Dogs, water, cars all on city's agenda

A wide variety of items, from rules at the city's new dog park, to a water feasibility study for the village of Carroll to additional loan money for a natural gas car manufacturer planning to build in Wayne, were debated during Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

Jessi Hansen, a representative of the group that has worked to bring a dog park to Wayne, answered questions on the rules and regulations for use of the dog park. She noted that a number of suggestions from the city's insurance carrier were incorporated into the rules for use of park.

Council member Doug Sturm questioned the "policing" of the park and asked who would be responsible for enforcing the rules. He suggested the group form a committee that would be responsible for handling complaints.

City Administrator Lowell Johnson told the Council that the park is under city jurisdiction, and dogs violating rules there would be handled the same way as in any other part of the city.

Following discussion, the council approved a resolution which adopted the rules for use of the park.

Council members also gave approval for the village of Carroll to move forward on a feasibility study to determine the cost to build the infrastructure to Wayne and purchase water from the Wayne water system.

Mark Tietz, representing the Carroll Village Board, spoke at the meeting and told council members the village has been having water issues in recent months and is looking at options to resolve the problems. Among these is to build a water main from Wayne to Carroll (approximately nine miles) and purchasing water from the City of Wayne.

Flood in Wayne to talk about possible '14 bid

It's been more than 50 years since a native of northeast Nebraska served as the state's commander in chief.

Last week, a Norfolk state senator and speaker of the Legislature stopped in Wayne to talk with residents about the possibility of running for governor in 2014.

Not since Norbert Tiemann of Wausa fulfilled the duties from 1967-1971 has a resident of the area been the governor of the state. Norfolk State Sen. Mike Flood visited with about 50 local residents and business owners Thursday as part of a 45-city "listening tour" around the state as he decides whether or not to throw his hat into the ring.

With current Gov. Dave Heineman finishing his second full session, Flood said he would decide by the end of 2012 whether or not he will join Lt. Gov. Rick Sheehy in the Republican race for governor two years from now.

Flood is ending eight years as the District 19 representative in the Legislature and has also been the speaker of the Legisla-

ture since 2007. He said he took some time off after the Legislature ended its session in April to spend more time at the two radio stations he owns in Norfolk.

I decided that I'd give myself 30 days, and after those 30 days the staff at the radio station asked if there was something else I needed to be doing politically," he said to laughter from the audience. "I've thought about it, and I am interested in continuing my public service . . . I am considering a run for governor of Nebraska in 2014."

One of Flood's concerns that he talked with local residents about was attracting and keeping young people in rural communities like Wayne.

"It's something I'm passionate about," he said. "You're already doing a lot of things here in Wayne, because I see a lot of people in their 20's and 30's who have moved here, and there are a lot of activities that cater to families here. This generation is less materialistic, more altruistic, more collaborative and they determine where they want to live and find a job to make it work, and that's one of the things Nebraska communities

Driest season in 25 years has left area fields going thirsty

Northeast Nebraska has seen approximately half an inch of rainfall since June 1, making it incomparably the driest season in almost 25 years.

The dry conditions coupled with the extreme heat throughout the region have left area farmers wondering what kind of yields they will be able to produce this year.

Wayne County is currently sitting between 50 and 60 percent of its normal rainfall for the growing season, with many areas in the state much lower than that.

Keith Jarvi, Extension Educator for the University of Nebraska, noted that in areas with sandier soil, the fields have already been cut down for silage – the process of grinding up the entire corn plant for animal feed as opposed to harvesting it at the end of the season.

While Jarvi was cautiously optimistic that Wayne County farmers will not have to do likewise if the area sees some rain in the near future, he said the situation is close to a tipping point and that the one saving grace for area farmers is that drought-resistant hybrid crops are better than ever.

2011 was good year in terms of rainfall, and that was reflected in the high yields. Jarvi said it is likely area farmers will not be as optimistic headed into next year's growing season.

"This is the first dry year we've had since 1988. We've had a real good weather pattern here in northeast Nebraska," Jarvi said. "It's amazing how one year can change everything."

County gets ultimatum on road issue

The daughter of land owners who are negotiating with Wayne County over the purchase of land to build a road south of Winside told the Wayne County Commissioners that they had "45 days to get their affairs in order."

At Tuesday's meeting, Linda Kirsch, speaking on behalf her parents, Leroy and Ione Rubeck, said the county will have that amount of time once an offer is made on land the county would like

The economic impact of the type of drought Nebraska, as well as the rest of the country, is dealing with is going to affect agricultural business all across the nation and extend beyond just the farmers themselves, Jarvi said.

"It's an unprecedented deal in the amount of area affected, and crop prices are going to stay high," Jarvi said.

Jarvi noted that while most farmers have drought insurance that should leave their operations more or less unaffected by one dry year, that won't replace the amount of business farmers are usually able to do with area contractors.

Each year, farmers across the area contract new silos and machine sheds, as well as purchase new machinery, providing valuable jobs for contractors and construction crews. This season's drought has led to substantial cancellations for this type of contracted work because the farmers can no longer afford it.

The agricultural industry that affects every level of local economy in states like Nebraska will, in the long run, be fine, according to Jarvi. There may, however, be more irrigation in this part of the state in the future as dry land farmers across the state see below-average yields in 2012.

to purchase to build a road after the family decided not to renew its long-standing lease with the county for land where a current road exists on 568th road about four miles south of Winside.

Board officials told The Wayne Herald they weren't sure what exactly Kirsch meant by the comment, but the county is interested in acquiring the right of way to build a redesigned road that meets state standards.

"I don't know if you can call it a threat or not," board member Kelvin Wurdemann said.

New wind turbine at LCC to educate, produce energy

At the end of the day, the role of education, be it high school or college, is to prepare the minds of young people for the challenges they will face as adults. One such challenge will be servicing the energy needs of an exponentially increasing global population.

Students at Laurel-Concord/Coleridge High School are learning in a unique and hands-on way about the energy alternatives that exist and which ones may be the most viable options in the future.

Wind Powering America, an organization whose goal is to spread information about the benefits of wind energy, sponsors the Wind For Schools Program in eight states across the nation and at 10 other high schools in Nebraska.

It was largely through a grant from Wind for Schools that LCC was able to recently construct a 45-foot tall wind turbine that resides near the school. Wind for Schools provided \$14,000, with the remaining approximately \$2,000 being covered by the school district.

In addition to supplying most of the funding for the tower, Wind

for Schools aided in construction and offered LCC a curriculum with which to educate their students.

Feeling that more self-sufficient forms of energy are going to be a

necessity in the future, former LCC Superintendent Richard Patton felt very strongly about the importance of educating his students on the pros and cons of wind, as well as other alternative energy sources.

"Just think about our kids learning about energy needs and energy production, the difficulties and benefits of wind energy," Patton said. "It is important for kids to explore these issues and learn about them and talk about them. This is a way that is hands-on"

With the discovery and expansion of alternative forms of energy a vital and imminent part of the future of this country, Patton hopes that the program will not only educate kids about the benefits and difficulties associated with wind energy, but also incite interest in the field of alternative energy as a whole.

"I personally believe that we need to look for alternative forms of energy to have a prosperous future," Patton said. "This was a good way to get kids to understand that."

The energy produced from the turbine at LCC is enough to power one classroom, with the small amount of excess going to the city of Laurel, who was instrumental in getting the program off the ground.

Jury duty calls are a hoax

If you've been receiving text messages or e-mails saying you have missed jury duty and could go to jail, delete those messages.

The Nebraska Supreme Court's Office of Public Information faxed The Wayne Herald this afternoon with information that a prank is being played upon people, saying they have missed their scheduled jury duty dates and could be fined \$500 or receive jail sentences of up to 30 days.

The prank messages contain telephone numbers to call, and when people call the number, they are told in the final sentence of the message that the information is a joke and asks callers to pass it on to "gullible"

friends. Telephone numbers include (704) 319-7254 and (704) 319-7242.

Although the messages do not ask for personal information, residents are cautioned that court staff do not contact residents by phone or e-mail to ask for Social Security numbers, credit card numbers or other sensitive information.

The prank is not a scam and does not involve money, but it is upsetting residents who take their civic obligations serious. Wayne County District Court Clerk Deb Allemann-Dannelly has been notified of the prank, and anybody with questions can call her at (402) 375-2260.

have to do."

Flood said communities shouldn't wait for the government to help them grow their towns.

"The thing I'm asked is why state government isn't doing more to combat rural depopulation, and my message has always been that you don't wait for the government to spoon-feed you opportunities for the future," he said. "Communities like Wayne and Battle Creek reach out to young people and create a culture that welcomes young people, and we have a responsibility to make our communities more attractive."

Flood said that Wayne State is a "huge gem" for northeast Nebraska, and he said he has been a strong supporter of the state college system. He said he has encouraged

state senators in the area to work together "to make sure Wayne State is taken care of. We need senators looking out for Wayne State."

Flood said state issues such as K-12 education funding, highways and quality of life are among the important issues he's looking at. He thinks the state will have to figure out a new way to fund K-12 education in the state, noting that schools like Wayne where valuations are rising are seeing their state aid eliminated.

"Rural communities not increasing and valuations going up is a recipe for less state aid in the long-term, and we have to figure out how to fund schools in Nebraska differently," he said.

Flood is a supporter of finishing freeways such as Highway 275,

which he said would further attract people to Wayne. Addressing the natural gas delivery system, with the increased reliance on natural gas, is also important for the state's future.

As to when he'll decide his future, Flood said he thought he would have a decision by the end of this year.

"I've been doing my job (in the Legislature) the last eight years and haven't been running all over the state, but now I'm trying to meet people and make contacts and see if this is something a guy from Northeast Nebraska can do," he said. "Living in Norfolk gives me appreciation of the challenges that face people who live away from the Interstate, as well as the challenges for those living near it."

Board members said they were told by Kirsch that she would have anyone arrested who steps on the family's property to attempt to appraise the property.

Mark Mainelli, representing the county's engineering firm, Mainelli and Wagner, said the appraiser has a right to be on the property for purposes of making an appraisal, and that he would have to physically be at the site to make any kind of an appraisal.

Board members said they will continue negotiating with the family in an effort to get a new road built in the area sometime in the near future.

The board also accepted the resignation of current County Assessor Joyce Reeg, who will step down from

her post at the end of the month. Dawn Duffy was appointed by the board to serve out the remainder of the term, which runs through 2014.

In other action, the board:

- approved a bid of \$139,990.35 from Elkhorn Paving of Norfolk for the Wakefield East road paving project.

- approved a budget request of \$10,000 from the Wayne County Library Association, which will be split with Wayne's library receiving \$5,000, \$3,500 going to Winside and \$1,500 to Carroll.

- continued its contract with Mainelli and Wagner for its engineering services.

- approved the closing of the Wayne County Courthouse for the entire day on Friday, July 27. Originally, the courthouse was to close at

noon due to the Wayne County Fair, but will close all day so a conversion of the building's cooling system can be executed.

- talked with Steve Muir of First National Insurance about renewal rates and dental insurance for county employees.

- heard a presentation from Mark Becker of Nebraska Public Power District regarding the NPPD electric transmission project that may require some work to be done in the southwest corner of Wayne County.

- meeting as the Board of Equalization, the board heard eight property tax protests. Property owners will be notified once decisions are made on their protests.

The board's next meeting is Tuesday, Aug. 7, at 9 a.m. in the county courthouse.

Garry Poutre, Wayne Public Works superintendent, told the council that from the city's standpoint, "doing the feasibility study is fine. The village of Carroll is not a huge water user. The study will determine whether or not to move forward with that option."

Due to recent changes in the way the Nebraska Department of Economic Development handles revolving loan funds, \$150,000 in funding to Wayne NG Cars, LLC is no longer available to the company. Instead, the Wayne LB840 Economic Development Advisory Committee presented a request to increase the LB840 loan guarantee to the company from \$150,000 to \$250,000.

Council member Sturm said that after meeting with company officials earlier this week, "he is impressed with the project."

Doug Rose, an investor with Wayne NG Cars, LLC, told the council that the project is continuing to move forward, and several issues with the production of the cars have been worked out.

Following discussion, the request for additional LB840 funds to the company was approved on a unanimous vote.

Council members gave first reading approval to an ordinance that will establish a code of decorum for the city's mayor and council members.

Council member Brian Frevert told the council he sees "no reason to change what we already have. I am

against the ordinance in its entirety. How did we operate before (without the ordinance)?"

Council member Jon Haase also was opposed to the ordinance, stating it "is just adding rules."

Council member Sturm said, in regard to the need to have the ordinance, "times changes and things change. I see this as a way to protect both sides."

Mayor Ken Chamberlain said that the ordinance was aimed at protecting city employees.

Council member Jill Brodersen said she felt the ordinance would serve as a "job description for council members."

Council members voted 6-2 with Frevert and Haase voted against, to move the ordinance forward for a second reading at the next council meeting.

Council members voted unanimously in favor of action on a settlement agreement and release of all claims regarding the Kate Lassila vs. City of Wayne and Lance Webster matter, as well as the claim for attorney's fees to Fitzgerald, Vetter, Attorneys-at-Law in the matter.

Approval was given for the membership of Tyler Mostek to the Wayne Volunteer Fire Department.

A tentative date of Monday, July 30 for a budget work session for the upcoming fiscal year.

The council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, Aug. 7 at 5:30 p.m. in council chambers.

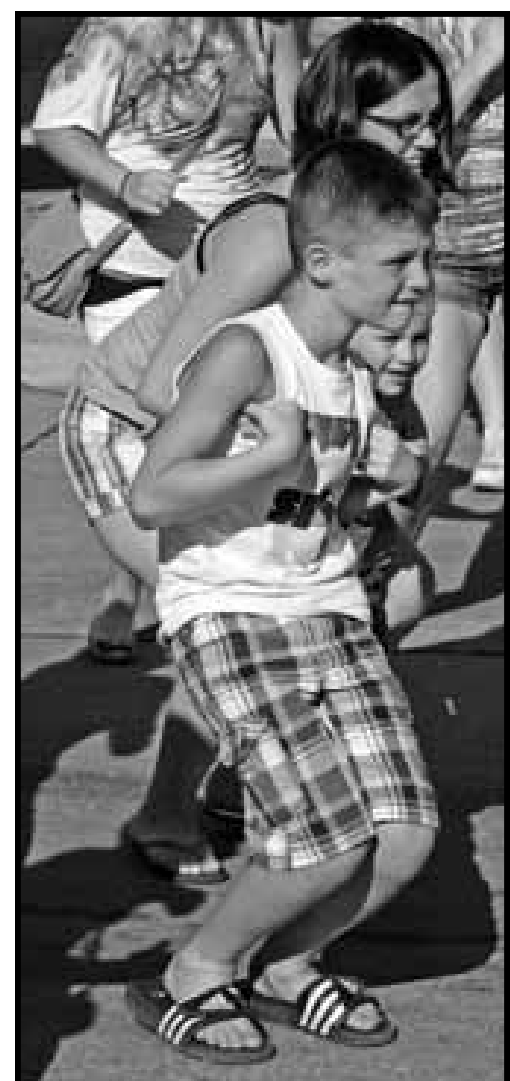

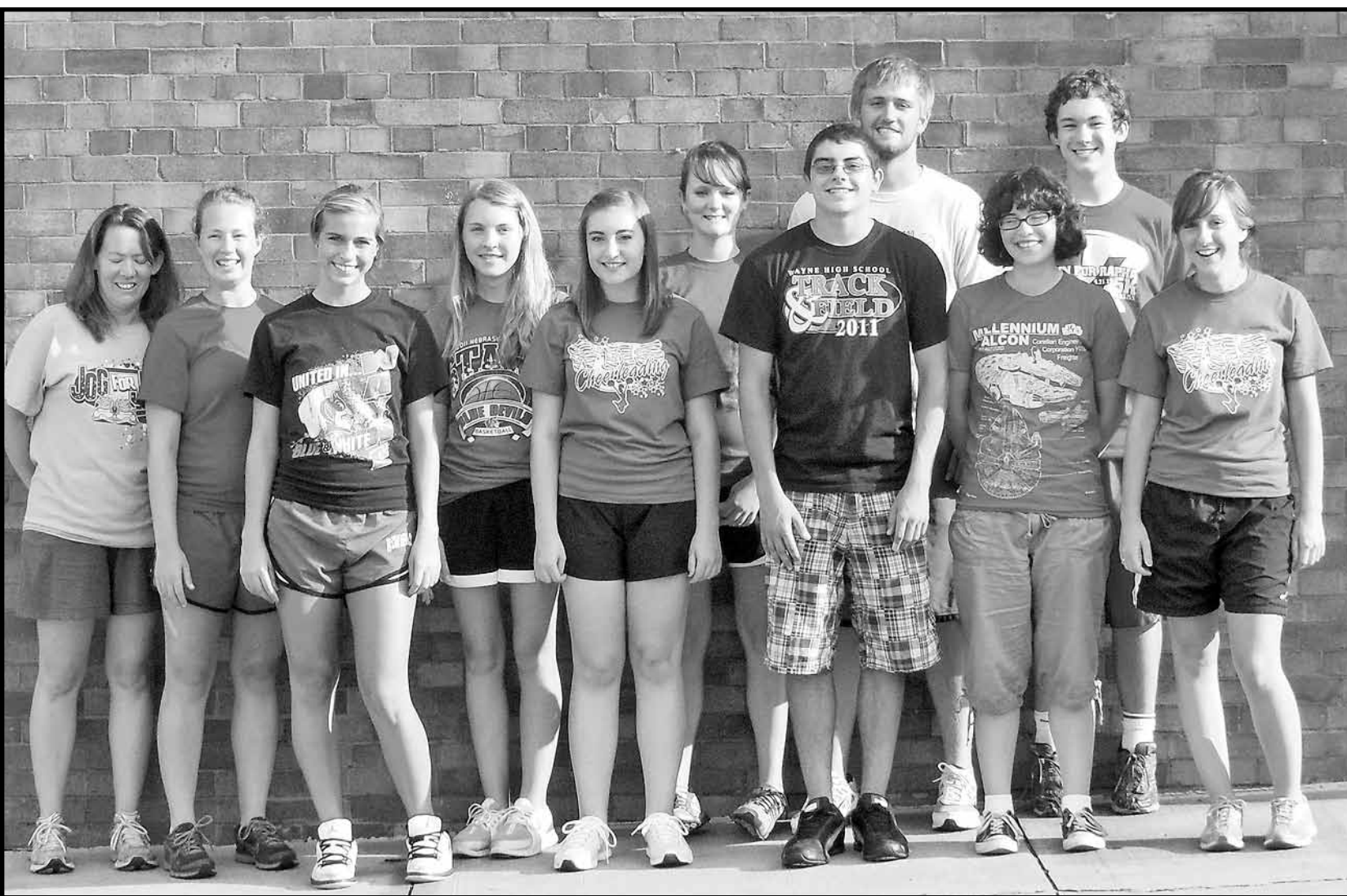

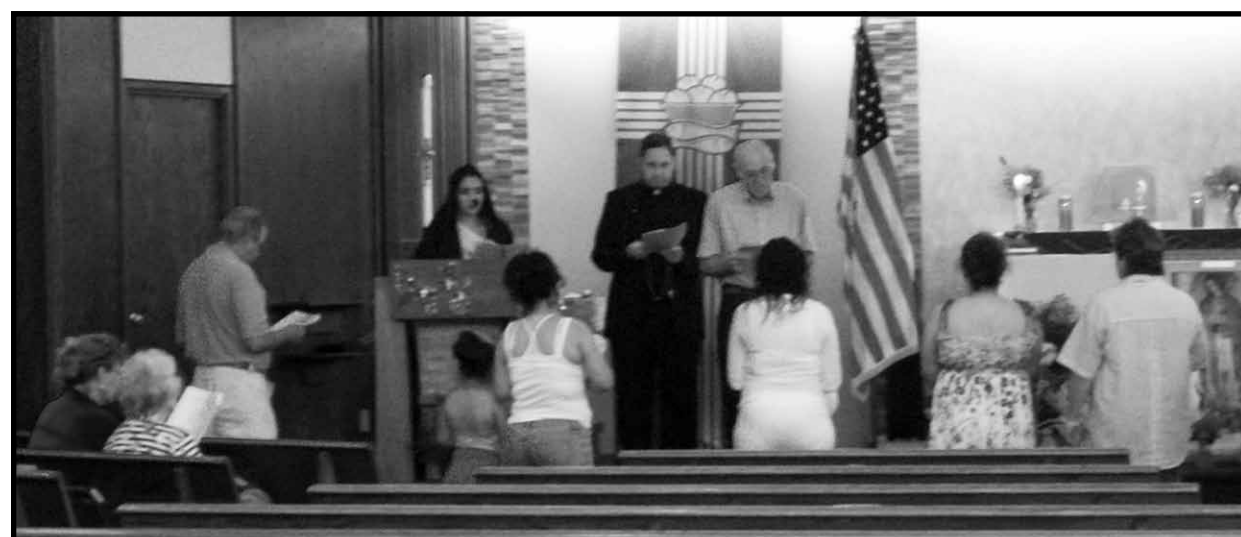

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Game and Parks recommends dates

The Nebraska Game and Parks Commission has released staff recommendations for 2012 hunting season dates for waterfowl and crow.

since guidelines were put into place by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in 1991," said Mark Vrtiska, waterfowl program manager. "I think the new four-zone format will provide a little more flexibility in trying to meet season date preferences for duck seasons."

Staff recommendations for duck seasons were based on a survey sent to duck hunters across the state about their preference for duck season dates as well as duck harvest information compiled by staff with the assistance of researchers at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

"I believe this is the first time we've brought these two elements together at the same time" Vrtiska said. "The Game and Parks board of commissioners will consider these recommendations when they meet July 27 in Lincoln. The public may provide comment prior to the meeting as well as attending the Lincoln meeting.

The recommended season dates are:

Early Teal - Low Plains: Sept.

8-23; High Plains: Sept. 8-16.

Youth - Zone 1: Oct. 6-7; Zone 2: Sept. 29-30; Zone 3: Oct. 13-14; Zone 4: Sept. 29-30.

Ducks and Coots - Zone 1: Oct. 13-Dec. 25; Zone 2: Oct. 6-Dec. 18 and Jan. 2-23 (High Plains only); Zone 3: Oct. 20-Jan. 1 and Jan. 2-23 (High Plains only); Zone 4: Oct. 6-Dec. 18.
