the leaves are falling. Raking leaves is not my preferred recreational activity but it needs to be done. Also, the lawn care season is winding down, but has not ended. Important lawn care tasks for the next couple of weeks includes a final fertilization, continued mowing as needed, removal of tree leaves, and draining the irrigation system after watering in the last fertilizer application.

The last fertilization of the season is recommended to be about the time of the last mowing, in our area usually in late October. It is an important application for promoting root and rhizome growth in still warm soils, and for spring green-up to help avoid applying fertilizer early in spring when soil temperatures are too cold. A myth about the last fertiliza-

tion is that fertilizer high in phosphorous and potassium is needed. This is not the case. With few exceptions, soils in Nebraska have adequate levels of phosphorous and potassium. With this application, nitrogen is still the nutrient most needed. The recommendation for the final fall fertilization has changed. The rate has been reduced from one lb. of actual N per 1000 sq. ft. to 1/2 to 3/4 lb. N per 1000 sq. ft. Turfgrass may not take up all of the nutrients at the higher rate with the cooler temperatures of late October to November, which can increase nutrient leaching or run-off issues.

Use fast release sources if applied close to the last mowing or slower release sources can be used when applied earlier in October, farther

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

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from the last mowing. Fall fertilization is important for cool season turfgrass to encourage production of storage products that help plants better tolerate stresses of winter and next year's growing season, and for spring rooting. With few exceptions, soils in Nebraska have adequate levels of phosphorous. Select a phosphorous free fertilizer whenever possible.

All applications of lawn fertilizer need to be watered in. This moves nitrogen into the soil for roots to take up and decreases the risk of fertilizer running off lawns during heavier rain storms or along with snow melt. During winter, when soils are frozen, snow melt runs off lawns into the street, down storm drains and into surface water.

When fertilizing, do not forget to sweep granules that fall onto sidewalks and driveways. Sweep them on the lawn where they will be watered into the lawn and not washed off of pavement into surface water. Do not sweep them into the street.

When mowing the lawn in late fall, it is not necessary to lower the height. While the height of bluegrass can gradually be taken down to as low at one and one-half inches and fescue down to two and onehalf inches, it is now preferred to keep the same height, about three inches, all year. This will maximize ance of turfgrass.


washed into surface water. For healthy lawns and water, remove tree leaves from lawns and street curbs on a regular basis. Leaves can be raked, mowed, or sucked up with a leaf blower/vacuum. They can be saved in plastic bags if a source of carbon, brown

them into a dust pan and place compost piles during next year's growing season.

Tree leaves can be moved and left on the lawn if a sharp mower blade that finely chops the leaves is used. The rule of thumb is if the unmowed leaf layer is one inch or less thick, it's okay to mow and not bag leaves. After mowing, the mowed leaf layer should not be thick enough to mat and suffocate
