Many of those involved in this summer's production have taken on several roles, including helping with set design, technical support and acting in the production.

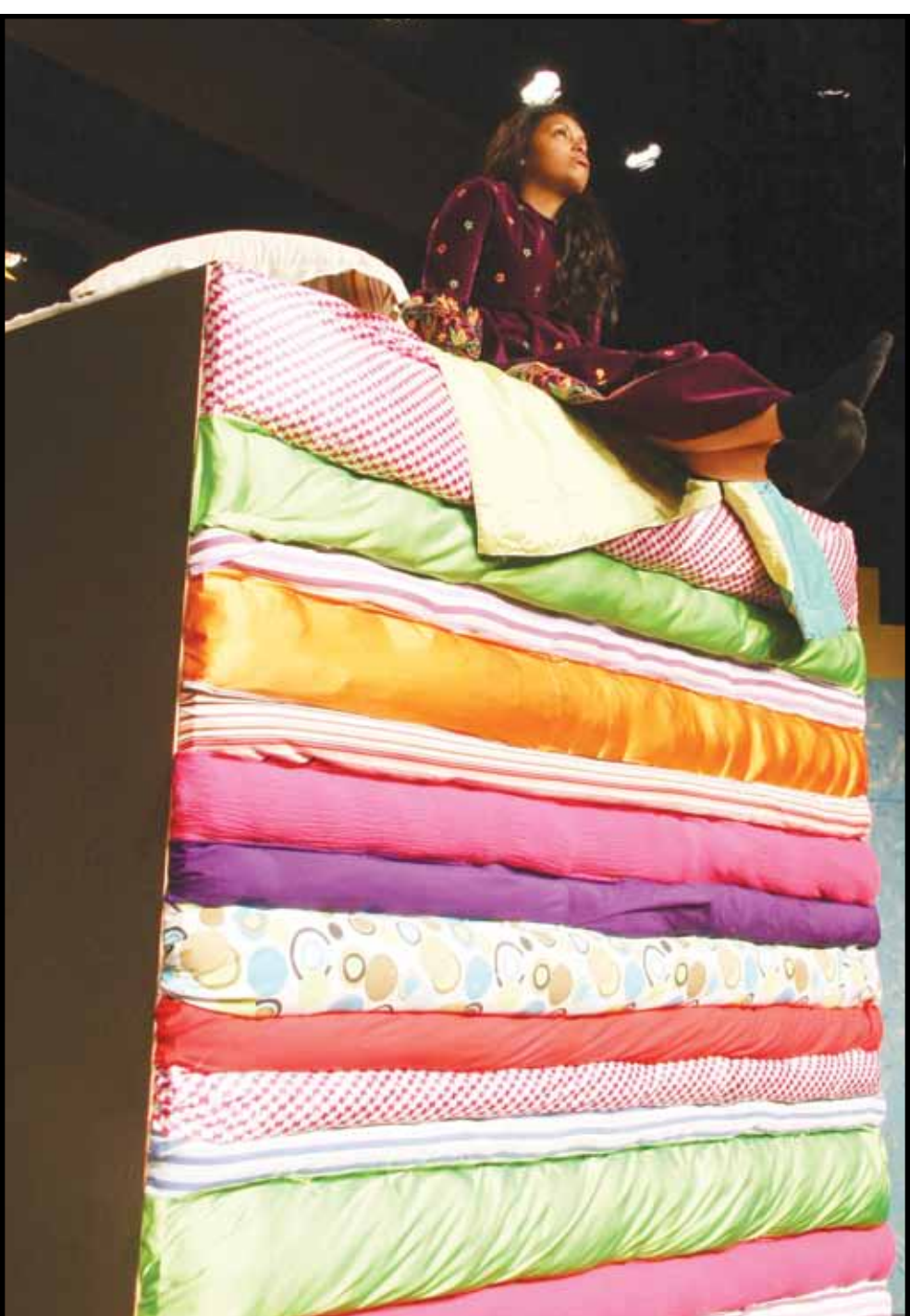
Melissa Derechailo designed the set and was responsible for building portions of it.

## 531 area code number assignments begin

The Nebraska Public Service Commission (Commission) has been notified by the North America Numbering Plan Administrator (NANPA) that the 402 Area Code is nearly exhausted, with only 10 codes remaining.

As a result, numbers from the 531 Area Code are now available for carriers to assign to their customers.

In 1999 NANPA informed the Commission that it must begin the process of selecting a plan for providing additional telephone numbers in the 402 numbering plan area as the current available numbers were depleting rapidly. On June 30, 2009 the Commission entered an order adopting an overlay relief plan with implementation milestones. One of the milestones was the new 531 Area Code numbers would not be made available until there were only ten remaining codes in 402.

The Commission, in conjunction with the Nebraska telecommunications industry,

has worked to ensure a smooth implementation of the new 531 Area Code.

For everyone making calls in the 402 Area Code, ten digit dialing will remain the same to reach local numbers in the 402 and 531 Area Codes. Long distance (toll) calls within the 402 and 531 Area Codes will continue to require dialing a 1 before the ten digit number is called.

New numbers with a 531 Area Code will begin to be available for carriers to assign and will serve customers in the same geographic area now served by the 402 Area Code.

Placing calls in the 308 Area Code and three digit dialing, including 211, 411, 711, and 911, will be unchanged with the introduction of the 531 Area Code.

## Janssen giving up guns after almost four decades

After four decades in law enforcement, Wayne County Sheriff LeRoy Janssen is hanging up his guns.

Janssen submitted his resignation to the Wayne County Commissioners and as of July 31, will no longer be the Sheriff of Wayne County, a office he has held since January of 1983.

After graduating from Randolph High School in 1972, Janssen earned an associates' degree in law enforcement and criminal justice from Northeast Community College.

His first job in law enforcement was with campus security at the University of Nebraska-Omaha.

"In 1975 I came to Wayne and worked with the Wayne Police Department for approximately a year," Janssen said.

He joined the Wayne Sheriff's Office in 1976 as a deputy and in 1982 decided to run for the position of Sheriff. He remembers working with Chief Deputy Scotty Thompson, who served after Don Weible resigned from the position.

Since January of 1983, LeRoy has served eight terms as Wayne County Sheriff. His term officially ends with the swearing in of a new sheriff at the first meeting of the Wayne County Commissioners in January

of 2015.

"When I began working for the Sheriff's Office, the sheriff lived in the jail, which was located in the same building the office is now, just north of the courthouse. In 1983 the sheriff moved out and the building became the detention center. Our office was

located in the basement of the courthouse, where the UNL Extension Office is now located. After the courthouse added an elevator, the office was moved to the southeast corner of the basement of the courthouse," Janssen said.

Approximately two years ago, the Sheriff's Office again re-located - back to the building adjacent to the courthouse where they had been earlier.

Janssen said he had not seen a rise or decline in the amount of crime in the county throughout his career.

"Probably the biggest change since I began is technology. Now we have instant communication in nearly all situations," he said.

Although Janssen is retiring from law enforcement, he will continue to be employed. He has accepted the position of Meeting Coordinator for the Nebraska Association of County Officials in Lincoln.

In addition to being the Wayne County Sheriff, Janssen has also served as the Deputy Emergency Manager for the Emergency Managers who have served Wayne County.

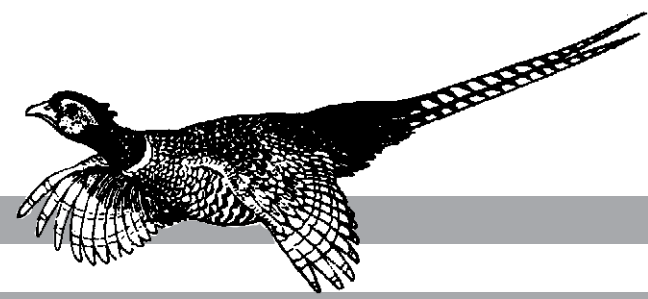
He has also served as the president of the Nebraska Sheriff's Association in 1995; the president of the Nebraska Association of County Officials in 2012 and on the board of directors for this group for several years. He is a member of the Nebraska Associa-

Services were held Saturday, July 5 at the Beemer Mennonite Church in Beemer. Burial was in Mt. Hope Cemetery in West Point.

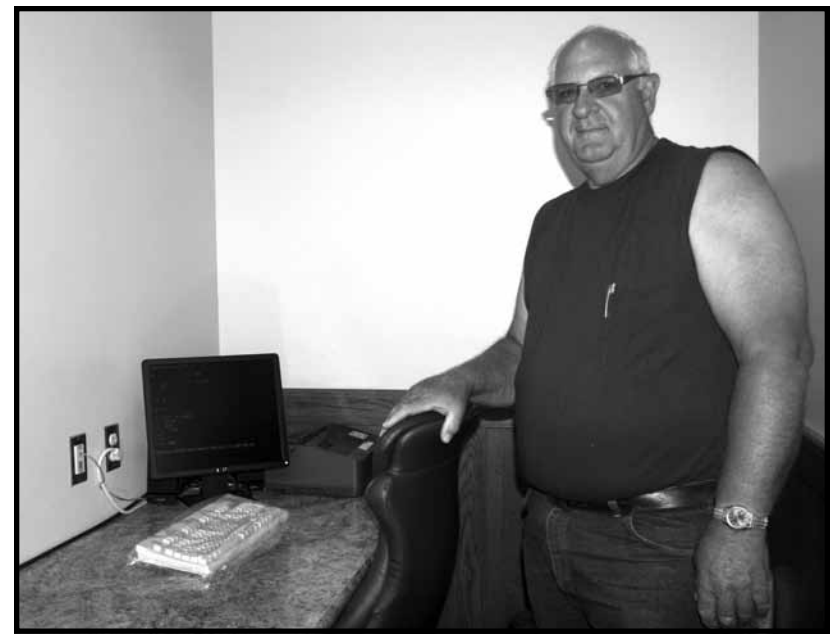

Fire fighters were deployed again in many places west of Wayne during the Wakefield/Pilger tornado and last week before the rolling high speed rotational winds that went through the north side of Wayne. They leave their own families at home and go out there as our eyes and ears in these emergencies.

In talking with Wayne fire fighters it looks like there were at least five that spent 40+ hours per week during the last 3 weeks as volunteer fire fighters away from their families and jobs. These are our neighbors doing this for us. Tell 'em thanks. Buy 'em lunch.

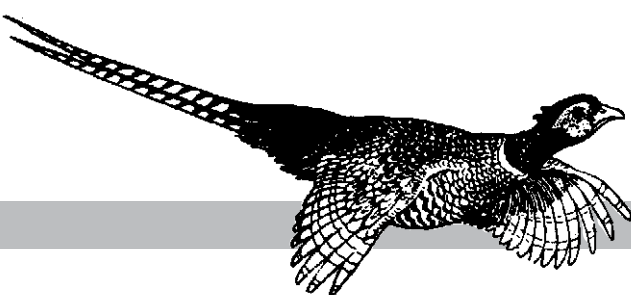

## Pretty weird weather here

The body's on vacation, but the mind never rests. Thus, another mid-summer's purging of the "Bits and Pieces" file:

— A friend of mine from down in Florida asked me a rather obvious question the other day.

"Pretty weird weather you guys are having up there in Nebraska, isn't it?" he inquired.

Boy, is it.

I haven't had a chance to look at the history books, but I'd be hard-pressed to believe there have been as many tornadoes in this part of the state than we have experienced in the past 12 months.

If you count last October's tornadoes (including the one that hit a little west of us in Creighton) along with the recent temper tantrum Mother Nature threw in the area, we've seen more than a dozen tornadoes here in Northeast Nebraska. Has it ever been this volatile in the skies here in Wayne County and the surrounding area?

We have been kept busy here at The Wayne Herald trying to document some of the damage and keep folks up to date on what's been going on with the severe weather in the area. It's a job that, while we're more than willing to do, we're getting a little tired of doing right now. I think I speak for everybody here when I say that we could use a break from Mother Nature's fury.

— My dog, Harley, has been with me just over a year now, and I seriously am dumbfounded at this animal's amazing ability to do nothing but . . . take naps.

Recently, on a rare weekend afternoon off, the dog and I sat on separate couches, and my afternoon of watching World Cup soccer, College World Series baseball and pro golf was constantly interrupted by my dog's snoring.

Now if there's an expert on sawing logs, you're looking at him. I can do buzzsaw impersonations that would make the folks at DeWalt jealous with envy. I used to spend weekends visiting family, but now can only do so if I agree to sleep in locations where my snoring can't be heard in other peoples' bedrooms. I've spent more nights trying to catch Z's in garages, sheds and basement utility rooms during my family excursions.

THIS dog, though, can snore like nobody's business, and it's actually an entertaining process to watch. He'll get comfy in some type of lying position with his legs sticking out one direction and his big beagle nose running perpendicular to his legs. The eyes slowly close, the breathing gets heavier, and then the legs start to twitch. First one in the front, then the other, then the first one and one of the back legs — there's no order to the randomness of the leg twitching.

And then . . . comes . . . that first inhale. It sounds just like Grandpa after a long day on the farm after he falls asleep in his easy chair. Deep, quick and loud — if you're not ready for it, it will jolt you out of your chair and wake up the dog.

At night's end, the dog gets shoed off the couch and finds his special sleeping place — in the utility room. I don't need that kind of noise interrupting the noise I'm trying to make.

— The push to get enough signatures to put the question of raising the minimum wage in Nebraska on the ballot this November gained a TON of signatures in its seven-week run, netting more than 135,000.

One has to question, though, how many of those signatures are legitimate. They only need 81,000 to get it on the ballot, and it's always good to have a cushion in the event that some signatures are deemed invalid. It will be interesting to see how many of those 135,000 signatures are legit and whether there will be enough to put the question to voters this fall.

All I know is — I was never contacted and never signed a petition, so if my name shows up, I'd seriously question the entire process.

— There's good news for the city of Wayne — the city is one of six communities in Nebraska that is sharing in \$1.2 million in grants from the Department of Economic Development.

Wayne is joined by Lexington, Plattsmouth, Schuyler, Nebraska City and Holdrege in the latest round of grant money from the DED. The city reportedly is getting \$215,000, which will go to pay for the demolition of six structures and the erection of something that, considering last fall's and this summer's bouts with severe weather, would be a much-needed addition — a public tornado shelter.

— Annnnnnd finally, proofreading is a very important skill to have in the newspaper world.

We go through tens of thousands of words every week during the writing, editing and page design of The Wayne Herald. From the original author, to the editor, to the person laying out the page, to the one who proofreads it before it is sent to the press room for publication.

## Capitol View

### Prison sentence calculations more than a numbers game

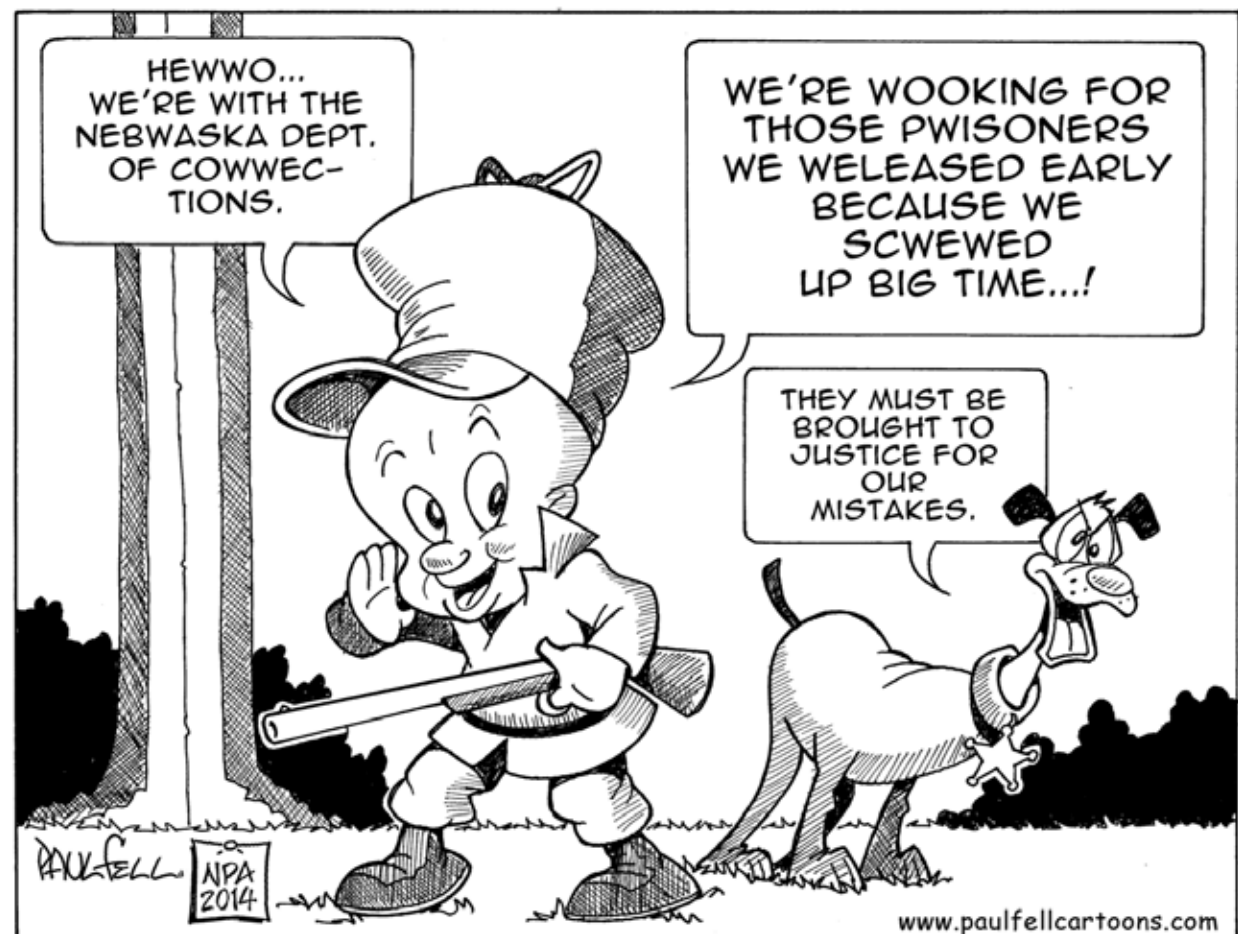
"Mistakes were made." That's a comment that has become all too familiar in government these days. In Nebraska, if it isn't health and human services, it's corrections.

For the third time in less than a year, bad behavior on the part of inmates or officials have made alarming headlines. It started last summer when a work release inmate who was speeding in a state van caused a crash that killed a Lincoln woman. Then an Omaha man was released and allegedly killed four people in random incidents. Next came the word that the release dates of hundreds of inmates were miscalculated and a number of them got out of prison too soon.

Credit the Omaha World-Herald with discovering the discrepancies and alerting officials and the general public about what it claimed to be a two-decade pattern of sentence miscalculations by the Nebraska Department of Correctional Services.

By the numbers, Governor Dave Heineman and Attorney General Jon Bruning said: There were 306 inmates released early; 257 of them would have already completed their sentences; 3 have died; 5 have successfully completed parole; 20-25 warrants for arrests of the others have been issued in 8 counties; another 567 had their release dates miscalculated but have not been released.

The two elected officials said the state would be rounding up the former inmates with the intentions of making them return to prison. Heineman had harsh words for the Department of Corrections saying they made a mistake that is now being corrected, adding they better not make a mistake in the future. Bruning said the case law is clear, the people incorrectly released early owe the state the time. But, not all of the people released early will be re-incarcerated. Those who have



been in the community without incident will get credit for that time. For those headed back to prison, they could be making up anywhere from one to four years.

Public officials rattling sabers and talking tough is nothing new. But maybe the focus should be on the people who made the mistakes. Maybe a planned deep cleaning of the system should focus on who goes to prison in the first place and those troublesome mandatory sentences for certain offenses. State Sen. Ernie Chambers of Omaha and others have argued that is part of the problem because it takes away a judge's discretion in sentencing. For sure, the sentencing laws, which have changed more than once since 1995 should be simplified, carved in stone and taught to the responsible corrections officials.

Not everyone is taking this well.

There have been lawsuits filed by those who were freed and are being ordered back. At least one has enlisted the aid of Chambers who is a long-time member of the Legislature's Judiciary Committee and a frequent critic of the system. The former inmate had been released three years ago and thought he had served his time. He has completed his parole requirements, has a full-time job and is the provider for a wife and three small children.

Chambers intervened and visited with Corrections Director Michael Kenney and Parole Board Chairwoman Esther Casmer, successfully arguing that the man would have been eligible for parole by now, so he should be allowed to live his new life. They all agreed that the cases deserve to be treated individually.

These are not just numbers. These are people who have gone on

to make that fresh start that lawmakers and prison authorities always hope will happen. Chambers has vowed to help the state resolve the problem while bringing as few people back to prison as possible. He says it's an ethical question for the state to officially discharge these people and then try to put them back in prison. He said these people didn't escape from prison, they served all the time that was required and they were released by the state.

To his credit, Kenney says he is taking full responsibility and working with Heineman, Bruning and Chambers to clean up the mess. Let's hope that the fruits of that labor will be sweeping prison reform that will reduce overcrowding by managing both who goes to prison and how long they stay.

### Be on the watch for scamming contractors

As the area is picking up and the rebuilding and/or repairing process is starting after the recent storms I would like to caution all of you to be on the lookout for scammers. With the amount of destruction in the area it will undoubtedly attract contractors who are less than upstanding.

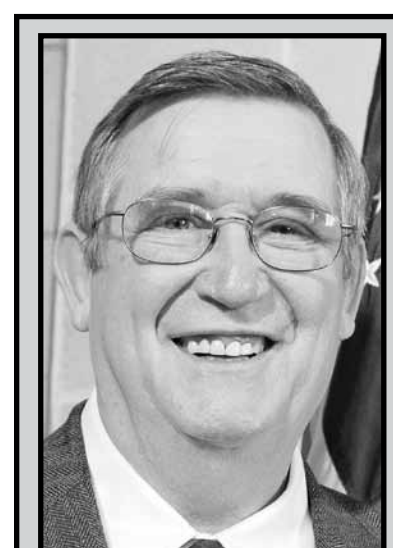
In dealing with a contractor make sure they offer written contracts. Get the name, address and phone number of the contractor especially if they are from out of town. Make sure they are licensed and have all the proper permits and ask for references. If you are thinking about using an out-of-town contractor be sure to find out how warranties or any problems will be handled after the work is completed. Most impor-

tantly, DO NOT give full payment up front.

Noel Canning, brought a lawsuit challenging the appointments. This past week, in an unanimous deci-

sion the United States Supreme Court agreed. The justices agreed that the NLRB appointments were unconstitutional but they were divided on when a president should be able to use the Recess Appointments Clause to fill vacancies. This is another case of presidential over reach which President Obama seems to do a lot. This is strictly federal stuff and I maybe shouldn't even comment, but sometimes I just can't help myself.

Returning to the Wayne area to visit is also among his plans as he has relatives in the area.

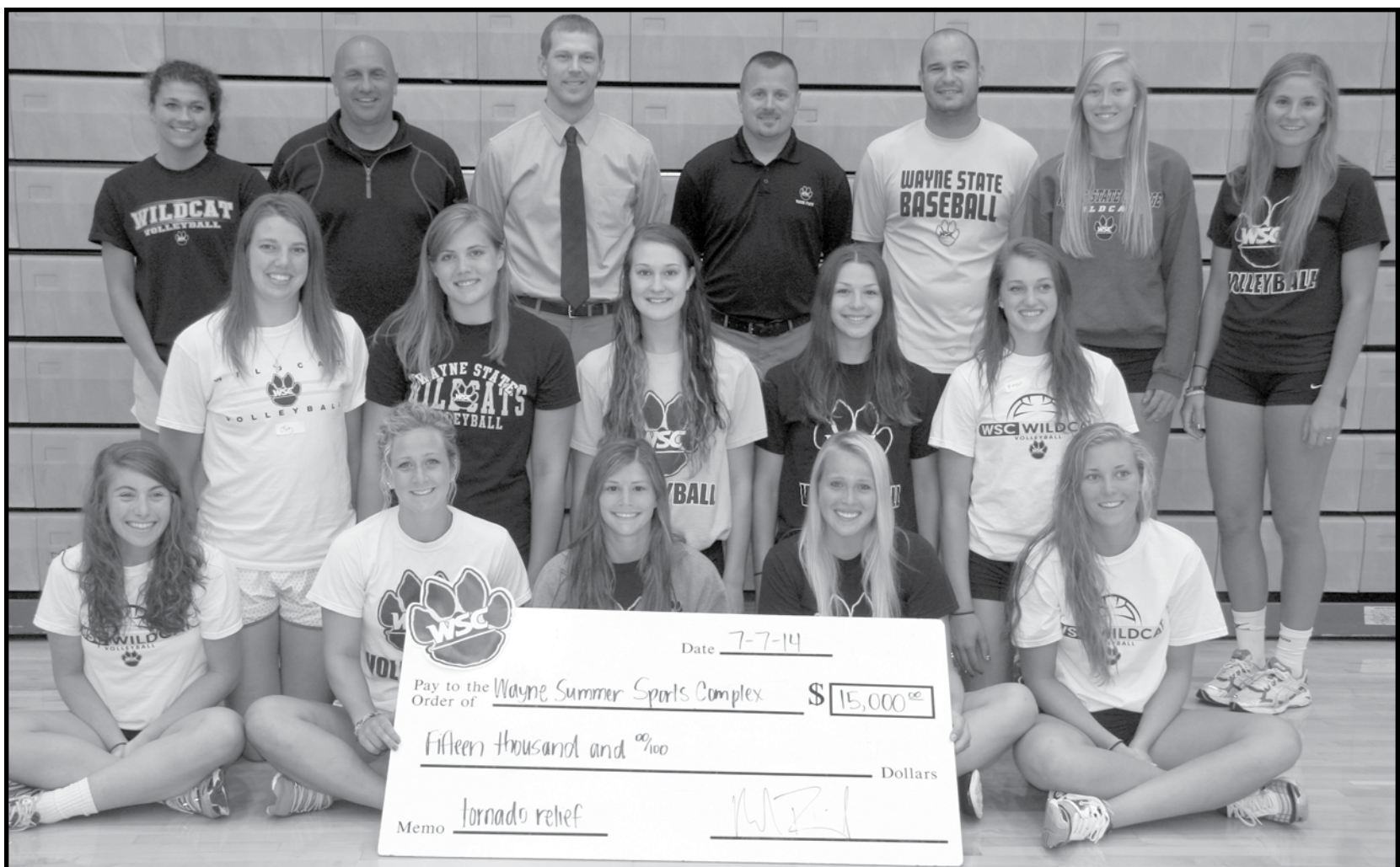
A retirement coffee for Janssen is being planned for Tuesday, July 29 from 2-4 p.m. in the courtroom of the Wayne County Courthouse.

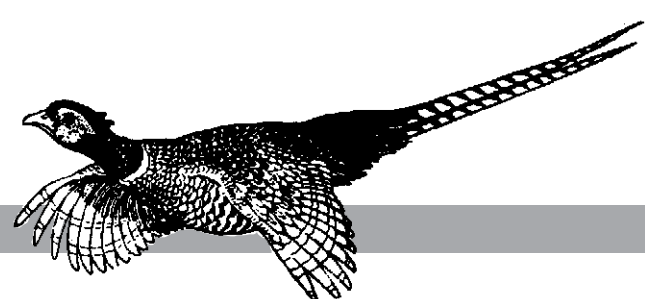

## Alex Koch named head baseball coach at Wayne State College

Wayne State College Director of Athletics Mike Powicki announced this afternoon that Alex Koch has been named new head baseball coach at Wayne State College. He becomes the 14th head coach in the program's 54-year history and replaces Brian Disch, who resigned in May after five seasons as head coach to take a teaching position at Norfolk High School.

Koch (pronounced Cook) has been associated with the Wildcat baseball program as a player and coach since 2006. He served three seasons as an assistant coach with the Wildcats from 2010-12 and was a volunteer assistant with the program since after accepting the position as director of the Wayne Community Activity Center in February, 2012.

A graduate of Millard South High School, Koch was a standout player for Wayne State from 2006-09, earning First Team All-NSIC honors three seasons (2007, '08 and '09) and was a two-time ABCA/Rawlings All-Central Region selection (Second Team in 2008 and First Team in 2009). Koch ranks second at Wayne State in career doubles (53), third in career RBIs (181) and tied for sixth in career hits with 217. He played on four NSIC regular season championship teams and four NCAA Tournament teams, including the 2009 team that reached the Central Region final.

Koch also has high school coaching experience, working with the Omaha Roncalli and Millard South Legion teams and most recently assisting the Wayne American Legion baseball program.

"We had a tremendous amount of interest in this position from many talented and qualified baseball coaches," said Powicki. "Through the process, Alex proved to be the best fit for taking the reins of the

Wayne State baseball program. He has a clear vision of where he wants the baseball program to go and how to get there. Coach Koch is a baseball guy in the purest sense with an energy and it-factor about him that will be a catalyst in the team's success. I am excited to have him join our coaching staff and to work with him to continue to build the great tradition of Wildcat baseball."

Wayne State College was 27-24 this season, finishing eighth in the Northern Sun Conference with an 18-15 league mark. It was the 17th straight winning season for Wildcat baseball.

A press conference is not planned at this time due to NSIC Summer Meetings in St. Cloud, Minnesota next week and the timing of the transition. Individual requests for interviews can be arranged with the WSC Sports Information office.

Wayne State College is an NCAA Division II school located in Wayne, Nebraska and competes in the 16-team Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference.

## Wayne State men's track adds three to 2015 recruiting class

Wayne State College Head Track and Field Coach Marlon Brink announced today that Nick Fly of Omaha, Kole Heller of Platte, South Dakota and Aydan Ronspies of Pierce will attend Wayne State College and compete for the Wildcat men's track team in 2015. Heller and Ronspies each signed national letters of intent while Fly is a transfer from Iowa Western Community College and signed a tender to attend Wayne State College.

Nick Fly will compete in both cross country and track and field at WSC and will have two years of eligibility with the Wildcats. The Omaha North graduate was a national cross country qualifier for Iowa Western and a national indoor track qualifier in the 1000 meter run as a freshman. This year, he was a national outdoor track qualifier in the

1500 meter run and received Academic All-American honors at Iowa Western CC.

"Nick has had some great experiences at Iowa Western CC which I think have prepared him to make the jump up to NSIC competition," said Coach Brink. "He is still developing as a mid-distance runner and will make some good contributions to our cross country team as well."

Kole Heller is a sprinter from Platte-Geddes High School in South Dakota. He was the Class B state champion in the 100 meter dash (11.11) and placed third in the 200 meter dash (23.79) as a senior. Heller also helped Platte-Geddes to

a second place finish in the Class B boys state basketball tournament as a senior earning Southeast South Dakota All-Conference honors. He also excels in the classroom with Academic All-State accolades in basketball.

"Kole is a very good athlete who is competitive and knows how to win," remarked Brink. "He has pretty good running mechanics and I believe will continue to get better at the college level in a year round training program. He should be able to help our team in the short sprints and relays immediately."

Aydan Ronspies is a sprinter from Pierce High School. He placed second in the Class B 400 meter run this spring with a time of 48.99 seconds and also ran a leg on the 4x400 meter relay team that competed at state.

Ronspies holds the school and Mid-States Conference records in the 400 meter dash.

"Aydan had an exceptional senior year and made some huge improvements that will enable him to make an immediate contribution to our team next year," commented Brink. "He is a very focused and dedicated individual who raised his performance level this past year."

The three athletes join Clay Kramper of Homer, Nate Lechtenberg of Papillion, Brady Metz of Grand Island and Richard Sweeney of Blair as members of the 2015 men's track and field recruiting class at Wayne State College.

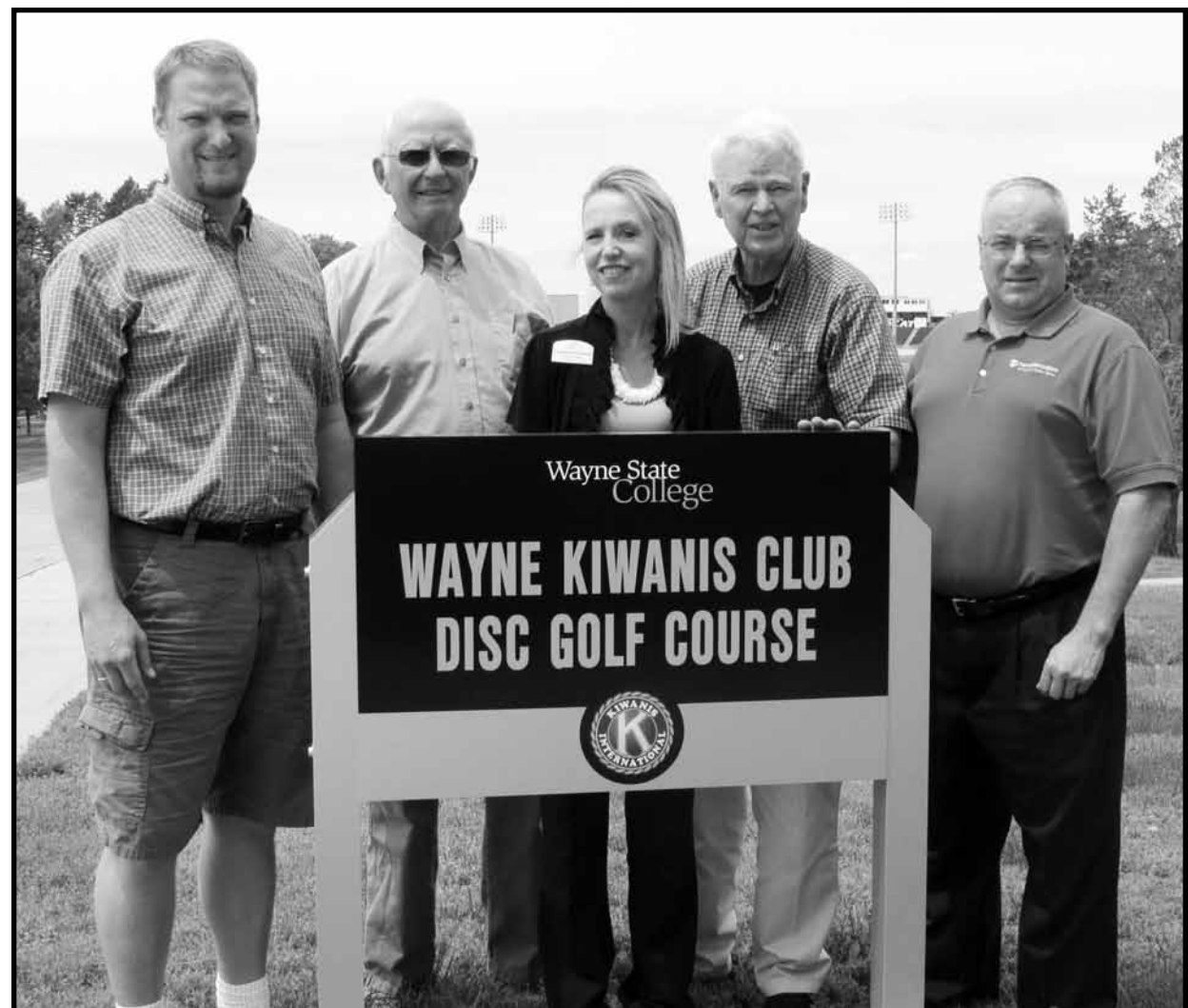

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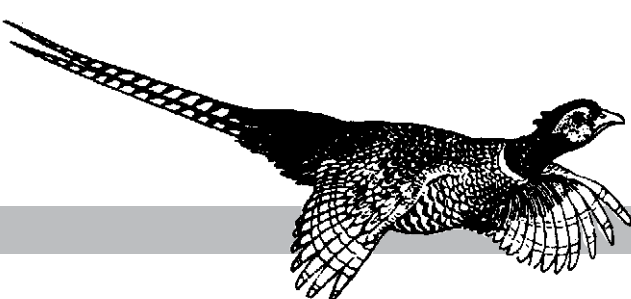
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## Sharing information

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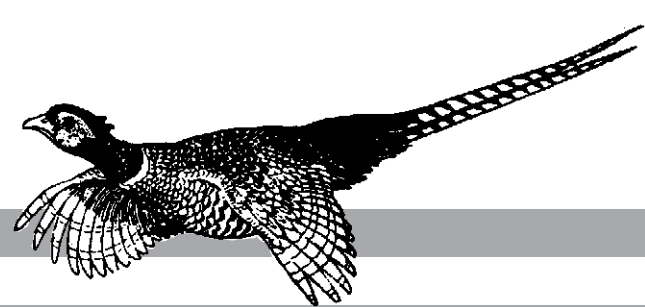

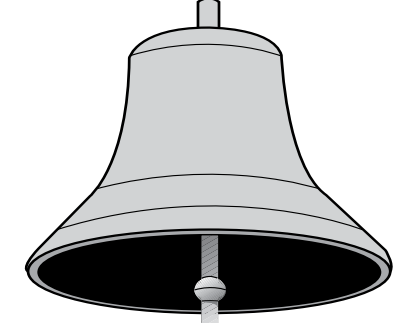

## Nebraska pharmacists association receives funding for statewide medication take-back program

The Nebraska Pharmacists Association (NPA) has received funding from the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality Waste Reduction and Recycling Incentive Grants Program for its Nebraska MEDS: Statewide Medication Disposal Initiative. The primary goal of this project is to engage, activate and empower pharmacies statewide to serve as safe and legal waste medication collection sites for leftover consumer medications.

An ongoing USGS research study has shown that 142 streams, 55 wells, and seven effluent samples collected across 36 states had traces of a variety of waste pharmaceuticals and other emerging contaminants. In Nebraska, seven streams and aquifers in the eastern portion of the state were included in the study. At least one chemical was detected in low levels in 80 percent of streams and 93 percent of groundwater sampled.

Over the past several years, a coalition of partners have come together to address the issue of unused medications and their impact on the aquatic environment and groundwater; poison prevention; and illegal drug diversion. The Nebraska MEDS (Medication Education for Disposal Strategies) coalition includes the following partners: Nebraska Pharmacists Association, The Groundwater Foundation, Nebraska Regional Poison Center, WasteCap Nebraska, Dillon's


House, Lincoln-Lancaster County Health Department, Lincoln-Lancaster County SafeKids, Guardian Angels Senior Homecare, Lincoln Police Department, LiveWise Coalition, Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality, and Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services.

The Nebraska MEDS Coalition has pilot-tested a medication take-back program in Lincoln and Lancaster County which currently has 41 pharmacies that have collected well over 3,500 pounds of unwanted consumer medications. With this success, NPA will work with the Nebraska MEDS coalition to expand the project statewide in order to collect unused medications to prevent poisoning, pollution, and prescription drug overdose for a healthier Nebraska.

Area residents are being asked to watch for the Nebraska MEDS disposal project coming soon this area of Nebraska. Residents will be able to safely dispose of medications from their home, safeguarding the environment with the goals of reducing the risk to children, and saving the community money that might be spent responding to water quality concerns and/or medical emergencies such as accidental poisoning or prescription drug overdose.

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# A Bit of Light

On July 6 Rev. Jason Pickering continued in the "Prayer Series" with a message about "How to Approach God Appropriately." Preaching from a number of texts in the Bible, he focused on Hebrews 12:18-24 and the roots of that story in the Old Testament as he likened our efforts to reach out to God to the struggles of the nation of Israel in its early days of wandering from Egypt to the "Promised Land."

He also mentioned that it was also possible to "inappropriately" try to reach God, as in the case of the situation when God told Moses to "speak" to the rock (at Meribah) and it would produce water for the immense crowd of his kinsmen. Instead Moses in his frustration at the

moment, struck the rock. God was gracious and still brought forth water for the people; however, because of his disobedience Moses was only allowed to view the land of Promise, instead of personally entering it with the whole nation.


Pastor Jason spoke frequently of the "Prayer Closet", which is not necessarily a specific place (although it can be); rather it is an attitude, a set apart time, and a set apart place when a believer decides that: "this is a time when I am going to seek the Lord." There were some words of advice when seeking the Lord in prayer:

1. Shut the door: it shuts out distractions.
2. You cannot learn how to pray in the "secret place" overnight.
3. The Lord says: "he who has ears to hear, let him hear what the Lord has to say to the churches." "What does this mean?" the pastor asked the congregation. "It means that the Lord wants to speak to us."
4. Everything changes when we hear God.
5. Take a piece of paper with you for the purpose of jotting down any distractions that come to mind.

He closed his sermon with three short, easy-to-remember reminders for prayer: Stop, Find your hiding place, and Listen.

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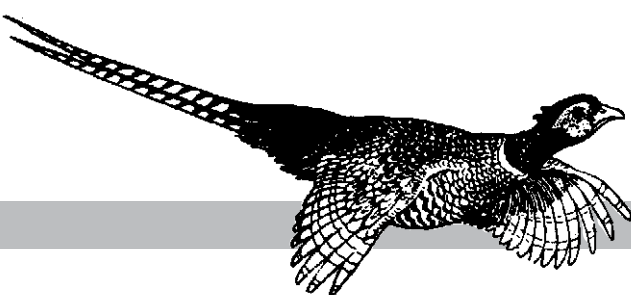

## Water management suggestions shared

As we all know we are heading into the hot, drier part of the summer. Hopefully it will be nothing like last couple of years when the rain basically shut off for July and August. However, irrigation systems will be running and we need to manage our water resources more efficiently.

We can't do anything about the weather, but if we have irrigation we can water our crops and yards. In crops, sometimes it might appear pretty simple. Turn the pivots on and don't stop them. In corn, which enters a high water use phase around tasseling, this could be pretty close to the truth. Irrigated corn with its higher plant populations will use over .30 inches of water per day during the early reproductive stages. Since most pivots can put about an inch of water on a field about every three days, the turn on and stay on might be a reality. However, some water/electric restrictions and occasional rainfall can cause a change in plans. To get more information on corn production, including irrigation management, go to <http://cropwatch.unl.edu>.

A relatively new UNL website offers soybean producers an easy-to-use decision aid for optimizing irrigation efficiency and energy use. SoyWater, available at [soywater.unl.edu](http://soywater.unl.edu), asks a few, simple questions specific to the field and then provides daily estimates of crop water use and soil water status.

Users log on and after just a few mouse-clicks, SoyWater provides a table of real-time, actual daily weather data for computing daily crop water use from planting (or emergence) to the day before producer log-in. It then uses historical weather data to compute daily crop water use from the day of log-in to the day of expected crop maturity.

The daily weather data is from a weather station of the Automated Weather Data Network (AWDN) maintained by the High Plains Regional Climate Center (HPRCC). (SoyWater automatically identifies the weather station nearest the producer's field.) During the season, the producer will log in to SoyWater to input the date and amount of local rainfall and any irrigation applications.

Based on this information, SoyWater will highlight the projected date when the first (or next) irrigation should be scheduled and projects the dates of specific soybean vegetative (V-) and reproductive (R-) growth stages. SoyWater can

be useful to both rainfed and irrigated soybean producers interested in predicting the date of a V- or R-stage. This information also can be useful when making other crop management decisions for a particular soybean field, such as when the effectiveness of a herbicide or fungicide depends on application at a specific growth stage. Give it a try.

For lawns without underground sprinklers it might be a losing battle and owners may want to let the lawn go dormant for a month or so, especially in little used and unseen areas. However, many people will still want to water to keep lawns green. Most of our lawns are cool-season, bluegrass dominated. The following are management suggestions from [turf.unl.edu](http://turf.unl.edu) to help the cool-season grasses cope with the heat:

The almost immediate response to high temperatures is to increase irrigation, which makes sense and is needed since most water is used for cooling the plant. However, saturated soils from over irrigation limits oxygen leading to root death and thus severely compromises the grass plant over the rest of the season.

Therefore, we still want to keep turf on the dry side to maximize soil oxygen, but at the same time enough water should be applied to allow the plant to cool itself. We are often questioned about irrigating lightly (syringing) during the day to cool the turf. This effect is very short term, maybe lasting 10-15 minutes depending on the conditions. Water at least one inch at a time and only when necessary, when you see the grass beginning to turn a lighter color. This may happen every 4 to

7 days during the hot part of the summer. Extreme heat may require more frequent watering. If you have an automated watering system invest in a rain shut-off valve that will turn your system off during a rain. It costs about \$40.00. There is nothing more aggravating than seeing sprinklers go off during or just after a big rainfall.

Continue mowing as needed, but be sure turf is well-watered to insure no extra damage. Consider mowing in the morning or evenings when temperature and water demand is lowest. Keep the grass length to 2 1/2 to 3 inches for shading of the ground.

Grass cut too short will allow the sunlight to reach the ground and raise temperatures much higher. This is still the biggest mistake I see in area lawns. Only golf greens should be short and they require intensive management.

## DEQ awards \$4.3 million in waste reduction and recycling grants

Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality Acting Director Patrick Rice today announced the awarding of \$4,296,581 in grants through the Waste Reduction and Recycling Incentive Grant Fund.

"These funds are used for a wide variety of projects to reduce waste, promote recycling and address the issue of scrap tire piles," Rice said. "The grants will provide support to important local environmental improvement efforts across the state."

The Waste Reduction and Recycling Incentive Grant Fund is generated by a fee on solid waste disposed of in landfills, an annual retail business sales fee, and a fee assessed on the sale of new tires for motor vehicles.

The grants are provided to local integrated waste management projects including: recycling systems, household hazardous waste collection programs, transfer stations, yard waste composting, scrap tire collections, and recycling scrap tires into crumb rubber for use in athletic fields.

In this area, the City of Wayne will receive \$2,970 to host an electronics recycling event; Wayne County will receive \$10,664 for a 120-ton scrap tire cleanup; City of Wayne will receive \$2,660, which is 25 percent reimbursement of bonded rubber poured-in-place and

# Northeast instructors receive warm velkommen in Scandinavian country

Since Northeast Community College instituted global educational opportunities as one of its eight institutional priorities, several students, faculty and staff have had experiences of not only learning and understanding other cultures, they have grown personally as well.

Three Northeast instructors are the latest to experience a real world culture first-hand by traveling to a distant land.

Brian Anderson, broadcasting instructor, Cara Hoehne, business instructor, and Kate Trindle, history/geography instructor, traveled

to Denmark this spring to teach at Aarhus Business College in Aarhus, Denmark. "The trip to Aarhus was an amazing experience, both culturally and educationally," Anderson said. "Our hosts provided us with a great mix of both that helped us bring those experiences back to our students and classrooms."

Administrators at Northeast and Aarhus signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) in April 2013, designed to promote relationships among students, faculty, administration, and board members that will mutually benefit each college. The Danish institution sent three instructors to Northeast Community College in October, 2013.

On their recent visit, Anderson, Hoehne and Trindle had the opportunity to immerse themselves in both of Denmark's education system and culture.

Hoehne said she enjoyed getting to meet the students. "They divide their students based on the degree they are seeking and where the person is in life when they are seeking that degree. At Northeast, we put all of these students together."

She said in her business communications class at Northeast, she has instructed students enrolled in business, diesel technology, wind energy, utility line, administrative assistant, computer programming, medical administrative assistant, graphic design, drafting, welding, and auto body. Hoehne said she also has had students of all ages in one classroom - from a high school senior to a second career grandmother.

"I believe these dynamics create a unique atmosphere with many different opinions and perspectives. Our students receive first hand experiences and enjoy communicating with students from across campus."

The age range at Aarhus Business College is primarily between 15 and 22, however, there are some non-traditional students. In the Danish education system, students can choose their direction after ninth grade. They may go on to 10th grade and finish high school or choose a technical college or trade school, such as Aarhus Business College, where they learn specific skills to prepare them for life in the work force.

Trindle said Aarhus instructors requested she have three different presentations when she taught. "I received the best response from students on The American Dream and American Politics. I also presented on Nebraska Culture. While our political systems are way different, we concluded that the American Dream isn't all that different than the Danish Dream. Our means of securing the dream are a bit different."

Trindle said the Aarhus students were eager to learn and asked good questions about Americans and American life. "They have impressions from movies and media and wondered about which stereotypes are true."

The Aarhus MOU actually got its start through the Northeast broadcasting program. The Danish college doesn't have a broadcasting department, but it wants to incorporate more of the technology. That's where Anderson comes in.

"The vision of this partnership is to create a European TV station

that is programmed entirely with college programs from around the world. Northeast was chosen to be part of this project because of its excellence in broadcasting. As the program evolves, it is our hope that our TV newscasts or other programs produced on the Northeast campus will be aired all across Europe on a regular basis."

Aarhus Business College has a number of campuses spread out in the city of Aarhus. "Between the three of us, we had the opportunity to speak at most of them. I spent most of my time at their main location where their broadcasting course is offered," Anderson said.

"Unlike Northeast, Aarhus Business College offers students a one-week broadcasting course instead of a full-time major of study. Each student at the college has the opportunity to take the course and learn about the world of TV broadcasting. During the week, they learn about cameras, video editing on the computer and putting an entire show together. I had the opportunity to speak to students and help them with video editing and camera handling skills."

When he wasn't observing the broadcasting course, Anderson spoke to English classes about American media culture, funding differences and how the Federal Communications Commission operates in the U.S.

"We had the opportunity to see both Danish radio and TV industries in operation. Unlike the U.S., most TV stations in Denmark are owned and governed by the Danish government," Anderson said. "Visitors would be surprised to watch an entire 20 minute TV program or listen to a radio broadcast without any commercials. The government provides most of their operating funds, unlike the U.S., where advertising dollars and commercials are the only sources of income for commercial stations."

The Northeast instructors had the opportunity to visit Danmarks Radio (DR), which also includes six TV stations in addition to numer-

ous radio stations. Aarhus is one of those stations.

Anderson said the TV stations run Danish programs, but most of the content is programming created and distributed in the United States. "Another day, we visited an Aarhus radio station called 'go!FM' The station reminded me of northeast Nebraska radio because their focus was on how to provide the best content and information to the listener. They had great personalities, focused on news and listener benefit and even went out into the community and did live broadcasts to meet their listeners."

Another aspect of Danish broadcasting is called "Project: Gellerup." The project is designed for Danish residents who may be out of work and who are looking for a skill to help make them employable. This particular project teaches them how to shoot, edit, and create various video projects that are made for television.

Aarhus, a city the size of Omaha, is the second largest city in Denmark and is the principal port city of the country. The three instructors said the Danes rely mostly upon public transportation and their own foot power (walking and biking) instead of automobile traffic. The tax on a car purchase in Denmark is approximately 180 percent, so many choose not to buy a vehicle. Outside many public places, there are areas where bicycles can be locked up and stored.

Anderson, Hoehne, and Trindle also had opportunities to see portions of Denmark and experience Danish hospitality.

Trindle said the faculty and staff of the college were extremely friendly and welcoming. "They were eager to escort us through Aarhus and throughout Denmark to show us the beauty and diverse landscapes of their country. We were welcomed into their homes and they treated us very well. It was a great study in Danish culture."

She said the Danes are a proud people and willing to share their accomplishments. "We visited a union and met with union representatives who explained the Danish model in which almost all Danes are union members and are paid a fair living wage no matter the level of job. It seemed to me that they have all but

eliminated poverty and with that, eliminated crime. We also visited a clinic and hospital and were introduced to their system of free, state-sponsored healthcare. Their college tuition is free as well. Students are paid a stipend of approximately \$1,000 to cover their living expenses while in college."

The Northeast instructors had the opportunity to see a good portion of Denmark too. They visited Skagen, which is the northern most tip of the country. "This was my favorite stop on the tour," Hoehne said. "It's where the North Sea meets the Baltic Sea and you can literally see an "X" in the water. Our guide was curious as to why we were picking up seashells on the shore. We quickly let him know that we do not have seashells in Nebraska."

The group also took a three hour train ride to Copenhagen, the country's capital - where there saw the Queen's Palace, Parliament, The Little Mermaid statue and numerous other famous landmarks. They also traveled south over the Danish border into Germany to the town of Flensburg. On the way to Germany, they stopped at a former WW II concentration camp and bunker complex and one of Denmark's first communities, Ribe.

Anderson said the night before they left, they stayed at the famous Legoland Hotel in Billund, Denmark. "Everyone in the U.S. has heard of or owns Legos, but do they realize that this product originates in Denmark?"

Anderson, Hoehne, and Trindle enthusiastically agree that the trip was very beneficial to them as it gave them a better understanding of the Danish culture.

"I think my cohorts will agree that we have come home with a much better understanding of Denmark and Danish culture and we can share that with our students and be one step closer to making our curriculum more international," Trindle said. "Our students will benefit from this partnership with Aarhus Business College. We hope in the near future to be able to offer such an exchange for our students and theirs as well."

Anderson called it an "amazing" cultural and educational experience. "In today's world, it is important that our students learn about other cultures and learn how to operate in a global climate. When I teach my students about advertising or commercial production, I will be able to relate to them about how it's done in Denmark. I will be able to tell them about how the skills they are learning at Northeast can be utilized in a broadcasting career in Denmark and how the programs they create here in the U.S. could be seen in European countries," he said. "I also brought back a few classroom ideas that I will be using beginning this fall."

Hoehne was very complimentary of their hosts at Aarhus Business College. "They had a fantastic itinerary planned for us, and we basically saw the entire country of Denmark. We were asked many times if we need down time, and we enthusiastically said 'no, we want to see it all!'"

She feels very fortunate to have been chosen to travel to Denmark. "Northeast's commitment to Global Educational Opportunities for our students should be commended. Whether a student travels abroad with Northeast, has exchange students in their classroom, or has an instructor who travels abroad, global and cultural understanding will be enhanced. We can talk about how the world is getting smaller in our classrooms all we want, but if we can bring in real life experiences, people, and examples, students will truly understand just how important global and cultural understanding can be."

**LEDs Help You See 'Green'**  
 Nebraska customers can save money, energy with new light incentive

Columbus, NE - On Jan. 1, 2014, Nebraska Public Power District and its wholesale customer utilities began offering incentives to residential electric customers for the purchase and installation of light-emitting diode (LED) bulbs.

At the start of this new 2014 year, final provisions of the 2007 Energy Policy Act began phasing out the standard, 60-watt, incandescent light bulb. Production and importation of the 100-watt and 75-watt standard incandescent lamps have already been closed out over the past two years under the same policy.

Fortunately, customers have an excellent alternative. City of Wayne Electric utilities will provide customers with a \$5 account credit for each 60, 75, or 100-watt LED equivalent to the standard bulb they buy, with up to 10 credits available per residential account this year. Customers can purchase these LED lamps wherever they desire, but the package must be identified as ENERGY STAR® qualified.

The Environmental Protection Agency's ENERGY STAR program encourages installation of LED lamps that use 75 to 80 percent less energy than equivalent incandescent light bulbs and have a rated life that is 25 to 50 times longer. LEDs do not contain mercury, which eliminates some disposal concerns.

LED lamps offer additional advantages over compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs), which have long been touted as energy-efficient alternatives to standard light bulbs. LEDs illuminate instantly when their power switch is turned on. Their light output is not diminished in cold weather. In fact, LEDs last longer in cold areas. LEDs offer a variety of color temperatures that allow customers to match the appearance of standard incandescent bulbs or the bright white of most office environments. Many LED lamps are dimmable, but customers should confirm this prior to purchase, as manufacturers are required to indicate whether they are or not on the packaging.

NPPD and its wholesale customer utilities are contributing approximately \$100,000 toward this campaign which will run through the end of December 2014. To receive the incentive, customers submit a completed program application along with a copy of their sales receipt to their local electric utility.
