

### Dogs, water, cars all on city's agenda

A wide variety of items, from rules at the city's new dog park, to a water feasibility study for the village of Carroll to additional loan money for a natural gas car manufacturer planning to build in Wayne, were debated during Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

Jessi Hansen, a representative of the group that has worked to bring a dog park to Wayne, answered questions on the rules and regulations for use of the dog park. She noted that a number of suggestions from the city's insurance carrier were incorporated into the rules for use of park.

Council member Doug Sturm questioned the "policing" of the park and asked who would be responsible for enforcing the rules. He suggested the group form a committee that would be responsible for handling complaints.

City Administrator Lowell Johnson told the Council that the park is under city jurisdiction, and dogs violating rules there would be handled the same way as in any other part of the city.

Following discussion, the council approved a resolution which adopted the rules for use of the park.

Council members also gave approval for the village of Carroll to move forward on a feasibility study to determine the cost to build the infrastructure to Wayne and purchase water from the Wayne water system.

Mark Tietz, representing the Carroll Village Board, spoke at the meeting and told council members the village has been having water issues in recent months and is looking at options to resolve the problems. Among these is to build a water main from Wayne to Carroll (approximately nine miles) and purchasing water from the City

of Wayne.

## Flood in Wayne to talk about possible '14 bid

It's been more than 50 years since a native of northeast Nebraska served as the state's commander in chief.

Last week, a Norfolk state senator and speaker of the Legislature stopped in Wayne to talk with residents about the possibility of running for governor in 2014.

Not since Norbert Tiemann of Wausa fulfilled the duties from 1967-1971 has a resident of the area been the governor of the state. Norfolk State Sen. Mike Flood visited with about 50 local residents and business owners Thursday as part of a 45-city "listening tour" around the state as he decides whether or not to throw his hat into the

With current Gov. Dave Heineman finishing his second full session, Flood said he would decide by the end of 2012 whether or not he will join Lt. Gov. Rick Sheehy in the Republican race for governor two years from now.

Flood is ending eight years as the District one of the things Nebraska communities 19 representative in the Legislature and has also been the speaker of the Legisla-

ture since 2007. He said he took some time off after the Legislature ended its session in April to spend more time at the two radio stations he owns in Norfolk.

I decided that I'd give myself 30 days, and after those 30 days the staff at the radio station asked if there was something else I needed be doing politically," he said to laughter from the audience. "I've thought about it, and I am interested in continuing my public service . . . I am considering a run for governor of Nebraska in 2014."

One of Flood's concerns that he talked with local residents about was attracting and keeping young people in rural communities like Wayne.

"It's something I'm passionate about," he said. "You're already doing a lot of things here in Wayne, because I see a lot of people in their 20's and 30's who have moved here, and there are a lot of activities that cater to families here. This generation is less materialistic, more altruistic, more collaborative and they determine where they want to live and find a job to make it work, and that's

# Driest season in 25 years has left area fields going thirsty

Northeast Nebraska has seen approximately half an inch of rainfall since June 1, making it incomparably the driest growing season in almost 25 years.

The dry conditions coupled with the extreme heat throughout the region have left area farmers wondering what kind of yields they will be able to produce this year.

Wayne County is currently sitting between 50 and 60 percent of its normal rainfall for the growing season, with many areas in the state much lower than that.

Keith Jarvi, Extension Educator for the University of Nebraska, noted that in areas with sandier soil, the fields have already been cut down for silage - the process of grinding up the entire corn plant for animal feed as opposed to harvesting it at the end of the season.

While Jarvi was cautiously optimistic that Wayne County farmers will not have to do likewise if the area sees some rain the in the near future, he said the situation is close to a tipping point and that the one saving grace for area farmers is that droughtresistant hybrid crops are better than ever.

2011 was good year in terms of rainfall, and that was reflected in the high yields. Jarvi said it is likely area farmers will not be as optimistic headed into next year's growing season.

"This is the first dry year we've had since 1988. We've had a real good weather pattern here in northeast Nebraska," Jarvi said. "It's amazing how one year can change everything.

With the lack of precipitation dominating the area weather scene, fields like this one located south of Wayne are feeling the effects of this summer's drought conditions.

The economic impact of the type of drought Nebraska, as well as the rest of the country, is dealing with is going to affect agricultural business all across the nation valuable jobs for contractors and construcand extend beyond just the farmers themselves, Jarvi said.

"It's an unprecedented deal in the amount of area affected, and crop prices are going to stay high," Jarvi said.

Jarvi noted that while most farmers have drought insurance that should leave their operations more or less unaffected by one dry year, that won't replace the amount of business farmers are usually able to do with area contractors.

Each year, farmers across the area contract new silos and machine sheds, as well as purchase new machinery, providing tion crews. This season's drought has led to substantial cancellations for this type of contracted work because the farmers can no longer afford it.

The agricultural industry that affects every level of local economy in states like Nebraska will, in the long run, be fine, according to Jarvi. There may, however, be more irrigation in this part of the state in the future as dry land farmers across the state see below-average yields in 2012.



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# Vavra becomes 10-time National Cluck-off champ

It wasn't hot enough to fry an egg on the stage Saturday in Bressler Park, but it was certainly hot enough to get a "chicken" to wear shoes.

Defending National Cluck-Off champion Joel Vavra usually does his "barefoot chicken" dance as part of his routine, but the burning pavement forced him into a pair of black sneakers as he crowed his way to a 10th National Cluck-Off championship to highlight the 32nd annual Wayne Chicken Show Saturday afternoon.

Wearing overalls over a neon green T-shirt and sporting colorful plumage on his backside, Vavra clucked, preened and crowed his way to a second straight title, beating out a field of 30 talented chicks, hens and roosters who were trying to knock him from the top of the roost.

But it was the hot cement that proved to be Vavra's biggest challenge.

"It was super hot," he said. "I had to put my shoes back on because it was burning my feet. I like to do the barefoot chicken thing, and I'm sure you don't see a chicken with shoes on very often."

Vavra faced some tough competition in the 14-over bracket. Wavne native and Seattle resident Lyle George put on a good show and earned a third-place finish, adding to the fun by joining Vavra in an impromptu chase around the bandshell during the finals.

"Lyle is one of the pioneers of this event and I've always liked him," Vavra said. "He's a really funny guy and we had a lot of fun doing that act up there."

Vavra's toughest competition in the adult division came from Richmond, Va., native Jenny Miller, who first heard about the Cluck-Off from 11-time champion Del Hampton and was sent to Wayne by her employer to compete in the event.

At the end of the day, the role of education, be it high school or college, is to prepare the minds of young people for the challenges they will face as adults. One such challenge will be servicing the energy needs of an exponentially increasing global population.

Students at Laurel-Concord/ Coleridge High School are learning in a unique and hands-on way about the energy alternatives that exist and which ones may be the most viable options in the future.

Wind Powering America, an organization whose goal is to spread information about the benefits of wind energy, sponsors the Wind For Schools Program in eight states across the nation and at 10 other high schools in Nebraska.

It was largely through a grant from Wind for Schools that LCC was able to recently construct a 45-foot tall wind turbine that resides near the school. Wind for Schools proapproximately \$2,000 being covered by the school district.

In addition to supplying most of the funding for the tower, Wind forms of energy are going to be a getting the program off the ground.



### **Baseball:** a language all its own

Every so often, someone will ask me what it's like to be a sports writer and be so close to the action.

I get a lot closer to what's happening inside the lines than most of the fans who attend the games. Because I have to take pictures, jot down stats and closely observe what's going on in the field of play, I usually am able to see – and hear – things that the average fan doesn't get to experience.

On the basketball court, you can generally hear the coach calling out plays or encouraging the official to make a call that everybody else in the gym saw. At a volleyball game, coaches are chatting with players and positioning them for a planned counterattack. On a football sideline, - well, about half of what I hear isn't meant for publication, but let's just say it's intense.

There's one place, though, where you really have to know your stuff if you plan on being able to carry on any kind of conversation with anybody in arm's reach – a baseball dugout.

Walking into a baseball dugout is not unlike strolling across the border into a country whose official language is nowhere near anything spoke on your side of the line. If you aren't up on the lingo, it's like dropping my 10-year-old nephew in the middle of Mexico City during Cinco de Mayo without a translation book.

There is good news, however because of my vast experience in watching thousands of baseball games from dugouts of all shapes, sizes and depths below ground level, I have been able to crack the language code that allows players, coaches and even umpires to communicate with one another from first pitch to the last out. And you would be surprised at some of the things that are said during the course of a baseball game.

"Comenowbud" is the dugout equivalent of a statement of support for your fellow teammate to make a good play or come up with a key hit. It's like he's saying "Come on now, buddy, help the team out." (See also "comenowkid" and "mon-now?")

"Haybattahbattah" is the baseball equivalent of having fans wave their arms desperately behind the basket while a player attempts a free throw. Trust me – rare is the occasion when the batter can hear anything beyond the end of his nose with all that padding inside those helmets. There's a reason why coaches slap, touch and pull on themselves from the third-base coaches box like somebody stuck a box full of chiggers in their shorts – it's the only way they can communicate with the batter and runners on base, because there's no way in the world they can hear "comenowbud" from anywhere outside arm's reach.

"Whatsaybud," from what I've been able to figure out in my translation skills, is something along the lines of "What do you say?" This is the teammate's way of cheering his fellow players won, sort of like "comenowbud," but more a rhetorical question than a call to action.

"Humnowwhatsaygitonenowbud" is one of those dugout phrases that's really hard to explain, let alone spell properly in a sports column. I'm pretty sure it has something to do with encouraging the pitcher to strike a batter out, and it is usually used most often with two outs in an inning and the tying and/ or go-ahead run in scoring position. It's said with great emphasis, as if a trip to the World Series is on the

There's also all kinds of words for jersey numbers – "deuce" for 2, "three-ball" for 3, "snowman" for 8 and "aces" for anybody wearing 1 or 11. You've got "Gretzky" for 99, "MJ" for 23 and "dubbadoos" for 22. Baseball has a secret language all its own, but once you've been able to translate it, the game becomes much more enjoyable to watch – as long as the football coach isn't cuss-

ing out the ump.

# **Penn State report** defies description

Disgusting.

- Appalling.
- Sickening.

The release last week of the 267-page report regarding the child sexual abuse scandal at Penn State University should undoubtedly bring those words to the mind of any living, breathing species with a brain and a soul.

After 430 interviews and more than 3.5 million pieces of data, the report issued by former CIA head Louis Freeh showed a level of cold-hearted laziness and callous disregard for human life among key personnel in the Penn State University administration that makes me wonder if the school's athletic department should even exist beyond this coming year.

The decisions by the four key administrators - president Graham Spanier, senior vice president of finance and business Gary Schultz, athletic director Timothy Curley and coach Joe Paterno – to put the school's brand and reputation ahead of the lives of innocent young boys whose childhood was stolen by the animal known as Gerald A. Sandusky is disgusting on a level that, even eight months after news of the attacks first surfaced, I'm still having trouble comprehending.

What I find most disappointing and revolting is the fact that the vast majority of these young boys – most of them now young men – could have been spared Sandusky's perverted and sick advances had the Penn State administration acted when the first word of Sandusky's action surfaced way back in 1998. Allegations of Sandusky's horrifying behavior were first made by the mother of a boy who was "hugged" in the football showers, but the administration made no effort to pursue the monster and have him, at the very least, removed permanently from the Penn State campus.

Two years later, Sandusky was seen assaulting a boy in the shower by a campus janitor, who failed to report the incident out of fear of losing his job, showing just how much power the football program had on campus. A few months later, Sandusky was seen raping another boy in the shower by a graduate assistant football coach, who reported the incident to Paterno the following day. It would be two days before Paterno would get around to passing word up to his athletic director, and by the time word got to Spanier, the seriousness of the crime was minimized.

Were it not for some outstanding investigative reporting by a local newspaper, the whole Sandusky affair might never have seen the light of day. And now that the scumbag will spend the rest of his life in prison, the question that must be asked is: where do we go from here?

that makes the 1980's pay-for-play scandal at SMU look like a friendly Friday night bar poker game. SMU's football program received the "death penalty" from the NCAA, barring the school from competing in the sport for two years, a penalty that, even almost 30 years later, it has not completely recovered from.

# **Capitol View** Debate on debates like deja vu

If the debate is about debates, it must be the U.S. Senate race in Nebraska. And, it must involve former Governor and U.S. Senator Bob Kerrev.


Such discussion is nothing new. Only the Republican candidate has changed.

Nearly a quarter century ago, Kerrey tangled with short-term incumbent Sen. David Karnes, R-NE, about the number of debates. The year was 1988. Now he is tangling with Republican candidate Deb Fischer about the same topic. Karnes and Fischer had both survived contentious primary battles only to face the decorated war hero who seems to like to debate about debates. Deja vu all over again.

Karnes, appointed to the Senate in March 1987 following the death of Democrat Sen. Ed Zorinsky, successfully captured the GOP nod in a primary race against Rep. Hal Daub. Zorinsky's unexpected death allowed Gov. Kay Orr to appoint his replacement. Many thought Daub was the clear choice.

The 39-year-old Karnes, a virtual unknown, had headed Orr's successful 1986 gubernatorial effort in Omaha-dominated Douglas County. Daub, 47, was a four-term congressman, a party regular. Orr said she thought Karnes was the right man for the job. Critics said she favored Karnes because he wouldn't threaten her status in the state party.

Daub and Karnes had a series of pre-primary statewide debates and Daub used a Karnes' statement about water projects during one of those debates to launch a series of commercials warning that a vote for Karnes would be "a vote to cut off your own water." Fighting words in a state where cattle and crops depend on water and many consider the element to be liquid gold.



faced Kerrey in a lone debate in the open-air auditorium at the Nebraska State Fair in Lincoln. Many agreed that Karnes damaged his chances to defeat Kerrey when he commented that he believed "we need fewer farmers at this point in time." That remark was broadcast statewide and subsequent attempts by Karnes to explain that he meant there were bigger farms being maintained by fewer farmers, just never seemed to fly.

Fischer, a veteran Sandhills rancher and state senator, has agreed to debate Kerrey on Aug. 25 at the Nebraska State Fair in Grand Island. Kerrey had proposed who bested Attorney General Jon nomination in 1992. Karnes won the nomination and Bruning and State Treasurer Don

Stenberg - both party regulars - in incident that earned former Navy the primary, has been busy raising funds to gear up for what could be one of the state's most expensive political races.

Critics have said the Republican Party has bloodied itself again with an ugly primary battle – remember Daub and Karnes? Some say Fischer appears to be afraid to debate Kerrey.

Kerrey, who returned to Nebraska following service in Vietnam, defeated incumbent Governor Charles Thone, a long-time Congressman, in 1982, but served only one term in that office. ### FSA committee nominations being accepted

Wavne County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director County Executive Director Debra J. Pieper, announced that county committee election nominations began June 15.

Farmers, ranchers and landowners are encouraged to nominate farmer and rancher candidates to serve on their local FSA county committee by the Aug. 1, 2012 deadline.

Elected county committee members serve a three-year term and are responsible for making decisions on FSA disaster, conservation, commodity, and price support programs, as well as other important federal farm program issues.

"County committees are unique to FSA and are a valuable resource that gives locally elected farmers and ranchers who participate in FSA programs the opportunity to impact farm programs at the local level," said Pieper. "I hope to see a high level of participation during the nomination and election process," she said.

Producers may nominate themselves or others as candidates. Organizations that represent minority and women farmers and ranchers may also nominate candidates. Nominees must participate in a program administered by FSA, be tee election and reside in the local administrative area (LAA) in which the person is a candidate. To become a nominee, eligible individuals must sign form FSA-669A. The form and more information about county committee elections are available online at: www.fsa.usda. gov/elections. "In order to have fair representation of the demographics and agricultural interests in the community, I encourage all producers, including women, minority and beginning farmers and ranchers to participate in the nomination and election process," said Pieper. County committees are comprised of three to five members elected by local producers. All newly elected county committee members and alternates will take office Jan. 1, 2013. Nomination forms must be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on Aug. 1, 2012.

The Nebraska Game and Parks since guidelines were put into place Commission has released staff by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in 1991," said Mark Vrtiska, waterfowl program manager. "I think the new four-zone format will provide a little more flexibility in trying to meet season date preferences for duck seasons."

> Staff recommendations for duck seasons were based on a survey sent to duck hunters across the state about their preference for duck season dates as well as duck harvest information compiled by staff with the assistance of researchers at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

"I believe this is the first time we've brought these two elements together at the same time" Vrtiska said. " The Game and Parks board of commissioners will consider these recommendations when they meet July 27 in Lincoln. The public Order - Zone 1: Feb. 9-April 14 may provide comment prior to the meeting as well as attending the Lincoln meeting.

The recommended season dates are:

Early Teal - Low Plains: Sept. Nov. 16-Jan. 19.
