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Chamberlain is re-elected as Wayne's mayor

\$2.8 million pool bond issue passes by almost 2-to-1

Wayne incumbent Mayor Ken Chamberlain overwhelmingly won a second term for the job as voters cast their ballots in Tuesday's general election.

Unofficial final totals from the Wayne County Courthouse show Chamberlain with 67.37 percent of the vote, compared to 26.80 for challenger John Temme. A total of 80 write-in votes were cast, and while the names of the write-ins were not noted, Wayne high school student Sydney McCorkindale had campaigned as a write-in candidate for the job.


For the former City Councilman-turned-mayor, it was humbling to see the support that he received at the ballot box.

"It's pretty humbling to get a nice voter turnout like we had and get 68 percent of the votes," he said Wednesday. "I've been pretty proud of the service I've been able to give and I really enjoy what I do for the community, and it sent a strong message to me that people here are supportive of the job I'm doing and I'm happy to be able to continue to do it."


Four years ago, shortly after Chamberlain was sworn in, he got his first significant test as mayor after two members of the Wayne Police Department contested their termination before the Wayne Civil Service Commission.

"I should've known I was in for a ride when I got sworn in on Pearl Harbor Day (Dec. 7)," Chamberlain said. "That was a real test for a lot of the city employees and we had to hold it together through all of that. I felt I grew a lot through that situation and developed a lot of relationships and a lot of trust with city employees and the community."

Chamberlain got another unexpected test of his leadership during the Oct. 4, 2013 tornado that struck the east side of town.

"You usually let the City Council guide and steer the community based on their decisions, but when situations like (the tornado) come up where you're thrown into a spot and it's either lead or get out of the way, I just took what I learned in the military and what I'd learned in this job and from my (eight) years on the City Council, and it served us pretty well."

Chamberlain said the city has a number of issues to address in the coming four years, including what to do with the 26 acres of land that will be available once the city drains the old wastewater treatment lagoon on the south side of town.


"We'll have to determine what's best for the

city and what the next stage is for that property," he said. "We've got a new pool to build and a baseball field to get back in shape as well, and I'd like to get the community involved to help guide and make those decisions."

The city will be getting a new swimming pool as well, as the bond issue for a half-cent sales tax increase to pay for the \$2.8 million bond issue for the pool passed with 65.66 percent of the vote.

"That was great to see," Chamberlain said of the community's support of the new pool project. "The thing that worried me was that if it didn't pass and a problem came up that required a major fix or rebuild, it would have to become a property tax issue and that would have been difficult for me to support putting

Parking, airport discussed by Council

Three agenda items dealing with parking in Wayne and a loan to the Wayne Municipal Airport for improvements made necessary after the Oct. 4, 2013 tornado took up the majority of the Wayne City Council meeting on Tuesday.

Marion Arneson spoke to the council on the need to restrict parking in Cityside Park.

Arneson told the council that the city recently took control of the streets. Vehicles are currently parking on the streets, which are narrower than those in some other areas of the city. Arneson said each unit in the area has two off-street parking spots, and he was concerned about overnight parking on the streets in the area. He requested the council restrict parking

on the streets in the area.

Council member Jennifer Sievers said she would like to see no parking on one side of the street and restricted parking from 12-5 a.m. on the other side, to make the regulations similiar to those in other parts of the city.

Council members directed city staff to draw up an ordinance to put the parking regulations in place. It will be brought before the council at a future meeting.

Two ordinances dealing with parking in Western Ridge received third and final reading during the meeting.

The first prohibits parking on the east side and the south side of the streets in Western Ridge, along with the entire cul de sac areas.

B.J. Woehler, who is building a house in the area, asked council to allow for parking in cer-

tain areas within a cul-de-sac. He showed a drawing of the area and indicated an area in the "neck" of the cul-de-sac where there was room to park.

The second ordinance will restrict parking in the area on the streets in the area from 12-5 a.m.

Ordinance 2014-30 also received third and final reading. It will change the hours of sale alcoholic beverages, both on sale and off sale, from 12 a.m. (in the current code) to 6 a.m. on Sundays. It will affect alcoholic liquors only and Sundays only, as city code already allows for the sale of beer and wine during this time frame and on all other days of the week.

Council member Jon Haase asked if the or-

Perry to go to trial for child porn

Not guilty pleas for 28 charges entered

A Wayne man accused on 28 counts of receiving and distributing child pornography pled not guilty Wednesday morning in Wayne County District Court.

Ted S. Perry, represented by Norfolk attorney Jason Doelee, appeared before Judge James G. Kube on 18 charges of possession of child pornography and 10 charges of distribution of child pornography. Each possession charge is a Class III felony, punishable by up to 20 years in prison, while each distribution charge is a Class I-D felony with a sentence of up to 50 years, including a mandatory minimum of three years, in prison.

In setting the pre-trial conference hearing for Wednesday, Jan. 7, Kube was told by Doelee that Perry has no prior record and is not a flight risk, due to having family in the area. He has three children under the age of 13 and has had one supervised visit with his children since his arrest on Sept. 9.

Kube ordered Perry to have no Internet, e-mail or texting access. He may have su-

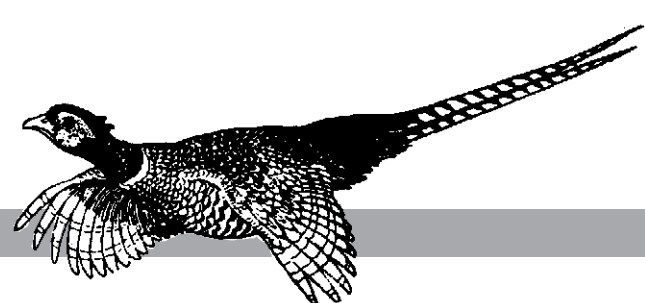

Wayne Sustainability Chapter in our Comprehensive Plan

Every city that has zoning is required to have a Comprehensive Long Range Plan for the future. The zoning rules are set up to guide the community's future development toward the Comp Plan. Comprehensive Plans are revised about every 10 years by a citizens committee appointed by the mayor and council. The current Wayne Comp Plan is about six years old and addresses future population trends, general goals for community growth, land use, transportation, recreation, public services, housing inventory, and commercial growth. A copy of the Wayne Comp Plan is linked to the City of Wayne website under Departments/Building and Planning/Comprehensive Plan.

The Nebraska Legislature has determined that all Nebraska Comprehensive Plans are now required to add an Energy Element Chapter. The purpose is to require life cycle costs of energy and resources to be considered when planning and op-

erating communities.

The Green Team and city staff have developed a draft that will be presented at Planning Commission and City Council public hearings in December to amend the Wayne Comp Plan to add a Sustainability Chapter. This draft Sustainability Chapter addresses: 1) Best Management Practices (BMP's) for energy efficiency of existing building and new construction, 2) Diverting more recyclable materials from our solid waste, 3) Increased transportation efficiencies, 4) BMP's for reducing the storm water management costs and life development costs through Low Impact Development (LID) design, and 5) Replanting and maintaining our urban forest over time.

We'll discuss some of the details of the draft Sustainability Chapter in this newsletter in the next few weeks. If you would like a copy of the draft, email me at the address below and I'll reply with a Word File attachment of the draft.

Wayne student advances in Lions Club poster contest

Jaden Jenkins, a sixth grade student at Wayne Elementary School has taken the first step to becoming an internationally recognized artist by winning a local competition sponsored by the Wayne Lions Club.

Jenkin's poster was among more than 375,000 entries submitted worldwide in the 27th annual Lions International Peace Poster Contest. Lions Clubs International is sponsoring the contest to emphasize the importance of world peace to young people everywhere.

"It is in our future to stress the importance of peace, tolerance and international understanding," the 13-year old said.

Her poster was selected by Wayne State College Instructor Dr. Pearl Hansen's Art Education students for its originality, artistic merit and portrayal of the contest theme "Peace, Love and Understanding." The judging was held in October at Wayne State College.

Second place was awarded to Emily Chamberlain and Natalie Bentjen earned third place honors.

Wayne Lions Club President Vic Kniesche said he was impressed by the expression and creativity of the students at the Wayne school. "It

is obvious that these young people have strong ideas about what peace means to them. I'm so proud that we were able to provide them with the opportunity to share their visions."

Jenkin's poster will advance to stiff competition through the district, multiple district and international rounds if she is to be declared the international grand prize winner," Kniesche said.

One grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners will be selected. The grand prize includes a cash award of \$5,000, plus a trip for the winner and two family members to the awards ceremony at Lions Day with the United Nations.

"Our club is cheering for Jaden as her poster advances in the competition and we hope that her vision will ultimately be shared with others around the world," Kniesche said.

Have you ever thought that someday you might be unable to walk and enjoy the simple pleasures of life? If so, it is time that you begin to reduce the chance of not being able to perform activities of daily living by beginning an exercise program. Exercise can be a powerful tool in an individual's health program and has been shown to improve a person's quality of life. Regular exercise can improve your chances of being able to continue to perform those activities that you enjoy.

Today exercise is indicated in the treatment of a large number of medical problems and is considered by some as the "wonder drug of our time". Evidence suggests, in selected cases, that exercise can be as effective as medical treatment, and in special situations more effective. Being active protects against heart disease, cancer, stroke and helps the body in controlling blood pressure, cholesterol and blood sugars. Exercise can also lessen the effects of arthritis, improve bone strength, reduce falls, and decrease the stress associated with everyday life.

For individuals with diabetes regular exercise has been shown to lower their blood glucose levels, and can decrease blood glucose for several hours following exercise. Decreasing your blood sugars by 1 percent can reduce your chance of heart attacks by 15-20 percent. Uncontrolled diabetes can decrease your life expectancy by 8-10 years. Participating in a regular exercise program can improve your quality of life and improve your life expect-

tancy. If you have just been diagnosed and wonder how you'll get in shape, or if you have had diabetes for a long time but still want to be more active, there is no time like the present. Don't use diabetes as an excuse to not exercise. Use it as an excuse TO exercise.

During the Dec. 3 session of Control Diabetes for Life, organizers invite participants to learn about how exercise can change their lives.

The program will help you get started with your exercise program by providing instructions on who can exercise, general rules about exercise, what type of exercise should you perform, how much exercise is enough, how often you should perform of an exercise program, and how you can get started. The goal of exercise is to improve a person's quality of life by decreasing the presence and the effects of disease. Feel better and stay healthy for years to come by exercising and lowering your blood glucose level.

Control Diabetes for Life is a program to help participants learn to control diabetes and prolong the onset of complications. The program is a joint project, sponsored by University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension and Franciscan Care Services of West Point, and is offered free-of-charge.

Participants are asked to pre-register for Control Diabetes for Life by calling the UNL Extension office in Wayne at (402) 375-3310. Please register by Monday, Dec. 1 so the proper number of handouts may be prepared. Nebraska School Food Service Association has approved this session for two hours of continuing education credits.

 a \$3 million pool on property tax payers. I think the rest of the community saw that too, which is why it passed so easy. The (pool) committee put a lot of work and effort to come up with the best plan, and that's what voters had in front of them and that's why it did so well." In the two Wayne City Council races that were contested, incumbent Matt Eischeid easily won re-election in Ward 2 with 72.32 percent of the vote, compared to 27.68 for former City Councilwoman Kathryn Berry. Jason Karsky claimed the seat in Ward 3 with 80.07 percent of the vote, compared to 19.59 percent for Nicholas Hawthorne. Wayne County appears to be vot-

ing along with the rest of the state in the state and federal races, as well as the amendment to raise the minimum wage. Wayne County voters approved the minimum wage increase with 54.65 percent of voters saying yes to the proposed increase. Wayne County voters gave nods to Pete Ricketts for the next Nebraska governor (64.93), Ben Sasse for U.S. Senate (64.47) and Adrian Smith for the District 3 House of Representatives (77.44). Republicans were also elected by Wayne County voters in all the state office seats, including Secretary of State (John Gale, 82.85), Treasurer (Don Stenberg, 77.49), Attorney General (Doug Peterson, 75.33) and Auditor (Charlie Janssen, 70.62). A total of 2,725 of the 5,183 regis-

tered voters in Wayne County cast ballots. The 52.58 percent voter turnout was better than the 45.55 percent turnout for the 2010 election. Turnout was strongest in the Fourth Ward in the city of Wayne, where more than half of the registered voters there (439 of 864) cast ballots. Most of the other nine precincts in the county were well into the 40-percent range, with the exception of the Deer Creek/Sherman (35.81 percent) and Wayne First Ward (39.15 percent). The 395 absentees ballots that were cast before the election was unusually high for the midterm election cycle, according to Wayne County Clerk Deb Finn.

School required immunizations are needed prior to entry into kindergarten (ages 4-6) and 7th grade. Lead screening is also available by appointment only to children ages 12 months to 5 years of age. Each child should be accompanied by the parent or guardian. Past immunization records and insurance cards are required. Proxy forms are needed when a parent or legal guardian is unable to accompany the child to clinic. Proxy forms may be obtained by contacting the Pender office at (402) 385-6300. A suggested donation of \$39 per child would be appreciated to help defray administrative costs. If a child only receives one immunization, then the suggested donation is \$19.50. 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County to go ahead with deal to map area with photos

The Wayne County Commissioners decided not to wait on the City of Wayne to take a picture of the county's landscape.

At Tuesday's meeting, the board unanimously decided to go ahead with plans to have the Pictometry International Corporation fly over the county and take high-resolution images across the county that could be used with the county's GIS mapping systems that help determine everything from bridge location to assisting with changes in land assessments.

Wayne County Assessor Dawn Duffy told the board that she was waiting to hear from city officials on whether or not they would address the possibility of paying about \$10,000 of the \$56,372.50 that it would cost to shoot the entire county, including the city, adding that the county would need to have the contract signed by early December to get the shooting done in early 2015.

"We could wait a year, which would still be in my time frame," Duffy said, noting the schedule she keeps, per state law, to assess properties throughout the county. "If we're going to do it this year, though, we need to sign the contract before December."

Duffy said the city had paid for a similar flight over

the city in 2013, and that they may not be interested in paying for another one less than two years after the last one.

Board member Randy Larson said he didn't want to commit to the project until he knew whether or not the city would be involved in the payment to the company.

"Maybe we need to see what happens at their next City Council meeting and we would get a better feel for it," he said.

Board chairman Dean Burbach agreed with Larson, but fellow board member Jim Rabe was concerned that delays would put Duffy behind in her work.

"We can make it work and wait until next year," Duffy said. "I would expect the cost to be a little more, but it wouldn't be a dramatic change."

Duffy said she is required to review every parcel of land in the county every six years, and she tries to break it down into certain towns or precincts each year. She said that she wouldn't fall behind if the county had to wait until next year.

Later in the meeting, it was determined the Wayne City Council was not going to act on the proposal, so the county board went ahead with approving the proposal with the idea that they would work with the city on a similar mapping project in the future.

The board's next meeting is Tuesday, Nov. 18 at 9 a.m. at the Wayne County Courthouse.

dinance could allow for off sale of all types of alcohol until 2 a.m. at certain locations within the city.

Mayor Ken Chamberlain said an ordinance can not be tailored to any one particular business.

City Finance Director Nancy Braden spoke to the council on the need for the airport to obtain a loan in the amount of \$70,000 to cover costs incurred after the Oct. 4, 2013 tornado.

She noted that more than \$2 million in improvements have taken place since the tornado, and the airport's cash reserves have been used to pay for the majority of those not covered by insurance.

However, two issues, the west driveway and drainage on some areas of the property, are being dealt with while a contractor was on site.

Braden said that the Wayne Airport Authority would be able to repay the loan in approximately a year and a half, with interest. Council members approved the res-

olution on a 6-1 vote, with Council member Jon Haase voting against.

Resolution 2014-90 was also approved by the council. It will allow for a contract between the City of Wayne and Northeast Nebraska Economic Development District for the completion of an environmental review for the Wayne Housing Authority's Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Capital Funds Award.

The contract involves the Villa Wayne, which is owned by the City

of Wayne. Villa Wayne operates under HUD guidelines and HUD requires that all housing authorities complete environmental reviews for the physical premises.

Trine McBride is the director of the Housing Authority and spoke to the council on the work that will be done and the fact that the Villa has adequate funding to reimburse the city for the cost of the study.

The council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, Nov. 18 at 5:30 p.m. in council chambers.

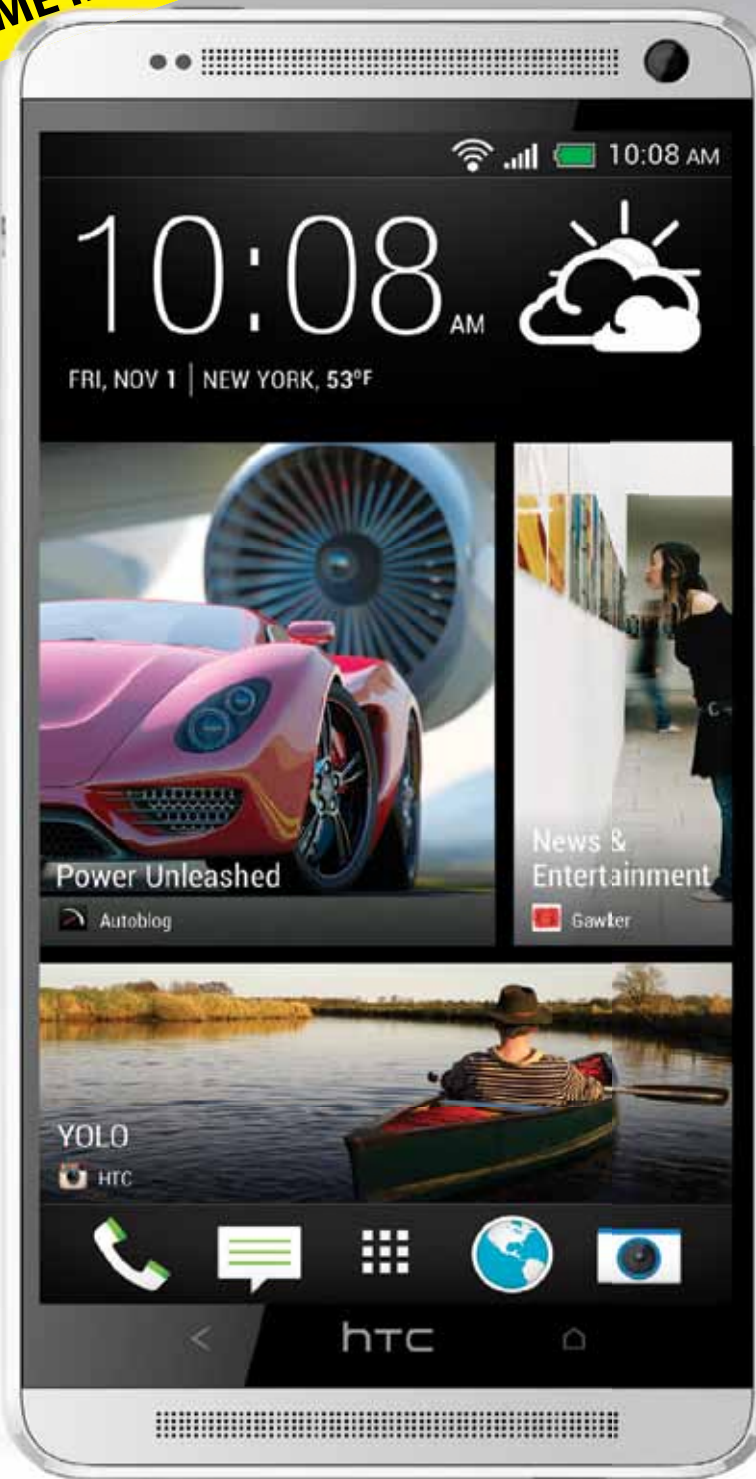

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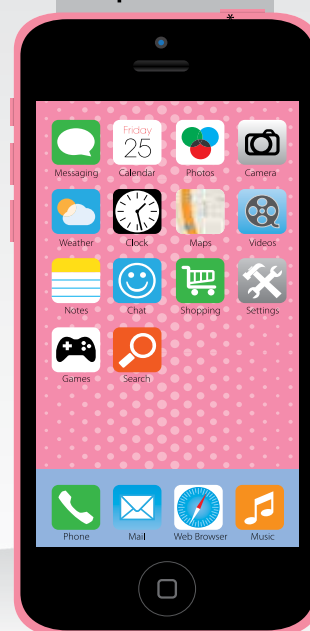
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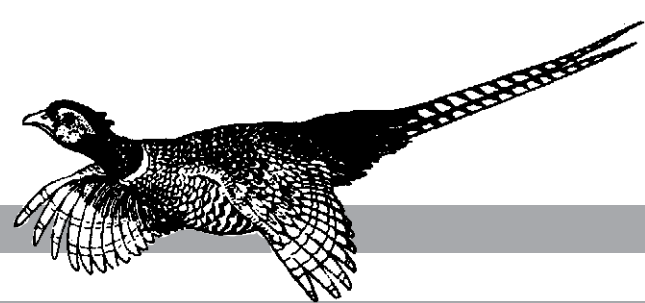

Sunday at 'The Bank': Forget it

The ACL-tearing, knee-jerk reaction to Sunday's 84-43 Husker beat-down of the Wayne State women's basketball team at Sunday's exhibition at Pinnacle Bank Arena in Lincoln is that this is going to be a very long year for the Wildcats.

That would be a very accurate assumption if it weren't for one small detail – Wayne State won't be playing any more Div. I teams this season.

When you look at the stat sheet, it looks more like Wayne State was just starting up a basketball program, rather than taking a team that is preseason ranked No. 6 in the country out for a test spin against a Div. I team that is also very impressively ranked in their division this preseason.

The Wildcats hit just 28.6 percent from the floor, committed 16 turnovers and were outrebounded 47-31. Eleven of Wayne State's 16 turnovers were the result of Husker steals. The five starters – including returning starters Ashton Yossi and Jordan Spencer – combined to score only 29 points, far below what they have historically generated. Wayne State hit just three 3-point shots in 11 attempts. (I'm not sure I can remember the last time a Chris Kielsmeier-led team took ONLY 11 3-point shots in a game.)

But let's remember one thing about this game – it was an exhibition game. It doesn't count in the win-loss column. It will have no bearing on anything regarding the 2014-15 season that gets started with next weekend's NSIC-MIAA Crossover Challenge and matchups against Nebraska-Kearney and Northwest Missouri State.

In other words – forget about it. That's exactly what the Wildcats need to do with Sunday's matchup. It was a practice game. A scrimmage in front of almost 5,000 fans (including a great turnout from the Wayne State faithful). An opportunity to get the big-time experience and see where work needs to be done before that season opener next Friday against the in-state rival Lopers.

Kielsmeier and Co. need to treat this game like an Etch-A-Sketch – address the adjustments that need to be made, then flip it over, shake it a few times and erase it from memory and begin drawing up the 2014-15 season.

With eight newcomers to the lineup, a game like this – regardless of the final score – is a great learning opportunity. A number of these girls were playing their first college game Sunday afternoon, and I'm sure that it didn't take long for them to come to the realization that the speed of college basketball, compared to the speed of the high school game they played for four years, is like comparing lightning to the lightning bug.

The game was also an opportunity for transfers like Haley Moore and Sadie Murren to get used to playing in a new system at a new level. With both coming from Div. I programs (Eastern Michigan and Nebraska, respectively), they have some idea of what that pace is all about, but are experiencing it with a different group of individuals that requires a little chemistry building that will come in due course.

The only real disappointment that I believe Kielsmeier had about Sunday's game was the fact that the team didn't start out well and dug themselves an even deeper hole than was to be expected. I don't think it was reasonable to expect the Wildcats to actually BEAT a very talented Husker team, but the hope was for the team to come out and play well and give a good showing. It was frustrating, to say the least.

The Wildcats will no doubt spend some time going over Sunday's game and addressing the issues that Nebraska exposed, but I have no doubt that this team is going to be worthy of its high preseason ranking and will help us forget all about what happened Sunday.

Five-set win over W-P puts Devils in C1-3 district final

OAKLAND – Survive and advance.

At this time of the season, the volleyball teams who can do those two things will keep playing another day. And, for the Wayne High Blue Devils, that next day is this Friday.

Wayne High outlasted Wisner-Pilger in a five-set thriller Tuesday night in the C1-6 subdistrict finals at Oakland-Craig High School, winning a rollercoaster match over the Gators, 25-22, 25-14, 16-25, 23-25, 15-11 to move into Friday's district finals for a shot at the state tournament.

The 22-10 Blue Devils looked to be on their way to a three-game sweep of a Gators team that had beaten them twice in best-of-three matches in tournament play earlier this year. But Wisner-Pilger bounced back and made a game of it, and the two teams were tied at 11-11 before Wayne was finally able to seal the deal.

"We had a lot of momentum going for us in the first two games, and then they stole it in the third game and kept it in the fourth, and it's so hard to get that momentum

back once you've lost it," coach Tracy Krusemark said. "I was proud of how the girls were able to take it back and fight to the end."

Krusemark said her front line swung well at the net, and the 1-2 combination of Madison Frevert and Lexi Sokol was once again dominant at the net. Frevert finished with a match-high 22 kills and Sokol added 14.

"They knew from the get-go this season that they were going to be our go-to players, and they really held their own tonight," Krusemark said.

Alyssa Schmale added eight kills for the Blue Devils, and Emma Evetovich recorded 46 assists. Peyton Roach had two ace serves and Tarah Stegemann led the defense with 23 digs.

On Monday, the Blue Devils took care of West Point-Beemer in three sets, winning 25-21, 25-13, 26-24.

Frevert and Sokol were a solid 1-2 punch at the net for Wayne. Frevert finished with 16 kills and hit .278 for the match and Sokol had 12 kills

Exhibition a rough start for 'Cats – NU wins 84-43

LINCOLN – Wayne State women's basketball coach Chris Kielsmeier has some bad news for the rest of the Big Ten Conference.

If Sunday's 84-43 exhibition trouncing of Div. II sixth-ranked Wayne State by the Div. I 16th-ranked Nebraska Cornhuskers is any kind of barometer, there are going to be some rough nights at the office for some of the teams the Huskers will face this year.

The exhibition game between the top Nebraska teams in each of the NCAA's two highest divisions played before a crowd of 4,948 fans at the Pinnacle Bank Arena, and Kielsmeier said the Huskers made his team look a lot more rugged than he expects them to be this season.

"I wish we would have represented our program a little better and give people a better sense of how we do things, but you've got to give

Nebraska a lot of credit," he said. "They're really, really good and play a fun, exciting style and they're going to give a lot of teams problems this year."

The Huskers certainly gave the Wildcats a lot to look at in the video room as they prepare for their season opener next week.

The Huskers opened with a 3-pointer by Brandi Jeffery in the first minute of the contest, which was countered by a Jordan Spencer basket on the inside to make it 3-2 with 18:44 to go in the first half.

That was as close as Wayne State would get the rest of the afternoon.

Nebraska jumped out early, hitting eight of their first 10 shots and repeatedly beating the Wildcats in transition to build a 28-point halftime lead.

"They're so experienced, and we didn't make them make any mistakes," Kielsmeier said. "They were able to execute their stuff and we just made too many mistakes that allowed them to get a lot of confi-

dence, and in turn that made our players tentative, and when you play an outstanding opponent you can't be afraid to make mistakes."

Nebraska opened with a 14-4 run in the first 3 1/2 minutes before Spencer slowed the runaway with her third basket of the half. She scored the Wildcats' first six points and had a game-high 11 in the game, but she was silenced after the Huskers made a change defensively, putting Hailie Sample on the Wildcat senior and keeping her away from the basket for the rest of the half.

"She's really good defensively and she was able to be physical and keep Jordan off of where she wanted to be," Kielsmeier said. "Jordan is used to going around people, and she had a hard time with that kid."

Eastern Michigan transfer Haley Moore hit a pair of baskets, Pender freshman Paige Ballinger hit a shot on the inside and Ashton Yossi hit

For Weich, FXFL a shot at big time

One game. Just one game. That's how close players in the new professional Fall Experimental Football League are to achieving the ultimate dream – making the NFL.

And that's no different for Wayne State graduate and former standout Wildcat punter Randy Weich, who has been part of the league since the start of training in September.

"Being a part of the FXFL is a blessing," said Weich, a 2007 graduate of Pierce High School. "I have had teammates get called up to the NFL along with other athletes I've competed against. It really is exciting to know that everyone in this league is just a breakout game away from being on an NFL roster."

The FXFL is in its inaugural year and serves as a developmental platform for players, coaches and referees. FXFL players must be two years or less out of college, or have been cut from an NFL team. Four teams currently make up the FXFL: the Omaha Mammoths, the Boston Brawlers, the Brooklyn Bolts, and the Blacktips, who are a traveling-only team.

Weich graduated from Wayne State in 2012 and holds several punting records, including the school's two longest punts (95 and 85 yards); the top three average punts in a single season (45.4, 44.8 and 43.4 yards); and the ninth most punt yards in a single season (2,676 yards).

While at Wayne State, Weich was

named an All-American both his junior and senior years, receiving honors from six different coaches' associations and/or publications (twice from the Associated Press All-American team). He is the only Wayne State athlete to ever receive that many All-American awards.

Weich joined the Mammoths in September before being traded to the Blacktips at the beginning of October. He is one of only a handful of players from a Div. II school participating in the FXFL. A majority of players attended Div. I schools, which could be an advantage if a team is looking for someone who has played in front of exceptionally large crowds.

But being in front of a bigger crowd has never been an issue for him, Weich said.

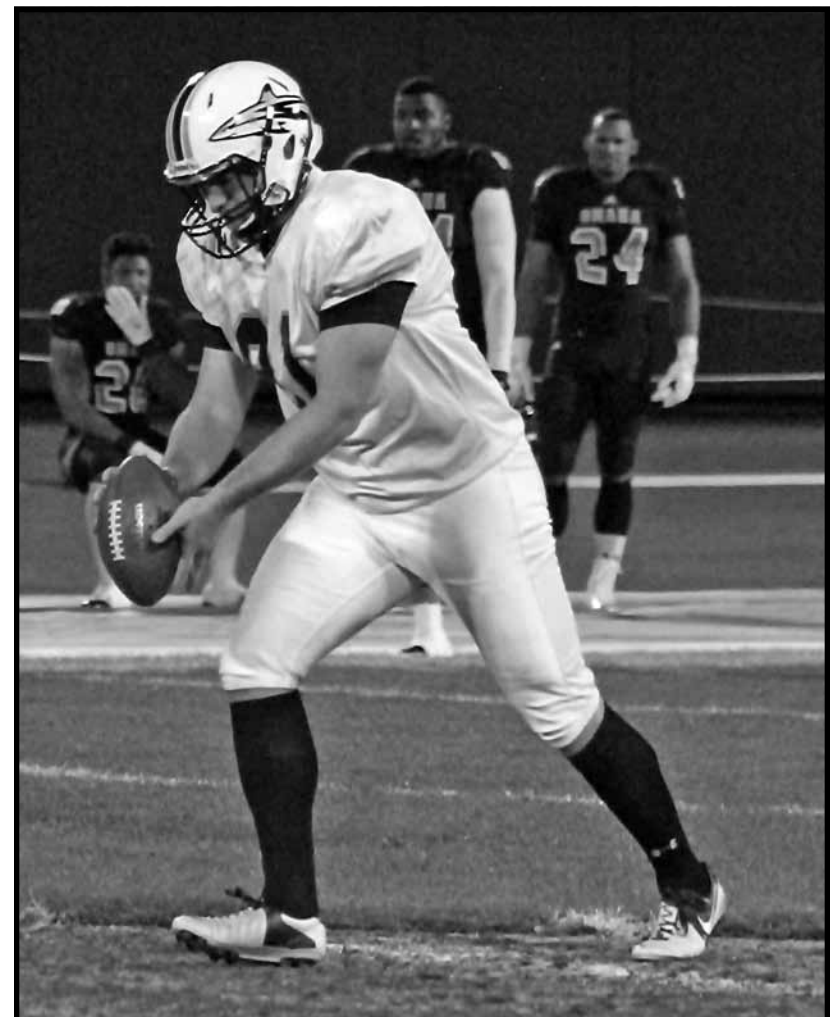
"When you're focused on a game, you don't really notice a lot of things going on around you," he said.

However, he said playing at Wayne State was still a great experience.

"Most of the players in this league don't know what it's like to play in front of only a few hundred people," Weich said. "It's one thing to play for the glory of performing in front of 60,000 people; it's another to play the game you love regardless of attendance."

Weich's former coaches both attribute his success and potential to two things: his ability to recognize

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Five turnovers doom 'Cats in 58-29 loss

FAYETTE, Iowa - Upper Iowa forced five Wayne State turnovers and racked up 583 yards of total offense to hand the Wildcats a 58-29 setback Saturday evening in Northern Sun Conference football action.

Wayne State's defense and special teams got the Wildcats off to a fast start. The defense forced a turnover when Nick Monzu intercepted a Peacock pass at the Wildcats' 46-yard line. Wayne State drove 54 yards in nine plays, finishing it off with a 14-yard touchdown pass by Zach Osborn to Nick Roth.

Yates blocked a Peacock punt out the end zone. The safety gave Wayne State a 9-0 lead with 8:18 to go in the opening period.

Upper Iowa got on the board with a 41-yard run by Chris Smith, but Wayne State responded with a 17-play, 75-yard drive that ended with Osborn's second touchdown pass, a two-harder on fourth down to Tyler Johnson, to make it 16-7 with 12:31 left in the first half.

The bottom fell out on Wayne State after that, as Upper Iowa took advantage of two Wildcat interceptions and scored 29 unanswered points, turning a nine-point Wildcat advantage into a 36-16 halftime lead for the host Peacocks.

Upper Iowa tacked on a safety in the third quarter to make it 38-16. Wayne State tried to bounce back, cutting the lead to 38-22 when Osborn hit Brian Kent on a one-yard scoring strike early in the fourth quarter.

Upper Iowa was able to put the game out of reach after that, scoring 20 points in the final period to end their three-game losing streak and come away with the 29-point win.

Upper Iowa held a 583-420 advantage in total offense over the Wildcats. The Peacocks were bal-

anced with 226 on the ground and 357 passing while Wayne State gained 118 rushing and 302 passing.

Yates led the Wildcat ground attack with 70 yards on 15 carries followed by junior Ryan Ludlow with 41 yards on 13 carries. Osborn completed 27-of-51 passes for 302 yards and four touchdowns with four interceptions. Roth had seven receptions for 96 yards and a touchdown, Cole McDaniel added seven catches for 52 yards, and Kent hauled in six receptions for 77 yards and a score.

Chase Samuel led the Wayne State defense with nine tackles, followed by Monzu with eight stops and one interception.

Wayne State is 5-4 overall and 3-2 in the South Division. They will play their final home game of the season Saturday, hosting top-ranked Minnesota State in the annual Egg Bowl Game at Bob Cunningham Field in Wayne. Kickoff is set for 2 p.m.

a late 3-pointer to account for all of Wayne State's first-half points, as the Wildcats were limited to 7-of-30 (23.3 percent) shooting from the floor by the Husker defense.

The exhibition game was a return performance for Sadie Murren, who transferred to Wayne State after playing with the Huskers for two seasons. She struggled in her return to Lincoln, hitting just 1-of-11 from the floor and finishing with three points.

"The (Wayne State) coaches told me to just play the game that I love and don't play the jersey or the faces in the jersey, but I knew who I was playing and that was difficult," she said after the game.

"You've got to give (Murren) a lot of credit," Kielsmeier added. "When we recruited her, this game was pretty much a done deal and we gave her the opportunity to make her choice on playing in this game. She wanted to get better and she wanted our program to have the opportunity to be on the big stage."

The Wildcats struggled throughout the game against their big-division sisters. Nebraska hit 53.2 percent (33-of-62) from the floor while Wayne State managed just 28.6 shooting (18-of-63) from the field. 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Kielsmeier said the good thing about Sunday's outcome is that it gives his team a chance to see where it needs to get better in the two weeks they have before the games start counting. Wayne State hosts an NSIC-MIAA Crossover weekend classic with fellow NSIC school Northern State and MIAA counterparts Nebraska-Kearney and Northwest Missouri State visiting Nov. 14-15.

"I'm proud of the kids in that they didn't give up and continuing to fight," he said. "You hope a setting like this isn't too big for them. I think our young players learned about the pace of the game, and until you get exposed to it and see what we're on them about, it takes some time."

"I think it's important our players understand that Nebraska is going to do this to a lot of Division I

his own talent, and the desire and determination to improve that talent.

"Randy was always determined to be the best punter in the country... A natural athlete, he has an extra 'pop' in his leg that just doesn't exist in everyone," said Dan McLaughlin, Wayne State's head football coach. "What he has done is maximize that gift – and that in itself is an achievement."

In high school, Weich played tight end and outside linebacker, as well as punting and kicking. But with punting, he had a little "extra" talent.

"He worked hard to improve himself as a punter," said Pierce's head coach Mark Brahmmer, "because I believe he recognized his unique ability and the opportunities it might open up for him."

Weich has attended several camps on his own in order to add to his punting skills, including one-on-one lessons with Coach Gary Zauner (who has coached NFL athletes and hosts camps for punters and kickers), as well as Zauner's College Senior Specialist's Combine and Free Agent Specialist's Combine.

With camps and combines under his belt, Weich has eagerly wel-

comed the opportunity to play with athletes of a higher caliber than even the best college athletes get to compete against.

"While I was with the Mammoths, I had the privilege to train with a linebacker who has a Super Bowl ring," Weich said. "Just being around a guy like that really pushes me to further perfect my craft."

The Mammoths head coach, Sandy Buda, has also been impressed with Weich's punting.

"He's definitely got an NFL-type leg," he said.

There are only 32 spots for a punter in the NFL and hundreds of players trying to get those spots. Opportunity is the key, said McLaughlin.

"(Randy) sees the same things we do – that he is capable of achieving at the highest levels," he said. "So, he continues to prepare himself for that opportunity when it arises. That's all he can do – and he is determined to make it happen. I just hope he gets the chance."

The FXFL could give him just that – a chance. All players put in a large amount of hard work during practice and games with the sole purpose of reclaiming (or in Weich's case, debuting) an NFL roster spot.

"(The FXFL) is a great thing," Buda said. "No. 1, it's an opportu-

nity for guys to get back to the NFL, and No. 2, they're focused. We don't have a problem with effort, and we don't have a problem with attitude. They all want to get back to doing what they were doing."

"It is really quite incredible what happens when a group of highly motivated and highly talented people take the field," Weich added. "The will to be successful and the drive to push further is almost impossible to get away from."

Since playing his only game with the Blacktips on Oct. 15, Weich has returned to the Mammoths. The Mammoths have just one spot for a punter/kicker, and he is currently working to secure that spot on their team.

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Wildcats close with 2-0 victory

Seniors Alex Mathers and Kelsea Lambert scored second-half goals to give Wayne State a 2-0 win over University of Sioux Falls Sunday afternoon in the Northern Sun Conference women's soccer regular-season finale for both teams in Sioux Falls, S.D.

Wayne State's defense held Sioux Falls scoreless while playing into a stiff wind in the first half. Wayne State took advantage of the win after intermission, scoring four minutes into the second half when Mathers scored off a corner kick from Mallory Hoyt for a 1-0 Wildcat lead.

Wayne State got the insurance goal at the 61:30 mark when Lambert score on a cross from Josie Brown to give Wayne State the two-goal lead and wrap up the season-ending victory.

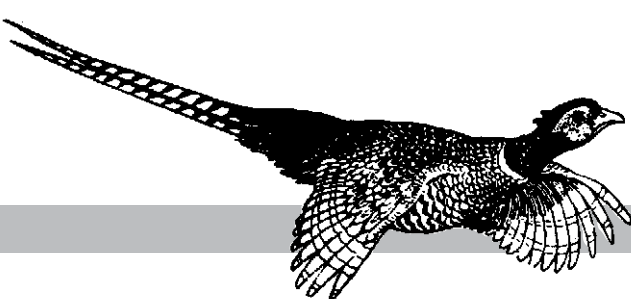
WSC wrestlers at home

Election is over – now what?

The election is over, the results are well-known. The will of the people has surely been shown. So let's let bygones be bygones and evil thoughts pass. They're newbies, they ought to go to class.

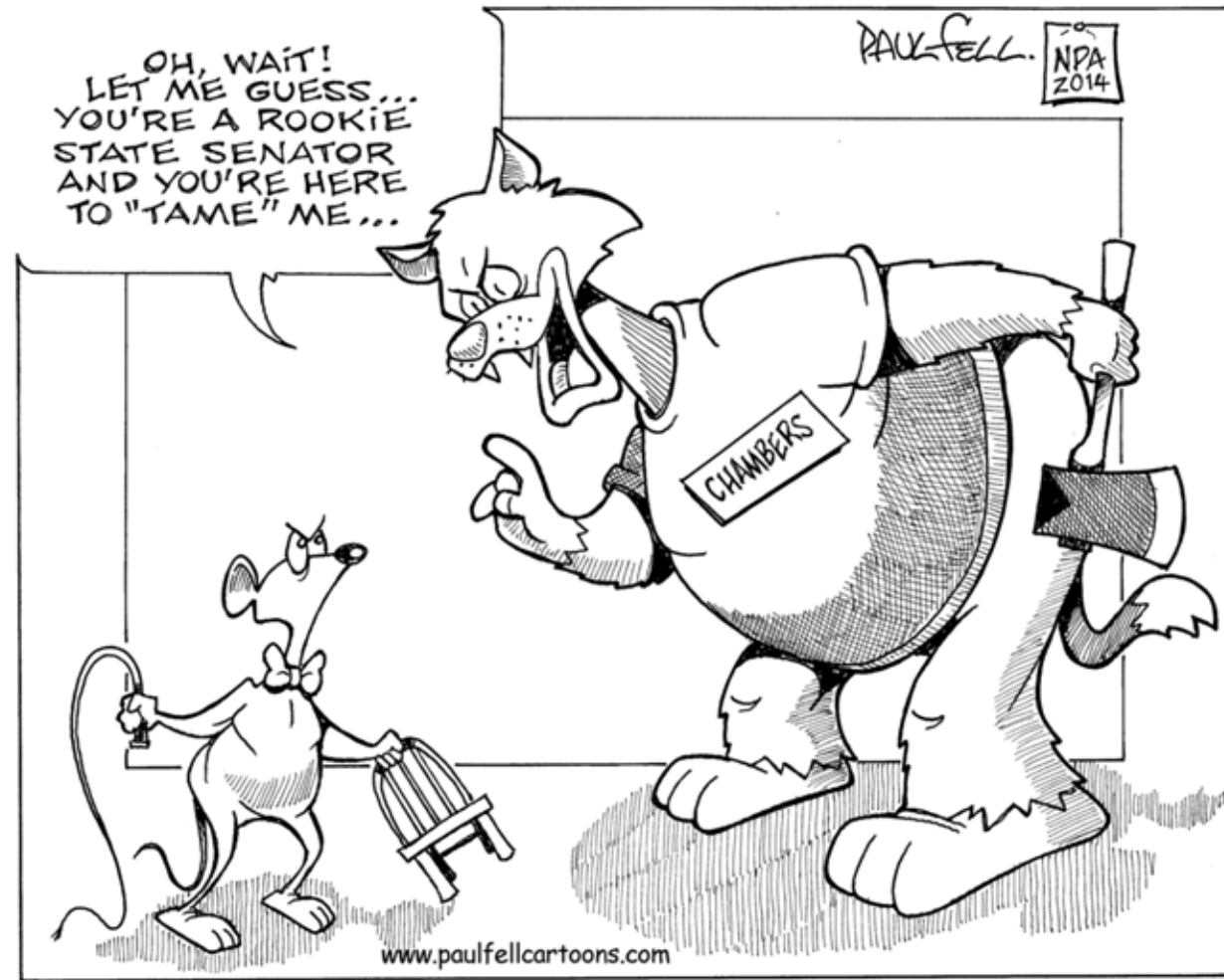
A new Governor, a new Attorney General and a new Auditor, as well as a large number of State Senators. Let the learning curve begin and keep an eye on what promises to be as big a roller coaster ride as the election. There's a lot of leftover business for all – in fact, there's plenty to go around.

The operative word here is NEW. A double-digit number of brand new smiley faces in the George W. Norris Legislative Chamber. For the most part they'll be learning from colleagues who have 2-6 years of experience. It's likely that one of them will make the not-so-wise statement that they have come to Lincoln to set Ernie Chambers straight. Yes, it happens with every new crop. Hasn't worked yet, never will.

On their desks will be a hefty report from a special investigative committee looking at the broken Nebraska Corrections System. There'll likely be a few other reports, as well, but this one has had the most press and will likely generate on-going public comment. There's also a report from a national group addressing over-crowding issues. That's serious since Nebraska is well beyond the brink of a federal mandate to require construction of a new prison.

It's not just the Legislature's problem. A lot of this will ultimately fall in the new governor's lap come January 2015.

The Corrections issue alone – with its sub-parts: the early release



of prisoners by department officials who ignored a Nebraska Supreme Court ruling; the release of Nikko Jenkins in spite of his pleading for mental health help and the four subsequent murders he has been convicted of in just a few days after his release; problems with the work release program that let inmates drive prison vans, one of which was involved in a fatal crash – could easily occupy an entire session.

Then, there's the seemingly unwieldy Department of Health and Human Services and its non-compliance issues, which have cost the state millions in federal dollars.

Add a subset of that with the expected debate over expanded Medicaid. Throw in the failed privatization of foster care and the lingering problems with the Beatrice State Development Center and you've got another major issue that's festering.

Don't overlook the as-yet unsettled issue of the Keystone Pipeline project. A district judge has ruled that the Governor and the Legislature violated the constitution in passing a law governing that project. Oh, and the Fremont Anti-Immigrant Ordinance which has caused the feds to raise an eyebrow about sending dollars their way.

Like I said, that's a pretty full plate – even for a veteran politician. Just enough to make it hard to hit the ground running. But, these are just the big issues. Lawmakers also start off with 10 days of introduction of new bills.

Oh wait, did I mention that this session is a budget year (the 90-day session)? Of course, there will always be groups calling for more tax reform and more aid to schools and fewer regulations on cities and counties and . . .

You get the picture. There may come a point when the winners will have to stop and count the cost.

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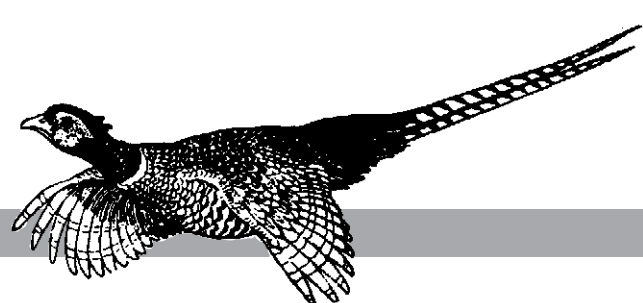
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Perhaps you think you just make

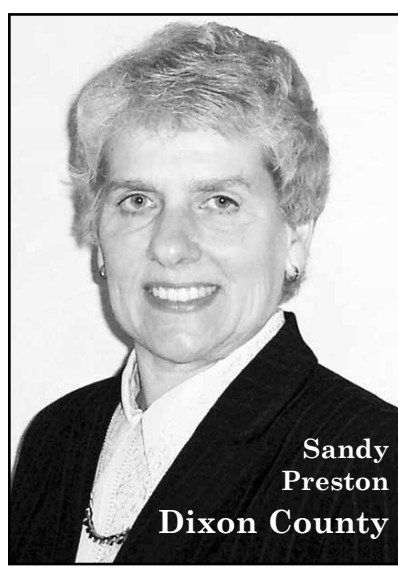
three food decisions daily: Breakfast, lunch and dinner. Well, think again. We choose how much milk to pour on cereal, whether to have a second piece of toast, if we want to add sugar to our cereal, and if so, how much and what type, and if we'll eat that doughnut at the office, and on and on . . . "Most of us don't overeat because we're hungry," says Dr. Wansink in his book, *Mindless Eating: Why We Eat More Than We Think*. We overeat, according to Wansink, because of such influences as family, friends, packaging, plates, labeling, shapes, distances and containers.

Wansink's studies suggest we can eat 20 percent more or 20 percent less without being aware of it. Becoming more "mindful" about even one eating practice can be significant. Daily eating 100 calories more than needed can result in a weight gain of 10 pounds a year!

Take this short six-question quiz and see if you can guess the results of some of Wansink's research studies:

Question 1: How much more soup did people eat when their soup bowl kept filling up without their knowledge? A. 13 percent B. 53 percent C. 73 percent

Answer 1: C. Dr. Wansink rigged up half the soup bowls on a table with hidden hoses attached to them through a hole in the bowl. As people ate the soup, the hoses kept filling the bowls with more soup. After the study, the people with the bottomless soup bowls estimated they ate the same amount as the people eating from the regular bowls. In reality, they ate an average of 73 percent (and 113 calories!) more. It's important to see the total amount you're eating. It's easy to overeat



the short, wide glass.

Question 3: How did the size of plate or bowl influence people's perception of amount when they were offered the same portion size?

A. Size of plate or bowl made no difference in the amount they thought they ate.
 B. People thought they ate more when they were served on a large plate or bowl.
 C. People thought they ate more when they were served on a small plate or bowl.

Answer 3: C. Wansink found people perceived they ate more when eating from a smaller bowl or plate. As the size of the dish increased, the size of their servings tended to increase. The larger dish made servings look smaller by comparison, resulting in people helping themselves to more food. For example, people ate an average of 31 percent more ice cream (equal to 137 more calories) when they scooped ice cream into a 34-ounce bowl vs. a 17-ounce bowl. Changing your "tablescape," such as the shape of glasses and size of your plates, etc. may be enough to help you significantly reduce your calorie intake. About 72 percent of our calories come from food we eat from bowls, plates, and glasses, according to Wansink's research. Container and package size also made a difference, regardless of how the food tasted. In another study, research subjects were fed five-day-old stale popcorn at the movies in three sizes of con-

Question 2: When two glasses had the same capacity, into which glass did people pour the most liquid? A. Short, wide glass B. Tall, narrow glass

Answer 2: A. Wansink's studies showed people drank an average of 25 to 30 percent more from short, wide tumblers than from tall, skinny glasses. The same amount of juice in a tall, skinny glass looks as if the glass is fuller than it does in

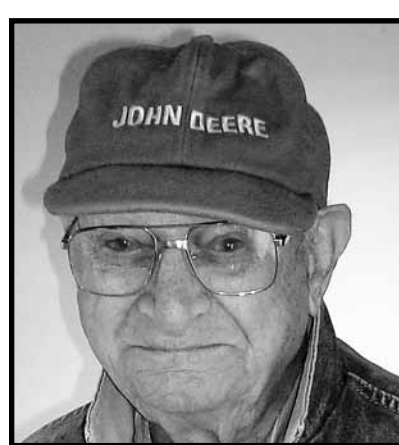
Nels Nelsen observes 101st

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Question 4: How did the number of chocolates people ate from covered, desktop candy dishes compare when the dishes were clear vs. when the dishes were white?

A. They ate the same amount from both dishes.
 B. They ate more from the white dish.
 C. They ate more from the clear dish.

Answer 4: C. Staff with clear desktop dishes ate 71 percent more (7.7 vs. 4.6 candies) than staff that ate candies from white dishes. This equaled an average difference of 77 calories per day. That could lead to over five pounds of extra weight in a year. We tend to eat more of visible foods because we think about them every time we see them. Eventually, our resistance is likely to weaken.

Question 5: At which location did people eat the most candy from a corner, lidded candy dish?

A. Corner of desk
 B. Top left-hand desk drawer
 C. On a file cabinet six feet from the desk
 D. They ate the same amount from all locations.

Answer 5: A. People tended to eat the most when it was more conve-

nient. They ate an average of nine candies – or about 225 extra calories daily – when the candy dish was on their desk, compared to six candies when in the desk drawer and only four candies when they had to walk six feet.

In talking with people after the experiment, the researchers noticed something else. When people had to walk a distance for a piece of candy, they had more time to think twice and talk themselves out of it. So, if you have a food you'd like to eat less of, make it less convenient to eat. Move it to a harder-to-reach cupboard shelf, store it in the basement, serve it from a buffet table vs. the dining table, etc. Or, just don't bring it into the house.

Question 6: What percent of what we eat is determined by "nutritional gatekeepers" (grocery shopper and food preparer)? A. 26% B. 61% C. 72%

Answer 6: C. Through eating more mindfully, whoever in your household is the "nutritional gatekeeper" can influence his or her food intake as well as that of everyone else as much as 72 percent. Make less healthy foods inconvenient to eat. Promote reasonable portion sizes through the size and shape of dinnerware. Encourage people to measure out and see the total amount they're eating rather than eating directly from a container.

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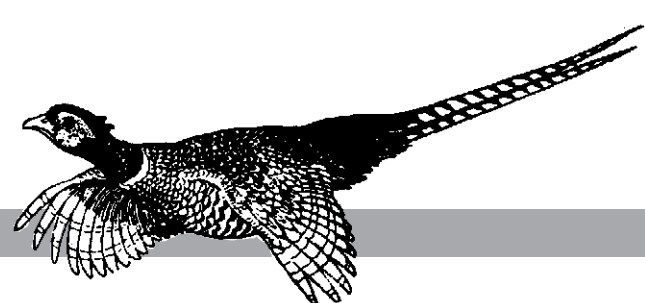

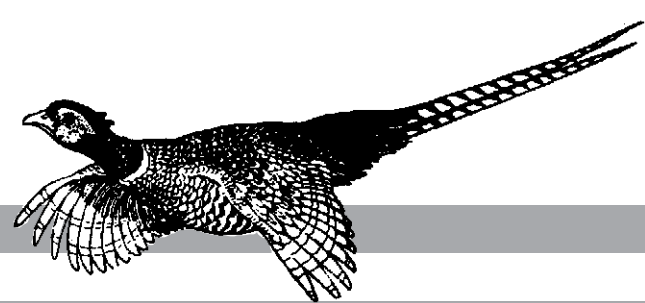

Dealing with end of life choices

Pediatric brain cancer has had a lot of publicity thanks to Team Jack. None of us can forget his touchdown run in the spring game a year ago; and his brave fight as the dratted stuff keeps growing back. Brain cancers, in general, do not have a good prognosis.

But the juxtaposition of two stories in today's paper certainly makes one aware of the difference in the way young people deal with the diagnosis. Because Brittany Maynard has used social media to talk about the awful thing she learned shortly after her marriage, and about her plan to take her own life on Nov. 1, everyone has weighed in on her decision.

Personally, I believe that the organization, Compassion and Choices, encouraged her to go public to advance its agenda. Once known as the Hemlock Society, it has lobbied, successfully in some states, for the right of physician-assisted suicide.

It's been interesting to follow the way it has played out; with other people fighting the same thing writing to her via YouTube; and many, I was surprised at how many, saluting her for her "brave" decision. I personally believe it is braver to "choose life" as long as we are blessed to have life.

I remember that when the former director of the Omaha City Mission,

Bob Timberlake, was diagnosed with glioma, he chose not to have treatment, realizing that it was futile. In my mind, that's not the same thing, although some will disagree with me.

Anyway, the other story about dealing with a brain tumor featured a young woman at Mount St. Joseph's College in Ohio who had won a place on her college basketball team, and her fondest wish was to play in a college game. A petition to move a regularly-scheduled game

up for her was granted, and the gym at Xavier University was filled yesterday afternoon by those who came to cheer for Lauren Hill.

She made a couple of layups. On the bench, she wore dark glasses and a headset, sensitive to the light and noise. She has challenged other athletes to make a layup with their non-dominant hand, after twirling around five times, which is how it feels to her.

And, as an acknowledgement of her accomplishment and her bravery, she was awarded the Pat Summitt Courage Award by Pat Summitt! As most of you know, Pat Summitt is the winning coach of women's basketball at Tennessee who has early-onset Alzheimer's. It takes courage to face that, for sure!

Someone pointed out to me today that none of us knows what we would do until faced with those kinds of circumstances. And that's true. But I hope that I will remember people like this when, and if, I also know that we get the strength we need when we need it, not necessarily before. At least that's how it's been for me, and I believe, for a lot of other folks who did not know how brave they were until they needed to be. May it be so, for each of us.

After all, I've lived with an example of courage for 54 years.

New Farm Bill meetings planned

Landowners and producers should be verifying that their FSA Farm Numbers are correct for 2014 base acres and 2014 CC (counter-cyclical) program yields. Then, one-time farm program option decisions will need to be determined which will last for the next five years.

To assist farmers in decision-making, Farm Bill informational meetings will be conducted across Nebraska with each educational session running about 2 1/2-3 hours. These sessions are not required but may be helpful regarding long-term decisions. The closest meetings in our area are: Monday, Nov. 24 at the Nielsen Community Center in West Point from 1-4 p.m.; Tuesday, Dec. 2 at the Pender Fire Hall from 9 a.m.-12 p.m.; Tuesday, Dec. 2 at the Farm Service Center in Dakota City from 1-4 p.m.; and Wednesday, Dec. 10 at the Wayne Fire Hall from 9 a.m.-12 p.m.

This new farm bill requires that each FSA Farm has a unanimous decision regarding sign-up options for all landowners, tenants and producers involved in any share leases on the designated "FSA Farm Number." (Note that if landowners are using cash leases or variable/flexible leases, then the sign-up options become the tenants' decision). Therefore, unless landowners receive a "share" of the farm production, the one-time option decision(s) sign-up will be the responsibility of the cash-leasing tenants for the upcoming year; and their sign-up decisions will stay with the FSA farm for the next five years; even if the lease is terminated during the next five years.

Each FSA Farm will have the option to update payment yields and reallocate base acres prior to the Feb. 27, 2015 sign-up deadline. This decision will allow landowners and tenants to either keep their

current yields or update their yields based on 2008-2012 yields (90 percent of the average). They may also choose to use current yields if they may not be able to document their updated yields such as not owning the farm in 2008 and 2009; or if grain production was fed to livestock without documentation. FSA Farm base acre decisions will also need to be determined by the Feb. 27 deadline. The total current base acres can't be increased, but the FSA Farm managers will have the freedom to choose their allocations based on previous years' base acres. This one-time sign-up decision will then set the base commodity acres for the next five years for potential payment calculations regardless of what crops are grown on the FSA Farm(s) during the next five years.

The last sign-up is the "program choice" deadline prior to March 31, 2015; although there is a possibility that this deadline could be extended. Farm managers will need to choose among the Agricultural Risk Coverage - county (ARC-CO);

Price Loss Coverage (PLC); and Agricultural Risk Coverage (ARC-IC) options for each FSA farm.

These decisions may best be determined by using one or several computer-based farm bill options comparisons. Check with your local Farm Services Agency (FSA) or Nebraska Extension (UNL) office for more details. There is no fee to attend these meetings.

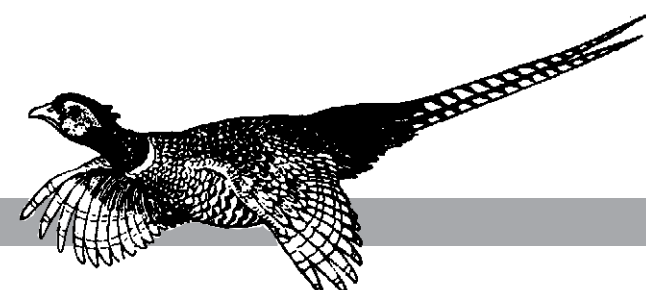
