## Police kill dog after local attack

A dog that bit a 20-year old woman in the 700 block of Pearl Street was shot by Wayne Police Department officers after attempts to capture the dog failed.

According to Wayne Police Chief Marlen Chinn, a call was received of two dogs running at large early Wednesday evening, April 2. A second call was received noting that one of the dogs bit a female who was walking in the area. The woman was taken by private vehicle to Providence Medical Center for treatment.

Two officers responded to the location of where the dog that was responsible for the bite and attempted to capture the dog. Officers reported the dog became aggressive toward the officers and would not allow them to leave the porch where they had gone to attempt to contact an owner. The dog was hit with a taser after coming at one of the officers before running away from the scene.

The report further stated that a third officer arrived on the scene to capture the dog, which began running toward a group of young children about one-half of a block away. The officer got the dog's attention, and the dog chased the officer back inside his cruiser. As the dog attempted to get at an officer again, the officer shot and killed the dog.

The dog's owner was located, and no proof of vaccinations were known. The dog's body was to be sent to Kansas State University for rabies testing, and the woman who was bitten is undergoing precautionary treatment for rabies until test results become available.

Formal charges against the dog's owner are under review by the Wayne County Attorney's Office.

## 10th Elderfest comes next week

Ten years ago, a group of area residents got together to plan a day-long celebration "especially for our friends 55 years of age and over to celebrate the people who formed our communities and way of life."

A decade later, the event – known as Elderfest – continues to draw hundreds of guests from throughout northeast Nebraska to Wayne on the third Thursday of April.

This year's Elderfest will be held Thursday, April 17, and due to the fact that the event this year falls on Maundy Thursday, it will conclude with a dance on Thursday, May 1.

Doors at the Wayne City Auditorium open at 9 a.m., with free gifts to the first 300 guests in the door. Those attending

will also register for a travel certificate, gift cards and various door prizes. They will also be able to enjoy free pastries and coffee.

During the morning, nearly 40 vendors will have displays and exhibits in the auditorium.

At 10 a.m., Ray Peterson will provide accordion music, and at 11:30, winners of prizes from the various vendors will be announced.

Throughout the day, Wayne Historian Steve Gross will give presentations in the north meeting room of the auditorium.

After a lunch break from 11:30 a.m.-1 p.m., the afternoon activities kick off with music by Rich Patton from 1-2 p.m. From 2-2:20 p.m., Deb Daehnke will lead line

dance and will be followed from 2:20-3 p.m. with music by Mike and Julie Couch.

At 3 p.m., Brenda Nissen, The Bruflats and Dr. James Lindau will entertain the audience.

The popular brownie ice cream bar will be served from 3-3:45 p.m.

The afternoon will conclude with entertainment by the Ranch Ramblers.

Doors for the dance on Thursday, May 1 will open at 6 p.m., and hors d'oeuvres will be served during the dance. Music will be provided by the Burt Heithold Band.

When Doug Sturm graduated from Wayne in 1973, he had one destination in mind: Lincoln.

"I was never going to come back to Wayne," he said. "I was going to set the world on fire elsewhere."

So, to Lincoln he went.

While there, Sturm met a barber who asked him what he wanted to do with his life.

"You like people," the man told him.

"You want your own business," he said.

But, perhaps most of all, he noticed that Sturm had the gift of gab.

It was the perfect combination for a barber, and in 1976, Sturm started cutting hair.

A year later, he returned to Wayne. He found a job here, worked at it for three years and then, with the encouragement of an uncle and a local businessman, opened up his own place.

Today, Shear Designs can be found in

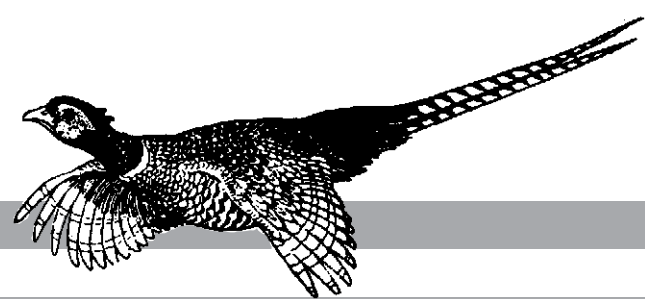

### LeRoy Herscheid

Services for LeRoy Arthur Herscheid, 87, were Tuesday, April 8, 2014 at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Norfolk. Burial was in Pleasant View Cemetery at Winside with military rites being rendered by American Legion Post 16, VFW Post 1644 and the Nebraska National Guard Honor Guard.

LeRoy Arthur Herscheid was born on May 5, 1926, at the hospital in Wayne, the son of Helena Baker Herscheid and Arthur William Herscheid. His family resided one mile south of Winside. He attended Winside Public Schools and graduated in 1943. LeRoy remembered Johnny Carson ushering people at the old Granada Theater. As a child, LeRoy enjoyed basketball, baseball and music. He played the clarinet in band. He especially loved listening to his mom play the piano. LeRoy was baptized and confirmed at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Wayne. On Jan. 25, 1951, LeRoy entered the US Army. It was a voluntary term of

two years, the required term was 10 months. His base was Camp McCoy in Wisconsin where he assisted with personnel processing. LeRoy courted Theresa Genieveve Tunink, after they met at the Skylon Ballroom in Hartington. They were married on Aug. 17, 1954, at St. Francis Catholic Church in Randolph. LeRoy and Theresa "re-built" their home in rural Stanton County room by room. Their family was a hard working farm family. LeRoy always wanted the best he could provide for the family. He was a past member of St. Peter's Catholic Church in Stanton.

He was very proud of his family and their involvement in the Wildcat Calf 4-H Club. He was honored for 60 years in the American Legion in 2013 and he was a life member of the VFW Post 1644 in Norfolk. In 1982, Herscheid Farms received the Nebraska Pioneer Farm Award presented by the Knights of AK-SAR-BEN to families who have owned the same farm for 100 years. LeRoy enjoyed talking, farming, investing, gambling, playing cards and most of all, spending time with his family. He was involved in farming, cattle feeding and the Herscheid Insurance Agency. LeRoy was an adjuster and supervisor for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation for nine years. The long term effects of his farming accident in 1964, caught up with him in later years. He semi-retired at the age of 76. However, he continued to give insight in the farming operation after moving to Norfolk. His physical limitations over the last 12 years were tough for him to accept. But after moving from Norfolk to the Colonial Haven Nursing Home in Beemer—he found himself enjoying learning about the staff, helping them find a "good" car deal, playing cards and serving as the Resident Leader. At the age of 80, LeRoy visited the municipality of Herscheid, Germany, and Paris, France, with Jan and Jerry and Kim.

Survivors include: daughter, Joan and Bub Johnson, of Lincoln, son, Jerry and Kim Herscheid, of West Point, daughter, Jan and James O'Tool, of Glenwood, Iowa, son, Jim and Shelly Herscheid, of Stanton; 14 grandchildren and nine great grandchildren; niece Marlyce Herscheid-Rohde and two great nephews.

He was preceded in death by his father, Arthur, mother, Helena, wife, Theresa, son Gayland and brother Marv (Bun) Herscheid.

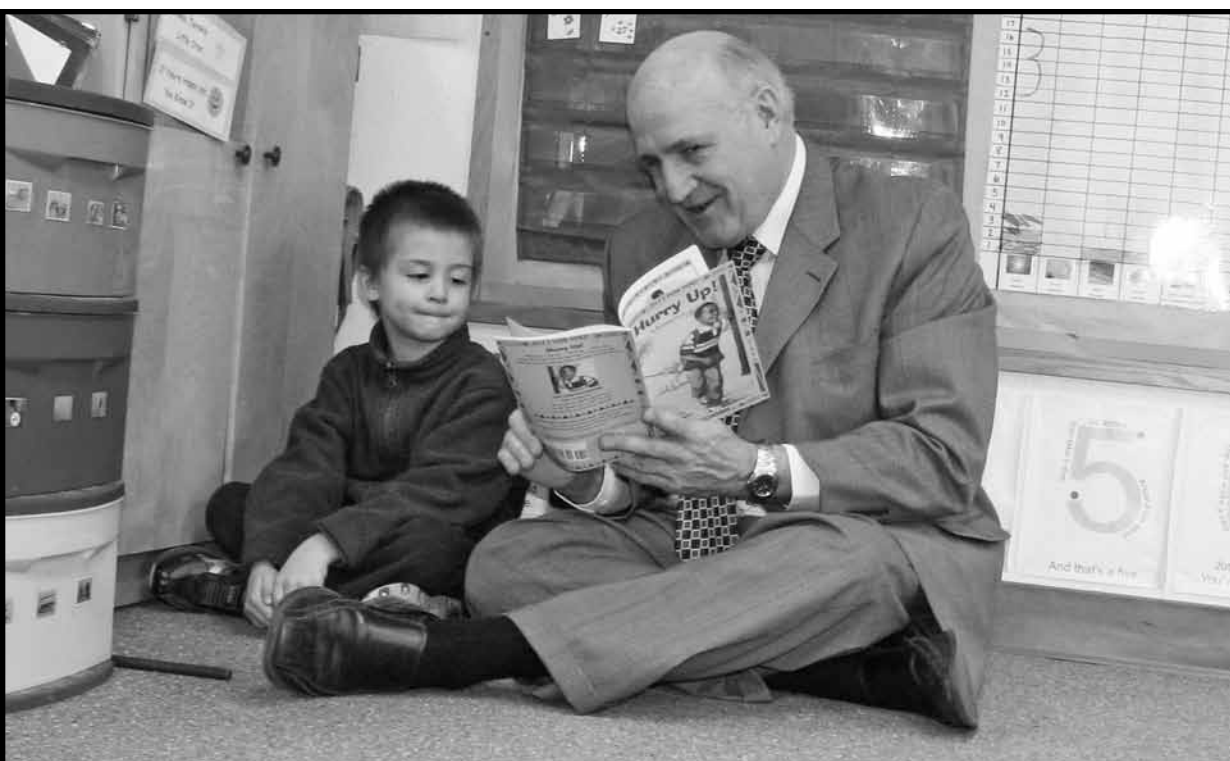

## Maly finishes 12th, golfers 17th at Pius

LINCOLN – The Wayne High boys golf team opened season play at one of Nebraska's elite golf courses Monday in Lincoln at Firethorn Golf Club.

The Blue Devils, like many teams, haven't had a lot of practice time with weather issues, and for four of the five players, it was the first time to ever see the course they were to play.

Inexperience showed as Wayne placed 17th out of the 20 participating teams with a 402. Lincoln Pius won their own invite with a 318, followed by Beatrice at 328 and Elkhorn South, 337. Columbus Scotus finished fourth at 343, and Omaha Skutt Catholic rounded out the top five at 349. The rest of the field in order went Lincoln Christian, 353; Waverly, 355; Mt. Michael, 365; Seward, 369; Pius X Green, 369; Hastings St. Cecilia, 373; York, 378; Fairbury, 379; Lincoln Lutheran, 379; Columbus Lakeview, 386; Crete, 389; Wayne, 402; Norris, 410; Nebraska City, 420 and Auburn, 430.

Individually, The Pius Gold team placed first, second and third, led by Nick Higgins with a 77. Justin Coffey fired a 78 and Joel Bittner, 79.

Blue Devil senior and number one golfer Kaje Maly earned a medal with a 12th-place finish after carding an 83.

"I wasn't expecting great scores by any means, but my expectations were a little higher than what we shot," coach Dave Hix said. "Kaje did a great job finishing 12th. The back nine played very tough with wind and lack of course knowledge."

"I was pretty impressed with Jalen Barry and how he handled himself around the course," Hix added. "Not knowing a thing about the competitive side of golf, he did a great job for his first-ever golf competition."

Hix said his squad will improve. "It's always a process, and we need to step it up and make the necessary changes to our game," Hix said.

Wayne will compete at the Albion Invite on Thursday.

Mineshaft Mall in downtown Wayne. It's relocated once since it opened up shop in 1980 – a move that meant picking everything up and hauling it over to a spot across the hall.

"It was tiny and dark in there," Rachel Judd, who works alongside Sturm, said of the business' first site. "I didn't like it."

Their current place, where the two have been since the fall of 2011, is larger – and brighter – and there's room for both her and Sturm to offer their respective services.

Though Judd has only been with Shear Designs for a few years – she joined Sturm in December of 2010, after he hired her in what he laughingly calls a "weak" moment – she's become an integral part of the business, adding her skills in hair, nails and waxing to his barber services.

Judd's thankful for her loyal clientele – customers who have followed her from The Hair Studio, where she worked before it closed its doors – and Sturm feels the same about those who have stopped by after the shop first opened 34 years ago.

Before Betty Henzler and her husband, Gerald, retired, they worked on a farm, where regular duties included milking cows, and family vacations weren't really possible because it was difficult to find someone to take over the chores.

"If it wasn't a one-day event, you couldn't do it," Henzler said.

Thanks to retirement and the gift of \$1,000 – a prize the Henzlers received at last year's Elderfest celebration – the couple was afforded something their cow-milking years didn't allow: a four-day trip that they shared with their son, daughter, son-in-law and granddaughter.

The group attended Cheyenne Frontier Days in Cheyenne, Wyo., where they got to take in the event's famed outdoor rodeo. Stops were also made at destinations in Colorado, including Estes and Rocky Mountain National Parks, two places Henzler and her husband had not previously visited but were fortunate enough to see before the area was blighted by flooding last year.

"We had a lot of fun with it," Henzler said about the certificate.

She and her husband aren't new to Elderfest. The annual day-long

celebration, which is scheduled for the third Thursday in April, attracts older adults from all across the area. The Henzlers try to go every year, and the event is that much more special to them because it falls right around their wedding anniversary.

Last year, they were lucky enough to toast the evening with \$1,000 to help take them wherever they wanted.

To be eligible for the certificate, entrants must be 55 or older, and they have to consent to an interview with The Wayne Herald so that it can be featured in a story the following year.

Cinda Brudigam, who helps coordinate Elderfest, explained that there are no limitations regarding where the certificate can be used. If the recipient wants to travel throughout Nebraska with it, they can. If they want to take it outside

state lines, that's fine too.

The chance to travel is possible with donations given by area businesses. It's one of many door prizes given away at Elderfest – including this year's event, set for Thursday, April 17 – and, over the years, has become an important element of the event.

"It's part of our celebration," Brudigam said. "It gives someone an opportunity they wouldn't have otherwise."

Though \$1,000 is the top prize, smaller certificates have been given out in the past. The gifts – combined with a day of food, music and dancing – are how the organizers of the event strive to make it a memorable one.

"I think they do a great job," Henzler said about the people who make Elderfest – and the travel gifts – possible. "I just thank them for the opportunity to go."

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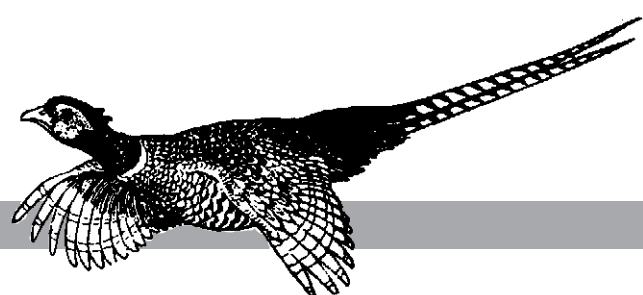

# Good day for area athletes at Wayne

## Wayne, Wakefield combine for eight first-place efforts

The Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce couldn't have ordered up a much better day for a track meet than the one enjoyed by those competing at Tuesday's Blue Devil Invitational.

With sunny skies and a slight, cool breeze serving as a reminder that it still is April in Nebraska, athletes from Wayne and Wakefield put together some nice efforts to highlight both schools' days on the track and in the field events at the Wayne High track.

The Wayne High teams both finished well, with the girls placing third and the boys fifth among the eight schools competing in the afternoon invitational. The girls finished 19 points away from the top spot and five out of the runner-up placing, while the boys were solid performers in the middle of the pack.

Wakefield didn't have the depth of the top teams in the meet, but still performed well and came away with some excellent efforts. The Trojan girls tied for fifth on the day while the Wakefield boys finished right behind the host team in sixth place.

"I thought we had a pretty good day," Wayne coach Dale Hochstein said. "The kids competed pretty hard today. We wanted to start and end the meet well on the track, and the boys especially did a great job of that by winning the 3,200 and 1,600 relays."

The boys were without the services of Tayib Toussaint, who tweaked a hamstring during warmups for the long jump. Still, they won two relays and had a number of top-six finishes to put together a good day on the track.

"We had quite a few kids place in some different things and pick up some points all over the place," Hochstein said.

The 3,200-meter relay of Cornelio Espino, Nolan Reynolds, Wyatt Martian and Ben Hoskins got the day started right with a first-place finish, and Espino was joined by Demetrius Alexander and brothers Tyler and Trevor Pecena on the winning 1,600-meter relay team that closed out the day's activities.

Wayne High's boys got a number of good individual performances. Alexander was the runner-up in both

the 100 and 200, Hoskins took second in the 1,600 and was fourth in the high jump, Espino was fifth in the 800, and Trevor Pecena took fifth in the 400. The freshman relay team also finished second in a non-scoring event.

On the girls side, the Blue Devils had one of its best home performances as a team in some time, finishing five points out of the runner-up spot and winning three events.

"A flip of a place here or there would have made a difference, and I think the 113 points we scored is more than we've scored in a while as a team, so that was good to see," Hochstein said.

Wayne got wins from Emily Pulfer in the 3,200 and Ashton Schweers in the high jump and earned a 1-2 finish in the shot put with Danica Schaefer edging out teammate Victoria Kranz by three inches.

"That was really nice to see those two girls finish 1-2, especially with some of the teams here who are in our district. If you can finish in the top two or three, that's going to make a big difference," Hochstein said.

Wayne's 400-meter and freshmen medley relays both finished second on the day, while the 1,600- and 3,200-meter relays both placed

## 82 teams battle at rugby tourney

More than 80 teams descended upon Wayne, America this past weekend for the 13th annual March Madness and Mayhem rugby tournament at the Wayne Rugby Park.

Both Wayne State rugby teams represented themselves well in the two-day tournament. The women's teams went a combined 6-0 on the weekend, while the men fell one game short of qualifying for the 7-on-7 Elite Eight tournament later this spring in Philadelphia.

The Wayne State women's team split into two teams and both went

3-0 on the day. The A team posted a trifecta of shutouts, beating St. Benedict (41-0), St. Thomas (24-0) and Minnesota Morris (21-0). The B team was also successful with wins over Chadron State (19-0), Northern Colorado (24-5) and Wisconsin-River Falls (19-10).

The Wayne State men organized as a 7-on-7 team for this year's tournament to play in a regional that would send the winner to the Rugby 7's national tournament May 31-June 1 in Philadelphia.

The 7-on-7 format is a much different and faster-paced game

than the traditional 15-on-15 format. Games are generally higher-scoring and move a lot faster, with teams playing two 10-minute halves instead of the traditional 80-minute game.

The Wayne State men's team went 2-0-1 in their pool, posting wins over Creighton (31-0) and Wisconsin-River Falls (27-0) and playing New Mexico Highlands to a 19-19 tie.

The Wildcat men came from behind to beat Wisconsin-Parkside

# 'Cats take 3 of 4 from Cougars

Wayne State improved to 15-11 overall and 8-4 in the NSIC after winning three of four from University of Sioux Falls over the weekend.

On Monday, Zak Leighton was 5-for-8 while senior first baseman C.J. Nolen went 3-for-6 and extended his hitting streak to 14 games to lead Wayne State in a 5-3, 13-3 sweep of the Cougars at the Chapman Complex.

In the opener, the Wildcats overcame an early 3-0 deficit and scored two runs in the bottom of the sixth to claim the victory. Nolen had a two-run double, and Nick McIntee added an RBI single in the third that tied the game up at 3-3.

That set the stage for the sixth inning, as Chris May singled and scored the go-ahead run on Leighton's single to center. Jake Perez hit a sacrifice fly that scored Leighton for the 5-3 lead. Reliever Curtis Bussard came on in the seventh inning and shut down the Cougars to earn his fourth save of the season.

Junior reliever Ryan Zweck worked the sixth inning to get the win, allowing one hit. Starter Dylan McGill yielded three runs on six hits over four innings with five strikeouts and one walk.

The second game saw Wayne State erupt for seven runs in the sixth inning as the Wildcats finished off the Cougars to take the weekend series.

The big inning came on seven hits and two USF errors. Big hits included O'Neil's two-run double, a two-run single from Herman and RBI singles from McIntee, Perez and Alex Kref. Junior righthander Nick Ragan pitched six strong innings to earn the win, allowing three runs on six hits with four strikeouts and two walks.

On Sunday, Eric Browning fired a three-hit shutout with nine strikeouts in the first game to help Wayne State earn a split with the Cougars. The Wildcats won the opener 3-0 but fell in the nightcap 5-4.

A three-run third inning and the stellar pitching of Browning were the stories of the first game. Nolen's double down the right field line scored Alex Kref with the first run, Perez singled up the middle to score Nolen and later came home on a Nick McIntee single through the left side.

Browning did the rest of the work, as he fired a three-hit shutout with nine strikeouts and one walk to improve to 4-2 on the season.

The second game saw Sioux Falls snap a 4-4 tie with a run in the eighth to edge the Wildcats, 5-4.

Wayne State took a 1-0 lead in the second on Bussard's double that scored McIntee, who doubled earlier.

Sioux Falls scored two runs in the third and fifth innings to take a 4-1 lead, but Wayne State responded with a three-run fifth to even the score at 4-4. Sioux Falls regained the lead in the eighth and hung on to get the split.

McIntee finished 2-for-3 with a double and two runs scored while Bussard was 2-for-4 with a double and RBI to highlight an eight-hit attack.

In other action, a season-high 17 hits in the second game allowed Wayne State to salvage a home with the University of Mary. The visiting Marauders won the first game 9-1, but Wayne State came back to take the second game 12-4.

The first game saw Mary score four runs in the fifth inning and four more in the seventh to take the win. Wayne State was limited to just five hits in the contest and scored its only run of the game in the fourth when Nolen walked and scored on Aaron Molinaro's single to right. John Roberts suffered the pitching loss, allowing five runs on eight hits over 4 2/3 innings with three strikeouts and two walks.

The second game saw the Wildcats rebound with a season-high 17 hits while overcoming an early 4-0 deficit.

Individually, Wayne had three medalists in the 100-meter dash with Meagan Backer taking third, Rachel Rauner fourth and Jalyn Zeiss fifth. Rauner and Backer were fourth and sixth, respectively, in the 200, while Zeiss was fourth in the 300 hurdles.

Angie Nelson was second, and Alyssa Schmale placed sixth in the 800. Paige Wacker was sixth in the discus, Tarah Stegemann was third in the long jump, Cassie Heier was fourth in the triple jump, and Pulfer added a sixth in the 1,600.

"All four of our relays finished in the top three, and that's pretty solid," Hochstein said. "I was really pleased with our performance today and hope we can continue to improve."

Wakefield showed some good things on both sides of the ledger Tuesday, claiming first-place finishes in three events.

Josh Dolph had a hand in two wins on the day, claiming top honors in the 800 and 1,600-meter runs with two solid efforts in his first major track test since ankle surgery after last year's state meet.

"We've been expecting some good things from him, and he got that ankle taken care of and is running

100 percent for the first time since he was a freshman," coach Mike Hassler said. "I was really pleased with his time in the 800, and it was good to see him get first in the mile as well."

Dolph won the 800 in a solid time of 2:02.9, then outpaced Hoskins of Wayne to break the five-minute plateau with a time of 4:59.0.

The other win of the day came on the girls side, as Josephine Peitz broke away from a busy pack on the final lap to take top honors in the 1,600-meter run. Peitz was cruising at the third and fourth position on the bell lap but turned things on in the final 200 meters to come away with the win.

"Coming into today, we knew there would be some tough competition for her to go up against, and to really go out and compete the way she did was really great to see," Hassler said. "If she can stay in contact with that lead group going into the last lap, she's got plenty of kick left, and we knew she'd have a chance."

Wakefield's boys got some good medal-winning efforts in the field events as well, as Anthony Gustafson was third in the high jump and a surprising fourth in the long jump with a best leap of 20 feet, 1 1/2 inches.

"He's been working on some things with his approach in the high jump, and we're getting some things fixed there, but he went over 20 feet in the long jump, and that was a nice surprise," Hassler said.

Wakefield also scored with Jacob Newton placing fifth in the 1,600 and sixth in the 3,200. Nick Gonzalez was sixth in the 1,600, and Dolph placed sixth in the 400.

Also scoring for the Trojan girls was Savannah Nelson, who placed third in the 400. Peitz and Taryn Hingst were fourth and sixth, respectively, in the 3,200, and the girls 3,200-meter relay team finished fourth on the day while the freshmen medley took fourth.

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Nebraska customers can save money, energy with new light incentive

Columbus, NE - On Jan. 1, 2014, Nebraska Public Power District and its wholesale customer utilities began offering incentives to residential electric customers for the purchase and installation of light-emitting diode (LED) bulbs.

At the start of this new 2014 year, final provisions of the 2007 Energy Policy Act began phasing out the standard, 60-watt, incandescent light bulb. Production and importation of the 100-watt and 75-watt standard incandescent lamps have already been closed out over the past two years under the same policy.

Fortunately, customers have an excellent alternative. City of Wayne Electric utilities will provide customers with a \$5 account credit for each 60, 75, or 100-watt LED equivalent to the standard bulb they buy, with up to 10 credits available per residential account this year. Customers can purchase these LED lamps wherever they desire, but the package must be identified as ENERGY STAR® qualified.

The Environmental Protection Agency's ENERGY STAR program encourages installation of LED lamps that use 75 to 80 percent less energy than equivalent incandescent light bulbs and have a rated life that is 25 to 50 times longer. LEDs do not contain mercury, which eliminates some disposal concerns.

LED lamps offer additional advantages over compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs), which have long been touted as energy-efficient alternatives to standard light bulbs. LEDs illuminate instantly when their power switch is turned on. Their light output is not diminished in cold weather. In fact, LEDs last longer in cold areas. LEDs offer a variety of color temperatures that allow customers to match the appearance of standard incandescent bulbs or the bright white of most office environments. Many LED lamps are dimmable, but customers should confirm this prior to purchase, as manufacturers are required to indicate whether they are or not on the packaging.

NPPD and its wholesale customer utilities are contributing approximately \$100,000 toward this campaign which will run through the end of December 2014. To receive the incentive, customers submit a completed program application along with a copy of their sales receipt to their local electric utility. 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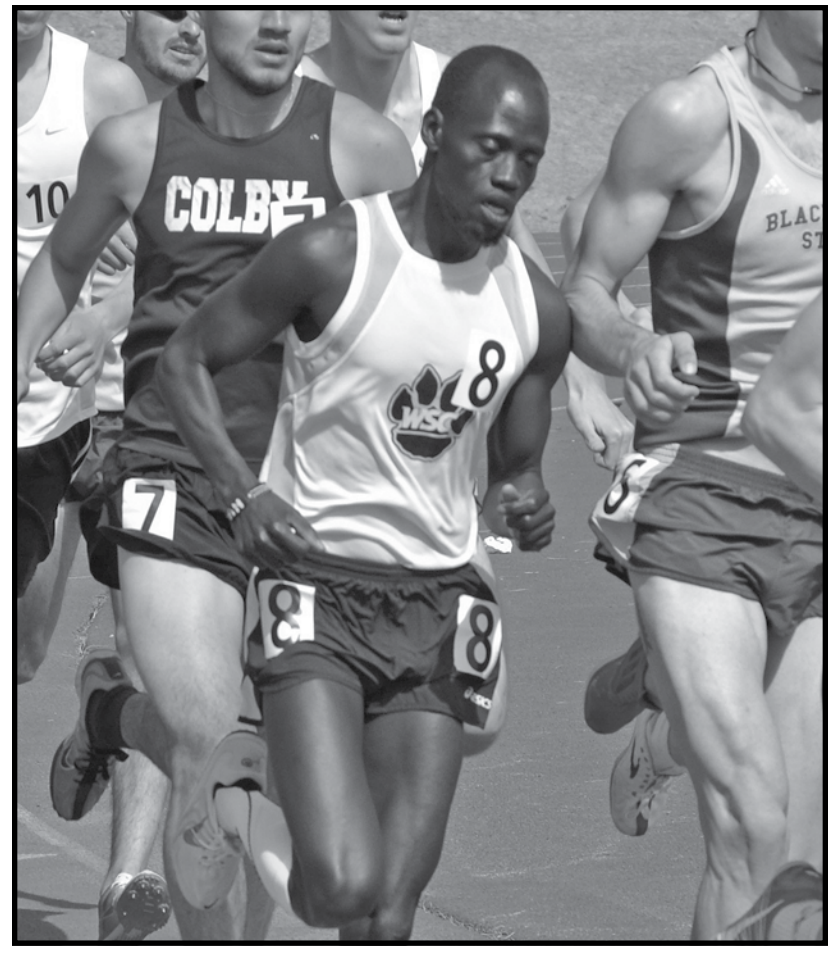

Wells took first in the discus with a new school record and NCAA provisional throw of 164 feet to edge the previous school mark of 163-7 she set last May at the NCAA Div. II outdoor national championships. The junior also captured first place in the shot put with a top mark of 47-9.

Wayne senior Carly Fehringer registered another first-place finish in the hammer throw with a mark of 195-9. Senior Emily Wells was second at 174-3, with junior Mackenzie Masching eighth at 156-1.

Other top 10 finishers in field events included Fehringer finishing fifth in the shot put (44-9), Jessi Pongratz was eighth in the shot put (42-8 3/4) and Michaela Dendinger ninth in the discus at 138-3.

Another first-place finish was recorded by junior Rebecca Davenport in the 400-meter hurdles, crossing the line in a time of 1:06.30. Fresh-

man Elizabeth Pille took sixth at 1:09.70.

Alexis Guhl and Megan Svitak placed second and third, respectively, in the 100-meter hurdles with times of 15.08 and 15.24 seconds.

Other top Wildcat finishers included freshman Cristina Murillo placing fifth in the 1,500-meter run (5:08.49), and Megan Svitak took eighth in the long jump (17-3 1/4). The 1,600-meter relay team of Pille, Danielle Hart, Davenport and Mary Alderson came in sixth place with a time of 4:16.14 while the "B" team of Guhl, Emily Kaup, Skyler Lippman and Murillo took eighth at 4:31.78.

On the men's side, Jared Balady's third place finish in the 400-meter hurdles was the top finish Saturday for the Wayne State men. Balady placed third with a time of 55.93 seconds.

Senior distance runner Garang Lual took sixth in the 1,500-meter run with a time of 4:10.63. Senior sprinter Mike King was eighth in the 200-meter dash (22.53), while Wayne junior Zach Thomsen had an eighth-place finish in the 800-meter run with a time of 1:57.99.

The men's 1,600-meter relay

team of Balady, Mickey Doerr, Steven Varela and Thomsen came in seventh with a time of 3:28.57.

Wayne State will compete in a pair of meets this weekend, participating in the Sioux City Relays on Friday and Saturday and the Concordia Invitational in Seward on Saturday.

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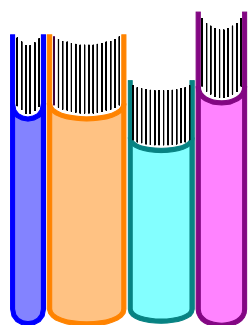
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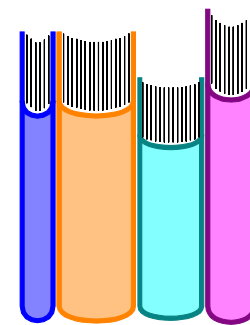

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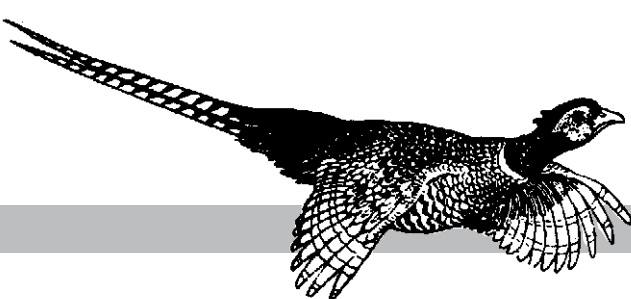

## Don't get me started

## State champion stands up to NSAA

If you are a fan of the comic strip "Dilbert," you are probably aware of the "Dilbert Principle."

Scott Adams, creator of the Dilbert Principle, once described the concept as follows:

"I wrote The Dilbert Principle around the concept that in many cases the least competent, least smart people are promoted, simply because they're the ones you don't want doing actual work. You want them ordering the doughnuts and yelling at people for not doing their assignments - you know, the easy work. Your heart surgeons and your computer programmers - your smart people - aren't in management. That principle was literally happening everywhere."

Including, it would seem, at the Nebraska School Activities Association, where their perceived efforts to avoid controversy wound up creating - thaaaaa's right - even more controversy.

At the recent state speech championships, a talented young man from Gordon-Rushville High School won a state title with a series of poems, including one called "Swing Set" by Andrea Gibson, written as a first-person account of a young lesbian kindergarten teacher whose young students wonder if she is male or female.

This young man, Michael Barth, used this speech at every level of competition, from in-season events to district and state, where he won a gold medal. He was one of a number of state speech champions who were invited to Lincoln for a taping of some of the top performances that will air on the ETV network at 9 a.m. on Easter Sunday.

A few days before the taping, however, the executive director of the NSAA, Rhonda Blanford-Green, determined that the young man's reading was inappropriate for broadcast because it might be controversial and cast the NSAA in a light where it endorsed the content, informing him that he would have to read a different poem in place of the "offensive" one.

And, as all good speech enthusiasts and defenders of our God-given freedom of speech are wont to do, he told her to, in so many words, go pound sand.

And, as has become the norm whenever otherwise-intelligent administrators take leave of their senses in announcing a decision that is completely lacking in logic or common sense, their mental hiccup finds life on social media, creating a nationwide firestorm of controversy - a zillion times more than ever would have come as the result of whatever shortsighted, dim-witted viewers might think of the content of the poem the young man would be reading.

Within a couple of days, the NSAA (which, if you're around sports writers long enough, stands for No Sense At All) was in its usual full backpedal mode, undoing a decision they had done and said they would NOT back down on, and Blanford-Green put a spin job on the situation that would make even the most dedicated public relations guru's eyes shoot out of his skull in disbelief:

"We were encouraged by the amount of support for Michael and freedom of speech . . . The intent of my decision was not to stifle freedom of speech, but rather to avoid any negative connotations for individuals within this statewide production."

Hogwash.

Blanford-Green was still stinging from the backlash of criticism she received last year when she tried to force through a non-discrimination policy for transgender students. The NSAA Board of Control had not discussed the matter, and she ultimately had to back track and the board decided to let local school districts handle the issue.

There was no logical reason for her to get involved in this situation, either. Mr. Barth's speech was approved by his speech coach, and the content did not violate any rules or regulations regarding content that are in place for speech competitions. The young man perfected his work, even going so far as to edit some of the profanity in the original prose to make it competition-friendly. He competed with that allegedly-controversial speech at the local level, used it again at the district level to qualify for state and then won a state title using the exact same speech.

And then, when given a chance to showcase the work that made him a state champion, Blanford-Green tried to act like she understands the moral consciousness of the people of the state by telling him he couldn't use that speech in his videotaped showcase - this would be like telling a left-handed basketball player who led his team to a state championship that he'd have to replay the game right-handed if he wanted to play on TV. As a result, she not only brought on infinitely more controversy than the speech's content could have ever possibly created, forced the NSAA to - once again - have to back away from a narrow-minded position that was never completely thought out, and make the state of Nebraska look like even bigger backwood country-bumpkin buffoons than we are already perceived as by people in other parts of the country.

I'm thrilled that this young man has stood up to the intolerance and the incompetence displayed by the administration of the NSAA. Enough of our freedoms are being violated, or otherwise compromised, in today's society, and it's high time somebody stand up to this intolerance that has been exhibited by controversy-seeking individuals and organizations.

# Prison reform or property taxes?

In the waning days of the Second Session of the 103rd Nebraska Legislature, one has to wonder if spending money on prison reform can survive a lame duck governor who has already vetoed millions of dollars to allegedly provide property tax relief.

The Legislature's Judiciary Committee has advanced a measure (LB907), which appears to address numerous problems with the system, and is broadly aimed at reducing recidivism. Much of the bill was brought on by the case of Nikko Jenkins, an Omaha man paroled last summer, who is alleged to have killed four people within weeks of his release. A state ombudsman's report concluded that Jenkins repeatedly asked for mental health help, which he never received.

Gov. Dave Heineman was an early proponent of prison reform but came down on the side of doing away with good time - a measure that cuts an inmate's sentence in half for every good day (no infractions or write-ups) the inmate serves - in favor of something he called earned time. Prison officials and Judiciary Committee Chairman Sen. Brad Ashford of Omaha say good time is a valuable tool for controlling inmate behavior. Good time, they point out, is also important given the current overcrowding in the state's prison system.

The governor has already vetoed \$65 million from the state budget with a directive to use some of it to fund property tax relief. Included in that amount was millions earmarked for fixing the aging and failing HVAC system at the State Capitol as well as a proposed \$2.5 million to build four courtyard fountains to complete the final design work of the building which is one of the outstanding architectural wonders in the country.

Property taxes are assessed, levied and collected by local governments based on guidelines developed and approved by the state.



Exactly where the state will "throw" money to address the property tax problem remains to be seen. But it is obvious that this governor, who has spent more time in office (10 years) than any other governor, wants property tax relief to be his legacy. The question remains if prison reform will have a place in that legacy as well.

Heineman has talked tough on prison issues, saying that those who don't support his stand against good time are soft on crime. There has been plenty of push-back from the legislative branch, perhaps enough to shepherd this \$14 million in prison reform through final reading and past a likely veto by the governor. The governor has said he wants to be dynamic in looking at issues and not be locked into one strategy. That dynamic failed when a specially appointed tax committee failed to recommend significant changes late

last year and left throwing money at the problem as the primary strategy.

So now we have the prison reform bill which would: give the Office of Probation Administration \$5 million to expand mental health services and \$3.8 million to expand new reporting centers to better monitor parolees; \$5 million to the Nebraska Crime Commission for the vocational and life skills program to train inmates to do something productive; and \$200,000 to establish the Nebraska Center for Justice Research at the University of Nebraska at Omaha to get to the root cause of the issues which are generally emotionally charged. The measure would also create a re-entry program coordinator to advise corrections officials regarding programs that transition inmates into communities; and require the state Department of Correctional Services

to ensure that an inmate's rehabilitation/re-entry program is complete or near completion upon the inmate serving 80 percent of his or her sentence.

In addition, an Ashford amendment to the bill would create the Nebraska Justice Reinvestment Working Group -- which would include state senators, correctional and law enforcement officials, judges, attorneys, community members and former inmates - to assist the Council of State Governments Justice Center in producing a report that prescribes how to reduce prison overcrowding to 125 percent within five years.

That all sounds like prison reform. None of it sounds like anybody is being soft on crime. Let's hope it survives the property tax relief penchant of a term-limited governor.

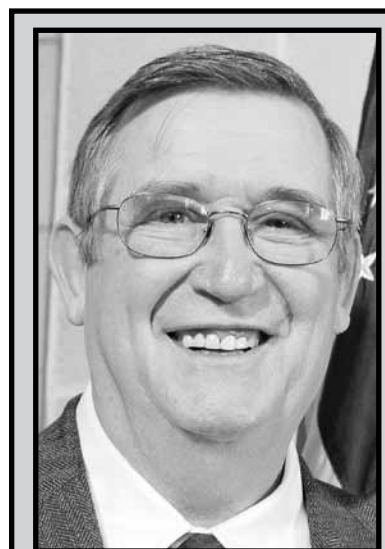
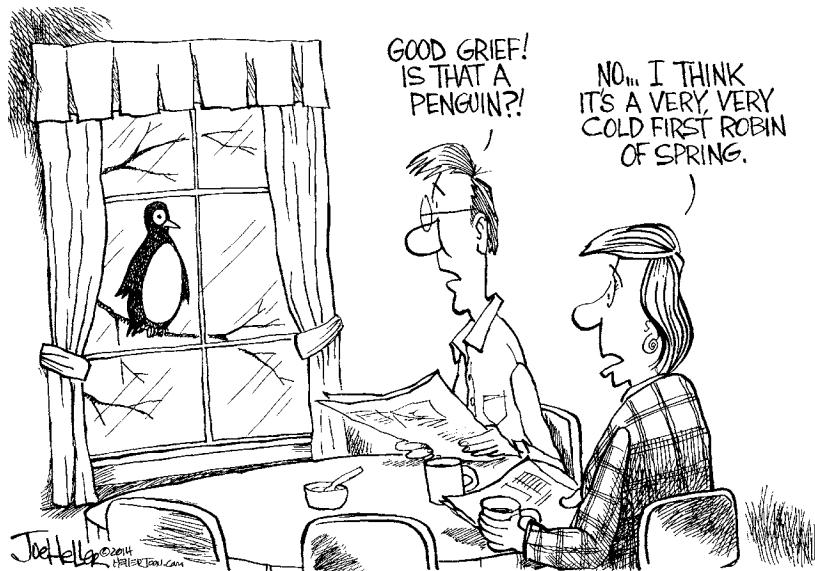
# Veto overrides a bad April Fools joke

What a week it has been in the Legislature. Governor Heineman announced that he used his "red pen" to veto about \$65.3 million from the almost \$8 billion budget that the Legislature had sent him.

Because the vetoes were on budget bills, the Appropriations Committee met to address the vetoes and make their recommendations. This year, the Appropriations Committee decided to address the Gov-

ernor's vetoes in one package - all or nothing! Attempts were made to pull out specific veto items but all were unsuccessful.

On April Fool's Day, the Legislature moved to override the budget vetoes, and it was successful. I wish I could tell you it was a bad April Fool's joke, but it is not. The supporters of the override would have you believe that most Nebraskans feel that spending \$2.5 million on

fountains to be placed in the four Capitol courtyards is a priority - I fought this on General File and Select File. I still believe it is a poor use of your money.

The Governor also vetoed LB671, Sen. Ernie Chambers' bill that would eliminate the mountain lion hunting season. After an unsuccessful attempt to override the Governor, Sen. Chambers moved to reconsider the vote. The motion to reconsider was successful so we had yet one more vote to attempt to override the veto. The final vote to override the veto failed. For now, the mountain lion hunting season is

still allowed, but I am fairly confident that this bill will be back next year.

This week there was an attempt to raise the minimum wage in the state. LB943, introduced by Sen. Jeremy Nordquist of Omaha, would have raised the minimum wage from \$7.25 an hour to \$9 over the next three years. LB943 was five votes short of the 25 it needed to advance.

We defeated LB935, introduced by Mike Gloor. This bill was in response to the Central Nebraska Veterans Home being moved from Grand Island to Kearney. It was a bill that represented terrible public policy that would have had huge impacts on the future placements of government services.

We debated and gave first round approval to LB976, introduced by Sen. Russ Karpisek of Wilber, which would change the procedure for the redistricting process. There is still much work to be done on this bill but it seems to be moving in the right direction.

We also passed, on the first round, LB383 a bill introduced by Sen. Charlie Janssen which allows our veterans to acquire a "Pride" license plate for an additional fee. While this is probably not the most important thing that we have done, I know it means a great deal to some of our veterans.

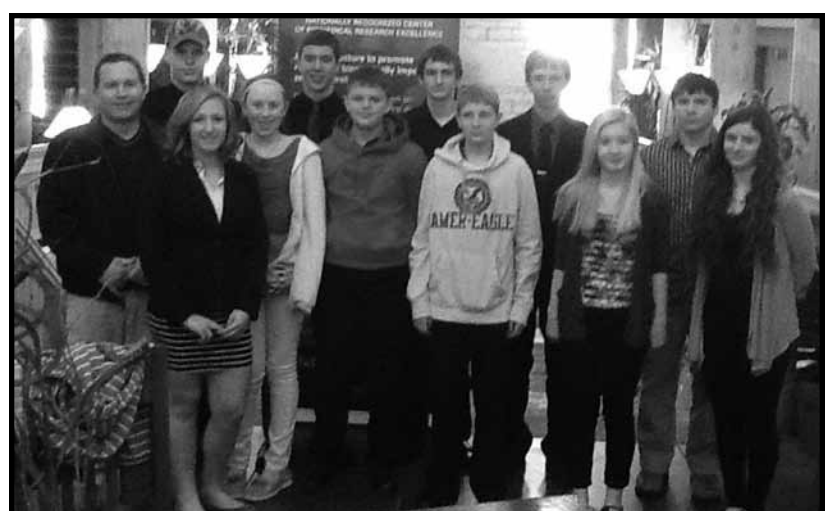

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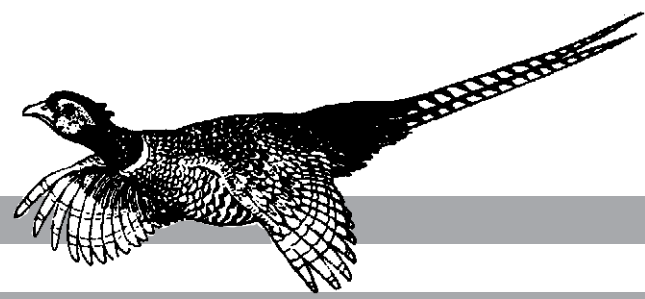

## Safe egg handling for Easter

**NOTE:** Information provided by the Nebraska Department of Agriculture, Poultry & Egg Division.

There are some important safe handling methods to remember this time of year when you're decorating, cooking or hiding Easter eggs since eggs are handled a great deal more than usual around Easter. Remember to:

Wash your hands thoroughly

with hot soapy water and rinse them before handling the eggs when cooking, cooling, dyeing and hiding them.

Be sure and inspect the eggs before purchasing them, making sure they are not dirty or cracked. Dangerous bacteria may enter a cracked egg.

Store eggs in their original cartons in the refrigerator rather than the refrigerator door.

If you're having an Easter egg hunt, consider hiding places carefully. Avoid areas where the eggs might come into contact with pets,

Make sure you find all the eggs you've hidden and then refrigerate them. Discard cracked eggs.

As long as the eggs are NOT out of refrigeration over two hours, they will be safe to eat. Do not eat eggs that have been out of refrigeration more than two hours. Refrigerate hard-cooked eggs in their shells and use them within 1 week. If you are planning to use colored eggs as decorations, (for centerpieces, etc.) where the eggs will be out of refrigeration for many hours or several days, discard them after they have served their decorative purpose.

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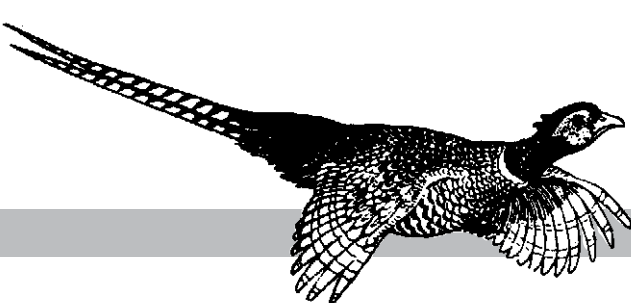

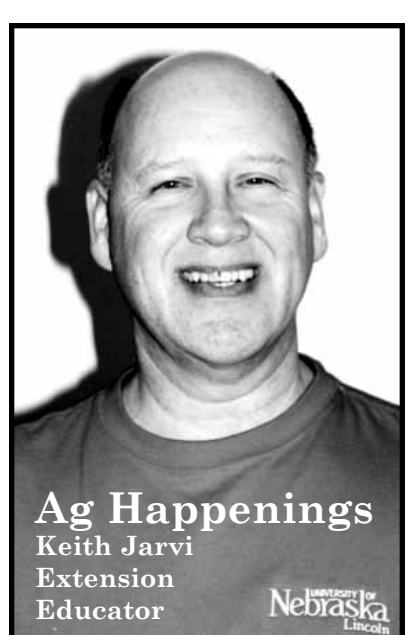
## Advice offered on pruning raspberries, grapes

Here are some more tips from Kelly Feedhan, Extension Educator from Columbus. While most plants are not harmed by pruning at the wrong time of year, there are better times of the year to prune than others. The times listed here are considered the ideal times to prune these plants.

We are still in the midst of the pruning season. Go ahead and prune shade trees, fruit trees, summer blooming shrubs, grapes and raspberries. It is also a good time to prune evergreens like Japanese yew, Junipers, Arborvitae, and spruce. Wait to prune pines until they begin to grow, called candlering, typically in late May or early June.

Hold off on pruning roses until mid to late April to avoid additional winter injury on these plants. When pruning, use sharp pruning tools, make correct cuts, and avoid over pruning which stresses plants and leads to sucker growth. The exception is when renovating overgrown, multi-stemmed shrubs. To do this, the shrubs are severely pruned to about one foot tall in February or March.

When it comes to fruiting plants, like grapes and raspberries, it is important to understand on what age wood fruit is produced for each crop or cultivar. All grapes produce fruit only on new growth that occurs each

spring from buds on one year old canes or last years' new growth. This is why grapes are pruned severely each spring if they are grown for fruit production.

Due to this fruiting habit, most grapes are trained to a specific system. If interested in producing good yields of quality grapes, learn more about grape training systems. One resource to use is Missouri Extensions Home Fruit Production: Grape

Training Systems at extension.missouri.edu/pg6090.

For the purpose of this article, understand that while grapes need severe pruning each spring, this does not mean cutting them close to the ground as is done with some other vines and for shrub renovation. If this were done, one year canes from which shoots that produce fruit grow would be removed.

How and when to prune raspberries depends on what type and cultivar of raspberry you have. The roots and crowns of all raspberries live from year to year. The canes or stems can live for up to two years. Red raspberries are divided into two groups, summer-bearing and fall-bearing. Summer-bearing plants produce one large crop of fruit in early summer on second year canes.

Fall-bearing plants, sometimes called everbearing raspberries, produce a small crop of fruits in summer on the lower portion of one-year old canes and then a larger crop in late summer on current year canes.

Many growers manage fall-bearing raspberries to produce only one large fall crop. To do this, simply prune all canes of fall-bearing raspberries back to three to four inches tall each March.

For summer-bearing raspberries,

pruning at this time of year consists of removing only the canes that produced fruit last summer since these canes are dead. If these fruiting canes were removed after harvest last summer; no pruning may be needed at this time of year on summer-bearing plants.

For summer-bearing plants, leave the one year old canes on which fruit will be produced this year. If the patch is quite dense, a few of the one year old canes could be removed now to thin the patch. This allows for better light penetration and air movement.

We'll have you drop it on the concrete and someone will take it down to get the work done on it.

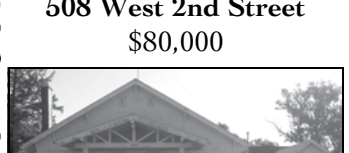

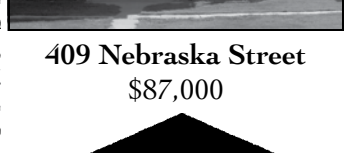

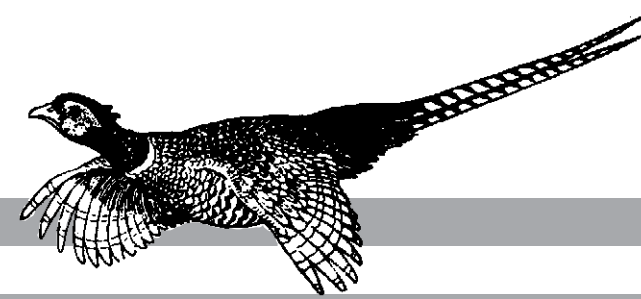
