Hundreds of local volunteers have spent countless hours picking up debris and mak-

ing plans for the restoration. Work in this area was aided by a group of college students who have no ties to the install a sidewalk that will run from east to community of Wayne.

Sunny skies greeted the group of UN-O students who traveled to Wayne last week to pour concrete for a sidewalk at the Summer Sports Complex.

Last week, a group of students from the University of Nebraska-Omaha, who are members of Associated General Contractors of America (AGC) came to Wayne to west between the ball fields.

The majority of the students were from Omaha, with others from as close as Norfolk and Hartington, and as far away as Mc-

They drove to Wayne on Thursday and spent the night at the Community Activity Center before beginning the project on Friday. Another group of students came to Wayne to work on Saturday. Nearly 20 students, ranging from freshmen to seniors at the college, took part in project.

The group had originally called the tornado hotline immediately following the tornado and were told that the focus at that time was on clean-up. The group wanted to provide assistance that was constructionrelated and remained in contact with city officials on their options.

They decided to wait until the spring and were directed to the sidewalk project at the Summer Sports Complex.

The students conducted fundraisers to help pay for the materials needed to complete the project.

The total project included 400 linear feet of concrete, which translates into a six inch deep, eight foot sidewalk the length of the two fields. A total of 80 cubic yards of concrete were poured.

Overseeing the students was Jerome Montgomery, Executive Director of the Nebraska Concrete and Aggreate Association.

## Several hired by school district

An elementary guidance counselor and three special education teachers were hired during Monday's meeting of the Wayne Community School's Board of Education

Jennifer Cliff was hired as the district's K-8 guidance counselor, replacing Joan Sudmann. Cliff has been doing an internship with the school during this school year.

Jess Sorensen was hired to fill the newly created special education teacher position. Her work will be primarily with kindergarten students. Sorensen has previously worked with the Fremont School district as a paraprofessional.

Candace Peterson was hired as a K-2 special education teacher to fill a position currently held by Kayla Varley, who is moving to a junior high position. Peterson has been employed with the Randolph Public Schools for the past 12 years.

Judy Stepp was hired to fill a 3-4 grade special education position currently held by Emily Sims, who is moving to a third grade classroom teaching position. Sims will replace Joan Hansen, who is moving to the elementary librarian position.

Stepp has over 20 years of teaching experience, both in Nebraska and Wyoming.

Following a presentation from Jay Spearman with Ameritas, the board approved a resolution allowing for the issuance of \$520,000 worth of certificates of participation to move forward with the heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) projects at the elementary and high school.

Spearman explained the payment plan for the money and interest rates throughout the course of the loan.

Board members also listened to a presentation by Tom Larsen, Director of Technology for the district.

Larsen told the board the district is in need of a system center server transition and system upgrade from Windows XP to Windows 7. He noted that the district would move from the current Novell system to Microsoft, which is a more stable company.

He explained the process of moving data from one system to another and said the process should be completed in approximately three weeks this summer.

Superintendent Mark Lenihan updated the board on a number of items, including

## Council approves LB480 requests, tables alley vacating request

cate a half block of alley in the western portion of the city during Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

Dave Headley requested having the alley vacated between properties he owns on Douglas Street.

City Administrator Lowell Johnson told the council that the request was not an alley issue, but a zoning non-compliance issue. and "zoning is about uses and property, not people. Even though we have well-regarded property owners, right now, there is no way to fix this situation."

A building owned by Headley on a lot adjacent to his home, was damaged in a fire several weeks ago. It was originally a house Council members tabled a request to va- but through the years it has been slowly converted in use and appearance to a nonconforming woodworking shop. This conversion was not permitted by city code, but no complaints were received from neighbors.

> Joel Hansen, City Inspector/Planner, said that even if the alley is vacated, the size of the building, along with the other auxiliary structures on the property, may be a larger percentage of the property allowed to be auxiliary in the city code. He also noted that there is some "grey area"

## Legislature overrides gubernatorial vetoes, regains some independence

The Nebraska Legislature's vote to override nearly \$65 million in gubernatorial budget vetoes on April 1 was no joke. Not only did the 49 members of the Legislative branch restore the budget crafted for them by the Appropriations Committee, ward separation of powers between the Executive and Legislative branches.

Not since Republican Governor Charlie Thone (1979-1983) and his so-called "Thone Clones," has the dividing line between the two branches of government been so blurred. Lobbyists and some senators in the officially non-partisan legislature have wondered aloud for some time about incumbent Governor Dave Heineman's influence on the body. Granted, some of that might be attributed to his longevity (he has served two four-year terms and was appointed for an additional two years when predecessor Mike Johanns went off to Washington to become the U.S. Agriculture Secretary).

But lawmakers remained amazed, though not often amused, by that influence. Some wondered aloud how the cycle would be broken. In this lame duck year for Heineman – he's term-limited at year's end - that spell seems to have been broken.

Veteran Senator Ernie Chambers tone for the override debate when he said that the vetoes simply represented the governor "once again poking his finger in the eye of the Legislature." Heineman's consistent cry for "property tax relief" this session failed at this moment even though his lieutenants, Senators Beau McCoy of Omaha and Bill Kintner of Papillion tried to win the battle. McCoy wants to be governor and Kintner is married to the head of Heineman's Policy Research Of-



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

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

Older children can choose if they want to have their snack first or do their homework first. Help your child think through choices. If vour older child is deciding between snack and homework, you could help him think out loud which order seems right to him. Help him explain his choice and thinking to

> Include children in family decisions, when appropriate. If the family is planning an outing, ask the children for ideas.

> When your child is not following a family rule, talk with him about the choice he is making. What are the consequences of his choice? How will it affect him and other family members?

> Praise your child when he solves his own problems. Focus on his solution and how it worked for him. "What a good idea! Now both you and your sister can have a chance to use the bike.'

#### Lying, Stealing, and Other **Problem Behaviors**

All children - at some point - behave badly. If your child has stolen, lied, hit, or disobeyed in some way, he is no different from other children. Although these behaviors can be distressing, they do not mean that you have a bad, naughty, or hopeless child. What these behaviors do mean is that we have an opportunity to teach our child how we want him to behave and why these types of behaviors are not appropriate or acceptable. It is important to

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think of your child as different from his behaviors. Your child can be a good kid and still do bad things. Stay calm when dealing with a child who has misbehaved. When a parent is able to stay calm, the child is better able to hear what is said. If you do yell, be sure to repeat your message later when you are calm.

Deal with the behavior and do not get distracted by why your child did it. Children, like adults, do things for many reasons. Your child may never be able to tell you "why" he lied, stole, or disobeyed. Focusing on this will likely only frustrate you further because it will feel as if the child is being even more defiant.

Remember that love builds the foundation for effective discipline. If you want your children to obey family rules, regularly let them know how much you love and appreciate them. Instead, focus on the

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behavior and what it is you want to teach your child. If your child took something that was not his, you may want to consider having him return it to the person or store. This will teach your child how to make amends and will send a strong message about not taking things from others. Remember it often takes many failures to learn a lesson.

You will likely have to teach your children many times what you want them to do. What is important is that you teach the lesson each time, and hold them responsible for making amends. Failing is just another chance to learn. In the US, we tend to think that failing is bad – but it is probably the best way we learn anything. Be a role model for picking yourself up, dusting yourself off and starting all over again.

Remember to praise your child when he makes an effort to behave appropriately. If your child has been lying and then tells you the truth, make sure to point this out. "I know it was hard for you to tell me that you broke the chair. I am really proud of you for being honest. Now what do you think we should

If you are feeling overwhelmed by your child's behavior, seek help. Some good places to start looking for help are with your family doctor, school counselor, and church.

## **GENERAL NOTICE**

#### YOU ARE REQUIRED TO CONTROL NOXIOUS WEEDS ON YOUR PROPERTY

It shall be the duty of each owner, owner's agent, and occupant of any lot, tract or parcel of land in the city to cut and remove from such lot, tract, or parcel of land, together with half of the abutting streets or alleys, excessive growth of weeds, grasses or worthless vegetation. Such growth shall be cut as close to the ground level as possible and shall be maintained as close to the ground level as possible throughout the period of May 1 to October 15 of each year. Growing or permitting the growing of weeds, grasses, or vegetation in violation of this subsection is a nuisance and is prohibited.

It shall be unlawful for any owner, owner's agent or occupant of any premises described in subsection (a) of this section to allow to grow or to maintain any weeds, grasses, or worthless vegetation 12 inches in height or greater.

The City Administrator or his or her designee shall cause to be published in a legal newspaper of general circulation throughout the city for one time at least ten days before May 1, and on any other date designated by resolution of the council, a general notice to owners, owner's agents, or occupants of real estate within the city to cut and remove excessive weeds, grasses and worthless vegetation 12 inches in height or greater from such premises. The notice shall specify that the weeds and other rank growth of vegetation shall be cut as close to the ground level as possible throughout the period of May 1 to October 15.

The City Administrator or his or her designee is authorized and empowered to notify, in writing, the owner, or owner's agent, and occupant of any such lot, place or area within the city to cut, destroy and remove any such weeds, grasses or worthless vegetation 12 inches in height or greater located on such property.

Within five days after receipt of such notice, the owner or occupant of the lot or piece of ground may request a hearing with the City to appeal the decision to abate or remove a nuisance by filing a written appeal with the office of the City Clerk. A hearing on the appeal shall be held within 14 days after the filing of the appeal and shall be conducted by the City Administrator. The City Administrator shall render a decision on the appeal within five business days after the conclusion of the hearing. If the appeal fails, the City may have such work done.

If the owner or occupant of the lot or piece of ground does not request a hearing with the City, or upon the failure of any such owner, owner's agent, or occupant so notified to cut, destroy and remove such weeds, grasses or worthless vegetation 12 inches in height or greater within five days after receipt of notice provided for in subsection (d) of this section, the City may have such work done. The costs and expenses of any such work shall be paid by the owner.

If the costs and expenses mentioned in subsection (f) of this section are unpaid for two months after such work is done, the City may either (i) levy and assess the costs and expenses of the work upon the lot or piece of ground so benefited in the same manner as other special taxes for improvements are levied and assessed or (ii) recover in a civil action the costs and expenses of the work upon the lot or piece of


