# 91st Wayne County Fair is under way

An artist's road to success can take some interesting twists and turns.

For Tate Stevens, singing and performing was something of a glorified hobby. As lead singer of the Outlaw Junkies, and later with his own Tate Stevens Band, he toured across the Midwest and released his own independent album in 2008.

Life changed for Stevens in 2012, though, when his family encouraged him to try out for the TV show "The X Factor." When he was declared the winner late last year, he was able to has him traveling all over the country. He will make a stop in Wayne to headline Saturday's concert with Craig Campbell at the Wayne County Fair.

Stevens said he was hesitant about trying out for the TV show.

"My wife and kids were the reason I got on," he said. "I reluctantly auditioned in March and made it all the way through. It was a lot experience."

Born in Japan, Stevens' father came home to Missouri after serving in the armed forces and started up his own band. His son quickly developed an interest in music, and it wasn't long before Tate was making music of his own.

"I started playing drums when I was four years old and eventually moved to bass guitar and now guitar," he said. "It's something I've always been interested in, and I wanted to be like my dad."

The 38-year-old Belton, Mo., native made a name for himself on the TV show, earning the top spot among contestants with his rendition turn his weekend fun into a full-time gig that of two Bon Jovi songs, "Wanted Dead Or Alive" and "Livin' On A Prayer." He also scored high with songs like "From This Moment" by Shania Twain and "If Tomorrow Never Comes" by Garth Brooks, and his rendition of Chris Young's "Tomorrow" helped him win the contest and a \$5 million recording contract.

"I was happy and greatly honored that the country music fans pushed me through a popdriven teenage show. I haven't been a teenager of fun and pretty stressful with not knowing for quite some time," he joked. "I've done this

if you'd survive each week, but it was a great for a long time, and playing music was kind of a hobby, but now with the recognition I've gotten, I'm actually getting to do it for a living and live the dream, so it's awesome.'

> Stevens' debut album hit the No. 4 spot on the Billboard album charts during its first week, and his first single, "Power of a Love Song," has been a hit on country radio this summer. He's been out on the road promoting his new album and thanking the fans who helped him achieve this amazing dream.

> "I'm out on the road thanking the people who put me here and let me do what I do," he said. We're trying to keep the wheels rolling, and the challenge is that people have seen you on TV, but now they need to see you perform and do your thing. We're out there trying to see all the people that got us here, and hopefully, we can make friends and fans everywhere we go.'

> After performing in Salt Lake City, Utah last weekend, Stevens said he was ready to get back on the road this week and perform, with stops in Virginia and Tennessee before his visit to Wayne, America on the docket.

Sales tax receipts for the City of Wayne saw their best July ever, as the city took in \$54.159.37 for sales during the month of May.

The total more than eclipsed the previous top total for July by more than \$5,000, breaking the \$49,032.12 record set last July. It is the eighth time in 10 months this fiscal year that sales tax receipts were better than the same period a year earlier and is also the eight best-ever total for a month since the city began collecting a 1 percent local sales tax in December of

With two months left in fiscal year 2012-13, the city has collected \$516,061.51 and is well ahead of its projected total of just under \$606,000.







For Campbell, there's nothing like kicking back in the recliner and catching up with his two kids.

Campbell had just returned to his home south of Nashville, Tenn., Monday afternoon to spend a few days with his wife, Mindy, and daughters, Preslee and Kinni, before going back on the road this weekend for a series of shows, including the Wayne County Fair, where he'll open up for Tate Stevens Saturday at the Wayne County Fairgrounds.

"They miss me when I'm gone, so it's nice to have them run up and hug my legs and welcome me home," he said during a phone interview Monday. "It's been a busy summer out touring, and I just opened for Alan

Jackson out in Wyoming, so I'm keeping busy. Campbell, 34, is out supporting his second album, "Never Regret," which was released in early May and has climbed into the top 30 on the Billboard Country Album charts. His first single, "Outta My Head," is also

"I had a lot of fun making that first album, and it's always a challenge to write songs and define yourself as a singer and an artist," Campbell said. "Having 'Family Man' peak as high as it did was kind of a big deal for a guy who's never had a song on the radio before."

Campbell describes his sound as a more traditional country sound.

"I feel it's a more traditional sound, which is hard to find on the radio these days, and I take a lot of pride in that," he said. 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

# Cheaters never win in baseball

Cheaters never win, and winners never cheat.

My dad explained this truth to me as a young lad when he caught me cheating in a game of Monopoly. I was reminded of this as I read news earlier this week of the steps Major League Baseball is taking to flush the cheating performance-enhancing drug users out of the game.

Earlier this week, former MVP and Milwaukee Brewers slugger Ryan Braun was given a sit-down for the rest of the season for violating the sport's drug prevention and treatment program. He had beaten the rap last year on a technicality, but with overwhelming evidence countering his lies to the sport's powers that be, he worked out a deal that will keep him out of the game until 2013.

As this column was being written, word had come out that MLB's leaders had even more info on New York Yankees third baseman – and previously-admitted steroid user - Alex Rodriguez than they had on Braun, and reportedly the cheater was working furiously to hammer out a similar deal to avoid a possible lifetime ban.

Professional baseball has had a problem with cheaters using PEDs for a long time now, and only in recent years has its doddering old fool of a commissioner, Bud Selig, made any kind of effort to bring these cockroaches out of the darkness.

We were all fooled into thinking Mark McGwire and Sammy Sosa saved the game of baseball in the late 1990s with their epic, seasonlong version of Home Run Derby. MLB had yet to fully recover from the strike of 1994 that left us without a World Series for the first time in the sport's history, and I'm sure Selig and the fools governing the sport thought it was fine to ignore what was going on in the locker room as long as the two juiced-up hitters kept launching bombs.

A few years later, Barry Bonds and his drug-flooded body assaulted the legitimate all-time home run record of Hank Aaron, and by the time Selig and the clowns leading the sport decided to do something about all the juicing going on, two of the game's most revered all-time marks had been bettered by "athletes" who wouldn't have touched those marks

I have no sympathy for Braun, Rodriguez or any of the other player who cheat baseball fans with their statistics-in-a-bottle method of playing the game. I do, however, feel bad for the kids who try to emulate these superstar athletes. Hank Aaron was one of my favorite players as I was growing up, and I can't imagine the disappointment I would have felt if I'd found out "Hammerin' Hank" was on the juice when he hit 755 home runs (the RE-AL all-time record, in my opinion).

What kind of message do the actions of Braun, Rodriguez, etc., send to our youth? We teach our kids the fundamentals of the game and get them to understand that hard work and discipline are the keys to success at the highest levels – and then have to try to come up with some kind of explanation why some of these players think it's OK to get shot up with performance-enhancing substances that make them bigger, stronger and faster without having to do all the work.

And think about the future of people like Braun, Rodriguez and Co. Rodriguez has already had a cloud of suspicion over him for some time after he admitted using steroids a few years ago. If I were a fan of that particular team and saw they were signing a known cheater like Braun or Rodriguez to a contract, I would seriously question whether or not I would continue to follow that team.

Major League Baseball is finally getting serious about dealing with cheaters who use performance-enhancing substances, and hopefully this sends a message to our children about how to always do things the right way – which is the only way



As abnormal dryness continues to expand eastward, according to the latest U.S. Drought Monitor (droughtmonitor.unl.edu), forecasts are not showing any indication of above or below normal precipitation through October, the state climatologist at the University of Nebraska-

There is no signal of improving conditions, but there is nothing there that signals conditions will get worse either, said Al Dutcher. state climatologist in the university's Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

However, current patterns tend to be replicating some of the patterns the state saw last July and August. Temperatures are forecast to be above normal for the southwest two-thirds of the state and equal chances for the remainder of age yields.

# GOP ticket is filling up fast

Nebraska Republican gubernatorial candidates are signing up for what promises to be a contentious race if the issues play out as expect-

Democrats are salivating as they anticipate a bruised GOP candidate emerging from the primary, something that could give them a shot at a statewide seat they haven't occupied since the two terms of Ben Nelson. Admittedly, a Centrist Democrat could rule the day.

State Sen. Charlie Janssen of Fremont has been the only announced Republican for months. His legislative colleague, Tom Carlson of Holdrege, recently joined the quest. He said he decided to run because former legislative Speaker Mike Flood of Norfolk, long seen as a favorite for the nomination, decided finally to not run. Flood briefly entered then dropped out of the race after his wife was diagnosed with cancer. He recently confirmed he was officially out of the race.

The 71-year-old Carlson was elected to the Legislature in 2006 and re-elected in 2010 and will be term-limited out at the end of next year's session. He is chairman of the Natural Resources Committee and formerly headed the Ag Committee. Janssen, 42, has been in the Legislature since 2008.

The two Republicans were on opposite sides of a controversial measure in 2012, which offered prelow-income women. Carlson supported the bill saying that the un-


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



# Dealing with picky eaters can be stressful

For some parents, nothing can be meals is one way to encourage them more stressful than meal time, especially with picky eaters.

"Parents get really stressed at meal times and one of the best things they can do is just relax," said Cami Wells, University of Nebraska-Lincoln extension educator and author of the guide "Feeding Without the Fuss."

Many children experience neophobia, or aversion to new foods.

Twin studies have shown that 78 percent of neophobia may be genetic and 22 percent may be from environmental factors such as the media and the influences of other children.

Other studies have shown that babies who are breastfed are more likely to try new foods because they have been exposed to a variety of

Parents with children who are crying and I will give you some canpicky eaters should offer a variety of healthy foods, Wells said.

"Be the role model," Wells said. "Enjoy healthy foods yourself."

Wells advises parents to encourage children to eat healthy foods by making mealtimes fun. Cut food into fun shapes and choose colorful meals. Add chopped broccoli and other vegetables.

A child's portions should be smaller and they should use childsize utensils

Some children have an aversion to vegetables because they taste bitter. Offering a low-fat vegetable dip can encourage kids to eat vegetables, Wells said.

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


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# Rhubarb lovers enjoying sweet season

# Heat hard on fair animals

A mild, rainy spring has yielded to heat, humidity and lack of moisture and the state's livestock have begun to suffer the consequences. Heat stress is hard on cattle and

other livestock, especially when combined with high humidity and low wind speeds; those are precisely the conditions occurring in many areas now. Heat stress can reduce feed intake, weight gain, reproductive efficiency and milk production, while increasing susceptibility to diseases. said Hanau. "Producers must also

Signs of heat stress can include animals bunching, seeking shade, and panting, slobbering or excessive salivation, foaming around the mouth, open mouth breathing, lack of coordination and trembling, said Lindsay Chichester of University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension. If such symptoms are observed

handlers should assume the animal is suffering from too much heat and immediately try to minimize the stress to the animal, especially by reducing handling or movement of the animal. Previous health of individual animals is an important risk factor, as animals with past health problems will be more affected by heat stress than animals with no prior health problems. These animals will generally be the first to exhibit signs of heat stress and be the most severely affected.

As county fair season gets under way, Chichester said, there are several things people showing animals should keep in mind, beginning with the heat index commonly reported by media outlets.

If the heat index is above 100 degrees, animals can tolerate it it shade is available and/or wind speed is at least 10 miles per hour, so show animals should be provided shade and/or moving air via fans.

If the index gets above 110 deees, animals will stressed regardless of wind speed. Show animals should be in the shade with fans, especially market ready animals, and have plenty of access to water. If a heat index above 110 is predicted livestock shows should be completed by noon. In addition, livestock that need to be moved or transported should be out of the facilities by early morning but certainly by noon, it possible

If the heat index is above 115 degrees, avoid moving or handling market ready animals. Livestock show rings should be shaded with fans and misters; the show staff should consider postponing the show due to excessive heat.

If the heat index is above 120 degrees, no activity should occur for animals or humans.

During the heat of summer, livestock management musts include providing: shade, ventilation and air flow, clean and cool water, wetting, cool water drench and sprinklers or hoses. Shade can be provided by trees, buildings or other sunshades. In addition, the temperature can be lowered by spraying cool water on the roof and walls of buildings where the animals are being housed. Improved ventilation can be provided by fans or opening windows on a breezy day. Sunshades should be high enough off the ground (10 feet or more) to allow for adequate air movement.

Chichester stressed that if one is wetting cattle, the droplet size should be large enough to wet the skin, not just the air. "A small droplet size will usually just wet the hair creating more humidity for the animal, thus not helping at all."

During times of heat stress, animals should not be subjected to too much activity, including movement or transportation. More information is available

# Be on the lookout for soybean aphids during summer months

We are beginning to get reports of soybean aphids in southwest Minnesota and South Dakota. The numbers are low, but relatively widespread.


We have only had a couple reports of soybeans aphids in Nebraska, again at very low numbers, but now is the time of year we generally start to find them. Start scouting now, as populations can start late and build fast. In 2011 we monitored a soybean field in Dixon County that was almost devoid of aphids on July 22, but by Aug. 18 was over 2000 aphids per plant in areas of the field that were left untreated.

The soybean aphid is soft bodied, light green to pale yellow, less than 1/16th inch long, and has two blacktipped cornicles (cornicles look like tailpipes) on the rear of the abdomen. It has piercing-sucking mouthparts and typically feeds on new tissue on the undersides of leaves near the top of recently colonized soybean plants. Later in the season the aphids can be found on all parts of the plant, feeding primarily on the undersides of leaves, but also on the stems and

Soybean aphid populations can grow to extremely high levels under favorable environmental conditions. Reproduction and development is fastest when temperatures are between 70 through the mid 80's. Aphid numbers can change rapidly (populations can double in 2-3 days).

The aphids do not do well when temperatures are in the 90's, and are reported to begin to die when temperatures reach 95 degrees. When temperatures drop below 48 degrees, development stops.

When populations reach high levels during the summer, winged females are produced that migrate to other soybean fields. Like a number



leafhoppers), these migrants can be caught up in weather patterns, moved great distances, and end up infesting fields far from their origin. These summer migrants are likely the major source of infestations in Nebraska during several of the past

Soybean aphids injure soybeans by removing plant sap with their needlelike mouthparts. Symptoms of soybeans infested by soybean aphid may include yellowed, distorted leaves and stunted plants. A charcoal-colored residue also may be present on the plants. This is sooty mold that grows on the honeydew that aphids excrete. Honeydew by itself makes leaves appear shiny. Soybean plants appear to be most vulnerable to aphid injury during the early reproductive stages. Heavy aphid infestations during these stages can cause reduced pod and seed counts.

We usually find a few in late June of other insect species (e.g. potato late July before we begin to regularly

find aphids, while soybeans are en- observed that many fields support and insecticides require high water canopies or high temperatures. Nebraska aphid populations can aphids (e.g. less than 100 aphids/ reach economically damaging populations in late July, but most reach economically damaging populations in August, while soybeans are in the mid-reproductive stages (R4-R5). In some years there are many fields where the aphid populations peak in late R5 (beginning seed) to early R6 (full seed). Most economically damaging populations occur in the northeast part of the state.

The current recommended economic threshold for late vegetative through R5 stage soybeans is 250 aphids per plant with 80 percent of the plants infested and populations increasing. Depending on economic conditions, this generally gives you about five to seven days to schedule treatment before populations reach economically damaging levels. If populations do not increase during these five to seven days, you may be able to eliminate or delay treatment. Determining if the aphid population is actively increasing requires several visits to the field. Factors favorable for aphid increase are relatively cool temperatures, plant stress (particularly drought), and lack of natural enemies.

There are many insect predators and parasitoids of soybean aphids that can significantly slow or stop soybean aphid population growth, particularly during our hot July weather, like multicolored Asian lady beetles, insidious flower bug, damsel bugs, and lacewings, among

Pyrethroids have a relatively long residual, and work best at temperatures below 90 degrees Fahrenheit. Organophosphates have a fuming action, and may work well in heavy

Spraying flowering soybean poses and coverage, however, only conduct a threat to honey bees. Communicate treatment plans to nearby beekeepers and follow label precautions to minimize honey bee kills. When there is concern about honey bees pyrethroids are the better insecticide choice and spraying late in the day is preferred.

# Nebraska NRCS announces availability of funds for windbreak renovations

The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) has funding available for landowners and operators to restore windbreaks. Funds and technical assistance is currently available from NRCS through their Cooperative Conservation Partnership Incentive program.

Windbreaks are one or more rows of trees or shrubs planted to provide shelter from the wind and to protect soil from erosion. They are commonly planted around the edges of fields on farms. If designed properly, windbreaks around a home can reduce the cost of heating and cooling and save energy. Other benefits include providing habitat for wildlife.

According to Nebraska NRCS Forester Constance Miller, several windbreaks in the state have suffered heavy tree loss, and are in need of renova-

"Windbreaks that were planted to help protect cropland, farmsteads and livestock have suffered heavy tree losses due to dry conditions, disease and age. This program can help landowners reestablish trees and get these windbreaks back to providing protection from the wind and heat in the summer and capturing snow and blocking the cold in the winter," Miller said.

Interested individuals may file an application at any time, but the ranking of applications on hand to receive funding will begin Aug. 14, 2013. The first step is to visit your local NRCS field office and complete an application.

For more than 75 years, the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service has helped agricultural producers with conservation plans. NRCS Conservationists will work with landowners on their farm or ranch to develop a conservation plan based on resource goals. Conservation planning assistance is free and does not require participation in financial programs.







Allemann, Trustees of the Jerry & Lynne Allemann Trust U/T/A \$280 for a temporary easement on .32 acres, and \$4,440 for a permanent easement on .58 acres in the SW 1/4 of Sec 31-T26N-R3E; and Tract 2 Mann Centennial Farm, LLC \$6,970 for a permanent easement on .91 acres and \$1,560 for fencing in the SW ¼ of Sec 31-T26N-R3E, and Craig Evans \$100 for leasehold interest in the SW 1/4 of Sec 31-T26N-R3E. Easement Deeds will be filed upon receipt of payment.

Hansen stated the only way for this project to continue is for the county to approve payment for the temporary and permanent easements.
