# Chamberlain says he'll run for second term

# Wayne mayor says he will run in 2014

With less than a week to go before the incumbents filing deadline, Wayne's mayor decided he wanted to have another go at the job.

Mayor Ken Chamberlain filed for re-election to the position on Wednesday morning, joining a growing list of incumbents who are asking voters for another four years in their current position.

Chamberlain, who was elected in 2010, said he waited until the final week before the incumbents' deadline

to make his decision on whether or not to seek a second and Lt. Phil Shear were suspended and later terminat-

"I knew I wanted to (run for reelection) a long time ago," he told The Wayne Herald after filing his papers at the Wayne County Clerk's office Wednesday morning. "I've enjoyed it, and there is a lot of stuff that I want to see finished up, but I also wanted to give myself as much time as I could and make sure it's the right decision for myself and my family.'

Chamberlain's first four years as Wayne's mayor have been anything but quiet.

Two months after taking office, he faced his first controversy when the city's Chief of Police, Lance Webster,

Last fall, Chamberlain showed his leadership ca-

pabilities in the aftermath of the Oct. 4 tornado that struck the east end of town. Rebuilding of the area is under way, and he hopes to see that through in a second term as mayor if he is re-elected this November.

"It's been quite an interesting experience, but I've enjoyed the work part of it," he said. "If I didn't enjoy it, certainly wouldn't consider (running for re-election)."

Chamberlain said he received advice from his drill sergeant in basic training about his leadership capabilities, and he tried to apply that advice during his

"My drill sergeant told me that leaders lead from the he said. "I think it's important for the community to have somebody who takes that role seriously and is a strong leader who can perform under pressure."

Chamberlain said he hopes to complete a number of projects that have been started during his first term, as well as continuing efforts to help the community rebuild from last fall's tornado - and he wants Wayne to be in a better place four years from now than it is

"I think we're in a better place today than we were four years ago, so that would be the challenge for me, to put Wayne in a better place four years from now than we are today," he said.

# Board approves new laptops

Seniors at Wayne High School will soon have their own Google Chromebooks to use following action taken at Monday's meeting of the Wayne Community Schools Board of

Last week, Wayne High School Principal Mark Hanson, technology cirector Tom Larsen, two teachers and two students visited several schools in northeast Nebraska that are using the technology in the classrooms. During Monday's meeting, a favorable report was presented to the board on the use of the Chromebooks

Board members approved the purchase of 76 of the books, which will be used by seniors for the remainder of the school year. The Chromebooks will be purchased from CDW-G for a total purchase price of

Superintendent Mark Lenihan updated the board on the status of several projects being undertaken by the district.

He reported that a new boiler has been installed in the elementary school and is up and running well. A decision on whether or not to replace the other boiler at the school will be made in the future, as the older boiler worked well as a back-up while the new boiler was being installed.

The heating, ventilation and air conditioning project and the track project have gone out for bids. These bids will be opened on Thursday, Feb. 27.

Lenihan said the district is also working with Jon Carlson of Carlson, West Povondra Architects on a facility study with a goal of having the study completed by the end of the year.

Work is being finalized for a visit from the accreditation team for the district's accreditation. A group of five individuals will visit Wayne in April to complete the accreditation process.

Wayne State College reported on its Facebook page Monday morning that neither drugs nor alcohol were a factor in the death of freshman Eddie Key III, who was found dead in his dorm room Saturday evening.

tion Center received a 911 call reporting

Responding officers and Providence Medical Center's Ambulance personnel found the 18-year-old from Lincoln deceased in his dorm room. Preliminary autopsy results showed that neither drugs nor alcohol were a factor in his death, according to the Wayne Police Department. Self-inflicted injuries were also ruled out by police, but full

# Two nabbed in car chase



> Here is another "what if" scenario from the Wall Street Journal that we have been also been preparing for at Wayne - One month with no regional electric power. In April 2013, an unknown group at San Jose, Calif. took out a major electrical substation through a "purposeful attack, extremely well planned and executed by professionals who had expert training" as described by Jon Wellinghoff, head of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.

Wellinghoff warns that "Coordinated attacks on just a few subimpact" and says "Destroying the right targets could knock out power for most of North America" for a long period of time. Wayne has maintained a modern power plant that burns 8.000 gallons of diesel fuel per day and has capacity to store up to 30 days of diesel fuel.

There is also an individual responsibility to prepare because having no regional power, means little diesel or gas can be pumped or transported in the Midwest, taking most trucks off the road for the duration. That's how we get our food and supplies

While nobody has announced plans to run against the current mayor, Chamberlain said he would welcome an opponent for the city's top seat this November.

"I haven't heard of anybody who's interested yet, but I would welcome it," he said. "The community needs to have choices."

Incumbents have until Tuesday to file their re-election plans. New candidates have until Monday,



# Not much room for error now

Our publisher at The Wayne Herald, Kevin Peterson, is something of a numbers guy – much in the same way ice is kind of cold.

He's a busy guy with all of the publisher-type duties he's got going on in the office (at least, that's what he tells me every time I go in to ask him about a raise), but he's always keeping an eye on other numbers – like the boys basketball wild card point standings.

Right now, the Wayne High boys are sitting in a pretty good position for a potential wild card bid to the Class C-1 state basketball tournament, but there isn't a whole lot of room for error as we get down to the end of the regular season.

As you may recall, last year's team made it to state by the skin of their chinny-chin-chins. After losing the district final to Boone Central/ Newman Grove, they waited nervously as fans who stayed behind were looking for anyone listening to a broadcast of the Wahoo vs. Boys Town game to see if the Warriors were going to come back and win. If they didn't – they were getting the second wild card and Wayne was being left behind on the state tour-

Fortunately, Wahoo was able to come back and win, which gave the Blue Devils that 11th-hour phone call from the governor and punched their ticket to an eventual thirdplace finish at state. But this year might be a little more difficult to sneak in the back door for whoever doesn't win a district title.

Barring anything weird, one wild card will likely be taken by the loser of a district matchup featuring Falls City (currently second in the wild card point standings) and Lincoln Christian (right behind Wayne

If the current placings hold through subdistricts, all that's left is for Columbus Scotus to somehow navigate a subdistrict that includes No. 8 Columbus Lakeview and a pretty solid Grand Island CC team on the other side in the district fi-

But Wayne's trip to Lincoln is by no means a smooth one. In fact, one could argue they have the toughest road to Lincoln of any of the top five teams in the C-1 point standings

Wayne has a subdistrict that includes West Point and Wisner-Pilger, both of whom are in the top 20, and a monster subdistrict on the other side that includes BC/NG (sixth) and Norfolk Catholic (11th), along with Pierce and O'Neill, who are sandwiched in between the Cadets (15th) and the Gators (18th).

While losing to the Cardinals in the Mid State Conference final was a disappointment for coach Rob Sweetland and his troops, it might actually turn out to be a good thing in the long run.

Wayne already has two wins over the Cardinals this season, beating them in the Great Northeast Nebraska Shootout and in a regular-season matchup in Albion. It's difficult to beat a team more than twice in a season, but the Cardinals' win in the conference finals might take some of the edge off that possible rematch in the district finals. Wayne has beaten everybody else in the district, aside from Pierce, who they close the regular season with next week.

This is the exciting part of the winter sports season, and Wayne High fans have enjoyed the efforts of the Blue Devils this season. The team has played with a ton of energy this season and look to be in pretty good shape for a trip to Lincoln this March.

The challenge will be to maintain their high level of play coming into a postseason that will be a very entertaining one to keep an eye on. A lot of potential roadblocks stand between the Blue Devils and Lincoln, and the room for error, at this stage of the game, is rather slim – but much better than that raise I keep asking Kevin for.


Hansen and Michaela Barry led Wayne State's rebounding effort with nine and eight, respectively, as the Wildcats outrebounded the Peacocks 43-37.

Nebraska customers can save money, energy with new light incentive

Columbus, NE – On Jan. 1, 2014, Nebraska Public Power District and its wholesale customer utilities began offering incentives to residential electric customers for the purchase and installation of lightemitting diode (LED) bulbs.

At the start of this new 2014 year, final provisions of the 2007 Energy Policy Act began phasing out the standard, 60-watt, incandescent light bulb. Production and importation of the 100-watt and 75-watt standard incandescent lamps have already been closed out over the past two years under the same policy.

Fortunately, customers have an excellent alternative. City of Wayne Electric utilities will provide customers with a \$5 account credit for each 60, 75, or 100-watt LED equivalent to the standard bulb they buy, with up to 10 credits available per residential account this year. Customers can purchase these LED lamps wherever they desire, but the package must be identified as ENERGY STAR® quali-

The Environmental Protection Agency's ENERGY STAR program encourages installation of LED lamps that use 75 to 80 percent less energy than equivalent incandescent light bulbs and have a rated life that is 25 to 50 times longer. LEDs do not contain mercury, which eliminates some disposal concerns.

LED lamps offer additional advantages over compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs), which have long been touted as energy-efficient alternatives to standard light bulbs. LEDs illuminate instantly when their power switch is turned on. Their light output is not diminished in cold weather. In fact, LEDs last longer in cold areas. LEDs offer a variety of color temperatures that allow customers to match the appearance of standard incandescent bulbs or the bright white of most office environments. Many LED lamps are dimmable, but customers should confirm this prior to purchase, as manufacturers are required to indicate whether they are or not on the packaging.

NPPD and its wholesale customer utilities are contributing approximately \$100,000 toward this campaign which will run through the end of December 2014. To receive the incentive, customers submit a completed program application along with a copy of their sales receipt to their local electric utility. 

The clock is ticking, the campaign treasurers are counting and the candidates are possibly shifting. Filing deadlines for Nebraska's May 13 primary are February 18 for incumbents - those people who currently hold any state office and either want to run for it again or for another office - and March 3 for everybody else.

The state Accountability and Disclosure Commission has released financial statements from the latest campaign reports and one Republican gubernatorial candidate has dropped out and there is a GOP power player on the cusp of jumping in.

Gotta love Nebraska politics in a year when the U.S. Senate race and the Governor's office are the big plums at stake. So, if you're inclined, go find your tally sheets that we made last fall and get out your eraser and be ready to pencil in a few. Under Republican Governor, remove State Sen. Charlie Janssen of Fremont who has been in the race for a year. He said he sees no clear path to victory in the crowded field that includes five others. That's a gracious way to put it. Chances are he looked at his finances. Or maybe he is just now "reading the streets" and comparing the traction that his limited platform - illegal immigrants and gun control -- has now, or could have given the rest of the

Accountability reports say Janssen raised a total of \$317,000 during the campaign. At the end of the 2013 reporting period he had \$74,000 in the bank. That would leave him in sixth place if the race were based on money available. Compare that to Omaha businessman Pete Ricketts who raked in nearly \$1.4 million for his campaign last year. State Sen. Beau McCoy of Elkhorn raised \$794,000 -- \$590,000 of that from Falls City businessman Charlie Herbster who dropped out

ey, who is also seeking the gubernatorial nod, had \$335,000 and Omaha tax accountant Bryan Slone had \$328,000 at year's end. Term-limited State Sen. Tom Carlson of Holdrege has raised \$241,000 and ended the year with \$157,000.

Adding to the uncertainty in the race is the possibility that State Attorney General Jon Bruning - who apparently won a battle with a cancer scare and shook off the humiliation of losing the highly contested U.S. Senate primary to eventual winner Deb Fischer -- said he is considering running for Governor instead of another term as AG. State law says he can bring his \$854,000 raised for his re-election bid to the new race. Bruning also brings statewide name recognition from previous campaigns and media coverage

If he decides to vacate the AG's office, longtime former attorney general Don Stenburg - currently State Treasurer - may decide to go after the office. Omaha attorney Brian Buescher and Lincoln attorneys Mark Hilger and Doug Peterson may try to go after the AG post if Stenberg decides against it. Depending on Stenberg's move, that could leave the door open for a new state treasurer candidate.

It remains the tallest free-standing structure in when the United States Army sold the western hemisphere, attracting more than two million international

visitors annually. Construction on the CN Tower began with massive excavation Flights of the antenna pieces were at the tower base for the foundation. By the time the foundation was complete, 61,729 short tons and 55,116 long tons of earth and shale were removed to a depth of 49.2 feet in the center and a base incorporating 9,156 cubic vards of concrete with 496 short tons, 443 long tons of steel rebar and 40 short tons, 35 long tons of steel cable had been built to a thickness of 22 feet. Construction was fairly rapid with only four months needed between the start and the foundation being ready for construction on the top.

To build the main support pillar, a hydraulically-raised slip for was built at the base. This was an impressive feat on its own, consisting of a large metal platform that raised itself on jacks at about 19.7 feet a day as the concrete below was set. Concrete was poured continuously by a team of 1,532 people until Feb. 22, 1974 at which time it had already become the tallest structrue in Canada. The tower contains 52,972 cubic yards of concrete that was mixed on-site in order to ensure batch consistency.

> The antenna was originally to be raised by crane, but during construction the Sikorsky S-64 Skycrane helicopter became available off theirs to civilian operators. The helicopter, named "Olga" first was used to remove the craine; then flew the antenna up in 36 sections. a minor tourist attraction and the schedule was printed in the local newspapers. Use of the helicopter saved months of construction time, taking only three and a half weeks instead of the planned six months.

The CN Tower opened to the public on June 26, 1976, but the official opening date was Oct. 1, 1976. Construction cost was approximately \$63 million (\$243 million in 2013 dollars) and re-paid in 15 years.

Those not afraid of heights, visiting the CN Tower is one of the greatest experiences they will enoy in Toronto. Soaring up to 1,122 feet is the outdoor observation deck, where on a clear day visitors can view the city. There is also an "elephant proof" glass located indoors where visitors can look straight down to street level.

Another 14 feet up visitors will hit the Indoor Observation Deck, which is great for cold weather days.

One floor above the Indoor Observation Level is the Top of Toronto Restaurant, which rotates every 72 minutes, providing visitors with a complete and unobstructed view of

Visitors can continue on to the world's highest public observation deck, Sky Pod, which sits at 1,465

Edge Walk is CN Tower's most thrilling attraction in it's history and first of its kind in North America. It is the world's highest full circle hands-free walk on a five foot wide ledge encircling the top of the Tower's main pod, 1,168 feet (116 stories) above ground. Visitors walk in group of six, while attached to an overhead safety rail, via a trolly and harness system. Trained Edge Walk guides will encourage participants to lean back over Toronto with nothing but air and breath-taking views of Lake Ontario beneath them.

In 1995 the CN Tower was declared one of the modern Seven Wonders of the World by the American Society of Civil Engineers. It also belongs to the world Federation of Great Towers, where it hold a second place ranking.

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

some snow just about everywhere. for winter, leaving them with a high Sure it created some problems, but concentration of nutrients and a low concentration of water in their roots. This winterized condition enables alfalfa crowns and roots to withstand temperatures down as

low as 5 degrees above zero.

Now this doesn't sound all that cold. After all, air temperatures have gotten much colder than that. Fortunately, the soil doesn't get as cold as the air above it. And when soil is covered with a blanket of snow, this snow acts like a layer of insulation protecting the ground from bitter cold temperatures. Plus, it reduces the rate that soils and alfalfa roots dry out. This is why winters with little snow cover can cause more injury to alfalfa stands, especially if soils also are dry.

Of course, management practices in the fall influence the effect of snow on your alfalfa. Tall stubble provides some insulation value itself and it will catch more snow. Also, avoiding alfalfa harvest during the so-called risk period from mid-September through mid-October helps alfalfa roots winterize well by building up nutrients and reducing water content.

You may not like the way snow disrupts your daily routine, but remember how valuable it can be for your alfalfa. Then, let it snow, let it snow, let it snow.

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
