Photo display provides fond memories of fallen soldiers

With almost all of the more than 100 chairs occupied in the Wayne Armory on Tuesday evening, it was hard not to feel the emotion and energy of a photo exhibit that was on display.

A dedication ceremony was held at the Wayne Armory for a new photo exhibit called "Remembering Our Fallen" that honors the 81 Nebraskans who have given the ultimate sacrifice while in military service, many of those killed in wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. The display is at the National Guard Armory through the weekend and is open from 9 a.m.-8 p.m. weekdays through Tuesday, Aug. 21, and 10 a.m.-2 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

The father of one of those soldiers – Lonnie Ford of Pender – spoke of his son's life, while a fellow soldier who lost a leg as a member of the same convoy reminded those in attendance to appreciate life.

Ford's son, Josh, was fondly remembered in a speech his father gave at Tuesday's ceremony. The elder Ford recalled his son growing up and coming to him one day to tell him he wanted to sign up with the National Guard.

"I was surprised at his request, and I

asked him if he wanted me to go with him," he told those in attendance. "His answer was 'Old man,' – that's what he liked to call me – 'this is something I can do by myself.' I was a very proud father."

Josh was part of the 189th National Guard unit based in Wayne, a group his father recalled him saying "was his second family." He became known as "Blockbuster" See DISPLAY, Page 3A

Commission's decision upheld in district court

District Judge Robert Ensz upheld the Wayne Civil Service Commission's decision regarding the employment status of two former Wayne police officers.

In separate decisions Tuesday regarding the Wayne Civil Service Commission's upholding of terminations of Chief Lance Webster and Lt. Phil Shear by city administrator Lowell Johnson, Ensz affirmed both judgements by the Civil Service Commission on the discharge of the two officers in the spring of 2011, stating they were made in good faith for cause.

Johnson suspended both officers in January 2011, citing a variety of allegations, and terminated the officers three months later. Both officers appealed their terminations to the three-member Wayne Civil Service Commission, which held a week-long hearing at the Wayne Fire Hall in November before issuing their decision in late December. Both officers appealed that decision in Wayne County District Court just after the first of the year.

At question was whether or not the Civil Service Commission acted in an arbitrary and capricious manner by upholding Johnson's decision to terminate the two officers.

In Cuming County District Court in West Point last week, attorneys for both officers argued that the commission did not prop-

erly weigh the evidence regarding their clients' terminations and did not rule in good faith.

Both attorneys argued that their clients had not been allowed to have a Loudermill hearing in front of an impartial third party, as Johnson – their accuser – was the hearing officer.

Both officers were provided with notice, an explanation of the evidence against them and were given an opportunity to tell their side of the story, and neither provided any contrary evidence at the hearing, Ensz said in his six-page decision.

The judge determined that both Webster and Shear were not denied due process in receiving a pre-termination hearing before Johnson.

"But if any existed, such violations were ultimately cured by the five-day public hearing before the Commission, preceded by a lengthy opportunity for discovery. The Commission, in its decision approving Johnson's action, did not deny . . . pre-termination due process rights," Ensz wrote in separate decisions on the two officers' appeals.

Both attorneys argued that the commission's decision was not supported by the evidence presented in the proceedings, which resulted in a decision that was not made in good faith for cause, and was both arbitrary and capricious.

"Chelley" can still remember the taunting during sports practice.

At first, she chalked it up to "girls just being girls," but when the name-calling persisted, she felt more and more alone in her class.

"It was never ever physical, but a lot of mean things were said," she said while playing nervously with her shoulder-length

Hospital ready for new addition's open house Sunday

Providence Medical Center will showcase its \$3.5 million expansion project with an open house on Sunday, Aug. 19.

The public is invited to attend the ceremony which begins with a short presentation at 1 p.m. and runs until 4 p.m.

The project includes a 7,300-square foot expansion of therapy services; an 8,500-square foot expansion of the Wellness and Cardiac Rehabilitation services and a 3,000-square foot addition to the Out-patient Speciality Services.

"We are proud of the employees, providers and volunteers who make us successful. We are all part of a team, and as a team, we stand ready to meet your health and wellness needs. We would like to invite everyone in the community to be a part of our celebration," said Tom Lee, Administrator at PMC.

Ground for the expansion project was broken on May 19, 2011, with the architectural firm of Avant of Omaha responsible for the design and Darland Construction Company of Omaha the construction manager.

Janice Stopak, area specialist for the USDA's Lincoln field office, said the new addition will have a lasting, positive impact on the quality of health care in the area.

"USDA Rural Development is pleased to fund this project which will improve and expand health care services to the residents of Wayne and surrounding areas," said Stopak. "Critical access hospitals are vital to rural Nebraska, allowing area residents to access medical services locally rather than traveling a distance to obtain the services needed. 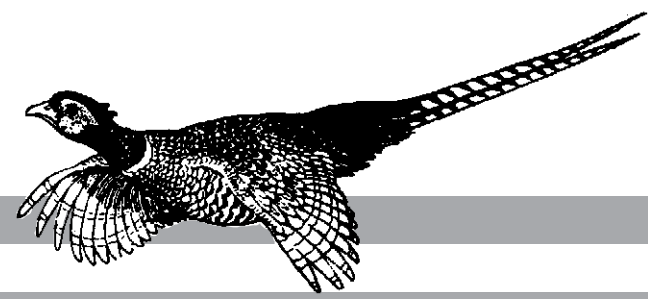

Tips shared for wise water use in summer

What does maintaining a green, healthy lawn and keeping electric rates low have in common? What time you water, of course!

The best time of day to water is during the early morning hours, around 4-6 a.m., when water pressure is highest. In addition, water will have a chance to soak down into the ground before evaporating, thus providing the most benefit for the lawn. Any water left on the lawn will evaporate in a timely manner

when daylight arrives.

This is also the best time for the electrical pumps that provide the water to operate. Air-conditioning needs are at about their lowest in the day and most neighborhoods are asleep. It is the time of day when electrical load on the system is at its lowest, and less expensive forms of generation are operating to meet the demand.

Conversely, mid-afternoon watering is probably the worst time to

water, as far as efficient water use is concerned. Much will evaporate away before it has a chance to soak down. A lot of water will flow, but the lawn will not be gaining as much benefit. If the home is supplied water through a municipal supply that is metered, cost is incurred for water that never helps the lawn.

Mid-afternoon into early evening is also when most municipal electric utilities experience their system peaks in energy service. Often, ad-

ditional generation units are needed to meet energy demands during this period. These intermittent generation resources usually have a much higher cost to operate. By watering, either your own water pump or your community's will need to operate to meet this demand for water. Thus, the electricity for the pump will come at a higher cost to your community.

One might think watering during the late evening hours might work, too. While watering after 8 p.m. will likely avoid pumping during your community's peak electrical load period, it could be harmful to your lawn. Fungi and other plant diseases tend to thrive in moist, cool environments. During overnight hours, temperatures cool off, water takes longer to penetrate down through the soil profile, and any excess evaporates much more slowly since the sun is not shining.

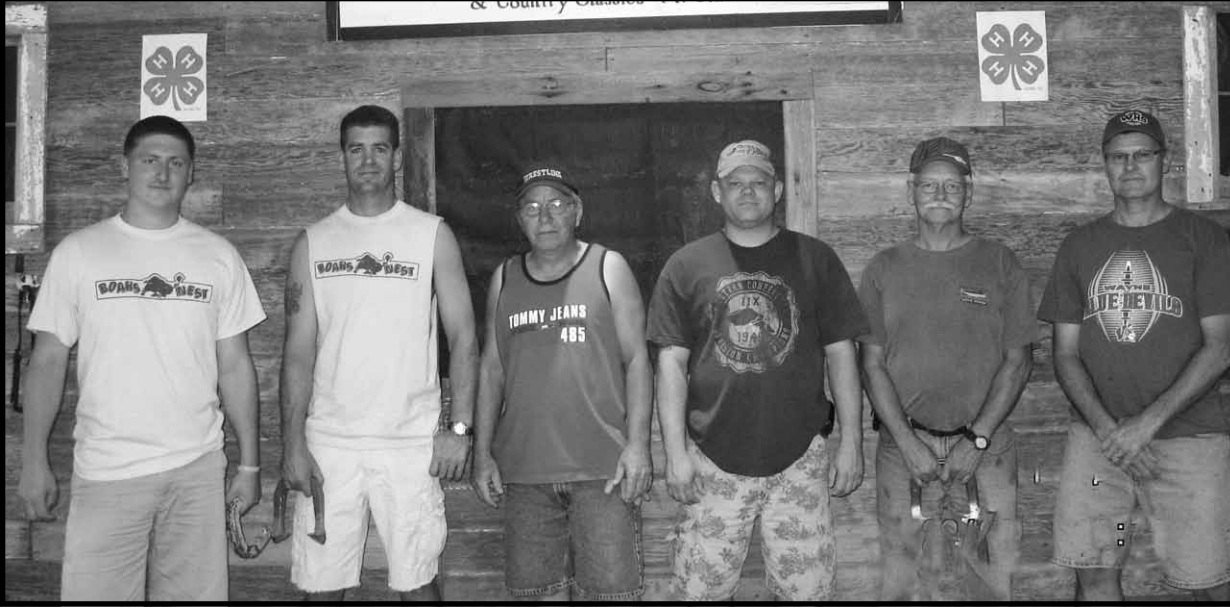
For people with in-ground sprinkler systems, it is easy to program operation to occur shortly before sunrise. However, for the many homes that do not have underground sprinklers, an alternative would be to set out sprinklers as early as possible before the sun starts heating things up.

This same approach to electrical cost savings applies to other water uses around the home, too. Consider doing laundry, washing dishes and bathing outside the hours of 9 a.m. and 8 p.m. Not only will electricity be needed to pump the water used and to heat the electric coil inside most dish washers, if an electric water heater is used, additional electric demand will be added.

These practices will help keep your electric utility's costs for power down. In turn, it reduces the pressure for future rate increases. For other ideas, visit with your local electric utility or go to www.nppd.com/save-energy.

City sales tax receipts sees record for fiscal year

With one month left in the fiscal year, the city of Wayne has already received a record total in sales tax revenue.

Totals from the city of Wayne show the city received \$55,604.12 in receipts for the month of August, which are based on sales made during the month of June. The total was the second-highest figure received, just behind the \$55,814.95 received in February of this year.

Nancy Braden, city finance director, attributed the August figures on the recent opening of the new Cobblestone Inn and Suites hotel and two new thrift stores that opened in downtown Wayne. She thought the recent closeout sales at Pamida, which is transitioning to a Shopko later this year, also may have had an impact.

The city has received \$539,070.20 in sales receipts for the year, which betters the total of \$521,105.15 received during all of fiscal year 2009-10.

Real world experiences part of events at State Fair

Two new contests aimed at exposing youth to real world experience will be unveiled at the 2012 Nebraska State Fair Aug. 24-Sept. 3 at Fonner Park in Grand Island.

"Our goal is to provide youth with hands-on activities which will help them prepare for a successful future," said Shane Potter, extension educator in 4-H youth development at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

The first new contest, scheduled for 2 p.m. Aug. 26, is an interview judging contest, where participants will be evaluated on how well they complete three steps of a job application process for one of three fictitious jobs: veterinary assistant, 4-H camp counselor and political intern.

Based on the three job descriptions posted on the 4-H Nebraska State Fairbook website at 4h.unl.edu/nebraskastatefairbook, participants must complete a cover letter and resume beforehand and turn them in on the day of the contest. During the contest, participants will fill out a job application and interview for a position.

To simulate an actual job application process, Potter has invited UNL's Career Services and employers from outside the university, such as Union Pacific, to help conduct the interviews and judge the contest.

"We want the experience to be as close to real life as we can make it," he said.

After the interviews, Career Services staff and employers will provide critiques to participants. The feedback will be valuable to show participants how they can improve, Potter said.

The second contest, called the Great Question Challenge, is being held in partnership with the Engler Agribusiness Entrepreneurship Program and will let youth explore real world opportunities in entrepreneurship.

Teams of two to four 4-H youth must come up with a feasible solution to decrease food wastage.

All teams will present their solution to a panel of judges at the state fair from 9 a.m.-12 p.m. Sept. 3. The winning team in each of the two divisions – ages 12 to 14 and 15 to 19 – will receive \$500 to put their plan into action.

Potter said the contest will continue in subsequent years with a timely problem for teams to solve each year. For more about this contest, visit the page on the Engler Agribusiness Entrepreneurship Program website at engler.unl.edu/web/engler/great-question-challenge-4-h.

Both the interview judging contest and the entrepreneurship challenge will be held in the 4-H/FFA building.

Josh" while the unit was stationed overseas, thanks to his collection of more than 400 DVD's that he would loan out to his fellow troops, provided they signed his book.

"One day, a sergeant asked to borrow a video, and Josh said he could as long as he signed his book," Mr. Ford said. "The sergeant reminded him that he controlled his life, what duty he could be assigned to and whether or not he got paid on time. Josh said, 'Yeah, I know that – but I have the videos.' The sergeant signed the book."

Late on the night of July 31, 2006, Ford received news that, he said, no parent should ever have to experience – the death of a child.

"The knock on my door at 11:30 p.m. on July 31, 2006 changed my life forever," he told those in attendance. "I was informed that my son was killed by an IED and another soldier, Ben Marksmeier, was severely injured and lost his leg in the explosion.

Ford and his wife delivered the news in person to their daughters, and by the time word had gotten out, the community of Pender came out in support of the family during their time of loss.

"Many of our friends and relatives, and Brad Wieland and many others were there to help us deal with what we had to deal with," he said. "One learns very quickly how the military handles the loss of one of their own – they gave us moral support and helped us make it through this very difficult time."

Marksmeier, a friend of Josh's who served alongside Ford when the Improvised Explosive Device (IED) took Ford's life and cost Marksmeier his leg, said he remembered his friend fondly and said the experience helped him come to an understanding about how life should be lived.

"One of the things that day showed me, and opened up my eyes to, is that you need to appreciate life," he said. "One of the things I appreciate most is those who gave

the ultimate sacrifice that these men and women behind me did, and that they gave their lives for all of us. We are all here for someone who has died in the past, and I want to thank everybody for coming out."

Ford encouraged those in attendance to show their love for family members, and to also thank those who have served in our armed forces.

"Hug your family members and tell them how much you love them – and if you see anyone in uniform or a veteran of the military, go up to them and shake their hands and tell them how much you appreciate their service," he said.

sandy-blond hair. "Even though they were girls who didn't really have an impact on my life, it still felt like I was an outcast and I never felt like I fit in because of the comments they made."

She moved to Wayne with her family from Iowa, and spent three years in the Wayne Public Schools system before moving on to college. At first, the transition to the new school was exciting for her.

"We moved here the summer before my sophomore year, and I had a chance to get to know some of my classmates and make some friends," she said.

She started out on the JV team, but once she moved up to varsity, some of the girls who were friendly to her at the start had begun calling her a variety of mean-spirited nicknames.

"It kind of made me feel like I wasn't any good at what I was doing," she said. "I've always loved playing sports, but after a while it started becoming something of a mental thing."

"Chelley" would confide in her mother, who had a feeling that something wasn't right.

"I'd come home and she'd ask what was wrong, and I would try to say it was nothing, but she would be persistent and eventually I'd tell her," she said. "Then she got upset and we'd just be upset about it together."

She tried talking with coaches and school administrators about the problem, but it seemed as if they didn't listen to her concerns.

"There were times when I'd meet with my coaches and tell them about what I was dealing with, and they just didn't see it," she said. "They thought I was getting along with everyone, and I tried to explain to them how girls act differently than boys and will do things behind your back."

While she didn't see any physical acts of bullying in the hallways, a lot of what she saw was done verbally.

"Some students will mock people as they walk by, and it's hard to tell sometimes whether it's bullying or just people messing around," she said. "If the teachers don't see anything physical happening, they don't think there's a problem. Sometimes, though, the teasing is worse because it sticks to you."

"Susan" has lived in Wayne all her life, and still remembers the day she was bullied.

"It was in fifth grade," she said. "I had worn some different-looking pants, and some of the kids made fun of me and said my pants were ugly. It can be something as simple as a haircut or the wrong pair of glasses, and a lot of it is behind your back that you don't know about until your friends tell you later."

"Susan said she sees bullies acting out subversively in school all the time, whether it's calling somebody a name or giving them a quick slap on the back."

"Bully" has received national acclaim for its portrayal of a student going to a high school in Sioux City, Iowa, who is constantly threatened and attacked, both physically and verbally, by fellow students. The movie will be coming to the Majestic Theater for a four-night showing, Sept. 6-9, that will be free to the public.

The Stand For The Silent group has been working with community members and school administrators to help bring the movie to Wayne. Donations from local individuals and businesses have helped defray the costs of showing the movie.

After each showing of the movie, a post-movie discussion of the issue of bullying will be held at the theater. Several local individuals will help facilitate the discussion on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, and Sunday's showing will include a visit from Kirk Smalley, an Oklahoma father whose son was bullied to the point that he committed suicide. The Smalley family has been a strong national advocate in the effort to end bullying in communities across the country, and is scheduled to be at the Sunday showing of the movie.

"If you don't confront them about it, you need to tell the teacher, but if the teacher doesn't do anything, then it's kind of up to you," she said. "I told the principal one time about a situation where I was being bullied, and he said he'd bring the kid in so that kid would have to tell me he was sorry, and he never talked to me or the kid (about the incident) after that."

The bullying that "Susan" has seen is frustrating, and she is nervous about what she is going to experience once the school year gets started.

"There are some kids who like to start rumors about people, and I have a sibling that hears about some of the rumors that are said about people," she said. "The bullying needs to stop before something terrible happens."

Building project, Foundation director discussed by board

Comments from the project's architect and a consultant for the general contractor gave members of the Wayne Community Schools' Board of Education assurance that the school buildings will be ready for students when classes resume on Wednesday, Aug. 22.

Both Jon Carlson of Carlson, West, Provondra, the architect for the project, and Ed Cable, who has been hired as a consultant and project manager by Holtze Construction, told the board that the project has moved forward at a rapid pace in recent weeks and following an inspection by the State Fire Marshall's Office this week, the school will be ready for students next week.

Carlson said work in the rooms at the elementary school is nearly complete, with the exception of tile in the hallways and cleaning dust in the renovated kindergarten rooms.

At the high school, crews were to remove equipment from the lower level early this week, and the life safety systems would be tested before the fire marshal's inspection. Several board members expressed concern about the progress

of the project and the amount of time being put forth by the school's maintenance crews, especially Travis Meyer, head of maintenance.

"This project has to be done right. Whatever you (Holtze Construction) don't do, Travis and his staff will have to," said board member Rod Garwood.

Superintendent Mark Lenihan told the board that any hours the school's employees are putting in as part of the project are being documented and will be put against the final payment on the contract.

Board President Carolyn Linster indicated that the board and the district want "quality completion of the project. I believe that when we are done, it will be an exciting place for the students and they will love it."

In other action, the board took steps to move forward with the hiring of an executive director for the Wayne Schools Foundation.

Laura Gamble, who has served as President of the Foundation, thanked the board for creating this position and noted that this hiring, "will make the Foundation more beneficial for the school."

During reports from the administrator's, Wayne High School Principal Mark Hanson told the board that the school will be hosting a foreign exchange student from Turkey this year. She is being sponsored by the Wayne Rotary Club and will be living with Dan and Kyle Rose.

He also noted that the school's supplemental accident insurance will be available to parents online

and save the district from having to print out copies to be handed to each student.

Lenihan updated the board on a number of items, including the future of the property of West Elementary School. He noted he has met with city officials in regard to use of the area for expansion at the Community Activity Center.

Lenihan told the board that the district is in a good position financially, but final numbers on the district's land values are not available yet. He told board members that the district tries to keep the tax levy flat and has been successful in doing so in recent years.

Lenihan told the board that a building dedication ceremony is scheduled for Monday, Aug. 20 at 6 p.m. near the entrance to the junior high portion of the building. A second ceremony will take place following that at the elementary school. Elementary Principal Jill Pickenpaugh told the board that the WEB group plans to serve food at the elementary school in conjunction with the event.

A special presentation entitled "Rachel's Challenge" will be presented to the students on Wednesday, Sept. 5 during the school day and for the community at 7 p.m. that evening.

The board will meet in a special session on Tuesday, Aug. 28 at 7 a.m. The next regularly scheduled meeting will be Monday, Sept. 10 at 5 p.m. at the junior-senior high school.

In the decision regarding Shear's appeal, Ensz said, "In final analysis, this case seems to turn on whose witnesses were more credible. As correctly stated by the hearing officer at the outset of the hearing, the Commission, as a finder of fact, is like a jury. As such, the

Commission observed the witnesses and heard their testimony. The Commission had the responsibility to ascertain the credibility of each witness.

"Evidence supports the findings of the Commission, which gave more weight to Johnson's evidence than (the officers)," Ensz responded

in his decision. "(The) argument that the city presented no credible evidence is without merit."

Attempts to contact attorneys for the City of Wayne, the Civil Service, Shear and Webster regarding the possibility of an appeal to a higher court were not successful at press time.



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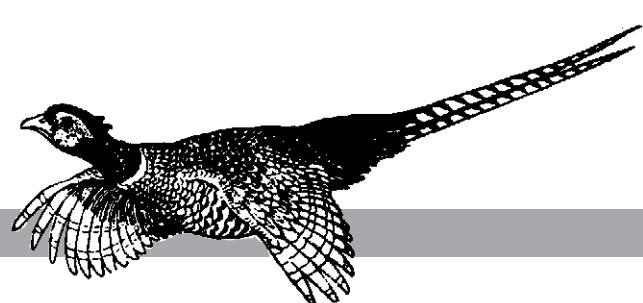

Softball team has holes to fill

Coach likes young Devils' work ethic

When you lose two major elements to an undefeated regular season and a 30-win softball campaign, you might think you're in for what the experts call a rebuilding year.

Certainly, there are some big holes to fill from last year's 31-4 state tournament team at Wayne High School, but 11th year head Rob Sweetland said he likes what he's seeing from this year's squad.

"We're small in numbers, but I really like the girls' work ethic," he said. "They have put in a great summer of working on their game and weightlifting, and I really like where this team is going. We're going to need everybody to contribute."

The Blue Devils lost most of its pitching and several key bats from last year's team that went undefeated in the regular season before losing four of its last five games at districts and state.

Even with those losses, the Blue Devils still have a solid nucleus to build around, with three of four infielders returning in senior first baseman Megan Hoffart, senior second baseman Emily Leeper and junior shortstop Jalyn Zeiss.

The Blue Devils are also solid in the outfield with seniors Hannah Gamble and Sydney Harris returning, and junior catcher Victoria Kranz will be a stabilizing influence for a young pitching staff that will be led by senior McKenna Gibson.

"We've got seven girls that got quite a bit of playing time on varsity (last year), and we didn't wait until now to fill the holes," Sweetland said. "With our winter hitting and the girls getting stronger and getting in the cage, I expect some girls to step right in. Those 3-4-5 hitters we had last year were a big part of our offense, but the girls have stepped up and, from top to bottom, I think our lineup is pretty solid."

In addition to the seven starters, three returning letterwinners are back, including juniors Lauren Gilliland and Kendall Gamble and sophomore Abbie Hix. Gilliland is expected to contribute in the outfield, Hix will see time at third base and Gamble should see time in the pitcher's circle to give Sweetland a 1-2 punch with her and Gibson.

"McKenna had a good summer, and she spots the ball really well and can change speeds and put some spin on the ball," he said. "She's not going to overpower anybody, but I think if she keeps the ball down, she'll have a good defense behind her and she'll pitch well for us."

"Kendall has had to deal with some injuries and is working her

way back to full strength," he added. "If we can get her healthy, it will be a good 1-2 punch where other teams aren't seeing the same thing 3-4 times a game. If we can do that, I think we'll be successful this year."

The Blue Devils move back down to Class C this year after being one of the small fish in a Class B pool that was deep with big-game talent, led by defending champion Omaha Skutt.

While they won't be facing some of the big sharks in that ocean, there will still be plenty of tough teams to battle in Class C this season.

WSC men to make Canadian exhibition trip

Wayne State men's basketball head coach Paul Combs announced Tuesday that the Wildcats will journey north of the border for three games with colleges in Canada over Labor Day weekend.

The Wildcats will play the University of Winnipeg on Saturday, Sept. 1, the University of Manitoba on Sunday, Sept. 2 and will complete the trip with another contest against the University of Winnipeg

on Monday, Sept. 3. This trip allows the Wildcats to have 10 practice days under NCAA rules leading up to the trip.

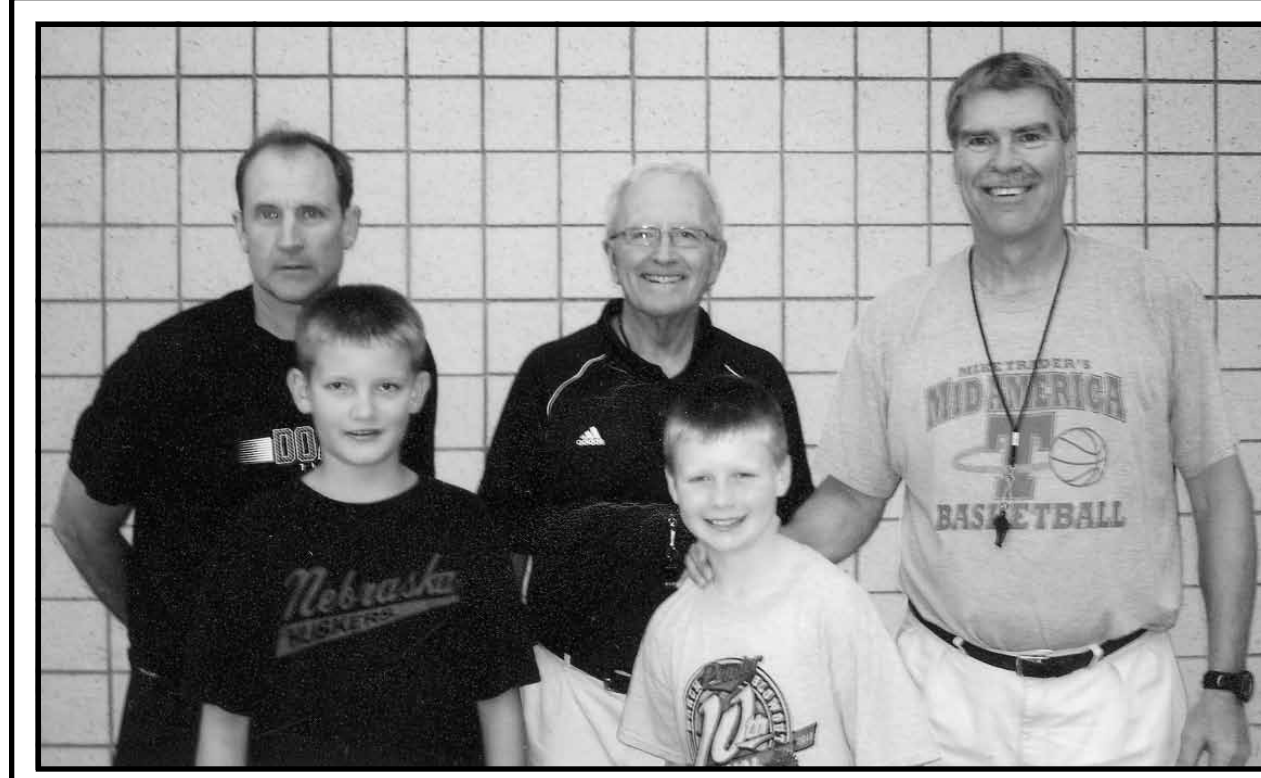
"The 10 practice days are crucial for the development of our team and for us to lay the foundation for the upcoming 2012-13 season," Combs said. "We are grateful for this opportunity and an experience like this will only bring our team closer together on and off the court."

Wayne State College returns four starters from a team that was 10-17 last season, finishing eighth in the Northern Sun Conference with a 9-13 league mark.

WSC picked fourth in coaches poll

Wayne State was picked to finish fourth by Northern Sun Conference coaches as their preseason poll was announced Thursday afternoon.

The Wildcats are behind five-time defending NCAA Div. II national champion Concordia-St. Paul, Minnesota Duluth and Southwest Minnesota State in the coaches poll. The Golden Bears received all but one of the 16 first-place votes, with Southwest Minnesota State getting the other vote.

Following Wayne State in the poll are Minnesota State, Augustana, MSU-Moorhead and Winona State in the top half. Northern State is ninth, followed by Upper Iowa, Minnesota Crookston, St. Cloud State, Bemidji State, Sioux Falls, Mary and Minot State.

Senior right side hitter Melanie Placke was named as Wayne State's player to watch by NSIC coaches. The 6-footer from St. Libory averaged 2.18 kills and 0.65 blocks last season for the Wildcats, starting 23 matches. She was eighth in the NSIC with a .298 hitting percentage and is a two-time NSIC All-Academic selection, helping Wayne State to a 23-8 record and a seventh straight trip to the NCAA Div. II Tournament in 2011.

WSC No. 12 in D-2 poll

The Wayne State volleyball team is ranked No. 12 in the preseason AVCA Div. II coaches poll that was released Tuesday afternoon.

The Wildcats are one of five Northern Sun Conference teams ranked by coaches in the preseason top 25. Five-time defending national champion Concordia-St. Paul leads the list as a unanimous No. 1 selection, with Southwest Minnesota State ranked No. 6, Minnesota Duluth tied for No. 7 and Minnesota State ranked No. 23.

Other Central region teams in the rankings include No. 4 Nebraska-Kearney, No. 5 Central Missouri and No. 7 Washburn. The Central Region holds six of the top eight spots and seven of the top 12 heading into the season.

The Wildcats open the season at the Oredigger Classic in Golden Colo., on Friday, Aug. 31.

Poll: Rural support for Keystone XL

A majority of rural Nebraskans support construction of the Keystone XL Pipeline but want it built on a route that avoids the Sandhills and the Ogallala aquifer, according to the Nebraska Rural Poll.

The 17th annual University of Nebraska-Lincoln poll was sent to 6,350 households in Nebraska's 84 nonmetropolitan counties in March and April. Results are based on 2,323 responses.

The poll included several questions related to recycling, land and natural resource priorities and the controversial Keystone pipeline, slated to be built to transport crude oil from Canada to Texas refineries.

Only 13 percent of respondents said they thought the pipeline should not be built because the environmental risks outweigh the economic benefits. Sixty-one percent disagreed with that position. Sixty-five percent, however, agreed the pipeline should be built along an alternative route that avoids the environmentally sensitive Sandhills and Ogallala aquifer; 15 percent disagreed.

The currently planned route does avoid the Sandhills but it would go through some still-sensitive terrain and over eastern reaches of the Ogallala. Opinions were mixed on who should control the decision to build the pipeline. Forty-six percent of respondents disagreed with the statement that the decision should be between only the landowners and pipeline owners and should not involve the government. Thirty percent agreed with that statement, and almost one-fourth had no opinion.

Seventy-three percent of respondents agreed that if the government ultimately decides the fate of the proposed pipeline, the decision on location within the state should be controlled by state government, not federal government.

"Build it but build it responsibly" is how Brad Lubben, UNL public policy specialist, described rural Nebraskans' take on the pipeline.

And, added rural sociologist Randy Cantrell: "We trust our state government more than our federal government."

Differences among demographic groups were significant in some cases. For example, 22 percent of respondents making less than \$20,000 a year said they believed the pipeline should not be built at all because of environmental concerns, while only 9 percent of those making \$60,000 or more felt that way. That was surprising, Cantrell said, given the jobs the pipeline's construction is expected to bring to Nebraska.

As for age and gender, older respondents were more likely than younger ones to disagree with the statement that the pipeline should not be built at all; the same went for men compared to women. Sixty-eight percent of those 65 and older disagreed with that position, while 44 percent of those 19-29 disagreed. Seventy-two percent of men and 53 percent of women disagreed with that statement.

As for regional differences, 44 percent of Panhandle residents agreed that the decision on the pipeline should have been left to landowners and the pipeline owners, with

no government involvement. Only 27 percent of residents of both the South Central and Northeast regions agreed. At the same time, Panhandle residents were more likely than residents of other regions to agree that the pipeline should not be built at all - 21 percent to just 11 percent in the Southeast.

Concern about where the pipeline is built is tied in part to Nebraskans' appreciation for the importance of land and natural resources, said Cheryl Burkhart-Kreisel, UNL Extension specialist in entrepreneurship and economic development based at the Panhandle Research and Extension Center. The poll asked questions related to what priority rural Nebraskans give to various uses of Nebraska's land or natural resources.

About 65 percent of respondents rated water protection and conservation as a high priority use of land or natural resources, and 55 percent rated production for community/local food systems as a high priority. However, only 27 percent rated recreational activity as a high priority for land or natural resource use, and 38 percent rated production for global food demand as a high priority.

In other findings, 38 percent of rural Nebraskans reported they recycle a lot. About 26 percent said there is no curbside program available where they live and 23 percent say it's too difficult to take materials to a drop-off site.

More than one-half of respondents say their community offers drop-off recycling for the following: plastic bottles, aluminum cans,

newspaper, cardboard/cereal boxes/other paper and plastic bags. At least 20 percent reported their community offers curbside pickup for the following: plastic bottles, other plastic, milk cartons, newspaper and cardboard/cereal boxes/other paper.

Fifteen percent said their community doesn't offer recycling and 14 percent don't know of any drop-off sites.

The Rural Poll is the largest annual poll of rural Nebraskans' perceptions on quality of life and policy issues. This year's response rate was about 37 percent. The margin of error is plus or minus 2 percent.

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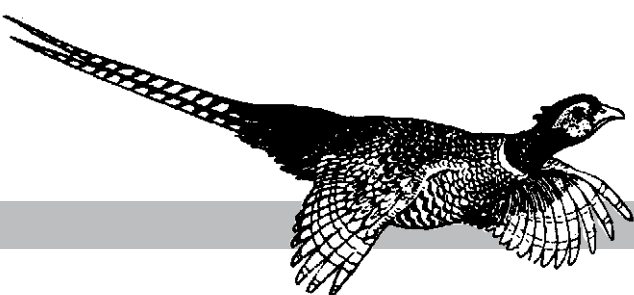

Campaign finance is an issue

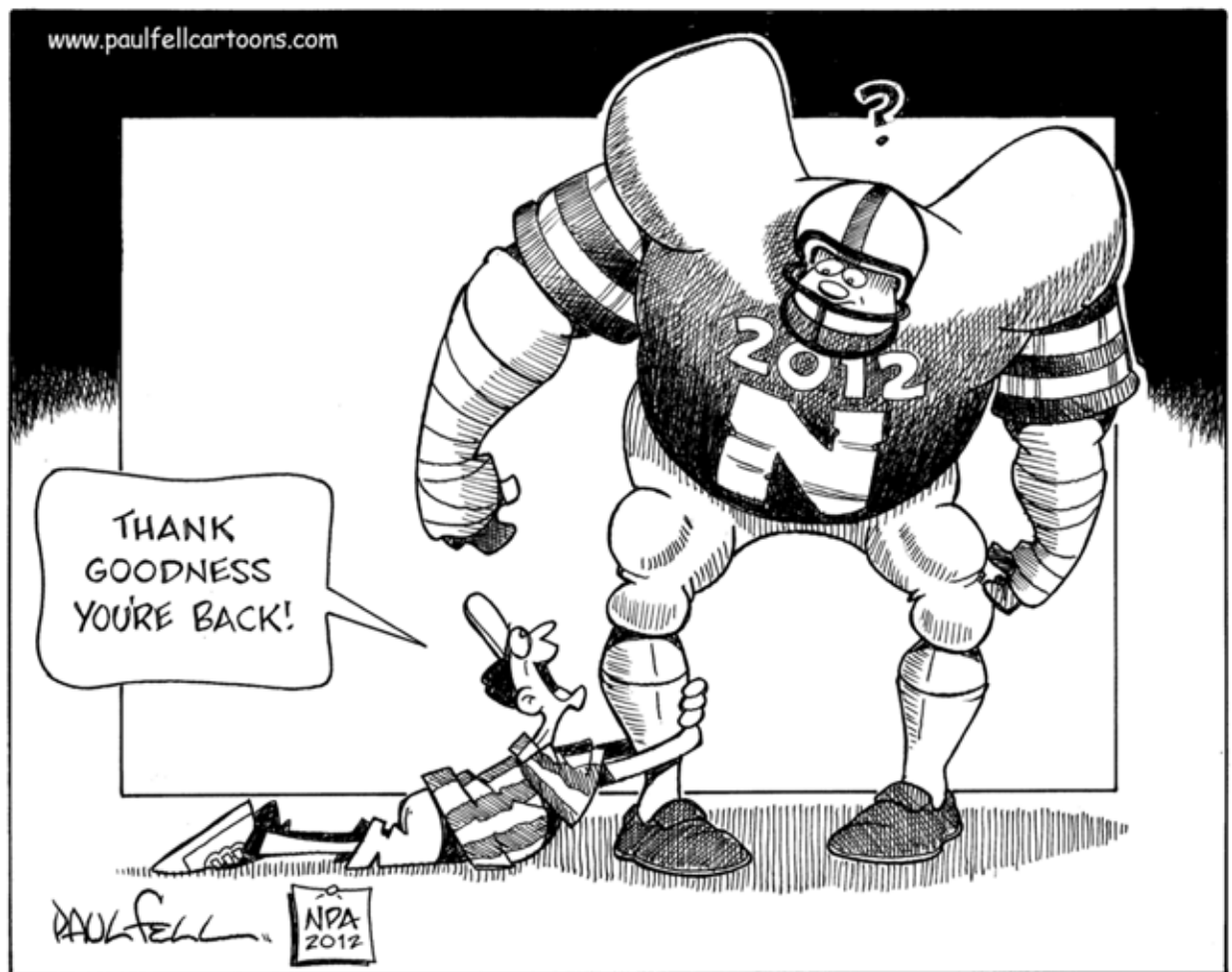
After 20 years of fits and starts, the Nebraska Supreme Court has finally declared the Campaign Finance Limitation Act "unconstitutional." Dead. Finished. Stick a fork in it, it's done.

Recent U.S. Supreme Court rulings on Arizona's campaign finance law apparently forced the hand of Nebraska's Judiciary. Nebraska Accountability and Disclosure Commission Executive Director Frank Daley asked Attorney General Jon Bruning a year ago for an opinion on the constitutionality. The Commission monitors campaign spending. Bruning said it was likely unconstitutional.

Back in 1992, lawmakers decided that candidates should be allowed to decide if they would abide by certain spending caps. That decision would trigger whether or not the candidate who had raised the least amount of campaign cash would be eligible for public funding. The measure also required candidates to report who gives them money and how much they expected to spend.

The U.S. Supreme Court voided only the matching funds portion of the Arizona law, not the validity of using public funds for campaign financing. The Nebraska court struck down the entire law, which includes contribution limits tied to spending limits and penalties for violations. Nebraska Chief Justice Mike Heavican wrote that the Nebraska law does not serve a compelling state interest to justify the burdens placed on a candidate's First Amendment rights.

Somewhere between enactment of the law in 1992 and the August 2012 shelving of the measure, came University of Nebraska Regent



Dave Hergert's 2004 defeat of incumbent Don Blank. The challenger from Scottsbluff spent significantly more than he had estimated on the race and topped limits that should have released funds to Blank. But Hergert missed late reporting deadlines and caused the McCook dentist to miss out on thousands of dollars.

Hergert's admission that he broke the campaign financing laws was only the tip of the iceberg. He was unceremoniously removed from the Board of Regents and later fell into other legal trouble with financing of his multi-state grain handling op-

erations.

Before the recent ruling, it had been widely accepted that the 2012 Session of the Nebraska Legislature would see attempts to gut the current law. Now, proponents such as Lincoln Sen. Bill Avery and Omaha Sen. Scott Lautenbaugh, with support from watchdog group Common Cause Nebraska, will try to create a new law to control campaign money – especially from special interest groups.

Common Cause Executive Director Jack Gould says it appears that running for public office "is now a rich man's game." That, he adds,

is not what was intended by the founding fathers.

Of Note: Lest you think this is a new issue spurred by national interest in recent years, Nebraska's political history indicates that the late Fred Seaton – a longtime newspaper publisher who served in several federal cabinet posts and became President Dwight Eisenhower's Secretary of the Interior (1956-1961) – ran for Nebraska Governor in 1962. He was defeated by incumbent Frank B. Morrison and "became a strong advocate for campaign finance reform in Nebraska." That was 50 years ago.

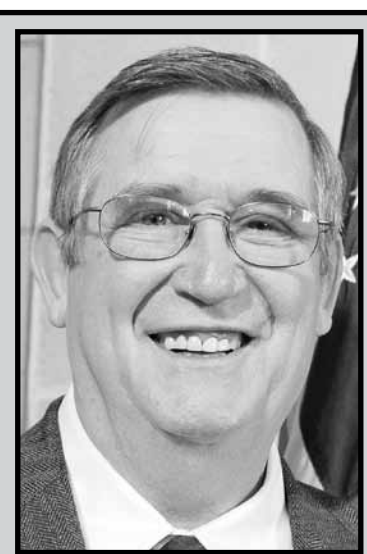
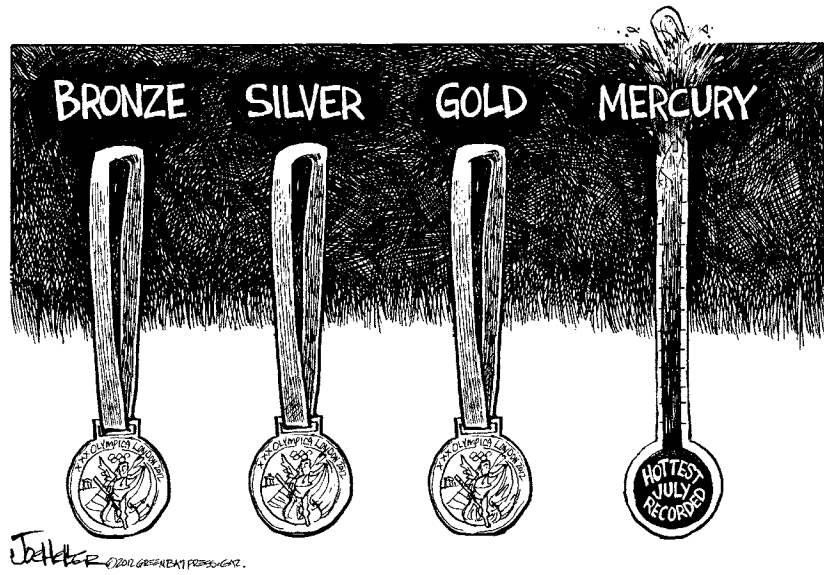
July was hottest ever in contiguous U.S.

It's official, according to NOAA, (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration) July, 2012 has gone down in the books as the hottest month on record for the contiguous U.S. since 1895 when they began keeping records. Dealing with the heat is one thing but the lack of moisture continues to make the situation worse for those of us involved in the agriculture industry.

During the last month, the USDA has taken several steps to provide assistance to those producers most affected by drought. Recently, the Conservation Reserve Program was opened up to allow for emergency grazing and haying, borrower interest rates for emergency loans have

been lowered and they have worked with the crop insurance industry to provide farmers with more flexibility. On Wednesday, Aug. 8, they announced another nearly \$30 million in assistance for those struggling as a result of the drought including the following:

Producers will now be able to modify any Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) contracts they currently have to address the drought by way of allowing grazing, livestock watering and other conservation practices. Rental payments to producers on CRP acres used for emergency grazing and haying were lowered in 2012 from 25 percent to 10 percent.

The Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is going to use \$16 million in funding from the Wildlife Habitat Incentive Program (WHIP) and EQIP to help states with the classifications of exceptional or extreme drought. Unfortunately, Nebraska is one of six states with the most severe drought classification. There are an additional 13 states that are experiencing extreme drought conditions. Look for announcements from the local NRCS offices in regards to special sign-ups for these funds, which enable farmers to apply for selected conservation practices.

\$14 million of unobligated program funds from the USDA's Farm

Service Agency (FSA) are being transferred to the Emergency Conservation Program (ECP). This will assist producers in emergency funding to enable them to rehabilitate farmland damaged, carry out emergency water conservation during periods of severe drought and help to restore livestock fences.

On Wednesday, Secretary of Agriculture Vilsack also designated an additional 44 counties in 12 states (including Nebraska) as primary natural disaster areas due to the drought. Dakota and Thurston counties were two of the 15 Nebraska counties receiving the designation, joining a majority of the counties in the state. This allows qualified farmers in these areas to be eligible for low-interest emergency loans.

If you would like more information about any of these programs you can contact your local NRCS or FSA office. Another great resource is the USDA website, www.usda.gov, as well.

While these and other programs are helpful, there is, in agriculture, no satisfactory substitute for producing a good crop and receiving a fair return on your efforts. As we have watched the promise of spring shrivel and destroyed by the heat and drought of an unrelenting summer, it has become apparent that without wide spread irrigation the returns this fall, throughout Nebraska, would be meager indeed. Unfortunately, as in most things, a few "bad actors" have created problems and bad feelings with unwise and excessive irrigation. This has prompted calls for more regulation and controls over irrigation. This is an issue that is sure to come before your legislators during the next session. It is hard to explain wasted water when the neighbor's domestic well is going dry. There will be no easy answers.

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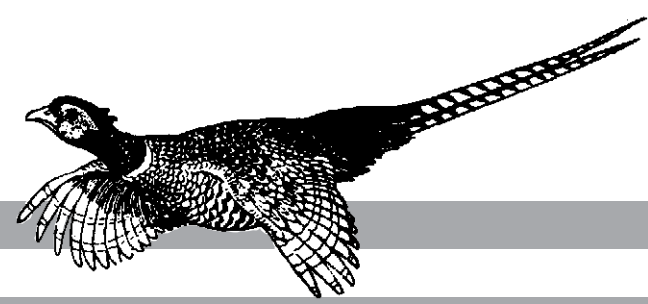

Packing healthy lunches for school

Are you worried about making healthy and delicious packed lunches for kids this school year?

During the school year, many parents will struggle to find healthy foods their children will take to school for lunch. However, shopping smart and trying new ideas can help parents send kids back to school with lunches that are good for them and taste great. Check

out the following tips to help make school lunches nutritious and fun.

Tips for Healthy Packed Lunches

Focus on fruits and veggies. Incorporating fruits and vegetables into lunches can be easy. Packing whole fruits like an apple or a bunch of grapes is easy and delicious. Individual containers of applesauce, pears, peaches, and pineapples also make a tasty treat. Vegetables are another healthy addition to a lunch. Sliced zucchini and cucumbers, red and green pepper strips, broccoli, carrots, celery, and cauliflower are raw vegetables that are easy to pack. Try adding a lowfat salad dressing or hummus as a dip.

Spice up fruit. Spice up fruit by packing dip for them. Low-fat yogurt or pudding is great with strawberries and melons.

Try different fruits with different textures so children do not get bored. Intermix crunchy apples with juicy oranges.

Making fruit salad is a great way to make fruit fun. Mix together sweet fruits like apples, bananas, and pears with acidic fruits like or-



anges and pineapples. Kids can try different fruit combinations, and the acidic juices will help prevent the fruit from turning brown.

Whole grain goodness. Use whole-wheat bread, whole-grain pasta, and brown rice. Whole-grain cereal is also a fun alternative to potato chips for a snack. If children still want chips, pick ones that are whole grain, baked, or possibly both.

Food labels are your friend. When buying canned or individual containers of fruit, make sure it has no added sugar and is packed in its own juice or water. Read labels to make sure products are made with whole grains. Just because bread is brown doesn't mean its whole grain. Check the ingredients list to make sure the first ingredient is brown rice, bulgur, whole-grain corn, whole wheat, oatmeal, whole oats, whole rye, or wild rice. Also check the Nutrition Facts label for the percent Daily Value (%DV) of fiber because foods with more fiber are more likely to be whole grain.

Choose 100 percent juice. Buy juices with little added sugar or sweeteners. Avoid juices that have sugars or caloric sweeteners listed as their first ingredient. Many juices are only 10 or 20 percent juice and contain a lot of unnecessary sugars. Check juice box labels and

try to buy products that are 100 percent juice.

Calcium counts. Make lunches healthier by adding low-fat dairy or calcium-rich foods. About 85-90 percent of adult bone mass is acquired by age 18 in girls and 20 in boys. The best ways to get calcium are dairy products such as milk, yogurt, sliced cheese, cottage cheese, and string cheese as well as calcium fortified foods such as some juices and cereals.

Packing lunches: Insulated, soft-sided lunch boxes or bags are best for keeping food cold, but you can also use metal or plastic lunch boxes and paper bags. If using paper bags, create layers by double bagging to insulate the food.

Beware of cross-contamination: This can happen by reusing paper or plastic bags, food wraps and aluminum foil. Have children discard used food packaging and bags after lunch. Throw away perishable leftovers unless they can be safely chilled immediately after lunch and when they are brought home.

Keep cold foods cold. Use an ice pack, gel pack, or freeze a juice box, bottled water or sandwich. For best quality, do not freeze sandwiches with mayonnaise, lettuce, or tomatoes; add them right before eating. Frozen juice boxes, water, and sandwiches will thaw by lunch.

The following should be kept cold: Meat, fish, poultry, bologna, luncheon meat and hot dogs, milk, soft and hard cheeses, yogurt, cooked vegetables and beans, rice, dressing and gravy, lunch combinations that include luncheon meats with crackers, condiments, and raw fruits and vegetables.

This school year when preparing lunches for kids, remember to focus on variety, check out food labels, and try out different flavors and textures. For more information and resources on food, nutrition, and health topics go to www.food.unl.edu.

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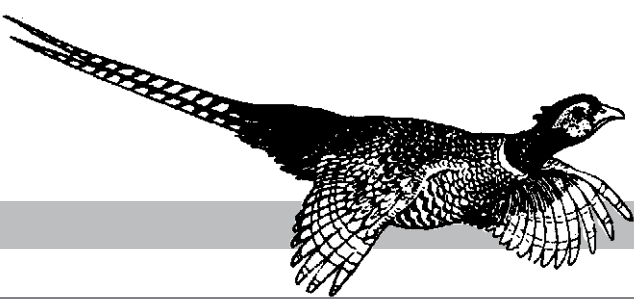
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Commenting on Olympics, weather

We watched a one-hour documentary by Tom Brokaw on London during the war last night. We knew about the air raids, of course, but I had not realized just how devastating they were. All through these two weeks, they have repeated the British slogan during those awful times; Be calm and carry on! Listening to some of them reminded me again of George Bernard Shaw's comment that Britain and America are two countries divided by a common language!

But the motto is a good one: be calm and carry on. Not always easy to do. I asked neighbor/cousin/friend Judeen at Murdock how her farmer husband was tolerating the drought. sure she's correct about that; I was rereading columns from 2002 and 2003 last week, it was dry then, too. But probably not as bad as this year.

I had not thought of surrendering the crop. But it makes sense. At first, you put the seed in the ground

and hope it stays dry until you get everything planted. And, this year, of course, because we had such an unusual winter and spring, everything was in the ground early. Then, you hope for rain.

As time goes on, you say "if we just get an inch this week, we'll be okay." Pretty soon, you know it's hurting, but a couple of inches would rescue it. And the sun keeps shining, the temperatures go up, and the ground cracks.

I've seen all the white corn stalks I want to this year. They are not a pretty sight. The chaplain at Tabitha quoted the Psalmist this week: "O God, you are my God, I seek you, my soul thirsts for you; as in a dry and weary land where there is no water." (Ps. 63) But he adds, "Because your steadfast love is better than life, I will bless you.. for you have been my help and in the shadow of your wings I sing for joy." We need to keep reminding ourselves of that, realizing it was not our crop anyway, and "keep calm and carry on."

Please consider attending this meeting on Aug. 22, starting at 9 a.m. at the Haskell Ag Lab. There is no charge.

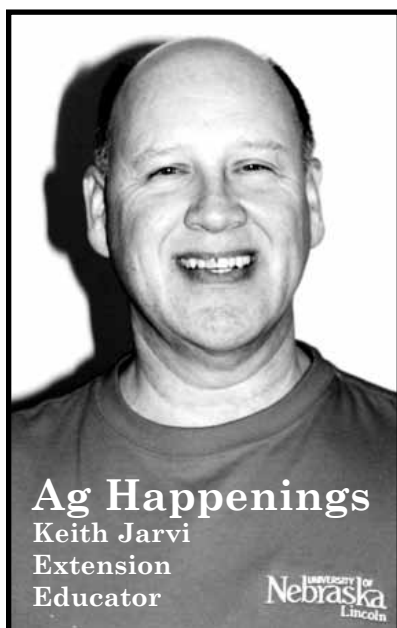
Thanks to Bruce Anderson, UNL Extension Forage Specialist, I have plenty of material to pass on.

Here is some information on potential forage crops after harvest. Be aware of the dates, the decision to plant should be made fairly soon, depending on whether you want to harvest or graze the forage. Remember, if it stays dry, it will be hard to establish anything in dry-land acres.

Most row crop acres will be harvested early this year, and many dryland acres are being harvested for silage or hay. Irrigated crops are maturing early and silage and grain harvest will be two or more weeks earlier than average. This may be an opportunity to double crop for forage production.

Ground left bare may need to be planted to a cover crop to maintain adequate ground cover. Since forage is scarce and values high, a cool season forage crop could be planted to graze or harvest mechanically. What should you plant?

Before planting anything, review your herbicide history. Prior use of contact herbicides like glyphosate won't cause any problems, but some herbicides have a long soil residual effect that could prevent successful establishment of some crops. Double crop choice is likely to be different for rain fed and irrigated condi-

tions. One ton (dry weight) of forage production is likely to use 4-5 inches of water. For rain fed conditions, a crop that will winter kill is preferred in order to accumulate soil water from snow melt and spring rainfall for the next crop.

For irrigated conditions, forage production will be more with a crop that survives winter and is spring harvested, although irrigation for the forage and following crop will likely need to be increased compared with no double cropping.

For fall forage, determine when the forage crop is to be harvested and how it will be used. For fall-harvested hay or silage, oats or other spring cereals will out-yield all other options. Plant about 100 pounds of seed per acre.

Various legumes like hairy vetch, field peas, or winter peas can be added to increase protein concentration a percentage point or two, but they are unlikely to increase dry matter yield; the forage from the cereal alone will meet most cattle protein needs. Also be wary of spending more for the seed than the extra protein might be worth. For grazing this fall and winter, turnips and oats (separately or in a mixture) usually will provide the most feed.

Early planting and emergence

(irrigation or soil moisture must be available immediately) is essential for successful fall forage.

Plantings after Labor Day rarely produce sufficient growth for mechanical harvest in the fall and the amount of fall grazing becomes negligible for plantings made after mid-September. Even earlier planting dates may be needed for sites north of the Platte River. Later plantings should consist of winter cereals. Also, the chances for successful establishment are low unless soil is sufficiently moist to at least an eight-inch depth at time of planting.

For spring forage, the winter cereals rye, triticale, and wheat tend to be the best choices. Rye is your best choice for early spring pasture and produces much growth before being terminated for timely planting of a row crop.

Some rye varieties also provide enough fall growth for some light grazing if planted early enough. Rye also may be the most reliable crop when planted under stressful conditions. Rye has some drawbacks. It turns stemmy and matures much earlier than triticale or wheat, with a loss in feed value and palatability, although this should not be an issue if harvest ends in time for spring planting of a row crop. Also, it should not be used in fields that will be used to grow grain wheat due to potential contamination that could lead to discounts/dockage when wheat grain is sold.

Triticale holds on to its feed value best into late spring. This makes it well suited for hay and silage, or for stretching grazing well into June if grazing begins two or three weeks later than it could begin with rye. Triticale often is more susceptible to winter injury than rye and wheat.

Winter wheat will provide very little grazing for fall. During spring, forage quality and acceptance is very high but forage yield is less than rye and triticale. It can be grazed and then allowed to produce grain if grazing ends when plants begin to joint and elongate.

The 2012 Norfolk Beef Expo — one of the state's premiere 4-H and FFA market beef shows — is slated for Sunday, Sept. 9.

Members of the agri-business council of the Norfolk Area Chamber of Commerce, a sponsor all 63 years, are readying the final details under the direction of chairman Garold Kollmar.

Any member of a Nebraska 4-H club or FFA chapter — who is at least 8 years of age and not older than 19 years of age on Jan. 1, 2012 — is eligible for the 63rd Expo. Each showman may exhibit two market cattle, with a \$25 entry fee per head.

Entry forms must be signed by a University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension educator or FFA adviser and sent to the Norfolk Area Chamber of Commerce office. Entries must be postmarked by Friday, Aug. 31.

Steer and heifer entries will be received only from 3:30-7 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 8.

Judging of the classes, divided by hip height, begins at 9 a.m. on Sept. 9, with the public welcome to attend. The junior, intermediate and senior showmanship classes will follow.

Selection of the grand and reserve champion market heifers and steers begins at approximately 5 p.m., immediately followed by the premium auction. The premium will be on a per-head basis. Each exhibitor is limited to one entry in the premium auction.

As an added educational component for the youths, this year's expo will also include a carcass contest with the entries to be evaluated on both quality grade and yield grade.

Prizes of \$125, \$100 and \$75 will be awarded to the first-, second- and third-place exhibitors, respectively.

The grand and reserve champion steers and heifers are required to be sold and slaughtered.

A fitting competition will be a new activity.

The application deadline for this year's \$500 scholarship, which is sponsored by the agri-business council of the Norfolk Area Chamber of Commerce, is Oct. 15.

Applications will be available at the expo, as well as through the chamber's website.

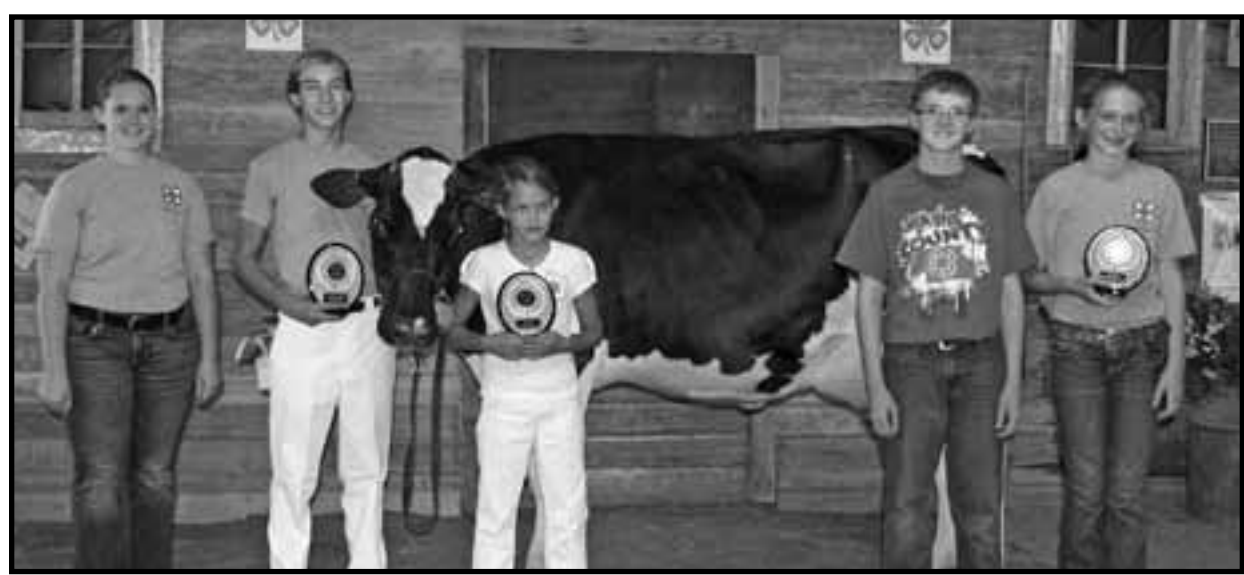

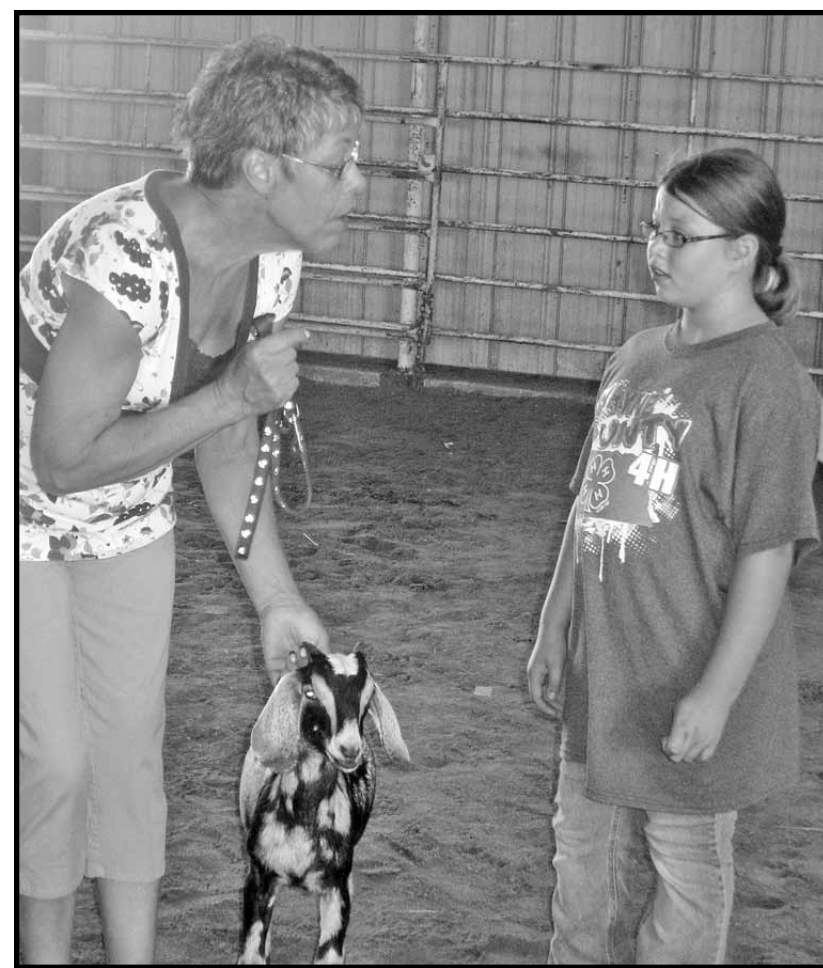

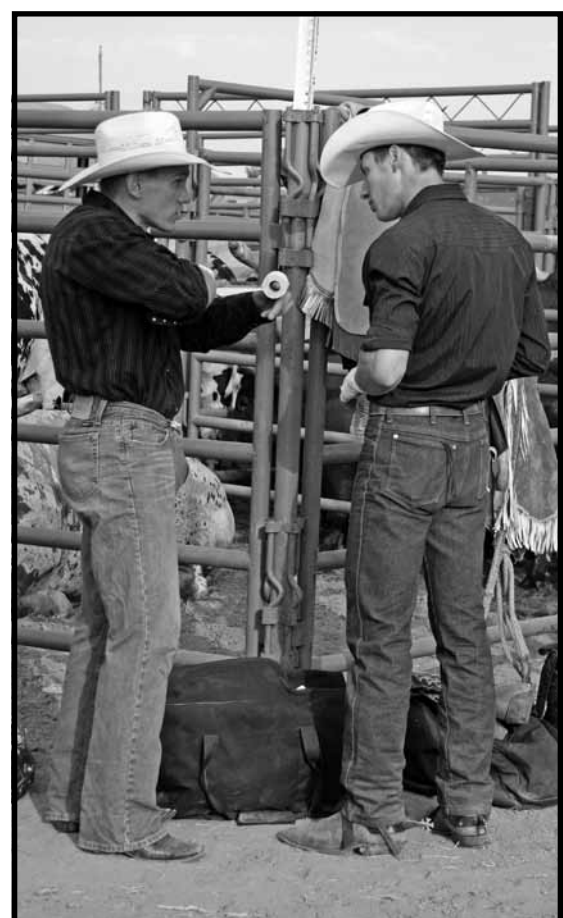
