Frye said, "While retiring is somewhat bittersweet, I want to thank the Board and Chancellor Carpenter for putting their faith in me and giving me the opportunity to serve as president of Wayne State. Their support and guidance has helped me make decisions to position the college as a premier institution in Nebraska and the region. I will be forever grateful."

Frye will remain president of the college through June 30, 2015. Carpenter will consult with the Board of Trustees to establish a timeline and protocol for a national



Fraternity placed under suspension by college

The only Greek fraternity associated with Wayne State vately-owned TKE fraternity house, located at 814 Nebras-College isn't on "double-secret probation," but has received notice that it has been indefinitely suspended by the school. In a news release sent to The Wayne Herald by the college on Friday, Wayne State College announced that it has suspended all fraternal and associated social activities of the Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternity at the college for an indefinite period of time, effective immediately. The fraternity was notified of this decision and provided with clear direction for addressing existing illegal and dangerous activities related to the use of alcohol.

According to a story in this week's edition of the college's student newspaper, The Wayne Stater, the suspension came as the result of a number of reports of underage

ka Street. Two 18-year-old, non-fraternity members were reported to have needed emergency medical treatment for alcohol poisoning following overconsumption at the frater-

The two individuals reported to the Wayne Police Department that they suspected their drinks were tainted with a drug while at the TKE house. Toxicology reports have been received by local law enforcement and are currently under HIPPA privacy privilege while the investigation is ongoing, according to Wayne Chief of Police Marlen

Several other reports of open-social events, where alcohol was consumed, were reported by The Wayne Stater as drinking and excessive consumption of alcohol at the pripart of the decision to suspend the fraternity, according to

Wayne State Dean of Students Jeff Carstens.

"The college did not arrive at this decision lightly," said Wayne State President Curt Frye. "One of the most important components of Wayne State College's mission is student success. This focus on providing young men and women with the tools they need to flourish in life forms the nucleus of who we are and what we do. This focus also necessitates direct consequences when a student group or organization operates outside the stated mission of the organization and contradictory to rules of conduct established by campus policies and local and state laws."

The fraternity's status at Wayne State College has not been revoked, according to Carstens, giving the fraternity a chance to work with chapter alumni, TKE fraternity ex-

Preschool study gets attention

Outgoing board member recognized

Steps were taken toward a district early learning center during Monday's meeting of the Wayne Community Schools Board of

Information was presented to the board by committee members Wendy Consoli and Special Education Director Misty Beair. The two were part of a committee that had been formed earlier in the school year to look at the need, and options available, for providing early childhood education within the district.

According to information obtained by the committee, more than 180 school districts in the state of Nebraska offer preschool services. In the Wayne district, there are unmet needs in regard to the number of preschool spots that are open, the number of preschools that meet ADA requirements. outreach to the growing Hispanic community and parent education opportunities.

The goal of the early learning team is to offer a preschool that would serve up to 20 fouryear-old students on a sliding fee scale and up to 10 three-year-old students on a slidingfee scale.

The plan is to develop an Early Learning Center in a building that is available on Providence

Also discussed was the staffing of the preschool, including teachers, administrators and paraprofessionals. Funding for the additional staff could include the Early Childhood Education Grant Program, Title 1 funding, local district funds and private grants and gifts. Following the discussion, the board voted to approve the first reading of the document.


On behalf of the board, Board President Dr. Carolyn Linster presented a gift to outgoing board member Mark Evetovich.

Evetovich has served the district as a board member for eight years and chose not to run for another term. He will be replaced on the board by Scott Hammer, who was elected to the position in November. Evetovich was also recognized during the Honor Coffee that was held following the board meeting.

The board also accepted, with regrets, the resignation of MaryAnn Lutt as a junior high English teacher. Lutt has been a part of the Wayne Community Schools staff for 26 years and indicated in her retirement letter that "the opportunity to serve the students in the Wayne community has been

Opal Nelson

Opal Nelson, 89, of Wausa, died Sunday, Dec. 7, 2014 at Osmond General Hospital in Osmond.

Services were held Thursday, Dec. 11 at Thabor Lutheran Church, in Wausa. Reverend Ron Youngerman officiated.



Opal Elane Nelson was born to Cora Belle (McGee) and French Penn on Jan. 9, 1925, in Wayne. She was the youngest of three daughters, including Edna (Penn) Higdon of Portland, Ore. and Josephine (Penn) Thomson of Camp Verde, Ariz. When she was two, her mother became ill and Opal and her sisters had the unique experience of growing up in the Masonic Home in Fremont, while their mother was treated for tuberculosis at the Bethesda Sanitorium in Denver, Colo. While living in the Masonic Home, Opal attended Fremont Public School through fifth grade. After their mother recovered, the reunited fam-

ily resided in Wayne, where Opal helped wait tables at the family business, the Boyd Hotel. She attended junior high and high school in Wayne and graduated in 1943. Opal attended Wayne State College and taught one year in a rural school near Wayne. In 1945 Opal moved to Wausa where she taught fifth and sixth grade for four years. She continued her education by attending classes during the summer.

Opal married Donald V. Nelson, better known as "Bunny," on June 23, 1947, at the First Baptist Church in Wayne. They owned and operated Nelson Produce from 1951 to 1981, while raising three children, Marcia, Laura, and Brent. Opal was a creative and talented artist, but would never admit it. Her works of art include paintings, greeting cards, quilts, ceramics, holiday decorations and clothing, as well as poems, all of which were shared with, and cherished by, her children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren. Opal was a 69 year member of the Wausa Eastern Star, where she served as Worthy Matron for four years. She also taught Sunday school and served on quilt and flower committees at Thabor Lutheran Church, in addition to volunteering at the Wausa Public School. While Opal's children were growing up she was a Brownie, Girl Scout, and Cub Scout leader. Opal enjoyed her extension club, pinochle club and, later, her quilting club.

Opal wasn't one to sit back and watch, whether it be a pick-up game of basketball when she was a young girl, sledding down the hills with her grandchildren or dressing up as Cat in the Hat as she did this past Halloween. Opal stated that her only regret in life was that Bunny had to pass away before her. The family will be celebrating her life as planned this January by coming together and painting a piece of art in honor of their beloved mother, grandmother, and great-grandmother.

Survivors include her two sisters; three children, Marcia and Larry Wakeley of Wausa, Laura Nelson of Newman Grove and Brent and Karen Nelson of Sioux City, Iowa; five granddaughters, Laurie Marco, Shannon Wakeley, Jill Redmond, Emily Beauvias and Erika Nelson; and seven great-grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by her parents and husband.

Burial was in Lutheran Cemetery at Wausa. Brockhaus Funeral Home in Wausa was in charge of arrangements.



Nissen ready for retirement after 35 years on airport board

Mitchell (Mitch) Nissen was appointed to the Wayne Airport Authority on Jan. 30, 1979 and is retiring after serving on the board for the past 35 years.

Nissen recalls Al Robinson, airport manager at the time talking to Mayor Wayne Marsh and asking that Nissen be appointed. Nissen learned how to fly by taking flight lessons from Al Robinson.

When asked about what he liked about serving on the Airport Authority, Nissen said it was "the camaraderie of the board." Having served with several board members who have moved on, and the current members, Nissen says the board has always looked to the future and what is best for the Airport.

Nissen said he feels the greatest accomplishment during his tenure as board chairman was seeing the new north-south runway completed.

"There have been many projects over the years, but when we finally got the new runway, that was the greatest. There were many years when I thought the runway was just a dream and it would not become a reality," Nissen said.



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

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
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Wildcat volleyball sixth in final coaches poll

The No. 6 placing is the highest ever for a Wayne State volleyball team. The Wildcats were ranked ninth in 2010 and 10th in 2011.

Wayne State finished the season 27-7 and lost in the regional semifinals to Minnesota Duluth. Nebraska Poison Center notes increase in carbon monoxide calls

The Nebraska Poison Center has seen a 24 percent increase in calls on carbon monoxide so far this year over 2013. Every year more than 400 Americans die from unintentional CO poisoning and 20,000 are seen in emergency rooms, while another 4,000 are hospitalized.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention ranked Nebraska as one of the states with the highest mortality rate from carbon monoxide. It is imperative that the citizens of Nebraska understand the dangers, the symptoms and how to prevent poisoning from carbon monoxide.

Symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning include sleepiness, headache, dizziness, blurred vision, nausea, shortness of breath and convulsions. The first step in treating carbon monoxide poisoning is getting the victim to fresh air. Then seek medical attention immediately.

Carbon monoxide is a gas produced when fuels burn incompletely. It has no color, taste or smell. The major causes of carbon monoxide poisoning include:

- Using heating equipment that is in poor repair;
- Lack of ventilation in a car;
- Using a charcoal grill indoors;
 Using unvented space heaters.
- The Poison Center offers the following suggestions to help prevent carbon monoxide poisoning:
- Inspect all fuel-burning equipment yearly;
- Vent fuel-burning heaters to the outside;
- Do not use a gas range or an oven for heating a room;
- Never use a charcoal grill or hibachi inside;
- Install carbon monoxide alarms on every level of your home;
- Never leave a car running in an attached garage, even with the garage door open;
- Have the vehicle muffler and tailpipes checked regularly.

Symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning resemble those associated with other health conditions that are common among the elderly, especially in the winter. The carbon monoxide death rate is highest among people greater than 65 years of age.

The Nebraska Regional Poison Center offers tips on carbon monoxide poisoning prevention as a free community service. If you suspect carbon monoxide poisoning or if you have any questions, contact the Nebraska Regional Poison Center toll-free at (800) 222-1222.

Advice offered on keeping child safe after school

Many children are not able to handle stressful or emergency situations until around age 11 or 12. It is best for those children that have not developed mature decision making skills not to be left home alone. It is always safer to arrange for an adult or a responsible older adolescent to be at home or arrange for other structured supervision.

You child, however, may be an exception and be adequately mature at age eight to 10 years to be home alone after school. Make sure your child feels safe and secure, and that he or she is prepared for dealing with knocks on the door, emergencies, and injuries. There are often babysitting classes offered and this can also prepare your child for a positive self-care experience. Always make sure you child is comfortable with the home alone arrangements. Here are a few topics to keep your child safe:

- 1. Do they know their full name, address and phone number? Does he or she know your full name as well, and the address and phone number of your workplace, or other ways to reach you at work? (You may establish a routine of calling home to make sure your child has arrived home and nothing out of the ordinary occurred.)
- 2. Is there an established routine to follow so he or she knows what he is supposed to do and where he is supposed to be?
- 3. When your child returns home from school every day, does he or she know how to lock the door behind them? Can they remember to call you and/or another appropriate adult as soon as they arrive home?
- 4. Instruct your child never to enter your home if a door is ajar, or if a window is open or broken?
- 5. Have you talked about what to do if someone knocks at the front door while he or she is home alone? (The best advice: he should not open the door and should tell the person knocking that you are home but are busy and unable to answer the door.)

Talking about these issues and talking all of these things into consideration will help you and your child feel more safe, secure, and comfortable about his after-school experience. More tips and information is available through NENCAP Home Visitations. This service is free to families who are expecting or have children up to the age of nine. Deadline for NEST college savings contributions near

Nebraska taxpayers are reminded that contributions to college savings accounts in the Nebraska Educational Savings Trust (NEST) must be postmarked by Dec. 31 to qualify for the 2014 tax year state income tax deduction, State Treasurer Don Stenberg said. The maximum deduction this year is \$10,000 for a couple filing jointly or for a single tax filer, up from the previous \$5,000 deduction.

Stenberg said account owners who contribute to their accounts electronically have until 10:59 p.m., CT, on Dec. 31 to make their contributions.

"This will be the first year that Nebraskans will benefit from the significantly higher tax deduction that was approved by the Nebraska Legislature in 2013. We are grateful for the Legislature's action to approve the higher tax deduction, which is attracting more families to open college savings accounts through NEST and providing them with responsible and varied investment options," Stenberg said.

Football like a religion here

University of Nebraska football is a religion for many residents of the Cornhusker state. They think red, they see red and they bleed red. As the fan base goes, so goes the sentiment surrounding the game played by a group of unpaid college students, some of whom parlay their experience into well-paying jobs with professional sports teams.

There is no doubt that Nebraska football is big business for the University. The Husker faithful can buy season tickets, but large cash contributions (over and above the ticket price) are also required to secure those tickets from season to season. Because of the passion and the big money, Nebraska football is often the subject of constant analysis - sometimes to the point of over-

Controversial head football coach Bo Pelini pulled the Nebraska program out of the depths of mediocrity with at least nine wins a season for a 67-27 record over seven years. chinery costs per acre saw the most significant increase from 2009 to 2013. If we go back another five years to 2004, the average machinery cost was just \$51.46 or \$61.04 less than 2013. I blame the income tax law as much as advancing technology for the skyrocketing costs in this area.

The nationwide recession starting in 2008 and 2009 caused Congress to dramatically increase the ability to write off capital purchases in the first year as a way to stimulate business spending. The fact that this recession hit at the same time as climbing corn prices was a huge benefit for those producing corn and soybeans who didn't want to pay taxes on the profits they were

Buying new equipment is a fun way to reduce taxes, upgrade old equipment that was just getting by, and implement new technologies such as auto steer and GPS mapping. The problem is this cost is going to be very hard to reduce. De-



preciation isn't a one-year cost. The cost for machinery bought in 2013 will continue through 2020. Unlike fertilizer expense, the choice to upgrade equipment is often one that has consequences for many years.

If the purchases were made with cash, that means the working capital has been reduced going into tough times. If the equipment is financed, payments must be made for the next five to seven years.

Decisions on whether the opera-
