January

More than \$2,000 was raised in the annual Salvation Army kettle campaign in the Wayne area. Kettles were set up at Pac 'N Save, Quality Foods, Bomgaars, Shopko, G's Quick Stop, Wayne East and Rain Tree.

Cedar and Wayne counties were deemed among the best in the state of Nebraska for job seekers, according to a study done by Nerdwallet, which took government data to determine where the best place to look for a job in each state was.

Donations relating to tornado relief efforts were made by Thrivent Financial and Black Hills Energy. Thrivent Financial's \$22,816 donation went to the Wayne Tornado Relief Fund, while Black Hills Energy donated \$5,000 toward the Wayne Sports Complex for efforts to rebuild the softball complex.

The first baby of 2014 was welcomed at Providence Medical Center. Paxton Raabe was born at 3:28 a.m. on Jan. 1, the son of Lia and Nathan Raabe of Wisner.

The Wayne County Commissioners discussed how they would issue \$4 million in highway allocation bonds to help with bridge and road repair work that needed to be done in the county.

Current office holders in county officers all decided to run for re-election, with the exception of Wayne County Sheriff. LeRoy Janssen had announced his intention to retire at the end of his seventh term in office

A legal notice published in the Laurel Advocate outlined plans for a merger of the Mid State Conference tournament in Nor-Laurel-Concord and Coleridge school districts, effective with the start of the 2014-15 school year.

John Dunning received a hero's welcome after cheating death in the Oct. 4, 2013 tornado. Dunning spent three months in hospitals in Sioux City and Lincoln while recovering from injuries received in the storm. He received a warm welcome home with an impromptu parade through downtown, complete with signs and well-wishers welcoming him home.

The Nebraska Court of Appeals affirmed the termination of former Wayne Police Department Lt. Phil Shear, who was fired by city administrator Lowell Johnson in the spring of 2011.

Locals were rolling in the aisles at the Majestic Theater as it played host to one of three regional competitions for the 2014 Great American Comedy Festival held each summer in Norfolk. Ten comedians from across the Midwest entertained a crowd of more than 100 local residents, and Omaha attorney Kris Covi came away as the winner of the competition, qualifying him to

compete in the amateur finals that summer.

A couple with local ties made it on the final airing of "The Tonight Show with Jay Leno." Andrew and Crystal (Jaeger) Meister were invited as one of the many couples whose engagement announcements were part of the show's famous "Headlines" segment that Leno found to be funny.

Wayne native Jess Zeiss of Omaha was appointed to the Nebraska State College System Board of Trustees by Gov. Dave Heineman. He was to serve on the board's fiscal, facilities and audit committee. Zeiss is a 1989 graduate of Wayne High School and is the son of Don and Jan Zeiss of Wayne.

Twig Marston of Norfolk resigned as director of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln Northeast Nebraska Extension District and the UNL Northeast Research and Education center, a position he had held since May of 2008. Dennis "Denny" Bauer and William Kranz were appointed as cointerim directors.

February

Wayne middle school students earned third-place honors in the 11th annual Nebraska Middle School Science Bowl at Wayne State College. Team members were Katie Brown, Grace Heithold, Jessica Schenck, Marcella Jurotich, Colton Spahr and coach Lee Brogie.

The Wayne High girls basketball team upset Pierce 35-28 in the first round of the folk. Jalyn Zeiss scored a game-high 19 points to lead the Blue Devils.

Mayor Ken Chamberlain announced that he was running for re-election to the position he was elected to in 2010.

A Wayne State College freshman football player was found dead in his dorm room. Eddie Key III was found in his dorm room after a 911 call of an unresponsive male was received from a campus dorm.

Two people were arrested after a car chase resulted in damages to a sign at Bright Smiles Family Dentistry. The vehicle the two individuals were driving also damaged a building owned by Mid-States School Bus.

The Wayne High boys bowling team earned Class C state runner-up honors in the state bowling tournament in Lincoln.

The City of Wayne and Wayne County were working on an agreement that would allow for the county to evacuate the courthouse across the street to the Wayne City Library, and vice versa, in the event of a

TOP 10 STORIES OF 2014

The year 2014 in our area was one of destruction and rebuilding, change and familiarity, the past and the future.

It is always difficult to pick out the top 10 stories of a calendar year, but we have come up with the list of the top stories that were reported in The Wayne Herald during the past year.

1. Rebuilding from 2013 tornado

After the Oct. 4, 2013 tornado caused more than \$50 million in damage in the industrial area on the east edge of Wayne, the majority of the more than 20 businesses that were damaged or destroyed quickly went back to work in rebuilding their business sites. Sand Creek Post & Beam held a grand re-opening in the summer, and Grossenburg Implement's impressive expanded building came together by November. Some construction remains to be completed as of the end of 2014, but to say the industrial area in Wayne came back bigger and better would be a wonderful understatement.

2. A second round of storms

The memory of the 2013 tornado was still fresh in the minds of many in the area when back-to-back nights of major tornadoes hit the area for the second time in less than 12 months. On Monday, June 16, a series of tornadoes that destroyed the town of Pilger made their way into eastern Wayne County, destroying and damaging numerous farmsteads and homes. The following evening, tornadoes ripped through Cedar County, causing significant damage north and east of Laurel.

3. LeRoy Janssen retires as sheriff

After eight terms and more than 30 years, LeRoy Janssen turned in his badge as the Wayne County Sheriff. His departure became official when he did not file for re-election in February, and he actually resigned five months prior to the end of his eighth term as the county's top cop to take a job with the Nebraska Association of County Officials. Jason Dwinell, who won the Republican nomination for the position, was tabbed by the Wayne County Commissioners to finish out Janssen's term. Dwinell won the general election for the position to officially bring Janssen's era as the county sheriff to a close.

4. Laurel, Coleridge schools merge

After almost a decade of existence as a co-operative, the Laurel-Concord and Coleridge school districts made it an official merger early in 2014. The merger was approved by the state, and Laurel-Concord-Coleridge Public Schools began as a single entity in the summer of 2014.

5. New pool coming for Wayne

With the 1960's-era swimming pool needing significant renovations, an effort to build a new swimming pool at the Wayne Community Activity Center quickly gained momentum. Voters overwhelmingly approved a one-half cent sales tax increase in the Nov. 4 general election to help fund construction of the \$2.8 million facility. Construction is expected to begin in early 2015, and city officials are optimistic that a grand opening for the pool could happen by

Labor Day weekend.

6. Chamberlain wins second term

Saying that he learned a lot during his first four years on the job, Wayne Mayor Ken Chamberlain earned a second term on the job, easily beating John Temme in the Nov. 4 general election. Chamberlain experienced several challenging situations during his first term, including a police scandal and dealing with the aftermath of the Oct. 4, 2013 tornado.

7. Overin Field damage

Area residents may have been wondering if the area had suddenly become a magnet for severe weather, as a severe wind storm blew through the area on Monday, June 30, damaging trees and roofs in the area, as well as lifting a set of bleachers into the Wayne public swimming pool. The wind blew over a tree just outside of Hank Overin Field, and the tree fell into the grandstand and backstop, causing a significant enough amount of damage that the old grandstand will have to be torn down and replaced. A community citizens group is finalizing plans for the new grandstand, with the hopes that the backstop can be replaced prior to the start of the 2015 spring season and grandstand construction would start after the sum-

8. Frye to retire as WSC President

After almost 30 years as a teacher and an administrator, Curt Frye announced that he will retire as Wayne State College president next June. Frye has been with the college since 1985, when he started as

the associate dean of students. He served as interim president of the college in 2003 and 2010, and came out of retirement when he was asked to be the 12th president of Wayne State College in 2011.


9. Dunning welcomed home

John Dunning and Mike Anderson both got a closeup look at the tornado that ripped through the east edge of Wayne on Oct. 4, 2013, and Dunning nearly lost his life after being hit by a rolling dumpster in the middle of the storm. Dunning made a remarkable recovery and returned home to a hero's welcome in January. He returned to his duties at Wayne State College on a limited basis before eventually working back up to his full-time duties as the college's chief information officer.

10. Legendary coach passes away

One of the legends of college basketball with ties to the Wayne community passed away in the spring of 2014. Don Meyer lost his battle with cancer and died at his home in Aberdeen, S.D. He won 923 games during a 37-year coaching career that included an NA-IA national title at Lipscomb and a long stint with Northern State University. He nearly lost his life in a car accident, and it was during recovery from those injuries that the cancer that ultimately took his life was found. Meyer was a mentor to many players and coaches and was considered one of the legends of the profession. His life is being documented in a movie "My Many Sons" that is currently under production.

Unrealistic expectations, extra shopping, and pressure to enjoy family and friends can cause a case of the holiday blues, said Scot L. Adams, director of the Division of Behavioral Health at the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services.

"Sometimes having the perfect holiday is not realistic," he said. "The number one thing is to take care of yourself."

Tips for dealing with the holiday blues:

fire-related evacuation. The city's policy at the time was to evacuate to the Wayne City Auditorium, which is more than a block away and would require an employee to be available to unlock the building.

Almost 20 members of the Leadership Wayne group were completing their work in the nine-month community leadership course.

Ky Kenny of Wayne won the Wayne County Spelling Bee to advance to the Midwest Spelling Bee in Omaha. Colton Jensen of Winside was second, Natalie Wright of Winside was third and Mariah Fervert of Wayne was fourth.

Anna Kruger, a senior at Wayne High School, was among four women from Nebraska selected to be part of the 58th session of the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women, which took place in New York City.

Ken Merlin, a volunteer with the St. Vincent dePaul Society of Lincoln, has been a constant presence in town as a volunteer, helping with recovery efforts from the Oct. 4, 2013 tornado that struck Wayne. He had been spending 3-4 days a week in town, and was also helping families affected by flooding in Colorado.

A time-honored tradition in Winside continued as two wrestlers earned state championships and got to sign their names on a sheet that holds the name of every Winside state wrestling champion since 1970. Carlos Escalera (132) and Caleb Lienemann (220) became the 35th and 36th state champions in school history, helping Winside to a fourth-place finish in Class D.

The Wayne State women's basketball team secured its third regular-season Northern Sun Conference championship in four years with a 78-56 win at Upper Iowa. Wayne State went 19-3 in conference play.

RUGBYMag.com named Wayne State's Amber Kutnink as the Small College Women's Player of the Year for the 2013 season. Kutnink helped lead Wayne State to a second consecutive National Small College Rugby Organization championship.

The Wayne High girls basketball team defeated Tekamah-Herman 54-30 to win the C1-4 subdistrict title and move on to the district championship game, where they would lose in the finals to eventual state champion Pierce.

March

The Wayne High boys basketball team won the C1-4 district title with a 71-46 win over Norfolk Catholic to qualify for the state tournament for the second consecutive year. They finished fourth in the state tourna-

In what had been a difficult 0-21 season, the Winside boys basketball team were able to take a positive memory from the season by helping a special needs player from Cedar Blufs enjoy a good life moment. Derek Westrom came into the game late and scored three baskets for the Cedar Bluffs team in their 56-7 win over Winside.

The Wayne High girls basketball team's hopes for a trip to state were dashed in the finals of the C1-4 district championship in Norfolk, as they fell to eventual state champion Pierce 58-39

The city of Laurel was named as one of eight communities that would serve as overnight stops on the 34th annual Bike Ride Across Nebraska. The 476-mile journey from Rushville to Omaha would include an overnight stay in Laurel, the fifth of seven stops on the BRAN tour for 2014.

Dr. Pearl Hansen of Wayne State College received the prestigious Nebraska Art Educator of the Year Award from the National Art Education Association. She received the award at the NAEA national convention in San Diego, Calif.

It's always fun for me to come to the end of the year and write the "best of the best" column that looks back on the big sporting events that happened during the past 12

There were events that needed a little memory jogging, and some that were instantly recalled because they were so amazing.

Two sports stories that I really got a charge out of reporting this year involved Wayne High athletes the Wayne High softball team's impressive 30-win run and the amazing comeback of a young lady who would become a state cham-





The problem is it can be hard to keep track of more than one drug. And how your body responds to medicines can also change as you age. Challenges like these may explain why one-third of hospitalizations among older patients are due to drug-related problems.

1. Multiple meds. It helps to use one pharmacy for all your prescriptions and refills. That way, we can check for potential interactions between your medications. And we can suggest supplements that would be safe for you to take along with those drugs.

Bring me a list of all your prescription and over-the-counter medications and vitamins and supplements. Let's discuss ways to synchronize or simplify your medication schedule. Ask about our refill reminder program—you never need to miss a dose!

If you notice any side effects, tell your doctor and me right away. This can be a reaction to a drug or a combination of drugs.² It may also be due to an interaction with alcohol or certain foods.³

2. Forgetfulness. You may find it helpful to write down your medication schedule. Note the day and time to take each drug, and what it's for. Include special instructions such as whether to take the drug with food and where to store it.

4. Swallowing or dexterity problems. Do you have trouble swallowing pills or opening

pill bottles? Together, we can come up with a solution.

For example, easy-to-open containers are okay if there are no children in your home. And, you may be able to take a liquid medicine instead of pills. Check with me first before chewing or crushing tablets.5





ing shrub with long cascading branches. It produces brightly colored clusters of pink to red berries in fall that persist all winter. Lined along the thin arching branches, the berries are beautiful against a backdrop of snow. It's a tough groundcover for full sun to part shade and well-adapted to a variety of soils. It grows to 3 feet high and 8 feet wide.

Snowberry is a native shrub with snowy white fruit clusters from October into early winter. It has

a rounded habit, with fine, twiggy shoots and blue-green leaves that remain on the plant well into fall. This very adaptable plant prospers in heavy clay soil and will grow best in part shade. It works well as a filler or in mass plantings and should be pruned in late winter to bring it back to its summer shape. It grows 3-6 feet high and wide.

Rugosa rose is a hardy, durable shrub rose with glossy leaves and abundant rose-to-white flowers late spring through summer. Large orange to red rose hips are beautiful in winter on this 3-4 foot shrub. A great drought-tolerant choice for hot, windy sites in full sun.

Both the native staghorn and smooth sumac tend to form widespreading colonies, but they can be kept in check with a mowed bound-

In nature, every change has its purpose, place

"Important lessons: look carefully; record what you see. Find a way to make beauty necessary; find a way to make necessity beautiful." Anne Michaels in Fugitive Pieces

The decorations we're putting out for the holidays we will soon pack up again for storage in closets, basements and attics. Meanwhile in the landscape, elements that have been developing all through the growing season are suddenly made visible as the green of lawns, deciduous trees and perennial beds begins to recede.

Every change we see in the landscape has a purpose. To us, that purpose may appear simply ornamental, but very little that occurs in the landscape is wasted. It might not be as dramatic in terms of color or quick-change but everything is there for a reason – primarily as food, propagation

Even the beautiful fall color we enjoy is purposeful, a result of the green of chlorophyll breaking down and disappearing to protect against the cold, and giving way to the suddenly visible yellow to orange to red colors.

Almost all the berries and other fruits we enjoy in our gardens are winter food for wildlife. Many of them, including crabapples and some viburnums, are only palatable after a long series of freezes and thaws, ultimately providing essential late winter food at a time when other food sources have The pine cones we use for outdoor and indoor decorations hold seeds in overlapping scales that

the beaks of some birds are perfectly angled to remove seeds from. The seeds of lodgepole pine are even more deeply "lodged," only to be released after fires, when new tree growth is most needed. Milkweed seeds normally burst their feathery pods in June or July, just in time to provide soft,

fibrous seeds for the mid-summer nests of American goldfinch and other birds.

The bare bones of tree trunks are exposed in their varied colors and textures. John Burroughs writes that "the rough dry bark of the trees is not such a barren waste as it seems. The amount of animal food in the shape of minute insects, eggs, and larvae tucked away in cracks and crevices must be considerable, and, by dint of incessant peeping and prying into every seam and break in the bark, [birds and insects] get fuel enough to keep their delicate machinery going." And further, "The brown creeper, with his long, slender, decurved bill, secures what the chickadee, with his short, straight bill, fails to get."

Bees, meanwhile, have stored their wealth of honey in strikingly architectural hexagonal combs, the perfect shape for maximum storage—and winter necessity. The honey they hold has its own perfect form as one of the few foods that never rots. With its high proportion of sugar and lack of moisture, there is no room for bacteria to grow.

The seedheads on asters, coneflowers and sunflowers are arranged in arcs or spirals in perfect increments to provide maximum sunshine and growth for new tissues at the base. And the entire heads of some plants in this family turn to follow the sun, almost like a solar panel.

County officials attend workshop

The annual conference, attended by approximately 700 county officials and employees, is part of a continuing education and leadership development series sponsored by the Nebraska Association of County Officials.

The conference updated county officials on recent changes in state laws and provided extensive training on the responsibilities of their respective offices.

On Jan. 15, there will be two different sessions in Nebraska. The first session will be at the Gage County UNL Extension Center in Beatrice. Registration begins at 10:30 a.m. with the program at 11 a.m. An evening session will be at the UNL Ag Research and Development Center near Mead, with registration at 5:30 p.m. and program at 6 p.m.

The Three-State Beef Conference (formerly the Four-State Beef Conference) is designed to provide regular updates on current cow-calf and stocker topics to beef cattle producers and others in the beef industry in Iowa, Missouri and Nebraska. The conference provides a forum of specialists from three of the United States' leading beef cattle land grant universities as well as other

industry experts. Registration fee is \$25 per person and it includes a meal and copy of the conference proceedings. Preregistration is due Jan. 9 to assist with meal planning and material
