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## WSC candidates make their pitches

Three presidential finalists speak in on-campus visits

The three candidates who hope to be the 13th president of Wayne State College saw a good turnout from the community during their open meetings with the public earlier this week.

Dr. Marysz Palezewski Rames, interim president at Dakota State University; Dr. Randall G. Pembrook, vice president for Academic Affairs at Washburn (Kan.) University; and Dr. James E. Williams, vice president for student affairs at Emporia State (Kan.) University, all stated their cases for the position that will come open this summer. Current Wayne State president Curt Frye is set to retire at the end of June after serving as president the last four years.

### Rames focus on retention

Dr. Rames spoke with a reporter-estimated 100 people in Gardner Auditorium Monday morning, discussing her work at the school in Madison, S.D., and answering questions about a variety of subjects related to higher education and Wayne State College.

Dr. Rames stepped in as interim president

during a rather tense moment in the school's history, jumping into the role about a week after the South Dakota Board of Regents dismissed the school's president. She quickly was able to calm down campus fears and get several initiatives addressed, including recruiting of incoming freshmen and transfer students and addressing fundraising concerns.

Dr. Rames told those in attendance that she likes what she sees in Wayne State College and would love to be a part of the future of the school if she is named president.

"I love the mission of the school," she said, adding that she wants to be part of an active community like Wayne and work with faculty, staff, students and the community to help continue the college's success and address challenges for the future.

Dr. Rames expressed an interest in attracting and retaining students, something she made note of her during her work at South Dakota State and in her current interim role at Dakota State University.

"There are plans to grow enrollment and transfer opportunities here, and that's something that I'm excited about," she said. "I also want to ex-

pand the footprint and serve students who are place-bound and can't get to campus here."

Dr. Rames said that retention of students is very important, and she would want to know more about why a campus is losing students and what can be done to reverse that trend.

"No college is going to have a 100 percent retention or graduation rate, because things come up or things happen in a student's life that is out of your control, or it's just not the right fit for them," she said. "But there are always students that we shouldn't lose, and we should focus on them."

Dr. Rames said there are opportunities to expand Wayne State's footprint outside of its traditional area, suggesting that the school could improve its enrollment by marketing itself outside the area into places like rural South Dakota, as well as improved efforts to draw community college graduates in the state who are looking to transfer to a four-year school.

"We should be the institution of choice for those students who graduate from community college and want to continue their education in a four-year school," she said. "Community college

## Retiring president to speak to grads

Wayne State College will hold commencement for graduate and undergraduate students Saturday, May 9.

The graduate ceremony will be at 9:30 a.m. in Rice Auditorium and the undergraduate ceremony will be at 2 p.m. in the Willow Bowl, Wayne State's outdoor amphitheater. President Curt Frye, who is retiring in June, will deliver the commencement address at the undergraduate ceremony.

The graduate ceremony at 9:30 a.m. in Rice Auditorium will confer degrees on 107 students, which includes master's degrees in education, business administration, organizational management, curriculum and instruction-instructional leadership, and educational specialist degrees.

The undergraduate ceremony will feature multiple awards honoring excellence among the college's faculty, alumni and supporters, as well as the commissioning oath of a second lieutenant who has completed Wayne State's ROTC program. There are 439 students graduating with their bachelor's degrees.

### Graduate Invocation

Samantha C. Parolek will deliver the invocation at the graduate ceremony. She is graduating with a master's degree in cur-

riculum and instruction - instructional leadership.

Parolek, originally from Clarkson, works as the high school assistant cross country coach, middle school girls basketball assistant coach, and middle school girls track head coach at Douglas County West Community Schools in Omaha. She is the daughter of Ron Parolek of Clarkson and Janice Parolek of Columbus. Her younger brother, Zachary, will be graduating with a bachelor's degree from Wayne State.

### Graduate Commencement Speaker

Brenton Patrick Hoelsing of Missouri Valley, Iowa, will deliver the commencement address at the graduate ceremony. He is graduating with an education specialist degree in school administration/educational leadership.

Hoelsing is earning his third degree from Wayne State. He graduated with a bachelor of science degree in 2008 and a master of science degree in 2011. He was a varsity letterwinner in golf as a Wayne State undergraduate and was the recipient of the Nebraska State Business Education Association Student-Teacher of the Year award in 2009.

er Gustafson, and three children.

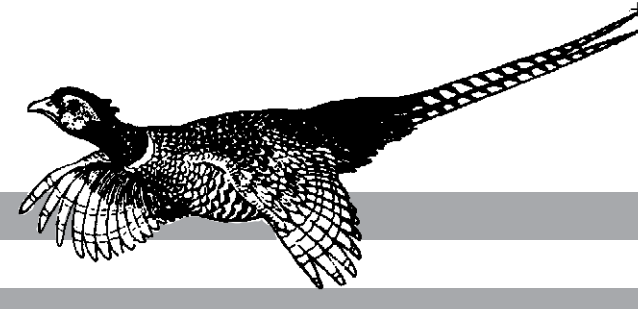

## City sees lowest monthly tax payout since 2013

The City of Wayne received its lowest monthly payment of local sales tax revenue since September of 2013.

The city's April revenue report, based on sales during the month of February 2015, came to \$48,203.69. That is the lowest amount received by the city in one month since September of 2013, when the city received \$47,782.23.

For the first seven months of the fiscal year, the city has received just under \$400,000, averaging \$57,042.69 per month.

Joyce's great uncle, Adam Pilger, served an instrumental role in the creation of Wayne State by introducing a bill in the House of Representatives on Jan. 23, 1909, to purchase the Normal School in Wayne for the state of Nebraska. The bill was passed on March 18, 1909, and was signed by the governor April 6, 1909. The Normal School at Wayne became Nebraska Normal College at Wayne in 1910. The name was later changed to Wayne State Teachers College. Nic and Joyce raised two daughters and have three grandchildren. Joyce lost her battle with cancer on January 10, 2008.

Windeshausen graduated from University of Nebraska in 1954 with a bachelor of science degree in accounting, a master's degree in finance in 1955, and a Ph.D. in marketing and management in 1962. Joyce graduated from Wayne State College in 1941 with an associate of arts degree in education and received her bachelor of science in education from the University of Nebraska.

Honorary doctorates granted by Wayne State include Esper Boel and Nebraska Gov. Kay Orr in May 1985; Charles Trimble in May 2002; Alex G. Spanos in 2003; Hilda Neihardt in July 2004; and Dr. H. Nicholas Windeshausen.

# TKE gets conditional nod from Wayne State College

In a news release received early Wednesday, Wayne State College officials announced that they have approved conditional recognition of the Lambda-Chi chapter of Tau Kappa Epsilon (TKE) at the college, effective April 20, to Jan. 31, 2016.

The TKE fraternity had been suspended by the college in December of last year for activities related to the use of alcohol.

Official association and connection between the fraternity and Wayne State was conditionally approved under the terms of a plan of action submitted to the college by the fraternity. During this period of conditional recognition, the organization is permitted to engage in recruitment, membership, social or other fraternal activities and operations, and to use the college's name, image and logo as well as to represent itself as affiliated with Wayne State.

"I have been impressed with the response of the student fraternity leaders and the assistance and guidance provided by Wayne State fraternity alumni," Dr. Jeff Carstens, vice president of student affairs and dean of students at Wayne State said in the release. "There is clear support for and appreciation of the positive contributions a strong, effective fraternity can have on the lives of undergraduate men. The fraternity has developed a plan of action that addresses the College's concerns as well as puts the chapter on the road to growth and success. I look forward to working with the fraternity into the future."

The fraternity's action plan includes making the off-campus chapter house in Wayne alcohol-free, effectively banning alcohol from the premises for any reason by any person. The chapter also agreed to alcohol education, risk management

education, and membership education on TKE's Blueprint Program, which focuses on membership education throughout all four years of the undergraduate experience.

A review will be conducted by the chapter and Wayne State College in January 2016 to evaluate compliance with the plan of action and determine the future of the fraternity at the college.

"I am encouraged by the understanding the college has reached with the fraternity members," said Wayne State President Curt Frye. "I am delighted that they took a hard look at issues with the local chapter and worked diligently to identify a plan that puts education at the forefront of their efforts to bring the fraternity back into the range of opportunities offered to our students."

 students fall in love with the personalized education experience they get, and a lot of larger institutions falter in that area."  
 Dr. Rames also said the school can maintain its status as an affordable institution as well.  
 "Once the states and federal government cut back on funding, the first thing these state institutions did was raise tuition, and the minute you do that, you take out a group of students who can't afford to come here, and that would be a travesty for us," she said. "It's important to have a strategic plan, and Wayne has one, and make financial decisions to stay focused on that and keep costs down. It's an important point if we're going to continue to serve our students here."

**Pembrook encouraged by alum**  
 Dr. Pembrook said that a meeting with a dean at Washburn with a Wayne State connection helped convince him that he should apply for the position.  
 Clark Coco, the dean of the Washburn University Institute of Technology, is a WSC alum and was talking about his experiences here when he asked why he was interested in his time there.  
 When told that Pembrook had been contacted about applying for the position, Pembrook said that Coco encouraged him to apply.

"He talked about how Wayne State meant everything to him and his career, and talked about the people here, and he said I should look into it," he said.  
 Pembrook said he liked the college's reputation and complimented the school's strategic plan, and he said the president should be the one who helps communicate the college's message to the public and to would-be students who are looking for a special place to get their postsecondary education.

"Clark is a pretty convincing guy, and there's something special in what he said about this community," he said. "The position of president is really important in that you have to be out there talking about Wayne State and what it stands for and the great things that are going on here."

Pembrook said that keeping tuition costs low are important, and one of the things a college president can do is be more involved in fundraising efforts for endowments and scholarships.  
 "At Washburn, we've been very successful in telling our story and have an endowment of almost \$170 million, which generates a lot of scholarship dollars," he said. "The president should be out trying to raise money for endowments so we can have more support for students."

He also said the president should be a liaison between the school and the state college board to help with communication issues, something he says he's noticed in his short stay in Wayne.

"I've been here less than 24 hours and could sense there is some tension," he said, adding that he would want to get a better understanding of the tension within the system and see how both sides are perceiving the picture.

"The president needs to be able to communicate in both directions," he said. "There's a balance there, and it's important for the president to bring that message to the system and remind the campus about what the system is doing for them."

Pembrook said he likes the overall atmosphere of the college and hopes that he can become a part of it.

"I like hanging around dedicated people who want to change the world and make it a better place, and I get the feeling that's what the people here at Wayne State want to do," he said. "Who wouldn't want to be part of something like that?"

**Williams says much to offer here**  
 Dr. Williams said he has been more than impressed with the atmosphere of the campus and congratulated those in attendance on what Wayne State College has built.  
 "As my wife and I came into town and we had the chance to look at what this college has to offer, you have a lot to celebrate," he said. "And if anything comes out of this process, I hope that it's a moment where you

pat yourselves on the back, because the opportunity for the next president of this college is phenomenal."

Dr. Williams said he works very closely with retention efforts in his position at Emporia State University, and said Wayne State College has some vital data that can be used to help enhance their retention efforts as well. He encouraged the school to look into the role the community plays in engaging students on campus, and to take a close look at the issues that lead to students not completing their education and what the school can do to eliminate those roadblocks.

Williams also talked about the ongoing issues between the school and the state college system, saying he would want to get away from the "don't want to play in the same sandbox" mentality.

"I think we have to sit down and figure out what's causing the concerns," he said. "It's a necessary and important conversation to have, and I would want to take the voice of the faculty and articulate that to the system, and I would also need to take the voice of the system and get that back here to the campus so it can be vetted. We may not get the decision we want, but we have to be able to have the assurances that the voices were listened to and there has to be trust built that the message was brought forward."

Williams said he would make every effort to spread the message of Wayne State College as the next president.

"I'm not going to be the chief development officer, but by golly I'm going to be the chief cheerleader and talk about the vision we have and the traditions we've built and how we're going to honor those traditions moving forward," he said.

He said he got to witness some of the college's success in athletics, pointing to the recent regional tournament where Wayne State and Emporia State both competed, and he said athletics and the arts are an important element in a college's success.

"We have to continue to be supportive and appreciative of athletics and the arts and all of these opportunities," he said. "All these co-curricular engagement opportunities are a chance to highlight our students and highlight the success they bring to the institution. It ties into the energy and the enthusiasm in getting donors and alumni to come back to campus and celebrate the institution."

The Nebraska State College System board will select a new president to replace the retiring Frye later this spring.

The NSCS Board of Trustees chose to honor the Kanters to recognize their major financial support and because they are individuals who bring honor to the college system by their values and work ethic.

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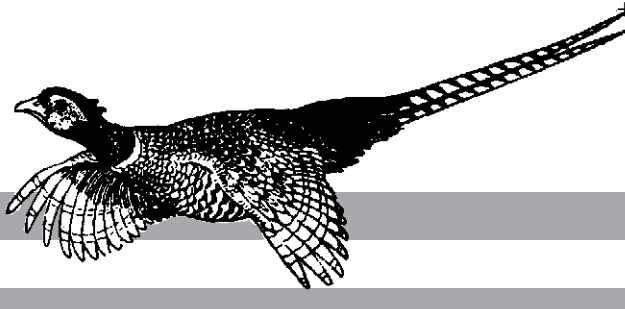

Bormann was 3-for-3 with a homer, double and three RBIs, Williams had three hits and scored three runs, and Lexie Loos saw her 18-game hitting streak come to an end, going 0-for-4 in the opener.

In the nightcap Wayne State got seven runs in the first two innings, including a two-run homer and a two-run double by Bormann, to jump out to a big lead early. They added a run in the fifth on a solo homer by Megan Hagemann that ended the game on the eight-run rule.

Bormann went 2-for-4 with four RBIs and King and Melanie Aleya each had two hits to lead a 12-hit attack. Bormann fired a four-hit shutout, striking out four.

Megan Hagemann had a huge day at the plate, smashing home runs in each game as Wayne State swept Concordia-St. Paul 9-4 and 9-3 in women's softball action Saturday in St. Paul, Minn.

Wayne State hit double digits in both games and moved back over the .500 mark with a 10-0, 10-7 sweep of University of Sioux Falls in baseball action Wednesday in Sioux Falls, S.D.

In the opener, John Roberts threw five shutout innings and helped his cause by going 2-for-3 with two RBI's and two runs, extending his hitting streak to 16 games. Nathan Ackerman and Albert Johnson each had two hits, with Johnson driving in two runs. Alex Kraft also hit a two-run homer, Curtis Bussard tripled and Chris May doubled to highlight a 12-hit attack.

In the nightcap, Wayne State scored two in the seventh and two more in the ninth to finish off the sweep. Wayne State scored five in the fourth, thanks to two-run singles by Michael Herman and Tanner Simons. After Sioux Falls regained the lead, Wayne State got a two-run single from Herman in the seventh, then added a two-run double by Simons to complete the sweep.

Wayne State used walk-off hits to take care of Upper Iowa and win both ends of a baseball doubleheader by identical scores of 4-3 Saturday at the Chapman Complex.

In the opener, a single by Quinn McGill was the difference in the Wildcat win, helping give Eric Browning a complete-game win after the junior hurler fanned 10 games.

Wayne State scored on a wild pitch in the first inning and added another run on a Peacock fielding error to lead 2-0 after three innings. The Peacocks came back with a run in the sixth and two more in the top of the seventh to take a 3-2 advantage.

Wayne State responded with a two-run rally of their own in the bottom of the seventh. Albert Johnson singled and Chris May followed with a bunt single. Kevin Anderson walked to load the bases, and Johnson came home on a sacrifice fly by Nick McIntee to tie the game. After an intentional walk to Curtis Bussard, McGill came through with a single to center to give Wayne State the win.

In the nightcap, Upper Iowa jumped out to a 3-0 lead in the sixth before Wayne State tied the game with three in the bottom of the sixth, thanks to a two-run double by John Roberts and an RBI double by Michael Herman.

Upper Iowa had a chance to tie the game in the top of the eighth, but Nick Ragan came on in relief of Connor Keating and got out of a bases-loaded jam. In the bottom of the ninth, Alex Kraft blasted a shot down the left field line for a solo home run, giving the Wildcats the win.

Wayne State salvaged a split in its final weekend home doubleheader of the season Sunday, beating Upper Iowa 4-1 in the opener before the Peacocks came back for a 7-4 win in the finale at the Chapman Complex.

In the opener, Dylan McGill tossed a complete-game two-hitter and struck out 11 to improve to 6-0 on the season. He walked one batter and gave up an unearned run in dominating the Peacocks on the mound.

Ackerman's two-run double gave McGill all the runs he'd need. Ackerman scored on a wild pitch to make it 3-0 after one inning, and Zak Leighton scored on a fielder's choice in the sixth to close out the scoring. McGill and Leighton each had two hits to lead a nine-hit attack.

In the second game, Upper Iowa got out to a big lead early, leading 7-0 after 2 1/2 innings before the Wildcats got on the board with two runs, coming in on a Herman groundout and an Johnson single. Starting quarterback Zach Osborn guided the offense to scoring drives on both of his possessions in the first half, a six-yard pass to Nick Roth on the opening series followed by a Ryan Ludlow 22-yard run on the other series led by Osborn in the first half.

The defense forced a pair of three-and-out series in the first half on series run by backup quarterbacks Layne Sullivan and Taylor Reedy, both redshirt freshmen.

The second half saw the defense step up, forcing four three-and-out series in the seven series that were run in the second half. Sullivan led an impressive scoring drive for the lone touchdown in the second half, capping the drive with a 31-yard option keeper for the score.

Sullivan was the top rusher in the spring scrimmage with five carries for 52 yards and a touchdown. Ryan Ludlow followed with 34 yards on 10

attempts and one TD. Other rushers included Lane Yates with 18 yards on seven carries, Alex Kline recorded 17 yards on seven rushes with Osborn gaining 10 yards on three attempts.

Throwing the ball, Osborn started the day completing 8 of his first 10 passes before finishing 10-of-17 with one touchdown. Redshirt freshmen Layne Sullivan and Taylor Reedy were 4-for-7 and 3-of-9, respectively.

Jonathan Parks was the top receiver with four catches for 69 yards, followed by tight end Eric Lammers with four grabs for 47 yards. Redshirt freshman Jacob Hjorth had three catches for 26 yards with Nick Roth accounting for two catches for six yards and one TD.

The Wildcat defense recorded two sacks and had seven pass breakups. Linebacker Nate Kroupa had a team-high six tackles followed by Jon Davis and Nathan Weatherby with four stops each. Redshirt freshman Jamaal Conway-Smith added three tackles, one sack and one pass breakup.

Wayne State will open the 2015 season at home on Saturday, Sep. 5, hosting Minnesota Crookston in a 1 p.m. game at Bob Cunningham Field in Wayne.

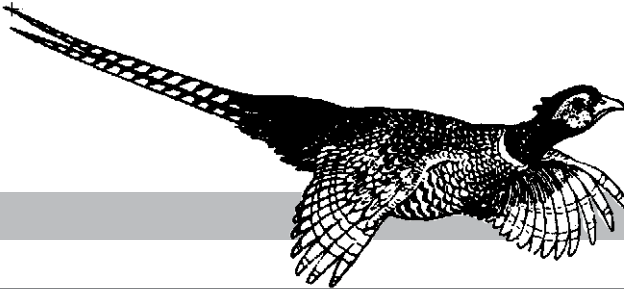

# One priority bill that is worthy of consideration

Some Nebraska state legislators seem intent on beating dead horses by attempting to pass priority bills that are lacking in common sense and are dangerous to the people of the state.

The bill goes after every aspect of the sex trafficking industry, which is a multi-billion dollar operation that hits a lot closer to home than some people here may fully comprehend.

Sex trafficking is particularly prevalent along Interstate 80 and in the big cities of Lincoln and Omaha, but there have been instances of prostitution-related transactions taking place in other small towns around the state as well. Go to any truck stop along the Interstate, and it's not unusual to find runaway children being pimped out to people, and these children are forced into sexual situations they have no business being a part of.

Our children are under constant attack in today's sexualized world, and nowhere is it more ugly or violent than in the sex trafficking industry. Kids are forced into sexual situations, given drugs and alcohol to help them let down their defenses, and threatened with physical violence. Many of these kids, literally, have their identities taken away from them by these evil individuals who have created this horrible industry. Their cell phones are taken away, their ID's are confiscated and they literally become reliant on the traffickers who make their money off of these lost boys and girls.

Scheer's priority bill toughens sentences for those who are involved in the trade. At the same time, it helps victims who are forced into the business of sex slavery and allows for more subpoena authority to go after those who attempt to do these transactions online through sites like Craigslist.

The sex trafficking industry is a huge operation. Whenever a major event happens in a big city, powerful people with money and sick, twisted sexual fantasies want to satisfy their urges in a way that can only be provided by those who engage in the sex trafficking trade. Prior to Super Bowl XLVIII, a major crackdown on sex trafficking took place in New York City that resulted in the arrest of hundreds of individuals involved in the trade. You can bet that something similar to this happens in Omaha during such events as the College World Series or the annual Berkshire Hathaway convention.

If LB294 gets through the Legislature, the state of Nebraska will have the tools needed to not only bring these evil pimps to justice, but provide for victims to seek civil damages against their attackers and get the help they need to overcome this horrible experience.

It's exactly the kind of legislation Nebraskans need to maintain The Good Life we are known for. It's good to see at least one state senator in our area making an effort to get real legislation passed this session without giving a dead horse one more good whipping.

# Governor is promising vetoes

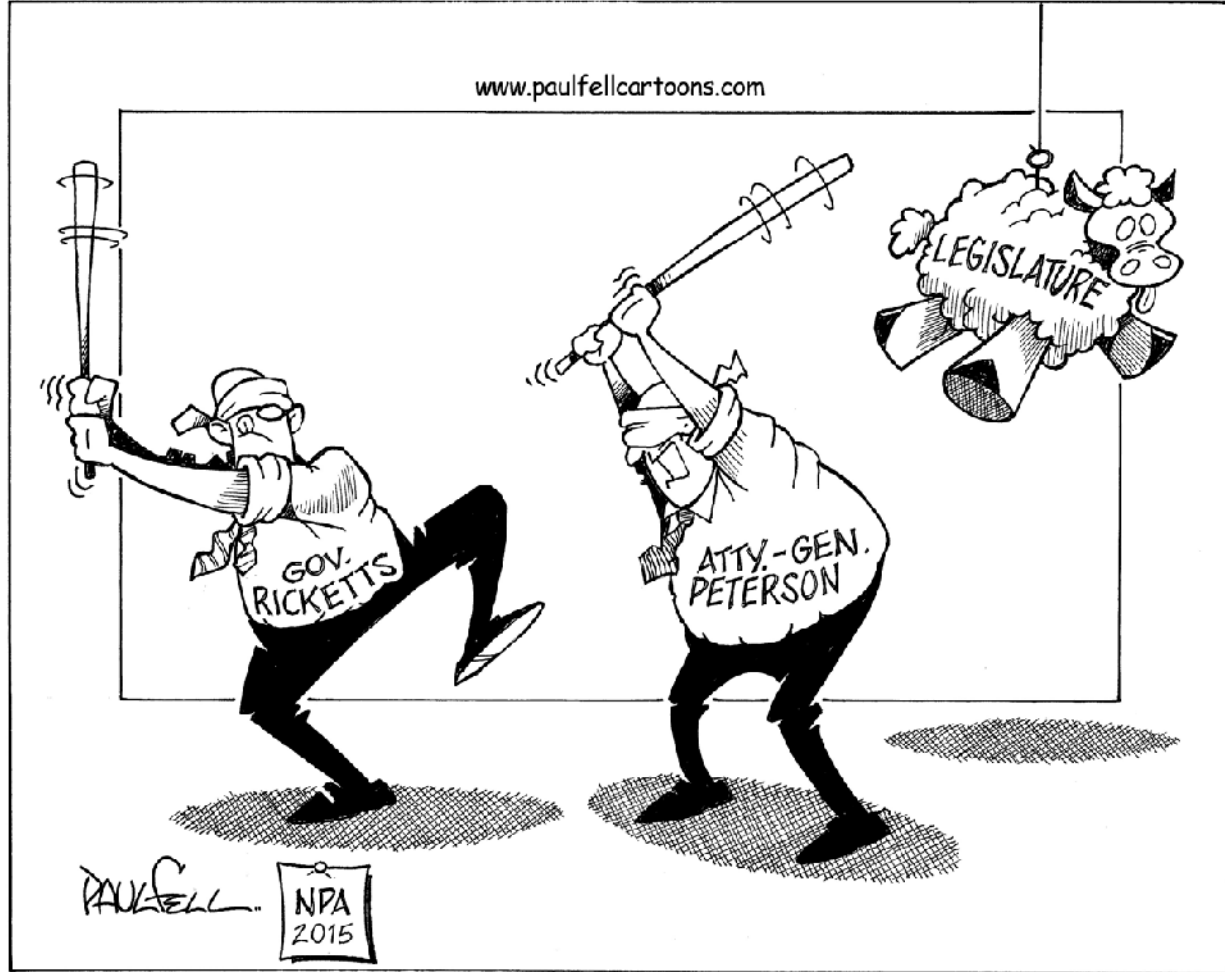
When you're a hammer, everything looks like a nail.

Quick, name a politician who has ever campaigned on being soft on crime. So, it comes as no surprise that Governor Pete Ricketts and Attorney General Doug Peterson and a handful of prosecutors would come out in support of "public safety" with harsh words for a Legislature they characterize as being soft on crime. This is the same Legislature that has convened several special committees to investigate a troubled correctional system that has released some inmates too soon, kept others in solitary confinement too long and outright refused to recognize the mental health needs of at least one violent offender.

We'll forgive Governor (Veto) and Attorney General (Hammer) because they are newbies. The prosecutors are . . . well they just prosecute. And the Legislature, well they have vast experience wrangling with the issues and applying the reform measures that were dictated by the results of the interim studies. Just doing their jobs to the best of their abilities and they get constant veto threats from the Executive branch.

It's the governor's prerogative to veto bills. Let's just hope it's nothing personal (he told the Journal Star's Don Walton he doesn't take his relationship with the Legislature personally) and that he actually weighs the validity of measures. Note, criminal justice reform and the repeal of the death penalty (which advanced from first round debate April 16 on a 30-13 vote) aren't the only bills he has promised to veto. Driver's licenses for the children of illegal immigrants and expanded medical coverage for poor people are also on the chopping block.

The Legislature is trying to salvage a prison system that was under pressure from the previous governor to reduce population — apparently in an attempt to avoid a federal review and the likelihood of being forced to build a new prison. Under the guidance of the Judiciary



Committee, lawmakers are looking at who gets sent to prison and for what reason and for how long. Adjustments in mandatory minimum sentences and classifications of certain types of crime are worth consideration. And, what about alternative programming? Are there crimes which can be "punished" with probation, community service, house arrest and halfway house living? I would argue a resounding YES!

I still remember when then-state corrections director Joe Vitek gave me my first tour of the state penitentiary in the 1970s. His exact words — "You know the trouble with this place? There are too many crooks in here, and they aren't all behind bars." That's a call for prison reform. So let the lawmakers handle it and stop your media posturing Governor Veto and Attorney General Hammer.

Then there's the death penalty. Governor Veto says that Nebras-

kans have been telling him that they support the death penalty. Really? I thought they were only telling him that they wanted tax relief. I'd like to see some polling instead of taking his word for it.

Quick, name one victim of an inmate who is currently on Death Row. That's hard to do because we spend so much energy focusing on the perpetrators that we lose empathy for the victims. But you can rest assured that the victim's families and friends deserve some respect and attention in the aftermath of the tragic events.

Governor Veto says he'll veto any attempt to repeal the death penalty in Nebraska because its repeal represents a real threat to public safety. He argues that the repeal would end important legal protections that have served law enforcement and the public well.

Quick, when was the last execution in Nebraska? If it's not being enforced, it is no better than an ir-

ritated parent threatening to send their misbehaving child to their room. It's not a deterrent, get rid of it!

Governor Veto lumps "the early release of convicted murderer Nikko Jenkins and sentencing miscalculations (and) incendiary comments made in a committee hearing by State Senator Ernie Chambers" in his call for more focus on public safety.

Let's remember that Nikko Jenkins asked not to be released because of his uncontrollable violence and requested mental health treatment. His pleas were ignored. Sentencing miscalculations were made by state employees who ignored a Supreme Court opinion. At least two black men (in other states) have been killed by white police officers since Ernie's comments.

I think the head of the Executive Branch and the state's top attorney would do well right now to concentrate on their own bailiwicks.

# Death penalty bill will see discussion

In the upcoming weeks, we will undoubtedly be discussing LB268, which changes the maximum penalty for first-degree murder from the death penalty to life imprisonment without parole. The bill was once again brought by Sen. Ernie Chambers of Omaha and advanced easily from General File.

This is an issue I have struggled with — there are cases when I feel the death penalty is warranted but then I wonder if there is any case, in which the State should be taking a life. For those of you that read this newsletter I would like you to contact my office to let me know your thoughts on the death penalty and

if we should keep it or move to life in prison without the possibility of parole.

Another bill that easily advanced to Select File this week was LB72, introduced by Sen. Paul Schumacher of Columbus. LB72 looks at the

use of revocable trusts by individuals who plan for retirement and the use of Medicaid for long-term care. Currently, if assets are placed into a revocable trust five years or more before application, they are not considered when deciding the eligibility of that individual for Medicaid. After the death of that individual, the trust is seldom looked at to help reimburse Medicaid. This process has been used to protect assets from the cost of long-term care expenses such as nursing homes.

Under LB72, trustees would have to settle-up with the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) before assets in the revocable trust can be split amongst the designated heirs. LB72 also requires the courts to notify HHS of any hearings addressing inheritance taxes, which could be considered a sign that there are assets available to reimburse Medicaid.

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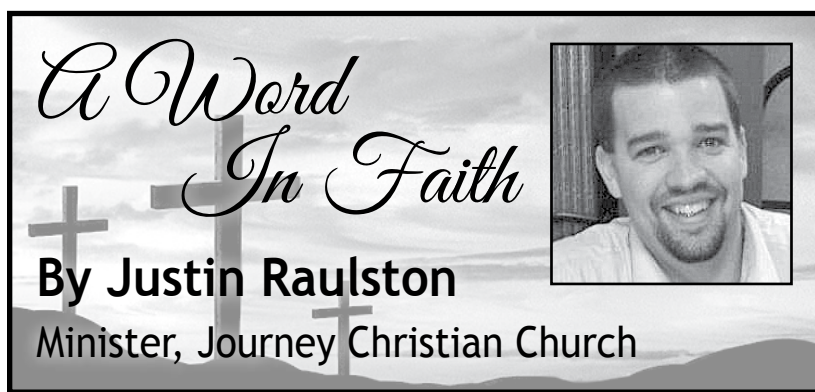
When was the first time you were amazed by something that seemed "bigger than life"?

Maybe you went to the Grand Canyon as a kid and were amazed by the vastness of God's creation. Sometimes, it's seeing your dad do something that you, as a kid, can't imagine doing yourself. The ocean, a thunderstorm, or the redwoods of California seem "bigger than life."

For me, the first time I walked into something that seemed bigger than life to me, was when my friends family took me to Memorial Stadium for my first-ever Nebraska Cornhuskers game. We walked out of the tunnel going towards our seats, and I saw the sprawling green of the field, the giant sea of red of the fans, and was in complete and utter amazement of the scene before me. As a little kid, it was truly bigger than life.

The older we get, the less we seem to be amazed by the things around us. We explain the mystery out of so much of life, and we get bogged down by the details, by the individual "trees" of life, that often we miss the grandeur of the entire forest around us.

The writer of Psalm 139 brings us back to the bigger picture around



us: "You have searched me, Lord, and you know me. You know when I sit and when I rise; you perceive my thoughts from afar. You discern my going out and my lying down; you are familiar with all my ways. Before a word is on my tongue you, Lord, know it completely. You hem me in behind and before, and you lay your hand upon me. Such knowledge is too wonderful for me, too lofty for me to attain. Where can I go from your Spirit? Where can I flee from your presence? If I go up to the heavens, you are there; if I make my bed in the depths, you are there. If I rise on the wings of the dawn, if I settle on the far side of the sea, even there your hand will guide me, your right hand will hold me fast . .

. For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearful and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well. My frame was not hidden from you when I was made in the secret place, when I was woven together in the depths of the earth. Your eyes saw my unformed body; all the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be. How precious to me are your thoughts, God! How vast is the sum of them! Were I to count them, they would outnumber the grains of sand - when I awake, I am still with you." - Psalm 139:1-10 and 13-18.

The writer reminds us that we,

our life, is a part of something much bigger than ourselves. We are created by a God much bigger and more vast than we could imagine, and because of that, the moments that make up our lives have a greater purpose, a much bigger purpose than we could have ever fathomed, because they are all a part of God's much bigger plan.

Your life matters, our lives together matter, and how we live them out for the glory of God is a part of something much bigger than we could have thought, and when we are able to view it from God's much bigger perspective it will be a sight that is more beautiful, more breathtaking, and more awesome than anything we will have ever seen.

Our marriages, our parenting with our kids, our going to work, or to school, or that community activity, to even our being at home on a Saturday afternoon, are all part of something bigger than us, created by a God who is bigger and better and whose plan is greater and more far reaching than we ever could have imagined.

Pastor David Zirpel, Kyle Schutte, Karen Grieme and Jan Null spoke about the efforts to raise money for an orphanage called Bibi's Hope in Bamako, Mali, West Africa. Jan Null's grandson, Jake Stephens, was stationed there in 2012 while guarding the Embassy. He was only 10 minutes away from the orphanage and came to know Bibi who started it 20 years ago. She was born Muslim but while visiting the USA, she became a Christian and was confirmed in 2014 at Redeemer Lutheran Church in Sioux City.

She, as a Christian, is in grave danger while caring for these children and since the war began, all international adoptions and funding has stopped. There are nearly 200 children and 40 of them are infants. Because of the Muslim con-

trol in the area, female babies are disposed of and unwed mothers are killed so they abandon their babies. With \$29,400 toward the goal of \$65,000, a new orphanage has begun. ## Book remembers 2014 Pilger tornado

Tornado survivors, disaster responders and volunteers share their stories in a book recently released. "Eighty-one Seconds: The Attack and Aftermath as Tornadoes Hit Pilger, Stanton, Wakefield and Wisner, Nebraska" tells the stories of those involved as tornadoes severely impacted four northeast Nebraska communities in June of last year. Author LaRayne Topp completed more than 200 interviews of those involved in the events: those directly hit by the storm; law enforcement, emergency management, and others who responded; along with personnel from assisting agencies, volunteers and others.



"Eighty-one Seconds is not intended to be a comprehensive book of all affected," Topp said. "That would be an impossible task, but the stories included give readers an idea of what happened on June 16 and several months following." The book's title refers to the time it took the tornado to storm through the community of Pilger. Since Pilger is about a quarter section in size, that's the same time it would have taken a tornado to demolish a 160-acre farm out in the countryside as tornadoes stormed from Stanton to Wakefield. "I'm extremely appreciative of those who shared their stories,"

Topp said. "It wasn't always easy for them to talk about what happened." In the Wayne area, the books are for sale at Lazy Acres Décor and Floral in Wakefield; Acquaintances in Wayne; True Value, Prime Stop, Two Blooms and a Bud, and Wisner Pharmacy, all in Wisner. They can also be purchased through Amazon.com as a book or e-book. A portion of book sales will be directed to the Northeast Nebraska June 2014 Long Term Recovery Team, assisting Pilger, Stanton, Wakefield, Wisner and other communities hit with extreme weather in June of 2014.

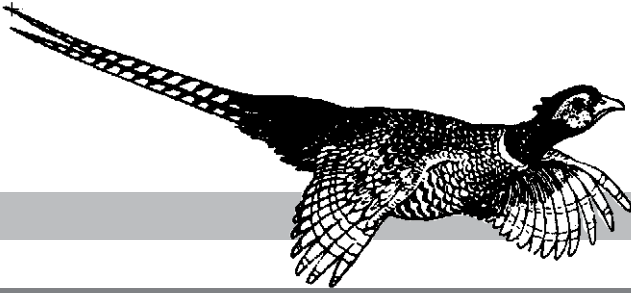

ros are basically supporting the campaigns, to the tune of millions of dollars.)

The surveys are sometimes live; the caller says we are going to answer a few quick questions about who we are going to vote for. None of their business! Or, it's automated and you can push 1 for one candidate and 2 for the other.

But the calls that really get my goat are the weekly notices that

say our credit card is not in any difficulty, but that, if we act fast, we can lower its interest rate! The calls come from all over the country; today's was from San Diego.

They also come at all kinds of odd times, like on Saturday evening or Sunday morning. The worst time, as far as I'm concerned, is during the time when I want to take a nap! I frequently take the phone off the hook for that hour or so, because when I don't, it invariably rings just as I'm dozing off.

Last week, it was just past one o'clock in the afternoon and the Big Farmer was down for the count. It always gets very quiet then, with the TV off, the paper read, and I usually get sleepy then, too. So, I went to the bed in the other room, pulled back the cover, and prepared to indulge myself.

The first call was the survey, which I hung up on. The second, two minutes later, was the credit card! They always say to push 3 to end these calls, but it never works! Who in the world is instigating them? And can't we get Congress to make them illegal? No, that would take too long. I will do what my friends do and let the machine pick them up.

## Soybean planting depth and plant populations discussed

We are into or approaching soybean planting in our area. In the last few years, on farm research plots have looked at two basic questions. How deep should you plant soybeans and how many soybeans should you plant per acre? For a full discussion of the results, go to cropwatch.unl.edu.

In summary, research conducted at UNL looked at several factors including soybean populations and planting depths over a three-year period (2011-2013). This research was conducted at different locations over the years including Clay Center, Lincoln, Cedar Bluffs, and Mead. These site-years represent a wide range of early season growing conditions, from wet-cold to dry-warm; hence, results are applicable over a wide range of conditions. They also represent conventional, strip-till, and no-till systems

All soybean plots were planted into 30-inch rows with planting dates of May 30 and June 4, 2011; May 1, 2012; and April 29, 2013. Later planting dates in 2011 were due to cold-wet planting conditions in conventional-till fields and the inability to get into those fields earlier. Planting depths of 1 inch and 1.25, 1.5, 1.75, 2.0, 2.25, and 2.5 inches were evaluated in 2011 and an additional planting depth of 2.75 inches was added in 2012 and 2013. Plant populations also were evaluated with each planting depth; these included seeding rates of 35,000; 70,000; 105,000; 140,000; 175,000; and 210,000 seeds/acre.

Many farmers plant soybeans shallow (as long as moisture is present) thinking that this will result in quick emergence. While that may be the case, shallow planting also may reduce stands. One of the study's hypotheses was that planting deeper would buffer soil temperature and moisture and protect newly emerged seedlings from frost and freeze damage, particularly when planting early in the season.

The results in fact showed the optimal planting depth was around 1.75 inches. The data also showed that this planting depth was consistent for all site-years of the study. Shallow depths of less than 1.25 inches with seeding rates of 35K-105K resulted in lower yields, as did deeper planting depths of 2.25 inches or greater at these seeding rates. Across all site-years, regardless of early or late planting dates

or tillage type, a planting depth of 1.75 inches maximized soybean yields.

Since 2006, farmers in the Nebraska On-Farm Research Network have been conducting on-farm soybean seeding rate research. Their objective has been to determine if they could maintain yields while reducing seeding rates and thus, curtail rising seed costs.

Based on five years of consistent research results, it's recommended to reduce planting populations from an average of 160,000 seeds/acre to 120,000 seeds/acre in 30-inch rows. This reduction of 40,000 seeds per acre results in a savings of \$10.66 to \$18.57 per acre based on seed costs of \$40-\$65 a bag. Producers were able to achieve a 90 percent stand or greater all years except for one location at 180,000 seeds/ac in 2008 (which was 88 percent of planted stand). The five years of studies were primarily conducted in silt-loam or silty-clay-loam soils. Reduced seeding rates have not been tested via our on-farm research studies in sandy or high pH soils; thus, these recommendations may not apply to those situations. Also, it may be necessary to increase populations slightly in drilled beans.

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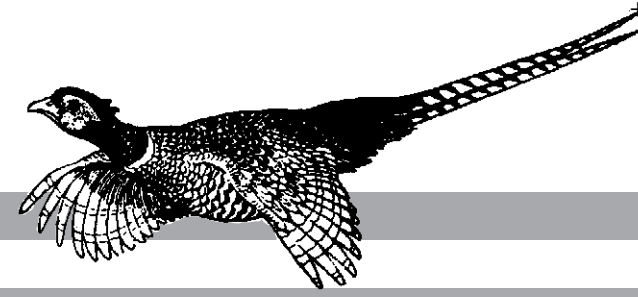

### ORDINANCE NO. 2015-14 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING WAYNE MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 90, ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL, BY AMENDING SECTION 90-10 DEFINITIONS; TO PROVIDE FOR THE REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES OR SECTIONS; AND TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska:

Section 1. The Planning Commission held a public hearing on March 2, 2015, and recommended amending Section 90-10 Definitions of the Wayne Municipal Code, with the "Findings of Fact" being:

> Staff recommendation; and  
> Consistency with the Comprehensive Plan and the current and future land use maps.

Section 2. That Chapter 90, Article I, Section 90-10 of the Wayne Municipal Code is hereby amended as follows:

Sec. 90-10. Definitions.  
**Agriculture means the planting, cultivating, harvesting and storage of grains, hay or plants, commonly grown in the vicinity. The raising and feeding of livestock and poultry shall be considered an agricultural venture if the area on which the livestock or poultry is kept is ten acres or more in the area and is such raising of livestock and poultry is incidental or supplemental to the raising of crops.**

**Farm means an area which is used for growing of the usual farm products such as vegetables, fruit, and grain; and the storage on the area, as well as for the raising of the usual farm poultry and farm animals. The term includes the operating of such area for one or more of such uses with the necessary accessory uses for treating or storing the produce, however, the operation of any such accessory uses shall be secondary to that of the normal farming activities and such accessory uses must not include the feeding of garbage or offal to swine or other animals.**

**Feedlot means the confined feeding of food, fur or pleasure animals in buildings, lots, pens, pools or ponds which normally are not used for the raising of crops or for grazing animals. The term shall include the confined feeding of animal units, with one animal unit being equivalent to one head of feeder/fat beef, or dairy cattle; one horse or pony; one llama; two head of swine; two dogs; three ostriches; three emus; five head of sheep and/or goats; 25 turkeys, chickens, ducks, or geese; or an equivalent number of other animals as determined by the board of zoning adjustment. Feedlots shall also be classified according to the registered capacity, as registered with the zoning administrator. The registered capacity of such feedlots shall be as follows:**

- First-class feedlot—1,500 or more animal units
- Second-class feedlot—750 to 1,499 animal units
- Third-class feedlot—321 to 749 animal units
- Fourth class feedlot—Any operation consisting of 160 acres or less shall be permitted two animal units per acre.

*Crop Production:* The raising, harvesting, and storing of tree crops, row crops, or field crops on an agricultural or com-mercial basis. This includes buildings used to store equipment necessary for crop production and bulk grain storage. This definition may include accessory retail sales under certain conditions.

*Animal Production:* The raising of animals or production of animal products, such as eggs or dairy products, on an agricultural or commercial basis, or the raising of animals for recreational/pleasure use. This use includes buildings used to house animals or store equipment necessary for animal production. Typical uses include grazing, ranching, dairy farming, and poultry farming. The term shall include the confined feeding of animals.

*First Class Animal Production:* One (1) animal unit is equivalent to: 1 head of cattle or cow/calf pair.

*Second Class Animal Production:* One (1) animal unit is equivalent to: 1 head of cattle or cow/calf pair; 1 horse or horse/foal pair; 1 llama; 1 head of swine; 1 ostrich; 1 emu; 5 head of sheep and/or goats; 3 turkeys, ducks, or geese; 10 chickens.

*Third Class Animal Production:* One (1) animal unit is equivalent to: 1 head of cattle

or cow/calf pair; 1 horse or horse/foal pair; 1 llama; 1 head of swine; 1 ostrich; 1 emu; 3 head of sheep and/or goats; 2 turkeys, ducks, or geese; 5 chickens.

Section 3. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect after its passage, approval, and publication as provided by law.

### ORDINANCE NO. 2015-15 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING WAYNE MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 90, ARTICLE III. AGRICULTURAL DISTRICTS, DIVISION 2. 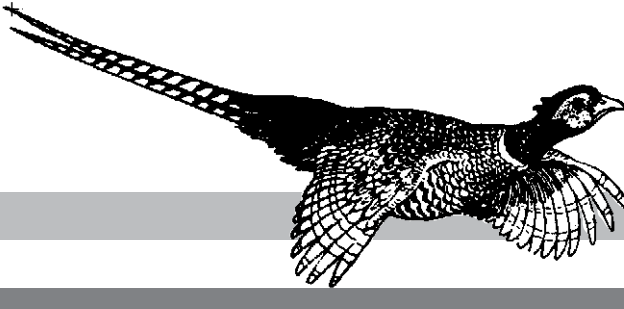

Tree Board Chairman Marcia

Rastede welcomed everyone, announced that Allen had been named a Tree City USA recipient for the 22nd year, and reviewed the four requirements to qualify as a Tree City USA. With the help of the fourth grade, she then presented a power point emphasizing maple trees.

Included was information about the many species of maple trees, the tree shapes, leaf shapes, seeds/whirlybirds, products made from maple wood which included the gymnasium floor, and emphasis on maple syrup.

She used pictures taken this spring at an actual maple tree tapping grove and evaporator in Wisconsin. The fourth grade, in addition to holding items made from maple wood such as guitars, bowling balls/pins, and pints and gallons of maple syrup, enjoyed waffles with maple syrup in their room earlier in the day. Following the maple syrup power point, she touched on a topic of importance to many states already--the invasion of the emerald ash borer.

She showed pictures and told of the beetle and larvae and how to prevent its spread. It has been found in Kansas, Missouri, Minnesota, and Iowa so it inevitably will come to Nebraska and kill some of the 44 million ash trees in Nebraska. The assembly concluded with encouragement for everyone to look for the whirlybird or helicopter seeds soon to be falling from maple trees and identify maple trees in the area.

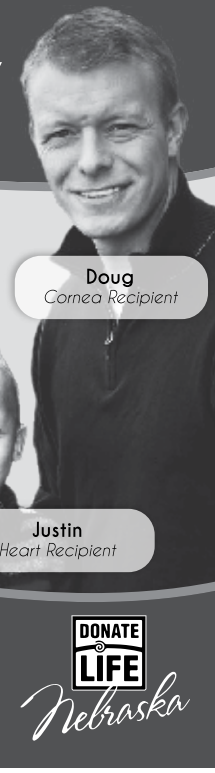
