Third officer fired, appeal is filed with CSC

Date pending on Bolles' hearing

A third police officer on the Wayne Police Department has been terminated by the Wayne city administrator.

Jessica Bolles was terminated recently by Lowell Johnson, and has appealed her termination to the Wayne Civil Service Commission. The three-member board met Friday to look at submissions from both the city and Bolles legal counsel.

Scott Nordby, special counsel to the commission, said the next step in the process will be a hearing for Bolles before the commission. He said a date for that hearing has yet to be set, as he will need to consult with counsel for both parties and determine their pre-hearing needs before a hearing date can be set.

Bolles is the third member of the Wayne Police Department to have been terminated by Johnson in the past 13 months.

In February of 2011, Johnson suspended then-Chief Lance Webster and Lt. Phil Shear, terminating their employment two months later, citing a variety of misconduct on the part of both Webster and Shear. Herald on Bolles' termination or appeal to Webster, who was the city's top cop for 17

years; and Shear, who worked for almost 10 years in Wayne, appealed their firings to the Wayne Civil Service Commission in May of 2011. The three-member board upheld Johnson's decision in December of last year after a week-long hearing in early November at the Wayne Fire Hall.

Both Webster and Shear have filed subsequent appeals of the CSC's decision in Wayne County District Court. Those appeals were filed in early January, and Wayne County District Judge Robert Ensz is scheduled to hold hearings on those appeals in early August.

In the meantime, the city has listed on its website three new police officers to its staff, increasing the department's roster up to seven officers, along with three dispatchers. Marlen Chinn has served as interim police chief since last fall, with senior patrolman Brian Swanson and officers Dominic Consoli and Rick Haase joined by new officers Cory Moeller, Josh Jacobi and Dylan Jensen. The city has previously advertised for a full-time chief of police.

Johnson declined comment to The Wayne

Relay For Life more personal for Roeber

Cervical, prostate, skin, bladder, breast (in both men and women), bone, leukemia, ovarian, bowel, lymphoma, lung, throat.

These are just some of the cancers that have plagued members of Diane Roeber's

Because of this, Roeber has been a part of the Wayne County Relay For Life since its beginning in 1999.

"In 1999, when Relay For Life came to Wayne, I joined the cause as a walker on the State National Bank's team. I have many friends and family members affected by cancer and decided to take a stand and raise funds to find a cure. In 2002, I took over as treasurer of the Relay and continue to be involved in our fight to wipe out cancer by finding a cure," Roeber said.

Her involvement with Relay For Life be-

came more personal in 2009. "In September of 2008 I had an annual

exam and mammogram. All test results

came back normal. However, in mid-February, after being menopausal of three years, I began spotting and made an appointment with my gynecologist. On Feb. 27, the day before my 49th birthday, during the exam, the doctor saw what he believed was a prolapsed fibroid tumor," she said.

Roeber said in the back of her mind, she knew that the results would not be positive, but did not share her fears with anyone at

When she went to the doctor on March 5, she went alone because her husband, Garry, could not get off of work.

"When the doctor walked in, I could tell that the news was not going to be good. I believe it was just as hard for him to tell me as it was to hear 'You have cancer'," she said.

Roeber was diagnosed with a very rare form of cancer called adenocarcinoma with sarcomatous stroma. She was referred to Dr. Peter Morris, a gynecological oncologist at the Nebraska Methodist Hospital Cancer Center in Omaha. After consultation eclipse the record total of \$521,105.15 re-

Sales taxes up for May in city

The annual rugby tournament and recent positive trends in spending led to an increase in sales tax receipts for the city.

City finance director Nancy Braden said the city's May sales tax revenue came to \$51,171.53 for sales made during March. That is almost \$8,000 ahead of last year's total of \$43,322.05, and marks the second time this fiscal year that sales tax receipts have topped the \$50,000 plateau.

For the year, the city has received \$383.988.71 in sales tax receipts, an average of \$47,998.59 a month. It is on pace to See ROEBER, Page 3A ceived in fiscal year 2009-2010.



An eclipse in the sky

The first annular eclipse in the United States in almost 20 years was visible in the western sky Sunday evening about an hour before sunset in Wayne County. Although seen as a partial eclipse here, the best place to view the eclipse was in other parts of the United States, from the Texas panhandle to northern California and parts of southwest Oregon. An annual eclipse takes place when the moon passes directly in front of the sun, but the moon isn't quite wide enough to cover the entire sun. The view leaves something that looks like a black hole in the center of the sun.





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

Pritchard earns second, Dolph takes two at state

OMAHA - One area athlete ended her career on a positive note, while a second took some big steps toward making a solid career of his own at the state track meet.

Laurel-Concord/Coleridge nior Amy Pritchard and Wakefield sophomore Josh Dolph were the lone area athletes to come away with medals at the 2012 Nebraska State Track and Field Championships. Pritchard had the best finish in the season finale with a runnerup effort in the Class C girls triple jump, while Dolph made his mark in the quantity department, securing medals in the 800 and 1,600-meter runs.

All three medal-winning efforts came in the second day of competition Saturday, and both athletes were happy to end things on a positive note

"It couldn't have ended any better for me," Pritchard said of her career-best mark of 36 feet, 8 3/4 inches, which came on her second jump in the preliminaries. "There was so much good competition down here, so I'm thankful for how I did."

LCC coach Nate Sims said Pritchard showed some good things in the long jump on Friday afternoon, which carried over into her triple jump efforts on Saturday.

"Usually, how you jump in the long jump translates to the triple jump, and she was very consistent in her approach and in every phase of her jumps," he said. "She'd gone over 36 (feet) twice coming into state, and she went over 36 on four her six attempts, so she had her best day by far and it was nice to see it happen at state.'

"It was an awesome jump," Pritchard said of her silver-medal effort. "I just tried to stretch it out as far as I could and remember everything my coaches told me, and I got it."

She didn't quite match her 16 foot, 7 inch effort in the long jump that she recorded last year, but Sims said even that wouldn't have been enough to get her in the finals

the scoreboard with a medal at this year's meet, but their coaches were happy with the way their athletes competed in the final competition of the year. "Blaine and Jayd both went down



Negative campaign turns voters away

Nobody has asked for my advice on how to run their campaigns for Congress this November – and pardon me for being so self-assured on this – but they should.

Reports are that, thanks in large part to the Supreme Court's determining that corporations' money spent on campaign advertising is the equivalent of free speech, we will see unprecedented millions of dollars spent on advertising between now and the first Tuesday in November – with the vast majority of it being spent on negative advertising.

I don't know about you, but I'm already sick and tired of the negative campaign ads that seemed to assault every available channel on TV these last few weeks – and the mud is already being flung back and forth in the days since the Nebraska primary.

Already, we are seeing the two U.S. Senate candidates - Republican Deb Fischer and Democrat Bob Kerrey – assaulting each other's character and, occasionally, voting record on a variety of topics. Some ads are being paid for by the candidate's political party, but more and more are being paid for by groups called Super PACs (Political Action Committee) that are funded by high-roller billionaires and major corporations that hide under the anonymity their Super PAC provides.

We are also seeing the two political parties bash the other side with a non-stop assault of e-mails being sent to all media outlets across the state.

Here at The Wayne Herald, we receive almost daily e-mail blasts from the Nebraska Democrat Party, which seems hell-bent on attacking the character (and, occasionally, the record) of the Republican candidates for Senate. For most of May, the party was attacking the state GOP's leading candidate, Jon Bruning, focusing primarily on his business dealings that have helped him become a millionaire while serving as Attorney General (frankly, I was more offended by Bruning's AND Don Stenberg's using their elections to the A.G. and Treasurer seats as nothing more than a springboard for the U.S. Senate race than by whatever business entities Bruning was involved in, but that's another column).

Now, the Democrats seem intent on going after every little thing Deb Fischer has to say, including her inference that Kerrey isn't a Nebraskan (and, while he IS a Nebraska native, he was not a resident of the state when he filed for the Democrat nomination – and, no, pulling out the rollout bed in the couch of your sister's basement doesn't make you a resident). Of course, the GOP and their related Super PACs have gone out of their way to attack Kerrey's residence status, to say nothing of his liberal leanings and how he has distanced himself from Nebraska's values since leaving the Senate for a job as president of a New York university.

All of this negative advertising is turning people off from the political process in general. Voter turnout in Wayne County was just over 30 percent – less than 25 percent in the city of Wayne – numbers that I find ap-

But it's hard to blame the people for not wanting to vote – with all the mudslinging going on between the candidates, their political parties, their Super PACs and the mainstream media (even certain small-town columnists aren't completely innocent here), it's no wonder that people are tired of the nonsense taking place, both on the campaign trail and in the halls

I'm a proud independent voter, and unlike some people who seem intent on voting ONLY for those of the political party they are "members" of, I base my votes on the person, my perception of that person's character and whether or not that individual would be the best one to represent me in public office, whether it's the Mayor of Wayne, my state legislator or a member of Congress.

In recent years, I have discovered that voting based on political parties is an invitation to our nation's eventual Armageddon, which appears closer with every election as the Democrats and Republicans continue spending all of their time, energy (and OUR tax dollars) fighting each other, rather than solving the federal deficit (\$15 trillion and growing), the war on terror (weren't ALL our troops supposed to be home by now?), education (I still can't use the phrase "No Child Left Behind" without laughing hysterically) and others.

This November, I'm going to spend a lot of time researching the candidates for President, U.S. Seanate, Congress and the Nebraska Legislature. I'm not going to rely on Fox News, MSNBC, CNN or the major network news, as they have all proven to be biased toward one side or the other. Based on that research, I will make my decision and vote for the $\operatorname{INDIVIDUAL}$ – not the party – that best displays my values and hopes for this nation's future.

In the aftermath (aftershock?) of the Republican senate primary, it might be appropriate to rename it Spending at the End.



Fischer, the feisty lawmaker/ rancher from Valentine, stunned everyone with a come-from-way-behind victory to win the GOP nomination and the right to face Democrat Bob Kerrey – a former governor and two-term U.S. Senator - in November. One of them will succeed retiring Democratic Sen. Ben Nel-

Ricketts put his money on Fischer not long after Tea Party icon Sarah Palin endorsed her.



The Alliance for Childhood defines play as a set of behaviors that are freely chosen, personally directed and intrinsically motivated. Play integrates all types of learning, including physical, social emotional and intellectual.

Open-ended play in nature or with nature objects enhances curiosity and triggers the imagination. For example, a hollow log can be a tunnel to another place. Mud could be made into mud pies. Sticks could be used to build a teepee, or be used as a walking stick or for scratching letters into sand. Children also increase their physical fitness when they run, explore, climb, find secret hiding places, dream up stories and have outdoor adventures.

By participating in a child's outdoor play experience, parents can help children develop math, language and even science skills. For example, math skills develop when a child learns to count the number of ants on the ground; language

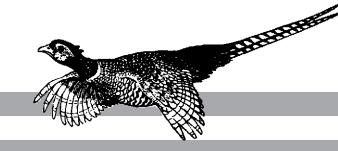

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Links Between Childhood Asthma & Obesity

Asthma is a chronic disease that causes airways to become inflamed. Does your child have this disease? If so, you're no doubt familiar with symptoms such as coughing, wheezing, chest tightness, and trouble breathing. Today, a whopping nine million children under age 18 have asthma – or have had it in the past. But with rates of childhood obesity climbing this number could quickly skyrocket. Why?

Because children who are overweight or obese are more likely to have asthma than children of a healthy weight. Overweight or obese children have double the risk of asthma as their normal-weight peers if they become or remain heavy in their early school years. Extra weight isn't considered a cause of asthma, simply a contributor. But what, then,

accounts for the connection between the two? One theory is that a hormone found in fat tissue increases the body's chronic inflammation. And this may increase the risk of asthma. Extra weight also sends kids with asthma to the doctor and emergency room more often and requires higher doses of asthma medications.² In fact, a recent small study found that overweight and obese children needed about twice as much of a commonly used asthma medication (an inhaled corticosteroid) as healthy-weight kids. These findings are similar to

those reported on earlier in adults. If your child has asthma, don't forget that I'm here to help you and your child manage this condition as well as you can. Remember that your child's asthma management plan may be different than another child's. I can help guide you in understanding how and when to use asthma medications. Getting the right care by a knowledgeable allergist or physician can help in figuring out whether a child has asthma, what is triggering it, and how to move forward to

2012 Water and Natural Resources Tour examines Missouri River Flood

This summer's University of Nebraska water and natural resources tour will spend three days visiting parts of Nebraska and Iowa that were most affected by last summer's record flooding on the Missouri River.

The tour is July 17-19, leaving from and returning to Hardin Hall on the University of Nebraska-Lincoln East Campus at North 33rd and Holdrege streets.

'We'll not only look at residual damage, but just as significantly, restorative efforts since flood waters receded and what we have learned from the actual flood," said Steve Ress, tour co-organizer and communicator at UNL's Nebraska Water Center, part of the Robert B. Daugherty Water for

"The flood disrupted the lives of thousands and extended for more than three months, breaking through levees and flowing beyond vulnerable lowlands to destroy homes, businesses and highways," said tour host and co-organizer Mike Jess, a retired UNL lecturer.

From Decatur to Hamburg, Iowa, tour participants will inspect a variety of locations where the flood's destructive impact will be fully evident.

"Near Tekamah, they will see where over-bank flows attempted to occupy a former river channel last used by the river more than a hundred years ago. We'll also see large tracts of cropland that remain unproductive from accumulations of fine-textured sediment left by the floodwaters," Jess

Some of the cropland bordering the river is covered by several feet of fine, blowing sand, resembling pictures from the 1930s Dust Bowl, Ress said.

Salvaging native forests, restoring river habitat and repairing levees and other infrastructure since the flood also will be featured.

Elsewhere, participants will see Omaha's Eppley Airport, where an ambitious water-well dewatering network allowed commercial air traffic to continue unabated throughout the duration of flooding, despite the fact that the airport borders the river.

The tour also will stop at Omaha Public Power District's coal-fired power plant near Nebraska City. There, special pumps, a series of temporary dikes and elevation of a railroad coal supply line permitted uninterrupted production of electricity throughout the flood, Jess said.

Last year's Missouri River basin flooding was caused by a combination of snowmelt in the northern Rocky Mountains and record-setting rainfall runoff in Montana and North Dakota.
