Dwinell wins 'friendly' Sheriff's race

Barring write-in campaign, will take over for retiring Janssen

What's an election between friends? For Wayne County Sheriff's deputy Jason Dwinell, running for the county's top law enforcement office found him competing against three people that he has worked alongside during his seven years as a member of the county's sheriff department.

The 41-year-old from Winside came out on top in Tuesday's Republican primary race for the office of Wayne County Sheriff and, barring a surprise write-in campaign, Dwinell will take over for longtime Sheriff LeRoy Janssen, who is stepping down after 32 years as the county's top cop.

Dwinell was selected among four candidates for the GOP spot on the Nov. 4 general election ballot, beating out fellow Republican candidates Clayton Bratcher, Domenic Consoli and Cory Moeller. Dwinell received 39.3 percent of the votes (578), compared to 417 for Moeller, 293 for Consoli and 176 for Bratcher.

"It was a difficult decision to run against three friends that I like and admire and work well with," Dwinell told The Wayne Herald on Wednesday morning. "I think we all knew going in that only one of us was going to win it, and I think it speaks very well for all four of us that we were all able to run a clean campaign and be very profes-

sional about it." Because no candidate was entered by the Democrat party, Dwinell will likely become the new top cop in Wayne County when Janssen steps down at the end of his term. Janssen has said he intends to serve through the end of the year, pending any job offer that might happen before then. He said if that happens, he would give a 30-day notice to the Wayne County Commissioners.

Janssen was out of town helping with emergency relief efforts to clean up from tornado damage in Beaver Crossing, but Dwinell is anxious to sit down with the current sheriff and get some advice on how to handle the new job once he takes over in 2015, pending the outcome of the November election.

"I haven't had a chance to speak with LeRoy yet, but there are a variety of things I'll want to talk with him about," Dwinell said. "I'd like to see some of the specific things he does as sheriff and get some suggestions that will point me in the right direction once I start work." Dwinell said that he knows he still must get the voters' approval in November, but doesn't see a last-minute write-in campaign taking place to challenge him.

"I know there's a possibility and that's part of the voting process, but I don't anticipate seeing one," he said. "I know it's kind of a long shot in a county election, but you never know."

The Republican nomination for Wayne County Sheriff was the only race of local

School board updated on summer projects

A number of renovation projects and replacement of a number of computers in the school were among the items discussed during Monday's meeting of the Wayne Community Schools Board of Education.

Work on the heating, air conditioning and ventilation project is scheduled to begin next week, as soon as the students are no longer in the building.

A pre-construction meeting is also scheduled prior to work beginning on the Kern track. It was noted that the old track will be torn out and, when concrete for the project is poured, it will need 30 days to cure before the track surface can be installed.

A preliminary report was given from the recent AdvanceEd Accreditation visit. Superintendent Mark Lenihan said the

visit "went well and we received a lot of comments about our school. We will begin work on the areas that the team noted for improvement and plan to make this an ongoing process."

Lenihan also told the board that due to the fact that students exceeded the goal for NeSA test scores, the last day of school for the 2013-2014 school year will be Monday, May 19.

Board members also approved the purchase of new social studies textbooks and resources for students in kindergarten through eighth grade. The cost to replace the books, which will be purchased from Houghton Mifflin Harcourt is \$42,470.51 with an additional \$3,073.95 in resource materials coming from Gibbs Smith Publisher.

New weather system to be installed at airport

At 5:15 p.m., the report included a thunderstorm and light rain, a temperature of 73 degrees, 84 percent relative humidity and winds out of the east at 16 miles per hour.

That was the last recorded information received by the National Weather Service (NWS) and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) from the weather station just north of the Wayne

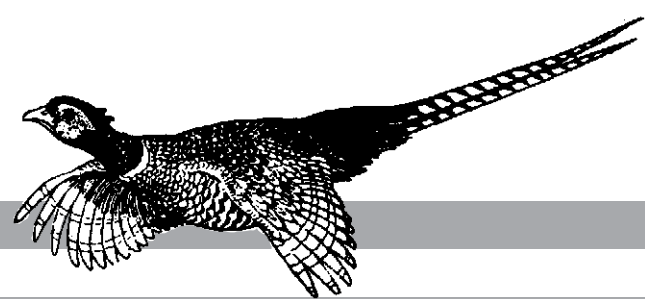
Airport on Friday, Oct. 4, 2013. The weather station lost power at around that time and, 15 minutes later, was blown away by an EF-4 tornado that also destroyed the Stan Morris Airport.

Wayne has been without an official weather report since that October afternoon, but you will soon be able to see Wayne's weather reports on the area TV stations once a new weather station goes back online this June.

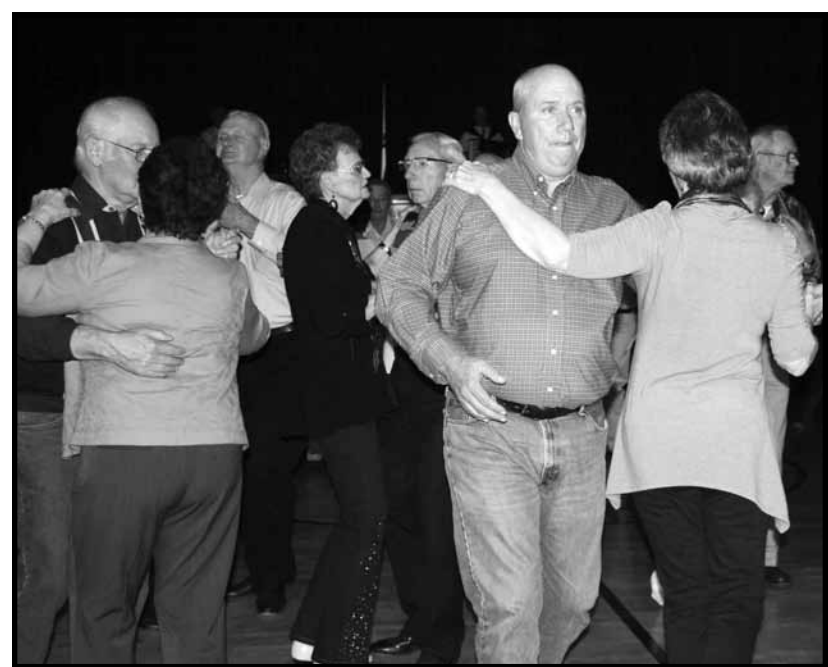

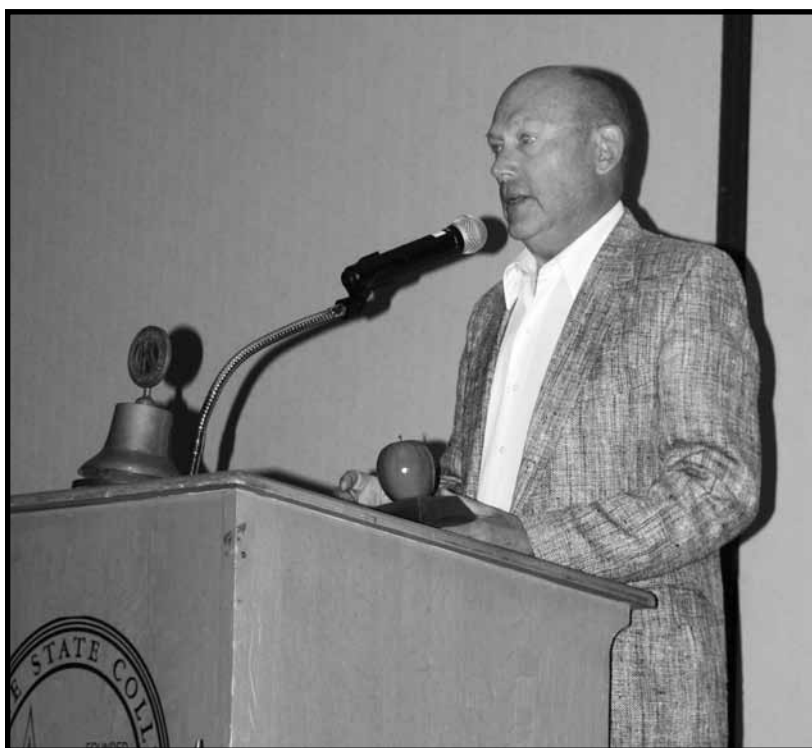

A first reading of the 7-12 student handbook for the 2014-2015 school year was approved with several changes noted by both High School Principal Mark Hanson and Junior High Principal Rocky Ruhl.

A bid of \$25,784 from Works Computing was approved for the purchase of 22 computers in the Junior/Senior High School technology lab was also approved.

Each of the administrators presented information to the board on recent activities in their respective areas.

Among the highlights was the third annual Spring Sprints, held May 2, and coordinated by Special

Education Director Misty Bear, with assistance from a number of staff, as well as members of the Wayne High School National Honor Society.

Bear told the board that approximately 60 athletes competed in this year's event from a number of area schools.

Bear also presented information to the board on the number of students in the district that are receiving English Language Learning services and explained the classes being offered to the students, as well as support provided to these students.

Wayne Community Schools Foundation director Lindsay McLaugh-

lin told the board that the recent alumni basketball tournament generated more than \$5,000, and she informed the board on how the proceeds will be spent. Several mini grants will be awarded to teachers at both the elementary school and junior-senior high school to allow teachers to purchase additional resources for classrooms.

Board members are planning a retreat prior to the June meeting with topics to be discussed to include preschool for the district, a facility analysis, a budget update and the AdvanceEd report.

The Wayne Community Schools Board of Education will next meet on Monday, June 9 at 5 p.m.

The Department of Aeronautics will install new equipment that is coming from Finland around the first week in June, according to Wayne city finance director and airport treasurer Nancy Braden.

"The equipment is coming from Helsinki, and that building needs to be put back in place, the power needs to go in and we have another building for the computer that gathers the information NOAA uses to report our weather," Braden told The Wayne Herald.

The equipment, which costs about \$93,000, will help to answer the question Braden has been hearing most often since the tornado hit.

"The most-asked question I've had since the tornado has been, 'When are we getting the weather back?' and it will be the first week in June," she said.

The installation of the weather equipment is part of what has been a rather impressive rebuilding project at the airport. The airport's runway lights were back in place within a month of the tornado's damage, and

seven buildings have either been rebuilt or replaced, including the terminal hangar work being done by Otte Construction that was within a couple of weeks of completion before the tornado undid everything that had been done.

"We're really coming along out there, and the contractor said they may be done with the hangars by the end of June," Braden said.

Braden said the original plan was to have the weather system up and running sometime next week, but floor sealing in one of the hangars needed to be finished before the weather system could be completed.

"We need to seal the floor of the hangar that week, so it works out better for the NOAA to get that up and running the first week in June, so we'll start seeing Wayne's weather on the TV very soon," Braden said.

consequence that voters decided, although there were plenty of interesting primaries involving state and federal offices that voters decided on.

On the Republican ballot, voters in Wayne County were on the right side in every state and federal race but the nomination for governor, where businessman Pete Ricketts narrowly defeated current Attorney General Jon Bruning. Bruning carried Wayne County by 104 votes, but lost in a close statewide race by about 2,200 votes.

Republicans who did advance to November and were the top selection in Wayne County included Ben Sasse for U.S. Senate, Adrian Smith for the Third Congressional district, John A. Gale for Secretary of State, Don Stenberg for State Treasurer, Doug Peterson for Attorney General and Charlie Janssen for State Auditor.

Democrats in Wayne County

didn't have as many candidates to choose from, but local voters picked Dave Domina for U.S. Senate, one of two primary races that was contested in the party, with Janet Stewart winning the Attorney General nomination. Moving on unopposed were Mark Sullivan in the Third Congressional District, Chuck Hassebrook for Governor, Michael J. O'Hara for State Treasurer and Amanda McGill for State Auditor.

Three Libertarian candidates also advanced unopposed to the November election, including Mark G. Elworth Jr. for Governor, Ben Backus for Secretary of State and Michael Knebel for State Treasurer.

A total of 1,752 votes were cast in Wayne County, representing 33.74 percent of registered voters in the county, a higher turnout than the 30 percent turnout for the 2012 primary election and 33.4 percent in the 2010 primaries.

In Cedar and Dixon counties, voters were nearly identical in their

selections, with the exception being the Republican race for State Auditor, where voters in those two counties chose Larry Anderson over Janssen.

Voters in those two counties had a decision in the District 40 Legislative race, and both counties went with incumbent Tyson Larson over Keith F. Kube.

Dixon County also had a sheriff's race that was a lot more hotly contested than the friendly battle in Wayne County. In the end, Don Taylor won the four-man race, gaining a little more than 40 percent of the vote to beat out Tom Decker, Roger Peterson and Michael Elton for the nod. Like Dwinell in Wayne County, Taylor is expected to run unopposed in the effort to replace the retiring Dean Chase.

All of Tuesday's winners advanced to the Tuesday, Nov. 4 general election.



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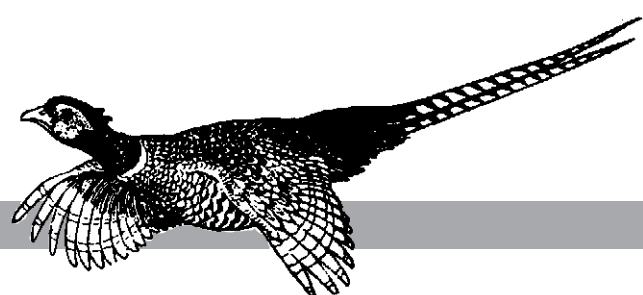

Throwers lead way for Wildcats

Wells, Fehringer repeat champs at NSIC outdoor meet

For the second straight year, Wayne State thrower Sara Wells and Carly Fehringer repeated as a conference champion to help the Wildcat women to a seventh-place finish at the NSIC Outdoor Track and Field Championships in Winona, Minn.

Wayne State's throwers accounted for all but one of the team's 60 points in the two-day meet. University of Mary captured the team title with 169.33 points, followed by Minnesota Duluth in second with 127.83. Augustana (110), Winona State (72), MSU Moorhead (65) and Minnesota State (61.33) finished ahead of the Wildcats.

Wells placed first in the discus with a winning throw of 154 feet, 5 inches. The Wildcats had two other throwers score points in the event as Michaela Dendinger finished fifth (142-4) and Fehringer was eighth (137-2).

Wells also took first place in the shot put for the second straight year, leading a 1-2 finish with an NSIC meet record mark of 51-0 1/4, breaking the old mark of 49-2 1/4 set in 2007 by Sheena Devine of Bemidji State. Fehringer put up a season-best mark of 47-7 3/4 to earn an NCAA provisional placing.

On Friday, Wayne State had five throwers score in the hammer throw as the Wildcats finished 1-2-5-6-8. Fehringer was a repeat winner and took first with a top mark of 192-1, while Emily Wells was second at 175-3. Dendinger finished

Wells tabbed as NSIC's best field athlete

Wayne State junior thrower Sara Wells was voted by league coaches as the Northern Sun Conference Women's Outdoor Field Athlete of the Year.

Wells, a junior from Albion, won two events at the NSIC Outdoor Track and Field Championships for a second straight season. She set a new conference meet record to win the shot put at 51 feet, 0 1/4 inches, finishing over three feet ahead of the next best throw. She also won the discus with a throw of 154-5 and placed eighth in the hammer throw to account for 21 of Wayne State's 60 points at the conference meet.

During the regular season, Wells has ranked among the top throwers nationally and is currently sitting second in the shot put (52-4), fourth in the discus (164-0) and 23rd in the hammer throw (174-7).

Exciting run ends for WSC

SIoux FALLS, S.D. — What a difference a few days make.

Just four days after suffering a four-game sweep at Minnesota State, the Wayne State baseball team got sweet revenge on the third-ranked Mavericks Wednesday in the opening round of the 2014 NSIC Baseball Tournament.

The win highlighted a 2-2 weekend for the Wildcats, who finished the season 27-24 overall and posted a third-place standing in the conference tournament after starting the tournament as the lowest of the eight seeds.

The Wildcats posted a shocking 2-1 win over NSIC regular-season champion Minnesota State at Karas Park, knocking off a team that had swept them just a few days earlier.

First-team All-NSIC starting pitcher Eric Browning outdueled NSIC Pitcher of the Year Jason Hoppe from Minnesota State in a game that saw the Wildcats make the most of their four hits. The Wildcats then escaped a bases-loaded situation in the bottom of the ninth to hold on for the dramatic win.

After Minnesota State scored the first run of the game in the first, Wayne State scored both of their runs in the second inning on just one hit. Junior third baseman Michael Herman reached first on a third-strike wild pitch, then scored on a Jake Perez double to right center that tied the score at 1-1. Perez moved to third on a wild pitch and scored on a John Roberts groundout to first base to give the Wildcats the 2-1 lead.

Browning shut out the Mavericks the rest of the way, with sophomore closer Curtis Bussard pitching the ninth inning. The Mavericks threatened to tie the score or even win the game in the ninth against Bussard, as the Mavericks used a walk, a two-out single and another walk to load the bases. Bussard got Parker Sullivan to strike out looking to end the game, giving Bussard his ninth save of the season to tie a school record set by Dustin Nilus in the 2005 season.

Wayne State had just four hits in the game by two different players as Perez was 2-for-3 with a double and RBI while senior second baseman Mike Servais was also 2-for-3 with a double and single.

Browning improved to 8-3 on the season with eight strong innings of work. He gave up six hits and one run with three strikeouts and one walk.

On Thursday, the Wildcats provided another dramatic finish in the tournament with a come-from-behind, 5-4 win in 10 innings over Winona State.

Senior first baseman Aaron Molinaro blasted a solo home run over the right field wall with one out in the bottom of the 10th to give

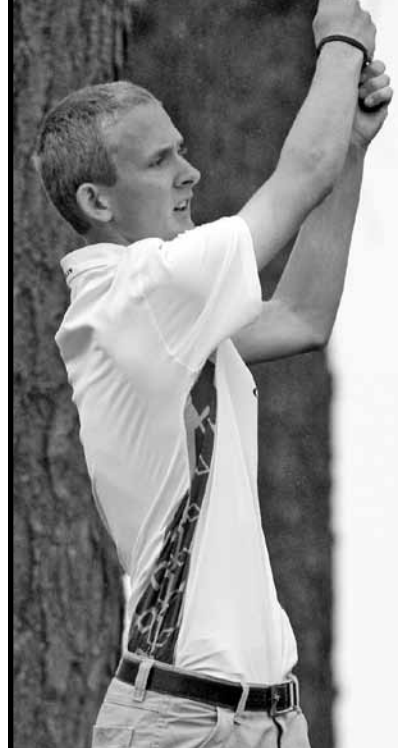

Columbus, NE – On Jan. 1, 2014, Nebraska Public Power District and its wholesale customer utilities began offering incentives to residential electric customers for the purchase and installation of light-emitting diode (LED) bulbs.

The Environmental Protection Agency's ENERGY STAR program encourages installation of LED lamps that use 75 to 80 percent less energy than equivalent incandescent light bulbs and have a rated life that is 25 to 50 times longer. LEDs do not contain mercury, which eliminates some disposal concerns.

LED lamps offer additional advantages over compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs), which have long been touted as energy-efficient alternatives to standard light bulbs. LEDs illuminate instantly when their power switch is turned on. Their light output is not diminished in cold weather. In fact, LEDs last longer in cold areas. LEDs offer a variety of color temperatures that allow customers to match the appearance of standard incandescent bulbs or the bright white of most office environments. Many LED lamps are dimmable, but customers should confirm this prior to purchase, as manufacturers are required to indicate whether they are or not on the packaging.

NPPD and its wholesale customer utilities are contributing approximately \$100,000 toward this campaign which will run through the end of December 2014. To receive the incentive, customers submit a completed program application along with a copy of their sales receipt to their local electric utility. 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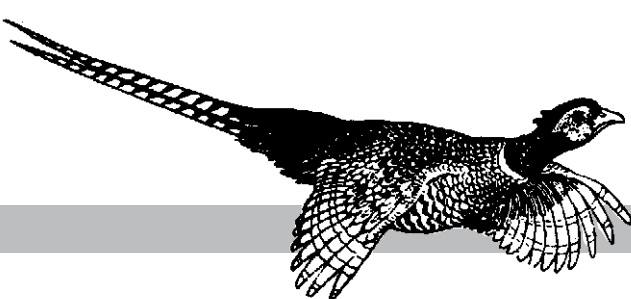

Your vote counts, so why waste it?

(NOTE: Before going any further, I do want to make it clear that the views in this column are my own and are not endorsed by the staff and management of The Wayne Herald. The Herald does not endorse candidates or political parties, so if you have issue with what you're reading here, e-mail me at sports@wayneherald.com.)

This question goes out to those of you who voted in Tuesday's primary (I'll get to those of you who DIDN'T vote a little later on):

How did you FEEL after you voted Tuesday? Did you feel uneasy? Were you absolutely confident that the candidate you voted for was the lesser of the evils available? Did you feel like you needed to take a long, hot, cleansing shower after casting your vote?

If the answer to any of those questions is yes, then you probably voted in one of the two major party primaries. Whether it was Republican (where the vast majority of Wayne County residents are registered) or Democrat (where a small-but-vocal group of die-hards cast their vote), there had to be a sense of dread that you were picking the lesser of two (or more) evils as you cast your ballot.

Capitol View Legislature by the numbers

As usual, a look at the numbers is the best way to determine just exactly what happened during the recently-concluded second session of the 103rd Nebraska Legislature.

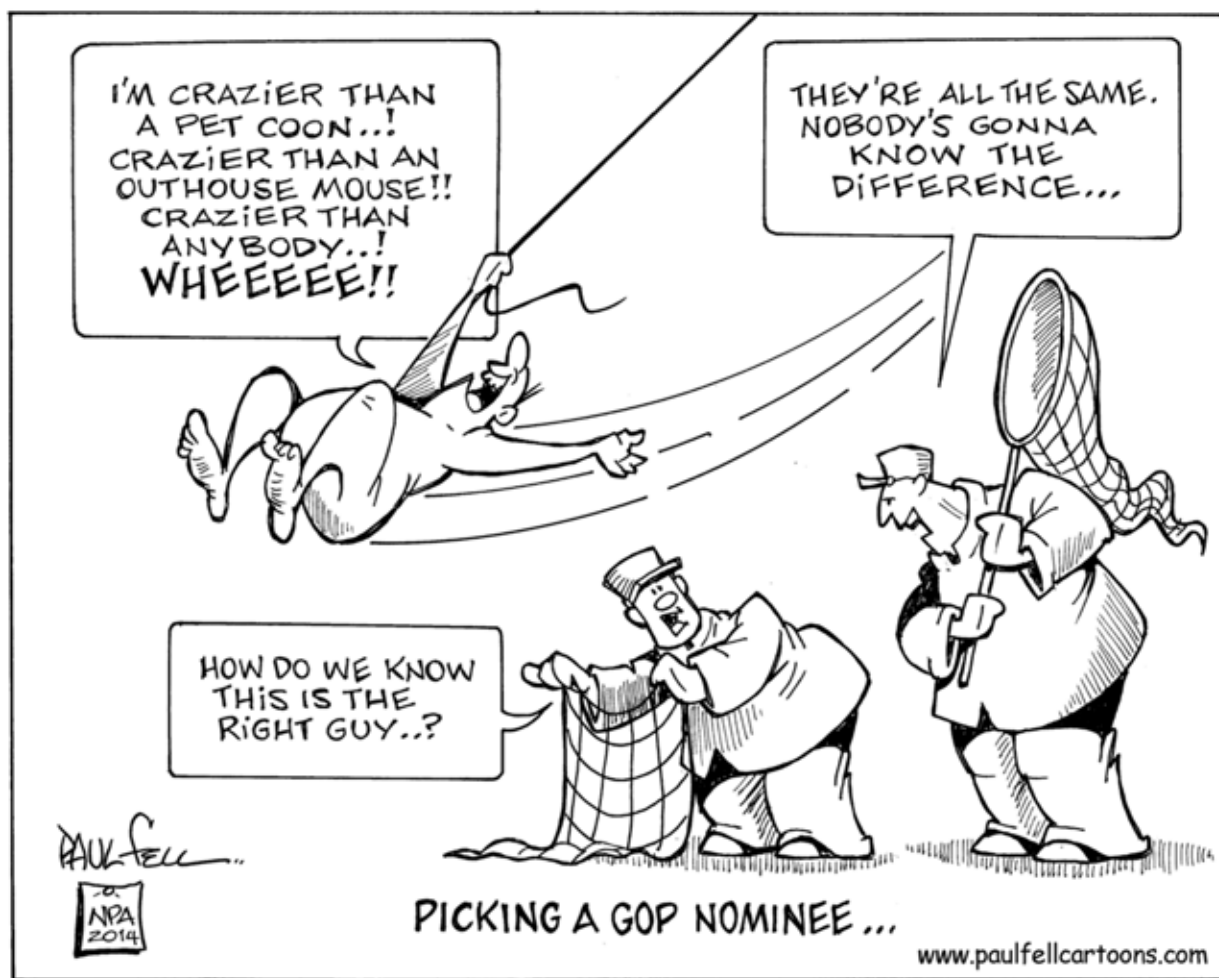
Over the two years that constitute a full session – 90 days the first session and 60 days the second – lawmakers looked at 1,115 bills and 82 accompanying appropriations measures. There were also 628 resolutions – some of which resulted in things like the Tax Modernization Committee – and 12 proposed Constitutional Amendments, only one of which (LR41CA to authorize gambling on historic horse races) will face voters in November.

Of that amount, 405 bills will become (or became) law. Of the 185 this session, Governor Dave Heineman approved 180 of them. Five (including major portions of the budget) were passed notwithstanding his objections. Two bills were returned without his approval and did not pass. One bill (LB1092 to allow for highway bonds) failed on final reading.

Lawmakers killed 727 bills and another six were withdrawn. Lawmakers adopted 135 resolutions.

Such is the unglamorous work of the Legislative branch. The stuff that doesn't make headlines. The stuff that isn't filibustered or otherwise filled with some manner of intrigue or mystery. Such is the stuff for which Nebraska lawmakers are given \$12,000 a year plus a per diem for living and travel expenses. Such is the stuff for which 49 state senators are allowed to serve a maximum of eight years.

It is NOT the stuff of Frank Underwood and his "House of Cards." The only "Scandal" might be a senator or an aid getting arrested for drunken driving, and that usually causes someone to wonder why the imbibing miscreant didn't just call a



lobbyist for a ride home.

Even with veteran Ernie Chambers' zeal to protect the mountain lion and punish those who didn't, and the attempts by those running for higher office to hone their speaking skills at the expense of their colleagues, the drama that was the 103rd Nebraska Legislature was pretty much routine.

Strip away the Governor's ballyhoo that Nebraska taxpayers will save \$412 million over the next five years and the Legislature's bragging rights that they overrode an excessive number of gubernatorial vetoes, and you've got a typical day at the office with lawmakers paying attention to the little things.

Here's a look at a handful of mea-

sures dealt with in the waning days that paint the true picture of legislative achievement. Lawmakers passed a bill (LB811) to update the list of banned controlled substances and to allow for enhanced penalties for people who assault first responders (firefighters, corrections officers, paramedics). The governor could not restrict firearms in the case of a state of emergency under a bill (LB390), which was also passed. The measure would also allow guns in schools for historic reenactments, hunter safety courses and honor guards.

Veterans will be able to display license plates honoring their branch of service (LB383) effective January 2016. Worker's compensation

rates will increase for emergency services personnel under another measure (LB961) passed. Teachers, counselors and school administrators would receive training in suicide prevention under a bill (LB923) that was passed to also establish a state school security director. The measure would also establish a protocol for getting concussion victims back to speed in the classroom and would require schools to hold two tornado drills a year.

Yes, it's the seemingly unglamorous yet essential things that were accomplished by the 103rd Legislature. Lawmakers deserve kudos for doing their job. Lord knows they aren't getting rich at it.

Legislative Update Watch for motorcycles

May is Motorcycle Safety Awareness month and the Nebraska State Patrol (NSP) wants to remind all motorists that we need to "share the road" with motorcyclists.

The weather is nicer, so we are starting to see more and more motorcycles on the roads. They have the same rights as those of us driving cars, trucks or SUV's. It is the responsibility of everyone on the road to pay attention and be alert to, and aware of, all drivers and pedestrians around them.

This is necessary, regardless of what they may be driving or riding or where they might be walking, running or playing. It is easy to miss a motorcycle because they are smaller and can often be hidden in a vehicle's blind spot, increasing the chances of you missing them with just a quick glance.

Unfortunately, we were unable to get LB393 passed, this year so motorcycle riders must continue to wear a DOT-compliant helmet. The helmet, while well intentioned, provides very little protection in accidents with larger vehicles or at highway speeds. Additionally, the helmet may provide for a false sense of security to the bike operator. Motorcyclists must also follow the rules of the road and have a license allowing them to operate a

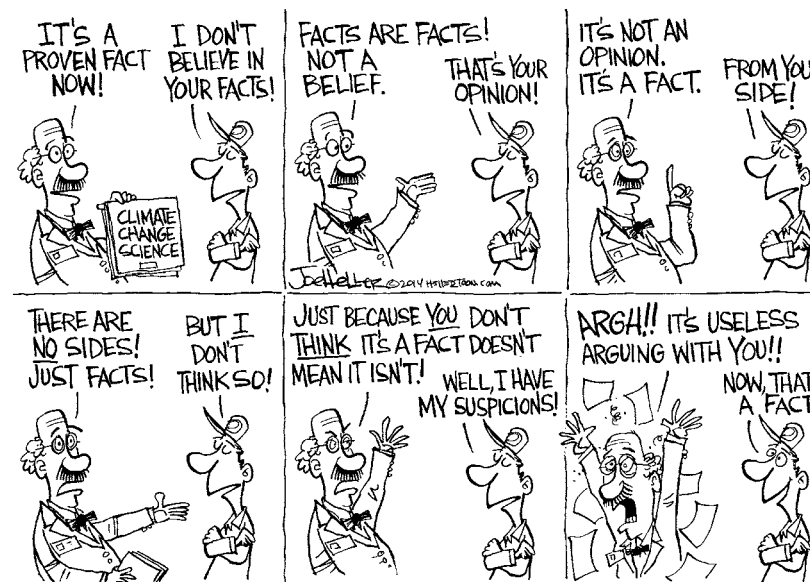

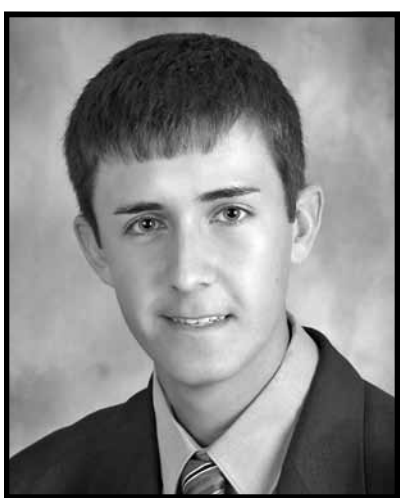
WHS sports nutrition class discusses fitness

Sports Nutrition students at Wayne High School spent a portion of the semester looking at the concept of fitness. They took tests to evaluate their coordination, reaction time, balance, abdominal strength, flexibility and heart/lung endurance. Dr. Kris Fox of Wayne State College, came to class and did skinfold caliper measurements on all the students. The students compared those numbers to results from a Bioelectric Impedance Analysis. What the students come to understand is that height/weight charts are not an indicator of fitness. A Body Mass Index may incorrectly identify an athlete as overweight or obese because the amount of muscle weight is not considered. Also, a person who is very lean isn't necessarily fit. They may have a large percentage of fat weight. The students then visited the Human Performance Lab at Wayne State College to do three other types of body composition activities.

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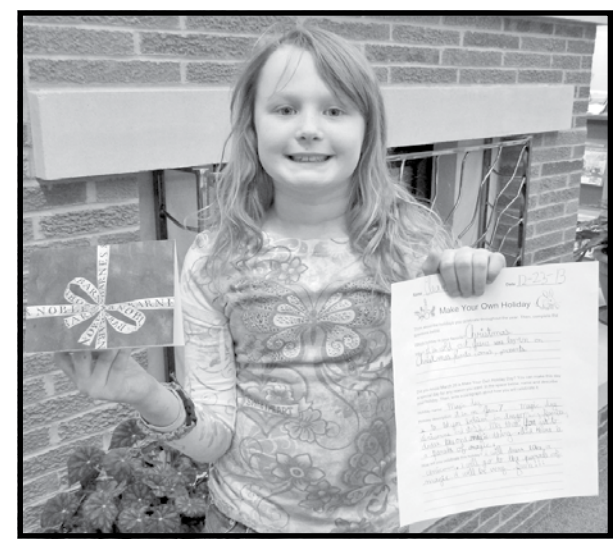
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McCalla wins 'Make Your Own Holiday' library contest

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Summer time is coming - check out tips for food, grill safety

Summer is on its way, and that means grilling season is starting.

Memorial Day weekend signals the start of the grilling season, said Julie Albrecht, food specialist at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

"It is important not to forget about food safety while having fun," Albrecht said.

Albrecht recommends following these tips for a safe grilling season:

- Wash hands with warm water for at least 20 seconds before handling food.
- Don't cross contaminate. Keep raw and cooked meat separate.
- Preheat the coals on the grill for about 20-30 minutes before grilling, or until the coals are lightly coated with ash.
- Do not let raw meat, poultry, eggs, fresh fruits and vegetables or cooked food sit at room

- temperature for more than two hours.
- Hot dogs should be cut lengthwise or into very small pieces before being given to children, as they can be a choking hazard.
- Always marinate foods in the refrigerator, not on a counter or outside.
- Do not use sauce that was used to marinate raw meat on cooked food.
- Keep hot food hot and cold food cold.
- Keep cold food at 40 degrees Fahrenheit or below until served. Hot food should be kept at 140 degrees Fahrenheit or above until served.
- Temperature is important when cooking meat. Use a meat thermometer to make sure meats reach the minimum temperature required to kill all the microbes.

"The best way to know that your meat or poultry is done is to use a food thermometer," Al-

brecht said. "They are available where kitchen utensils are sold."

In addition, Albrecht urges to use proper temperatures/cooking times:

- Poultry: at least 165 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Ground pork or beef: 160 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Beef, veal and lamb steaks and roasts: 145 degrees Fahrenheit for medium rare and 160 degrees Fahrenheit for medium.
- Fin fish: 145 degrees Fahrenheit of until the flesh is opaque and separates easily with a fork.
- Clams, oysters and mussels: until the shells are open.
- Shrimp, lobster and crabs: until the meat is pearly and opaque.

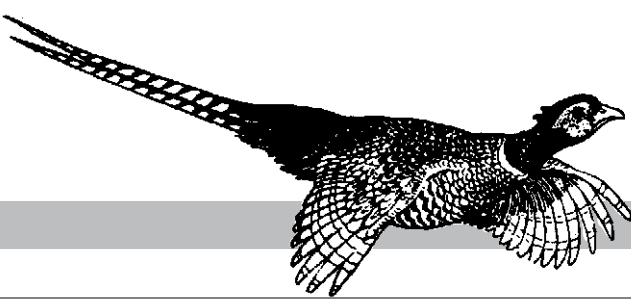

Tractor training classes coming, plus alfalfa advice

We will soon be holding Tractor Safety Training in Concord at the Haskell Ag Lab. The training will take place on Wednesday and Thursday, May 28-29.

Federal law prohibits youth under 16 years of age from working on a farm other than their parents'. Course completion grants an exemption to the law allowing 14- and 15-year-olds to drive a tractor and to do field work with mechanized equipment. The most common cause of death in agriculture accidents in Nebraska is overturn from tractors and all-terrain-vehicles (ATV). Tractor and ATV overturn prevention are featured in the class work.

Classes consist of two full days of instruction plus homework assignments. Classes are from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. each day. The first day of class will consist of intensive classroom instruction with hands-on demonstrations, concluding with a written test that must be completed satisfactorily before the student may continue driving tests the next day. Classroom instruction will cover the required elements of the National Safe Tractor and Machinery Operation Program. Homework will be assigned to turn in the next day. The second day will consist of testing, driving and operating machinery. Students must demonstrate

competence in hitching equipment and driving a tractor and trailer through a standardized course as well as hitching PTO and hydraulic systems.

Pre-registration is strongly encouraged at least one week before the start date. Cost is \$60, which includes educational materials, testing, supplies, lunches and breaks. Here are some current thoughts from Bruce Anderson, Extension Forage Specialist.

Many pastures have good soil moisture from spring rains. Fertilizer might help you take advantage of that moisture. Grass growth is stimulated by nitrogen fertilizer just like other crops. One key to profitable fertilizing of pastures, though, is to time fertilization to stimulate grass growth for when you need it. We often fertilize cool-season grass pastures in early April to get a good boost in early growth. By June or July, though, these pastures run out of both moisture and fertilizer. Add in hot temperatures and growth nearly stops.

This recently some pastures received abundant rain. With just

a little more moisture, pastures should be able to continue to grow longer into summer if soil fertility is adequate. If you were lucky enough to catch that good rain, take advantage of this extra soil moisture by fertilizing cool-season pastures with thirty to sixty pounds of nitrogen per acre between now and Memorial Day to gain extra summer forage.

To make May fertilizing work best, he has found that it helps to graze pastures moderately before

adding nitrogen fertilizer. This seems to encourage more thickening of the grass stand and slightly reduces the number of seed stalks produced. Don't graze too short, though, or plants will be stunned and regrow more slowly.

Would it be smart to fertilize again in May if you applied nitrogen earlier this spring? Normally no, especially with nitrogen so expensive. But if you applied just a light amount earlier and already have grazed off most of the grass, a second application might be beneficial, similar to the multiple nitrogen applications used on irrigated pastures. So, if you can use extra grass, fertilize now to take advantage of extra moisture.

You've been busy planting crops and getting work done with the late start this spring. But don't relax just yet because your alfalfa soon may be ready to cut. Being aggressive on the first cutting is critical if high forage quality is needed. Alfalfa's forage quality changes faster during the first spring growth than at any other time of the year. Plants are maturing and temperatures are increasing; both cause quality to decline. So don't delay if quality is needed.

But what about alfalfa for beef cows? That might be a little differ-

ent story, especially if you need to rebuild hay reserves. Normally we get our highest total yield by waiting until alfalfa is near full bloom. Not only is yield highest, this also uses what soil moisture is available for most efficient alfalfa growth.

In dryland fields you may need quite a bit more rain for good summer and fall harvests since many

deep subsoils remain dry. But with a good first cut you at least will have some hay of good enough quality to feed your beef cows next winter.

Timing of hay harvest is important whether your needs are for high quality or for high yield. With alfalfa becoming ready to cut soon this spring, don't miss your best time.

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AN UPDATE FROM DAVE

We've had a good week. A lot of progress is going on. We're finishing pouring the big shop floor today. Half of that was poured last week. The guys are back putting stuff on the roof today. The wind is cooperating so they're making some pretty good progress on the roof today.

We also had another subcontractor move in this week. The guys are putting in the sprinkler for the fire suppression system. Six different subcontractors are working and amazingly they're getting along. They're not falling on top of each other. It's a really big building, they can spread out. We can get everything done, but we have to go to a couple of buildings to get it done. They're not that far apart, just across the road. And we're still working in the other three farmer places.

Everything is in the field that was sold for planting. We're working on some hay equipment and starting to get combines in. Everything keeps coming in.

We have unloaded the last of our Reinke systems. We actually have a working demo with some corn planted at the old Plant Market property. We don't actually have the water hooked up yet but by the time we need it, we'll have it. We will also include the field connect unit from John Deere that will measure moisture so we will know when to irrigate.
