Artificial turf project in the works at WSC

When the Wayne State Wildcats open the 2013 football and soccer seasons next fall, they will do it on a pair of brand new fields.

Fundraising efforts are being made for more than \$1 million in improvements to the football and soccer complexes on campus that will turn the natural grass football field into an artificial turf facility, while the soccer field will be widened and new bleachers will be installed on the opposite side of the field.

The major part of the project is the changeover from grass to turf at Cunningham Field, which makes up for a little more than half of the \$1 million project cost.

"We haven't gotten the bids in yet, but we're looking to fundraise \$575,000, which would handle the cost of the turf, excavation, sub base and drainage for the field," Wayne State athletic director Mike Powicki said. "We'll have green grass on the football field 12 months out of the year."

Next spring, construction crews will begin removing dirt from the football field, and will move that dirt over to the east side of the soccer field in an effort to widen the field, which currently does not meet NCAA standards.

"Right now, the soccer field is the right length, but is about three yards too narrow, so we'll need to widen that field to make it NCAA regulation size," Powicki said.

In addition, the bleachers that are located behind each team's benches on the west side of the field will be moved to the east side, leaving the team benches and press box on the west side.

Once the dirt is transferred to the soccer field, work will begin on installing the football field's infrastructure, which includes a mix of dirt and rock that will help with drainage. Once that is in place, a combination of silicon sand and crumbed rubber will be laid down, with the field itself completing the process. The project is expected to be ready in time for the Wildcats' Sept. 2, 2013 kickoff against MSU Moorhead.

In addition, the track will undergo some changes with some resurfacing and the installation of devices that will assist in electronic timing for track and field meets at Memorial Stadium.

The changes at the football and soccer complex will provide more flexibility for the school's athletic programs, as well as intramurals and the school's marching band.

"We'll be able to better utilize the field for football practice, band practice, intramurals and other things on campus," Powicki said.

In addition to the work on the field, plans are being made to improve the quality of fencing around Memorial Stadium. The chain link fence is set to be replaced with a black iron fence and stone pillars that will

Seat belt saves WSC student's life

Freshman receives Seatbelt Safety Award

Calla McClenahan is living proof that seat belts save lives.

The 18-year-old Wayne State College freshman from Kearney was on her way home on the morning of Sept. 13 when a malfunction with her car caused it to enter a ditch just over five miles west of Wayne.

According to Nebraska State Patrol Trooper Matt Eischeid, who investigated the accident, the car rolled one and three-fourths times, coming to rest on its side.

The crash shattered the rear window and smashed the roof. However, because McClenahan was wearing her seatbelts, she escaped serious injury and was able to crawl out the rear window and call for help.

"We are so thankful that the call we got after the accident was from Calla, and not law enforcement telling us she was injured or something worse," said her mother, Dee.

Because of the nature of the accident and McClenahan's use of seat belts, Trooper Eischeid nominated her for a Seatbelt Safety Award, which is presented by the Nebraska State Patrol.

improve the look of the facility.

"It will improve the aesthetics of the field and help dress up a main thoroughfare through the campus," Powicki said. "There are some components, that are part of the project, that we want to make sure we do right."

The athletic department has already received a state grant, along with a financial commitment from the college. A fundraising steering committee of school officials and alumni is currently putting together plans to raise the additional funds through gifts and support from other Wayne State athletic alumni, and the athletic department and school's foundation will have more information available on their websites in the coming weeks.

"We've received a state grant that will help out, and we'll do some lead gifts ahead of time," Powicki said. "After the first of the year, we'll roll the project out so that alumni who want to be a part of it will have an opportunity as well."

Once the projects are completed, Powicki said it will be an added op-

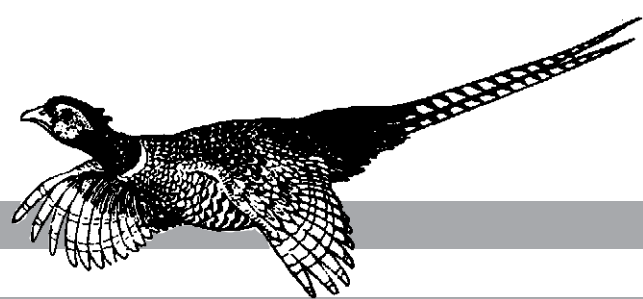

Dual format a plus for wrestling

One of the things I enjoy most about the sport of wrestling is the fact that only one person is ultimately responsible for their success or failure.

In basketball, a team effort is required in order to succeed. Players must work with one another — whether it's setting a screen, making a pass or rebounding a missed shot — to be competitive and successful when the final buzzer sounds.

Wrestling is a different animal — there are no teammates to set a block or make a pass to. You have only one individual to blame if your hand isn't raised at the end of the match, and that is the one you see in the mirror.

At the same time, wrestling is a team sport. The collective individual efforts of each team determine whether or not the team is successful in comparison to other teams. Whether it's in a bracketed tournament format or in a dual situation where one team wrestles another, the individual success helps determine the team's overall success at the end of the day.

After many years of work, proponents of the sport will have the opportunity, beginning this season, to showcase the duals aspect of wrestling as the Nebraska School Activities Association has followed the lead of other wrestling-friendly states such as Iowa and Minnesota in holding a dual tournament championship.

The state dual wrestling tournament will be held in Kearney on Saturday, Feb. 23, one week after completion of the traditional tournament that is held the third week in February in Omaha. Eight teams in each of the four classes will wrestle in an eight-team bracket, with each team wrestling three matches.

The teams that win district titles during the season will automatically qualify for the tournament, while the other four teams will qualify based on a point system that includes total district team points, number of wrestlers competing in district and state qualifiers.

This tournament has been a long time coming because of the uniqueness of the sport.

In the traditional tournament format, wrestlers are committed to a particular weight bracket for the entire tournament. A 132-pounder can't move up to 138 pounds for the semifinals.

But in the dual format, coaches have the flexibility to move people around to take advantage of more favorable lineups. That same 132-pounder may have a better opportunity to win at 138 pounds, so a coach can move up a 126-pounder who might be able to avoid giving up a pin against a tougher wrestler at 132, allowing the 132-pounder to move up and dominate the opposing team's weaker wrestler at 138 pounds.

And in the dual format, the momentum of a match between two teams can change quickly. I've seen teams come back from 20 points or more after an unexpected turn of events, such as a JV kid getting a pin against a quality varsity wrestler. That individual victory might fuel the wrestlers who follow that upset and help the team come from behind to win.

The new dual state tournament will allow wrestlers to compete an extra week during the season, and will give some teams a chance to enhance their schedule with more dual meets that allow them to showcase the entire team, rather than spread the team's wrestling out over the course of an entire day. It's a more fan-friendly format that is easier for the non-wrestling fan to understand and enjoy.

I've been a proponent of the dual state tournament for many years, and am glad to see the NSAA has seen fit to add this to its postseason agenda. It will be fun to see the top teams in the state compete in a dual format.

'Cats have first 5-0 start in 45 years

In 1967, the price of gas was 33 cents a gallon, the average new home cost \$14,250, the Beatles released "Sgt. Peppers Lonely Heart Club Band" — and the Wayne State men's basketball team was 5-0.

The Beatles have long since broken up and the cost of gas and a new home has grown exponentially since then, but for the first time since the year the first Super Bowl was played, the Wildcats are perfect after five games.

On Tuesday, the Wildcats put on a tremendous defensive performance in the second half, holding down a York College team that had averaged 93 points a game to just 26 on their way to an 86-71 win at Rice Auditorium.

Wildcats coach Paul Combs wasn't born the last time Wayne State started the season with five straight wins, but said the good start by his team is a tribute to the perseverance of people like seniors Amry Shelby and Derrell Williams.

"Derrell has been here three years and Amry has been here four, and they've been through some ups and downs and really have come into this season appreciating every opportunity they have, so it's a credit to those kids," Combs said.

For the fifth straight game, the Wildcats shot better than 50 percent from the floor and finished with four players in double figures, thanks in part to a solid defensive effort in the second half that slowed down a fast-paced Panther attack.

It was a back-and-forth affair throughout much of the first half, as the two teams traded leads for much of the first 20 minutes.

Wayne State trailed 15-14 on a 3-point basket by Thadd Varmail, but the Wildcats responded with a Shelby trifecta at the 12:45 mark to take a 17-15 lead, and Wayne State would never trail again.

The Wildcats built a lead of as many as 10 points late in the first half before the Panthers cut that lead in half and trailed 52-45 at intermission.

"I was impressed with how York played with such confidence, and I thought we were prepared for them," Combs said. "We made some adjustments in the second half, and to hold them to 26 points was a credit to these kids. It was a good team win tonight."

Wayne State pulled away coming out of the intermission, scoring the first six points of the second half to lead by 13, 58-45. York College got as close as six points with 8:35 to go, but back-to-back threes by Jordan Holdsworth moved the lead back

to 11 points and the Wildcats were able to maintain that double-digit advantage.

"We challenged Jordan at the half, and he came out and hit a couple of threes on the wing there to give us a lift there," Combs said.

Williams had 21 points and 10 rebounds, and Shelby added 20 to

lead four Wildcats in double figures, while LaTroy Wright added 15 points and six assists and Ryan Rolfzen tossed in 11 points.

The stat of the night, though, had to be the fact Wayne State turned the ball over just seven times.

"That's a credit to our guard play," Combs said. "Ty Bauschek

came out and guarded one of their leading scorers and held him to five points, and he's turned into a complete player and was rock solid the whole night."

On Saturday, Williams notched his second double-double of the season. See START, Page 2B

Fast start helps WSC women to 49th straight home victory

If you got to Rice Auditorium late Sunday afternoon, you may have been shocked when you got your first look at the scoreboard.

The No. 9-ranked Wayne State women's basketball team went on a 10-minute blitzkrieg, outscoring St. Ambrose University 41-3 to start the game on their way to an easy 82-47 win that improved the team's record to 3-0 heading into Northern Sun Conference play and ran their home win streak to 49 games.

The game was over soon after the opening tip, as Wayne State's transition game and defensive play buried the visiting Queen Bees.

Regional a lot like Elite Eight tourney

The NCAA Div. II Elite Eight volleyball tournament won't officially be played until next weekend in Pensacola, Fla.

Wayne State volleyball coach Scott Kneiff make a pretty strong argument, though, that most of the top eight teams in the nation will be deciding who represents the Central Region in the Elite Eight.

Wayne State is making a trip to the regional round for the eighth consecutive year, taking a 22-9 record into Thursday's first-round matchup against top-seeded and five-time defending national champion Concordia-St. Paul at 7:30 p.m. at the Ganglehoff Center in St. Paul, Minn.

Six of the top eight teams in the final AVCA Div. II coaches poll and half of the top 16 are represented in the Central Region's bracket. Four teams from the Northern Sun Conference — Concordia-St. Paul, Southwest Minnesota State, Minnesota Duluth and Wayne State — are joined by MIAA teams from Nebraska-Kearney, Washburn (Kan.), Central Missouri and Truman (Mo.) in the three-day tournament.

It's a tournament setup that, Kneiff believes, will make the Elite Eight almost an anticlimactic event for whoever survives the three-day slugfest in Minnesota.

"You're talking about six of the

top teams in the country, along with the No. 13 and 16 teams in this regional, so I feel like this is the Elite Eight and whoever comes out of this region has a great chance to win a national title," he said.

If the Wildcats want to win it all, they're going to have to start with a first-round upset of the team that has laid claim to the last five national titles, a team that could be conservatively described as loaded.

"They have four All-Americans on the team, so that tells you about what their team is comprised of," he said. "They have two extremely good outside hitters, their middles are very solid and their right-side (hitter) is the best in the game. They also have a setter who is a stud, so they're as solid as you'll find on any level."

The Wildcats, meanwhile, have been a youth-oriented team that has learned on the fly this season and overcome its share of adversity, losing two starters to season-ending injuries and seeing a third leave the team in mid-season.

"We've had some adversity, so to make regionals with this team is something that I'm very proud of," he said. "It's extremely tough to make this regional, but we want to push forward and try to win a national championship. This is a great stepping stone for that group."

While, on paper, it would appear the Wildcats are prohibitive underdogs, Kneiff knows his team will not go quietly against the Golden Bears.

"We know what we're up against, and we're going to go up there and compete and try to execute and play hard," he said. "Concordia's ball

Trojan boys have solid experience

Hobbs also had 18 kills and 20 digs in a 3-1 win over then No. 1-ranked Nebraska-Kearney on Oct. 10.

Wayne girls to rely on defense

Wayne High girls basketball coach Nate Wall thinks his team will surprise some people this season.

Despite the loss of several key players from last year's 16-9 team, the fifth-year head coach feels he has some good talent that will make things interesting for opposing teams this season.

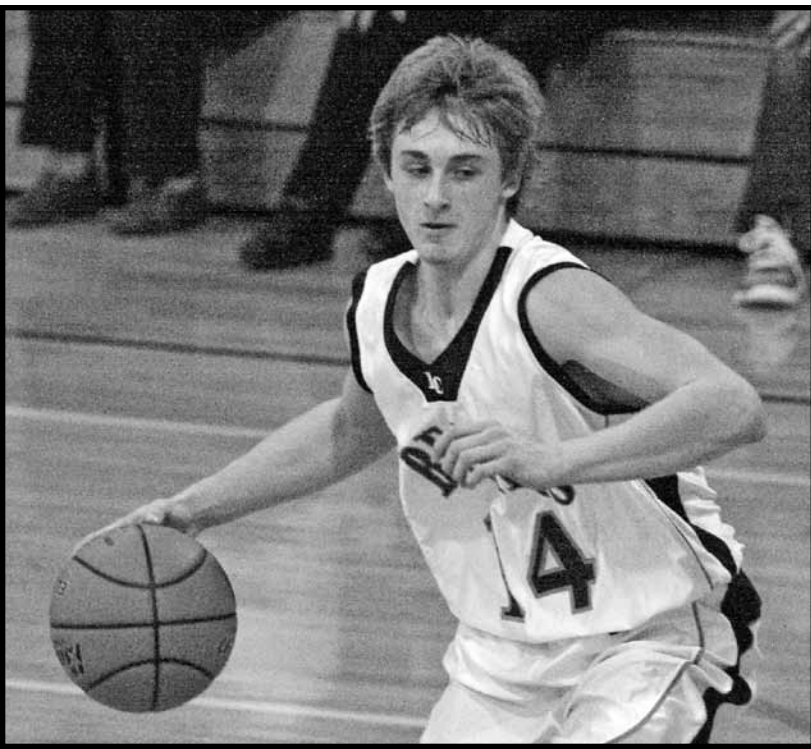

Annual State of the Schools Report explained

Last week, the Nebraska Department of Education released the annual State of the Schools Report and the new Nebraska Performance Accountability System (NePAS). The NePAS is in effect for this year for the first time and provides a great deal of information on school districts in the State of Nebraska regarding the measurement of student performance on results from the Nebraska State Assessments (NeSA). NeSA are statewide tests implemented in the spring of each school year.

There are several areas in which the NePAS ranks school districts. The grade level configurations considered are the elementary grade-level (grades 3-5), the middle school grade-level (grades 6-8), and the high school grade-level, (grades 9-12). A district configuration of grades 3-12 is also considered. The purpose of NePAS is to inform policy makers, school officials, and the public about student performance. There are several areas considered by using "scale scores" from each grade level tested, which are grades 3-8, and 11. The information about the progress of districts is provided by looking at state test scores in categories of "Status" (average scores in reading, writing, science, and math), "Growth" (comparison of scale scores of the same students from one year to the next), and "Improvement" (comparison of scale scores of the same grade from year to year). The NePAS information also includes "Graduation Rates" and "Participation".

A number of rankings are involved in the NePAS to provide

comprehensive information. Factors to be considered when looking at rankings are that they do not account for ties, in other words if 50 districts have the top ranking in the same area, all 50 districts would be ranked #1 with the next or second highest district being ranked #51. While it is easy to look at the rankings to determine success, I caution doing so because there are many factors and differences between individual school districts. The NeSA assessments are one piece of multiple measures we use at Wayne to make sound decisions aimed at improving student learning. What is important is that quality data and the integrity of test implementation give us information on how our students are doing and what areas we need to look at to improve. The Nebraska Department of Education discourages using one piece of data to make a judgment about a school district, just as we would discourage making a grade judgment about a student on one test score.

Our goal and our plan is to focus on several measures of student achievement including NeSA, MAP

testing, AIMSweb testing, ACT scores, attendance, and graduation rates to help assess how we are doing as a district in regards to student achievement, and what areas we need to improve and strengthen. Our teaching and administrative staff has spent most of our in-service time this year, including late start in-service days, to analyze the data and make good, sound instructional decisions that will have a positive impact on student learning. We are also using the data to determine necessary changes in curriculum. Our staff is very dedicated to this process and is committed to doing whatever it takes to help our students attain the highest level of achievement possible, and to show improvement and growth on our test scores.

In January, the school board will host the annual State of the Schools presentation in which the public is invited to attend. At this presentation, patrons will hear more information about NePAS and the state of the school, along with details about what we are doing to prepare for the NeSA assessments this

spring. When a date is finalized, we will make sure it is well publicized and hope to have a good turn-out. From the State of Schools Report for the 2011-2012 school year we have found that our Writing scores and most scores in Math are strong, and we need to continue to look for improvement in Reading and Science. Our cohort graduation rate is very good (93 percent) and our participation rate on the assessments is 100 percent, meaning our district tested every student enrolled last year. Listed below are the grade configuration rankings.

The NeSA assessments are one piece of information that is a very important part of helping us determine student achievement. We are paying very close attention to our scores and are working very hard to improve our results. We also know that there are many other aspects to the education of our students that are a very important part of ensuring well-rounded, productive citizens, and achieving our mission for education at Wayne – "Learning for Life". Thank you for your continued of Wayne Community Schools.

Capitol View

Means catalyst at Wounded Knee

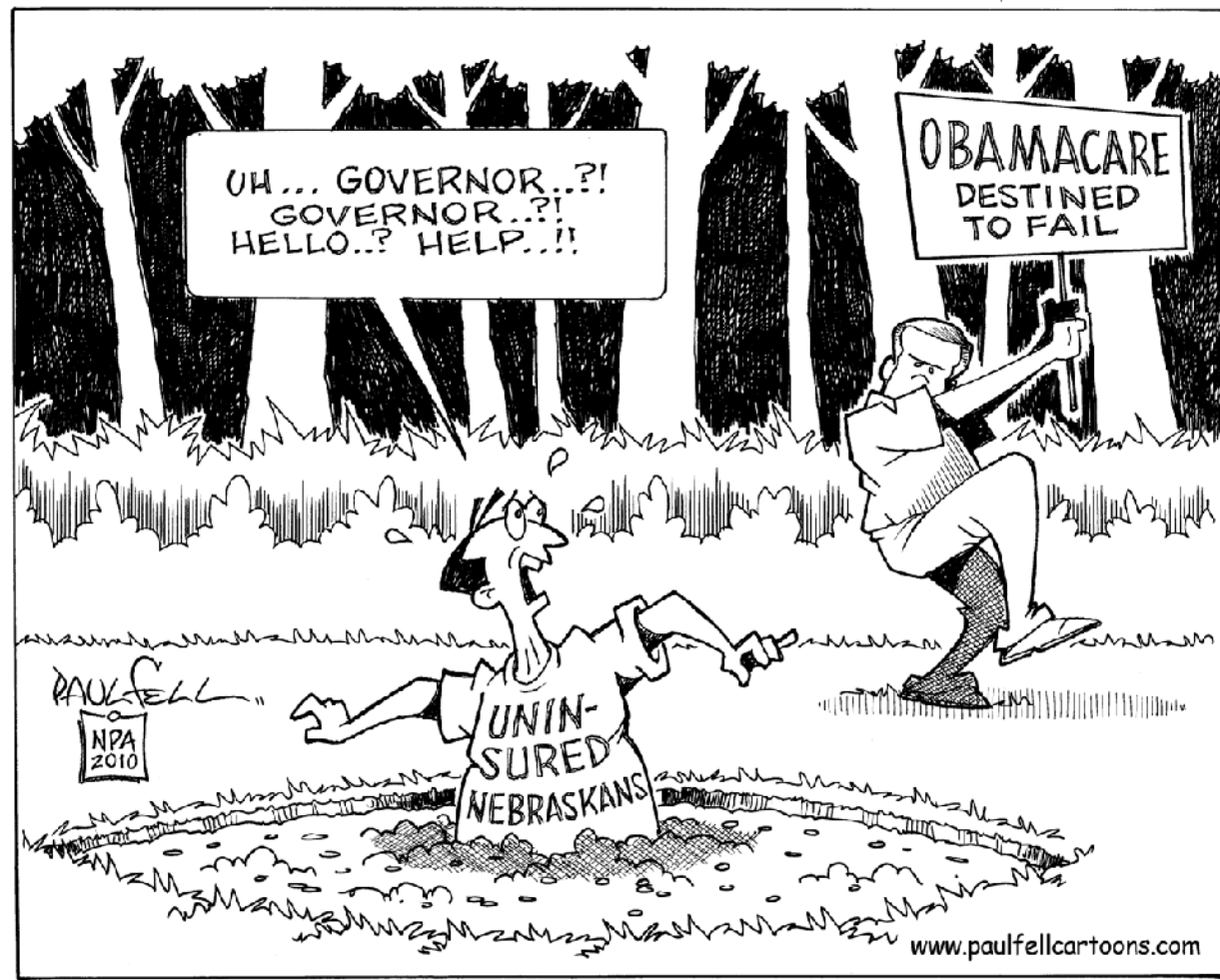

Dogs were treated better than Native Americans in Nebraska towns bordering the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, said American Indian Movement leader and activist Russell Means sometime before the 71-day siege of Wounded Knee that began Feb. 27, 1973, a little more than a month after a Unity Conference held in Scottsbluff.

Means, 72, who died October 22 of complications from throat cancer, had also led a group of 200 Native Americans to Gordon, Nebraska, a year earlier following the death of Raymond Yellow Thunder. The 51-year-old Oglala Sioux had been abducted and beaten by two white men in Gordon and then paraded, half-naked, around an American Legion dance, stuffed into the trunk of a car and later abandoned at a Laundromat. His body was found and police arrested brothers Leslie and Melvin Hare, but released them without bail. AIM's call for justice was heeded and the brothers were tried and convicted and served prison time for the murder.

Throughout 1972, tension mounted with the election of Dick Wilson as President of the Pine Ridge Reservation. Wilson, an outspoken opponent of AIM, hired a private army called the Guardians of the Oglala Nation, or GOONS. The group was linked to beatings, acts of terror and even the death of AIM supporters. A riot on the steps of the Custer County (South Dakota) Court House resulted in several injuries and a lot of property damage.

Following the Scottsbluff event, AIM turned its caravan of some 200 cars toward Pine Ridge with an initial plan of going to town and removing the corrupt Bureau of Indian Affairs officials from office, Means and others said. The movement started on a Sunday night after dark and the Associated Press Bureau in Omaha received a tip that something was going to happen. AP editor, Ed Howard, called me (I was working as a reporter in Scottsbluff) and asked me to confirm the report. I checked with law enforcement in South Dakota who said they had seen movement toward Wounded



Knee, the small hamlet that had been the site of a massacre of some 300 members of Chief Big Foot's party in 1890 at what some incorrectly called the Battle of Wounded Knee.

Moments later I received a telephone call from Leroy Casados in Alliance — one of the attendees at the Scottsbluff Unity Conference — asking me to join him and several others as they drove his van to South Dakota. I declined the offer, but let the AP know that the siege had begun. I opted to head to the area by light of the next day and convinced a pilot friend to fly me and a TV reporter and cameraman to Gordon where we could rent a car for the drive into Wounded Knee on the Bigfoot Trail.

AIM leaders had scrapped the Pine Ridge plans because, as one said later, "they had the place completely fortified and had Federal Marshals and BIA pigs all around it, and sand-bags on top, machine guns, and fortifications all over

the town. So in order to avoid that kind of pitched battle, we decided to come to Wounded Knee, because of its historic significance to our people, naturally, and the fact that it lies right in the heart of the Pine Ridge Reservation."

The trip from Gordon to Wounded Knee was uneventful. When we got to a spot on the Big Foot asphalt where we knew we could see Wounded Knee over the edge of the road, we stopped our car and got out to take pictures. We were confronted by heavily armed federal marshals who told us to leave the area immediately for our own protection. Staring down the barrel of what I later learned was a military assault rifle I complied and returned to Gordon.

Still wanting a look at the hamlet, I asked the fixed base operator at the Gordon Airport to fly me over Wounded Knee in a Piper usually used for aerial tracking and hunting of coyotes. He obliged and I began taking photos with my 35 mm

camera. When I noticed puffs of white smoke, I asked the pilot what they were.

"They're shooting at us," was his unusually calm reply. I don't recall asking who "they" were, and I still don't know if it was the government or the Native Americans doing the shooting. He landed the plane at the Pine Ridge Airport as he noticed bigger aircraft coming from Denver with national TV crews sent to cover the event. He said he wouldn't charge me for my flight if I helped him convince some of the newcomers to take a dangerous and — I'm guessing "costly" — flight over the area. It wasn't hard because I was still shaking when the first taker approached.

The government shut down the airspace about an hour later and I set out to find a telephone to file a story. No cell phones or laptops in those days.

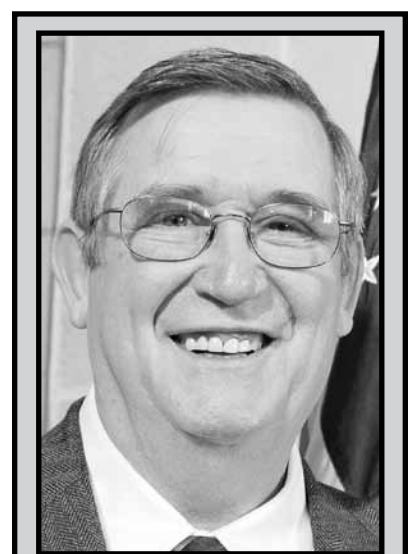
Unclaimed property noted in district

This past week, my office looked into the unclaimed property in Dakota, Thurston and Wayne counties.

Unclaimed property could be a savings account that you forgot about that did not have any activity on it for more than five years, death benefits, money orders, paid-up life

insurance, certificates of deposit, unpaid wages, uncashed checks and the list continues. State Treasurer Don Stenberg keeps track of all of the unclaimed property in the state.

When we inquired about the list for the three counties I represent, we received a document that

was 72 pages long. Most of the individuals on the list have amounts under \$100, but there are some with hundreds and even thousands of

dollars waiting to be claimed. My office sent an e-mail including the list to the county clerks, and we mailed a copy to the town and village clerks in Wayne and Thurston counties. The list for Dakota county was so large that we decided not to mail it out.

Finding out if you have unclaimed property out there waiting to be claimed is a very easy process. If you go to Treasurer Stenberg's website, www.treasurer.org, and then select the "Unclaimed Property" tab along the top of the page. Next, enter your name or the name of your business and wait for the results. You can also call (877) 572-9688, toll free, if that is more convenient for you. If you are one of the lucky ones on the list, there is a claim form that you will need to fill out and return to Treasurer Stenberg's office.

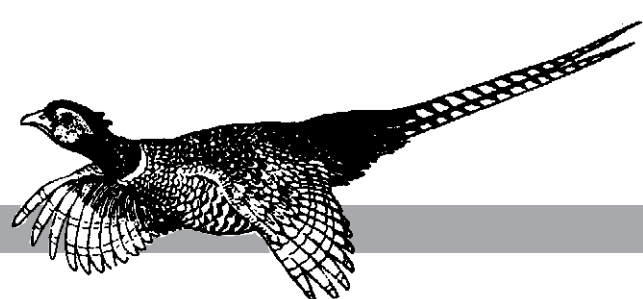

Keep holidays light and bright

of just being an item. Children can make cookies and give them as gifts or draw a picture and put it in a frame for grandma. These are sure ways to save money that may mean more to grandma than a new sweater.

Schedules during the holidays shouldn't be jam-packed with school programs, work parties, family gatherings and neighborhood parties. Too many activities in such a short amount of time can be burdensome on parents, but especially for children. Adults handle increased activity better than children, so it's important for younger families to not cram so much into their schedule.

It's better to miss a neighborhood party than to have cranky children and be frustrated that night and into the next day. Keep children on their regular eating and sleeping habits to level their temper. Limit

the amount of sugar they consume each day and particularly before bedtime since too much sugar will either cause them to be hyper or act out of character. Lack of sleep for children causes them to be irritable which causes the parents to have more stress. It's important for children to get a good amount of sleep.

Finally, keep expectations real. Make a budget for Christmas presents, stick to it and shop early to prevent overspending and panicking because what's on the list is unavailable. Find out what children would like to receive for Christmas, but also help them understand there are limitations, so they may not get everything they ask for. Stop shopping when everything on the list is purchased. Shopping after list items are crossed off enables parents to see things they think their children need when really, they don't. Keeping in the budget for Christmas spending will help lower the stress level for parents.

Members of the Acme Club met Nov. 19 for a no-host lunch and regular meeting at the Senior Center in Wayne with eight members present. It was also Joke Day.

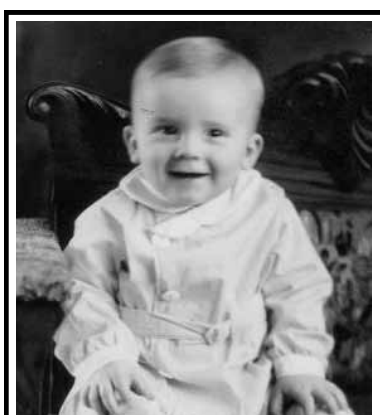

BISPHOSPHONATE THERAPY AND THE ORAL CAVITY

What are bisphosphonates?
Bisphosphonates are a class of drugs that are used to prevent bone loss and weakening. Some of these drugs can be taken by mouth, while others must be given intravenously at a hospital or clinic. **Are there side effects to my mouth from taking these drugs?**
Yes, there is an important but rare side effect you should know about. Less than five years ago, doctors began reporting cases of individuals having difficulty healing after undergoing tooth extraction or other invasive dental procedures, a phenomenon called osteonecrosis of the jaw. The only common factor in these patients was that they were taking bisphosphonate drugs. As a result, most doctors agree that there is an association between osteonecrosis of the jaw and bisphosphonates. **What can I do to avoid this condition if I am taking bisphosphonates?**
You should discuss with your dentist ways to minimize the risk of needing invasive procedures (extractions and oral surgery).

Frequent professional cleanings, attention to home care, and careful observation of any changes in your mouth are a good start. It is best to attempt to preserve teeth, rather than extract them. The best scenario is one where dental work is planned and executed before therapy with bisphosphonates is started. **Should I stop taking my bisphosphonates before dental procedures?**
No. Not without the advice or instruction by your physician. These drugs have been shown to be stored within the bones and slowly released over time. It is believed that, even when not taking the medications, the drugs can persist in the bone. There is no evidence that stopping the medication will reduce the risk of developing osteonecrosis of the jaw.

Farm Bill among issues at Farm Bureau meeting

Delegates to the Nebraska Farm Bureau Federation's annual meeting will discuss and form policy positions on a number of key issues that affect the well-being of Nebraska farm and ranch families.

Delegates will gather Dec. 3-4 at Kearney's Younes Convention Center to establish policy for the organization on state issues and recommend policy on national issues to the American Farm Bureau, which holds its national meeting in January.

This year's convention theme is "Managing the Winds of Change," a reflection of the challenges and opportunities that exist in agriculture today. "Our annual meeting and policy development process is critical to bringing together the collective voice of our members to help shape the public policies that directly affect their livelihood and ability to raise food for a growing population," said Steve Nelson, Nebraska Farm Bureau president.

Among the key issues for discussion at the convention are management of Nebraska's water resources, tax reform and the farm bill. "Water

is the lifeblood of agriculture in Nebraska and our delegates will consider a number of resolutions that examine the way in which we manage both ground and surface water and the integrated management of both," said Nelson.

Delegates will also consider resolutions targeting tax issues. The Nebraska Legislature will likely have several tax reform proposals before it in January, including measures that examine both income and inheritance taxes.

"We have long believed that property tax relief and reform should be part of any major changes in our state's tax structure and our delegates will further discuss what they would like to see done in that area," said Nelson. "We also have some major tax issues pending in D.C. such as changes in the estate tax and capital gains that will likely be a topic of discussion."

Passage of a new, five-year farm bill will also be a major topic among delegates. With the elections now in the rear-view mirror, farmers and ranchers are hopeful Congress can move forward in crafting a farm bill that provides some certainty to farmers and ranchers on farm and

conservation programs.

Other issues for deliberation by delegates include topics such as the establishment of a state beef checkoff program, agriculture transportation regulations, EPA flyovers of agriculture operations, electrical inspections on farms and ranches and oversight of the use of antibiotics in livestock, among others.

Outside of discussions on agriculture policy, attendees to the annual meeting will have the opportunity to attend a handful of breakout sessions designed to help farm and ranch families address operational needs. Sessions will be held to help attendees with issues surrounding the passage of the farm or ranch from one generation to the next, identifying how farmers and ranchers can tell the story of agriculture to a non-farm audience and gain insight on the impact of the next farm bill on the agriculture economy.

"The Nebraska Farm Bureau Federation was established many years ago to help Nebraska's farm and ranch families deal with challenging issues, while the times and issues may have changed, our mission has not," said Nelson.

Weed Superintendent attends training seminar

Wayne County Weed Superintendent Marlin Schuttler recently attended the Nebraska Weed Control Fall Training Seminar at Central Community College in Hastings.

This was the third opportunity during 2012 to obtain 10 of the required 20 hours of continuing education needed by county weed superintendents statewide. Topics presented on the first day included Off Season Public Contacts, Environmental Rhetoric, NE Department of Energy, Herbicide Overview, Small Acreage Owners Weed Control, Range Management during Drought & Fire, and the NWCA Weed Mapping program.

The second day's topics includ-

ed Digging Deeper, Sericea Lespedeza Update, Knotweed Update, Reports from all 13 Weed Management Areas, County Added Noxious Weeds, Urban Weed Control, an NWCA Open Discussion, and the 2013 Daily Planners were distributed.

As with every NWCA Training, superintendents answered morning and afternoon roll call. Each day ended with an exam that superintendents must complete and pass to obtain the hours needed.

The one remaining opportunity for continuing education hours for 2012 is the Nebraska Association of County Officials Conference in Kearney this December.

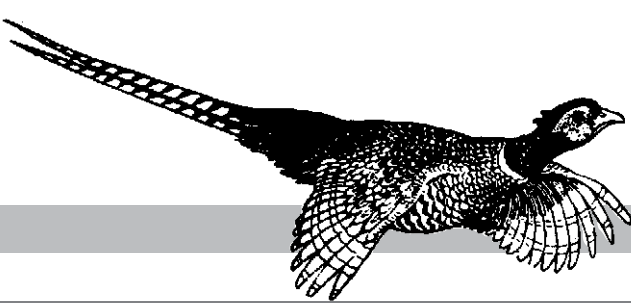

Conference, soil testing discussed

Here is a reminder that the second Annual Tri-State Fruit and Vegetable Growers Symposium will be on Friday, Dec. 7 from 11 a.m.-6 p.m. at Bev's on the River at 1110 Larsen Park Road in Sioux City, Iowa.

Featured speakers include University of Nebraska State Climatologist Al Dutcher talking about Extreme Weather Events, and Martell, Nebraska farmer Alex McKiernan giving a presentation on his Community Supported Agriculture operation.

Participants can choose from a variety of fruit/vegetable production and marketing sessions led by University Extension horticulture specialists and experienced local growers. Topics include plasticulture, irrigation scheduling and fertigation of vegetables, soil nutrient management in high tunnel greenhouses, frost protection for fruit crops, harvesting wine grapes, and planning for orchard success.

There is a \$35 registration fee for the symposium before Nov. 30. The fee will be \$40 at the door. The symposium is planned in partnership with University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension, Iowa State University (ISU) Extension and Outreach, and South Dakota State University Extension. Expect soil nutrient values - particularly residual nitrate - to be more variable this fall than in recent years from field to field, and within fields. The only way to know the availability of soil nutrients is to soil test. Fertilizer costs can

easily exceed \$100 per acre for irrigated corn. Nitrogen prices currently range from about \$0.50 to \$0.70/lb N, depending on the fertilizer source. Phosphorus prices range from \$0.45 to \$0.80/lb P205, depending on P source and the price of N fertilizer. Thus, an irrigated corn field requiring 180 lb N/acre at \$0.60/lb, and 60 lb P205 at \$0.60/lb, will have a fertilizer cost of \$148/acre.

Making accurate estimates of profitable fertilizer rates for next year will require accurate soil test information. Guidelines for soil testing are available in two Extension publications - Guidelines for Soil Sampling (G1740) and Soil Sampling for Precision Agriculture (EC154).

Here is some nutrient testing information from UNL's Soil Science Team. While there is still time for soil sampling this fall, consider sampling next spring instead. Dry conditions this fall may make sampling difficult, and spring sampling may result in a more accurate prediction of nitrate-N availability, depending on weather conditions

this winter. Nebraska is fortunate to have several good analytical labs where growers can have soil samples tested. Contact your extension office for information about Nebraska soil testing labs on current pricing and how to ship samples.

For very low-yielding, rainfed corn fields, expect residual nitrate levels to be high. This will primarily be from unused fertilizer nitrogen. Soil mineralization of N will have been quite low in rainfed fields due to low moisture. Limited crop N removal and little or no leaching means that unused fertilizer N remains in the soil. Unless we have an unusually wet winter and spring, this nitrate-N will be mostly available for crop use next year. The only way to accurately account for residual nitrate-N is through deep sampling, to a depth of at least two feet; this may be difficult until soil moisture is restored. Unusually high residual nitrate levels following soybean harvest are not likely as soybean typically depletes soil nitrate-N to reduce energy needed for biological N fixation.

For irrigated fields with yields close to normal, expect little impact from drought on soil test levels of phosphorus (P), potassium (K), and other nutrients. For dryland fields, crop uptake of these nutrients will be less than normal. However, this may have little impact on soil test levels for P, K, and other nutrients. There may be some tendency toward higher soil test values, but soil tests for these nutrients are an estimate of plant availability over the growing season. There is evidence that soil test K can be influenced by soil drying, and some states have started analyzing soil K from field moist samples. However, most Nebraska soils are quite high in potassium, and thus slight differences in soil test K that can occur with the analytical process have no impact on the fertilizer recommendation.
