

Reeg to step down as county assessor Aug. 1

The resignation of Joyce Reeg as Wayne County Assessor was brought before the Wayne County Board of Commissioners at

Tuesday's regular meeting. Reeg submitted a letter to the board, indicating her resignation is effective Aug. 1, 2012. She is currently 1 1/2 years into a four-year term. She has served as Wayne County Assessor since her appointment to the position in July of 1988. She has been employed by the county since January of

Board members discussed the steps that need to be taken to fill the position, including the qualifications and certification necessary to perform the duties of assessor.

In other action, the board listened to reasons for keeping a county Weed Board in

Several members of the Wayne county

were in attendance at Tuesday's meeting to talk about the work they do, the need to conduct meetings throughout the year and

the cost to maintain a weed board. The commissioners were asked why they were considering eliminating the board and Board member Kelvin Wurdeman said that the commissioners would not be the ones eliminating the board, but would instead put the issue on the ballot for Wayne

County voters to decide. There are presently less than 15 weed boards in existence in the state, with Pierce, Antelope, Wayne and Dixon Counties among those that have the boards. Several of the weed superintendents across the state are in part-time positions with additional responsibilities.

It was noted that the Weed Board costs Wayne County just under \$200 per month.



Health alert is issued for Maskenthine Lake

The state has issued health discontinued. alerts for toxic blue-green algae at Maskenthine Lake in Stanton

This is the only health alert currently in effect; alerts that had been issued have been cancelled. Weekly sampling has been conducted at 49 public lakes in Nebraska since the beginning of May.

Samples taken earlier this week at both lakes were above the state's health alert threshold of 20 parts per billion (ppb) of total microcystin (a toxin released by certain strains of blue-green algae.) The alert will continue at the lakes for at least two more weeks, because lakes that results for toxic algae and bacteria are on health alert must have two consecutive weeks of readings below the threshold before the alert is deq.ne.gov

When a health alert is issued signs are posted to advise the public to use caution, and designated swimming beaches are closed during the alert. Recreational boating and fishing are permitted, but the public is advised to avoid activities that could involve accidental ingestion of water and to avoid full immersion in water. People can still use the public areas for camping picnics and other outdoor activities.

The lakes will continue to be monitored weekly throughout the 2012 recreational season. Sampling will be updated every Friday and posted on NDEQ's web site, www.







Finally, the people running major college football came to the realization that the BCS was – well, I can't give you an accurate description due to the fact that this is a family newspaper, but suffice to say it ain't good. At any rate, they've decided to play the semifinals on New Year's Day at two of the major bowls, with the finals at a site that will be bid

Will this be a perfect system? Of course not - no playoff system is completely foolproof. However, the setup that will be in place starting in 2014 will be infinitely better than the confusing chaos that made the BCS an ongoing joke and made the powers that be who run college sports look like idiots. Ideally, I'd like to see this format expanded to eight teams, but for now this is a much better alternative.

- Tiger Woods is the best golfer in the world? It's like deja vu all over

It wasn't that long ago that Woods had an epic fall from grace, his personal life left in tatters and his golf game looking closer to mine than the one that catapulted him to worldwide stardom.

Woods recently won his third PGA tournament of the year, making him the only pro golfer to have that many wins this season. He has played well at the U.S. Open, and is in line to make a run at another British Open and/or PGA title later this summer.

He recently became the secondhighest tournament winner all time, moving him within less than 10 of the legendary Sam Snead. He's still four behind Jack Nicklaus in major wins, and at age 36, still has a lot of golf left in him.

If Tiger's short game can get nailed down, the question won't be 'will" he reach those milestones, but "WHEN will" he?

- Now that some of the information regarding e-mails involving the powers that be within Penn State University are becoming public, the legend of Joe Paterno is becoming more muddy by the minute.

Thankfully, a jury saw fit to put the monster, Jerry Sandusky, behind bars for the rest of his life. They convicted him on 45 of 48 counts, and with the mandatory minimum sentences on each charge added up, the 69-year-old disgraced football coach will spend the rest of his days on earth in a prison cell.

But as news has leaked out concerning memos where school officials were allegedly encouraged by Paterno to avoid contacting authorities regarding Sandusky's continued assaults on school grounds, one has to wonder if Paterno was that clueless about what was happening, or was so intent on preserving his image and the program's brand that the victims were noting more than disposable pawns.

The NCAA is investigating the situation at Penn State now, and one has to wonder if the lack of institutional control that went all the way to the top of Penn State University warrants some serious punishment due for the school. Some are calling for the "death penalty" for the football program, a move the NCAA hasn't made since killing off the wayward SMU football program in the late 1980's.

Whatever comes of it, I'm of the opinion that this story will continue to shine the light on the abuse of power in major college sports, as well as giving survivors of these awful assaults the courage to speak out against their attackers, no matter how far up the chain of command they might be.

However, straw can aid in breaking up or diffusing the solar heat load that often contributes to heating up dry, bare ground. The degree bedding is effective in doing this is unknown. However, if used, it is suggested bedding be placed in the pen early in the morning when the ground has cooled; otherwise, heat will be trapped in the pen surface. Also, wetting the bedding would allow for additional cooling to occur when the animal uses it.

Producers should avoid handling cattle when it's hot and never after 10 a.m. Cattle body temperatures can rise an additional 0.5-3.5 degrees during handling.

Cattle yards also should be free of any structures that restrict airflow. Cutting down vegetation around pens and moving cattle away from windbreaks can all help. Building earth mounds in pens also can increase airflow by preventing cattle from bunching together. Other heat stress mitigation strategies include: providing shade, controlling biting flies and other parasites, keeping very current on cattle marketings and being mindful of heat effects on personnel as well.

Manage your drought risk

As drought continues to take hold of the state, managing drought on the range becomes ever more impor-

"Managing Drought Risk on the Ranch" is a website at drought.unl. edu/ranchplan from the National Drought Mitigation Center that can help livestock producers get through the current drought and continue to manage their pastures when not in drought.

The NDMC developed the site in collaboration with University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension researchers Pat Reece (now owner of Prairie and Montane Enterprises). Jerry Volesky and Matt Stockton. The NDMC also consulted with ranchers, federal grazing experts and other researchers from UNL South Dakota State University and Texas A&M University. The project was funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Risk Management

"The website has a number of things available to producers related to animal nutrition, etc., but the most important thing is that producers really do need to make adiustments in overall grazing plans and stocking rates," said Volesky, UNL Extension range and forest specialist. "With these drought conditions, we have seen pasture growth and production that is only

20 percent to 50 percent of normal." On the positive side, in the last three to four years, the Sandhills and Panhandle have had good rainfall and there is a lot of previous years' grass left in pastures, he said. Unfortunately, the quality

isn't very good. Volesky said warm season grass started to grow, but it has stopped So, using pastures overall is very





"I'm glad he brought that up," said Roy Bennett of Yakima, WA, as he made his way along Highway 30 headed east to Cedar Rapids, Iowa. "He also told me to forget about finding a motel in Omaha because of the College World Series."

Bennett and countless other motorists have encountered what seems to be an unusually intense summer of road construction, especially on the aging Interstate 80 corridor across Nebraska. By the numbers, the Nebraska Department of Roads is doing asphalt overlay on 100 miles of road in 11 projects ranging from Milford in southeast Nebraska to Kimball in the Nebraska Panhandle.

'We actually have the money in the budget this fiscal year to attack all of these interstate issues," said NDOR Public Information Officer Mary Jo Oie. "We needed to get this work done and we are in a one year blitz to get the surface repair work done, mostly in this one summer construction season."

She said engineers are hopeful that the pavement repair won't be needed again for several years. "There are always bridge repairs, paint striping and some weatherrelated surface/shoulder issues that our Districts will watch for, howev-

Disappointed with U.S. Supreme Court

I, like many of you, was disappointed with the ruling out of the U.S. Supreme Court on the so-called in the last few days. I will probably have more to say about this at a lat-

With District 17 being a major agricultural territory, the scorching temperatures and the lack of rainfall, I fully support U.S. Sen. Mike Johanns' letter to the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack, which states, "I urge you to promptly consider the Nebraska Farm Service Agency (FSA) Committee's request to authorize emergency haying and grazing of Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) land in all counties that meet the appropriate drought conditions and to give prompt consideration to future requests. The State FSA Committee has already consulted with the US-DA State Technical Committee on this matter. This authority can help provide producers another option as they seek to provide adequate hay

and forage to their animals." CRP lands are voluntarily set aside for conservation purposes. The lands can be released for haying and grazing after the primary wildlife nesting season which typically ends July 15. Nesting, however, occurred earlier than normal this year due to a mild winter and warm spring. Nebraska is requesting to allow grazing immediately. This authority has already been approved in Wyoming which has the same typical nesting season end

Keeping with agriculture, we are all painfully aware of the impact to cisions reached by the "high court" wide broadcast of misleading and damaging information about lean, finely textured beef (LTF Beef). In fact, Beef Products, Inc., has closed three of its processing plants and let go some 700 employees.

However, there is a little good news to report on this story. The States of Iowa, South Dakota and Nebraska have chosen to purchase the beef product, which provides an estimated savings of 3 percent in the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) National School Lunch Program. The Nebraska Department of Health and Humans Services (DHHS) is responsible for purchasing food for state school lunch programs, and has reiterated the safety and nutritional value of the

The USDA has a standard process for the recall of products that have been identified as having the potential of being unsafe. If a USDA food product is identified as potentially unsafe and should warrant recall, all State agencies are notified and the State would then begin our own process of identifying and taking any needed action for such products. Some additional information that we (State)

Examples include: cheese slice 1.5 oz. = 76 mg (813 ppm); hamburger bun 2 oz. = 50 mg (440 ppm); condiments 2 oz. = 50 mg (400 ppm); beef patty3.2 oz. = 40 mg (200 ppm); baconslice 1 oz. = 16 mg (160 ppm)."

Nebraska Farm Bureau has also gotten on board with DHHS decision to continue to purchase this food product. Hopefully, other states and organizations will pop their heads out of the darkness (being polite) and start to use this safe product again.

"If Nebraskans were to divert just 33 percent of readily recyclable materials that we currently dispose of, it could earn over \$45 million in scrap sales, create over 5,000 jobs in the workforce, and save \$11.2 million in landfill fees," said Carrie Hakenkamp with WasteCap Nebraska. "Nebraskans have a real opportunity to reduce the cost and quantity of our waste by increasing our recycling rates."

The Nebraska Product Stewardship Coalition is seeking to educate more parties about the millions of dollars literally being thrown away each year, the benefits of waste diversion, and how it can be achieved through a concept called "product stewardship" -a strategy that ensures that all those involved in the lifecycle of a product share responsibility for reducing its health and environmental impacts, with those who make and sell the products tak-

cle their used products and empty packaging when consumers throw them away. In doing so, manufacturers are capturing materials that were formerly headed to landfills. Product stewardship is already being implemented in Nebraska. For example, manufacturers and retailers prevent a significant amount of mercury and other toxic heavy metals from reaching landfills and incinerators by offering collection and recycling services for spent rechargeable batteries, mercury thermostats, fluorescent lamps, electronics, and auto switches. Pharmaceuticals and latex paint are also being targeted for collection through a product stewardship

"By implementing and promoting producer-run "disposal" programs for difficult and expensive-to-manage products like electronics and paint, we can help reduce municipal waste management costs and foster the recycling industry here in Nebraska," said Gene Hanlon of the City of Lincoln Solid Waste Operations. The next day started with a morning swim in the Ionian Sea and a viewing of the ancient site of Delphi, with all of its mythological temple ruins.

> "We then took off for the Island of Crete to its capital Heraklion. The majority of the time involved extremely long hikes to mountain temples, caves (where Zeus was buried - if it is possible to bury a mythological figure), and a number of churches (Greek Orthodox). The last morning on the island was spent riding on donkeys with old wooden saddles and learning a couple of Greek dances. The afternoon was spent at a old, family-owned pasta plant and a swim in the Aegean Sea. The group then ferried back to Athens to visit a medieval bakery and olive oil plant.

Due to the Fourth of July, I was asked to turn in an article earlier than usual, so from the time I write this to about the time you read it, it will be about a week. All indications as of this writing appear that we are heading into a hot, dry July-August. Knowing that weather forecasts are pretty iffy more than three days out gives hope, but farmers and home owners need to be

We can't do anything about the temperature, but if we have irrigation we can water our crops and vards. In crops, it might appear pretty simple. Turn the pivots on and don't stop them. In corn, which is entering a high water use phase, this could be pretty close to the truth. Irrigated corn with its higher plant populations will use over tasseling time. Since most pivots can put about an inch of water on a field about every three days, the turn on and stay on might be a re-

However, some water restrictions and occasional rainfall can cause a change in plans. To get more information on corn production, including irrigation management, go to cropwatch.unl.edu/web/corn/home.

A relatively new UNL website offers soybean producers an easy-touse decision aid for optimizing ir-



.30 inches of water per day around rigation efficiency and energy use. SovWater, available at sovwater. unl.edu, asks a few, simple questions specific to the field and then provides daily estimates of crop water use and soil water status.

> Users log on and after just a few mouse-clicks, SoyWater provides a table of real-time, actual daily weather data for computing daily crop water use from planting (or emergence) to the day before producer log-in. SoyWater can be useful to both rainfed and irrigated soybean producers interested in predicting the date of a V- or R-stage. This information also can be useful when making other crop management decisions for a particular soybean field, such as when the

specific growth stage. Give it a try.

However, many people will still want to water to keep lawns green. Most of our lawns are cool-season, bluegrass dominated. The following are management suggestions from turf.unl.edu to help the cool-season grasses cope with the heat:

The almost immediate response

to high temperatures is to increase irrigation, which makes sense and is needed since most water is used for cooling the plant. However, saturated soils from over irrigation limits oxygen leading to root death and thus severely compromises the grass plant over the rest of the sea-

Therefore, we still want to keep turf on the dry side to maximize soil oxygen, but at the same time enough water should be applied to allow the plant to cool itself. We are often questioned about irrigating lightly (syringing) during the day to cool the turf. This effect is very short term, maybe lasting 10-15 minutes depending on the conditions. Water when necessary, when you see the grass beginning to turn a lighter color. This may happen every 4 to 7 days during the hot part of the summer. Extreme heat may require more frequent watering.

Continue mowing as needed, but be sure turf is well-watered to insure no extra damage. Consider mowing in the morning or evenings when temperature and water demand is lowest.

Keep the grass length to 2 1/2 to 3 inches for shading of the ground. Grass cut too short will allow the sunlight to reach the ground and raise temperatures much higher. This is still the biggest mistake I see in area lawns.
