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Janssen steps down

Longtime sheriff submits resignation after 31 years

Outgoing Wayne County Sheriff LeRoy Janssen had told members of the Wayne County Commissioners that he might give 30 days notice before the end of his eighth and final term as the county's top cop.

On Tuesday, he gave them that and one more, announcing during Tuesday's county board meeting that he will resign from the job he has held for more than 31 years at the end of this month.

"I told you I was giving 30 days notice, and here I'm giving you 31." he said with a smile as he handed copies of his letter to the three-member board. The board accepted his resignation with re-

In his letter, Janssen said he has accepted a position with the Nebraska Association of County Officials office in Lincoln, and coln with his wife, Judy, who already lives there.

"Thank you for your acquaintances over the years and for all the significant changes we have accomplished together as a group for Wayne County," Janssen stated in his letter. "I have found the work to be both interesting and rewarding."

Board chairman Dean Burbach thanked Janssen for his years of service, which included six years as a deputy with the department. He also served nine months with the Wayne Police Department before joining the county.

"We're sorry to see you go, and we appreciate your service to the county," he told Janssen.

The county board did not vote on a replacement for Janssen, but they are expected to name Jason Dwinell as the acting county sheriff. Dwinell, 41, won the Republican primary for the Wayne County Sheriff and, at this time, is running unopposed in the Nov. 4 general election with no Democrat having filed for the position.

A going-away coffee for Janssen is being planned for Tuesday, would begin his duties there on Aug. 1. He will be moving to Lin- July 29, from 2-4 p.m. at the Wayne County Sheriff's Department. See JANSSEN, Page 4A

LB840 discussion on council agenda

The status of LB840 funds for various projects and the awarding of a portion of these funds to build a building in an area affected by last fall's tornado were topics of discussion during Tuesday's regular meeting of the Wayne City Council.

City Finance Director Nancy Braden spoke to the council on the amount of LB840 funds that have been allocated since the voter-approved one cent sales tax went into effect in 2008. At that time, it was determined that a maximum of \$3.2 million council on JEO's involvement with the projcould be generated for local development ect to this point, and noted that the city is

been committed to projects throughout the options on financing the project and gaining community, including \$500,000 that was allocated to those businesses affected by the Oct. 4, 2013 tornado that met specific criteria. Not all of the money was distributed, and at council's discretion, could be returned to the general LB840 pool of money.

Braden told the council that approximately \$132,000 is being re-paid to the fund each year and could be re-allocated in

On the topic of LB840 funds, the council

gave its approval to a request from Rodney Hefti, doing business as Hefti Trucking, for a \$50,000 loan (15 years at zero percent interest) to construct a building in the location of a former building that was destroyed by last fall's tornado. The business does not qualify for the money allocated for tornado relief, but is eligible for funding from the

general LB840 fund. Council also approved a proposal from JEO Consulting regarding services to the city in regard to the proposed aquatic center in Wayne.

Roger Protzman with JEO spoke to the projects. The sales tax is limited to 15 years. "at the end of the study phase and transi-To date, approximately \$2.8 million has tioning from the idea phase into looking at public support for the project."

City Administrator Lowell Johnson noted that the pool committee has arrived at two preliminary cost estimates for a pool, one for an indoor facility and one for an outdoor facility. Both of these would be located at the Community Activity Center.

Johnson also presented a timeline that would be necessary to have the issue put on

Team Rubicon relies on familiar faces in aftermath of tornadoes

Some familiar faces have been in the area in the days since tornadoes struck Wayne, Cedar and Dixon counties, helping out area residents who are picking up the pieces from what has been a dan-

gerous month of June.

Nine months ago, Team Rubicon came to Wayne to help the city deal with the flood of volunteers who came to help after the Oct. 4 tornado that struck the east end of town. The relationships the Team Rubicon members developed with city and county officials proved to be beneficial when the team of military veterans were called upon again nine months later.

Three members of Team Rubicon who were part of the relief effort that was stationed at the Wakefield city offices and fire hall had previous experience in the area, helping out Wayne residents after last fall's storms. That familiarity with the area and the government officials they would work with were a huge benefit during their return visit to the area last week.

"Wayne was the first operation Team Rubicon had done in Nebraska, and since we are still a relatively new organization, we hadn't developed any working relationships. That's the most dif-


as well as a variety of games, will be available on Main Street and several side streets throughout the evening.


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

ficult thing," said Max Jones, an equipment operation for Omaha Public Power District and a Navy veteran who was involved in a variety of duties during the recent cleanup effort in the three-county

Jones said that when Team Rubicon is called in, it's usually at a time when local residents are still dealing with the shock of whatever natural disaster had just occurred, which makes developing good working relationships a very important aspect of their efforts.

"A disaster is a traumatic experience for everyone involved, but it's something that we're used to," he said. "It's difficult at first because you haven't developed those relationships, but once we are able to do that, things move along a lot more

Wakefield's city administrator (Jim Litchfield) said he had an open space here and this has been great."

Setting up shop in Wakefield proved to be an ideal setting, especially when the storms that hit Pilger and spread into Wayne and Dixon counties were followed up 24 hours later by tornadoes that struck Cedar County between Coleridge and Laurel.

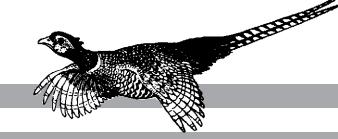

Overin Field damage is tough to see

Things that I thought about while thinking of things to think about (I

- It was heartbreaking to see the photos of the damage done to Hank Overin Field's grandstand by a tree that was felled during Monday's

The baseball field has been a treasure of the city for a long, long time. It was built during the Great Depression more than 80 years ago and has played host to thousands of baseball games, from American Legion baseball to the old town-team leagues that were so vibrant during the middle of the 20th century. Area fans sat in that grandstand and witnessed a future Hall of Fame pitcher by the name of Bob Gibson, who was brought in as Wayne's "ringer" to play the rival team from Winside, who – it was reported – had an ace up their sleeve as well.

We're still trying to fully recover from last year's tornado that destroyed the Summer Sports Complex – in fact, two of the fields have yet to have their lights installed and one is still without a scoreboard as construction continues at this writing (fortunately, what has been finished was able to stand up to Monday's storms). To have another well-used facility with the history and reputation that Hank Overin Field has to be brought down by the wrath of Mother Nature is, to say the least, upsetting.

There are a lot of memories that have been left behind in those grand old bleachers. Those seats, I'm sure, could tell a lot of stories about amazing plays, championship teams and outstanding athletes eight decades. Wayne fans, and fans from other communities, have witnessed many a classic game in those stands, whether it was American Legion, town-team baseball or even Wayne State College games.

It will be interesting to see, as city crews take care of the damage in the coming days, what the fate of the old stadium will be. I certainly can't imagine playing anywhere else, and I'm hopeful the field will still be playable enough to finish out the summer American Legion sea-

High winds drop ash tree on grandstand at Overin Field

It's a field that has seen everything from American Legion baseball to future Hall of Fame super-

For now, though, Wayne's Field of Dreams is more like an Arena of Uncertainty.

Late Monday morning, violent winds estimated at between 90-100 miles per hour split and uprooted an ash tree just to the north of the entrance of Hank Overin Field, depositing the old tree on top of the grandstand on the first-base side of the 80-year old baseball complex, leaving a mess for the City of Wayne to deal with - to say nothing of the future of the American Legion and Wayne High baseball teams who have called this field home.

"I'm just glad nobody was down there and nobody was stuck out there in that storm," Wayne City Recreation director Alex Koch said Tuesday afternoon. "The tree snapped right at the base of the tree and came down (on the grand-

Hank Overin Field was named after the legendary Wayne baseball coach who helped start and build the community's baseball and softball programs before retiring in the early 1990's. The city renamed the field in his honor in 1991.

The field was built almost 80 years ago as part of a Works Progress Administration project during the Great Depression, moving Wayne's baseball epicenter from its origins at the county fairgrounds. 

Dealing with food during disasters

It has been a wild spring and early summer here in northeast Nebraska. Many of us are just needing to take a breath, but the weather pattern does not seem to want to low down. Here are a few ideas for you to consider to get ready for the next "wave of weather" that comes out way. Stay safe out there.

When Disaster Strikes, Have **Emergency Food Supply Ready** When disasters strike, it's im-

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portant to be prepared with proper emergency food and supplies.

Tornadoes, floods and power outages make it necessary to have supplies and food on hand that don't require refrigeration and can be eaten cold, unheated or grilled.

Shelf-stable food, boxed or canned milk, water and canned goods should be part of a planned emergency food supply.

Make sure ready-to-use baby formula for infants and pet food is available as well. Also, use those items and replace them from time to time so they don't become outdated. It's also important to keep a hand-held can opener for an emer-

People who can be affected by a flood should plan out food storage on shelves that will safely be out of the way of contaminated water.

A couple of large coolers and zen gel packs also will keep food cold if power is lost. Refrigerators and freezers can keep food at safe temperature levels for about four hours if unopened. Packing food in coolers will keep food cold if the power will be out for more than four

perature of zero degrees for about 48 hours if it is full. If it isn't full, add a block of ice or dry ice if power is going to be out for a prolonged period of time. Plan ahead and know where coolers and emergency supplies are and find out where dry ice or block ice can be purchased.

Extension Educator

hold an 18-cubic foot full freezer for two days. If the freezer is not full, freeze clean containers of water to fill some of the empty space. If there is a power failure, this will slow temperature increase.

It's also a good idea to have a digital, dial or instant-read thermometer and appliance thermometers to know if food is being kept at safe temperatures and if the refrigerator and freezer is maintaining safe temperatures.

Meat, fish, poultry, fish, eggs, leftovers, cut fruit and vegetables should be kept at or below 40 de-

Food, Supplies Necessary

After Disasters

Tornadoes and floods can change daily routines in an instant. To be prepared for these disasters, families should have essential needs in an easily accessible and portable disaster supply kit.

Before disaster strikes, make a list of items that would be absolutely necessary for survival, such as special medications or foods needed by diabetics or others with health

Non-perishable supplies should be stored in an easy-to-carry container and a smaller version stored in the trunk or backseat of a vehicle.

If evacuation is necessary because of a flood or if a home must be left because of tornado or severe thunderstorm damage, some shelters will have food while others will not Take food, water and disaster supplies to evacuation centers or shelters and have enough food available for the first 24 hours

Normal, healthy adults need at Fifty pounds of dry ice should least one gallon of water per person per day for drinking.

> Also, additional water will be needed for food preparation and hygiene. Store at least an additional half-gallon of water per person for these uses and store at least a twoday supply or as much as space allows.

> In hot environments, store two gallons per person per day for drinking water. Children, nursing mothers and people who are ill may need more than normal amounts of

Commercially purchased water is best to store and should be stored in a cool, dry, dark place.

Potato leafhoppers can hurt alfalfa fields

Potato leafhoppers have the potential to hurt alfalfa in Nebraska every year. This is generally a second and third cutting pest and has been common in Nebraska recently. Southerly winds bring this insect into Nebraska, as is does not overwinter here. There have been a lot of strong southerly winds the last couple of weeks, so it is probable we have potato leafhoppers in the state. So, it is time to begin scout-

These small (1/8 inch long), bright green, wedge shaped insects may cause severe damage to alfalfa by injecting a toxin into the plant as they feed. This feeding results in a distinctive yellow or purple triangle shape at the tip of the leaf. First year spring planted alfalfa fields are particularly attractive to and vulnerable to potato leafhoppers, as are fields planted last year. In older fields, these insects are usually a problem on second and third cuttings. Newly developed resistant varieties will protect from potato leafhoppers fairly well, but alfalfa in the seedling stage may still be damaged. All fields should still be scouted, as large numbers of leaf- ly 1/2 leafhoppers per sweep could sure of the sprayer.

Uneven pressure throughout the sprayer boom can mean uneven application of pesticides. The first step in sprayer calibration is to determine that the spray pressure is equal throughout the spray boom.

Be sure to check pressure all along the boom because there might be a restriction in the line and uneven pressure. If the pressure is not even through the boom, you'll be wasting your time trying to calibrate the sprayer.

Nozzle Spacing: The typical nozzle spacing is 20 inches, but 30-inch nozzle spacing is just as effective if 110-degree nozzles are used. Most new air-induction nozzles are only available in 110 degrees. Another reason for 30-inch nozzle spacing is that most farmers are still planting 30-inch rows. If you want to use drop nozzles, add extensions to have drop nozzles. Thirty-inch nozzle spacing also allows for 50 percent larger nozzles. That, in turn, provides for using lower application rates without going to extremely small nozzles. Avoid nozzles that require less than a 50-mesh nozzle screen because smaller screens tend

Nozzle Flow Rate: This is determined by the nozzle orifice size, ressure and solution density. Re member that anything heavier than water will come out more slowly than water and anything lighter than water may come out faster. Adjust the sprayer accordingly.

Sprayer calibration provides the information you need to determine the amount of spray solution (both pesticide and carrier) being applied per acre. For more information see NebGuide G1756, "Fine-Tuning a Sprayer with the 'Ounce' Calibration Method" available at local UNL Extension offices or online at go.unl. edu/dr3.

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

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

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
