## Educating on 'social media' focus of event

Social media websites like Facebook, Twitter and Pinterest have brought a whole new level of communication to our civilized society.

Our youth have fully embraced the new technology and use these sites and others to communicate – sometimes with negative consequences that leave their parents completely in the dark as to what their children are doing on the family's home computer.

The Community Partnership for Youth was organized earlier this year as a local conglomeration of school, religious and leaders in the private and public sector who are seeking to provide safe, healthy and productive experiences for our local youth. One of the first items the group has chosen to take a look at is the

world of social media, and presentations will be made at Wayne High School and the Majestic Theater on Wednesday, Sept. 4.

The community group got its start after school board members Wendy Consoli and Dr. Carolyn Linster attended a state school board conference. While at the conference, they heard a presentation from another community that had started their group as a reaction to some dangerous activities involving youth in their community, and felt a similar community-based group could help youth in the Wayne area as well.

The Community Partnership for Youth group is looking at issues ranging from bullying and diversity to hunger and dealing with tough decisions, and have chosen to educate students and their parents about some of the pitfalls that come with utilizing social media sites on the Internet.

"Kids are so in tune to this technology," Wayne superintendent Mark Lenihan said. "They are natives of things like Facebook and Twitter and Pinterest, whereas we adults have a hard time understanding some of it. What kids need to understand, though, is that once you put something out there on the Internet, it's there forever. We need to help them understand that they need to be responsible about what they're putting out there."

As a policy, Wayne Public Schools does not allow students to access social media sites on the school's computer system, although some sites do see some use in education-related situations.

"We have some teachers who use YouTube videos or items on Pinterest, and a couple have Facebook pages for their class, which are more responsible uses of social media," Lenihan said. "We need to work toward

what is an educational use for social media that is acceptable and help kids understand the difference."

The school has dealt with student-related issues that started on social media sites, and Lenihan said most kids aren't fully aware of the responsibilities that come with posting potential problem comments or photos on the web.

"We have had some issues come up where kids may not be getting along on a social media site, and that carries over into the school day," he said. "I think we're becoming more aware about what is going on, and we need to get parents involved and help them understand that what is going on in social media is affecting what is going on with their kids in school."

Part of that is getting an understanding of how sites

## School board hears about budget, update on building projects

Final budget numbers have not been released and land valuation numbers for the district will not be known until next week, but Wayne Public Schools superintendent Mark Lenihan said the district's budget for the coming year is nearly completed.

Lenihan told the Wayne Community Schools' Board of Education at the Monday meeting that the district is working to increase the cash reserve.

The board also accepted a check for \$1,103 from Kent Franzen of First Nebraska Bank. The money represents the number of students at Wayne Junior-Senior High School who were named to the honor roll during the 2013-14 school year. The funds will be used for technology at the schools.

Barb Matousek with Coventry Health Insurance presented information to the board on health care reform and changes the district could see when the contract for health insurance is renewed next year.

She also noted that the district has been with the same insurance company since 1966 and explained how the fees for the 2013 contract were determined. She told board members that the 14.7 percent increase in premiums was considerably less than some of the other clients she works with.

Board members asked a number of questions in regard to upcoming changes and said the information on health insurance would be valuable when negotiating contracts for the coming years.

Discussion was held during the meeting on a \$90,000 donation to the school from

the Kern family for renovations at the Kern Track. Work on these improvements, including the installation of a pole vault pit, could begin yet this fall.

Dennis Kern, who has contributed money to the track on several occasions, will be in Wayne in early September and board members discussed plans for acknowledging his gift to the school.

Board members also talked about the need for another gym at the junior-senior high school and updated locker rooms. Several members indicated the need to move forward with these plans as "we need to do something now, when interest rates are cheap."

During Monday's meeting, each of the building principals and the director of special education gave updates on the activities in their respective areas. Final preparations have been completed and training of new employees has taken place in anticipation of the beginning of the 2013-2014 school year.

Travis Meyer, head of maintenance, reported on summer activities at the schools, including the installing of security cameras in both buildings and the installation of a climbing wall for use in physical education classes at Wayne Elementary School.

As part of Monday's meeting, board members and administrator took a tour of the elementary school, noting a number of projects that were completed this summer, as well as the changes that took place as the result of the consolidation of the district into two buildings.

The board's next meeting is scheduled for Monday, Sept. 9 at 5 p.m. at the Junior-Senior High School Library.

## Janssen talks taxes during Wayne visit

Wayne State alum and Fremont-based state Sen. Charlie Janssen said he's anxious to hear from taxpayers in the state while taking part in a nine-city tour of Nebraska to discuss tax reform.

The 42-year-old business owner was in Wayne on Tuesday to discuss tax issues and talk about his candidacy for the Republican nomination for Nebraska governor. Most of

the lunchtime meeting, which was attended by about a dozen local residents, focused on concerns with the tax system in Nebraska and what changes need to be made.

Janssen is one of 14 state legislators who make up a tax modernization committee that was formed after Gov. Dave Heineman brought a bill before the Legislature that would eliminate some taxes. Janssen said the governor's proposal amounted to a tax shift that didn't go over well, especially for those with interests in agriculture.

"It didn't go over very well, especially in the ag community," he said. "We had pitchforks and tractors coming down O Street, so we started this committee to go across the state and talk with people about tax codes and what should and shouldn't be changed."

Wayne was the third stop on Janssen's tour, and those in attendance talked about everything from property taxes and fees to online sales and gambling revenue.

"We have to look at every area and what are we getting for our tax dollars," Janssen said. "That's why we're going across to talk with people and look at each area."

Janssen said a lot of what he is hearing from taxpayers has to do with accountability in the state's various departments.

"What I'm hearing mostly is accountabil-

ity," he said. "People want to audit certain agencies to make sure they're doing what they should be doing."

Online sales taxes have gone uncollected in the state for a long time, and while there is an option for taxpayers to self-report online purchases that they make and pay the required sales tax, Janssen said it is rarely utilized.

"I've said that if we captured the (online sales) taxes we should be capturing, we'd be flush with money and could get some tax relief," he said. "The federal government is close to doing something, and you can self-report what you buy online, but it obviously hasn't been a big hit."

Janssen said he would take a look at ex-

## Tax receipts down, still above average

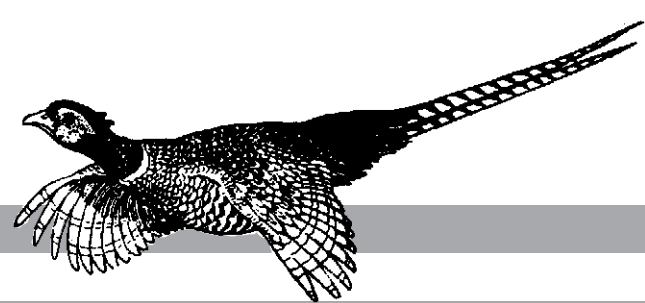
Wayne's city sales tax receipts for August were down by about 10 percent from a year ago, but still keep the city above its average monthly projection for the year.

August's receipts, which are based on June's sales, were \$50,983.45. That's down from last year's August take of \$55,604.12.

The city is still well on pace to surpass last year's overall total. With one month to go in the fiscal year, the city has received \$567,044.96 in local sales tax receipts. The city should surpass last year's record mark of \$593,969.16 when next month's receipts are received by the city.

## Bittersweet end to an era of hairstyling

In a bittersweet situation, Sheryl Anderson is giving up hairstyling and retiring the name of her business, The Headquarters, a business that has been a part of the Wayne community for 37 years.

"I know I have to quit, but it is hard to quit something you love, and I love doing hair," she said.

Anderson, a 1974 graduate of Laurel-Concord High School, attended one year of schooling at Bahners Beauty School in Fremont right after graduation.

"After graduation from beauty school, I came back to Wayne and worked for Jane Lubberstedt, at Jane's Beauty Shop in the trailer court for two years," she said.

In 1977 she decided she would like to have her own shop.

"I did a lot of men's hairstyling, and men did not want to go to a beauty shop. At that time, Monday nights were 'Men's Night' when men came in for cuts, perms, etc. They did not want women coming into the shop then," she said.

Anderson first operated her business out of a house in the 300 Block of Main Street.

"We fixed part of the house up into a shop with two sinks and two chairs for styling. I lived in the back of the shop for several years," she said.

Anderson's business remained in that location for 17 years when the opportunity came to move to what was a former steak house on West

"The building had been in a fire and was completely remodeled. I was able to choose which part of the building I wanted to be in and help with the plans for the area. When I moved to this location, I added tanning beds to the services I provided," she said.

Anderson's family includes two sons, Joel, who is married and lives in Lisbon, Iowa where he is a paramedic, and Justin, who lives in Mechanicsville, Iowa and works at Scheels in Iowa City.

Health issues in recent years have kept Anderson from being able to do what she loves most and forced her to make the decision to sell her business.

"I have had a number of health issues, including being hospitalized for 67 days at one time, that have made me unable to work. On several other occasions, I was homebound for periods of time and have decided that I need to sell the business. My doctors and I have also been struggling to get my diabetes under control," she said.

Through the years Anderson has worked with generations of the same family and befriended many of her sons' friends.

"I am 'Mama' to lots of kids, many of them who still visit me today," she said.

She has also been a listening ear to those who come into her shop with problems that they shared while getting a hair cut or style.

"We learned in school that there are three things we, as stylists, do not talk about - religion, politics and ourselves, unless asked. Through the years of styling hair, many of my clients have provided me with lots of fun memories that I will cherish," she said.

In nearly four decades of hairstyling, Anderson said styles really haven't changed a lot.

"Many of the styles come back in cycles. I remember the Farrah Fawcett bangs, the shag haircut and, for a time, I was famous for the Dorothy Hamill haircut. People would come to Wayne from other towns to get that cut," she said.

Anderson said in her 'retirement' she would like to get back to playing the piano and keyboard and reuniting with friends on Facebook.

"I would like to thank everybody who has come into my life in the past 39 years, for the love you have brought me and for the memories you have provided me," she said.

## For Roberts, Dixon fair was 50 years of enjoyment

The Dixon County Fair recently celebrated its 100th year of existence. For half of that time period, Darlene Roberts of Allen has served as a 4-H leader in the county.

Roberts recently shared some of her memories of her experiences with 4-H and the fair in the last half century.

"Our first 4-H Club was called Hilltoppers Club and started at Beacon Country School for the 1962-63 year," she said. "Our first officers were David Jager, president; Pat Emmons, vice president; Jerome Roberts, news reporter; Buddy Jager, historian; Kendall Loetscher, music leader. The club leaders were myself (Darlene Roberts) and Bernice Loetscher."

"Our club ranged in size from six members to 19 members and was involved in all types of different projects, including baking, animals, gardening, woodworking and electronics," Roberts said.

"I have enjoyed my 50 years of working with 4-Hers and plan to continue working with my grandchildren in their 4-H activities in Cuming County," she added.

# Local outreach finding support in the alley

It might not be the ideal place for a business, but Josh Sievers and his staff of volunteers at Micah's Closet make their location, situated in the back of a wireless retail store and accessible from a back door overlooking the alleyway, work.

"We have people walk in, and they're like, 'I didn't realize this was here,'" Sievers, manager of the shop, said.

The business, started in August 2012 as an outreach of First United Methodist Church across the street, is in the kitchen of the restaurant that used to be at 602 Main Street, its long-gone appliances replaced with racks of clothes and shoes.

Sievers found his way to Micah's Closet in June. He was on the road with his wife Brittany putting on school assemblies when Pastor Peter Phillips called him with news

of a manager position at Micah's Closet.

"I got offered a job," he said. "I

explained that Micah's Closet can make that amount work for them.

Right now, the money the thrift shop makes goes into an account to pay for the various aspects of keeping Micah's Closet up and running. Sievers has hopes that, in the future, the money that is brought in can be used to pay for missions work. Until then, however, the business will continue to help others by offering them affordable goods.

It's one way the store can give back to the area, which has fully embraced it in the year it's been open.

"The community support has been big," Sievers said. "It's pretty cool."

Because of this and the influx of clothes and shoes it's received since last August, Micah's Closet has blossomed from a couple of racks to "plenty of donations."

In addition to those said donations, which can be made during the store's regular business hours of Monday-Saturday, 10 a.m.-6 p.m., Micah's Closet readily accepts the aid of anyone willing to lend a hand.

"We're always open to new volunteers who want to help the community," Sievers said.

They can help run the store or assist with landscaping, replacing ceiling tiles and other maintenance work on the building.

And, of course, there's always the option to purchase something at Micah's Closet, like a pair of shoes, and ship it across the globe to someone who needs it.

In fact, some of Sievers' customers have done just that.

"We've gone international," the thrift shop manager said.

# WSC to offer in-state tuition to S.D. residents

panding gambling in the state, although an initiative was voted down in the early 2000's and the state has seen tens of millions of dollars spent at casinos in Iowa, South Dakota, Colorado and Kansas.

"I don't disagree that we're sending a lot of money across the border," he said. "When I was at Wayne State, a bunch of us would meet at Riley's and take a limo to Sioux City and gamble. It's something that has been part of the discussion when we're talking about what we're losing and is certainly worth looking at again instead of just saying no."

After the meeting, Janssen said a lot of people are concerned about

possible tax shifts that might come as a result of future legislation, something he wants to avoid.

"I don't feel the committee is trending toward tax relief for Nebraskans," he said. "Tax shifts, maybe, but then it comes down to winners and losers and if you shift away from property to sale, then only property tax payers win. I think we have too much of a tax burden on each individual citizen in the state, and we need to look at services and where we spend our money. We can't talk about tax relief until we talk about reducing spending in some areas, and something needs to change."

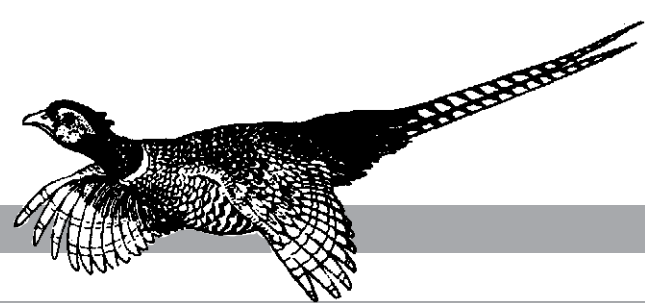

## Wayne softball team has nice problem with pitching trio

Can you feel it?  
It's in the air – summer is in its final days, and fall will soon be upon us. And you know what that means. Yep, that's right – softball.  
Now wait a minute, you're saying – it's fall. Fall means football. What's up with this softball thing? Didn't we wrap that up a month ago?

Well, yes we did – and no, we didn't. Because, you see – here in Wayne, we have two softball seasons. We have the summer season with the Dirt Devils, followed by the Wayne High campaign that kicks in with the start of the school year.

And for a program that has known quite a bit of success and tradition over the past decade, this year may be the most interesting one in recent memory.

It's been 10 years since Wayne won the first of back-to-back state titles, and some of the success of those teams was due to the pitching of Molly Hill, who baffled and frustrated hitters during the Blue Devils' title runs in 2003 and 2004.

The past couple of years, a lot of the pitching duties fell to one person. Cassy Miller's power pitching led the Blue Devils to state in 2011, and last year it was the precision of McKenna Gibson that got Wayne back to Hastings for its ninth state trip in 10 years.

This year, coach Rob Sweetland has a problem that every coach should have – three talented hurlers who are all capable of competing at a high level. There are, however, concerns with the Blue Devils' pitching staff that will make it one of the places Wayne High fans will want to keep a close eye on this fall.

Last year was supposed to be a two-person rotation with Gibson and Kendall Gamble, but Gamble was unable to play because of a rare nerve condition that made it impossible for her to push off the pitcher's rubber. In fact, it was so bad that there were days where walking was an exercise in pain for the senior-to-be.

Gamble has rehabbed through her injury and saw a little time this summer with the 18-under Dirt Devils. If she's back to full strength physically, Wayne has a fantastic senior in the circle who can mix it up well and give the Blue Devils a go-to person at pitcher.

Also in the mix to see time in the circle are a pair of fantastic freshmen in Ashton Gibson and Hannah Belt, both of whom tortured opposing batters during the summer on the Dirt Devils 14-under squad. Both can throw the ball hard and mix up pitches pretty well, and if they can overcome those freshman jitters and adapt to pressure situations, Wayne will have a real three-headed monster in the middle that will make it tough on opposing bats.

With all those question marks in the pitcher's circle, the saving grace might be behind the plate. Victoria Kranz has been a solid backstop at catcher for Wayne the last couple of years. She has handled the fireball

pitching of Miller and the surgical efforts of Gibson, and she's more of a stabilizing influence on defense that will be of great benefit to Gamble, Gibson and Belt during tough situations.

Pitching is only as good as the defense behind them, and Wayne's will have a few question marks mixed in with some solid experience.

Four-year starter Jalyn Zeiss has been a tremendous field general at shortstop, and she'll have some work to do with a young infield. Sophomore Danica Scafefer stepped in for the injured Abbie Hix at third base and performed admirably for a freshman. I'm not sure at this point who will go where, but with Hix back in the lineup, having both gloves on defense will help the transition in the infield be more of a smooth one, with second base the only real question mark.

Wayne's outfield will have some questions. Rachel Gilliland is back in right field, but filling the holes left behind by graduation in left and center will probably be this team's biggest question mark heading into the season.

Offensively, this team has the potential to score a ton of runs. Hix had a huge summer on the 18-under Devils team, leading them in home runs and RBI, and with experienced bats such as Zeiss, Kranz and Gamble in the lineup, there won't be many easy outs in the Blue Devil lineup for opposing pitchers to target.

The only concern I see with this year's team is its schedule. Wayne's schedule has had more than its share of cupcakes over the years. It's difficult for a team of Wayne's caliber to play the kind of quality opposition it needs to see if it wants to do more than make a trip to state every year.

In all honesty, the quality of high school softball in this part of the state leaves a lot to be desired, which is both good and bad for a team like Wayne. They'll put up some good numbers, win a lot of games and are the runaway favorites to win districts and go to state. However, beating the stuffing out of softball cellar-dwellers like Madison or South Sioux City doesn't always translate when the Blue Devils meet up with Wahoo, Milford or some other Class C powerhouse in the state tournament.

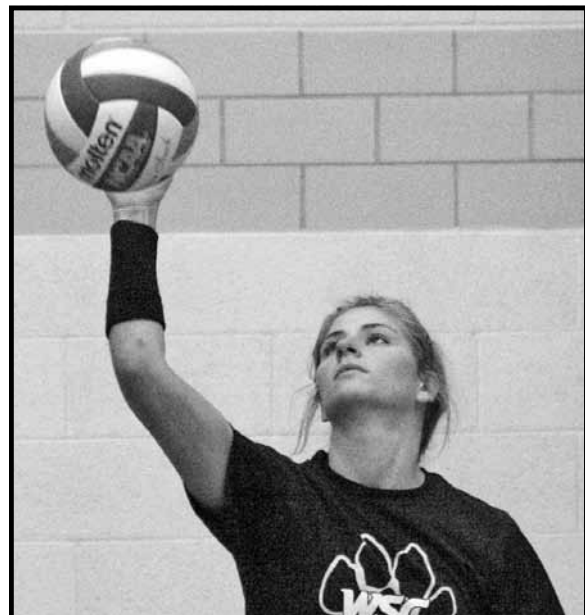

## WSC volleyball picked fourth in NSIC

The Wayne State volleyball team was picked to finish fourth in the 2013 Northern Sun Conference Preseason Volleyball coaches' poll released last week.

Six-time defending NCAA Div. II national champion Concordia-St. Paul was the unanimous selection (coaches cannot vote for their own team) to win the NSIC volleyball title with 15 first place votes. Minnesota Duluth was second in the poll with one first place vote; Southwest Minnesota State ranked third while Wayne State and Augustana rounded out the top five.

Minnesota State and Winona State were tied for sixth, followed by Northern State, MSU Moorhead and Upper Iowa (95) filling out the rest of the top 10. Rounding out the 2013 NSIC Preseason Volleyball Coaches Poll are Minnesota Crookston, Sioux Falls, St. Cloud State, Bemidji State, Minot State and the University of Mary.

Wayne State's player to watch in the NSIC this season is Cori Hobbs, a 6-foot senior outside hitter from Battle Creek. She led Wayne State in kills last season, averaging 3.21 per match to earn All-NSIC Second Team and AVCA All-Central Region honors. Hobbs had 16 double doubles on the year, averaging 3.17 digs to go along with 3.21 kills per set. She recorded a career-high 20 kills at Upper Iowa while starting all 32 matches for the Wildcats last season and is on pace to become the latest member of the 1,000 kill club at Wayne State, with 815 entering her senior season.

Wayne State finished the 2012 season with a 22-10 record, finishing fourth in the Northern Sun Confer-

ence with a 14-6 league mark. The Wildcats finished the season ranked No. 18 in the final AVCA Div. II Top 25 Coaches Poll while advancing to the NCAA Div. II National Tournament for an eighth straight season.

### Wildcats preseason No. 20 in AVCA poll

The Wayne State volleyball team will start the season ranked No. 20 in the American Volleyball Coaches Association Div. II preseason poll that was announced Tuesday afternoon.

The Wildcats are one of four teams from the Northern Sun Conference ranked in the first poll of the year. Six-time defending national champion Concordia-St. Paul begins the

season at No. 1, while Minnesota Duluth is No. 4, and Southwest Minnesota State is No. 6.

Other Central Region teams ranked in the preseason include Nebraska-Kearney at No. 3, Washburn at No. 7, Central Missouri at No. 8 and Truman at No. 16. NSIC schools Minnesota State and Winona State also received votes.

The Wildcats will be tested right out of the gate to start the season, as they face preseason-No. 9 Indianapolis in the first game of the Concordia-St. Paul Tournament on Friday, Sept. 6 at 9 a.m. They will also face No. 11 Colorado School of Mines on Friday, and will battle No. 1 Concordia-St. Paul and No. 21 Wingate University on Saturday.

## WSC volleyball fourth in attendance

The Wayne State College volleyball team ranked fourth in NCAA Div. II for home attendance during the 2012 season, according to the NCAA attendance report released last week.

It marks the fourth straight year that the Wildcats have ranked in the top 10 nationally in home volleyball attendance and the No. 4 ranking ties for the school's highest-ever national ranking, matching the 2010 season.

In 12 home matches during the 2012 season, Wayne State attracted 8,014 fans for an average of 668 fans per home match. The season was highlighted by a crowd of 1,411 fans on October 10 when the No. 19 Wildcats knocked off then-No. 1 Nebraska-Kearney 3-1. It was the second largest crowd in Wayne State volleyball history.

Only Nebraska-Kearney, Southwest Minnesota State and Angelo State of Texas averaged more fans

per home game than Wayne State. Wayne State was one of seven teams from the NSIC to rank in the top 15 in home attendance, making the Northern Sun Conference the top league in NCAA Div. II for home volleyball attendance at 453 fans per match.

Wayne State's first home match of the season is Sept. 19 against University of Sioux Falls at 7 p.m. at Rice Auditorium.

## Putz named assistant men's coach

Wayne State head men's basketball coach Brian Dolan has announced that Brett Putz has been named assistant coach for the Wildcats.

Putz is no stranger to men's basketball in the Northern Sun Conference, as the Forest City, Iowa native comes to Wayne State after serving the 2012-13 season as an assistant coach at St. Cloud State following a stellar playing career with the Huskies from 2008-12. He also brings three years of coaching experience to the Wildcats, having worked with the Iowa Mavericks and Iowa Barnstormers AAU programs from 2010-12.

As a player, Putz was a part of three NCAA Tourna-

ment and two NSIC Conference Tournament championships teams at St. Cloud State, including a trip to the NCAA Div. II Final Four in 2010. He finished his career as the school's all-time leader in games played (124), ranked second in three-pointers made (245), 10th in career steals (142) and 18th in scoring with 1,315 career points.

"I'm very excited about the opportunity to coach at Wayne State College," Putz said. "I am looking forward to working with coach Dolan and continuing to help the basketball program move forward, specifically getting to know and working with our players."

## Soccer team preseason picked 15th

The Wayne State women's soccer team was picked to finish 15th out of 16 teams in the Northern Sun Conference preseason coaches poll released Tuesday.

The Wildcats have a new coach in Tom Cliff and return several players from last year's team. Players to watch according to the NSIC are ju-

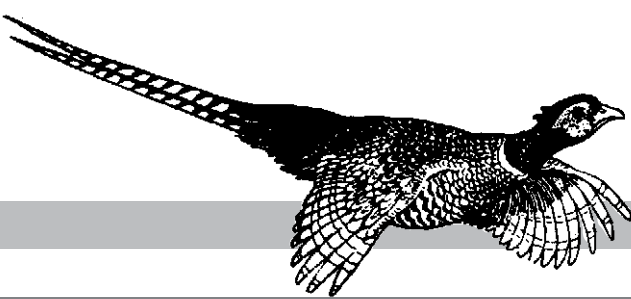

## Putting 'public' in public power

Our state is fortunate to be the only state in the nation with public power. Nebraska is the only state where an elected board represents our interest when it comes to generating the electricity we use every day. The board is at its best when the opinions of the people they represent are there to guide them in making decisions about power in Nebraska.

There are many Nebraskans who believe we need to increase our investment in renewable energy in the state. We currently fall behind neighboring states when it comes to investing in renewable sources of energy. Wind energy is a great example — Nebraska ranks fourth in the nation in wind energy potential, but we don't even make the top ten for installed capacity.

During the first half of this year, the Center for Rural Affairs organized meetings in six NPPD districts to bring Nebraskans together to meet with their NPPD board members. These meetings gave citizens a chance to talk about the future of energy in the state face-to-face with their representatives. NPPD Director Fred Christensen met with constituents in Wayne to discuss concerns and learn about issues — including economic development from renewable energy, the costs associated with generating electricity from different sources and environmental effects of coal-fired power plants. After introductions he took time to listen to the groups concerns and answer questions that they asked about producing power in Nebraska.

Fred Christensen is one of the newest members elected to the NPPD board, and he has a great opportunity to be a leader for renewable energy in the state. Even though he is new to the board, Christensen knows quite a bit about our state's history when it comes to public power. He is familiar with the questions that arise when

NPPD makes power purchase and generation decisions, and he cares quite a bit about how it will affect local power districts in the state.

Christensen is a long-time resident of Burt County and has farmed between Oakland and Lyons for many years. He feels a deep connection to rural communities and cares deeply about their future. The impact that power prices can have on businesses and families in rural communities was a concern he expressed. Christensen has also worked with the Nebraska Farmer's Union to promote wind development in Burt county. He noted that he is committed to representing the interests of his district, making sure they have a voice on the board.

Several participants felt that, during the meeting, Christensen made it clear he is a supporter of renewable energy but that he may not be aggressive enough in making the case for renewable energy to other board members. Many wanted him to be stronger — not only supportive, but to actively point out the benefits that renewable energy can have in our state, especially for rural communities. His experience and knowledge of the benefits that wind development can have for communities provides him a unique opportunity to start a conversation with his fellow board members, and participants at the meeting showed that they wanted him to seize that opportunity.

It was a friendly gathering that also afforded many the opportunity to speak with a representative that they often forget about. Nebraskans are interested in issues surrounding wind and renewable energy, but it isn't often enough that they get to speak to their NPPD representative about those issues. This meeting provided a much-needed outlet for questions, concerns, and ideas about renewable energy in Nebraska. Putting the public back in Public Power begins with representatives and their constituents having a real discussion.

# Public input sought on taxes

During a lengthy legislative hearing some years ago, a reporter friend said, "Nothing screws up the public hearing process like the public showing up."

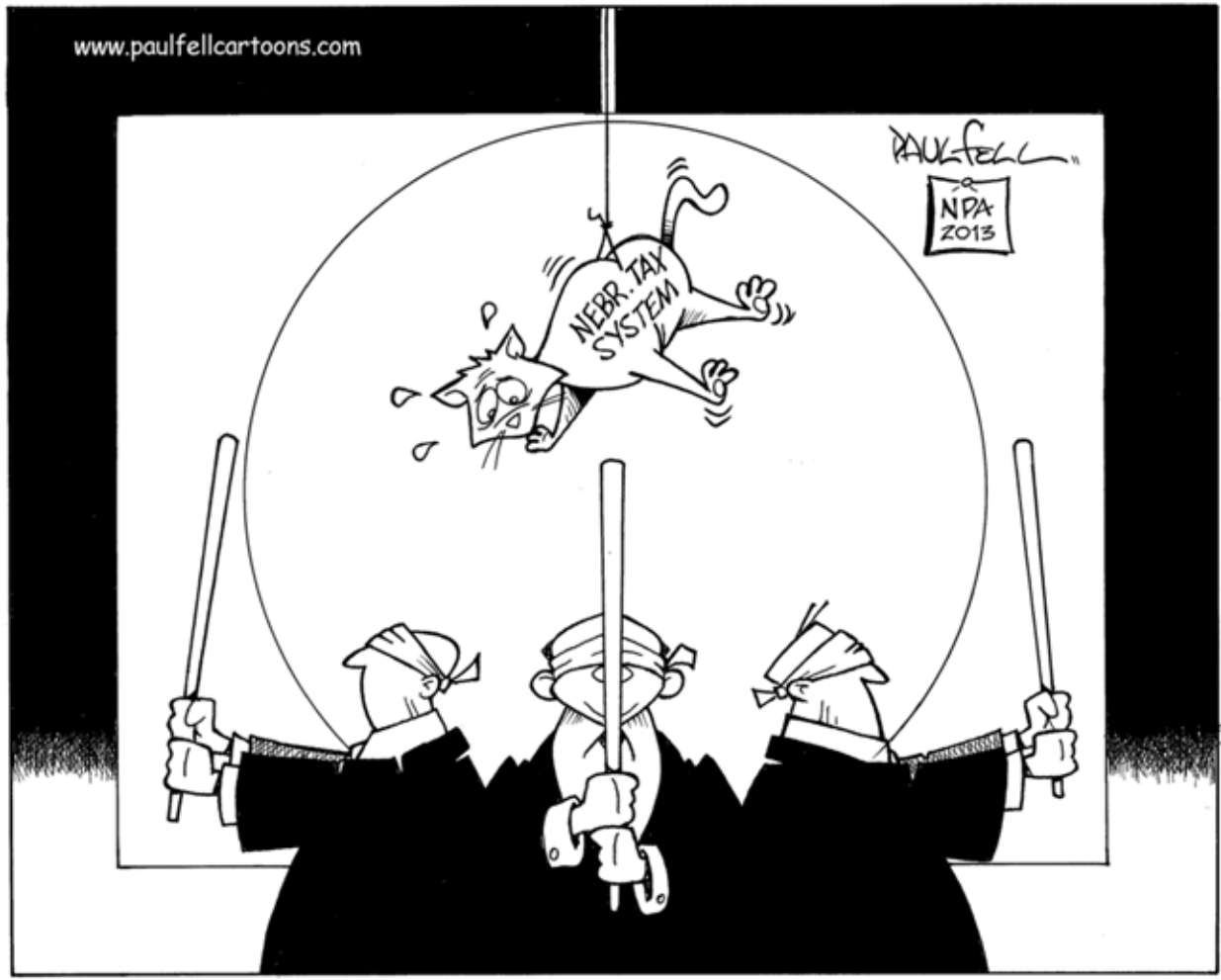
It was a joke of sorts. But the press corps understood that public engagement, while vital to the democratic process, could be cumbersome. An occasional proponent or opponent would offer some words of wisdom — a sound byte or a headline — but the majority of the presentations were canned. And the cans were often distributed by special interest groups.

Nothing against special interest groups. They serve a vital function to make people aware of things that might otherwise escape them. Nebraskans are bombarded with causes and messages and buy-it-now offers. Most of us pay attention to the things that matter to us. One would think that the subject of taxes would fall into that category.

Early in this year's legislative session, Governor Dave Heineman offered two massive proposals to change the way Nebraska collects taxes. Hours and hours of public debate followed before lawmakers settled on a plan (Legislative Resolution 155) to put a committee on it. The Tax Modernization Committee was formed and it has held some preliminary meetings with Chairman Sen. Galen Hadley of Kearney announcing that everything will be on the table.

The committee has announced public hearings: Monday, September 23 in Scottsbluff; Tuesday, September 24 in North Platte; Thursday, September 26 in Norfolk; Thursday, October 17 in Omaha and Friday, October 18 in Lincoln. The committee consists of 14 senators broken into three subcommittees: income tax, property tax and sales tax.

As with major statewide issues of late — read that Keystone XL Pipeline — the public interest groups



have already formed. Websites and Facebook pages speak of a group called Rebuild Nebraska. The website touts "a coalition of concerned Nebraska organizations and residents, known as Rebuild Nebraska, has mobilized to support stable, sustainable fiscal decisions that will benefit all Nebraskans."

According to its latest news release, members of Rebuild Nebraska include AARP Nebraska, The Center for People in Need, The Center for Rural Affairs, Community Action of Nebraska, Nebraska Appleseed, Nebraska Association of County Officials, The Nebraska Association of Public Employees/AFSCME, Nebraska Hospital Association, Nebraska State Education Association, Nonprofit Association of the Midlands and Voices for Children in Nebraska.

The coalition's rhetoric speaks of Nebraska pride in a high quality of living with great schools, safe streets and strong communities, which it calls the foundational fundamentals of "The Good Life."

They have issued a call to the Legislature's Tax Modernization Committee to make recommendations that safeguard the legacy for our children and grandchildren by maintaining our state's ability to invest in key services that maintain Nebraska's strong economy and high quality of life.

On its website, the coalition promises to "work with lawmakers and other residents to promote a fair and balanced tax code that lets us provide opportunities for all Nebraskans by adequately funding economic building blocks, such as education and infrastructure."

It cautions that "recent fiscal decisions have already caused significant issues; but, working together, we can start to repair this damage by making decisions about our tax code that will move the state forward."

Given that tax debate is all about whose ox is getting gored, it seems shallow for any special interest group, lawmakers included, to promise that we'll all work together to make the best decision possible. But it sounds good and probably makes people want to be a part of the process.

One thing for sure, the coalition says, "the time has come to make these changes." Let's hope that everyone concerned realizes that and is willing to cooperate. Lawmakers, the governor and the public must all accommodate change.

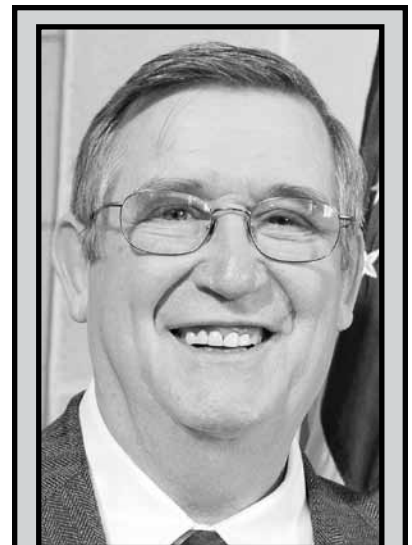
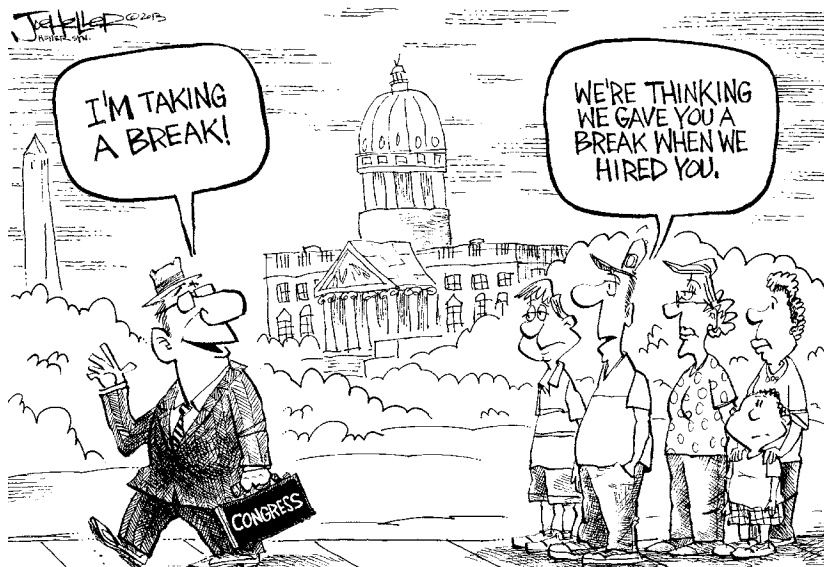

# Honor Flights being set up for veterans

Two weeks ago, I read an article about a couple, Bill and Evonne Williams, who were hoping to do an Honor Flight for the veterans of the Korean War. This is the same couple that organized the Heartland Honor Flights in 2008 and 2009 that took World War II veterans to Washington to visit the various military memorials.

In the two weeks since I read the article, they have had more

than 500 veterans who have applied to participate in the one-day, all-expenses-paid flight. The hope is for the flight to take place in October. The veterans selected to attend will be flown to Washington; and then they will be taken to the Korean War, World War II and Iwo Jima memorials; the Lincoln Memorial and Arlington National Cemetery. They will try to accommodate any living veteran, so I would en-

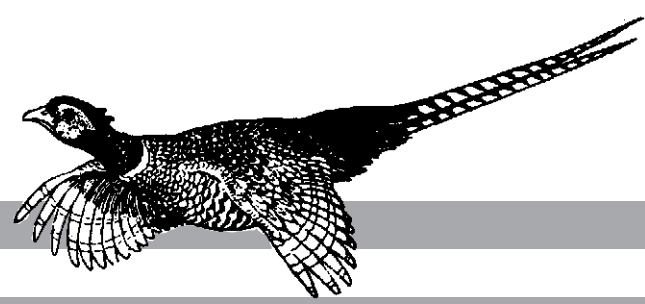

## Back to school resources available

It is hard to believe that school is starting again for another year. One of my enjoyable job responsibilities is visiting a classroom to

teach students about a topic they are learning in school or expanding their knowledge with hands-on activities. UNL Extension has several resources to enhance a classroom experience for teachers. Maybe it is scheduling a robotics experience for students to learn how to build and program a robot to complete missions, explore Nebraska agriculture to increase their knowledge and appreciation for the largest industry in the state, or discover how citizenship and leadership skills can strengthen their community with a service learning project.

Many of the local extension offices offer school enrichment lessons and programs for teachers. The school enrichment program is a great opportunity to supplement educational objectives with "hands-on learning". It can make a teacher's classroom a fun and exciting learn-

ing environment! The lessons use the Experiential Learning Model: Do, Reflect, and Apply to develop critical lifeskills. They are based on the research from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and other land-grant universities.

One activity that many teachers can add to their classroom experience is the National Science Experiment. This year's experiment, the 4-H Maps & Apps, youth will turn young people into geospatial

thinkers as they design and map their ideal park, use GIS mapping to solve community problems and contribute data about their community to the United State Geological Survey. The experiment information can be found online at [www.4-h.org/4-h-national-youth-science-day/](http://www.4-h.org/4-h-national-youth-science-day/).

Another resource that is available for teachers (birth to eight years-old) is called "Texts4Teachers". Texts4Teachers is designed to share information and resources offered through UNL Extension that can support their work through a simple text message. When teachers subscribe, they will receive weekly short informational tips and links based on the following areas: child development, family involvement, social/emotional development, health/safety/nutrition, and curriculum/activities. 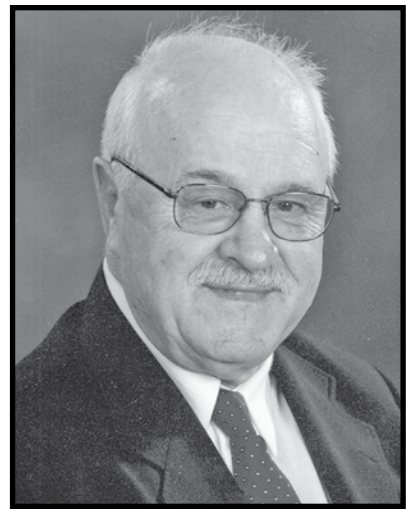

## Nebraskans are being urged to conserve water

Many Nebraska communities have instituted water restrictions again this summer after one of the worst droughts in the state's history in 2012. Even where restrictions haven't been imposed, Nebraskans are being encouraged to conserve water whenever possible as drought conditions persist in many parts of the state.

University of Nebraska-Lincoln experts have gathered some resources to help Nebraskans conserve water, at [droughtresources.unl.edu/waterwise](http://droughtresources.unl.edu/waterwise).

As of July 19, 11 Nebraska com-

munities began restricting water. Mark Kuzila, director of UNL's Conservation and Survey Division, pointed out that in the case of a multi-year drought, water level drawdowns that may have occurred in an aquifer during the first summer may still exist to some extent at the start of the next summer. He cautioned that, when this situation occurs, the aquifer has less water in storage than normal, and wells that were unaffected the first summer of the drought may experience water supply difficulties in subsequent years of the drought.

This website contains ready-to-use information including three newly revised "Make Every Drop Count" publications, new "Water Wise" NebGuides, concise water-wise news articles, water-wise audio recordings, and a 100-Gallon Challenge. The website will be updated regularly with timely news articles, additional audio recordings, and additional "Water Wise" NebGuides as they are prepared over the summer.

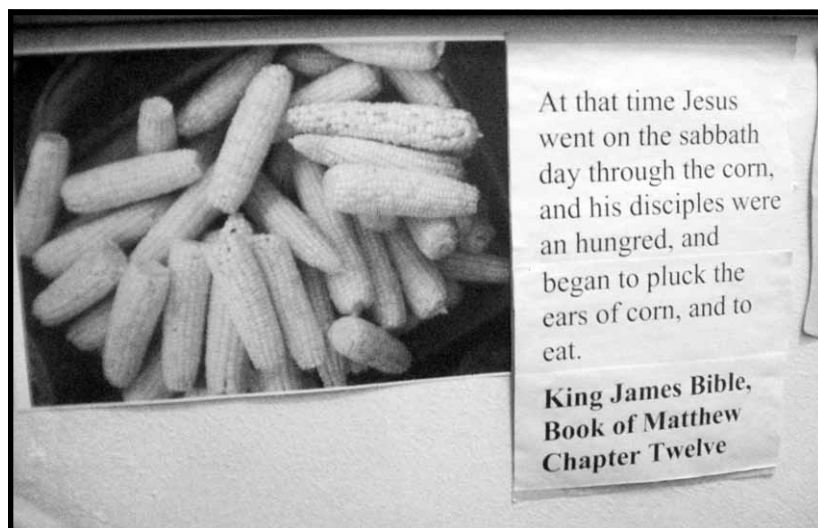

## Students start organic farm on UNL campus

Students at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln have found out that there is a lot to learn from carrots, tomatoes and chard.

Environmental studies majors at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln want to help bring organic farming experience to students. Using donations from the public and land from UNL's agronomy and horticulture department, they have started a small farm located on UNL's East Campus east of the Law College.

"This is a really hands-on way that students can learn to grow their own food," said senior environmental studies major Neil Tabor of Omaha, a founding member of the farm. "It brings a whole new angle of what we view as agricul-

ture and horticulture."

Chuck Francis, a professor in the university's agronomy and horticulture department, supported the students with their endeavors.

"He was a big help," Tabor said.

The university provided half an acre of land to the students, previously an asparagus patch. The students have replaced the asparagus with a cover crop designed to put nutrients back into the soil so that it can be used in the future to grow produce. Also on the land is a hoop house, one of six used for research by the department.

"The hoop house is designed to capture the solar energy and store it," Tabor said. This extends the growing season, allowing the students to plant crops that otherwise would not be able to survive outdoors.

Students were invited to use the hoop house by Laurie Hodges, UNL Extension commercial vegetable specialist. It needed repairs, so recent environmental studies graduate Jenn Simons of Albion helped start a campaign on indiegogo.com to raise funds.

"That's really what set things off," Simons said. "We set up that campaign and people realized that we were serious."

Over \$3,000 was raised, allowing the students to begin fixing the hoop house and buy needed equipment and seed.

Simons said she enjoyed the unique opportunity that starting the organic farm gave her.

"It was a chance to actually try doing some sort of agriculture experience on my own," Simons said. "I've lived in apartments and houses where I couldn't have a garden."

The students want the farm to eventually be integrated into classes.

"Basically any soils, agronomy and horticulture classes would be free to use it," Tabor said.

The students hope to continue harvesting fresh, healthy vegetables next year.

"I think it is a very solid start," said senior environmental studies major Heather Hansen of Sioux Falls, S.D. "It is pretty promising for this year and the next."

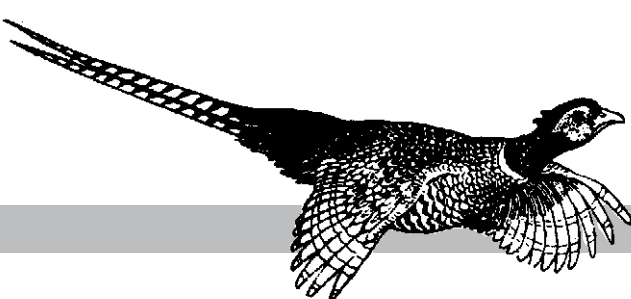
### Kilroy Award

## Continue to scout for soybean aphids

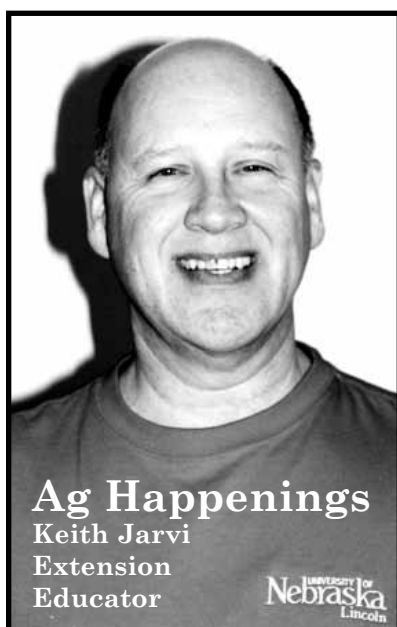
Crop conditions were slowly (or rapidly, depending on whom you talked to) deteriorating and some wide general rain over the last week really helped.

Soybean aphid populations have been very low the past couple of weeks. We are still not out of the woods, but it looks like there won't be much of an aphid problem this year. However, the weather has been favorable for them, so don't stop looking until the beans hit the R6 stage.

Speaking of soybean aphids, in an age when farming continues to go high tech, it was only a matter of time before scouting for soybean aphids went digital. That means you won't have to make use of paper sheets or keep track of your writing utensil in the field. Two recent offerings from UNL provide that opportunity. The first is Aphid Speed Scout. It is an application or app for the iPad, iPhone, and iPod Touch. The second is the spreadsheet EC1582: Soybean Aphid Speed Scouting Spreadsheet. Both are available free of charge.

Any mobile device that is capable of running an Excel spreadsheet can make use of the spreadsheet. That means you keep track of what is going on with soybean aphids in your fields on your smart phone or tablet. The spreadsheet and app will allow for infield decisions to be made for soybean aphid management.

Both the spreadsheet and app utilize the speed scouting method for determining whether soybean aphids have reached the treat-

ment threshold of 250 aphids per plant. Scouting this way relies on the number of "infested" plants rather than estimating the number of aphids on each plant. Plants are considered "infested" if there are 40 or more aphids on the plant. When using the spreadsheet or app they will let you know whether you need to "Resample in 7-10 days," "Resample in 3-4 days," "Sample 5 more plants," or "Treat, confirm in 3-4 days."

## Bacon prices on rise

A devastating swine disease new to the United States hasn't shown up in Nebraska yet, but it's already forcing bacon prices nationwide to new highs.

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln's Veterinary Diagnostic Center stands ready to test piglets for the Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea virus, said Dr. Bruce Brodersen, assistant professor in the center and the School of Veterinary Medicine and Biological Sciences.

Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea - PED for short - has been around since at least the 1970s but first showed up in the U.S. this summer.

"Since the swine population has never been exposed before to this virus, they're very susceptible," Brodersen said. "The disease outbreaks are very severe because there's no immunity to it at all. So, it's been devastating as far as pig mortality is concerned."

Brodersen said he expects PED to turn up in Nebraska eventually, but swine producers can take steps to avoid it coming to their facilities.

Surveys show PED may be spread when trucks gather anywhere there are common loading and unloading chutes such as buying stations. From those common areas, the virus can be tracked back to individual operations. Brodersen urged producers to be very careful to clean their trailer or

truck before they go home.

"You should always follow very strict biosecurity steps," he said. No vaccine is available in the U.S. yet.

Piglets infected with PED experience diarrhea and vomiting violent enough to kill them. The U.S. Department of Agriculture has confirmed only about 400 cases of the disease in the lab, but its toll has already been estimated in the hundreds of thousands.

As a result, pork price futures have risen to historic levels, with hundredweights of pork going for about \$105 in recent trading at the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. The USDA reports that the same amount of pork went for \$78 in March.

Fox Business News reported that the prices for pork bellies, which are cured into bacon, have risen particularly fast. On Tuesday, the wholesale price of a hundred pounds of fresh pork belly topped \$189, 5 percent more than it was five days earlier and apparently at or near all-time highs.

Retail prices for bacon don't track one-to-one with belly prices, Fox Business News reported, but they also have risen. The Bureau of Labor Statistics estimated the price of a pound of bacon in urban supermarkets at \$4.92 in June - up 14 percent from June 2012 and another all-time high.

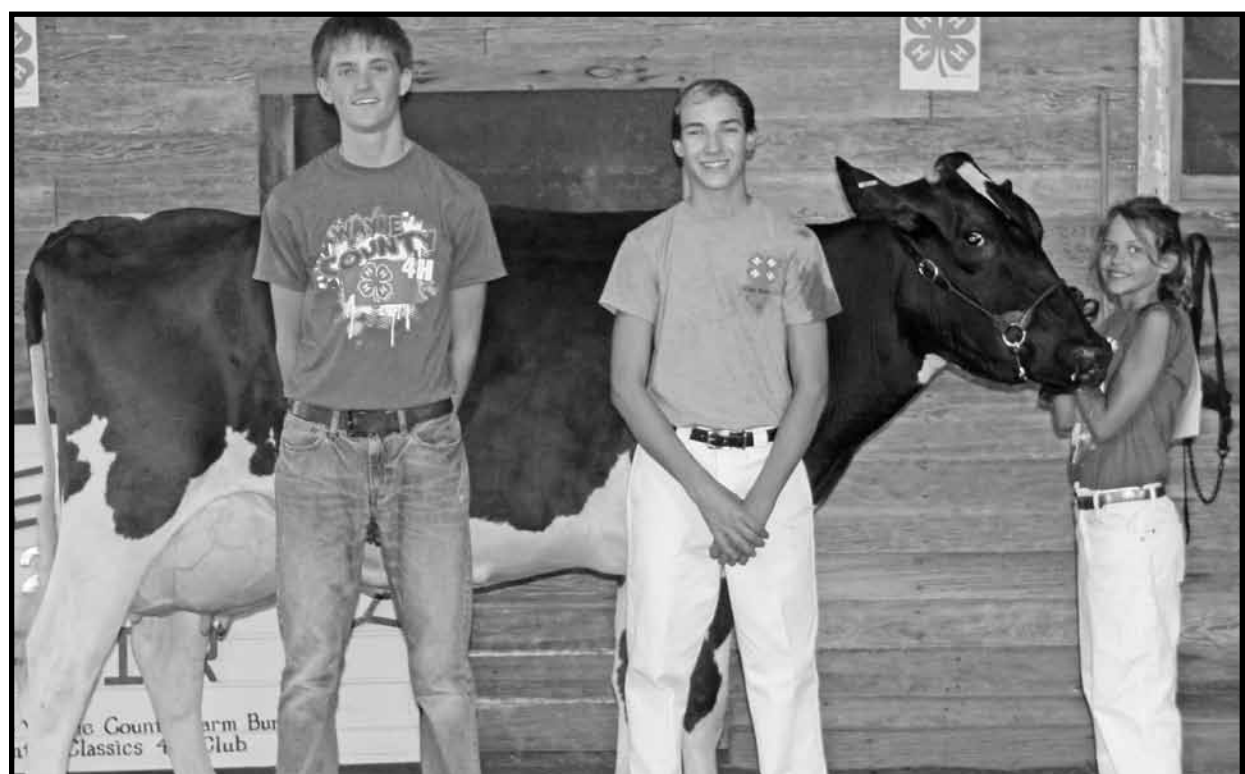
