# Council approves **TIF funds**

Will assist in move to new building for Dollar General

The Wayne City Council reconsidered a decision made last month during Tuesday's meeting.

Acting as the Community Development Agency, council members revisited the issue of allowing for the use of TIF funds for the construction of the infrastructure on a portion of Milo Drive just north of Highway 35 in the Western Ridge III subdivision.

Steve Meyer and Brent Pick, owners of the property, were not notified that the item was to be discussed at the last meeting, when the request was denied, and requested that additional discussion be held on the proposal.

Both Meyer and Pick told the council that Tipton Holdings, the firm that will be building a \$1 million building on the property, does not want to be involved with the project and intends to sell the building to an investment firm. Therefore, they do not want to handle assessments to the property and asked the current owners to seek TIF financing for the project.

The building will allow for the relocation of Dollar General from its current location to west Highway 35.

Matt Ley, representing the Wayne Main Street/Revitalize Wayne group, spoke in opposition of allowing TIF funds for the project, spoke to the council and noted that, since the last meeting, he has learned more about the process and while he had no problem with the relocation of Dollar General, he had an issue with tax dollars being used to move a business out of downtown. He said that when roads are developed in other areas of the city, the costs are assessed to the property owners B.J. Woehler and Lou Benscoter both spoke in favor of allowing for the use of TIF funds for the project. Woehler said there is a "huge cost to get utilities under the highway" and while he has questioned the use of these funds in the past, he felt it was appropriate to extend the funds to this project. Benscoter said he has used TIF funds and the current property owners are "taking a huge chance on the project." He said the project is a stepping stone for the community because "bringing more businesses to town will bring more people to town."

The Wayne County trailer has been equipped by surplus equipment from neighboring counties, enabling it to be staffed during disasters and assist the towns and villages in Wayne County to manage the incidents at hand. The trailer is also on call for disasters that strike neighboring towns and counties in the state of Nebraska.

The Wayne State College communications trailer was developed to meet the needs of data preservation, personnel notifications, public and parental notifications and communications that are necessary for the college in the event that the main data and phone systems become inoperable during an emergency, as well.

It was learned through interlocal cooperation that Wayne County and Wayne State College had similar needs during a disaster, so the two groups began working together to be able to deploy at the same time to a scene to learn the effects that disasters and events have on an incident command structure. The goal is to have efficient and effective recovery take place.

For the last several years, the two separate trailer units have worked together on actual recovery deployments and for staged events that bring about further testing of their capabilities.

Congressman Smith learned of the training and experience of the Northeast Nebraska Emergency Management Support Group that will deploy with Wayne State College Emergency Communications Support Team.

Following considerable discussion, the CDA voted 6-0, with council member Kaki Ley abstaining, to allow for the use of the funds for the project.

Council members also heard an update from the Wayne State College Rugby Club on the status of the club, the maintenance of the rugby fields and a Summer 7 Tournament planned for July 27 in Wayne.

It was noted that the group is having difficulties keeping up with mowing of the fields and would appreciate any assistance the city was willing to provide. Don Larsen, representing Northeast Nebraska Public Power District (Ne-NPPD), spoke to the council on plans to seek proposals for alternative power sources. The plans were developed after Nebraska Public Power requested that all its wholesale customers enter into 25-year contracts to assist with the funding of power plant upgrades.

Larsen told the council that NeNPPD "feels a responsibility to its customers to see what other options are available for the purchase of electricity." He also said that the more entities working together on a request for proposals, the better the chance of obtaining a favorable rate for the purchase of the electricity.

Following the presentation, the council voted in favor of joining NeNPPD in the request.

Approval was given for city staff to negotiate the purchase of 40 feet of property east of McDonalds for the purpose of relocating the current walking trail.

The move would allow a potential buy-

# **County residents air concerns** about bridge closings in district

Kris Loberg and her son, David, questioned the status of bridge construction and road improvements in their area, which has had an impact on their farming operation. Six bridges in their area were closed right before the harvest season last fall, and bridge construction in that area has not started on any of the closed bridges, causing them to have to travel several miles out of their way to get to their property.

The Lobergs noted that, with the closing of those bridges, traffic has been diverted to other roads, which is also putting stress on those bridges.

District 2 Commissioner Dean Burbach, who represents the area under discussion, said he had been assured by engineers working on the bridges that construction projects would be ready to go ear-

This year's Hero of Hope for the Wayne County Relay For Life received funds from a mud volleyball tournament in her honor five years ago.

Since that time, Karla (Keller) Leriger has been heavily involved in raising funds to help others in similar situations.

Karla was diagnosed on Jan. 22, 2008 with Invasive Carcinoma Breast Cancer.

"I had a bilateral mastectomy and had eight rounds of chemotherapy. Because all three tumors were triple positive, meaning the cancer thrived on estrogen, progesterone and Her2, I had to be on a drug called Herceptin for another year that was administered through my port. I also had to start an oral drug called Tamoxifen at that time and be on it for five more years," she said.


She excitedly noted that it has been exactly five years, and she was actually able to get off that medication just a couple weeks ago.



# **Eleven District 1 residents** apply for Commissioner seat

When a special committee meets today (Thursday) to take a look at applications for the now-empty District 1 County Commissioner seat, they are going to be busy.

A total of 11 applications have been received to serve out the term of Kelvin Wurdeman, who was recalled by voters in a May 14 special election. The individual selected will be the District 1 representative through December of 2014, and if they decide to run for a full term on the seat, would have to make their intentions known by the Feb. 28, 2014 incumbent filing deadline.

The three-member panel, consisting of County Attorney Mike Pieper, County Treasurer Karen McDonald, and County Clerk Deb Finn, was scheduled to meet Thursday at 9 a.m. in the county commissioner's office to work through the process of filling the seat with one of the applicants. A list of the applicants was not made available and will likely be announced at Thursday's meeting.

The committee will appoint a chairman, discuss the process for filling the vacancy, determine the interview process, review applications received and schedule interviews. A new commissioner is expected to be in place by sometime in early July.

# Wind energy incentive bill gets **OK, aides Dixon County project**

LINCOLN – Senators gave final approval last week to a bill aimed at attracting wind energy developers to Nebraska.

LB104, introduced by Sen. Steve Lathrop of Omaha, gives sales tax refunds to renewable energy companies that build projects in the state. The bill passed May 29 on a vote of 38-2.

Nebraska ranks fourth in the nation in wind potential, according to the American Wind Energy Association, but lags behind neighboring states like Iowa in ment that would require developers to use some Newind energy development. Lathrop's bill creates a new tier under the Nebraska Advantage Act – which provides tax incentives for economic development – for electricity generation from wind, solar, geothermal, hydroelectric and biomass. It was drafted to secure the construction of a 100-200 megawatt wind farm in Dixon County by Kansas-based wind energy developer TradeWind.

the project should LB104 become law.

Most of the energy from the TradeWind project would be exported to other states.

The project would generate significant economic benefits for Dixon County and the state as a whole through property taxes and rent payments to landowners, Lathrop said.

Critics of the bill argue that it doesn't do enough to ensure the economic benefits if these wind projects remain in Nebraska.

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

# 18-under **Devils look** impressive

Things I thought about while thinking of things to think about (I think):

- I was very impressed with the play of the Wayne Dirt Devils 18-under softball team during last weekend's Dirt Devil Classic.

I was, however, a little confused. It was almost like a Wavne High alumni team that was out there last weekend at Wayne State College. Four of the starters who competed this past weekend are 2012 graduates, but they remain eligible to play at the 18-under level because their birthdays fall before the cutoff point set up by the state softball organization.

It's a good thing the "old ladies" on the team - Cassy Miller, Caitlin Fehringer, Kristin Carroll and Scribner-Snyder graduate Shelby Wobken - were around, too. Four or five of the players who would normally be in the lineup were on a school field trip in Washington, D.C., so it was up to the "grizzled veterans" to put on the Dirt Devil red-and-black.

Joining the Wildcat program are transfers Jared Bartling of Sioux Falls, S.D.; Akeem Morissaint from Delray Beach, Fla.; David Andersen of Lester Prairie, Minn.; Jamie Pearson from Belleville, Mich., and high school signings Jaron Denn of Mapleton, Minn.; Kenny Finco of Hartland, Wisc.; and Damjan Sredanovic from Mount Pleasant, Utah. The seven players join Joel Heesch of New Lisbon, Wisc., who signed with the Wildcats during the NCAA early signing period last November.

Bartling is a 6-foot-8, 235-pound center that is transferring from the University of South Dakota and will have one season of eligibility for the Wildcats. He will be reunited with high school teammate and current Wildcat Adol Aluong, who played together at Sioux Falls Roosevelt High School. Bartling appeared in 34 games in his three seasons at South Dakota and had a careerhigh 11 rebounds versus Tabor College in his sophomore season. Morissaint is a 5-foot-10, 160pound guard who played the last three seasons at Nebraska-Kearney and will have one year of eligibility for the Wildcats. He has played in 77 games with 28 starts over the last three seasons and averaged 7.5 points per game while making 127 three-pointers. He shares the school-record for 3-pointers made in a game with nine. Andersen is a 6-foot-8, 220-pound center who played the last two seasons at Iowa Central Community College. This past season, he averaged 10.4 points, 6.0 rebounds and 1.1 blocks per game while shooting 52 percent from the field. Pearson is a 6-foot-2, 180-pound guard who comes to Wayne State from Oakland Community College in Michigan and will have three seasons of eligibility with the Wildcats. In his lone season at Oakland

Sredanovic 6-foot-4. is а 200-pound point guard from Wasatch Academy in Mount Pleasant, Utah. The native of Montenegro helped Wasatch Academy, one of the top prep schools in Utah, to a 22-3 record in the 2011-12 season and a fifth-place finish at the state tournament.

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



About 27 million Americans have osteoarthritis (OA), which is the most common type of arthritis in older people.<sup>1,2</sup> Hands and weight-bearing joints such as knees, hips, and lower back often take the biggest hit.<sup>1,2</sup>

You can learn better ways to move to protect your joints. Your doctor may even recommend physical or occupational therapy.<sup>1</sup> If you need a cane, make sure a professional fits it for you. You can also buy a brace or knee sleeve or special devices to help open jars or do other challenging tasks.<sup>2,4</sup> Don't overlook our store's resources.

When pain flares up, it may be tempting to curl up in a ball and try to ignore it. That may be exactly the wrong thing to do. Although rest is important, moving may also help ease your pain. Some types of exercise can relieve stiffness and improve flexibility, while others promote strength or endurance. It may also help to switch to less weight-bearing activities, for example, swimming or cycling instead of running.<sup>4</sup>

If you've put on some extra weight, do your best to lose it. Did you know that with every pound you gain, your knees must handle four more pounds and your hips six more pounds of pressure? And, obesity may add insult to injury. That's because body fat may release chemicals that also cause joint damage.

What else can you do? Heat or cold may help ease the pain of arthritis. And pain medications may be essential as well. Stop by, and I can help you sort out the differences between the types of medications used for arthritis. Some require prescriptions; others do not, such as aspirin, acetaminophen, and ibuprofen.<sup>2,4</sup>

NSAIDs (nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs) can also be effective in treating symptoms. That's because, with arthritis, fluid builds up when the body tries to compensate for lost cartilage. The resulting inflammation can cause pain and warmth around the joint.<sup>3</sup>

In more severe cases, you may need other types of treatment such as injections, splinting, or surgery such as a joint replacement.

As for alternative remedies, recent studies show that acupuncture may bring relief for some people. The oral supplements glucosamine and chondroitin may help with moderate to severe osteoarthritis pain. But studies in the knee show these don't appear to improve cartilage changes.<sup>2</sup> Whatever you do, steer clear of unproven supplements. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has warned the public about certain products marketed as "natural" dietary supplements for conditions such as arthritis. If you're not sure about a certain product, please ask me.<sup>5</sup>

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# **UNL smartphone app tracks temperatures**

A new University of Nebraska-Lincoln smartphone app helps agricultural producers track key temperatures.

The Climate App publishes maps that show recent highs, lows, and soil temperatures. The High Plains Regional Climate Center in UNL's School of Natural Resources released the app to keep agricultural producers aware of the temperature ranges that could affect production timelines.

Ken Hubbard, a regional research climatologist and the coordinator heading the app's development, said that the project aims to inform producers' decision-making.

"We already had maps online," said Hubbard. "But we realized that producers don't really have time to go hunting on their computers for information. So the hope is that the app will go with them on their phones and make their jobs easier."

The Climate App's homepage currently presents five options: "Maximum Temperature (F) yesterday," "Minimum Temperature (F) yesterday," "7 Day Average Soil Temperature (4")," "1 Day Soil Temperature (4")," and "1 Day Precipitation Total." Each option links to a map with a color scale that indicates the corresponding local information.

"The maps are scalable to help people find their location," Hubbard said.

The current map options focus on temperature because the HPRCC wants to help farmers decide whether it is a good time to plant. In the coming months, the app will progress to showcase precipitation information and corn water-use for the previous day. The intention is that this information would help farmers know whether to irrigate.

Sixty-seven weather stations report data to the HPRCC. Using this data, Hubbard and the team at HPRCC create maps that showcase the variations in temperature at a local level.

The Climate App is the latest development in the HPRCC's mission to provide useful information to help producers make decisions

regarding their production time- invaluable feedback as the team lines and procedures. The app automatically imports data from the HPRCC's established system. "The main challenge we faced in

developing the app was getting the right people with the right knowledge together," said Hubbard.

For this reason, the HPRCC partnered with representatives from other groups, including UNL's Information Services, UNL's Agronomy and Horticulture department, and financial sponsors at Kansas State University. Additionally, UNL extension personnel provided

developed prototype apps.

"The developers are on the research side," said Hubbard, "but the extension educators are the ones who talk to people who use the app. They've been providing information about how the app actually gets used."

Those interested in the app can use the phone's browser and enter the URL as hprcc3.unl.edu/Ap. There is no cost for the app. Hubbard and the app's team welcome feedback regarding the Climate App's function and future.

# Sharing memories of brother James

I wish you all could have known my brother. He was two and a half years younger than me, and I have a vague memory of our Mom taking a nap with me during the summer before he was born in December.

I also have a memory of being lifted up by my aunt to gaze at the new baby in the nursery, but being entranced by the nurse who was standing there. I'm pretty sure that was the day I chose my vocation.

James Paul (my dad's name was Paul) did everything early: walking, talking, and generally getting into mischief. Our neighbor, Burton, told me he remembered my mother walking up their driveway with Jim in her arms after he practically cut off his little finger in the pump jack. Burton's mother was a nurse and she cleaned it and bandaged it.

I told him my recollection of that day was the fact that when they got hold of Dad and went to get stitches, he (Dad) fainted when they removed the bandage and he saw the finger. They saved the darned thing, though.

Jim's class in our parochial school had a reputation for being just a little bit more energetic, shall we say. And every Sunday School teacher dreaded having them, except when they got to Burton's mother; she never had a problem. Some people command respect just by being there, and she did that.

He took a gun along to high school and did some hunting on the way, which frequently made him tardy. (Try that today.) Our superintendent would call him into his office, give him demerits or something, and then entertain him with stories about his days in the Navy.

Therefore, it was no wonder he went to see the Navy recruiter the

I still see things I want to send him, sometimes purposely antagonizing him and getting him all stirred up. Because I could always do that, from the time he was about two years old



# UNL offers advice on nitrogen, herbicides

The following is taken from the on-line site UNL CropWatch (cropwatch.unl.edu) an excellent up-todate-source for all kinds of ag information. This article was written by Charles Shapiro, Soil Scientist at the HAL in Concord and Amit Jhala, Extension Weed Management Specialist, Lincoln.

An early May snow followed by frequent rains throughout most of May have significantly delayed corn planting as well early season field operations such as fertilizer and herbicide applications. This year many corn fields in Nebraska were planted before nitrogen or preplant/pre-emergence herbicides had been applied. At this point, urea ammonium nitrate (UAN) is the preferred nitrogen source because it's a liquid that can be applied easily and quickly, and placed more precisely than other nitrogen sources. UAN is a combination of urea and ammonium nitrate and has an N content of 28-32 percent. The safest application method is to knife in UAN between the rows, but broadcast application is possible if the total nitrogen rate is kept to around 60 lb N per acre. An exact "safe" level of nitrogen is difficult to predict since environmental and corn plant conditions at application affect crop response. Early leaf burn on corn usually is not a lasting problem since the growing point is still underground and a very small amount of total



save time and a trip across the field; UAN, can be used as herbicide adhowever, this enhances the foliar activity of herbicides and may result in significant foliar damage to young corn plants.

Several residual herbicides such as Degree Extra, Harness Extra, Keystone, and TripleFlex are labeled for preemergence application in corn with 28 percent UAN as a at two quarts UAN per acre when carrier option. However, it is not recommended that UAN be used as a carrier when Keystone and TripleFlex are being applied postemergence due to the potential corn injury. Several other residual herbicides (Balance Flexx, Bicep II Magnum, Keystone, Lexar, Lumax, and TripleFlex) are labeled for early postemergence application in corn where UAN is not recommended. Postemergence application of these herbicides with UAN as a carrier will result in corn injury. Degree Xtra is one of the few residual herbicides labeled for postemergence applications with UAN as a carrier; however, you should be aware of these aspects:

A few herbicides, such as Python and Resolve DF, allow mixing UAN as a carrier applied after corn emergence; how ever, they cannot be applied with UAN as the total carrier because excessive corn injury may occur.

Early season weed control is imperative to maximize corn yield. Due to wet soil conditions, many corn growers were not able to apply residual herbicides prior to corn emergence: however, several residual herbicides labeled in corn can be applied after corn emergence. Two important factors to consider when addressing weed control with residual herbicides applied after corn emergence are tank mix partner and carrier options.

Applying herbicides and UAN at the same time in a tank mix for restrictions. corn may seem like a good way to

Always check herbicide labels for restrictions on use of UAN as a carrier. If a field needs significant nitrogen application, it is best to apply the nitrogen in a separate application or if possible, through the pivot.






