

However, Council member Doug Sturm told the board he felt the grant request was reasonable and "we have given lots of larger grants to other groups and this group is putting in a lot of work on the building." Wes Blecke, Director of the Wayne Area

He noted that as of Dec. 31, 2011, approximately 28 percent of available LB840 funds have been granted or given as performance-based loans which will not be repaid. In addition, nearly five percent of the available funds have been distributed to businesses in the form of loans.

Ordinance 2011-32 received second reading approval on a 6-1 vote. The ordinance will allow ATV and utility vehicles on public streets in Wayne with a number of restrictions. Council member Jon Haase voted against the ordinance.

As a 15-year-old, Marilyn Anderson began playing the organ at Concordia Lutheran Church during Sunday services.

More than 60 years later, the now Marilyn Wallin, will retire from that job and "be able to finally have a padded seat during

Marilyn grew up south of Concord, the granddaughter of the pastor of Concordia Lutheran Church. She was the only member of her family to have piano and organ lessons.

"Famy Fredrickson was my piano teacher. I know we didn't pay very much for lessons at that time. I also took lessons from a man at Laurel. My family didn't have to pay for those, because he used our house to give lessons to people and then I got free lessons," she

After graduating from Concord High School, Marilyn attended Wayne Teachers College for two years to become a teacher. During that time she took organ lessons from Dr. Carlson. She later went on to teach in several country schools and spent 17 years teaching in Allen.

Marilyn remembers receiving \$15-20 per month for being the church organist, "which helped pay for my college supplies."

Among her other memories is a time before her marriage when she was living in Wakefield when the pastor of Concordia Lutheran asked her to record a 15-minute service for a Christian radio station in Columbus.

"Pastor would pick me up and take me to Concord. I remember playing "The Church's One Foundation" as part of the recording. The pastor and his family would feed me and then take me back to Wakefield," she said.

After her marriage to Winton Wallin in 1951, the couple lived and farmed south of Laurel. They moved to Wayne in 1976 and

Marilyn retired from teaching in 1995. Throughout the years, Marilyn continued to play the organ at Concordia Lutheran, the only church she and her husband (who is deceased) have ever been

"At first I played the piano for Sunday School activities. Later I played a pump organ and in 1952 the church purchased an electric Baldwin organ," she said.

As she raised five daughters, Marilyn said she took some time off from being the full-time church organist, but went back to playing and later added choir director at the church to her list of duties. She noted that all five of her daughters were in band but none of them play the organ or piano.

Marilyn did give piano and organ lessons in her home through the years. She has played for numerous church events and played at The Oaks when she and her husband lived there.


"I have played at lots of funerals and weddings. In fact, I have played at the weddings of three generations of one family,' Marilyn said. She said payment for these functions ranged from "nothing, to a vase or dish and sometimes money. There was no set

She said that playing the organ at the funerals of her friends is difficult, "but it's better to be at the organ than in the pew. It helps me stay focused."

Marilyn said that certain times of the church year were busier than others, noting that during Lent, extra services are held. "As the organist, I always wanted to be on time and prepared. I

also knew I needed to be ready for change at any time if the pastor made any changes.





${f A}$ second bracket for **Shootout?**

It's been said that bigger is better – and the Great Northeast Nebraska Shootout could stand to

The last day of this year's three day basketball bonanza at Wayne State College's Rice Auditorium was one of the more entertaining days of basketball I've been around in some time. All of the games on the final day were tightly-contested battles from start to finish. Only the championship games were decided by more than 10 points, and both games were up in the air until Pender's girls and Hartington Cedar Catholic's boys put their Wayne counterparts away at the free throw line down the stretch.

The final day of competition, however was in complete contrast to the first day of the eightschool tournament, which could respectfully be described as a napinducing festival of beatdowns.

It's bad enough that these teams are literally walking into the gym cold from an NSAA-mandated fiveday moratorium. But when you get a good team playing a team that is, shall we say, not playing at the good team's level – well, let's just say that it's not a lot of fun for anybody

None of the first-round games were nail biters. Heck, only one game was decided by less than 13 points - two of the four girls games were 50-point bludgeonings, and two of the boys games were blowouts of more than 20 points. The average margin of victory for the tournament's first day was a whopping 29 points (the second day was a little better - the average margin of victory was only 15

smaller-enrollment schools like Battle Creek and Emerson-Hubbard – both of those schools played for seventh and eighth place in both divisions - and while the bigger and more talented teams like Wayne, Hartington CC and Pender have a chance to play their younger players in varsity competition, you run the risk, as a coach, of injury to key players who are already coming off five days of no organized practice or competition.

The Wayne Booster Club, which does a fantastic job putting on the Great Northeast Nebraska Shootout, is faced with the likelihood of losing some teams for next year's tournament – a problem that turned into a challenge this past year and led to the late addition of the Norfolk JV team.

Rather than lose teams like Emerson-Hubbard and Battle Creek, I have an idea - why not EXPAND the tournament, create a bracket for C-1 and C-2 schools and another for smaller C-2 and Class D schools in the area?

To do this, you would have to double your working staff and play the games at Wayne High School. It's a lot of extra manpower, but think of the benefits - you keep those fans coming to Wayne during the holiday break, which brings more business into the community. More people stay in town to eat, do a little shopping – some might even decide to stay the night in our new hotel (which, by the time next year's tournament rolls around, will be

open and ready for business). Creating a small-school division of the Shootout would be a win-win situation for everybody involved – the bigger schools would get a chance to play three games that would be competitive in every round, and the smaller schools would benefit by playing competition more to its size. Bringing in area schools like Wakefield, Winside and Allen would also give those schools a chance to compete and spend less time on the road traveling to tournaments in Wisner, Randolph or Verdigre (and, if I may be allowed a selfish moment, give me the chance to see all my area schools in one place, making the job of covering them during the holiday break even easier).

Clare Duwelius scored a game-high 18 points, while senior All-American forward Ashley Arlen notched her sixth double-double of the season and moved into seventh place on the all-time scoring list Tuesday evening as the Wildcats held off St. Cloud State 59-50 in Northern Sun Conference action at St. Cloud, Minn.

The Wildcats opened the game scoring 14 of the first 16 points, taking a 14-2 lead six minutes into the contest. Wayne State's biggest lead of the half came at 23-7 with 7:49 to go, following two Alisha Brown free throws; but St. Cloud State held the Wildcats without a basket for the rest of the half as the Huskies trimmed the Wayne State advantage to 25-21 at halftime.

The Wildcats opened the second half scoring the first seven points and regained a doubledigit lead at 32-21 on an Arlen jumper with 17:05 to play. Wayne State extended their lead to the biggest of the night at 19 points, 44-25, on an Eva Benson jumper with 12:21 remaining.

St. Cloud came back late in the game, going on a 17-2 run to pull within four at 49-45 on a Sam Price 3-pointer with 3:49 left. The host Huskies got within four again with 46 seconds left on another Price trey to make the score 54-50, but the Wildcats sank 5-of-6 free throws in the final :42, two each from Ali Schwartzwald and Ellen Hansen and one by Arlen, to seal the win.

Duwelius led all scorers with 18 points to pace the Wildcats in scoring, going 4-of-6 behind the arc to move into third place on the all-time school list with 205 trifectas. Arlen recorded her sixth double-double of the season with 16 points and 15 rebounds, moving her into seventh place on the Wayne State all-time scoring list. She now has 1,348 points, moving past former Wildcat teammate Mara Hjelle, who scored 1,334 points

Wayne State held off a late Concordia-St. Paul rally on Monday, as the Wildcats recorded a 53-50 win in St. Paul, Minn.

Wayne State went on a 13-2 run and took their biggest lead of the first half, 18-11, with 6:48 to play after a Jennifer Kalbfell three-point play. Later in the half, Wayne State took another seven-point lead at 22-15 before finishing with a 22-17 lead at halftime.

Casino gambling good bet for state

I find it hilarious to hear opponents of casino gambling telling us how all hell would break loose and the end of civilization as we know it would take place if a casino were to open up within the state of Nebraska.

I seem to recall, about two decades ago, that the same thing was going to happen to the state of Iowa when they saw fit to allow their citizens to play blackjack, poker, roulette or dump their money into a slot machine. Oh, good heavens, there would be all sorts of chaos and mass hysteria east no doubt has supporters and of the Missouri River, and to have casinos so close to our borders – rather than being safely tucked away in fantasy lands like Vegas or Atlantic City was the next step before the downfall of the human race.

Two decades later, not only has Iowa NOT imploded upon itself, but it is doing quite nicely, thank you. Casinos have done well, and the communities that host those casinos seem to have flourished from the economic impact that has come from people not only spending their gambling dollars, but their restaurant, hotel and entertainment dollars as well.

Make a drive to the Argosy in Sioux City, or the Horseshoe, Harrah's or Ameristar in Council Bluffs, and you're going to find a significant number of vehicles whose license plates are not from the state of Iowa. On my last trip to the Argosy, in one section of the parking lot I was able to see that two-thirds of the vehicles in that lot had licenses plates from out of state – and of those out-of-staters, more than half were from Nebraska.

Columbus State Sen. Paul Schumacher is considering sponsoring an amendment during the upcoming Legislative session, that would give the Legislature the authority to legalize casino-style gambling within our borders. He may be two hours away from the nearest casino, but even he sees our hard-earned dollars heading over the border and thinks that's a problem, especially if those dollars wind up in Iowa or South Dakota.

And he's absolutely correct – it is a problem when people are going over the border to be entertained. That's millions of dollars in revenue that is leaving the state and winding up in the treasure chests of the departments of revenue in Iowa, South Dakota, Colorado and other surrounding states.

Nebraska is surrounded by states that offer expanded gambling options, and those states are benefitting from our continued unwillingness to go all-in with gambling in this state.

And puhhh-LEEEZE – do NOT get me started on the evils and potential personal economic chaos that some might experience if a casino were built within our borders. The same people who have a problem with casino gambling give not a moment's thought to using the revenue generated from keno, pickle cards, scratch-off tickets or lotteries like the Powerball, Mega Millions or Nebraska Pick 5. The same anti-gambling foes who want to keep us from playing poker, craps or blackjack are the same people who have no problem buying a Powerball ticket or using the money from those gaming devices to support their own causes.

In fact, I seem to recall the same hand-wringing taking place back in the Legislative Update mid-1990's when Nebraska expanded its gambling to include lotteries and scratch-off tickets. All hell was about to break loose - however, it would seem that the state has somehow survived and used that revenue to help support certain programs it might not otherwise be able to without raising our property taxes higher than they already are.

The State of Nebraska is leaving more than \$100 million on the table in potential tax revenue that would come from casino gambling. I don't know about you, but in these tough economic times, if we can realize \$100 million worth of savings on our property taxes, I'm all-in with bringing a Harrah's or Ameristar here to Nebraska. The state of Iowa took in more than \$1.3 billion in casino revenue during the last fiscal year – and a good chunk of that money came from their neighbors to the west, when it could have been put to better use here in Nebraska.

Save me the speech about the social ills of gambling - that horse has already left the barn, and the addition of casino gambling to what is already being offered within our borders isn't going to make near the negative impact the anti-gambling folks think it will. We survived keno and the lotteries – and it's a good bet we will see much more benefit from

Who will replace Sen. Nelson?

Nebraska political junkies got a new fix this week when Democratic Sen. Ben Nelson announced he would not seek reelection, setting off speculation about who the state's Democrats might find to run for the open seat against a field of well-heeled and long-running Republicans.

One of the possibilities, former Lt. Gov. Kim Robak, was quoted as saying she'd consider running, but that the political divisiveness in Washington, D.C., was a less than attractive feature of the job.

Think about that for a minute. Robak, like all political figures,

detractors. But she is an intelligent, respected Lincoln attorney, and surely is an example of the type of people whose credentials plausibly fit them for public office.

But if the intensely partisan atmosphere in Washington turns off too many such potential candidates, who do we have left to choose from? Just the people who like to hear themselves talk? The people who just like to argue in front of television cameras? The people who are gifted at crafting sound bites or hiring staff who can do so?

Current events watchers who pay attention to government, especially at the national level, have been treated in recent months to a seemingly never-ending display of line-in-the-sand partisan standoffs on jobs, taxes, Social Security, spending cuts, you name it. The rhetoric inevitably features one side or the other adamantly rejecting the mere notion of compromise on the issue du jour.

When did compromise become a four-letter word?

Perhaps our elected officials would do well to return to their local high school's American history class. Most Nebraska youth take it in 11th grade. That's where

government was born in compromise and is predicated on the notion that people with intensely held views can find common ground.

It was at the Constitutional Convention of 1787 in Philadelphia when representatives from Connecticut proposed what became known as the Great Compromise, breaking a deadlock that threatened to derail the entire process. Under the proposal, each state would be assigned a number of votes in House of Representatives proportional to its population while all states would have an equal voice in the

The Great Compromise passed by just one vote. But it passed. And the blueprint laid out in 1787 has new ideas eventually wither and expect no less from our 21st century

centuries.

American history is full of such compromises, of greater and lesser magnitude. Indeed, most Nebraskans are familiar with, if not always satisfied with, compromises in all aspects of community – and family – life.

Civic clubs, Scout organizations, student councils, garden clubs, church groups, merchants' associations and all manner of other groups in every Nebraska and thereby change the nature of community survive because their members know how to find compromises on the issues they



It's not as important to pass on a watch that will end up in the bottom of a jewelry box as it is to share even the simplest pleasures like cooking, fishing, and storytelling. Grandchildren don't care if we're poor or rich, pretty or ugly, fat or



skinny. And that's what makes life so grand."

I remember cherishing a crystal bud vase that had been a wedding gift from a patient, and having it broken accidentally one day. My first reaction was one of anger, but I quickly thought better of it and reminded myself it was only a bud vase. Yes, it did remind me of the patient, who was German and spoke very little English, but I can remember her without the vase.

I've seen families torn apart by

fighting over objects, sometimes antiques, sometimes very valuable, sometimes only for sentimental reasons. And it makes me sad every time; they are only things.

My sis took a bunch of stuff to a three day garage sale and netted \$300, which is really not worth all the work, and the sitting in the heat. She was shocked at how little interest was paid to some things we thought were special. And, in the final move to the nursing home, I actually had to pay movers to take the last of the furniture to the Good Will store! It was furniture that Mom had worked hard to obtain, and was proud of, and took very good care of, but it's not "in" now, and no one wanted it. Besides, everyone in our family has enough! What a commentary on our way of life today.

What we remember about her are the cinnamon rolls, the pies, the fried chicken, the readiness to help whenever there was a need. and the fierce determination. (Which, I admit, we sometimes called stubbornness, but it's just a good old German trait!). The items that have been now disbursed are just that, items.

I intend to remember that. Happy New Year!
