

NESTFest event urges area families to save for college

Nebraska State Treasurer Don Stenberg urged Nebraska families to begin saving for their children's education when their children are young through the Nebraska Educational Savings Trust (NEST), the state-sponsored 529 college savings program.

He was part of a NEST Fest celebration in Wayne on Sunday.

In remarks prepared for delivery at NESTFest in Wayne, Stenberg said the Nebraska Educational Savings Trust, known as NEST, offers four unique plans that make saving for college simple and affordable for Nebraskans and families across the United States. State-sponsored 529 plans take their name from Section 529 of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code.

"We have one of the best college savings programs in the country right here in Nebraska," Stenberg said. "That's why NEST has more than 214,000 accounts nationwide, including more than 61,000 accounts owned by Nebraskans."

NESTFest festivities in Wayne were hosted by the Nebraska Educational Savings Trust (NEST), First Nebraska Bank of Wayne, State Nebraska Bank & Trust Company, F&M Bank, and BankFirst.

The free NESTFest activities included musical entertainment, dance performances, face painting, an appearance by Miss Nebraska and the Kool-Aid Man and games. Among the featured entertainers was the kids band The String Beans. This is the fourth year for NESTFest.

help our children and grandchildren go to the college of their choice, whether that is a four-year college, a community college, or a technical school, either in Nebraska or another state or abroad," said Stenberg, who is trustee of NEST.

In his prepared remarks, Stenberg also urged families attending NESTFest to take advantage of the significant scholarship opportunities offered throughout the year by NEST.

As part of the NESTFest celebration, NEST also is offering each new customer a \$25 new account bonus

to jump start a college savings plan account.

"NEST has been recognized by national experts as one of the top college savings plans in the nation," said Deborah Goodkin, managing director of College Savings Plans, First National Bank of Omaha. First National Bank of Omaha is program manager of NEST.

"We're extremely proud of the program and equally as proud of the commitment thousands of families have made to save for college and help create a bright future for their children," Goodkin said.

Osborn visits Wayne before election

With just days before the May 13 Primary Election in Nebraska, political hopefuls are making last minute efforts to tell the voters why they would make the best choice for each of the political offices.

Shane Osborn, candidate for US Senate spent time in Wayne this week, visiting with voters and telling his story.

Osborn was raised in Woodland Park, near Norfolk, and graduated from Norfolk High School. He then attended the University of Nebraska-Lincoln on an ROTC scholarship.

After earning a degree in math and statistics, he enlisted in the U.S. Navy and spent nine years as pilot.

Osborn earned national attention when, on April 1, 2001, the plane he was flying was involved in a mid-air collision with a Chinese fighter jet. He and his crew of 23 survived an inverted dive and landed in China.

There they were held hostage for

12 days before being released.

Osborn continued to serve in the U.S. Navy, flying some of the initial combat missions in Afghanistan after the Sept. 11, 2001 terrorist attacks on the United States.

After being discharged from the Navy in 2005, he came back to Nebraska and went into private business.

He ran for State Treasurer in 2006 and successfully won the race, 2-1 over the incumbent.

"While treasurer, I kept my promises to the voters and over a four-year period, cut the budget of the office of State Treasurer nearly 12 percent. I reduced the staff by one-fourth and made the office more efficient. Our office won the Treasury Marquee Award for our work," Osborn said.

Osborn also helped create nebraskaspending.gov for transparency in

the office. The website tells Nebraskans where their money is being spent.

He noted that in the race for U.S. Senate, he "is the only fiscally conservative candidate who has been truly tested."

Osborn said among his qualifications for the position are the fact that he has been tested, he kept his promises and he would like to serve Nebraskans "the same as I did as a Naval officer, state treasurer, businessman and family man."

Osborn considers himself a small businessman, having created three businesses. He said among his focuses with his business is the hiring of disabled veterans returning from the war on terror.

"I know what it is like to sign the front of a paycheck, as well as the back," he said of his business experience.

Osborn and his wife, Stacie, are the parents of four children, ages, 7, 8, 9 and 16. They currently reside in Waterloo.

when it got its start under its current name.

On Feb. 1, 2008, Ben's family purchased D&N Service at the corner of Seventh and Main streets. His mom, Renee, ran the front; Ben ran the back, managing the employees who worked there with him; and the place became Main Street Auto Care.

Fast forward six years, and Ben and Taryn are now responsible for the business. The couple took it over on March 1; and – excuse the pun here – things have been running like a well-oiled machine in the weeks since.

"It's been going real good," Ben said. "We've been really busy."

"Everybody tells horror stories about working as husband and wife, but we've survived the first two

months," Taryn added.

Ben and Eric can replace, rotate and fix tires. They do tune-ups and diagnostic tests, perform major and minor work and follow factory maintenance programs. If there's an issue with your exhaust, suspension or windshield, you know where to go.

In addition to repairing automobiles, the business sells them too. It also offers snow removal services; can unlock or tow a vehicle before, during or after its normal operating hours; and has plans to offer spray-on truck bed liners to its roster by the end of the summer.

Or, to be more concise, if it's car-related, it can probably be done by the staff at Main Street Auto Care – and all while a couple of furry security personnel watch over things.

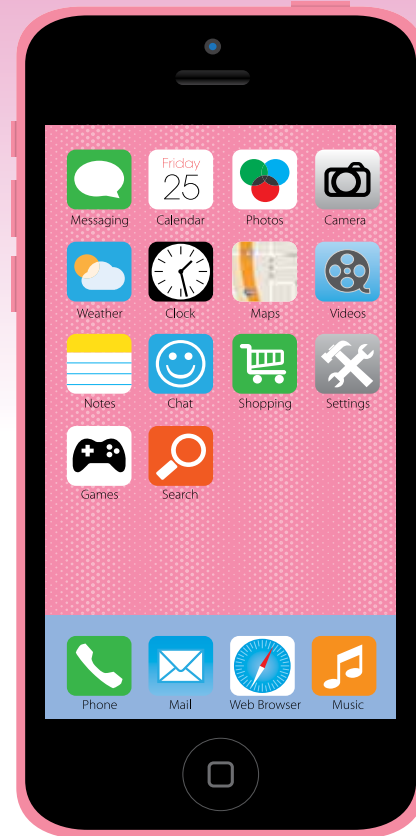

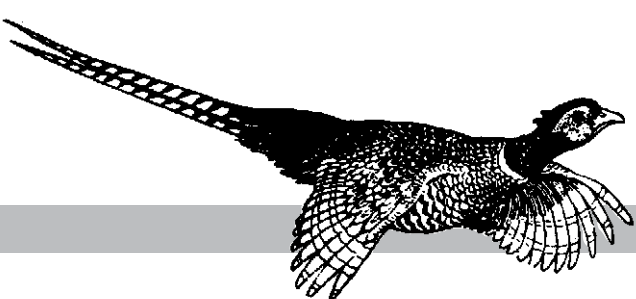

Capitol View Legislature did provide tax relief

In spite of some complaining to the contrary, even Governor Dave Heineman had to admit that the 2014 Nebraska Legislature delivered some “meaningful, responsible and sustainable tax relief.” That was in contrast to his chastisement of a tax modernization committee that recommended more study before tinkering with the status quo.

Of course, it was Heineman's hope going into the session that the committee would create sweeping tax reform that would help the 10-year governor leave his legacy. The committee was formed after massive public testimony last year against two Heineman-inspired tax reform measures. Out of the limelight this year, the Legislature's Revenue Committee filtered, tweaked and advanced a handful of bills that won Heineman's belated OK.

“We are providing \$412 million of tax relief to Nebraskans over the next five years,” Heineman said as the 103rd Legislature Second Session neared a close. “We've indexed Nebraska's individual income tax brackets for inflation. We've begun the process of exempting social security income and military retirement income from taxation. We have helped farmers and ranchers by eliminating the sales tax on repair parts for agricultural machinery and equipment.”

He said that highlights of the five bills included an expansion of Nebraska's homestead exemption program (LBs 986 and 1087) so that more Nebraskans -- including honorably discharged 100 percent disabled veterans and their spouses and people with developmental disabilities -- will qualify.

Heineman also praised the expansion of the Property Tax Credit Program (LB905) by \$25 million, adding that he had hoped to increase that amount even through last minute budget vetoes and a suggestion that the money saved be funneled toward property tax relief. The property tax credit program, started in 2007, provides a state-funded discount on a local homeowner or landowner's property tax bill. As passed this session, the state will direct \$140 million to the fund. That could mean a savings of \$74 per \$100,000 valuation for property tax payers.



The governor said he didn't ask the Legislature to introduce a specific bill because he knew that all of the tax bills that were needed for this discussion were already introduced or would be introduced. He also had to be thinking about his failed two-bill package that crashed last year.

Heineman also signed into law a measure (LB987) to index Nebraska's individual income tax brackets for inflation. Provisions of the measure will exempt social security income for folks with an adjusted gross income of \$58,000 or less if

married persons and filing jointly and \$43,000 or less for all others. It also allows veterans to either exclude 40 percent of their pay from state taxation for seven consecutive years, or exclude 15 percent of their military retirement pay in perpetuity, starting at age 67.

A variety of sales tax reductions were approved in a bill (LB867) on issues ranging from acquisitions by historic automobile museums to postage, as well as changes to the sports arena turnback provisions.

An oft-discussed measure to provide tax relief for farmers and ranchers (LB96) was also passed by lawmakers and signed into law by Heineman. It eliminates the sales tax on repair parts for agricultural machinery and equipment. Nebraska implement dealers, especially those in communities near the state's borders, have long

complained about losing parts and service business to nearby states that don't have the tax. In some cases, those Nebraska dealers have bought dealerships in those states to stem the loss of revenue. Parts for a \$300,000 combine can be expensive and even more pricey when the sales tax is added.

The governor contends that tax relief is a major force for economic success, especially as Nebraska competes in global markets. Hats off to the Legislature for addressing the important issue through a variety of bills that were able to make it through the process without creating headlines, grandstanding and political advantage for those who would seek such in a crucial election year.

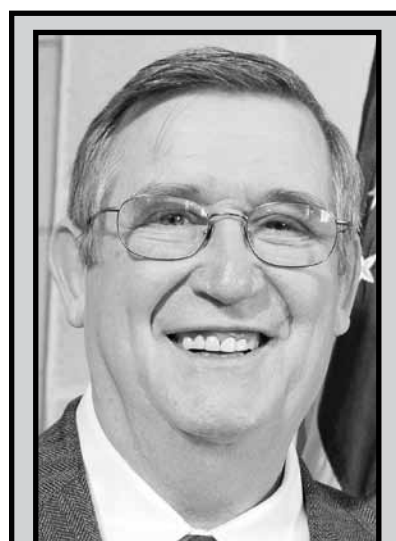
Legislative Update LEAD program develops ag leaders

needing a CDL under LB983 and federal law.

The message the Transportation and Telecommunications Committee is trying to get out is that if a farmer or employee currently has a CDL, they should keep and renew it, but it is not necessary to get a CDL if they are a farmer/rancher (family member or employee) transporting their own products within the state or within 150 miles of their farm in a farm plated vehicle.

Additionally, by bringing us into compliance with federal laws, LB983 made the process for obtaining a CDL more rigorous. If you had a medical waiver which a driver may have been grandfathered into, it will no longer be honored if the CDL lapses. If you have questions regarding the changes, you can contact my office or the DMV or the State Patrol.

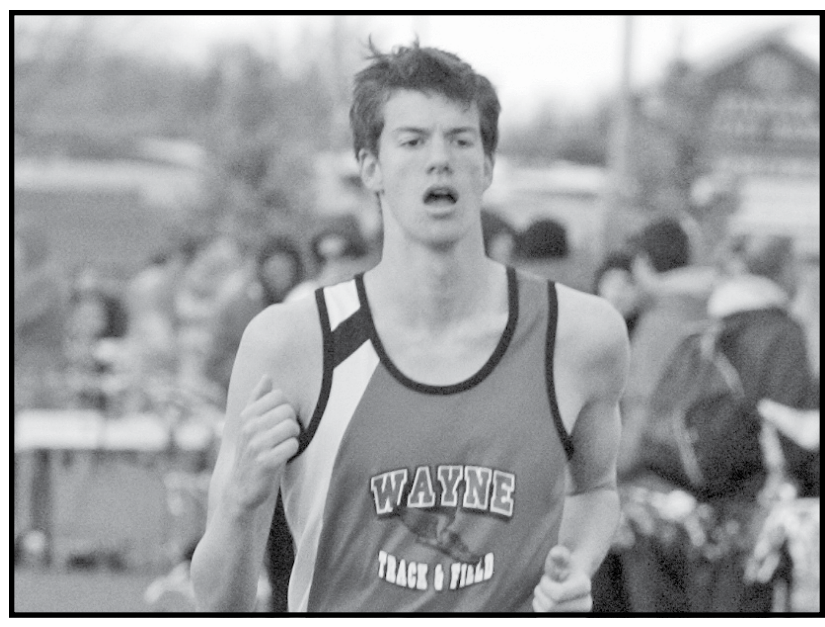

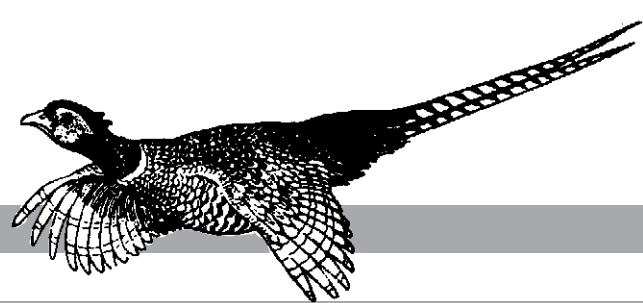

Job interview tips offered for teens

I wanted to share a few interview "Tips for Teens" who are looking for jobs. If you follow some of these simple rules for interviewing, it will increase your chances of employment.

Practice interviewing with other employers or teachers if they are available. Everyone will have some employment tips for you. Remember, even if this is your very first job interview, confidence is the key. Do your homework on the position, and Good Luck!!

Be Prepared

Don't just show up for the interview. The more information you have prepared in advance, the better impression you will make on the interviewer. Take the time to get working papers (if you need them) and references, before you start looking for a job. Bring the following with you to the interview:

Completed job application
Working papers (if you need them)
References

Be Polite

It's essential to have good manners when interviewing. Shake your interviewer's hand. Don't sit until you are invited to. Don't slouch in your chair. Don't use slang or swear. Be polite, positive, and professional throughout the interview.

Know Your Schedule

Know what days and hours you are available to work. The employer will ask. Flexibility is definitely an asset, because the more time you are available, the easier it is for the employer to set a work schedule. Also, know how you are going to get to and from work, if you don't drive.

Be on Time

Arrive at the interview site a few minutes early. If you're not sure where to go, get directions ahead of time. If you don't have a driver's license, make sure you have a ride.

Go on Your Own

an interview, don't bring them into the interview room with you. Go by yourself. It's important that you speak for yourself and connect with the interviewer, without someone else's assistance.

Take a few minutes to thank the person who interviewed you. If you have an email address, send an email thank you note; otherwise send a paper note thanking the interviewer for taking the time to meet with you.

Attire

Applying for a teen part-time or

summer, non-professional job is a little different from applying for a full-time professional position. Dress should be, at the least, neat and tidy. Business casual is usually appropriate. For example, khakis and a neat tucked in polo shirt would work well. Your shoes should be moderate and you should avoid extreme hairstyles or colors. Also, keep makeup and perfume to a minimum. No jeans or shorts, no tank tops, crop tops, or anything especially low cut (shirt or pants) or too short (skirt or blouse) - keeping everything professional is a must.

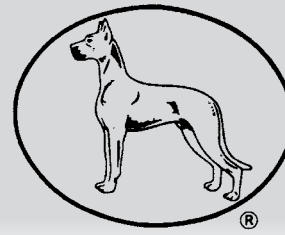

Cattle temperament may impact at feedlot

The temperament of cattle may have a significant impact in how they perform in the feedlot, according to research by the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, Kansas State University and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Cattle classified as temperamental appear to be less susceptible to lung damage and related respiratory diseases and have decreased yield grades, but at the same time may produce lighter weight carcasses with decreased quality grade, according to the study by Ty Schmidt, Joe Buntyn, Chris Calkins and Kathy Domenech of UNL; Jeff Carroll and Jeff Daily of USDA-Agricultural Research Service; and Justin Waggoner of Kansas State University.

The research team used 2,800 cattle at a commercial feedlot to determine cattle temperament solely by exit velocity upon arrival to identify the impact temperament had on feedlot performance. Infrared sensors were attached to the processing chute and alleyway and used to time how fast cattle exited the processing chute. Once exit velocity was determined, within each pen the fastest 20 percent were classified as temperamental and the remained deemed non-temperamental, said Schmidt, UNL animal scientist.

Exit velocity was used as a measurement of temperament because it is the only objective and practical measurement of temperament that can be applied in a commercial setting. Scientists sought to evaluate the impact of temperament on animal health and carcass merit with an eye toward using the data as a sorting tool within feedlots.

After scientists determined exit velocity, the cattle were maintained in their original pens, not sorted based upon temperament, and finished. At the end of the finishing period, the research team followed the cattle to the packer and evaluated lung damage, liver abscesses and collected all the

variables for carcass data. One of the major findings of the trial was the difference in lung damage associated with respiratory disease. The results suggest that the non-temperamental cattle had more observable damage to the lung, indicative of the animal being impacted by respiratory challenge, when compared to cattle classified as temperamental.

"The temperamental cattle may have more resilient immune systems," Carroll said. "Research has suggested that temperamental cattle have an altered immune response and display limited clinical symptoms of illness and this altered immune response may be a more resilient immune response compared to non-temperamental based upon these findings."

Schmidt and colleagues also found that cattle classified as temperamental had lighter carcass weight at harvest and decreased quality grades. More than 53 percent of the non-temperamental cattle received a quality grade of choice, compared to 49 percent of the temperamental animals.

Schmidt said the findings from this trial "suggest that utilization of temperament may be a viable management tool for feedlots. It might provide for a

unique management strategy that might increase returns on these temperamental animals."

With the difference in lung damage in the temperamental cattle at the time of harvest, and previous research indicating limited clinical signs of illness in temperamental cattle, segregation may allow for some modifications to the processing procedures and management of these cattle to take advantage of this alterations, Schmidt said.

Alterations may also be introduced in terms of nutritional management, or even modification of days to feed to overcome the decreased body weight of the temperamental cattle. However, before this type of segregation can be used in commercial feedlot, there is still a need to further evaluate this methodology, Schmidt added. The next step for the research team is to determine temperament upon arrival and then sort the cattle based upon temperament.
