Dispatch service costs will make a big jump

City's asking expected to double for 2014-15 FY

The Wayne County Commissioners are working on their 2014-15 fiscal year budget, and they got some bad news during their meeting at the county courthouse Tuesday.

Wayne Police Chief Marlen Chinn spoke with the county board about the shared services between the city's police department and the Wayne County Sheriff's Office and noted that they will be asking for a significant increase from the county for dispatch services.

The county has been paying the same amount – \$36,000 a year – for almost 10 years. But with some of the coming changes that Chinn noted, the county is going to probably have to double what they pay to the city because of changes in technology and reduction in fees received by the city to support emergency dispatch services.

Chinn said that the city has had a couple of surprises in recent months, most notably a recent communication with their 911 system provider that the current system in use will no longer be supported by the company after this year.

"There have been a lot of changes with the 911 system," Chinn said, noting the capability to providing instant mapping for cell calls and a text-to-911 system that adds to the expense.

Last fall's tornado and the storms that took place this summer resulted in a lot more calls for service as well, and the ongoing training of personnel and additional technical support will cost the city more in the next fiscal year.

Chinn noted that the City of Wayne spend around \$264,000 during fiscal year 2013-14 for dispatch services that included 24-hour-a-day, seven-day coverage for both the city and the county.

The city has received fees from wired landline phones in the city, but those fees have been reduced over the years as more people opt for cell phones over the traditional in-home lines.

"With the changes of having both home phones and cell phones going to mainly cell phones, it has resulted in a reduction of funds received as surcharges that have funded the 911 system over the years," Chinn said.

The cost for upgrading the 911 system will run more than \$1 million.

Local airport busy as word of cheap fuel flies through the air

Stan Morris Airport may be the only place where \$5-a-gallon fuel is one heck of a good deal.

Traffic at the Wayne airport was a lot heavier than usual over the past two weeks as pilots flew from the western United States to Oshkosh, Wis., for the annual AirVenture convention that draws tens of thousands of airplane enthusiasts from all over the country for a week's worth of festivities.

More than 20 airplanes a day took advantage of the rebuilt airport as word spread that Wayne's airport had the cheapest airplane fuel in the area.

"We're at \$5 a gallon, and that was the price we had at the time of the tornado," said Jim Hoffman, who works with his wife, Sandy, as caretakers of the Wayne airport.

The Hoffmans had been hired by Tom Becker Flying Service of Hartington to manage the airport two weeks before an EF-4 tornado devastated the facility last October. The airport reopened late this spring, and the traffic picked up as word got out that Wayne's fuel was up to 60 cents cheaper than other nearby airports.

"I've heard people on their radios after they've come in, and they're saying Wayne is the place to stop," Mrs. Hoffman said. "Even when they were in Oshkosh, one gentleman told me that he had been standing around minding his own business and heard that Wayne was the place to stop. He said they were talking about the cheap fuel and great hospitality."

The gas pump, with a sign that says \$5.00 for the per-gallon price perched above the pump, is a self-serve, credit card-based setup, but Mr. Hoffman could be seen helping pilots pull the hose out to the plane and assist with checking tire pressure.

Inside the Nancy Braden Terminal, sandwiches and bottled water were being provided by the Wayne Airport Authority, and

addresses in the guest book showed people who had come from all over the western part of the country, from the Silicon Valley in California to the numerous Denver-area pilots that made a stop at the Wayne airport.

"A lot of times, you really have to shop around," said Jay Gasper, a pilot from Golden, Colo., who was fueling up on his way home from Oshkosh. "Wayne is about 60 cents a gallon cheaper than anywhere around, and that really adds up. It's also halfway there and on a direct line for us, so it made for an easy stop."

Gasper also complimented the airport's ample runway setup, which made it easier to land his aircraft in a stiff breeze Saturday morning.

"You guys have good runways here, and you can count on getting the airplane down in a strong wind like this," he said.

Ron Duren, a Denver-area pilot who was flying his Vans RV-7 plane for the first time, said Wayne's airport was getting good reviews all over the Internet.

"The Experimental Aviation Association website has a listing of (airports) with cheap aviation fuel or snacks, and this was on the list and it's right on the way home and halfway there (to Oshkosh), so I thought I'd stop and check it out," he said. "I love it. It's a very nice facility, the decor in the terminal is nice and the hospitality has been great."

The Hoffmans said they weren't expecting as much traffic as they had experienced over the past two weeks, and a call actually had to be made on Saturday to bring more fuel in to take care of the incoming traffic.

"We've pumped more than 6,000 gallons in the last week and a half," Mr. Hoffman said. "I guess it's something that happens every year, but we weren't prepared for this much."

Based on the response from those pilots who were interviewed, it's something they will no doubt have to get used to.

"I saw the airport on the AirNav website and saw they had a good fuel price," Denver pilot John Evens said as he gassed up his plane. "The fuel prices are great and it's a nice, friendly airport. It's a great stop."

Dwinell sworn in as new county sheriff

The passing of the torch in the Wayne County Sheriff's Office wasn't expected to happen until early in 2015.

That ceremony wound up happening a few months ahead of time, though, as Jason Dwinell was officially sworn in Friday morning as the county's new top cop, replacing LeRoy Janssen.

Janssen has served as the county sheriff for more than 31 years, but decided to step down five months short of completing his eighth term to take a job with the Nebraska Association of County Officials.

Dwinell, who won the Republican primary election after Janssen opted not to run, is expected to run unopposed in the

Nov. 4 general election with no Democrat set to challenge him. He was selected by the Wayne County Commissioners last month to fill out the remainder of Janssen's final term, which runs through the end of 2014.

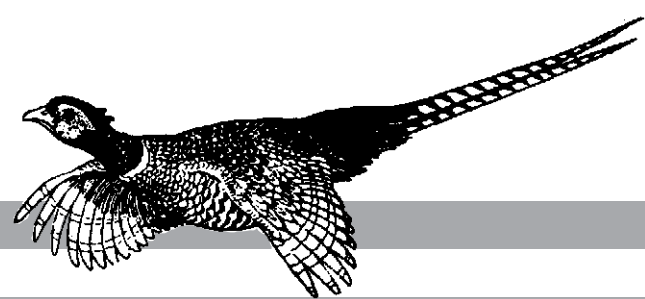
"I don't think it's hit me yet," Dwinell said shortly after being sworn in. "I haven't had a chance to do anything official, but I'm enjoying the moment and celebrating with family and friends before going to work."

Kimberly Hansen swore Dwinell in and Janssen pinned his new badge to symbolize the official change of the guard in the courtroom at the Wayne County Courthouse. A crowd of about 50, including family, county and city officials and other friends, witnessed the event and enjoyed refreshments after the ceremony.

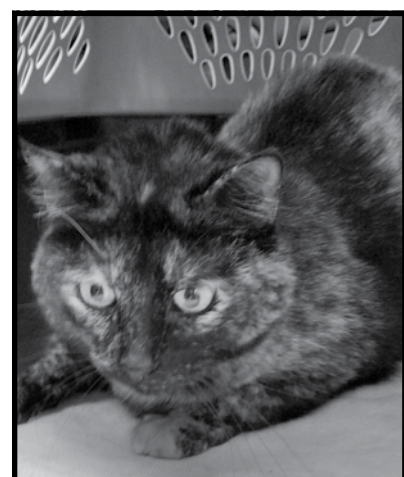

NorthStar Services celebrates 40 years of service in Wayne

Prior to 1974, parents of grown children with intellectual disabilities had few options in regard to services available for their children. That changed with the arrival of NorthStar Services in 1974.

NorthStar Services celebrated its 40th anniversary last week by hosting the Chamber Coffee on Aug. 1 at its Central Office at 1202 E. 14th Street.

Alan Zavodny, Chief Executive Officer at NorthStar Services, acknowledged the great relationship they had with the Wayne Community over the past 40 years. He also thanked the employers in and around Wayne that employ people with intellectual disabilities.

NorthStar Services is a community based provider under the developmental disability category that supports people with intellectual disabilities who require a broad range of support needs.

NorthStar provides services to those over 21 years of age throughout 22 counties in Northeast Nebraska and is governed by commissioners from each of those counties. They began offering services in northeast Nebraska in July of 1974.

Services are offered out of locations based in nine communities including Bloomfield, Columbus, Fremont, Norfolk, O'Neill, South Sioux City, Valentine, Wayne and West Point.

There are two NorthStar locations in Wayne - one at 209 South Main Street where services are provided and the other at the Central Office, 1202 East 14th Street, where the administrative side of the business is handled.

NorthStar also owns and operates four residential locations in Wayne. "As an agency, we currently provide services to 282 clients and have 495 employees," Zavodny said.

Of this number, 32 clients are served here in Wayne and between the Central Office and Area Office, 77 people are employed by NorthStar.

Services provided range from vocational to residential. NorthStar is an employment first agency and is also an employment network for the Ticket To Work Program.

"Beginning in 2005, there has been a large push for employment; currently, 57 percent of people receiving services from NorthStar are employed," Zavodny added.

Helicopter crash injures one

A crop-dusting helicopter went down in Dixon County Thursday afternoon, injuring one person.

According to Dixon County Sheriff Dean Chase, the helicopter was spraying a field near the intersection of 579th Avenue and 867th Road in rural Concord at around 3:43 p.m. when it came into contact with power lines and the pilot subsequently lost control and crashed in a corn field.

The pilot, Dennis Monday, 56, of Weyers Cave, Va.,

was transported by ambulance to Mercy Medical Center in Sioux City with what appeared to be non-life threatening injuries. He was treated and released.

Monday told authorities that he flew into a pocket of air, which caused a sudden drop in altitude and he subsequently collided with the power line.

\$100,000, and with the costs for other related equipment and salaries for five full-time dispatchers to provide 24-hour, 7-day coverage across the county, Chinn said that the city would probably need to ask the county for close to \$72,000 for their share of the equipment and staffing.

Chinn said the dispatchers answered more than 7,300 calls for the Sheriff's Office, which accounted for about 25 percent of the total calls received to the dispatch center.

Chinn said it was unfortunate that more wasn't asked of the county in the preceding years, which would make this year's asking a less dramatic increase.

"I wish we had looked at this every two or three years rather than coming here and asking for such a big increase all at once," he said.

Chinn said the city's police department has developed a good working relationship with the county's law enforcement and would like

to have that continue.

Board member Jim Rabe said he thought the county would be looking at a doubling of what they had paid the city in previous years, but understood that the increased costs are justified by the shared resources between the city and county.

Wayne County Sheriff Jason Dwinell echoed those sentiments, not-

ing that even with the requested increase, it would be a drop in the bucket to what the county would have to spend to create its own dispatch center.

"With the equipment, maintenance, staff and training, what we'd be paying them now is a fraction of what it would cost us," he said.

Council takes steps to put pool issue on Nov. 4 ballot

Action was taken during Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council to put ballot language together for the purpose of building a swimming pool for the city of Wayne.

Council members voted unanimously to move forward with a letter of engagement with D.A. Davidson & Co. to provide underwriting services and prepare the ballot language to have the issue on the November ballot.

The necessary paperwork must be completed by Sept. 1 to put the issue before the voters during the November general election.

Council members also listened to information and recommendations from the LB840 Sales Tax Advisory Committee on a request by Tim Fertig for a \$50,000 loan.

The LB840 committees' recommendation was for a \$50,000 loan for 15 years at 3 percent interest with a balloon payment after 10 years. Fertig plans to use the money for capital improvements to the building he is purchasing at the corner of Second and Main streets. He intends to open a Crossfit gym at this location.

Fertig spoke to the council on the improvements he plans to make to the building, including updating the exterior of the building, installing ADA accessible bathrooms, and installing security equipment for the building.

Council members discussed Fertig's business plan and the amount of capital Fertig is bringing to the project. They also encouraged him to work with the Revitalize Wayne and Architectural Committee in regard to the look of the building.

Matt Ley, a member of the Revitalize Wayne committee, told the council he is "very happy to have someone fill two empty spots on Main Street."

Council members took no action on an ordinance that would amend the city code in regard to the discharge of fireworks within the city. Instead, they determined the issue could be re-visited again, next year, prior to the 2015 Fourth of July holiday.

Council members discussed, but took no action on establishing sewer hook-up fees for the Kardell Sanitary Sewer Extension and Chief's Way Sanitary Sewer Extension projects.

The total cost of the projects was \$372,585 for the work that was do-

ne outside city limits. Property owners in the area would be billed when they are hooked up to city services, rather than be assessed for the work, as would have happened for a project within city limits.

The language of the resolution will be revisited at a future council meeting.

Mayor Ken Chamberlain appointed a number of people to a Community Citizen Committee to make recommendations on the repair and replacement of the Hank Overin Field grandstand. The grandstand was damaged in a June 30 wind storm in Wayne, and decisions on the future of the grandstand need to be made.

Members of the committee include Steve Lutt, Dallas Dorey, Jeff Zeiss, Josh Johnson, Alex Koch, Mike Carnes, Cassie Harm, Adam Hoffman, Pat Melena and Joel Hansen. Mayor Chamberlain said additional members may be added to the group in the future.

Following the regular agenda items, the council met in a budget work session to work on the 2014-2015 city budget.

The council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, Aug. 19 at 5:30 p.m.

Dwinell said he knew there was a chance he might have to step in prior to the start of his term, but Janssen's announcement at the July 1 Wayne County Commissioners meeting was still a surprise.

Dwinell, 41, is a Winside resident and he has spent a good deal of time talking with the man he has replaced about the position and the responsibilities that come with it.

Dwinell said he is getting into the job right at the start of the 2014-15 fiscal year, so he has had a chance to walk through the office's budget needs for the coming year. He said he would be responsible with the county's tax dollars and work with what they have to provide the best coverage they can for the county.

"Money is tight right now, but there are some things that we'll need," he said. "I'm going to be as responsible as I can with our tax

dollars and use what we have to best benefit the county."

Dwinell's biggest challenge, as he enters the full-time duties as the county sheriff, is to hire replacements for both Janssen and long-time deputy Doug Muhs, who is also retiring after more than 30 years in the department.

"With LeRoy retiring and our chief deputy retiring, we have to hire a couple of people so we can continue to serve the area as well as we have," he said.

While the possibility of a write-in campaign could materialize before the Sept. 2 deadline, Dwinell said that isn't a concern for him as he begins his duties.

"As long as I don't do something drastic to upset the public, I shouldn't have to worry about it," he said. "I'm just looking forward to doing the job the best I can."

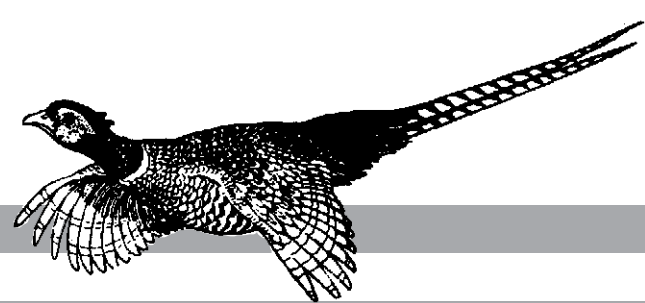

Football playoffs different this year

Next week marks the official start of the 2014-15 high school sports calendar, and this will be a year of change in area high school sports.

The most notable change that you're going to see this year will be on the football field, where common sense seems to be finding its way into a place one might never think possible — the offices of the Nebraska School Activities Association.

Yours truly has been one of the most vocal critics over the years of the NSAA's awful playoff format for high school football, a system that rewarded mediocrity and traded dollars for common sense and safety for far too long.

There was once a time when teams at all levels, from Class A to the small-school eight-man teams, played a nine-game regular season before going into playoff mode. That changed in the mid 1990's when the NSAA discovered that an extra round of playoffs meant hundreds of thousands of dollars that could be added to their coffers, coming with the twisted, politically-correct idea of giving more schools the chance to call themselves "playoff teams."

Now, all the 11-man teams will play nine-game regular seasons, with the top 16 in each class advancing to the postseason. The good news is, we won't have to see anything like what we saw here two years ago, when 2-7 Wayne "qualified" for the playoffs against a Fort Calhoun team that, at 6-2, was much more deserving of a postseason spot. (I should note that the previous statement is not a knock on the kids or the coaching staff of Wayne High, but more critical of the system that put them in that position.)

The bad news is, there won't be room for error for area teams who want to make the playoffs. Even with as tough a district as Wayne will play in this year, a 7-2 mark may not be enough to get to the big show. The nice part about that, though, is that it will make EVERY game on the agenda a big game, which adds to the excitement.

So what are the chances we'll have some area teams in the football playoffs this November? To be honest, the chances will be a little shaky, from a schedule standpoint.

Wayne and LCC (listed as "Cedar County" on the NSAA website) both

have difficult schedules that don't leave a lot of room for error if they want to make the playoffs.

Wayne High coach Terry Bear must have angered somebody in the NSAA office when you look at the second half of the Blue Devils' schedule, which includes road games at Pierce AND Norfolk Catholic, along with a home battle against defending C-1 champion Boone Central/Newman Grove. There is also a road game at Fort Calhoun and a home battle with Columbus Lakeview, so nobody is going to accuse Wayne High of playing a bunch of cupcakes this year.

The Bears don't have it very easy, either. Their first four games are all tough ones, with West Holt and Crofton at home and Hartington CC and Lutheran High NE on the road. The second half of the schedule gets easier, so if they can somehow navigate through that early-season mine field, they might have a chance to sneak into the C-2 bracket.

Wakefield won't be a playoff team this year since they are moving to eight-man and their enrollment is above the NSAA's limit for schools competing in the eight-man playoffs. Their season finale at Pender on Oct. 24 will be the Trojans' version of the Super Bowl to close out the season.

Thirty-two teams still get to the playoffs in eight-man ball, and Allen and Winside are both in the same district in Class D-2 this year. They'll meet each other on Oct. 17 in Allen, and it might be for a playoff spot in what will be a tough district.

Both the Eagles and Wildcats have to lock horns with Lyons-Decatur, Wynot and Bancroft-Rosalie in district play this year, as well as Emerson-Hubbard. That shapes up to be one of the more entertaining districts in small-school ball this season.

Huskers on '14-15' docket for Wildcats

An exhibition game at Nebraska and 17 home games highlight a 28-game schedule for the 2014-15 Wayne State women's basketball team.

"We are extremely excited about the upcoming season," coach Chris Kielsmeier said in announcing the team's schedule Thursday. "Our schedule sets up great for our fans to see us play a lot in Rice throughout the entire season. We have 17 home games this year, which is the most we have ever had on the schedule."

The Wildcats open the season on Sunday, Nov. 2 with an exhibition game at Nebraska, with tip-off slated for 2 p.m. at Pinnacle Bank Arena in Lincoln.

"Playing at the University of Nebraska will be a very unique opportunity for our program," Kielsmeier

said. "We will have seven players on our roster from the state of Nebraska, which is the most we have ever had, and playing in this game will be very special for them and all of our players."

Wayne State will play 17 games in the friendly confines of Rice Auditorium this season, where the Wildcats are 70-5 under Kielsmeier in the last five years.

The Wildcats and Northern State from the NSIC will battle Nebraska-Kearney and Northwest Missouri State in the MIAA/NSIC Challenge on Friday and Saturday, Nov. 14-15, to open the home schedule.

The Wildcats have four more non-conference games at home in November, hosting York College on Wednesday, Nov. 19 and Chadron State on Friday, Nov. 21.

Wayne State will have two home games over Thanksgiving weekend, entertaining Peru State on Friday, Nov. 28 at 6 p.m. and South Dakota School of Mines on Sunday, Nov. 30 at 3 p.m.

"Our non-conference part of the schedule will prepare us for another demanding season in the Northern

Sun Conference," said Kielsmeier. "The MIAA/Northern Sun Conference Challenge is an opening week-end exempt tournament that will allow us to play two more games and give us a greater chance to make the NCAA Regionals again this season."

Wayne State opens Northern Sun Conference play with road games against three of the premier teams in the league as the Wildcats visit Augustana on Monday, Nov. 24 followed by a road trip to defending Central Region Champion Concordia-St. Paul and Minnesota State on Dec. 5-6.

"With us having to open conference play at Augustana, it is really important to be playing well early in the season," stated Kielsmeier. "The early portion of our schedule is very demanding."

The Wildcats will close out the first semester schedule with three home games against Minnesota Crookston and Bemidji State (Dec. 12-13) and against travel partner Augustana on Saturday, Dec. 20.

Ten games highlight a busy January schedule for the Wildcats with

six on the road. Home games include Minnesota State and Concordia-St. Paul on Jan. 9-10, and Upper Iowa and Winona State on Jan. 23-24.

February finds the Wildcats playing four of their six games at home. Wayne State will meet MSU Moorhead and Northern State, an NCAA Tournament team last season, on Feb. 6-7 followed by the last regular season home games against Sioux Falls and Southwest Minnesota State, Feb. 13-14.

The first round of the NSIC Sanford Health Women's Basketball Tournament will be played at the host site of the top eight teams on Wednesday, Feb. 25. The remainder of the tournament will be played at the Sanford Pentagon in Sioux Falls, S.D., with the quarterfinals on March 1, semifinals March 2, and championship game set for March 3.

The NCAA Central Region will be played March 13, 14 and 16 at the site of the highest seed, with the 2014 NCAA Elite Eight to be held March 24, 25 and 27 in Sioux Falls, S.D.

Wakefield among top 20 in MaxPreps' list

MaxPreps recently celebrated its 10-year anniversary by listing the top 20 high school football programs in Nebraska during that period, and there are some familiar names on the list.

Among those are the Wakefield Trojans, who were ranked 16th on a list that includes some of the best 11-man and eight-man teams in the state. Wakefield won back-to-back Class C-2 state titles in 2006 and 2007 and have a 52-41-1 record during that period.

Two of the top three teams in the state are from northeast Nebraska. Norfolk Catholic was listed as the No. 1 team in the state during the past 10 years, boasting an overall record of 110-12 that includes five state titles and 10 top 25 finishes.

Pierce was tied for third with Crete. The Bluejays have eight top-25 finishes and have won two state

titles. Howells was the highest-ranked eight-man school on the list, coming in at No. 9.

Those two, along with Chris Wimers of Happy Hollow and Ryan Norman of GolfTec-Omaha, will represent Nebraska in the 48th

PGA Professional National championship that will be held next summer in Philadelphia, Pa.

WSC netters earn academic honors

The Wayne State College volleyball team has earned the American Volleyball Coaches Association Team Academic Award for the 2013-14 season.

The Wildcats posted a team cumulative grade-point average of 3.48 during the 2013-14 academic year to receive the honor for a ninth consecutive season.

Wayne State was one of eight schools from the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference and 94 from NCAA Division II to receive the award. To be eligible for the award, a team must maintain at least a 3.30 cumulative grade-point average on a 4.0 scale. A record 676 teams from collegiate and high school levels received the award.

SEWER CLEANING NOTICE

Over the next few days, the City of Wayne Sewer Department will be having sewer mains cleaned in various parts of the City.

In the cleaning process, high pressure water is forced through the sewer main line, which pushes the air from the sewer main into the service lines of homes and businesses. If this happens, it can result in the air exiting through the toilet, causing the water to shoot out of the toilet bowl. This air should exit through the sewer vent of the building, but inadequate venting or location of toilets can cause the air to exit through the toilet.

This is a rare occurrence, but can be remedied by covering the toilet bowl with a towel and keeping the lid closed. This will keep most of the water in the bowl rather than on the floor.

Again, during the next week, when the toilets are not in use, cover them with a towel and keep the lid down.

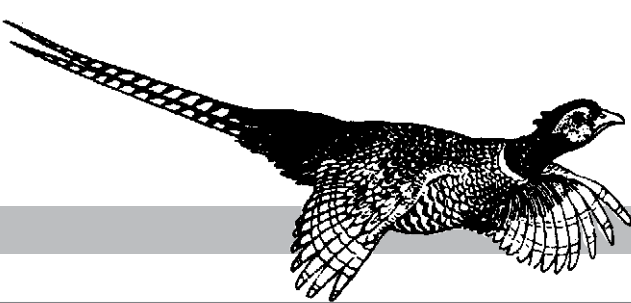

Gather in one place everything that's going to school with your child in the morning.

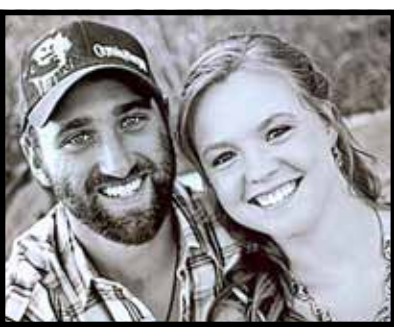
Preschool - the morning school starts:

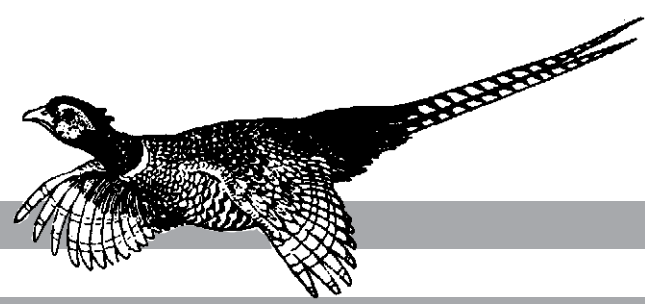

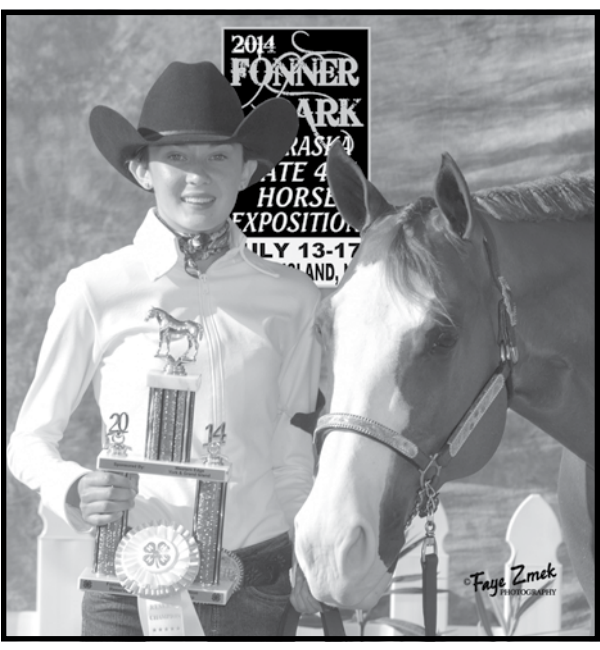

New application helps monitor irrigation pumps

A University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension app will help irrigators calculate the amount of water pumped by their irrigation pumping plant.

The Water Meter Calculator App allows the user to store data, such as field size in acres, flow meter units and allocation and annual irrigation caps for each field.

The user inputs the beginning and ending meter reading and the app calculates the amount of water pumped for the field and on a per acre basis. The app keeps track of total water pumped for the irrigation season, the remaining allocation for future years, the annual cap remaining as well as any annual cap penalties.

The developers of the Water Meter Calculator App include: Chuck Burr, Tim Lemmons and Tom Dorn, all UNL Extension educators, and Bryan Lubeck and Shirlee Poyser, both of the Lower Republican River

Natural Resources District. It was made by Jeff Abele of Move Creative, LLC.

The Water Meter Calculator App is available for download at the Apple App Store and Google Play store for \$1.99.

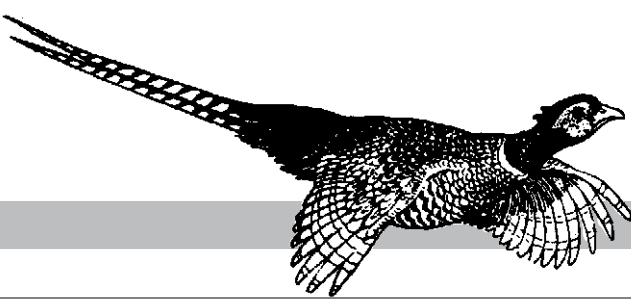

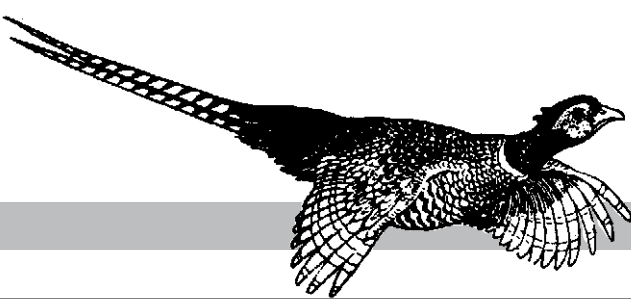
