Police kill dog after local attack

A dog that bit a 20-year old woman in the 700 block of Pearl Street was shot by Wayne Police Department officers after attempts to capture the dog

According to Wayne Police Chief Marlen Chinn, a call was received of two dogs running at large early Wednesday evening, April 2. A second call was received noting that one of the dogs bit a female who was walking in the area. The woman was taken by private vehicle to Providence Medical Center for treatment.

Two officers responded to the location of where the dog that was responsible for the bite and attempted to capture the dog. Officers reported the dog became aggressive toward the officers and would not allow them to leave the porch where they had gone to attempt to contact an owner. The dog was hit with a taser after coming at one of the officers before running away from the

The report further stated that a third officer arrived on the scene to capture the dog, which began running toward a group of young children about one-half of a block away. The officer got the dog's attention, and the dog chased the officer back inside his cruiser. As the dog attempted to get at an officer again, the officer shot and killed the dog.

The dog's owner was located, and no proof of vaccinations were known. The dog's body was to be sent to Kansas State University for rabies testing, and the woman who was bitten is undergoing precautionary treatment for rabies until test results become avail-

Formal charges against the dog's owner are under review by the Wayne County Attorney's Office.

years ago.

"I've had a good business ever Mineshaft Mall in downtown since," he said. "I want to thank all the clients of mine who have made this business successful.



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



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Nebraska customers can save money, energy with new light incentive

The Environmental Protection Agency's ENERGY STAR program encourages installation of LED lamps that use 75 to 80 percent less energy than equivalent incandescent light bulbs and have a rated life that is 25 to 50 times longer. LEDs do not contain mercury, which eliminates some disposal concerns.

LED lamps offer additional advantages over compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs), which have long been touted as energy-efficient alternatives to standard light bulbs. LEDs illuminate instantly when their power switch is turned on. Their light output is not diminished in cold weather. In fact, LEDs last longer in cold areas. LEDs offer a variety of color temperatures that allow customers to match the appearance of standard incandescent bulbs or the bright white of most office environments. Many LED lamps are dimmable, but customers should confirm this prior to purchase, as manufacturers are required to indicate whether they are or not on the packaging.

NPPD and its wholesale customer utilities are contributing approximately \$100,000 toward this campaign which will run through the end of December 2014. To receive the incentive, customers submit a completed program application along with a copy of their sales receipt to their local electric utility. 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
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

Don't get me started

State champion stands up to NSAA

If you are a fan of the comic strip "Dilbert," you are probably aware of the "Dilbert Principle."

Scott Adams, creator of the Dilbert Principle, once described the concept

"I wrote The Dilbert Principle around the concept that in many cases the least competent, least smart people are promoted, simply because they're the ones you don't want doing actual work. You want them ordering the doughnuts and yelling at people for not doing their assignments - you know, the easy work. Your heart surgeons and your computer programmers – your smart people – aren't in management. That principle was literally happening everywhere.'

Including, it would seem, at the Nebraska School Activities Association, where their perceived efforts to avoid controversy wound up creating thaaaaa's right – even more controversy.

At the recent state speech championships, a talented young man from Gordon-Rushville High School won a state title with a series of poems, including one called "Swing Set" by Andrea Gibson, written as a first-person account of a young lesbian kindergarten teacher whose young students wonder if she is male or female.

This young man, Michael Barth, used this speech at every level of competition, from in-season events to district and state, where he won a gold medal. He was one of a number of state speech champions who were invited to Lincoln for a taping of some of the top performances that will air on the ETV network at 9 a.m. on Easter Sunday.

A few days before the taping, however, the executive director of the NSAA, Rhonda Blanford-Green, determined that the young man's reading was inappropriate for broadcast because it might be controversial and cast the NSAA in a light where it endorsed the content, informing him that he would have to read a different poem in place of the "offensive" one.

And, as all good speech enthusiasts and defenders of our God-given freedom of speech are wont to do, he told her to, in so many words, go pound

And, as has become the norm whenever otherwise-intelligent administrators take leave of their senses in announcing a decision that is completely lacking in logic or common sense, their mental hiccup finds life on social media, creating a nationwide firestorm of controversy – a zillion times more than ever would have come as the result of whatever shortsighted, dim-witted viewers might think of the content of the poem the young man would be reading.

Within a couple of days, the NSAA (which, if you're around sports writers long enough, stands for No Sense At All) was in its usual full backpedal mode, undoing a decision they had done and said they would NOT back down on, and Blanford-Green put a spin job on the situation that would make even the most dedicated public relations guru's eyes shoot out of his

"We were encouraged by the amount of support for Michael and freedom of speech . . . The intent of my decision was not to stifle freedom of speech, but rather to avoid any negative connotations for individuals within this statewide production."

Hogwash.

Blanford-Green was still stinging from the backlash of criticism she announced that he used his "red pull out specific veto items but all received last year when she tried to force through a non-discrimination policy for transgender students. The NSAA Board of Control had not discussed the matter, and she ultimately had to back track and the board decided to let local school districts handle the issue.

There was no logical reason for her to get involved in this situation, either. Mr. Barth's speech was approved by his speech coach, and the content did not violate any rules or regulations regarding content that are in place for speech competitions. The young man perfected his work, even going so far as to edit some of the profanity in the original prose to make it competition-friendly. He competed with that allegedly-controversial speech at the local level, used it again at the district level to qualify for state and then won a state title using the exact same speech.

And then, when given a chance to showcase the work that made him a state champion, Blanford-Green tried to act like she understands the moral consciousness of the people of the state by telling him he couldn't use that speech in his videotaped showcase – this would be like telling a left-handed basketball player who led his team to a state championship that he'd have to replay the game right-handed if he wanted to play on TV. As a result, she not only brought on infinitely more controversy than the speech's content could have ever possibly created, forced the NSAA to – once again – have to back away from a narrow-minded position that was never completely thought out, and make the state of Nebraska look like even bigger backwood country-bumpkin buffoons than we are already perceived as by people in other parts of the country.

I'm thrilled that this young man has stood up to the intolerance and the incompetence displayed by the administration of the NSAA. Enough of our freedoms are being violated, or otherwise compromised, in today's society, and it's high time somebody stand up to this intolerance that has been exhibited by controversy-seeking individuals and organizations.

Prison reform or property taxes?

In the waning days of the Second Session of the 103rd Nebraska Legislature, one has to wonder if spending money on prison reform can survive a lame duck governor who has already vetoed millions of dollars to allegedly provide property tax re-

The Legislature's Judiciary Committee has advanced a measure (LB907), which appears to address numerous problems with the system, and is broadly aimed at reducing recidivism. Much of the bill was brought on by the case of Nikko Jenkins, an Omaha man paroled last summer, who is alleged to have killed four people within weeks of his release. A state ombudsman's report concluded that Jenkins repeatedly asked for mental health help, which he never received.

Gov. Dave Heineman was an early proponent of prison reform but came down on the side of doing away with good time - a measure that cuts an inmate's sentence in half for every good day (no infractions or write-ups) the inmate serves - in favor of something he called earned time. Prison officials and Judiciary Committee Chairman Sen. Brad Ashford of Omaha say good time is a valuable tool for controlling inmate behavior. Good time, they point out, is also important given the current overcrowding in the state's prison system.

The governor has already vetoed \$65 million from the state budget with a directive to use some of it to fund property tax relief. Included in that amount was millions earmarked for fixing the aging and failing HVAC system at the State Capitol as well as a proposed \$2.5 million to build four courtyard fountains to complete the final design work of the building which is one of the outstanding architectural wonders in the country.

Property taxes are assessed, levied and collected by local governments based on guidelines developed and approved by the state.

Exactly where the state will "throw" money to address the property tax problem remains to be seen. But it is obvious that this governor, who has spent more time in office (10 years) than any other governor, wants property tax relief to be his legacy. The question remains if prison reform will have a place in that legacy as well.

Heineman has talked tough on prison issues, saying that those who don't support his stand against good time are soft on crime. There has been plenty of push-back from the legislative branch, perhaps enough to shepherd this \$14 million in prison reform through final reading and past a likely veto by the governor. The governor has said he wants to be dynamic in looking at issues and not be locked into one strategy. That dynamic failed when a special-

So now we have the prison reform bill which would: give the Office of Probation Administration \$5 million to expand mental health services and \$3.8 million to expand new reporting centers to better monitor parolees; \$5 million to the Nebraska Crime Commission for the vocational and life skills program to train inmates to do something productive; and \$200,000 to establish the Nebraska Center for Justice Research at the University of Nebraska at Omaha to get to the root cause of the issues which are generally emotionally charged. Here are some more tips from Kelly Feedhan, Extension Educator from Columbus. While most plants are not harmed by pruning at the wrong time of year, there are better times of the year to prune than others. The times listed here are considered the ideal times to prune these plants.

We are still in the midst of the pruning season. Go ahead and prune shade trees, fruit trees, summer blooming shrubs, grapes and raspberries. It is also a good time to prune evergreens like Japanese yew, Junipers, Arborvitae, and spruce. Wait to prune pines until they begin to grow, called candling, typically in late May or early June.

Hold off on pruning roses until mid to late April to avoid additional winter injury on these plants. When pruning, use sharp pruning tools, make correct cuts, and avoid over pruning which stresses plants and leads to sucker growth. The exception is when renovating overgrown, multistemmed shrubs. To do this, the shrubs are severely pruned to about one foot tall in February or March.

When it comes to fruiting plants, like grapes and raspberries, it is important to understand on what age wood fruit is produced for each crop or cultivar. All grapes produce fruit only on new growth that occurs each



spring from buds on one year old canes or last years' new growth. This is why grapes are pruned severely on the lower portion of one-year old each spring if they are grown for fruit canes and then a larger crop in late production.

Due to this fruiting habit, most grapes are trained to a specific system. If interested in producing good yields of quality grapes, learn more about grape training systems. One resource to use is Missouri Extensions Home Fruit Production: Grape

How and when to prune raspberries depends on what type and cultivar of raspberry you have. The roots and crowns of all raspberries live from year to year. The canes or stems can live for up to two years. Red raspberries are divided into two groups, summer-bearing and fall-bearing. Summer-bearing plants produce one large crop of fruit in early summer on

second year canes. Fall-bearing plants, sometimes called everbearing raspberries, produce a small crop of fruits in summer summer on current year canes.

Many growers manage fall-bearing raspberries to produce only one large fall crop. To do this, simply prune all canes of fall-bearing raspberries back to three to four inches tall each
