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# Council approves LB840 funding requests

Two requests for LB840 funds, two change orders on recently completed projects and two bids for upcoming projects were among the items on the agenda for the

Wayne City Council when it met in regular session on Council members approved a request from Ken Jorgensen for \$250,000 to build a sports bar and bottle

shop on the east side of Wayne. Council members debated the nature of the request

and the way the funding would be awarded. Jorgensen had originally requested the money in the form of a \$125,000 performance based loan that would be forgiven over a period of 15 years based on the business creating 20 full-time-equivalent jobs and \$125,000 in a low interest rate loan that would be paid back in

The LB840 Committee had recommended to the council that the funds be awarded in the form of a \$250,000 zero percent interest loan to be repaid over a period of 15 years.

Council members voted to approve two change orders on the Chief's Way Sanitary Sewer Project rather than risk added costs of arbitration.

Change orders in the amount of \$3,723.50 and the Summer Sports Complex.

Discussion was held on the merits of either of the \$2,710.05 were approved to Robert Woehler and Sons Construction.

The changes were necessary due to the fact that engineers designing the project had used out-dated information and were unaware of utilities located in the project.

In accepting the change orders, the city will seek to have some of the costs incurred by the engineering firm and the utility company.

Council member Matt Eischeid said he did not like the idea of paying for the change orders rather than going to arbitration and felt this was "just giving up."

City Administrator Lowell Johnson said the city would have incurred some of the costs associated with the change orders had they been noted in the original bid documents and that in the future, the city's policy will be changed to require a meeting with all the utilities prior to the start of a construction project.

Bids were accepted and contracts awarded for the Highway 15 and 10th Street Intersection Project and relocations of ball fields, reconstruction of the infields and the creation of common space between the fields at

Robert Woehler and Sons was the low bidder in the street project with a bid of \$73,760. Work is scheduled to begin May 19 and should be completed by Aug. 1. It will involve turning lanes both on the highway and on 10th Street, the addition of sidewalks on the south side of 10th Street and ADA accessibility where required.

Odeys of Omaha was awarded a contract in the amount of \$71,500 for the work at the Summer Sports Complex. Work there is scheduled to begin as soon as the frost is out of the ground.

Ordinance 2014-6 received first reading approval from the council. It will begin the process of annexing real estate in the northeast quadrant of the city into city limits.


Discussion was again held on the merits of annexing the Pacific Coast property into the city at this time.

Council member Eischeid said doing so takes away options for potential buyers of the property who may wish to remain outside city limits.

The council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, March 18 at 5:30 p.m. in Council chambers.



With less than four minutes left in the game and Cedar Bluffs leading the Wildcats 50-5, Cedar Bluffs score – and he did.


"Nothing goes totally as planned, but in the last few minutes, Derek came on the court and was able to score a few baskets," Messersmith said. "It was an awesome night."

Services were held Monday, March 3 at the United Methodist Church of Christ in Wisner. Burial was in the Wisner Cemetery.



Edith Christine Skinner was born on July 21, 1915 in Wisner, the only child of Harry E. and Kathryn (Stauffer) Leisy. She was baptized and confirmed at the former Salem Mennonite Church, south of Wisner. Edith graduated from Wisner High School in 1933 and went on to earn her Bachelors of Science Degree in Business Education from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln in 1939. 

# What's a watt?

you get your electric bill, the first thing you make note of is how much you owe the power company. Next, you most likely will consider whether the total cost is higher or lower than the previous month's without considering the "watts" that you're being charged for. Unfortunately, cost is not a good way to tell if you used more or less electricity than you normally would.

To start, let's consider what a watt is. By definition, a watt is a measure of power. The more watts, the more power. That's why a 1,500-watt microwave oven cooks about twice as fast as a 750-watt microwave.

But when you examine your electric bill in greater detail, you will notice you are being billed for kilowatt-hours. Kilowatt-hours, abbreviated kWh, are a measure of energy and time. For example, if you run a 100-watt light bulb for one hour, you've used 100 watt-hours, or 0.1 kilowatt-hours, since a kWh is 1,000 watt-hours. In other words, 0.1 kWh is the amount of energy you need to run a light bulb for an

It is very common for people to underestimate the power needs of an appliance or light, as well as to not realize how many hours a month some appliances and lights

Now consider: While all watts are the same, not all watt-hours are created equal! During summer months, demand for electricity increases. Large-scale storage of electricity is generally cost prohibitive, so utilities must operate more generation to meet that higher de-

If you're like most people, when mand. This additional generation costs more to operate per kWh produced. Consequently, utility companies must charge a higher price per

kWh to cover their costs during the

What energy-using item operates and for how long will naturally change in your home, too! Most homes in Nebraska have central heating systems. As the weather gets colder, units run longer and the system blowers consume more electricity. If your home also uses electric resistance or a heat pump to keep the "inside" comfortable, significant increases in billed kWhs are normal.

As daylight hours change throughout the year, more or less lighting is used in the home. Depending on the number, type of lights, and hours operated, sizeable changes in energy consumption can

Over 97 percent of Nebraskan homes have some form of air conditioning. As temperatures rise, air conditioning typically operates for more hours each month and causes the number of electric kWhs consumed to increase. By the time the electric bill arrives in September, which includes electricity used in August, cooler weather is often upon us and we tend to misjudge how much the air-conditioning ran.

When you open your next monthly electric statement, consider some of these points after looking at the kWhs billed and not just how much you owe. Reviewing your energy use patterns and understanding where the energy goes just may change how you use electricity.

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

# Wayne High secures trip to state tourney

Norfolk Catholic tried to bring the heat early, but Wayne High's threeheaded monster was the one leaving the charred remains behind.

Facing a win-or-else situation Monday night, the Wayne High Blue Devils overcame some early full-court pressure by Norfolk Catholic and pulled away in front of a standing-room-only crowd of about 1,100 people at Wisner-Pilger High School, punching their ticket to state with a convincing 71-46 win over the Knights to claim the C1-4 district championship.

The Knights used a suffocating full-court press that created some early troubles and put Wayne in a quick 6-0 hole, but it wouldn't be long before Wayne broke the Knights' pressure and, eventually, their will as well.

"They came out against Boone Central and did the same thing, and we told our kids that we just needed to withstand it," coach Rob Sweetland said after the win sent the 23-4 Blue Devils to the Class C-1 state tournament next week in Lincoln.

"We put ourselves in some bad positions in the corners early on, but we addressed it and got more to the middle of the floor," Sweetland added. "Once their press went away, we were able to do some things.

The Blue Devils overcame the sluggish start with eight straight points, capped by back-to-back layups by Kaje Maly to give Wayne an

Norfolk Catholic would lead 14-12 after one period, but the two teams traded the lead throughout much of the first half before the Blue Devils changed defenses and put the ball

# Wildcats upset in NSIC quarters

The 11th-ranked Wayne State women's basketball team had one of their most sluggish nights offensively and suffered a 75-69 overtime upset at the hands of Sioux Falls Saturday in the quarterfinals of the Northern Sun Conference tournament at the Sioux Falls Pentagon.

The Wildcats struggled shooting the ball for most of the evening, finishing the game shooting 33 percent from the floor (24-of-72).

Even with their shooting struggles, the Wildcats played solid defense for much of the first half. Wayne State led Sioux Falls 28-26 with 3:27 to go in the half but closed out the half with a 5-0 run, capped by a Jaylan Spencer three-point play, to give Wayne State a 33-26 halftime lead.





#### Disagreeing with Feb. 20 column

In your editorial printed on Feb. 20, you bluntly stated that I made a "bad priority bill pick." Not surprisingly, I am inclined to disagree with

I understand that you are disappointed that the bill that addressed. to the degree possible, your views of education concerning child sexual assaults (LB143) did not become law. I failed to get this bill out of committee; now I want to share with you and your readers some of the reasons why.

You incorrectly state that priority bills are those which advance out of committees; you are mistaken. There are many priority bills that never survive the committee process, and that seems, to me, a true waste of a priority designation.

As for my priority bill, LB393, which took me two years to get to the floor for debate, you state that it affects only a select few: I would remind you that there are over 94,000 licensed motorcyclists in Nebraska; that seems to me to be more than a few. You also state that you don't recall being taught about "American soldiers fighting for the "freedom to decide" about helmets; does the phrase "life, liberty, and the PUR-SUIT OF HAPPINESS" ring a bell with you? My father, myself and my son all served in combat zones overseas, and I believe that may qualify me to some degree to decide some of which rights we were defending.

I would remind you in closing, that I have not ruled out the possibility of carrying a bill similar to LB143 again.

I don't know what the oft-quoted German leader knew about the Nebraska Legislature, but I do know about sausages and sausage-making and some of the men who make sausages, or used to make sausages. My late father was a butcher who also made sausage on occasion. So was former state Sen. Ray Janssen of Hooper. I knew it the day I met him and noticed his fingers that were round like link sausages with very smooth skin, just like my dad's

Apparently, animal fat is as good as lanolin-rich lotion on a man's hands. Janssen was a good lawmaker who had some very practical ideas. He said butchers are deep thinkers. My dad was a practical man and a deep thinker. # How the legislative process works

As we have been making our way has occurred to me that it might be beneficial to provide you with some "Good Practice Ideas" for when you might be interested in legislation.

I often have people contact my office with ideas that they feel would be great legislation. After much research I may determine that it just is not feasible, it is a great idea or maybe it is a good idea but it needs some modification. If a senator decides to bring a bill based on the idea that you brought to them -WORK WITH THAT SENATOR. Jolanda Kuzma Know what the introduced bill does,

opinion. If this is the case you have through the committee process it some options - you can work with the senator to move towards your goal or you can work against the bill based on your idea and watch things stay status quo.

Many people do not realize just what a delicate process it is to successfully pass a bill. Once you have a bill that has been introduced, that bill will be scheduled for a hearing. Frequently, the senator introducing the bill has very little say as to when that bill will be heard by the committee to which it has been referenced. When the hearing date is set - the person who brought the Lincoln it may or may not be enough in your idea to a senator should make it



their priority to be there to testify to support the bill. After all, a senator can bring a bill but we need testifiers for that bill and if you truly care about getting your idea passed in some form you need to be there to tell the committee in person just how important it is because, let's face it - letters and e-mails are good, but when it comes to a committee hearing, being there in person is the best option because it allows the committee members to ask

you questions. Once the hearing has been held on the bill it is important that you continue to work with your senator who introduced the bill. The committee chairs are the ones that decide when or if the committee will have an executive session on a bill; this is when the committee votes to decide if a bill should be sent to the full Legislature for consideration. The bill may also be amended, simply held or killed. These executive sessions are held without public attendance - only the media and committee members are there. There are times where it may appear to you that we are doing very little to advance legislation but the fact is we are working behind the scenes trying to advance the bill. It is in your best interest not to assume that you know more about the status of the bill than the introducing senator, after all you know the old saying about assuming.

is up to the Speaker to decide if or when a bill is placed on the agenda for debate by the full Legislature. In a year like this year, a short session, if your bill does not have a priority designation it probably will not be heard by the full Legislature. Each senator is allowed to pick only one priority bill, even this does not guarantee that the bill will be

Once a bill is out of committee, it

For the last two years I have selected my bill that would be a partial repeal of the motorcycle helmet law (LB393). LB393 was not heard last year and was defeated this year. Selecting a priority bill can be difficult, often times senators feel very strongly about most if not all of their bills.

I introduced six bills last year and of those only one of them made it out of committee and that was LB393. The other five bills that I introduced last year were still held in committee when we adjourned This year, I introduced three bills and as of right now only one of them has been advanced from committee. LB766 has 35 cosigners, six of whom sat on the committee which is holding it simply because the com-

mittee chairman refuses to act on it. A few people think that I wasted my priority designation both this year and last year but I think it I would be doing a disservice if I prioritized a bill that was destined to not advance from committee. In addition to senator priority bills, the speaker of the Legislature is allowed to select 25 Speaker Priority Bills. Last year, I requested that LB143 be considered for this and this year I asked that LB857 be considered - both still in committee when the request was made and both times the Speaker Priority's I requested were passed up. LB143 has since been killed by committee and LB857 is still in committee,

still with 35 cosigners. If you take anything away from reading this, I hope, it is that if you have a senator bring legislation on your behalf, work with them, follow their advice and do not be surprised

# Paarlberg addresses conventional ag during Heuermann Lecture series

That's not to say conventional agriculture won't have to make adjustments in the face of ongoing challenges from its detractors, said Robert Paarlberg, who spoke at the riculture has drastically cut inputs University of Nebraska-Lincoln as part of the Heuermann Lecture series. Conventional agriculture as practiced in states such as Nebraska "is under strong attack" from people who believe it is unhealthy, unsafe, environmentally unsustainable and socially unjust, Paarlberg said. These forces want a shift from large-scale, specialized, highly capitalized farming systems to smaller scale systems that integrate crop and livestock production. Instead of internationally traded foods, they want local foods and instead of genetically engineered food, they want organic food.

Paarlberg said this battle is being fought on several fronts – intellectual, commercial and policy.

Conventional ag already has lost on the first front, he added.

"As for who's winning in the tural arena, I would say flat out the advocates for alternative agriculture have already won," Paarlberg said. "Students come to my classes with their minds already made up." They've taken in "Food Inc.," Michael Pollan's "Omnivore's Dilemma" and other popular media attacks on modern agriculture and "they see this as a social cause."

Paarlberg said he's found one Agriculture and Natural Resources risks "social ostracism" by defending conventional agriculture in his state of Massachusetts.

In the commercial arena, detractors have made some progress in promoting changes in diets. Meat consumption and overall calorie consumption have dropped and a recent study shows the obesity rate among preschoolers is down.

"The activists' critique of the way we eat . . . is having an impact . . should welcome and celebrate," Paarlberg said.

Activists' promotion of organic agriculture and local marketing of food have led to advances in those areas too, but Paarlberg noted, they still

While genetically modified crops are used widely for animal feed and industrial use, they have "been stopped dead in their tracks for human food use," Paarlberg said. Ballot issues to require mandatory labeling of foods containing any genetically modified ingredient failed in Washington and California and

passed in Connecticut and Maine. "Conventional agriculture will be obliged to make concessions," Paarlberg concluded, but "those concessions aren't going to push conventional agriculture away from its preferred model" of highly capital-
