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# City receives input on proposed code changes

Lengthy discussion was held during Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council on several proposed changes to the city code.

Public hearings were held in regard to allowing multi-family dwellings in areas of the city zoned B-3 (Neighborhood Commercial) and R-3 (Residential) dis-

The proposed code changes would have either resulted in the multifamily dwellings to be built as Conditional Use, Use by Exception or with Specific Conditions and Exceptions.

Council members heard from Zoning Administrator Joel Hansen that, at recent Planning Commission meetings, the Planning Commission recommended to the council not to make amendments in any of these

areas of the city code.

Several members of the public spoke during a public hearing regarding the changing of parking regulations which would require that one-half of the minimum offstreet parking requirements for residential uses be met on the lot, rather than the terrace.

Wendy Vawser spoke of a specific parking situation in which 12 cars could be parked on the terrace at a townhouse being built at the corner of Eighth and Pearl streets.

She noted that this is a dangerous intersection, due to the fact the corner is on a hill and the streets in the area are brick.

In all of the recommendations from the Planning Commission, the group felt no changes should be made until the city completes a new Comprehensive Plan.

Discussion was also held on a proposed change in the city code in regard to nonconforming structures being rebuilt or replaced.

Hansen said the current language in the code is not clear in regard to rebuilding a structure that has been damaged. One portion of the code says a nonconforming structure can be rebuilt, while another portion says that if the structure was damaged or destroyed by any means, to the extent of more than 60 percent of the current assessed value, it can not be restored until it conforms to current regulations.

Discussion was held on the impact of the requirement in different sections of town and the fact that many structures, which are currently nonconforming, were built before the city implemented zoning laws.

A request from Dave Headley to vacate the half block of alley between Lots 9 and 10, Block 24 of the original town of Wayne, located in the 100 block of Douglas Street, did not receive a motion and therefore will not move forward.

Several letters were received by the city from property owners and tenants in the neighborhood, expressing a desire to leave the alley open.

A committee was appointed to act as the Fraternal Order of Police Labor Agreement Negotiating Committee. Members will include Mayor Ken Chamberlain, Council members Cale Giese and Jennifer Sievers, and City Administrator Lowell Johnson.

The council also approved a lease agreement with Verizon Wireless to build a cell tower just north of 10th Street, east of the First National Bank Card Center parking lot.

The lease agreement will be for one term of 15 years. with no extensions, and will result in Verizon Wireless paying the city a \$1,000 per month fee.

The council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, May 20 at 5:30 p.m. in council chambers.

# County gives nod to \$2.5 million in construction bonds

Wayne County is going to take advantage of a friendly bond market to move ahead on a number of long-overdue road and bridge

At Tuesday's meeting, the board moved forward with a resolution that authorizes the issuance of \$2.5 million in bonds for nine road construction projects that the county hopes to complete during the later stages of the 2014 construction season.

Phil Lorenzen of D.A. Davidson and Co., told the board that low interest rates make money now at the lower interest rate and it feasible for the county to go ahead with do all the projects at once, rather than do issuing the bonds at a low rate that will it on a piece-by-piece basis," Lorenzen told be in the neighborhood of 2.67 percent, depending on when the bonds are executed. Lorenzen expected those transactions to be completed in early June.

Engineering for the nine road projects has already been completed, and the estimated cost of the projects is in the neighborhood of \$2.35 million. Total project costs are estimated at \$4 million, but Lorenzen two bonds for courthouse construction in said it would be smart for the county to issue the majority of the funding now and

leave themselves the option of borrowing the rest later or using its available cash flow if bids come in below estimates.

"If the bids come in low and the county can swing it, we would dismiss the additional borrowing," Lorenzen said.

The bonds would mature in 2027, and the county would make payments on the bonds in June and December to match the time the county receives money from the state for the gas tax. No tax increase will be needed from county taxpayers for the bonds, Lorenzen said.

"It's smart for the county to borrow the The Wayne Herald. "It's a very advantageous bond market right now, so it's a good time for the county to borrow the money now and get those projects out of the way."

The county does have the option to pay ahead on the bonds and save on interest costs if the cash flow is available. The county recently completed its last payments on December of 2013, and could prepay on the bonds and accelerate the payoff process.

"It (the archery unit) has been fun, but it is pretty hard," Maura said.



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

# Legislature did provide tax relief

In spite of some complaining to the contrary, even Governor Dave Heineman had to admit that the 2014 Nebraska Legislature delivered some "meaningful, responsible and sustainable tax relief." That was in contrast to his chastisement of a tax modernization committee that recommended more study before tinkering with the status quo.

Of course, it was Heineman's hope going into the session that the committee would create sweeping tax reform that would help the 10-year governor leave his legacy. The committee was formed after massive public testimony last year against two Heineman-inspired tax reform measures. Out of the limelight this vear, the Legislature's Revenue Committee filtered, tweaked and advanced a handful of bills that won Heineman's belated OK.

"We are providing \$412 million of tax relief to Nebraskans over the next five years," Heineman said as the 103rd Legislature Second Session neared a close. "We've indexed Nebraska's individual income tax brackets for inflation. We've begun the process of exempting social security income and military retirement income from taxation. We have helped farmers and ranchers by eliminating the sales tax on repair parts for agricultural machinery and equipment."

He said that highlights of the five bills included an expansion of Nebraska's homestead exemption program (LBs 986 and 1087) so that more Nebraskans -- including honorably discharged 100 percent disabled veterans and their spouses and people with developmental disabilities -- will qualify

Heineman also praised the expansion of the Property Tax Credit Program (LB905) by \$25 million, adding that he had hoped to increase that amount even through



gram, started in 2007, provides a state-funded discount on a local homeowner or landowner's property tax bill. As passed this session, the state will direct \$140 million to the fund. That could mean a savings of \$74 per \$100,000 valuation military retirement pay in perpetufor property tax payers.

The governor said he didn't ask the Legislature to introduce a specific bill because he knew that all of the tax bills that were needed for this discussion were already introduced or would be introduced. He also had to be thinking about his failed two-bill package that crashed

A variety of sales tax reductions were approved in a bill (LB867) on issues ranging from acquisitions by historic automobile museums to postage, as well as changes to the sports arena turnback provisions. An oft-discussed measure to

provide tax relief for farmers and ranchers (LB96) was also passed by lawmakers and signed into law by Heineman. It eliminates the sales tax on repair parts for agets for inflation. Provisions of the ricultural machinery and equip-

complained about losing parts and service business to nearby states that don't have the tax. In some cases, those Nebraska dealers have bought dealerships in those states to stem the loss of revenue. Parts for a \$300,000 combine can be expensive and even more pricey when the sales tax is added.

The governor contends that tax relief is a major force for economic success, especially as Nebraska competes in global markets. Hats off to the Legislature for addressing the important issue through a variety of bills that were able to make it through the process without creating headlines, grandstanding and political advantage for those who

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
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# Biosecurity recommended to protect against EHV

across the nation, State Veterinarhorse owners, as well as operators of horse shows/exhibitions to remain vigilant and exercise biosecurity measures at all events where horses are co-mingled.

"No horses in Nebraska have been diagnosed with the disease at this time. I want to encourage horse owners to take precautions to help prevent this disease from affecting our horse population," said Dr. Hughes.

According to Hughes, two horses (one from Wisconsin and one from Kansas) recently were diagnosed with EHV-1. The two horses had been at a competition held at the Lancaster Event Center in Lincoln in April. A number of states are dealing with this disease issue.

Dr. Hughes encourages all horse owners to follow biosecurity measures at their operations, including: require individuals to wash their hands before and after con-

Equine Herpes Virus (EHV-1) cases contact with horses other than your own; if possible, avoid contact with ian Dr. Dennis Hughes is reminding other people's horses, and isolate horses returning from shows for 2 to 3 weeks.

"Owners who will be co-mingling their horses also should consider contacting their veterinarian to discuss their horses' current vaccination status and weigh the benefits of vaccinating their animals for EHV-1," said Dr. Hughes.

The disease is spread through direct or indirect contact with infected horses, so Hughes encourages operators of horse shows/exhibitions to review their biosecurity plans and minimize the opportunity for horses to have direct or indirect contact with each other. Indirect contact includes the use of shared water and feed sources, as well as the use of shared equipment.

In addition, Dr. Hughes said he recommends horse owners planning to travel to shows/exhibitions contact the venue prior to transporting their horses to inquire about entrance re-

# Go green by recycling plastic pesticide containers

pesticide containers have been recycled as part of a more than 20-year into useful products.

about 35 tons of containers, adding 2.2 million pounds of plastic pesticide containers in Nebraska...which is well over 1,000 tons," said UNL Extension pesticide safety educator Clyde Ogg. "We're going to keep adding on to that total as this very successful and collaborative program starts year 23."

The Pesticide Container Recycling Program recycles 1- and 2.5-gallon plastic pesticide containers and 15-, 30- and 55-gallon plastic crop protection chemical drums.

Ogg, who coordinates UNL Extension's Pesticide Safety Education Program, said, "These are farm and ranch pesticide containers that could otherwise end up stored and forgotten in barns or sheds or be them aside on creek banks or by burning them."

Plastic from the collected containers is turned into industrial and consumer products like shipping pallets, drain tile, dimension lumber and parking lot tire bum-

Details of recycling sites and program guidelines are online at pested.unl.edu/recycling.

The program accepts pressurerinsed or triple-rinsed 1- and 2.5-gallon plastic pesticide containers. They must be clean and drained, inside and out. Caps, labels, booklets and slipcover plastic labels, which can't be recycled as part of the program, must be removed. Those items should be disposed of as normal, solid waste. Glued-on paper labels can be left on the container. Rinsate should be re-

turned to spray tanks. Of the 32 sites involved in the program, 18 accept 15-, 30- and 55-gallon plastic crop protection chemical, crop oil and adjuvant drums.

Drums must be thoroughly rinsed improperly disposed of by casting before delivery to collection sites and should not be cut or opened in any way. Mini-bulk, saddle tanks and nurse tanks, which can be made of fiberglass or plastics not compatible with the recycling program, are not accepted.

> Eight sites collect year-around, 12 collect May through August, eight collect on specific dates, and four are by appointment only.

Program funding is by a national coalition of agri-chemical manufacturers through the Agricultural Container Recycling Council, Lexington, Va.

> early in the season. The results in fact showed the optimal planting depth was around 1.75 inches. The data also showed that this planting depth was consistent for all site-years of the study. Shallow depths of less than 1.25 inches with seeding rates of 35K-105K resulted in lower yields, as did deeper planting depths of 2.25 inches or greater at these seeding rates. Across all site-years, regardless of early or late planting dates or tillage type, a planting depth of 1.75 inches maximized soybean yields.

Since 2006, farmers in the Nebraska On-Farm Research Network have been conducting on-farm soybean seeding rate research. Their objective has been to determine if they could maintain yields while reducing seeding ing depth; these included seeding rates and thus, curtail rising seed rates of 35,000; 70,000; 105,000; costs.

Based on five years of consistent research results, it's recommended to reduce planting populations from an average of 160,000 seeds/acre to 120,000 seeds/acre in 30-inch rows. This reduction of 40,000 seeds per acre results in a savings of \$10.66 to \$18.57 per acre based on seed costs of \$40-\$65 a bag. Producers were able to achieve a 90 percent stand or greater all years except for one location at 180,000 seeds/ac in 2008 (which was 88 percent of planted

The five years of studies were primarily conducted in silt-loam or silty-clay-loam soils. Reduced seeding rates have not been tested via our on-farm research studies in sandy or high pH soils; thus, these recommendations may not apply to those situations. Also, it may be necessary to increase populations slightly in drilled beans.



# Cattle temperament may impact at feedlot

The temperament of cattle variables for carcass data. may have a significant impact in according to research by the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, Kansas State University and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

classified temperamental appear to be less susceptible to lung damage and related respiratory diseases and have decreased yield grades, but at the same time may produce lighter weight carcasses with decreased quality grade, according to the study by Ty Schmidt, Joe Buntyn, Chris Calkins and Kathy Domenech of UNL; Jeff Carroll and Jeff Daily of USDA-Agricultural Research Service; and Justin Waggoner of Kansas State University.

The research team used 2,800 cattle at a commercial feedlot to determine cattle temperament solely by exit velocity upon arrival to identify the impact temperament had on feedlot performance. Infrared sensors were attached to the processing chute and alleyway and used to time how fast cattle exited the processing chute. Once exit velocity was determined, within each pen the fastest 20 percent were classified as temperamental animal scientist.

Exit velocity was used as a measurement of temperament because it is the only objective and practical measurement of temperament that can be applied in a commercial setting. Scientists sought to evaluate the impact of temperament on animal health and carcass merit with an eye toward using the data as a sorting tool within feedlots.
