### 531 area code number assignments begin

sion (Commission) has been notified by the tation of the new 531 Area Code. North America Numbering Plan Administrator (NANPA) that the 402 Area Code is nearly exhausted, with only 10 codes re-

As a result, numbers from the 531 Area Code are now available for carriers to assign to their customers

In 1999 NANPA informed the Commission that it must begin the process of selecting a plan for providing additional telephone numbers in the 402 numbering plan area as the current available numbers were depleting rapidly. On June 30, 2009 the Commission entered an order adopting an overlay relief plan with implementation milestones. One of the milestones was the new 531 Area Code numbers would not be made available until there were only ten remaining codes in 402.

The Commission, in conjunction with the Nebraska telecommunications industry,

The Nebraska Public Service Commis- has worked to ensure a smooth implemen-

For everyone making calls in the 402 Area Code, ten digit dialing will remain the same to reach local numbers in the 402 and 531 Area Codes. Long distance (toll) calls within the 402 and 531 Area Codes will continue to require dialing a 1 before the ten digit number is called.

New numbers with a 531 Area Code will begin to be available for carriers to assign and will serve customers in the same geographic area now served by the 402 Area Code.

Placing calls in the 308 Area Code and three digit dialing, including 211, 411, 711, and 911, will be unchanged with the introduction of the 531 Area Code.

### Janssen giving up guns after almost four decades

After four decades in law enforcement, Wayne County Sheriff LeRoy Janssen is hanging up his guns. Janssen submitted his resignation to

the Wayne County Commissioners and as of July 31, will no longer be the Sheriff of Wayne County, a office he has held since January of 1983.

After graduating from Randolph High School in 1972, Janssen earned an associates' degree in law enforcement and criminal justice from Northeast Community Col-

His first job in law enforcement was with campus security at the University of Nebraska-Omaha.

"In 1975 I came to Wayne and worked with the Wayne Police Department for approximately a year," Janssen said.

He joined the Wayne Sheriff's Office in 1976 as a deputy and in 1982 decided to run for the position of Sheriff. He remembers working with Chief Deputy Scotty Thompson, who served after Don Weible resigned

from the position. Since January of 1983, LeRoy has served eight terms as Wayne County Sheriff. His term officially ends with the swearing in

Wayne County Commissioners in January

of 2015.

"When I began working for the Sheriff's Office, the sheriff lived in the jail, which was located in the same building the office is now, just north of the courthouse. In 1983 the sheriff moved out and the building became the detention center. Our office was

located in the basement of the courthouse, where the UNL Extension Office is now located. After the courthouse added an elevator, the office was moved to the southeast corner of the basement of the courthouse,' Janssen said.

Approximately two years ago, the Sheriff's Office again re-located - back to the building adjacent to the courthouse where they had been earlier.


Janssen said he had not seen a rise or decline in the amount of crime in the county throughout his career. "Probably the biggest change since I be-

gan is technology. Now we have instant communication in nearly all situations," he Although Janssen is retiring from law enforcement, he will continue to be employed.

He has accepted the position of Meeting Coordinator for the Nebraska Association of County Officials in Lincoln. In addition to being the Wayne County Sheriff, Janssen has also served as the Dep-

uty Emergency Manager for the Emergency Managers who have served Wayne County. He has also served as the president of the Nebraska Sheriff's Association in 1995; the president of the Nebraska Association of County Officials in 2012 and on the board of directors for this group for several years.



Who can give you CPR, operate a 70 foot ladder/pumper truck, crawl into a building on fire to do search and rescue, drive out into the storm to spot for tornados, and take control of a disaster scene to stabilize it while the rest of us get back on our feet? That would be our neighbors who are fire fighters that have other full time jobs and businesses. They do this as volunteers.

Wayne immediately dispatched fire fighters, rescue equipment, and PMC sent ambulance service with doctor and nursing staff to Pilger within minutes of their tornado. Fire fighters were deployed again in many places west of Wayne during the Wakefield/Pilger tornado and last week before the rolling high speed rotational winds that went through the north side of Wayne. They leave their own families at home and go out there as our eyes and ears in these emergencies.

In talking with Wayne fire fighters it looks like there were at least five that spent 40+ hours per week during the last 3 weeks as volunteer fire fighters away from their families and jobs. These are our neighbors doing this for us. Tell 'em thanks. Buy 'em lunch.

### Pretty weird weather here

The body's on vacation, but the mind never rests. Thus, another midsummer's purging of the "Bits and Pieces" file:

- A friend of mine from down in Florida asked me a rather obvious question the other day.

Recently, on a rare weekend afternoon off, the dog and I sat on separate couches, and my afternoon of watching World Cup soccer, College World Series baseball and pro golf was constantly interrupted by my dog's

Now if there's an expert on sawing logs, you're looking at him. I can do buzzsaw impersonations that would make the folks at DeWalt jealous with envy. I used to spend weekends visiting family, but now can only do so if I agree to sleep in locations where my snoring can't be heard in other peoples' bedrooms. I've spent more nights trying to catch Z's in garages, sheds and basement utility rooms during my family excursions.

- The push to get enough signatures to put the question of raising the minimum wage in Nebraska on the ballot this November gained a TON of signatures in its seven-week run, netting more than 135,000.

They only need 81,000 to get it on the ballot, and it's always good to have a cushion in the event that some signatures are deemed invalid. It will be interesting to see how many of those 135,000 signatures are legit and whether there will be enough to put the question to voters this fall.

- There's good news for the city of Wayne - the city is one of six communities in Nebraska that is sharing in \$1.2 million in grants from the Department of Economic Development.

Wayne is joined by Lexington, Plattsmouth, Schuyler, Nebraska City and Holdrege in the latest round of grant money from the DED. The city reportedly is getting \$215,000, which will go to pay for the demolition of six structures and the erection of something that, considering last fall's and this summer's bouts with severe weather, would be a much-needed addition – a public tornado shelter.

### Prison sentence calculations more than a numbers game

"Mistakes were made." That's a comment that has become all too familiar in government these days. In Nebraska, if it isn't health and human services, it's corrections.

For the third time in less than a year, bad behavior on the part of inmates or officials have made alarming headlines. It started last summer when a work release inmate who was speeding in a state van caused a crash that killed a Lincoln woman. Then an Omaha man was released and allegedly killed four people in random incidents. Next came the word that the release dates of hundreds of inmates were miscalculated and a number of them got out of prison too soon.

Credit the Omaha World-Herald with discovering the discrepancies and alerting officials and the general public about what it claimed to be a two-decade pattern of sentence miscalculations by the Nebraska Department of Correctional Ser-

By the numbers, Governor Dave Heineman and Attorney General Jon Bruning said: There were 306 inmates released early; 257 of them would have already completed their sentences; 3 have died; 5 have successfully completed parole; 20-25 warrants for arrests of the others have been issued in 8 counties; another 567 had their release dates miscalculated but have not been released.

The two elected officials said the state would be rounding up the former inmates with the intentions of making them return to prison. Heineman had harsh words for the Department of Corrections saying they made a mistake that is now being corrected, adding they better not make a mistake in the future. Bruning said the case law is clear, the people incorrectly released early owe the state the time. But, not all of the people released early will be re-incarcerated. Those who have cident will get credit for that time. For those headed back to prison, they could be making up anywhere from one to four years.

Public officials rattling sabers and talking tough is nothing new. But maybe the focus should be on the people who made the mistakes. Maybe a planned deep cleaning of the system should focus on who goes to prison in the first place and those troublesome mandatory sentences for certain offenses. State Sen. Ernie Chambers of Omaha and others have argued that is part of the problem because it takes away a judge's discretion in sentencing. For sure, the sentencing laws, which have changed more than once since 1995 should be simplified, carved in life. They all agreed that the cases stone and taught to the responsible corrections officials.

Not everyone is taking this well. These are people who have gone on and how long they stay.

is a long-time member of the Legislature's Judiciary Committee and a frequent critic of the system. The former inmate had been released three years ago and thought he had served his time. He has completed his parole requirements, has a fulltime job and is the provider for a wife and three small children.



These are not just numbers.

the problem while bringing as few people back to prison as possible. He says it's an ethical question for the state to officially discharge these people and then try to put them back in prison. He said these people didn't escape from prison, they served all the time that was required and they were released by

To his credit, Kenney says he is taking full responsibility and working with Heineman, Bruning and Chambers to clean up the mess. Let's hope that the fruits of that labor will be sweeping prison reform that will reduce overcrowding by managing both who goes to prison

Returning to the Wayne area to visit is also among his plans as he has relatives in the area.



### Alex Koch named head baseball coach at Wayne State College

Wayne State College Director of Athletics Mike Powicki announced this afternoon that Alex Koch has been named new head baseball coach at Wayne State College. He becomes the 14th head coach in the program's 54-year history and replaces Brian Disch, who resigned in May after five seasons as head coach to take a teaching position at Norfolk High School.

Koch (pronounced Cook) has been associated with the Wildcat baseball program as a player and coach since 2006. He served three seasons as an assistant coach with the Wildcats from 2010-12 and was a volunteer assistant with the program since after accepting the position as director of the Wayne Community Activity Center in February, 2012.

A graduate of Millard South High School, Koch was a standout player for Wayne State from 2006-09, earning First Team All-NSIC honors three seasons (2007, '08 and '09) and was a two-time ABCA/ Rawlings All-Central Region selection (Second Team in 2008 and First Team in 2009). Koch ranks second at Wayne State in career doubles (53), third in career RBI's (181) and tied for sixth in career hits with 217. He played on four NSIC regular season championship teams and four NCAA Tournament teams, including the 2009 team that reached the Central Region

Koch also has high school coaching experience, working with the Omaha Roncalli and Millard South Legion teams and most recently assisting the Wayne American Legion baseball program.

"We had a tremendous amount of interest in this position from many talented and qualified baseball coaches," said Powicki. "Through the process, Alex proved to be the best fit for taking the reins of the Intercollegiate Conference.



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
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### Fair season is time to remember good sportsmanship

heat and humidity may not be appealing, it's important to aim for about 60 minutes of physical activity most days of the week. Avoid the heat of day by venturing outside early in the morning and late in the evening. Water activities like swimming and water volleyball help keep the body cool, too.

Because of Nebraska's hot and humid weather, it is important to stay well hydrated by drinking lots of water. A cold glass of water is a refreshing and healthier alternative to sugary and caffeinated drinks. Cold soups, such as cucumber soup or strawberry soup, are also a good way to cool off in the summer heat.



### Water management suggestions shared

As we all know we are heading into the hot, drier part of the summer. Hopefully it will be nothing like last couple of years when the rain basically shut off for July and August. However, irrigation systems will be running and we need to manage our water resources more efficiently.

We can't do anything about the weather, but if we have irrigation we can water our crops and yards. In crops, sometimes it might appear pretty simple. Turn the pivots on and don't stop them. In corn, which enters a high water use phase around tasseling, this could be pretty close to the truth. Irrigated corn with its higher plant populations will use over .30 inches of water per day during the early reproductive stages. Since most pivots can put about an inch of water on a field about every three days, the turn on and stay on might be a reality. However, some water/electric restrictions and occasional rainfall can cause a change in plans. To get more information on corn production, including irrigation management, go to http://cropwatch.unl.

A relatively new UNL website offers soybean producers an easy-touse decision aid for optimizing irrigation efficiency and energy use. SoyWater, available at soywater. unl.edu, asks a few, simple questions specific to the field and then provides daily estimates of crop water use and soil water status

Users log on and after just a few mouse-clicks, SoyWater provides a table of real-time, actual daily weather data for computing daily crop water use from planting (or emergence) to the day before producer log-in. It then uses historical weather data to compute daily crop water use from the day of log-in to the day of expected crop maturity.

The daily weather data is from a weather station of the Automated Weather Data Network (AWDN) maintained by the High Plains Regional Climate Center (HPRCC). (SoyWater automatically identifies the weather station nearest the producer's field.) During the season, the producer will log in to SoyWater to input the date and amount of local rainfall and any irrigation applications.

Based on this information, Soy-Water will highlight the projected date when the first (or next) irrigation should be scheduled and projects the dates of specific soybean vegetative (V-) and reproductive (R-) growth stages. SoyWater can

be useful to both rainfed and irrigated soybean producers interested in predicting the date of a V- or Rstage. This information also can be useful when making other crop management decisions for a particular soybean field, such as when the effectiveness of a herbicide or fungicide depends on application at a specific growth stage. Give it a try.

For lawns without underground sprinklers it might be a losing battle and owners may want to let the lawn go dormant for a month or so, especially in little used and unseen areas. However, many people will still want to water to keep lawns green. Most of our lawns are coolseason, bluegrass dominated. The following are management suggestions from turf.unl.edu to help the cool-season grasses cope with the heat:

The almost immediate response to high temperatures is to increase irrigation, which makes sense and is needed since most water is used for cooling the plant. However, saturated soils from over irrigation limits oxygen leading to root death and thus severely compromises the grass plant over the rest of the sea-

Therefore, we still want to keep turf on the dry side to maximize soil oxygen, but at the same time enough water should be applied to allow the plant to cool itself. We are often questioned about irrigating lightly (syringing) during the day to cool the turf. This effect is very short term, maybe lasting 10-15 minutes depending on the conditions. Water at least one inch at a time and only when necessary, when you see the grass beginning to turn a lighter color. This may happen every 4 to

7 days during the hot part of the summer. Extreme heat may require more frequent watering. If you have an automated watering system invest in a rain shut-off valve that will turn your system off during a rain. It costs about \$40.00. There is nothing more aggravating than seeing sprinklers go off during or just

after a big rainfall. Continue mowing as needed, but be sure turf is well-watered to insure no extra damage. Consider mowing in the morning or evenings when temperature and water demand is lowest. Keep the grass length to 2 1/2 to 3 inches for shading of the ground.

Grass cut too short will allow the sunlight to reach the ground and raise temperatures much higher. This is still the biggest mistake I see in area lawns. Only golf greens should be short and they require intensive management.

Brian Anderson, broadcasting instructor, Cara Hoehne, business instructor, and Kate Trindle, history/geography instructor, traveled

Denmark. "The trip to Aarhus was an amazing experience, both culturally and educationally," Anderson said. "Our hosts provided us with a great mix of both that helped us bring those experiences back to our students and classrooms."

Administrators at Northeast and Aarhus signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) in April 2013, designed to promote relationships among students, faculty, administration, and board members that will mutually benefit each college. The Danish institution sent three instructors to Northeast Community College in October, 2013.

On their recent visit, Anderson, Hoehne and Trindle had the opportunity to immerse themselves in both of Denmark's education system and culture.

Hoehne said she enjoyed getting to meet the students. "They divide their students based on the degree they are seeking and where the person is in life when they are seeking that degree. At Northeast, we put all of these students together."

She said in her business communications class at Northeast, she has instructed students enrolled in business, diesel technology, wind energy, utility line, administrative assistant, computer programming, medical administrative assistant, graphic design, drafting, welding, and auto body. Hoehne said she also has had students of all ages in one classroom - from a high school senior to a second career grand-

"I believe these dynamics create a unique atmosphere with many different opinions and perspectives. Our students receive first hand experiences and enjoy communicating with students from across campus."

The age range at Aarhus Business College is primarily between 15 and 22, however, there are some non-traditional students. In the Danish education system, students can choose their direction after ninth grade. They may go on to 10th grade and finish high school or choose a technical college or trade school, such as Aarhus Business College, where they learn specific skills to prepare them for life in the work force.

Trindle said Aarhus instructors requested she have three different presentations when she taught. "I received the best response from students on The American Dream and American Politics. I also presented on Nebraska Culture. While our political systems are way different, we concluded that the American Dream isn't all that different than the Danish Dream. Our means of securing both Danish radio and TV industries locked up and stored. the dream are a bit different.

Trindle said the Aarhus students were eager to learn and asked good questions about Americans and American life. "They have impressions from movies and media and wondered about which stereotypes are true.

The Aarhus MOU actually got its start through the Northeast broadcasting program. The Danish college doesn't have a broadcasting department, but it wants to incorporate more of the technology. That's where Anderson comes in.

"This was my favorite stop on the tour," Hoehne said. "It's where the North Sea meets the Baltic Sea and you can literally see an "X" in the water. Our guide was curious as to why we were picking up seashells on the shore. We quickly let him know that we do not have

seashells in Nebraska."

The group also took a three hour train ride to Copenhagen, the country's capital - where there saw the Queen's Palace, Parliament, The Little Mermaid statute and numerous other famous landmarks. They also traveled south over the Danish border into Germany to the town of Flensberg. On the way to Germany, they stopped at a former WW II concentration camp and bunker complex and one of Denmark's first communities, Ribe.

Anderson said the night before they left, they stayed at the famous Legoland Hotel in Billund, Denheard of or owns Legos, but do they realize that this product originates in Denmark?"

Anderson, Hoehne, and Trindle enthusiastically agree that the trip was very beneficial to them as it gave them a better understanding of the Danish culture.

"I think my cohorts will agree that we have come home with a much better understanding of Denmark and Danish culture and we can share that with our students and be one step closer to making our curriculum more international," Trindle said. "Our students will benefit from this partnership with Aarhus Business College. We hope in the near future to be able to offer such an exchange for our students

and theirs as well."

Anderson called it an "amazing" cultural and educational experience. "In today's world, it is important that our students learn about other cultures and learn how to operate in a global climate. When I teach my students about advertising or commercial production, I will be able to relate to them about how it's done in Denmark. I will be able to tell them about how the skills they are learning at Northeast can be utilized in a broadcasting career in Denmark and how the programs they create here in the U.S. could be seen in European countries," he said. "I also brought back a few classroom ideas that I will be using beginning this fall.'

Hoehne was very complementary of their hosts at Aarhus Business College. "They had a fantastic itinerary planned for us, and we basically saw the entire country of Denmark. We were asked many times if we need down time, and we enthusiastically said 'no, we want to see it all!"

She feels very fortunate to have been chosen to travel to Denmark. "Northeast's commitment to Global Educational Opportunities for our students should be commended. Whether a student travels abroad with Northeast, has exchange students in their classroom, or has an instructor who travels abroad, global and cultural understanding will be enhanced. We can talk about how the world is getting smaller in our classrooms all we want, but it we can bring in real life experiences, people, and examples, students will truly understand just how important global and cultural understanding can be."

### LEDs Help You See 'Green'

Nebraska customers can save money, energy with new light incentive

Columbus, NE – On Jan. 1, 2014, Nebraska Public Power District and its wholesale customer utilities began offering incentives to residential electric customers for the purchase and installation of lightemitting diode (LED) bulbs.

At the start of this new 2014 year, final provisions of the 2007 Energy Policy Act began phasing out the standard, 60-watt, incandescent light bulb. Production and importation of the 100-watt and 75-watt standard incandescent lamps have already been closed out over the past two years under the same policy.

Fortunately, customers have an excellent alternative. City of Wayne Electric utilities will provide customers with a \$5 account credit for each 60, 75, or 100-watt LED equivalent to the standard bulb they buy, with up to 10 credits available per residential account this year. Customers can purchase these LED lamps wherever they desire, but the package must be identified as ENERGY STAR® quali-

The Environmental Protection Agency's ENERGY STAR program encourages installation of LED lamps that use 75 to 80 percent less energy than equivalent incandescent light bulbs and have a rated life that is 25 to 50 times longer. LEDs do not contain mercury, which eliminates some disposal concerns.

LED lamps offer additional advantages over compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs), which have long been touted as energy-efficient alternatives to standard light bulbs. LEDs illuminate instantly when their power switch is turned on. Their light output is not diminished in cold weather. In fact, LEDs last longer in cold areas. LEDs offer a variety of color temperatures that allow customers to match the appearance of standard incandescent bulbs or the bright white of most office environments. Many LED lamps are dimmable, but customers should confirm this prior to purchase, as manufacturers are required to indicate whether they are or not on the packaging.

NPPD and its wholesale customer utilities are contributing approximately \$100,000 toward this campaign which will run through the end of December 2014. To receive the incentive, customers submit a completed program application along with a copy of their sales receipt to their local electric utility.
