'Guys and Dolls' coming back to WHS stage

Third time featured as spring musical

For the third time in school history (as accurately as can be determined), Wayne High School students will present the musical "Guys and Dolls" on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, April 10, 11 and 12.

Performances will begin at 7 p.m. on Friday and Saturday with a matinee on Sunday, April 12 at 2 p.m. Tickets are now on sale from any member of the cast or

Set in Damon Runyon's mythical New York City, "Guys And Dolls" is an oddball romantic comedy.

"Gambler Nathan Detroit (Reed Trenhaile) tries to find the cash to set up the biggest craps game in town while the authorities breathe down his neck; meanwhile, his girlfriend, nightclub performer Adelaide (Riley Nichols), laments that they've been engaged for entirely too long. Nathan turns to fellow gambler Sky Masterson (Austin Hammer) for the dough, but Sky ends up chasing the straight-laced missionary Sarah

heart of Times Square to the cafes of Havana, Cuba, and even into the sewers of New York City, but eventually everyone ends up right where they belong," said Director Tracy Anderson.

Guys And Dolls ran for 1,200 performances when it opened on Broadway in 1950. It received nearly unanimous positive reviews from critics and won a bevy of awards, including TONY Awards, Drama Desks, and Oliviers. Frequently revived, the show has been done with numerous all-star casts including productions/ concerts featuring Ewan McGregor, Jane Krakowski, Brian Stokes Mitchell and Jessica Biel.

"From visiting with Wayne community members, this is likely the third production of Guys and Dolls on the Wayne High stage," Anderson said.

Frank Loesser's brassy, immortal score makes Guys And Dolls a show that will have the audience tapping their toes and humming on the way home. Recycling bins are installed downtown

The City of Wayne now has recycling bins

in the downtown area. City crews spent part of Friday morning installing the blue recycling bins. Four of the bins are on Main Street and the fifth

is located in front of the Wayne City Audi-

The city received funding for the five new bins from the Nebraska Environmental Trust through the Nebraska State Recycling Association.

These containers were manufactured in Columbus by Behlen Manufacturing. The labels on the sides of the containers were ordered through Recycle Across America, which has started a national movement to standardized recycling labels.

The top lid labels were designed and installed by Heidi Claussen.

The containers will be used to recycle aluminum cans, plastic bottles and paper. Bottles should be empty of all liquids and paper should be clean, with no food or food

"Two keys to encouraging people to recycle is to (1) place recycling bins next to garbage cans, and (2) have clear labels indicating what to recycle," said Sandy Brown, chairman of the Wayne Green Team.

The steel recycling bins were designed to match the existing garbage bins.

City sales tax figures received from the City of Wayne business office show a 22 percent decline from the previous month, but only a slight decrease compared to a year


Figures announced by city finance director Nancy Braden note that the city received \$52,032.96 in March, which are the result of sales made during the month of January. That's a significant drop from the record number of \$66,640.07 received last month, but only a slight decrease from the same period last year, when \$52,541.21 was

For the first six months of fiscal year 2014-15, the city has received \$351,095.14, well ahead of its projected pace. The city's average monthly intake is more than \$2,300

ahead of projected estimates.







Backflow Protectors and Broken Water Mains

Wayne's water comes from deep and pure underground aguifers where there is no bacteria and there are currently no contaminants. We sample and test our water every two weeks at various locations around Wayne. The secret to keeping this water pure is a pressurized water system so any leaks go outward instead of into the water main.

When a water main breaks all this changes. The water supply to the broken spot has to be shut off so the broken pipe can be replaced or repaired. Sometimes the shut off valves are a block away or more. The water left in the pipes that are shut off then drains back to the spot that is broken. When the water mains drain back, so do the service lines to every house and so do the water heaters. So far so good – probably still clean water.

A water main break can happen at night when a lot of our water softeners are drawing water to recycle and the discharge line could be laying in the floor drain with dirty water around it. When the house water service line drains back into the water main, it siphons the water backwards through the operating softeners and can pull dirty water off the floor back into the water

main with it. If we shut off the water while someone is using a garden hose, that hose water siphons back to the water main, along with any soapy or chemical water if the hose is stuck into a bucket or tank. Underground lawn irrigation systems, "quiet-fill" submerged toilet tanks, heating system boilers and laundry sinks with short hoses that lay in the sink can all siphon back into the water mains if they happen to be turned on when we have a broken water main.

Nebraska Health and Human Services Department requires all towns to make sure their water utility customers have mechanical or air gap backflow protectors for certain connections in homes and busi-

Wayne contacted all home and business owners about eight years ago to help them get backflow devices in place. NHHS is monitoring the Wayne water system in 2015 so we will be contacting building owners again to make sure we're in com-

pliance with health requirements. Questions or comments?

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

pole vault

Things I was thinking while watching my NCAA tournament bracket go up in flames:

- Another season of spring sports is upon us, and if you're a fan of Wayne High track and field, you're going to see something a little different this year.

Of course, the new track setup will capture your attention this season, but even more interesting is the fact that you'll see Blue Devil athletes a little higher in the air than you're accustomed to seeing. Wayne High has not tradition-

ally (at least, in the previous five seasons I covered track and field) been known as a team that compete in the pole vault. That changes this season, however, and we already saw Marta Pulfer and Nolan Reynolds give it a go during Saturday's Wayne State Indoor Classic.

I've had an opportunity to cover some pretty good pole vaulters over the years, including current Nebraska vault coach T.J. Pierce and Jeremy Scott, a state champion pole vaulter from Norfolk who went on to compete in the Olympic Games in

It takes a different kind of athlete to compete in this event. You have to have the physical skills, obviously, but there's also a sense of reckless abandon that you need to get comfortable with the idea of using a pole to vault that high in the air, hoping that you do things right and wind up falling in the soft pit on the

It should be interesting to see how the Blue Devil athletes who compete in that event perform this

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

Priority bills are a hot topic

Priority: a thing that is regarded as more important than another; the fact or condition of being regarded or treated as more important; the right to take precedence or to proceed before others. Bill: a proposed law under consideration by a legislature. A bill does not become law until it is passed by the legislature and is, in most cases, approved by the executive. Once a bill has been enacted into law, it is called an Act or a statute.

Here's what you need to know to choose a ventilation system that fits your cooktop and your space.

Ducted vs. Unducted

Cooking fans without ducts leading outside the home are not true ventilation systems. Rather, they are referred to as recirculating range hoods, and have a limited ability to reduce grease, smoke, heat and odors. These hoods attach to the wall above the cooktop and pull air through a filter, then recirculate it back into the room, Often, this recirculated air includes odors and gases along with humidity and heat.

Ducted systems take emissions through ductwork to be vented outside. Venting outside takes much less energy to remove heat and water vapor than relying on your airconditioning system to do the job.

Ups and Downs

Updraft systems, are the favorite among kitchen-design professionals, as they install directly over the cooking surface. A hood helps gath-

the exhaust fan moves them outside through a duct. Downdraft designs pull air across the cooking surface and down through a duct that leads outside the home. Unlike hoods or canopies, downdraft systems are often integrated into the surface of the cooking appliance. Since these units rise no more than 10 inches above the cooking surface, they are too short to capture vapors rising from a tall pot. Most designers prefer to reserve downdraft systems for kitchens with cathedral ceilings, where the length of the ductwork would be too great to work effectively, or in kitchen island configurations. A larger fan is required in a downdraft system because there is no hood to help capture cooking

Depth and Width

A 30-inch range requires a hood or downdraft vent that is at least 30 inches wide. If space permits, wider is better. For a 30-inch range, a 36-inch hood is recommended. A hood's depth, which is the distance

it projects from the wall, is also important. "You want to make sure it hangs over at least the middle of the front burners. Ventilation Efficiency

Generally, a range hood with an exhaust fan vented to the outside (updraft) is considered the most effective system. Placement of the fan above the cooking area takes advantage of the natural rise of heated air. Note that small ducting and/ or several elbows in the ducting decreases the ventilation system's efficiency.

Ventilation Rate

When a cooking appliance is against a wall, ventilation is more effective. Ventilation systems for ranges and cook tops in open islands or peninsulas require larger fans. The Home Ventilating Institute recommends hoods being placed along a wall have a minimum exhaust rate of 40 cubic feet of air per minute (CFM) per lineal foot of cooktop. Ideally, 100 CFM per lineal foot should be used. Thus, for a typical 30-inch range 100 to 250 CFM is needed. Hoods above an island or peninsula (no wall) should have a minimum of 50 CFM per lineal foot while 150 CFM is recommended. This calculates to 125 to 375 CFM of a 30-inch cooktop.

Duct work can alter efficiency of a ventilation system. The longer the duct run, the more turns or angles, and the smaller the duct, the less efficient the system. A larger fan may be needed to draw enough air from

Remember, the most efficient thing you can do with kitchen ventilation is to turn it off after it is no longer needed. If you do not, it will continue to draw conditioned air out of your kitchen.

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Caring for newly planted trees

Tree planting projects on the Great Plains need regular care and maintenance to grow and

All of the work that went into preparing the site for planting and then planting the trees was only the beginning. To insure that the seedlings you planted provide benefits you want, you will need to provide regular maintenance to insure the growth and survival of your seedlings. Some of the maintenance activities you will need to consider include weed control, supplemental watering, and protection from animal damage.

Weed control may be the most important post-planting maintenance activity that you can perform to ensure the success of your new tree planting project. Controlling volunteer woody vegetation, annual and perennial grasses, and broadleaf weeds may be necessary throughout the life of your plantation. However, it will be most important during the first three to five years after the seedlings are planted. Eliminating competing weed species can greatly improve the survival and growth of your seedlings. They will compete with your tree seedlings for soil moisture, nutrients, sunlight and space, and provide cover for rodents that can dam-

There are several methods that you can use to control weed species within and between the tree planting rows. These include mechanical cultivation (hoeing, roto-tilling, etc.), mowing or shredding, mulching (organic or fabric mulches), and chemical control (pre- and postemergence herbicides). If herbicides are used, their selection will depend on site conditions, tree species in your plantation and the weeds to be controlled.

Mechanical or hand cultivation can be a very effective way to control weeds and grasses around seedlings. When cultivating you should clean an area at least three feet in diameter around each seedling. To avoid damage to the seedlings stay at least six inches away from the stem and do not cultivate the soil deeper than three inches. You may need to clean cultivate around the seedlings two to four times each year depending on the growing season.

Mowing is a poor alternative for weed control. Although, sometime it is the only option on certain highly erosive sites. Mowing will reduce fuel buildup, rodent cover, and make the plantation more accessible for other management activities. However, it does little to reduce competition for moisture and nutrients caused by weeds and grasses and may encourage the growth of damaging perennial grasses like brome grass. Also, there is always the potential for mechanical damage to the seedling. If you do plan to use mowing as a part of your maintenance plan, you should mow as often as necessary to keep the seedlings clearly visible.

Mulch can be used around seedlings to control weeds and reduce the loss of soil moisture. There are two common types of mulch: organic mulches and plastic fabric mulches. Organic mulches include composted yard waste or wood chips. When using organic material a top dressing of nitrogen fertilizer may be necessary to replace nitrogen lost from the soil as the organic materials decompose.

Program blends beef production with nutrition and culinary expertise

Beef Councils recently collaborated on a program to provide culinary dietitians with a taste beef production practices set in the ranching communities of Napa and Sonoma County California. The 2 1/2 day Nutrition and Di-

etetics' Association conference focused on increasing food and culinary skills and knowledge on emerging trends and topics in the field of nutrition. Included in those trends was an increased focus on agriculture - specifically, an inclusive conversation with the farmers and ranchers who grow the food with transparency on how it was raised.

To facilitate this conversation within the beef community, 45 participants travelled to Kunde Estates, home of the Sonoma Mountain Hereford ranch. Marcia Kunde Mickelson, a fourth generation rancher and winegrower, provided a tour of operations at the ranch and was assisted in the sustainability discussion by Mike Smith of Harris Ranch and Chairman of the California Beef Council. At the center of the discussion were the production practices that contribute to meeting a growing global beef demand while balancing environmental responsibility, social diligence, and food safety. The dietitians were provided a

walking tour of the ranch and given a hands-on approach to understanding the production cycle by interacting with newborn calves, cows, and production sale bulls.

Regrouping at the Kunde Estate winery, James Winstead, Registered Dietitian Nutritionist for the California Beef Council, provided a nutrition presentation on the health aspects of lean beef while participants enjoyed a sampling of

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The Nebraska and California beef sliders and Kunde wines. Assisting with the program was Mitch Rippe, Director of Nutrition and Education with the Nebraska Beet Council, "we are helping people to learn more about their food, not just about the nutrients in it, but how all the hard work and efforts by our farmers and rancher contribute to the high quality, nutritious beef we all enjoy."

As the trusted health and nutrition resource, consumers look to Registered Dietitians to help them in choosing and selecting the most beneficial foods to feed their families, Rippe said. "Therefore, it is important that we provide dietitians the opportunity to join us in the production experience, so they can see and understand the direct correlation between beef production and beef nutrition."

The next day, over 120 dietitians attended a sustainability presentation by Dr. Kim Stackhouse, Director of Sustainability with the National Cattlemen's Beef Association. Dr. Stackhouse spoke about the continuous improvement of balancing efficient agricultural production with environmental, social and economic attributes. To do this, Stackhouse detailed the comprehensive assessment launched by the Beef Checkoff Program to quantify and benchmark aspects of beef industry

dietitians traveled to Cakebread Cellars to partake in a beef and wine pairing excursion led by Winstead, Rippe, and Executive Chef Dave Zino of the National Cattlemen's Beef Association. Provided a walking tour of the winery, participants then gathered to enjoy a four meal sampling of culinary inspired beef dishes expertly paired with Cakebread Cellar wines. The conference concluded Saturday with hands-on culinary sessions at the Culinary Institute of America at Greystone in St. Helena, Calif.

To end the evening, a group of 20


Gearing up for Siouxland Garden Show
