Officials at Allen Consolidated Schools expressed disappointment over the discovery that a teacher at their school compromised a statewide writing assessment of fourth-grade students at the school.

According to a final order by the Nebraska State Board of Education, the teaching certificate of Michelle Jacobsen was suspended for a year after it was discovered that she had corrected punctuation and capitalization on the tests of her fourth-grade students' state writing assessment tests during the 2013-14 school year. Jacobsen resigned from her job with Allen Consolidated Schools prior to the start of the 2014-15 school year in August.

"It's not something any school wants to have happen," said Mike Pattee, Allen superintendent of schools. "We pride ourselves on integrity and being honest, and this is not something we want to see happen."

According to information obtained from the Nebraska Department of Education website, the mother of a fourth-grade student at Allen Consolidated Schools was told by her son that Jacobsen - who was also serving as the district's testing assessment coordinator corrected capitalization and punctuation on his rough draft. This information was noted on documents filed by the state Department of Education's professional practices commission. A subsequent investigation by

eight students' rough drafts, and had committed a similar infraction the previous year as well.

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According to information in the 63-page electronic document obtained by The Wayne Herald, Jacobsen told school officials that she felt pressure for students to perform well on the statewide tests, which are submitted to the U.S. Department of Education as part of the state's "State of the Schools" report that is part of the federal No Child Left Behind Act. Allen school officials reported the incident to the state education office, and the district's fourth-grade writing test results were invalidated.

Jacobsen submitted her resignation to Pattee on Aug. 8 of this year. The resignation was accepted by the Allen Board of Education at its Aug. 11, 2014 meeting.

The professional practices commission, which is made of school administrators from across the state, rejected a request that Jacobsen's teaching certificate Allen school officials confirmed the parent's concern, be revoked for a year, opting instead for a year-long ple with oversight on the process," he added.

finding that Jacobsen corrected mistakes on at least suspension. That suspension was brought before the State Board of Education on Friday by assistant commissioner and chief of staff Brian Halstead, who noted that while there had been reprimands for other lapses of protocol documented in the past, this case was unique in that Jacobsen was the district's assessment coordinator and was fully aware of the protocol that was in place regarding the interference with students taking of the test, meaning something stronger than a reprimand was needed as punishment.

After voting down a motion to revoke Jacobsen's teaching license, the board voted unanimously and ordered a one-year suspension of her teaching certificate effective Nov. 7, 2014.

Pattee said the Allen school district is disappointed with what happened, and he said the district will work to correct the situation.

Wakefield school goes in lockdown

Authorities investigate self-inflicted shooting

Wakefield Public Schools was in lockdown mode on Wednesday as officials with the Nebraska State Patrol and the Dixon County Sheriff's Office investigated a death that happened on school property.

According to a news release from Dixon County Sheriff Dean Chase, a complaint of suspicious behavior on the property of Wakefield Community School was received Wednesday morning. An investigation revealed that an unidentified 20-year old male had died as the result of a self-inflicted gunshot wound. School officials placed the building in lockdown mode as a precaution, pursuant to school policy. Chase said that students and staff at the school were not in any danger and classes were running normal schedules. The identity of the deceased is being withheld, pending notification of family. The Dixon County Sheriff's Office was assisted by the Wayne County Sheriff's Office, Dixon County Emergency Management, Wakefield Volunteer Fire and Rescue and the Nebraska State Patrol.

of our Garbage

Is there a better and cheaper long term way to get rid of some of our garbage?

We invited the Nebraska Recycling Association to do a "waste sort" to determine the general contents of the normal Wayne garbage flow. They sent a recycling consultant on Oct. 1, to monitor the contents of an average garbage day at the Wayne Transfer Station.

Their sampling found 42 percent of our normal garbage is paper fibers which includes cardboard and packaging. They also found 28 percent of our garbage sampled was food products, which come from homes, restaurants, grocery stores, schools, retirement centers and WSC food service. oped for discarded food is to blend with grass, garden waste and shredded wood at a rural site to produce compost instead of burying in a landfill.

About 65 percent of our total garbage sampled has an existing recycling market. Although there is no way to sort out the food at this time, if the discarded food was also sorted out at the institutional locations, and recyclable materials were diverted back into the market, there could be a significant reduction in the cost to landfill our garbage. We don't know how to do this yet. We may try some demonstration projects to see what all is involved.


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Scholarship presentation

Energy Tip Be energy-efficient on the range

What's for dinner? Around most homes, it's the most frequently asked question. If you plan on cooking, you likely have an opportunity to save energy while making the meal.

Webster's Dictionary defines "range" as the combination of a stovetop and an oven into one kitchen appliance. Even if you have a separate cooktop and oven, you still have the same opportunities to make your meal in an energy-efficient manner. Consider the following tips:

Match the amount of food to pan and element size. Using a pan capable of holding much larger quantities of food ends up requiring more energy than necessary to cook the food. Also, using a burner or cooking element larger than the selected pan also wastes energy. As an example, a 6-inch pan on an 8-inch burner will waste over 40 percent of the heat produced.

Select durable, flat-bottomed cookware. The best cookware has a slightly concave bottom, which when heated, expands and the bottom flattens out. An electric element or burner is significantly less efficient if the pan does not have good contact. For instance, boiling water for pasta could use 50 percent more energy on a cheap, warped-bottom pan compared to a flat- bottom pan.

Choose highly conductive materials. Some materials transfer heat more evenly than others and usually result in more evenly cooked food. Note that copper-bottom and stainless steel pans heat up faster than aluminum or tin pans. In the oven, glass or ceramic pans are typically better than metal. This allows the oven temperature to be set about 25 degrees lower and cook foods just as quickly.

Keep stovetop clean and shiny. When burner pans become blackened or the surface of cooking elements become tarnished, they can absorb a lot of heat and reduce burner efficiency. Clean and shiny reflects more heat up into the cookware.

Reduce cooking time. Defrost frozen foods in the refrigerator before

cooking. This will often improve have a microwave oven available, "doneness" consistency in the prepared food.

Minimize preheat time. All too often, cooks turn their ovens on to preheat to a specific temperature, and the oven reaches that temperature long before food is ready to be placed in the oven. This additional while cooking individually sized "unoccupied – at temperature" time results in wasted energy.

Keep racks clear. Don't lay foil over the top of oven racks as this will restrict air flow and increase cooking time. For the same reason, stagger pans on the racks to improve air flow.



Food Pantry, Coat Closet continue to support locals who are in need

As the temperatures plummet and the holiday season approaches, thoughts tend to turn to those less fortunate.

The Wayne Food Pantry and Coat Closet, both located in the basement of First Presbyterian Church in Wayne, have opportunities to assist those in need and those desiring to help.

According to statistics provided, as of the end of October, 107 requests for food have been received by the Food Pantry. This equals the number for the entire year in 2013.

In addition to the Food Pantry, the First Presbyterian Church serves as the central location for the organizing and packing of food items for the Backpack Pack program, which provides food for the weekend for students in need. The program involves students at Wayne Community Schools and Winside Public School. Both of these schools are in Wayne County and served by the Wayne Food Pantry also.

Since the beginning of the 2014-2015 school year, approximately 1,500 backpacks have been filled.

These statistics, and the fact that donations have been low in the past several months, have led the Food Pantry to have a need for a number of items.

These include canned vegetables, beans (dried or canned), soups, instant potatoes, canned fruit, macaroni and cheese, pasta, juice and canned or powdered milk

"Those using the Food Pantry are allowed to get assistance up to three times a year and generally get a two-week supply of food each time. Our program is designed to help people get their feet back on the ground and is not a long-term solution," said Jenny Hammer, who oversees the program, which has been a joint effort of several churches in the community for nearly 30 years.

perishable food and a voucher to allow those using the Food Pantry to 'purchase' fresh items such as milk, hamburger and fruit. Funds for the vouchers come from monetary donations received by the Food Pantry.

"The Wayne community is usually extremely generous and we appreciate all the support we have received," Hammer said.

In addition to the Food Pantry, volunteers at First Presbyterian Church assist those in need of coats for the winter months.

Hammer said that so far this year, 137 coats have been distributed. In 2013, a total of 249 coats found new owners

"We are thankful for the many coat donations that are coming in. We do have a particular need for children's coats and we also accept hats, gloves and mittens." Hammer said.



The stat sheet the Wildcats have put out the last three games has a noticeable burn mark right in the center of it, the charred remains of a smoking-hot run of success for sophomore middle blocker Alyssa Frauendorfer.

Frauendorfer earned national Player of the Week honors this last week after having the kind of weekend that, I'm sure, every volleyball hitter dreams about. In games against Crookston and Bemidji, she recorded 29 kills in 42 attack attempts and had zero - zilch, nada, nuttin' – attack errors.

Most hitters would be giddy about hitting in the .250-.300 range. Frauendorfer's batting average for the weekend – a stunning .690.

And, in case you figured that it was just a case of taking advantage of two of the NSIC's weak sisters, she followed it up Tuesday by hitting .607, recording 17 kills in 28 attempts with nary a miscue.

Being able to nail 46 kills in 70 attempts (a .657 average overall), if you ask her, comes down to the help that comes behind her.





Despite returning the team's top three scorers, the Wildcats must look to their eight newcomers to replace three-year starting forward Ellen Hansen, who graduated as the school's seventh all-time leading rebounder at 744; and starting point guard Addy Roller, who transferred to Drury (Mo.) after averaging 8.8 points and an NSIC-best 4.73 assists per game.

Headlining the Wildcat roster this season are three seniors, led by first-team All-NSIC forward Jordan Spencer. Spencer averaged 16.2 points and 6.2 rebounds per game last season and needs just 45 points to become the 18th player in school history to score 1,000 career points. Spencer scored double figures in 29 of 33 games last season and ranked among the NSIC leaders in scoring (eighth) and field goal percentage (fifth) making 51 percent from the field (200 of 392).

Also back is senior shooting guard Ashton Yossi, who averaged 11.5 points a contest last season and scored her 1,000th career point in the Wildcats' NCAA Div. II National Tournament win over Pittsburg State with a career-high 27 points. Yossi made 68 treys last season and needs 71 3's during her senior year to become Wayne State's all-time leader in career 3-pointers.

Millie Niggeling is the third senior back for the Wildcats this season, but will miss the first part of the 2014-15 campaign following off-season shoulder surgery. 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

Wildcats fall to top-ranked Mavericks

Top-ranked Minnesota State opening drive of the third quarter handed Wavne State a 49-0 setback Saturday in the final home game for the Wildcats at Bob Cunningham Field in Wayne in the 26th annual Egg Bowl Game.

Wayne State forced Minnesota State to punt on their first two series. The Wildcats had a sustained drive on their second series of the first quarter and moved the ball from their own 11 to the Mavericks' 13, a drive that covered 13 plays and 76 yards, before the Wildcats turned the ball over on downs.

After a scoreless first quarter, Minnesota State got on the board with 13:18 to go in the second quarter on a two yard run by Connor Thomas for a 7-0 Maverick lead. Following a Wildcat punt, the Mavericks scored again on a 23-yard pass from Nick Pieruccini to Austin Rieder with 11:55 remaining in the half for a 14-0 Maverick lead.

On the next series, Wayne State started from their own 25 and consumed over six minutes on the clock. moving the ball to the Minnesota State 21 where the Wildcats failed to convert a fourth-and-4 pass play that gave the visitors the ball. The Mavericks then marched 79 yards on seven plays and used a Pieruccini 30 yard run with 3:06 to play in the half for a 21-0 halftime lead. Minnesota State scored on the

for a 28-0 lead and added a 20-yard interception return by Kris Fleigle late in the third quarter for a 35-0 advantage.

Fourth quarter scores by Pieruccini on a six yard run and a three yard plunge from Chad Zastrow made the final score 49-0 and hand Wayne State its first shutout since a 35-0 loss to St. Cloud State in 2005.

Minnesota State held a 542-268 advantage in total offense over Wayne State. The Mavericks had 172 yards on the ground and 370 passing while Wayne State finished with 135 rushing and 133 passing.

Freshman Lane Yates was the top ground gainer for the Wildcats with 57 yards on 11 carries followed by sophomore quarterback Zach Osborn with 35 yards on seven rushes.

Throwing the ball, Osborn was 15-of-32 for 128 yards with one interception while Brody Rohach completed one attempt for five yards.

Brian Kent led the Wildcat receivers with five catches for 67 yards while senior Cole McDaniel was limited to three catches for one yard, marking just the second game this season that McDaniel did not have at least seven catches in a game.

Defensively, senior linebacker Nick Monzu paced the Wildcats with a game-high 13 tackles to go



Nebraskans have elected another Republican as governor. Oh boy. Nothing like celebrating the status quo. There hasn't been a Democrat in the Governor's Mansion in Lincoln since Ben Nelson spent some time there in the 1990s.

Early indications are that this new Republican Governor doesn't plan to spend much time there either. He said he expected to spend most of his time in Lincoln (read that, in the office). But the beautiful two-story Georgian style brick mansion on H Street will likely just be used for formal events. Governorelect Ricketts expects to keep his family in place in Omaha.

If you've been paying attention. you know that you can count the number of Nebraska Democrat Governors in the last 54 years on one hand. There have been five since Ralph Brooks, a Democrat, died in office in 1960 and was replaced by Republican Dwight Burney who was replaced 9 years later by Democrat Frank Morrison. Morrison served three 2-year terms through 1967 and was replaced by Republican Norbert Tiemann who served one term 1967-1971 and was replaced by Democrat J. James Exon who served two terms from 1971 to 1979.

Exon was replaced by one term Republican Charlie Thone who lost re- election to Vietnam War veteran, Democrat Bob Kerrey. Kerrey announced that he was tired of the office after one term and Republican Kay Orr was elected in the nation's first all-female contest (she defeated Democrat Helen Boosalis). Democrat Ben Nelson defeated Orr in 1990 and served two terms unwho served one term and two years

of the next before resigning to become U.S. Agriculture Secretary replaced him. He was replaced by Lt. Governor Dave Heineman who was re-elected twice and has been the longest serving governor in Nebraska history.

The Associated Press recently revealed that about 48 percent (559,494 people) of registered Nebraska voters are Republicans, while Democrats account for nearly 31 percent (357,899) and Independent voters make up 20 percent (235,984). In 2014, Libertarians accounted for the balance with 5,708 registered voters

A report from the Nebraska Secretary of State said that the Independent voter ranks have swelled 1991 to 1999. He won as a Demo-11 percent since the last nonpresidential election year and that Republicans have grown by 2 percent. The number of Democrats has de-

clined in every election since 2008. In other election news, Republicans also took the top constitutional offices. Nebraska's next Attorney General, Auditor, Secretary of State and Treasurer will all be Republicans.

The last time Nebraska had a Democrat Attorney General was Harold Caldwell who served for 31 hours in 1951. Before that it was Richard Hunter who served from 1937 to 1939.

There hasn't been a Democrat State Auditor since John Breslow in crat and changed his party affiliation to Republican. Former State Senator Kate Witek of Omaha was elected Auditor as a Republican in 1999 and switched her party affiliation to Democrat. She served until 2007. Before that, William Price was the last Democrat Auditor from 1937 to 1939.

There hasn't been a Democrat Secretary of State since Harry Swanson in 1941. There hasn't been a Democrat State Treasurer since Dawn Rockey served from 1991 to 1995.

Nothing to see here folks. Move along.

Cash rents for 2015 farmland

It's time to think about cash rents for farmland for next year. Here are some edited thoughts from Al Vyhnalek, Extension Educator from Platte Co. from last year and an update with this year's figures.

First of all, the economics just do not support \$350 per acre for dryland rent, or \$500 per acre for irrigated ground cash rent. Too many times, the landlord wants to calculate rent on the best yield and the price of about \$7 per bushel, which is the best price of the last year (2013). year of the last 10 years and the lowest price of the last year, which is the current price. Neither point of view is fair or realistic.

It is suggested that a starting figure for conversation on cash rent should be about 30 percent of the gross revenue per acre, which would be paid to the landlord. This calculation should be completed by taking an average yield times a fall 2015 price at the local elevator or grain processor. So, an average irrigated corn yield of 200 bushels per acre times an expected fall 2015 price of about \$4 would be \$800 gross revenue per acre. By multiplying that amount by 30 percent, you arrive at a suggested rent of \$240 per acre. This would be the starting point for negotiating rent for 2015.

You can see from this simple calculation, if cash rent for irrigated corn ground is less than \$200 per acre, it may be appropriate for the rent to go higher. If rent is above \$300 per acre, a decrease in rent seems appropriate.

Of course, rent will be determined by what the tenant is willing to pay and what the landlord is willing to accept, not by a suggested calculation. True economics of a particular commodity is still determined by supply and demand. With land economics, the demand appears to be exceeding supply. So, cash rents will probably still remain strong in Nebraska, and specific rent on a specific farm will vary.

The past few years have been good for farmers, and when returns far exceed expenses, people can tend to get a little careless on where money is spent. Expenses are going to have to be reduced if farmers are going to continue to be profitable. We will have some more information coming on controlling costs in the future.
