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Several hired by school district

An elementary guidance counselor and three special education teachers were hired during Monday's meeting of the Wayne Community School's Board of Education meeting.

Jennifer Cliff was hired as the district's K-8 guidance counselor, replacing Joan Sudmann. Cliff has been doing an internship with the school during this school year.

Jess Sorensen was hired to fill the newly created special education teacher position. Her work will be primarily with kindergarten students. Sorensen has previously worked with the Fremont School district as a paraprofessional.

Candace Peterson was hired as a K-2 special education teacher to fill a position currently held by Kayla Varley, who is moving to a junior high position. Peterson has been employed with the Randolph Public Schools for the past 12 years.

Judy Stepp was hired to fill a 3-4 grade special education position currently held by Emily Sims, who is moving to a third grade classroom teaching position. Sims will replace Joan Hansen, who is moving to the elementary librarian position.

Stepp has over 20 years of teaching experience, both in Nebraska and Wyoming.

Following a presentation from Jay Spearman with Ameritas, the board approved a resolution allowing for the issuance of \$520,000 worth of certificates of participation to move forward with the heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) projects at the elementary and high school.

Spearman explained the payment plan for the money and interest rates throughout the course of the loan.

Board members also listened to a presentation by Tom Larsen, Director of Technology for the district.

Larsen told the board the district is in need of a system center server transition and system upgrade from Windows XP to Windows 7. He noted that the district would move from the current Novell system to Microsoft, which is a more stable company.

He explained the process of moving data from one system to another and said the process should be completed in approximately three weeks this summer.

Superintendent Mark Lenihan updated the board on a number of items, including

Council approves LB480 requests, tables alley vacating request

Council members tabled a request to vacate a half block of alley in the western portion of the city during Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

Dave Headley requested having the alley vacated between properties he owns on Douglas Street.

City Administrator Lowell Johnson told the council that the request was not an alley issue, but a zoning non-compliance issue, and "zoning is about uses and property, not people. Even though we have well-regarded property owners, right now, there is no way to fix this situation."

A building owned by Headley on a lot adjacent to his home, was damaged in a fire several weeks ago. It was originally a house but through the years it has been slowly converted in use and appearance to a non-conforming woodworking shop. This conversion was not permitted by city code, but no complaints were received from neighbors.

Joel Hansen, City Inspector/Planner, said that even if the alley is vacated, the size of the building, along with the other auxiliary structures on the property, may be a larger percentage of the property allowed to be auxiliary in the city code. He also noted that there is some "grey area"

Weather related accident claims two lives

Road conditions were responsible for a two-vehicle accident on April 13 that claimed the lives of an Emerson couple.

The accident, which occurred 2.5 miles east of Hoskins on Highway 35, was reported at approximately 3:15 p.m.

A 2004 Ford Ranger driven by Virlyn Lukens, 85, of Emerson, was east bound on Highway 35. Lukens appeared to have lost

control of the vehicle due to poor road conditions and blowing snow and crossed into the path of a west bound 2008 Buick Enclave driven by Robbi Johnson, 45, of Norfolk.

The Lukens vehicle was struck on the passenger side causing it to spin and roll onto the passenger side. Both occupants of the Lukens' vehicle, Virlyn, and his wife Marvel, were pronounced dead at the scene.

Robbi Johnson received non-life threatening injuries and was transported to Faith Regional in Norfolk.

Seatbelts were in use in both vehicles. The accident was investigated by the Wayne County Sheriff's Office with assistance from Hoskins/Woodland Park Fire and Rescue, Winside Rescue and the Nebraska State Patrol.

Students volunteer to help improve Complex

Work is underway to restore and upgrade the Summer Sports Complex in Wayne following damage done by the Oct. 4 tornado.

Hundreds of local volunteers have spent countless hours picking up debris and making plans for the restoration.

Work in this area was aided by a group of college students who have no ties to the community of Wayne.

Last week, a group of students from the University of Nebraska-Omaha, who are members of Associated General Contractors of America (AGC) came to Wayne to install a sidewalk that will run from east to west between the ball fields.

The majority of the students were from Omaha, with others from as close as Norfolk and Hartington, and as far away as McCook.

They drove to Wayne on Thursday and spent the night at the Community Activity Center before beginning the project on Friday. Another group of students came to Wayne to work on Saturday. Nearly 20 students, ranging from freshmen to seniors at the college, took part in project.

The group had originally called the tornado hotline immediately following the tornado and were told that the focus at that time was on clean-up. The group wanted to provide assistance that was construction-related and remained in contact with city officials on their options.

They decided to wait until the spring and were directed to the sidewalk project at the Summer Sports Complex.

The students conducted fundraisers to help pay for the materials needed to complete the project.

The total project included 400 linear feet of concrete, which translates into a six inch deep, eight foot sidewalk the length of the two fields. A total of 80 cubic yards of concrete were poured.

Overseeing the students was Jerome Montgomery, Executive Director of the Nebraska Concrete and Aggregate Association.

The place opened under her ownership in August of 2008 and has been churning out food and drinks ever since.

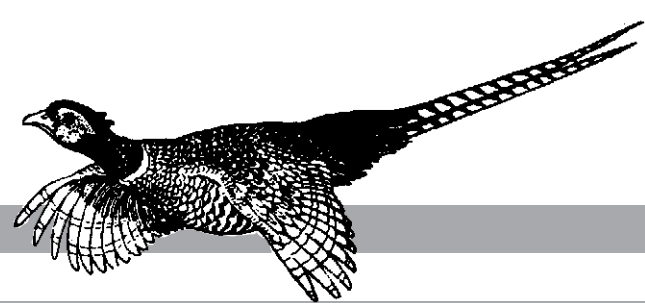
Varley's staff is small. One of three people who work at The

Wayne State College chapter of Phi Kappa Phi initiates new members

The Honor Society of Phi Kappa Phi, Chapter 299 at Wayne State College, inducted new initiates on April 1. The ceremony was held in the Frey Conference Suite on the Wayne State College campus. Dr. Paul Campbell, retiring WSC Criminal Justice Professor, was the guest speaker.

A total of 10 Seniors, 25 Juniors, and one WSC Staff member were initiated during the society's eighth annual ceremony. A reception followed the ceremony.

Dr. Randy Bertolas, Chapter President, welcomed the audience and served as Master of Ceremonies and said that "we are here for one reason: to celebrate excellence." In his opening comments, Jeff Carstens, Vice President of Student Affairs and PKP member, mentioned that PKP has inducted over 1 million scholars over the last

100 years. Dr. Campbell said that even though state financial support has dwindled over the years forcing students to shoulder more of the financial costs of college than in the past, "higher education is a remarkable experiment in democracy-no longer just for the elite." Campbell stressed that "the Bachelor's degree is not a job-keeping permit, but a job-hunting permit." He said that "faculty are most efficient when we help students 'filter' the abundance and validity of information: we need thinking voter-citizens and we need to 'follow the money' with a critical eye to ensure a better society." He concluded by saying, "Education is knowledge metabolism."

Founded in 1897 and headquartered in Baton Rouge, LA, Phi Kappa Phi is the nation's oldest, largest and most selective all-discipline honor society. Having chapters on

approximately 300 college and university campuses, membership in the society is by invitation only to the top 7.5 percent of juniors and the top 10 percent of seniors and graduate students. Faculty, professional staff and alumni who have achieved scholarly distinction also qualify. The Society's mission is "To recognize and promote academic excellence in all fields of higher education and to engage the community of scholars in service to others."

in the code with regard to how much of the structure can be rebuilt.

Headley told the council, "the walls (of the building) are fine. I just need to put on a new roof and new windows. There is also another way around this (if the alley is not vacated). I can sell the property to my neighbor to the south and then lease it back from him."

Following discussion, the council voted to table the request until more information can be obtained.

Council members approved the recommendation of the LB840 Sales Tax Advisory Committee for sales tax money for two businesses.

Gurkan Ozenci, with GCSR, LLC, doing business as Dollar Plus, was granted a \$125,000 loan for five years at zero percent interest for help in bringing a dollar type store into the former Dollar General building on the corner of Second and Main Streets.

Ozenci explained what the store will offer and noted that it will generate tax money to the city, as well as increase foot traffic on Main Street.

Council members discussed the practice of issuing zero percent loans for LB840 money and were told by Wes Blecke, representing the LB840 Committee, that the money has been loaned with various stipulations and payment terms.

Council members voted 6-1 in favor of Ozenci's request.

Following a lengthy discussion, the council voted unanimously to amend an earlier application by Ken Jorgensen for \$250,000 in LB840 funds for the building of "The 4th Jug Sports Bar and the Jug Store."

Jorgensen's request to the council was for a \$125,000 loan for 15

years at three percent interest and \$125,000 in a performance-based loan to be forgiven over 15 years provided 20 full-time equivalent employees are hired by the business.

Council members listened to information from Jorgensen on the anticipated revenue to be generated for the city from the business and the need for the performance-based loan to obtain other funding for the project.

Joey Baldwin, owner of The Rain Tree, told the council he isn't against the project, but "it is risky and he (Jorgensen) should be held accountable." He also noted that if 20 jobs are created by Jorgensen's business, they will be lost elsewhere.

In approving the performance-based loan, it was noted that if Jorgensen fails to meet the loan stipulations, he would be required to pay the money back, with interest.

Council members also gave their approval to a resolution that will allow the city to move forward with an application for Community Development Block Grant Comprehensive Investment and Stabilization Phase II Funds for work in the southeast quadrant of the city.

The funding will be used to clear/demolish six structures, construct a tornado shelter, rehabilitate three single-family, owner-occupied homes, housing management and risk assessment.

The city will provide matching funds by making street and water improvements in the area.

Mayor Ken Camberlain read proclamations for National Library Week (April 13-19) and Arbor Day (April 25).

The council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, May 6 at 5:30 p.m.

the pre-construction meeting for the HVAC project, a track pre-construction meeting scheduled for this summer, the last day of school, which has been set for Tuesday, May 20. He told the board that if the students meet their NeSA testing goal, school will be dismissed on Monday, May 19.

Lenihan told the board that there is good news for the district in regard to state aid for the school. He said that due to the fact that student enrollment is up and because of a comparison of costs for educating students in the Wayne schools, the district should receive an additional \$270,000 in state aid for the coming year.

A tentative scheduled was shared with the board for the AdvancEd accreditation visit. A group of five people will be in Wayne April 27-30 to complete the accreditation process. A special board meeting on April 30 will be part of the visit.

Each of the administrators presented information to the board on activities that are occurring in the schools prior to the end of the school year.

Rocky Ruhl, junior high principal and athletic director, also told the board that earlier this year Scheels conducted a contest during the state basketball tournament, and Wayne was selected to receive \$500 worth of sporting equipment.

The board will next meet in regular session on Monday, May 12 at 5 p.m. in the junior-senior high school library.

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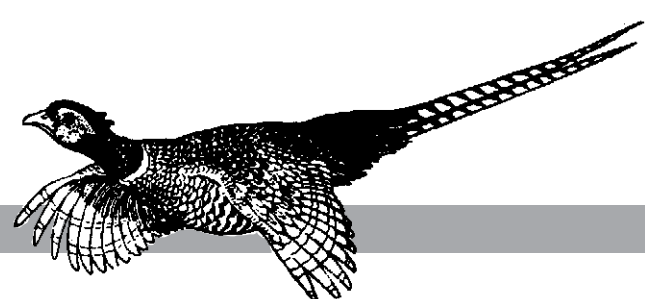

Wayne senior golfer Kaje Maly captured medalist honors at the annual West Point-Beemer Invitational last Thursday in Beemer, carding a

3-over par 74. In doing so, he edged Laurel-Concord-Coleridge senior Mitchell Klooz by a single stroke.

The Bears, however, claimed team honors in the 13-team field with a 327. Runner-up honors went to

Bancroft-Rosalie at 350 followed by West Point Guardian Angel, 364. Hartington finished fourth with a 365 followed by Wayne at 378. Wisner-Pilger finished at 391 followed in order by Schuyler, West

Point-Beemer, Wakefield (440), Humphrey/Lindsey Holy Family and Lyons-Decatur. Other schools that did not field full teams included Tekamah-Herman, Homer and Leigh-Clarkson.

Maly began his day with a three-putt par on the first hole and followed with an uncharacteristic double-bogey on the par three, but he shook off the early round jitters and went on to play the next 16 holes at just one-over par.

"I knew what I did wrong on the second hole so I really wasn't that mad at myself," Maly said.

He went on to card three birdies on the day including two on par 3's. He went back-to-back on birdies on holes 16 and 17, a par 3 and 5, respectively.

"Kaje was really focused on his game," Wayne coach Dave Hix said. "He has matured with his golf mentality. I thought Jalen Barry finished his round nicely with seven straight bogeys, and Reed Trenhaile turned his game around from the previous meet. It is still early for everyone, and we need more practice time on the course. We did miss Jared Peterson because of a prior academic commitment in Lincoln. Zach Keating is making some major changes to his swing so I am expecting some slow progress but in the right direction. Tyler Echtenkamp made his high school debut, and he looked a little nervous out on the course. I know with more experience he will be able to contribute."

Barry finished second on the Wayne squad with a 98, while Trenhaile carded a 101 and Keating, 105. Echtenkamp finished with a 118 in his first meet.

Laurel's Mitchell Klooz had rounds of 38-37 for a consistent round. What might be considered a bit unusual for the senior headed to Liberty next fall for golf is three of his bogeys on the day came on par 5's. He did have one birdie on the par 3, 4th hole. Brendan Groene tied for second with an 82 and Jamy McCoy placed fourth in the meet with an 83, while Cory Peterson was 8th with an 87.

Wayne is slated to compete at the Blair Invite on Tuesday followed by the Scotus Invite at Quail Run in Columbus on Thursday. The Mid-States Conference Tournament will be held next Saturday in Wayne.

sive performance at the Concordia Invitational in Seward on Saturday. In the shot put at Saturday's Concordia Invitational in Seward, Albion junior Sara Wells took over the top throw in NCAA Division II this season with a new school record mark of 52' 4" to win the event and top the previous school record of 51' 11" set by Katie Wilson in 2008. 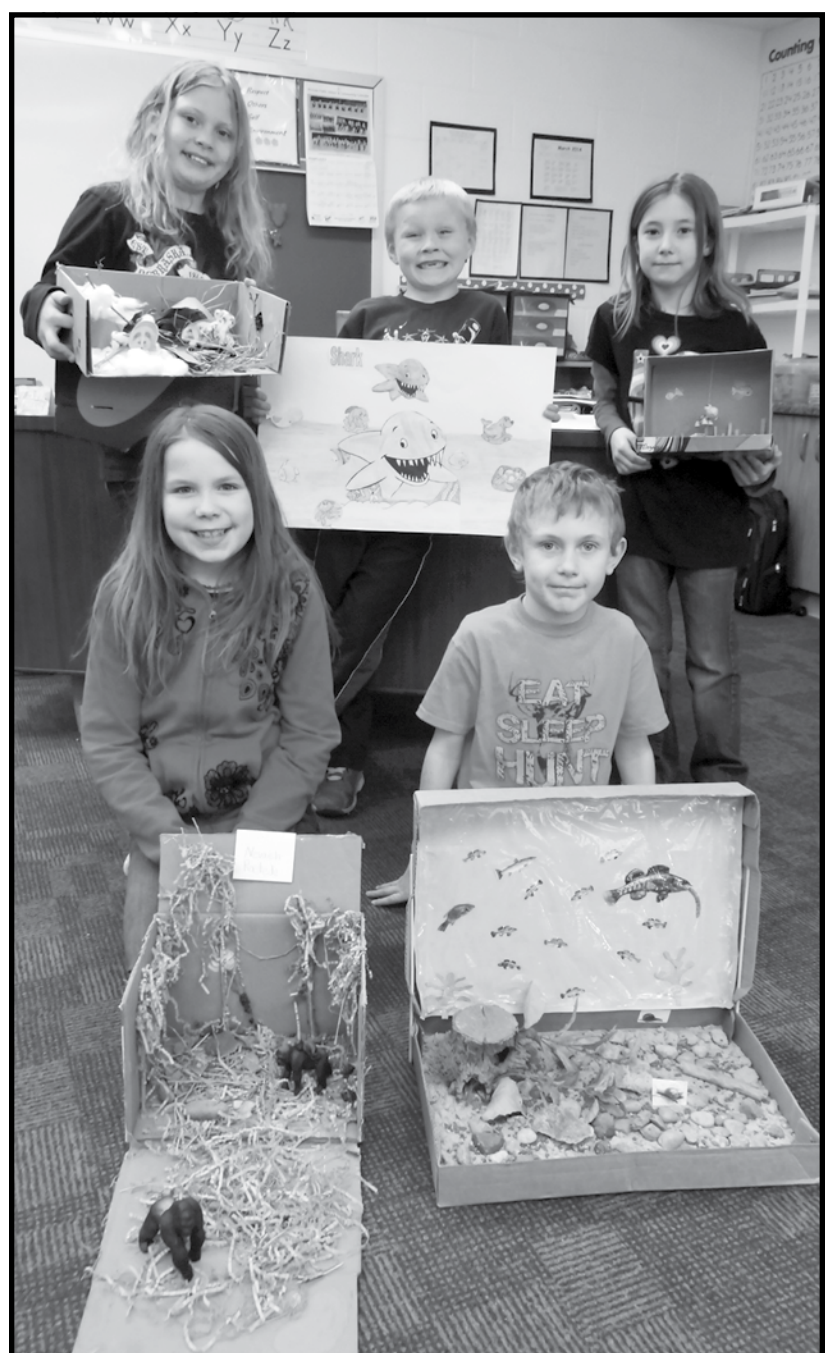

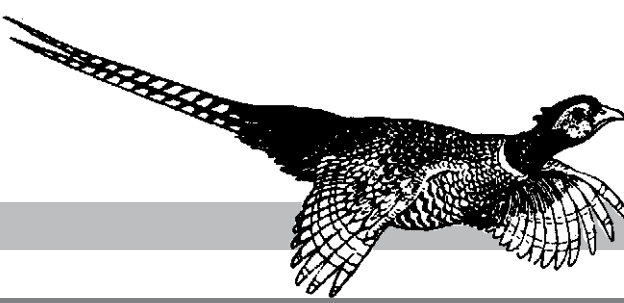
