Michael Foods set for expansion

Highway 35 runs through the very east edge of Wakefield, giving drivers a frontrow seat to the massive construction project Michael Foods has delved into.

The project, totaling \$33 million, is divided into two different phases: expansion and renovation. A 75,000 square foot expansion has already been finished and is being followed up by Phase Two, the renovation of current spaces.

"The purpose of the expansion was to enable Michael Foods to continue to meet the growing needs of our customers," Beth Peta, director of marketing and communications for the company, told The Wayne Herald.

The new addition will add space for production, refrigeration, finished good space and egg storage. There will also be two added production equipment lines installed.

The renovation work is underway now that Phase One is finished. This will include the relocation of two food production equipment lines as well as site preparations for a potential addition to the building in the future. Phase two is set to be completed in late May.

"This investment will address existing needs for additional space, expand our production capacities at the Wakefield location, provide enhanced service for our customers and position the plant for future growth," said Joe Clevenger, plant manager. "Michael Foods is committed to the Wakefield community and greatly values our partnership with local officials, who were instrumental in helping get the project underway.²

At this time, the expansion is not expected to bring forth additional jobs, due to the anticipated efficiencies in the new production operations.

"However, the expansion will build our overall production capacity and we expect it to generate additional revenues for the company and, by extension, will increase Michael Foods' economic contribution in Wakefield," said Clevenger. "We look forward to working with community leaders as the project progresses."

Area team looking for volunteers

Airport enthusiast passes away

Mitchell (Mitch) Nissen, who served on the Wayne Airport Authority Board for 35 years, died Friday at his home in Wayne at the age of 78.

Nissen was appointed to the Airport Authority on Jan. 30, 1979 and retired in December of 2014.

During a retirement celebration at that time, Nissen recalled when Al Robinson, airport manager at the time talked to Mayor Wayne Marsh and asked that Nissen be appointed. Nissen learned how to fly by taking flight lessons from Al Robinson.

When asked about what he liked about serving on the Airport Authority, Nissen said it was "the camaraderie of the board." Having served with several board members who have moved on, and the current members, Nissen says the board has always looked to the future and what is best for the Airport.

Nissen said he felt the greatest accomplishment during his tenure as board chairman was seeing the new north-south runway completed.

"There have been many projects over the years, but when we finally got the new runway, that was the greatest. There were many years when I thought the runway was just a dream and it would not become a reality," Nissen said.




Baseball winning streak ends

Dealing with winter annuals in crops and lawn care


Roller coaster temperatures make it harder to determine what is going on, but we are warming up so winter annual weeds will soon be greening up and beginning to grow vigorously. Some crop fields will even turn purple by planting time.

What is the impact of winter annual weeds and what should you think about in planning control programs?

Winter annual weeds begin germinating in early fall, and some species (especially marestail) continue to germinate until after planting. Depending on the species, they begin flowering in early to mid-April and most set seed and senesce by mid-June or earlier.

Control of winter annuals is relatively easy in the fall and early spring, but harder once they begin flowering as they are less susceptible to herbicides. In addition, the time between the start of flowering and when they have viable seeds can be relatively brief. Henbit, for example, produces mature seeds within two weeks of flowering. Plants can be flowering and shedding mature seeds at the same time.

Because winter annual weeds are small and their growth doesn't overlap extensively with crop develis sometimes overlooked. In areas where dense winter annual weed infestations occurs, we recommend controlling those weeds at least two weeks before planting to protect against yield loss. In addition, controlling winter annual weeds be-



fore mid-April will reduce the risk of weeds going to seed and increasing winter annual weed pressure in subsequent years.

Warm weather brings lawn work, but don't be in a hurry to apply fertilizer just vet. It is more important now to clean up the yard and reseed damaged areas. It may be worth is to wait a couple of weeks to see if you decide you have to replant, seed as soon as possible. Do not apply any herbicides prior to reseeding or within two or three mowings unless allowed on the label. It's too early to apply fertilizer

to your lawn now. Heavy spring fertilization should be avoided. Cool-season turf needs little additional encouragement to grow and applying too much fertilizer in late March and April causes excess shoot growth at the expense of root growth and uses up valuable storage products needed for summer performance. Early spring fertilization should be reserved for the professionals, while most homeowners should wait until after the first growth flush to apply fertilizer.

Once emerged, grasses grow from their crown and thus it greens up from the base in the spring. The end result is that even though the turf looks brown from above, it may be green and growing underneath. Now is the time to check your mower's mowing height, sharpen the blade, and start the mower to guarantee it is ready to go when needed. Lawns eventually should be mowed at 3 to 3.5" throughout the year and ideally often enough to remove no more than 1/3 of the leaf blade. This will keep the lawn at optimum thickness to provide enough height to shade itself in the summer and provide competition for weeds. UNL Extension Tractor Safety courses offered

University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension Tractor Safety/Hazardous Occupations Courses will be offered at seven locations in Nebraska during May and June. Any 14 or 15-year-old teen who plans to work on a farm other than their parents' should plan to attend.

Federal law prohibits youth under 16 years of age from working on a farm for anyone other than their parents. Certification through the course grants an exemption to the law, allowing 14 and 15-year-olds to drive a tractor and to do field work with mechanized equipment.

Classes consist of two days of instruction plus homework assignments. Classes are from 8 a.m.- 5 p.m. each day. Our nearest class will be on June 15-16 at the fairgrounds in Wayne. There will need to be a minimum of eight registrations to hold the workshop.

Pre-registration is strongly encouraged at least one week before a location's start date to the Dixon County Extension Office. Cost is \$60, which includes educational materials, testing, supplies, lunches and breaks. For more information, contact the Extension Office at (402) 584-2234 or e-mail Keith Jarvi at kjarvi1@unl.edu for registration materials.

The first day of class will consist of intensive classroom instruction with hands-on demonstrations, concluding with a written test that must be completed satisfactorily before students may continue driving tests the next day. Classroom instruction will cover the required elements of the National Safe Tractor and Machinery Operation Program. Homework will be assigned to turn in the next day.

The second day will include testing, driving and operating machinerv. Students must demonstrate competence in hitching equipment and driving a tractor and trailer through a standardized course as well as hitching PTO and hydraulic systems.

Don't get me started

Bloomfield blew it on Ernie's blowup

When we go to the ballot box every 2-4 years, we elect people to represent our voice in the halls of government, whether it's in Washington, D.C., Lincoln, Neb., or right here in our local area.

We expect those who "represent" us, whether it's on the local school board or the moral cesspool that is the United States Congress, to express our voices and serve as an upstanding representation of civilized society.

Our state senator, Dave Bloomfield, absolutely failed on this front last week in a manner that, in this writer's opinion, is a slap in the face to those who advocate peace and respect for our fellow man and for law enforcement

Last week, during a hearing on a bill in the Nebraska Legislature, Omaha Sen. Ernie Chambers compared the state's law enforcement community with the ISIS terrorist organization. The outrage expressed at Chambers' comments came at a trickle in the Nebraska Legisalture, a governing body Chambers has continually bullied during his long tenure as the north Omaha representative. One state senator demanded an apology, which Chambers quickly and forcefully refused. Other state senators have followed, demanding everything from an apology to a resignation.

And then - there was our "representative" here in District 17, a staunch conservative and alleged supporter of law enforcement, who did everything but DEFEND Chambers' remarks.

Rather than joining in what Bloomfield called the "piling on" of the Legislature's lone race baiter, our "representative" in the Unicameral said that Chambers was exercising his "freedom of speech." While paying lip service by saying he didn't "condone" Chambers' remarks, his lame explanation of not wanting to "pile on" with his colleagues serves as more of an applause of Chambers' veiled threat to shoot a police officer than it did a rebuke of the Omaha senator's not-so-subtle attempt at advocating a potentially-deadly assault on our state's law enforcement.

Now don't get me wrong – I know that there are a number of individuals hiding behind the badge who use their power as a police officer to create more problems than they solve. Thankfully, those individuals are in the very small minority among those who take the concept of "serve and protect" seriously and lay their lives on the line every day to make sure we live in a safe community, whether it's in small-town Wayne, America or Legislative Update the big cities of Lincoln and Omaha.

Capitol View Paid petition talk circulating


Few people argue with the First Amendment right of free speech and allowing people to petition their government.

But, bring up the issue of paying petition-circulators by the signature in Nebraska and you'll generate discussion. Such has been the case since at least 1986 when a couple lobbyists and two state senators were charged with violating the law by paying people to circulate petitions for a Constitutional change to permit a state-run lottery. A couple years later, the Nebraska Supreme Court ruled that prohibiting the payment of petition circulators "violates the first amendment and is for that reason void and of no force or effect.'

Several changes to petition laws ensued. Petition circulators had to disclose that they were being paid. The proposed ballot issue - the reason for the petition - had to be clearly stated on each page of the petition. About eight years ago, payment per signature instead of an hourly wage was banned. Proponents of the ban said paying per signature would increase the chances for fraud and aggressive behavior.

Proponents of the pay-per-signature idea have long argued it makes the petition process more affordable and creates an incentive for circulators to gather more signatures. In addition, the folks who pay the circulators per signature verify that each signature is valid - from an eligible registered voter - thus providing an extra measure of validity before the petitions are filed with the Secretary of State.

Six other states, in addition to Nebraska, require circulators to disclose to potential signers whether they are paid or a volunteer. Arizona, California, Ohio, Oregon and Wyoming all require that a prominent notice be placed on the petition form stating whether the circulator is paid or volunteer. In Missouri, the circulator must file an affidavit with the Missouri Secretary of



State.

In Oregon, paid circulators must carry a registration form with them indicating that they have taken the state's mandatory training program for paid circulators. Also, volunteer-circulated petitions and paidcirculator petitions are required to be printed on different colored paper.

The topic of pay-per-signature has surfaced again, in a bill (LB367) from North Platte Sen. Mike Groene. The freshman lawmaker is no stranger to the petition process and has been involved in at least one lawsuit to change the situation. He says the seven-year-old prohibition violates free speech and destroys grassroots efforts to get issues on the ballot.

Groene's bill is awaiting the second round of debate after advanc- ing an initiative campaign. He aling from its debut on a 38-0 vote. so cautions that the state could be

The measure was forwarded to the full Legislature on a 7-1 vote after a public hearing in the Government and Military Affairs Committee. Perennial petition supporter Kent Bernbeck and two others spoke in support of the measure during that hearing. The director of the League of Nebraska Municipalities and the head of the Nebraska Grocery Industry Association spoke against the bill.

Committee Chairman Sen. John Murante of Gretna has told his colleagues the right of citizens to petition their government is especially important in a state with a circulators. one-house Legislature where the people serve as the second house. sued if the ban remains in place.

Federal courts have struck down bans in five states - Maine, Mississippi, Ohio, Washington and Idaho - for violating the First Amendment. There are 24 states, including Nebraska, that allow initiative petitions.

Groene used circulators paid by the signature in a 2006 petition drive to cap government spending. The measure made it on the ballot but was defeated by voters. Groene contends that people who opposed the measure then lobbied the Legislature to approve the ban on paid

Colleague Sen. Paul Schumacher of Columbus says he thinks the petition process helps keep the Legislature in line.

I agree. It's time to rise above the personalities and make the petition process better.

And I don't care what context or what spin job Chambers and his defenders put on the Omaha senator's remarks – saying you'd want to shoot ANYBODY, especially a police officer, is wrong. It's especially wrong to suggest such a thing in a public hearing in the state legislature. There should have been a universal outcry by the entire body of the Nebraska Legislature, demanding an apology by Chambers and, if none is received, then a move to censure Chambers should have immediately been carried

Dave Bloomfield had an opportunity to be a part of that correction of this public misstep – and he blew it. Instead, he chose to lecture his cohorts on Chambers' right to free speech, forgetting – or choosing to ignore – that with great power comes great responsibility, and advocating the use of violent force against any human being – especially a representative of our law enforcement community - is irresponsible at best, and encouraging and inciting a riot at worst.

And let's be serious - even in the cases where police officers have used unjustified force against a citizen – to compare that to what ISIS terrorists are doing to peace-minded human beings is like comparing lightning to the lightning bug. I have yet to see any video evidence of a police officer bounding, gagging and then beheading a fellow citizen here in the United States. I've yet to see a situation where a bunch of police officers storm a museum and randomly shoot and kill 100 people. There is not one documented case of law enforcement being tied to any car bombings, burning buildings or other acts of mass violence here in this country.

But, for Bloomfield, it's OK that a fellow state senator can not only make those comparisons, but then say that he'd shoot a police officer if given the opportunity and not be publicly reprimanded for advocating this kind of violence against a member of the law enforcement community.





How to get children to do the chores School Lunches

How do I get my child to do the chores "no fun" by nagging at chores? We hear these statements from parents all the time!


One main reason that children don't respond is when parents make




their children to get them done! Getting your children to get their chores done can become a battle. When parents nag, nag, nag, children will stop listening. The conflict can roar sometimes on to even a bigger battle. Some parents feel that "chores" is a negative word and they should be called "tasks." Either is fine, it depends how whether you use the word negatively or positively.

Here are a few steps to get the chores done.

1. Take a look at all the chores in the house and made a list of chores your children could do that would fit their age. Listing chores that mom and dad do helps let children know that their parents do chores too. Children can do chores from 18 months or older. An 18-month-old child may need guidance each time to help them keep on task and learn

when they need to do their chore. Many times for young children it is a privilege to help mom and dad. At age three children can have regular chores that they need to do each day.

2. Just know they will need help till they can learn the tasks and be able to do it right. You might say, "Clean your room." What does that mean? The task may need to be broken down into steps so they understand. "Let's make the bed first, then pick up the books, then etc.... Now and then there also might need to be reminders how to do the task. If children have not done any chores, then start out with one or two chores till they are able to do these on a regular bases.

3. Charts and check lists are great for kids because they can see when a chore is done and they can see how many times it is done in a week, a month or whatever the time schedule is. You can also reward completing so many days of chores. For very young children this may have to be daily at first and work your way to weekly. I would suggest extra privi-

leges or special activity in place of gifts and money. You might say, "You now can stay up 20 minutes longer tonight since you got your chores done." As a child gets older giving an allowance is okay because that is a great way to start teaching the use of money. All children need to know that chores will always be a part of being a family. Chores are definitely a family affair.

4. Set a time the chore should be done. For best results, have it relate to a time in the child's schedule. such as breakfast, dinner, bedtime, or after school. This helps the child remember when it should be done. It also can be set for a specific time to be competed, if the child is old enough to understand time.

5. It is very important to reward when your child does their chores without being told. This is one thing parents don't do very well. If the child is doing the right thing, we have a tendency to overlook the good behavior.

6. It is better to reward for completion of tasks, but sometimes there should be consequences if the chore doesn't get done. Consequences can come two ways: taking things away or introducing extra tasks to be done.

7. It should be an enjoyable time, so vou mav want to make statements like, "Let's see how fast you can get the table set! Remember you have to do it right." This way you are giving your child positive comments to motivate them to do better.

8. Consistency is also the key. This can be a hard task because many times your days are really busy or daily schedule changes. Just remember when you are home it is very important to keep the chore list going. Both parents need to be clear what the chores are for each child and when they are to be done, otherwise the child will figure out fast who is going to make them do their chores and who is not. This is where consistency breaks down. It has to become part of the daily or weekly routine.

9. Remember parents to do your chores too, because children learn the most from what they see you doing, than what you are telling them to do.



Connecticut is made up of mountains, trees, rivers and poor rocky soil that was difficult to farm. They have short summers and long cold



Thomas Hooker inspired the "Fundamental Orders of Connecticut," which was one of the first written democratic constitutions that established a representative government. This famous constitution was in force for 180 years.

During the Revolutionary War, Connecticut sent more soldiers (in relation to population) than any other colony. In 1782 General George Washington created a medal for bravery in battle. He called it the Purple Heart. The first three recipients were from Connecticut.

In 1794 Connecticut native Eli Whitney perfected the cotton gin and also started a gun factory in present day Hamden. In 1839 Charles Goodyear of Naugatuck found a way to strengthen rubber through a process called vulcanization. The first bicycle made in the United States came from Connecticut. In towns and cities near the sea, shipbuilding became a key industry. Connecticut became the world's submarine capital after the first modern submarine was built in Groton. They also produce world-famous aircrafts there.



Have you ever noticed how one person's mistake can impact many others? One person on the team messes up and the whole team has to run. One person decides to drink and drive and two families and a whole lot of friends have to deal with the consequences. One person's mistake can impact a whole lot of people.

Recently in my devotions I was reading from the seventh and eighth chapter of the Old Testament book of Joshua. The Israelites had just defeated Jericho (remember, the walls came tumbling down). God had told them not to take any of the plunder, but one man by the name of Achan did. He took some gold, silver, and expensive clothing. He then hid it all in his tent.

When the Israelites went to take on the people in the city of Ai they thought it would be pretty easy since it was a small town. But they were defeated and 36 Israelites died. And when Joshua asked God why, God said, "Israel has sinned; they have violated my covenant."



entire nation was considered guilty and had to face the consequences. So Joshua and the Israelites punished Achan and the place came to be called "The Valley of Achor" -"The Valley of Trouble."

Maybe today you find yourself in the Valley of Trouble - maybe because something you have done; but maybe it's because something someone else has done. And it doesn't "Why am I suffering because of

Well, as Paul Harvey used to say, let me tell you the rest of the story. For years and years that place was called the Valley of Achor, but God, through the prophet Hosea, declared that someday that would change. God said, "I will . . . make the Valley of Achor [Trouble] a door of hope" (Hosea 2:15).

Isn't that what we celebrate at Good Friday? That first Good Friseem fair. It doesn't seem right. day didn't seem very good. Instead the hope and forgiveness Jesus ofit seemed to be filled with trouble. It fers.

was a dark Friday; a bleak Friday; a seemingly hopeless Friday. However, we call it Good Friday because of what actually took place there. Instead of one person's sin resulting in the punishment of all; One Man's punishment resulted in forgiveness for all. The One who kept the commandments suffered the penalty so that those of us who have broken the commandments might escape the penalty (see Romans 5:12-21).

Today you might find yourself in the Valley of Trouble. But because of what took place on a cross outside of Jerusalem 2.000 years ago. your Valley of Trouble can become a Door of Hope. And that Door of Hope leads us out of the Valley of Trouble and Suffering to the Valley of Grace and Forgiveness. The place of our greatest failure can become the place of God's greatest glory.

So, this Easter Season, may you take your troubles and your sins and your failures and leave them at the foot of the cross and experience
