## Janssen steps down

Longtime sheriff submits resignation after 31 years

Outgoing Wayne County Sheriff LeRoy Janssen had told members of the Wayne County Commissioners that he might give 30 days notice before the end of his eighth and final term as the county's top cop.

On Tuesday, he gave them that and one more, announcing during Tuesday's county board meeting that he will resign from the job he has held for more than 31 years at the end of this month.

"I told you I was giving 30 days notice, and here I'm giving you 31," he said with a smile as he handed copies of his letter to the three-member board. The board accepted his resignation with regrets.

In his letter, Janssen said he has accepted a position with the Nebraska Association of County Officials office in Lincoln, and would begin his duties there on Aug. 1. He will be moving to Lincoln with his wife, Judy, who already lives there.

"Thank you for your acquaintances over the years and for all the significant changes we have accomplished together as a group for Wayne County," Janssen stated in his letter. "I have found the work to be both interesting and rewarding."

Board chairman Dean Burbach thanked Janssen for his years of service, which included six years as a deputy with the department. He also served nine months with the Wayne Police Department before joining the county.

"We're sorry to see you go, and we appreciate your service to the county," he told Janssen.

The county board did not vote on a replacement for Janssen, but they are expected to name Jason Dwinell as the acting county sheriff. Dwinell, 41, won the Republican primary for the Wayne County Sheriff and, at this time, is running unopposed in the Nov. 4 general election with no Democrat having filed for the position.

A going-away coffee for Janssen is being planned for Tuesday, July 29, from 2-4 p.m. at the Wayne County Sheriff's Department.

## LB840 discussion on council agenda

The status of LB840 funds for various projects and the awarding of a portion of these funds to build a building in an area affected by last fall's tornado were topics of discussion during Tuesday's regular meeting of the Wayne City Council.

City Finance Director Nancy Braden spoke to the council on the amount of LB840 funds that have been allocated since the voter-approved one cent sales tax went into effect in 2008. At that time, it was determined that a maximum of \$3.2 million could be generated for local development projects. The sales tax is limited to 15 years.

To date, approximately \$2.8 million has been committed to projects throughout the community, including \$500,000 that was allocated to those businesses affected by the Oct. 4, 2013 tornado that met specific criteria. Not all of the money was distributed, and at council's discretion, could be returned to the general LB840 pool of money.

Braden told the council that approximately \$132,000 is being re-paid to the fund each year and could be re-allocated in the future.

On the topic of LB840 funds, the council

gave its approval to a request from Rodney Hefti, doing business as Hefti Trucking, for a \$50,000 loan (15 years at zero percent interest) to construct a building in the location of a former building that was destroyed by last fall's tornado. The business does not qualify for the money allocated for tornado relief, but is eligible for funding from the general LB840 fund.

Council also approved a proposal from JEO Consulting regarding services to the city in regard to the proposed aquatic center in Wayne.

Roger Protzman with JEO spoke to the council on JEO's involvement with the project to this point, and noted that the city is "at the end of the study phase and transitioning from the idea phase into looking at options on financing the project and gaining public support for the project."

City Administrator Lowell Johnson noted that the pool committee has arrived at two preliminary cost estimates for a pool, one for an indoor facility and one for an outdoor facility. Both of these would be located at the Community Activity Center.

Johnson also presented a timeline that would be necessary to have the issue put on

The Wayne Eastern Star Chapter will hold a pie and ice cream social in the North Meeting Room of the Wayne City Auditorium from 5-9 p.m., and wine tasting will be hosted by Nissen Wine and Diamond Center/Flowers and Wine at the Diamond Center Friday evening.

## Team Rubicon relies on familiar faces in aftermath of tornadoes

Some familiar faces have been in the area in the days since tornadoes struck Wayne, Cedar and Dixon counties, helping out area residents who are picking up the pieces from what has been a dangerous month of June.

Nine months ago, Team Rubicon came to Wayne to help the city deal with the flood of volunteers who came to help after the Oct. 4 tornado that struck the east end of town. The relationships the Team Rubicon members developed with city and county officials proved to be beneficial when the team of military veterans were called upon again nine months later.

Three members of Team Rubicon who were part of the relief effort that was stationed at the Wakefield city offices and fire hall had previous experience in the area, helping out Wayne residents after last fall's storms. That familiarity with the area and the government officials they would work with were a huge benefit during their return visit to the area last week.

"Wayne was the first operation Team Rubicon had done in Nebraska, and since we are still a relatively new organization, we hadn't developed any working relationships. That's the most dif-

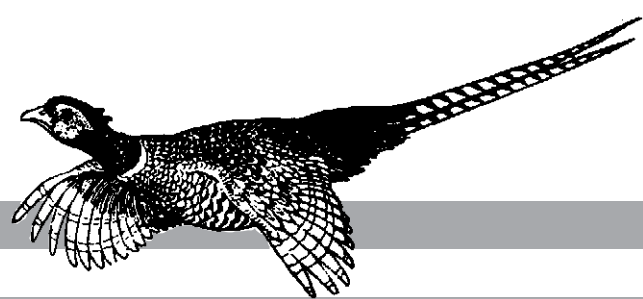

Robert Leon Parenti, 81, of Middleton, Idaho died Sunday, June 29, 2014 at a local hospital of natural causes.

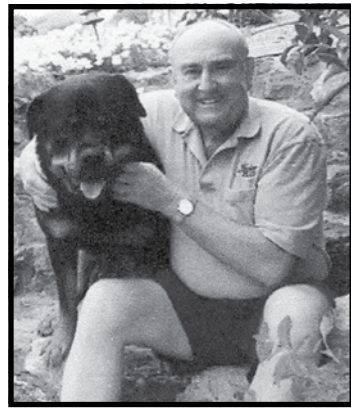

difficult thing," said Max Jones, an equipment operation for Omaha Public Power District and a Navy veteran who was involved in a variety of duties during the recent cleanup effort in the three-county area.

Jones said that when Team Rubicon is called in, it's usually at a time when local residents are still dealing with the shock of whatever natural disaster had just occurred, which makes developing good working relationships a very important aspect of their efforts.

"A disaster is a traumatic experience for everyone involved, but it's something that we're used to," he said. "It's difficult at first because you haven't developed those relationships, but once we are able to do that, things move along a lot more smoothly."

This time around, Jones, Bob Obernier and Steve Elliott brought that familiarity with area officials to the Team Rubicon effort and helped make things go a lot easier for the 10-member team that was dispatched to the area.

"We established good working and personal relationships with some of the people here," said Obernier, a native of Titusville, Fla., who handled volunteer management during the Wayne tornado and served as incident commander for Team Rubicon while working with emergency managers from Wayne and Dixon counties. "I knew Nic (Kemnitz, Wayne County's emergency manager) from working with him before, and with him and Shay Scollard from Dixon County, I think things progressed in a more organized and orderly fashion, and having already established those relationships made things go a lot quicker."

Elliott's familiarity with the area goes a little deeper. The retired Marine is the dean of the School of Arts and Humanities at Wayne State College, and an old college roommate of his started up Team Rubicon.

"Having had the structure put into place with the Wayne tornado, it did allow people to fall into place a lot easier," Elliott said. "With this being a larger event, the experience we had in Wayne made it easier for us to get involved and do assessments and get boots on the ground here right away."

Team Rubicon was originally set up at the Wakefield Fire Hall, but moved into a meeting room next door at the Wakefield City Office for their central command efforts.

"The city and the fire department here have been extremely accommodating to us, and I can't express our gratitude enough," Obernier said. "We started in their meeting room (at the fire hall) and it became an operational issue trying to manage volunteers coming in and running a command post. Wakefield's city administrator (Jim Litchfield) said he had an open space here and this has been great."

Setting up shop in Wakefield proved to be an ideal setting, especially when the storms that hit Pilger and spread into Wayne and Dixon counties were followed up 24 hours later by tornadoes that struck Cedar County between Coleridge and Laurel.

"Having such a large path to deal

with, with Wakefield having opened up their facilities to us and being able to use these facilities has really made this operation run a lot more efficient," Obernier said. "When these things happen, it's almost borderline, uncontrolled chaos, and we try to bring organization to it."

What helps Team Rubicon is that all of its members are either military veterans or former first responders who can work closely with emergency managers at the local, county and state level.

"We fit in with them and understand their language, so we're used to that regimen and it helps us to be able to coordinate with the emergency managers in the area," Obernier said.

Having had that previous experience these three had in Wayne is unusual for Team Rubicon members, who are usually in a different location each time they volunteer their services.

"Usually, we are coming in from the outside and it's a new town every time," Jones said. "This is a unique situation for us, because we've been here before and are working with the same emergency manager that we worked with in

Wayne. It's different for me because we already have these working relationships established."

That has been particularly beneficial for the team as a whole, especially with the expanded area they have had to deal with that included storms in Stanton and Dakota counties.

"The Wayne tornado was about 20 miles long and there wasn't near the amount of devastation on a wide scale that this group of tornadoes did in the area," Elliott said. "This event was so large and covers so many counties, and a lot of the damage is off the beaten path, so it's a challenge to get help where it needs to be, but as we've been able to get more people out here and get the word out, we're able to get to those areas."

Team Rubicon is a volunteer group that relies on donations to fund its operations. The team is invited to assist with recovery efforts on an as-needed basis, and volunteers come from all over the country to assist in relief efforts as part of the team.

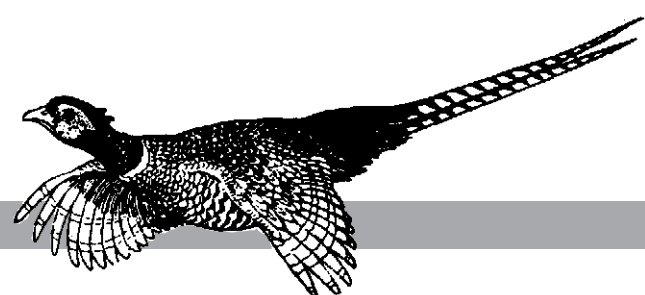

## Overin Field damage is tough to see

Things that I thought about while thinking of things to think about (I think):

– It was heartbreaking to see the photos of the damage done to Hank Overin Field's grandstand by a tree that was felled during Monday's storms.

The baseball field has been a treasure of the city for a long, long time. It was built during the Great Depression more than 80 years ago and has played host to thousands of baseball games, from American Legion baseball to the old town-team leagues that were so vibrant during the middle of the 20th century. Area fans sat in that grandstand and witnessed a future Hall of Fame pitcher by the name of Bob Gibson, who was brought in as Wayne's "ringer" to play the rival team from Winside, who – it was reported – had an ace up their sleeve as well.

We're still trying to fully recover from last year's tornado that destroyed the Summer Sports Complex – in fact, two of the fields have yet to have their lights installed and one is still without a scoreboard as construction continues at this writing (fortunately, what has been finished was able to stand up to Monday's storms). To have another well-used facility with the history and reputation that Hank Overin Field has to be brought down by the wrath of Mother Nature is, to say the least, upsetting.

There are a lot of memories that have been left behind in those grand old bleachers. Those seats, I'm sure, could tell a lot of stories about amazing plays, championship teams and outstanding athletes who have played there over the past eight decades. Wayne fans, and fans from other communities, have witnessed many a classic game in those stands, whether it was American Legion, town-team baseball or even Wayne State College games.

It will be interesting to see, as city crews take care of the damage in the coming days, what the fate of the old stadium will be. I certainly can't imagine playing anywhere else, and I'm hopeful the field will still be playable enough to finish out the summer American Legion season.

– Sometimes, you just have to go all-in.

There comes a time in your life when an opportunity presents itself that is beyond what you've done in your career, yet is within your creative wheelhouse and is just too good a deal to pass up.

I have a lot of friends who are "former" sports journalists – they love sports and love being around the sports, but at some point the opportunity to do something different that is not such a drain on your day-to-day existence, yet stirs your creative spirit and is something you're passionate about, is just too good to not go after.

I can remember when Travis Morgan was but a young buck in this business, asking me for professional advice. He actually lived next door to me in an apartment in Norfolk when he was a mass communications student at Northeast Community College and I was the fairly young and energetic new face of the Norfolk Daily News.

Our paths have crossed many times over the years. After I left Norfolk and he graduated from Northeast, we found ourselves in the same neighborhood for a brief period when he was at KMEG-TV in Sioux City and I was across the river at the Dakota County Star in South Sioux City.

A few years later, I made my way back here to beautiful Wayne, America, and Travis was still at KMEG, but he soon left for the bright lights of Omaha for a short stint at KMTV before the folks at KCAU-TV in Sioux City made the brilliant decision to bring him in when longtime sports director Tim Seeman decided to move to the anchor's chair on their newscasts.

# Local field hit by Mother Nature's pitch

High winds drop ash tree on grandstand at Overin Field

It's a field that has seen everything from American Legion baseball to future Hall of Fame superstars.

For now, though, Wayne's Field of Dreams is more like an Arena of Uncertainty.

Late Monday morning, violent winds estimated at between 90-100 miles per hour split and uprooted an ash tree just to the north of the entrance of Hank Overin Field, depositing the old tree on top of the grandstand on the first-base side of the 80-year old baseball complex, leaving a mess for the City of Wayne to deal with – to say nothing of the future of the American Legion and Wayne High baseball teams who have called this field home.

"I'm just glad nobody was down there and nobody was stuck out there in that storm," Wayne City Recreation director Alex Koch said Tuesday afternoon. "The tree snapped right at the base of the tree and came down (on the grandstand)."

Hank Overin Field was named after the legendary Wayne baseball coach who helped start and build the community's baseball and softball programs before retiring in the early 1990's. The city renamed the field in his honor in 1991.

The field was built almost 80 years ago as part of a Works Progress Administration project during the Great Depression, moving Wayne's baseball epicenter from its origins at the county fairgrounds. Before it was a baseball field, the land was used as a brickyard, a junkyard and even an ice plant.

The baseball facility has seen thousands of games over the years, everything from American Legion baseball to the old town-team games of yesteryear. Sometime in the 1950's, Wayne's baseball team heard that their rivals from Winside were bringing a "ringer" up to pitch for them, so they got one to match Winside's unknown pitcher – a future Hall of Famer by the name of Bob Gibson.

Tuesday evening, as a cool early-summer breeze rustled the leaves on the fallen tree, groundskeeper Jeff Zeiss sat in the first-base dugout and couldn't help but feel a sense of dread looking at the damage that had been left behind not more than 24 hours earlier.



As high winds in excess of 90 miles per hour rolled through Wayne, an old ash tree sitting near the front entrance of Hank Overin Field was split and lifted out of the ground before being dropped on the grandstand at the facility, which was built during the Great Depression in the 1930's.

"I just had that feeling," he said, recalling the storm of the day before. "I was just pulling out and Tracy Gamble called me and said 'You might want to come down here' (to the field). I just had to see it for myself."

Hank Overin Field has almost been Zeiss' home away from home for the better part of four decades. From his playing days at Wayne High School to his years coaching the American Legion teams, he's been coming to the field almost every summer since 1977.

"Back then, the infield was all dirt and the dugouts were below ground with chicken wire fencing," he said. "The city used to dump the snow from the streets on this field, and we'd have to come out here at the start of the season with buckets to pick up everything that had been left behind."

Even today, as groundskeeper for the field, Zeiss said he'll occasionally drag the infield and turn up some old piece of trash that has settled up into the dirt.

Now, he's not sure what the city will do with the facility.

"It was tough coming down here," he said. "I couldn't imagine what people like Doug Carroll and the Gambles, who put a lot of time in over the years getting the softball facility to look the way it had, were going through after the devastation last year. Now, I don't know what the city will do. The Juniors had a couple of games yet to play here, but with the safety issues, I don't know if you could play here right now."

Zeiss said he could see damage to the press box, as well as to the grandstand itself. Both he and Koch See PITCH, Page 2B

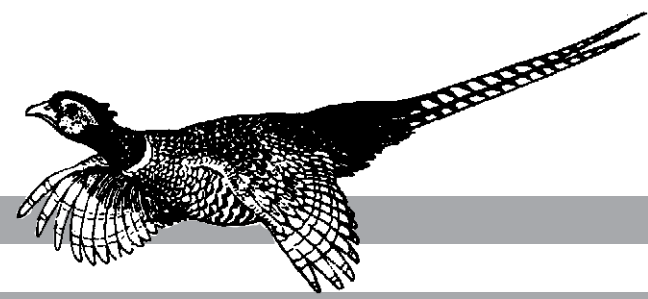

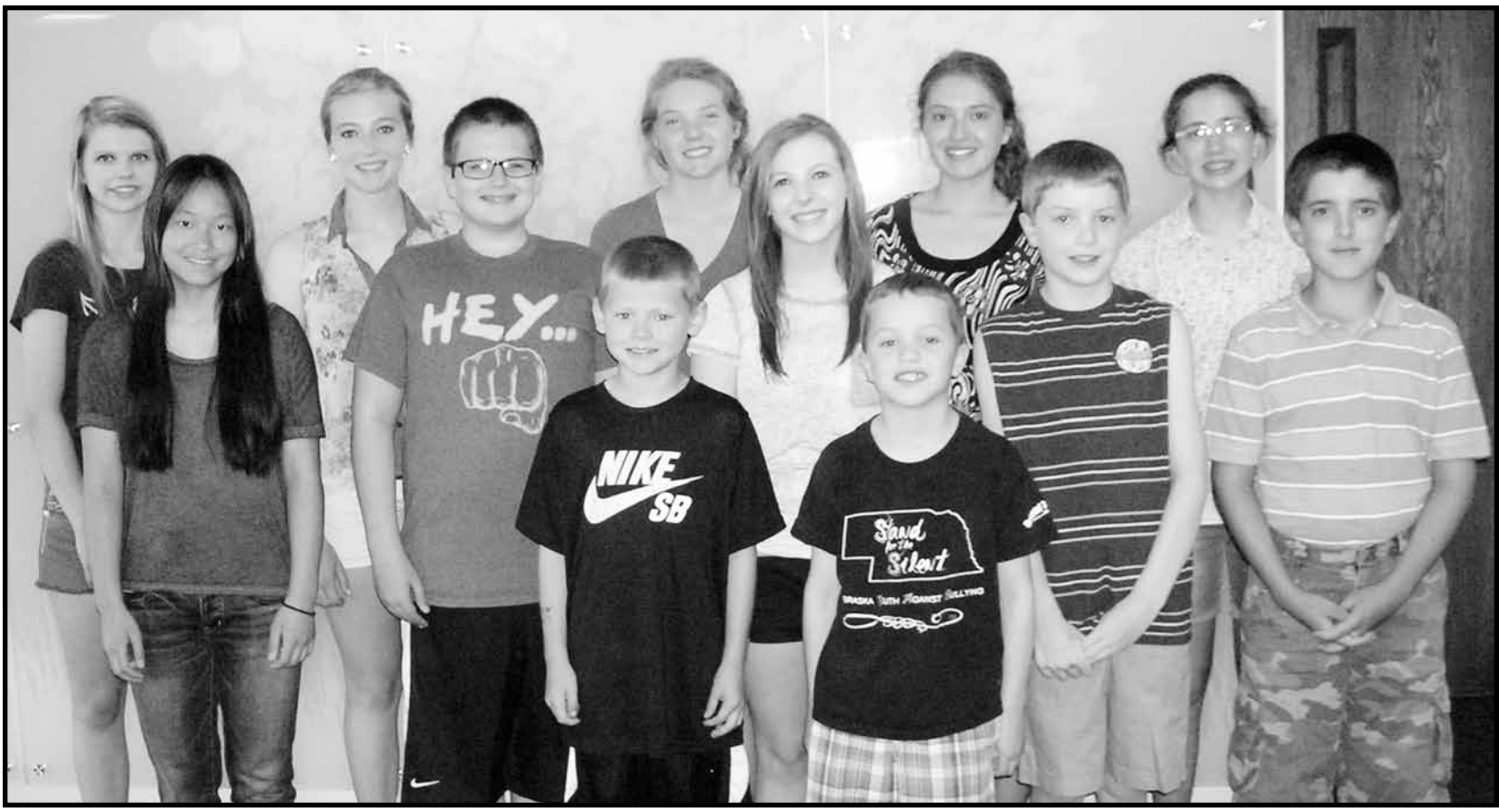

## Dealing with food during disasters

It has been a wild spring and early summer here in northeast Nebraska. Many of us are just needing to take a breath, but the weather pattern does not seem to want to low down. Here are a few ideas for you to consider to get ready for the next "wave of weather" that comes out way. Stay safe out there.

**When Disaster Strikes, Have Emergency Food Supply Ready**  
When disasters strike, it's im-

portant to be prepared with proper emergency food and supplies.

Tornadoes, floods and power outages make it necessary to have supplies and food on hand that don't require refrigeration and can be eaten cold, unheated or grilled.

Shelf-stable food, boxed or canned milk, water and canned goods should be part of a planned emergency food supply.

Make sure ready-to-use baby formula for infants and pet food is available as well. Also, use those items and replace them from time to time so they don't become outdated. It's also important to keep a hand-held can opener for an emergency.

People who can be affected by a flood should plan out food storage on shelves that will safely be out of the way of contaminated water.

A couple of large coolers and frozen gel packs also will keep food cold if power is lost. Refrigerators and freezers can keep food at safe temperature levels for about four hours if unopened. Packing food in coolers will keep food cold if the power will be out for more than four hours.

A full freezer will hold a safe tem-

### After Disasters

Tornadoes and floods can change daily routines in an instant. To be prepared for these disasters, families should have essential needs in an easily accessible and portable disaster supply kit.

Before disaster strikes, make a list of items that would be absolutely necessary for survival, such as special medications or foods needed by diabetics or others with health problems.

Non-perishable supplies should be stored in an easy-to-carry container and a smaller version stored in the trunk or backseat of a vehicle.

If evacuation is necessary because of a flood or if a home must be left because of tornado or severe thunderstorm damage, some shelters will have food while others will not. Take food, water and disaster supplies to evacuation centers or shelters and have enough food available for the first 24 hours.

Normal, healthy adults need at least one gallon of water per person per day for drinking.

Also, additional water will be needed for food preparation and hygiene. Store at least an additional half-gallon of water per person for these uses and store at least a two-day supply or as much as space allows.

In hot environments, store two gallons per person per day for drinking water. Children, nursing mothers and people who are ill may need more than normal amounts of water.

Commercially purchased water is best to store and should be stored in a cool, dry, dark place.

perature of zero degrees for about 48 hours if it is full. If it isn't full, add a block of ice or dry ice if power is going to be out for a prolonged period of time. Plan ahead and know where coolers and emergency supplies are and find out where dry ice or block ice can be purchased.

Fifty pounds of dry ice should hold an 18-cubic foot full freezer for two days. If the freezer is not full, freeze clean containers of water to fill some of the empty space. If there is a power failure, this will slow temperature increase.

It's also a good idea to have a digital, dial or instant-read thermometer and appliance thermometers to know if food is being kept at safe temperatures and if the refrigerator and freezer is maintaining safe temperatures.

Meat, fish, poultry, fish, eggs, leftovers, cut fruit and vegetables should be kept at or below 40 degrees.

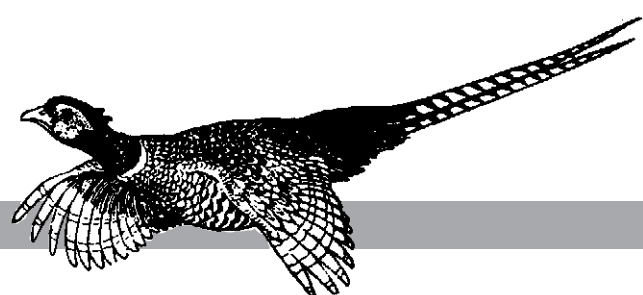

Trained Red Cross volunteers remain in the area. Local officials report there remains a need for untrained volunteers from the general public in specific locations.

In Stanton County, there is still a lot of debris in the fields that needs to be cleaned up. Volunteers interested in helping need to check in at the Stanton County Courthouse between 8 a.m.-5 p.m., where they will receive a location and assignment. Groups of individuals who want to help need to call (402) 658-5060 in advance.

In Pilger, individuals who want to help must check in at the Pool/Park area between 8 a.m.-3 p.m. Volunteers can also call (402) 833-1515.

## FSA county committee nominations due Aug. 1

Kristi Hanau, County Executive Director for Wayne County Farm Service Agency in Wayne, has announced that farmer and rancher candidate nominations are currently being accepted for the local Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees.

The nomination period closes Aug. 1, with the election taking place between Nov. 3 and the close of business on Dec. 1, 2014.

"I encourage all farmers, ranchers, and landowners to participate in the county committee election process by nominating candidates

by the Aug. 1 deadline," Hanau said. "We would like as much participation as possible since county committees provide a vital link to have opinions and ideas heard at the U.S. Department of Agriculture. With better participation in recent years, we also have seen a trend of increased nominations of minority and women producers that we hope will continue."

To be eligible to serve on a Farm Service Agency county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in a program administered by FSA, be eligible to vote in a county

committee election and reside in the local administrative area in which the person is a candidate. Producers may nominate themselves or others and organizations representing minorities and women also may nominate candidates. To become a candidate, an eligible individual must sign the nomination form FSA-669A. The form and other valuable information about FSA county committee elections are available online at: [www.fsa.usda.gov/elections](http://www.fsa.usda.gov/elections), or you may visit any local FSA office to obtain a copy. Nomination forms for the 2014 election must be post-marked or received in the local FSA office by close of business on Aug. 1, 2014.

FSA county committee members make decisions on disaster and

conservation programs, emergency programs, commodity price support loan programs and other important agricultural issues. Committee members are a critical component of the day-to-day operations of FSA. They help deliver FSA farm programs at the local level. Farmers who serve on committees help decide the kind of programs their counties will offer. They work to make FSA agricultural programs serve the needs of local producers.

Members serve three-year terms. In Nebraska, committees consist of three to five members who are elected by eligible producers. Hanau added, "It is important that farmers nominate the neighboring producers they want to represent them on FSA county committees."

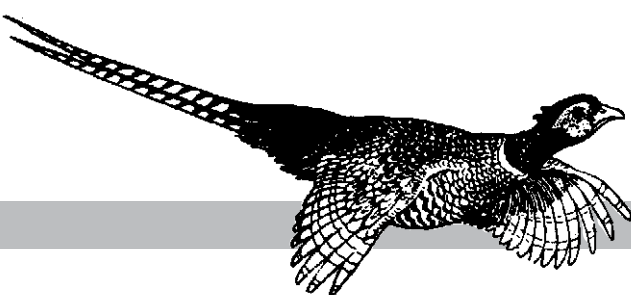

## Potato leafhoppers can hurt alfalfa fields

Potato leafhoppers have the potential to hurt alfalfa in Nebraska every year. This is generally a second and third cutting pest and has been common in Nebraska recently. Southerly winds bring this insect into Nebraska, as is does not overwinter here. There have been a lot of strong southerly winds the last couple of weeks, so it is probable we have potato leafhoppers in the state. So, it is time to begin scouting.

These small (1/8 inch long), bright green, wedge shaped insects may cause severe damage to alfalfa by injecting a toxin into the plant as they feed. This feeding results in a distinctive yellow or purple triangle shape at the tip of the leaf. First year spring planted alfalfa fields are particularly attractive to and vulnerable to potato leafhoppers, as are fields planted last year. In older fields, these insects are usually a problem on second and third cuttings. Newly developed resistant varieties will protect from potato leafhoppers fairly well, but alfalfa in the seedling stage may still be damaged. All fields should still be scouted, as large numbers of leaf-

hoppers may still cause a problem, even in resistant variety fields.

Treatment decisions are based on numbers captured by sweep net. A sweep net is the only reliable way to scout for potato leafhoppers. There do not have to be many to cause a problem. At today's prices roughly 1/2 leafhoppers per sweep could

justify a treatment, depending on plant height. A large number of insecticides are registered for control, and all will provide good results when applied properly. Commonly used insecticides include Mustang, Warrior, Baythroid, and Lorsban. If possible, refer to the UNL Department of Entomology Web site at entomology.unl.edu/instable/ for a list of suggested insecticides and treatment levels.

Uneven pressure throughout the sprayer boom can mean uneven application of pesticides. The first step in sprayer calibration is to determine that the spray pressure is equal throughout the spray boom.

Be sure to check pressure all along the boom because there might be a restriction in the line and uneven pressure. If the pressure is not even through the boom, you'll be wasting your time trying to calibrate the sprayer.

Check and compare the cab pressure with boom pressure. If there is a difference, make note on the cab's pressure gauge how much higher or lower the boom pressure is so you will know the exact operating pressure of the sprayer.

Set up the pressure gauge with quick-attach fittings that can snap in place on the nozzle fitting. Select glycerin-filled stainless steel gauges, as lesser quality gauges won't last.

Three basic things affect the number of gallons applied per acre. These include:

**Speed:** If you run the tractor twice as fast, you'll apply half the rate, if nothing else is changed.

**Nozzle Spacing:** The typical nozzle spacing is 20 inches, but 30-inch nozzle spacing is just as effective if 110-degree nozzles are used. Most new air-induction nozzles are only available in 110 degrees. Another reason for 30-inch nozzle spacing is that most farmers are still planting 30-inch rows. If you want to use drop nozzles, add extensions to have drop nozzles. Thirty-inch nozzle spacing also allows for 50 percent larger nozzles. That, in turn, provides for using lower application rates without going to extremely small nozzles. Avoid nozzles that require less than a 50-mesh nozzle screen because smaller screens tend to plug.

**Nozzle Flow Rate:** This is determined by the nozzle orifice size, pressure, and solution density. Remember that anything heavier than water will come out more slowly than water and anything lighter than water may come out faster. Adjust the sprayer accordingly.

Sprayer calibration provides the information you need to determine the amount of spray solution (both pesticide and carrier) being applied per acre. For more information see NebGuide G1756, "Fine-Tuning a Sprayer with the 'Ounce' Calibration Method" available at local UNL Extension offices or online at go.unl.edu/dr3.
