Plea agreement reached in child porn case

Judge sets May 6 sentencing date

A Carroll man will serve at least six years in prison after a plea bargain was reached with the Wayne County Attorney's office regarding multiple charges of possession and distribution of child pornography.

Under a plea agreement brought before Wayne County District Judge James G. Kube Wednesday morning,

session of child pornography and five of 10 charges of distribution of child pornography, the result of a Nebraska State Patrol investigation that led to his arrest last September.

Perry's attorney, Jason Doele, and deputy county attorney Amy Miller presented the plea agreement to Judge Kube on Wednesday morning, and Kube accepted the plea deal and ordered a pre-sentencing investigation before he sentences Perry on Wednesday, May

Under the plea agreement, Perry pled guilty to the first nine charges of possession of child pornography, a Class III Felony, and five counts of distribution of child pornography, a Class I-D Felony. By agreeing to plead tence on the first count of possession, with one year Perry is sentenced.



The charges against Perry came after the Nebraska State Patrol, working off a CyberTip reported by Microsoft Corporation, found photographs and video images depicting child pornography on a computer operated by Perry. According to information in the case, some of the images were taken in Wayne, based on identifying marks found within the images.

Ted S. Perry pled guilty to nine of 18 charges of pos-guilty to those counts, the county agreed to drop the concurrent on the remaining eight possession counts. For the first two distribution counts, a mandatory-minimum sentence of three years in prison was agreed to with a mandatory-minimum three years attached to the remaining three distribution charges, concurrent with the first distribution sentence.

Position changes to help eliminate various city jobs

City approves electric rate increase

The establishment of a rate-increase schedule for electric rates and the elimination and addition of various positions within the city highlighted the agenda for Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

Discussion sparked when the proposed action of nixing some positions and titles included that of the Senior Patrolman, a position held by officer Brian Swanson.

City Administrator Lowell Johnson said the idea behind the action is to flatten out administrative positions, clarifying that it is more of a clean-up effort than anything, as some of the positions aren't currently in propriate level.

The police department previously operated with a Chief, Lieutenant, Sergeant and Senior Patrolman. The idea was to bring the department down to the Chief, Marlen Chinn, and two Sergeant positions—one of which is currently held by Rick Haase.

Chinn wasn't at the council meeting, but spoke to Johnson prior to it about the impending action. Johnson spoke on Chinn's behalf, stating that Chinn wished to keep the title of Senior Patrolman to be able to differentiate the position, as the pay is higher due to specialized training.

There are no supervisory responsibilities with the Senior Patrolman position, and the expunging of the title would not change Swanson's pay.

Council member Cale Geise moved for the approval of the addition of the titles Street Supervisor, Senior Lineman and Water Supervisor, as was listed in the council packet and moved forward with eliminating the

Further on in the meeting, the police wage and salary schedule was amended, re-adding the Senior Patrolman position for the time being. Power was also on the mind of the Coun-

cil, as members agreed to a rate increase schedule for electric rates, set to begin this

in May," Johnson said. "We've had a fair amount of subdivision expansion, and that The recommendation is coming from the

city's "rate guy", Mike Towne at Western Consulting and the city's auditor, Terry Galloway with Almquist, Maltzahn, Galloway and Luth.

Council member Jon Haase expressed concerns at the rate increase when the city is in the process of buying cheaper power, but Johnson explained this increase would just be until the new power source kicked in to keep the city's cash reserve at an ap-

Council member Matt Eischeid weighed "It seemed really top-heavy to have four in on the topic, stating the Council needs to "Nobody likes to increase anything,"

Chamberlain said. "But we need to maintain consistency." The action carried unanimously.

That action was followed by several

unanimous resolutions to approve the amendments to contracts between City and Western Area Power Administration. Currently the City of Wayne receives roughly 17 percent of its power from WAPA, generated from dams on the Missouri River in South Dakota

These amendments included a contract renewal, pushing the contract end back from December 2020 to December 2050, along with changing the way the WAPA power is measured.

In other news, the unanimous approval of an Engagement Letter with the bond company, D.A. Davidson and Co., was agreed upon to arrange temporary bond financing for construction of the sewer and water infrastructure in the new Southview Addition on Grainland Road.

"There are two major companies in the state. This is the bond company we are working with for the project," said Johnson. We've had really good luck with them." The next City Council meeting is set for

Tuesday, March 17, at 5:30 p.m. in Council chambers.

Condemnation, district changes are discussed

The Wayne County Commissioners spoke with Wayne County Attorney Mike Pieper regarding two issues during Tuesday's meeting in the county courthouse.

The first discussion centered around a process for condemnation of property on the northeast edge of Carroll owned by Darrel Hahn that is part of a county bridge project.

Pieper told the board that the county has 45 days to wait for a report on an appraisal of the property before it can negotiate with the property owner, unless the county has some documented basis for what they are offering the landowner for the property.

"I recommend that we wait until we get that appraisal and have a chance to digest that," he said. "You have to have a basis for what you're offering for that property, and

I suggest we wait until the appraisal comes back unless you have some evidence as to the basis for what we're offering.'

Pieper said he would be more comfortable with getting a professional testament to the property's value.

"I think it's prudent for taxpayers that you have a basis before you send out the offer," he said.

Board member Dean Burbach asked if the county could go ahead with letting the project out for bids before the appraisal is received, but board chairman Randy Larson said the county should wait.

"I definitely think it would be putting the cart before the horse," he said.

The county also talked with their attornev about a taxpayer request to look into



Natural Gas: The Wayne power plant and water departments have replaced two older gasoline powered pickups with pickups fueled by compressed natural gas. Wayne reas part of a University of Nebraska survey of performance of alternative fuel vehicles in small city fleets.

The waiting game starts for Wildcats

The great 20th century philosopher Thomas Earl Petty once opined, "the waiting is the hardest

There isn't a lot of concern here in Wildcat country about whether or not the Wayne State women's basketball team will be playing in the NCAA tournament. With a 27-5 record, the regular-season NSIC title and a runner-up finish in the conference tournament on their resume, the question isn't WILL they get in, but WHERE?

And that, my friends, is the unanswered question – and so, we wait.

There was every reason to believe this team could get that much-coveted golden ticket that is awarded to every one of the 24 conference tournament champions in NCAA Div. II. Wayne State won the regular-season conference crown for the fourth time in five years. Three of the four teams they lost to in NSIC regular-season play were caught in the other half of the 16-team bracket. When Moorhead disposed of Winona and Northern took care of both Augie and Mankato (and Mankato knocked out Crookston), Wildcat fans were feeling pretty good that a sweep of conference supremacy was inevitable. Teams they had already defeated were the only ones standing in their way.

The problem, though, is that you've got to come ready to play every night in this league – and even more so come tournament time.

Tuesday night, it was clear within the first couple of minutes that the Wildcats weren't playing with the same fire and determination they showed 24 hours earlier in a 22-point beatdown of Moorhead. The problem seemed to have momentarily corrected itself by the first media timeout when the Wildcats got within two points of North- out and really show the fight that late in the first half, but Murern State, and even at halftime, vou had to think the problem was going to correct itself when Wayne State was only down by seven after playing, easily, its worst 20 minutes of the postseason.

The Wildcats never got into a flow, though, and this has been the way this team has rolled more often than not this season – when it gets things going early, they tend to dominate. If the game doesn't come to them right away, it's a struggle.

Back in December, when the Wildcats dropped three of four games, we could chalk it up to inexperience. Seven of the 13 girls on the roster were playing their first college basketball games, and three others were getting acclimated to a new system after transferring from other locations. Chemistry is a volatile element in the development of a championship-caliber basketball program, and it takes time for that to come together.

Three months later, this team has come a long way from that shaky start. Winning 14 in a row and storming to the regular-season conference title came in a variety of ways, leading this writer to believe that this team had the makings of something special. I still believe that an Elite Eight trip can be had by this team, but Tuesday's effort should be a reminder to this group of girls that anything less than their best effort isn't going to cut it at this time of the year.

Wayne State will be one of the top 64 teams among the close to 300 Div. II schools playing in the postseason. The question is - do they want to be one of the 63 teams who fell short of achieving the ultimate prize, or are they going to be the one team that puts it all together over the course of the next six games and brings home that rarest of trophies – the one given to the national champions.

From The Tourney title hopes fall short for 'Cats

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. - The look of dejection on their faces told you everything you needed to know.

The 17th-ranked Wayne State women's basketball team had their sights set on sweeping the Northern Sun Conference regular-season and tournament titles for the first time since the team's magical Elite Eight run in the 2011-12 season, and were one win away from accomplishing that goal on Tuesday evening.

The Wildcats fell short of reaching that rare pinnacle, though, as Northern State jumped on Wayne State early in the finals of the NSIC conference tournament at the Sanford Pentagon and never let the regular-season champions get comfortable in a 61-45 defeat that helped the Wolves avenge an earlier loss to the Wildcats and claim the conference tournament title and the automatic bid into the NCAA Div. II

The Wolves jumped out to an 8-0 lead by making four of its first six shots to open the game. It would take more than three minutes before the Wildcats could get on the board, and they pulled to within two at 9-7 with 15:10 left in the half, thanks to baskets by seniors Jordan Spencer and Ashton Yossi and a 3-pointer by Sadie Murren.

That was as close as Wayne State

Northern went on a 9-0 run of six minutes after the Wildcats got within a basket, and the Wildcats never got closer than six points from then on.

"We just didn't settle in on the offensive end and play the way you need to play to be successful against them," coach Chris Kielsmeier said after the game. "We really fought the game and didn't get the shots we needed to get."

Kielsmeier said he was most disappointed with the team's defensive effort, and yet the Wildcats were still well within range after a lackluster first 20 minutes, trailing 29-22 at intermission.



OAKLAND - Wayne High boys basketball coach Rob Sweetland hoped his team could stay within striking distance of Winnebago and catch them at the end.



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

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WSC wrestlers send 11 to nationals

The Wayne State wrestling team came away with 11 qualifiers for the NCWA national tournament later this month after a runner-up finish in the Great Plains Conference tournament Saturday at Rice

The Wildcats finished with 150 points and finished as runner-up to Rochester College of Minnesota, who won the eight-team tournament with 174.5 points. United States Air Force Academy finished third with 136.5 points.

The 11 Wildcats who qualified for the national meet in Texas did so in nine weights, led by four-time qualifier and returning All-Ameircan Jon Williams and three-time qualifier and conference champion Matthew DeGarmo

DeGarmo was the lone conference champion for the Wildcats, winning the 197-pound title by going 3-0 in round-robin action. He won all three of his matches by pin, closing with a first-period pin of teammate Spencer Trout, who also qualified for nationals by going 2-1 in the bracket.

Wayne State will also send a pair of heavyweights to the national meet, as Jason Trautman and Ethan Hirschman both qualified for nationals. Trautman was the conference runner-up at 285 pounds, while Hirschman finished third.

Williams was a conference runner-up for the Wildcats at 174 pounds. He pinned his way into the championship round before losing in the finals to Cory Berry of Rochester College on a late first-period

Private pesticide applicator training scheduled

Private pesticide applicators whose licenses expire in 2015 and those seeking first-time certification can find information on pesticide safety education programs at their local University of Nebraska Extension offices.

Licensing as a private applicator allows farmers to purchase and use pesticides classified as restricted use by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency in their own farming operations.

Extension provides the educational program, while the agriculture department is responsible for licensing. The training fee is \$30. An applicator may also certify by self-study or online training for a \$60 training fee.

In 2001, the Nebraska Legislature created a state pesticide license fee of \$25 for private applicators. The fee covers a three-year license period.

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

Extension Educator in Knox County Alfalfa is a hungry crop. Proper fertilizing in spring often is needed to feed alfalfa so it will produce profitable yields. So what are your fertilizer plans?

How much fertilizer should you apply to alfalfa? With increasing fertilizer costs and strong land use competition from other crops, the only way to answer that guestion intelligently is to first get a soil test. Soil tests tell you the amount of each nutrient your soil can provide to your alfalfa plants. Then you can determine how much more fertilizer, if any, should be applied

for maximum profits. Remember that alfalfa gets most of its nitrogen from the air if the plant roots are well-nodulated. So usually you are just wasting money and fertilizer if you fertilize with

trients must come from the soil or from fertilizer.

Many soils in our region provide high quantities of most nutrients. But very few soils provide all the nutrients needed for top alfalfa yields. So fertilizer often is needed.

Collect soil samples as soon as frost is gone from existing alfalfa fields and also from fields you expect to plant to alfalfa this spring or next fall. Send these samples to a lab for analyses of at least phosphorus and soil pH. If your field is sandy, eroded, or highly weathered, also test for potassium and sulfur.

Most important of all, use the results of these soil tests, with advice from your extension educator and fertilizer dealer, to develop an alfalfa fertilizer program designed for your conditions. Better alfalfa profits will be the result.

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Snow or water – what's the dif?

Are you getting tired of winter? Tired of hauling water or chopping ice? Well maybe, just maybe you can let your cows eat snow once in a while for their water needs.

Snow sometimes can be a good

source of livestock water. Research from Canada and several northern states have shown that cows can eat 30 to 40 pounds of snow per day to meet their water needs. And some ranchers already rely on only snow to provide water on their winter pastures.

To be successful using snow as your water source, several conditions must be met. First off, the snow must be clean and fresh. We've all heard jokes about eating yellow snow, but it's no joke if that is what your cows are depending on. Second, the cows must be in good shape. It will take body heat energy to melt the snow they eat so thin cows or sick cows should not be forced to rely on snow for water. Lactating cows also should have a good source of liquid water.

Don't let nitrates cost cattle lives

Are you feeding cane, millet, or oat hay, or maybe corn stalk bales, to your cows this winter? If so, don't to feed high nitrate hay safely. Dilet high nitrate levels kill your cows or cause abortions. Nitrates occur naturally in all for-

ages. At low levels, nitrates either excreted. But when nitrate concentrations get too high, they can kill cows and maybe abort calves. When stress affects pasture

and hay production, nitrates often reach potentially toxic levels. Some plants are more likely to be high in nitrates than others. Annual grasses like cane, millet, oats, and even meal when very hungry. This could corn often have elevated nitrate levels. So do certain weeds like pigweed, kochia, and lambsquarter. If your hay has lots of these weeds or is an annual grass, be alert to the vour local extension office or online potential for high nitrates. That doesn't mean these feeds

always are toxic, nor does it mean Extension Forage Specialist.

Don't get me started

WSC makes most with sports dollar

I have an uncle who is a magician with a dollar.

For as long as I've known him, whether it was a paper route, collecting sports memorabilia or even owning his own business, he has a knack with making the most of his financial resources and had made quite a name for himself during his business career.

My uncle isn't a Wayne State graduate – in fact, he's never taken a single college class – but it would appear that the people running the athletic programs at Wayne State College run their operations much in the same way my uncle does and gets quite a return on their investment.

A recently-completed comprehensive analysis of athletic programs in the Northern Sun Conference that was published in a recent edition of The Wayne Stater shows that, without question, Wayne State does a better job with their financial resources than any other school in 16-team conference.

And it's not even close.

Wayne State outperforms the rest of the conference in women's basketball and softball, and is one of three schools (Winona State and MSU Moorhead) that has a positive ranking in each of the seven sports studied (men's and women's basketball, baseball, football, softball, volleyball and

And, when you compare those three schools, Wayne State gets more bang for its buck than all of the comparable MSU Moorhead teams, and outperforms Winona State in every sport except soccer (where Winona State is the top school in that sport).

Of the seven sports, Wayne State is the best in women's basketball and softball when it comes to having an average performance ranking that is higher than their average expenditure ranking. Wayne State is also the only school whose average per-

formance ranking is two ranking positions higher than its average expenditure ranking.

The only thing Wayne State doesn't rank as high in, when it comes to finances within its athletic department, is the AMOUNT that is spent on athletics in Wayne State College – where the Wildcats are 13TH out of 16 schools.

That's right - Wayne State is one of the WORST schools in the conference when it comes to the amount of money its athletic department has to work

with, yet its overall average mance is, far and away, the best in the Northern Sun Conferen

There is a lot that the average fan doesn't see, when it comes to how financial resources are used, that each coach and his or her staff has to think about, and it would blow your mind to look at all the things that they have to take into consideration when spending their limited financial

It's more than uniforms and equipment - it's travel costs, meals and hotels, recruiting visits, apparel, updated computer and video equipment, online resources such as video distribution services . . . all those behindthe-scenes bells and whistles that a program needs to be competitive.

And when you look at what the teams work with, there aren't a lot of bells and whistles within the halls of the Wayne State athletic department. Coaches aren't flying in private jets to all parts of the globe to recruit kids. The team doesn't eat in the finest restaurants in town when they're on the road (Applebee's or Ruby Tuesdays is as good as it gets for

And the athletic department doesn't get a blank check when it comes to its budget. If they want or need something more that the budget can't cover, there are a variety of fundraising efforts the athletic department has to work with to help raise that money. The annual Catbacker golf tournament is a big money-maker for the department, and that money goes toward those expenditures that are not a part of the budget.

Take all that into consideration, and it makes the results we have seen from the Wildcat teams over the years all the more impressive. That Wayne State can have one of the smallest bank accounts in the NSIC, yet boast THREE top 25 programs (volleyball, women's basketball, women's indoor track) and have competitive programs in sports like football, baseball and softball (along with rebuilding efforts in men's basketball and women's soccer) speaks volumes to the work the entire athletic department – from the administrators to the coaches and athletes – do to get the biggest bang for their buck.

It's the kind of resource management that would make my uncle proud.

Saying 'no' to needless legislation

There is such a thing as a needless bill. And then, there's a needless bill with an estimated \$1 million price tag. Fortunately, Nebraska lawmakers voted to table the voter photo ID bill for the remainder of the 2015 session.

In "bracketing" the bill (LB111) until consideration on the final day, the officially non-partisan Nebraska unicameral stopped the Republican Party's goal of a requirement that voters must show government-issued photo IDs. Supporters say it's important to prevent voter fraud. Opponents suggest the real motivation is to further disenfranchise people groups who tend to vote for

Nebraska is a predominantly Republican state. There have been no reported cases of voter fraud in the state. Proponents said everyone who wants to vote would be issued a free photo ID. The fiscal note attached to the bill for that provision would be about \$1 million. So let's recap: Republicans already have the edge on votes; there have been no reported cases of voter fraud; to make the bill happen would cost \$1

Freshman lawmaker Sen. Adam Morfeld of Lincoln said the bill would place a burden on a fundamental constitutional right to vote. Freshman Sen. Brett Lindstrom of Omaha said the measure is fiscally irresponsible. Freshman Sen. John McCollister of Omaha said voter fraud is not a problem in Nebraska. Lindstrom and McCollister are both Republicans and were joined by 10 other Republicans in voting to table the bill. The final vote, 25 to 15 to NOT do something stupid.

In a second breath of fresh air, a legislative committee voted NOT to advance a proposal to the full Legislature that would have allowed Nebraska bars to stay open 24/7. The General Affairs Committee, chaired



said NO to Larson's proposal, which would have been part of an omnibus liquor bill. Larson had said the elimination of "last call" would keep bars from dumping too many people $\,$ in the street all at once.

Bar owners and law enforcement agencies have spoken out against the proposal. Lincoln Police have installed cameras at a busy downtown intersection to monitor the activity of people from a cluster of bars and have found no major concerns over the swell of people from closing time. Bar owners obviously struggle with staffing and cleanup and maintenance if the doors never

Examples could include: Farmer/Rancher (that's an easy one), Banker (loan's money to producers and producers keep their money in a bank, Car salesman (farmers/ranchers purchase vehicles), Newspaper Owner (Producers may have a subscription or take out ads), Restaurant owner (producers raise the products used to create

food), the list could go on and on.

You could create a matching game out of everyday objects. This could be accomplished by bring pictures of various plants/animals and/or items made from them. Then you would ask the youth to match the items up with the plant/animal that they came from. For example: 100 percent cotton t-shirt - cotton, crayons - soybeans, marshmallow's - corn, leather - beef, chewing gum -corn, football - swine, etc. As you can see there are many

ways fun and entertaining ways in which you can teach youth about the importance of Ag Literacy each and every day. If you are ever in the Grand Island area, be sure to check out Raising Nebraska, an interactive exhibit that opened during the 2014 Nebraska State Fair. A joint effort of the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, the Nebraska Department of Agriculture and the Nebraska State Fair, this 25,000 square foot exhibit is designed to help visitors better understand and appreciate the advancements, impact and global leadership of Nebraska agriculture. The exhibit will be available yearround, staffed by a UNL extension educator. Building hours are 9-11 a.m. and Thursday 2 - 4 p.m. or by appointment.
