Local business gives \$12,000 to Overin rebuild

Pat Melena and Steve Lutt, both members of the Rebuild Hank organization, accepted the donation.


"With this donation (we will have raised) somewhere around \$60,000-65,000," Mele-

Progress being made in Avian inluenza cleanup

Director Greg Ibach announced that the depopulation of birds with, or exposed to, highly pathogenic H5N2 avian influenza (HPAI) in Dixon County is now complete.

According to Ibach, a total of 4.9 million laying hens and pullets were humanely depopulated and composted at five farms owned and operated by the same producer in Dixon County. Four of those farms had confirmed cases of HPAI, while the producer voluntarily depopulated the birds at the fifth farm in an effort to contain the spread of the virus within their operation.

A backyard flock of less than 100 mixed fowl, with epidemiological connections to the five farms, and located within the 6.2 mile quarantine zone established by NDA, also tested positive for the virus. These birds were also depopulated

and buried on that property.

On Friday, Nebraska Department of Agriculture (NDA) ceived from local, state and federal agencies," Ibach said. "I personally want to thank our staff for their hard work, dedication and long hours they put in to help prevent further spread of the virus. I also want to thank those within several key organizations who played a critical part in the response.'

Ibach said Governor Pete Ricketts signed an emergency declaration, and that gave the Nebraska Emergency Management Agency, Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality, Nebraska State Patrol, Nebraska Department of Roads and the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services additional flexibility to play vital roles in assisting NDA. He also said county emergency management teams were instrumental in daily operations in both Dixon



disinfection efforts," Ibach said. "I'd like to thank each of these partners for their support and contributions to addressing this disease.

With the depopulation process completed, the work of cleaning and disinfecting each building and the equipment found in those buildings can begin in earnest. According to Ibach, USDA contracted crews have arrived in Dixon County to facilitate and oversee those cleanup efforts. After successful completion of the cleaning and disinfection process, environmental tests will be conducted to ensure the presence of the virus has been eliminated. When that testing is successfully complete, the producer will be able to repopulate its operation.

NDA staff will be returning to regular duties, while an individual specializing in composting protocol will remain on site in Dixon County to monitor the compost piles daily to ensure proper temperature levels are being maintained

Working on Next Year's **Budget** Over the next several weeks I'll

mention some of the budget questions ahead of the city council for the next near. We always start work on the next year's budget in January at our annual strategic planning retreat. The city's fiscal year begins every Oct. 1. We have two sets of budgets:

City Government - streets. police, library, fire department, civil defense, city recreation, activity center, senior center, swimming pool, parks, public buildings and administration.

City Utilities - water, sewer, electric and transfer station

number of certified officers was cut from 9 1/2 to 9 in 2003 and from 9 to 7 in 2011 and remains at that level. The wage ranges for our officers and dispatchers are set each year at the midpoint of the wage ranges for the same job descriptions in an annual third party survey of other Nebraska towns in this market and or of similar size. We use the same procedure for all of our city full time and part time job descriptions.

Through agreements with Wayne County and Wayne State College, we are reimbursed about \$105,000 annually for dispatch and/or police services we provide to them. Fire Department: The Wayne

Department is authorized to have 45 volunteer fire fighters but currently has 37. The history of the five most recent Fire Department total budget expenditures is: 2010/11 $-\$81,088;\ 2011/12-\$513,271$ (replaced old ladder truck); 2012/13 -\$109,108; 2013/14 - \$135,873; current budget - \$129,739.

Familiar faces add coffee to their business interests

The familiar faces behind the huge success that is Rustic Treasures have branched out, stepping outside the doors of thrifting and consignment...right next door

Lucas Rix and Mark Kanitz made the decision to purchase The Coffee Shoppe after the previous owner, Cathy Varley, decided she was ready to sell.

After moving locations last summer, Rix and Kanitz

had kept the doors between the two businesses open to encourage customers to head over for a cup of coffee after browsing and to invite Coffee Shoppe customers over to peruse the aisles while sipping their mochas.

"The most influential piece in us wanting to purchase The Coffee Shoppe is to better serve our Rustic Treasures customers," said Kanitz.

The benefit both businesses saw from it was enough for the guys at Rustic Treasures to know they would be interested in the business if Varley ever wanted to sell. And as luck would have it, she did.

In order to enable customers to move freely between the two businesses, Kanitz and Rix adjusted the Coffee Shoppe's hours to match those of Rustic Treasures better. This change allowed for a big change, the addition of lunch served Saturdays.

"We were getting several requests from our out-oftown shoppers where was a good place to eat? This way we will be able to offer food and drink right on location with similar hours as Rustic Treasures," Rix said.

There weren't many changes to the menu, though in the future the owners are looking into offering dessert options, perfect for that afternoon snack craving. Former Rustic Treasures employee Lucas Fedde moved from the store to serve as the full time chef and food manager. Fedde graduated in May from Wayne State College with a Foods and Nutrition degree, making him a perfect, and natural, fit for the job.

Fedde is joined by three baristas and most of the time at least one of the owners is also there to oversee

To ensure the success of their employees, Rix and Kanitz took on the project of doing some remodeling to the establishment, including replacing several appliances in the kitchen. Other parts of the renovation include new flooring, new tables and chairs and turning the current display windows into additional seating.

"The remodel was very successful, the business was only closed for 24 days," Kanitz said. "Every surface in the building was touched in one way or another."

Running two businesses so different from one another has posed challenges, and making the transition between the two has been the most difficult of all. "At Rustic Treasures all items are sold on consign-

ment, so at the end of the day you are making commission," said Rix. "The Coffee Shoppe is different because you are carrying food inventory--the most difficult inventory to manage. But these challenges have paled in comparison to what the two have gained by buying the business. Not

only have they learned how complicated but fun, coffeedrink making can be, they have seen just how supportive Wayne's community can be. "The community has been very supportive of young

entrepreneurs lighting up downtown and that's exactly what it takes to make a small business work.' The two are incredibly passionate about the commu-

nity and the downtown area and it shows. They have successfully helped to put Wayne's Main Street on the map and this move can only be seen as a way to make that map-dot bigger.

to effectively eliminate the virus. The compost piles will remain in place at the affected properties until regulatory officials confirm the process has eliminated the virus from the compost material. Once the virus has been successfully eliminated the compost can be utilized for its nutrient value.

As part of NDA's ongoing surveillance work, a total of 48 farms with

mile radius of the affected farms remain under quarantine. Those flocks have all undergone one round of avian influenza testing with no further cases of the virus detected. Those flocks will undergo another round of testing in July, and if the virus is not detected at that time, NDA will begin the quarantine release process for those farms.

"While we are cautiously optimis-



- 4. Analysis and evaluation. 5. Celebration.






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


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






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Ring ring. Buzz buzz. Tweet tweet. Knock Knock. Ding. Dong. Zing. Zap. Zoom.





SEWER CLEANING NOTICE — June-July 2015

During the next two to three weeks, the City of Wayne Sewer Department will be having sewer mains cleaned in various parts of the City. The majority of the sewer cleaning will take place in the area between 1st and 2nd Street between Douglas and Sherman, Pine Heights from 8th to 10th Street, north of Claycomb Road, Providence Road going north, and the entire Sunnyview area.

In this process, high pressure water is forced through the sewer pipe to clean it. This pushes solid materials to the manholes so they can be removed by vacuuming. This entire process is necessary to keep obstructions out of the sewer system and insure proper drainage of waste.

Residents should be aware that when this process is done, the high pressure water pushes the air in the sewer line which occasionally enters the private sewer lines into homes and businesses. If this happens, it can result in the air exiting through the toilet bowl, shooting the water out of the toilet bowl. This air should exit through the sewer vent of the building, but inadequate venting or location of toilets can cause the air to exit through the toilet. This is a rare occurrence and keeping the lid closed on the toilet during this time will keep most of the water in

If you have any questions about the sewer cleaning process or the areas the sewer main cleaning will take place, you can call the Wastewater Treatment Plant at 375-5250 or City Hall at 375-1733.



Dismayed over library budget cuts

ing the library budget was discussed, and I was dismayed to learn asked to cut \$100,000 from its proposed budget of around \$310,000.

Statistics on patron use in the council information packets show use is increasing and also show that increases in staff have been modest in spite of the new roles the library plays. How can the library maintain services with a cut of over 30 per-The library board and the librar-

ian have identified \$60,000 in cuts and have already implemented some serious cuts that are impacting library services. Library aide hours have been reduced from around 90 per week to 40-50 per week. The hours of the assistant librarians were already reduced by the city in order to avoid paying health care benefits. Library aides are now averaging eight hours per week. Some have already left for different positions and others probably will in the future. These are people who have education, skills, experience, and training that make them valuable employees. Their job descriptions now include cleaning the library. 'Tis the season: Caution, road construction ahead

It's July. The corn is getting taller, the soybeans and other crops are thriving after a wetter than usual

spring. The road construction crews are out in full force and motorists are complaining that you can't get there from here ... without delays. Key among the projects overseen

by the Nebraska Department of Roads is 184 miles of Interstate 80. From Exit 8 at Bushnell in western Nebraska's Panhandle to Exit 453 at South 24th Street and U.S. 75 in Omaha. There are no road closures, just lane closures, but there are sure to be delays as the official speed limit drops from 75 mph to 55 mph or slower in work zones. Fines for speeding double when workers are present.

I've often wondered about the conversations going on inside the cars, especially ones with license plates from either the left or right coast. Are these folks just hellbent on getting across Nebraska, or are they actually marveling at the scenery? Do they understand the importance of the farmers and the livestock in the fields and the grain elevators that rise like sentinels of economic prosperity in many of the towns along the path?

Is it still about the journey? Or just the destination?

For a young Army lieutenant colonel named Eisenhower, a trek across the United States in 1919 from Washington, DC, to San Francisco with a convoy of 81 Army vehicles, was about the journey. Coupled with his World War II experience years later in Germany – where he noted the Nazis moving with ease across the "broader ribbons" of highways - Eisenhower began to understand transportation.

In 1956, as President of the United States, Dwight Eisenhower cited the 1919 convoy and his World War II experiences to persuade Congress

Act, creating what is now known ing 80 mph. So construction is to be as the interstate highway system, which is nearly 60 years old. That original convoy, which followed the path of the Lincoln Highway, averaged 6 mph, or 58 miles a day, and took 62 days to make it to San Francisco. Think about that the next time you see the orange cones and have to slow down to 55 mph

or slower.

The interstate system now comprises nearly 50,000 miles. The completion of the system, at a cost of \$129 billion, was a cooperative federal-state effort with each state managing its own program for location, design and construction to Something that big and that old is

expected.

As a college student in the 1960s, I remember elation at the opening of every new stretch of I-80 that would make our trips from Scottsbluff to Lincoln and back again go a lot faster and safer. I knew a lot of guys who worked summer construction jobs on that project to pay for college. I am as guilty as the next person in taking that highway system for granted today. And yes, I have grumbled about the construc-



In the first ruling, SCOTUS ruled in favor of a key provision of the Affordable Care Act (ACA) affirming nationwide subsidies for poor and middle class Americans. In the 6-3 ruling the court was

asked to interpret the portion of the law that said that tax credits are authorized for those who buy insurance on marketplaces that are "established by the state." The questions came because most states, like Nebraska, did not create their own exchanges rather they participated in exchanges established by the federal government.

As of March, about 6.4 million people across the country are reported to have been receiving subsidies to assist in covering the costs of their health care in 34 states, which had not established their own marketplaces. Had the court ruled the other way those individuals would have lost their subsidies worth roughly \$1.7 billion a month.

The fact remains that the ACA is a broken and costly program that needs to be fixed. While I am all for

The second ruling came Friday, and SCOTUS ruled that state same-sex marriage bans are unconstitutional.
