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# City airs frustrations with trail delay

Mayor Ken Chamberlain and members of the Wayne City Council made their frustrations known with the Nebraska Department of Roads' decade-long delay in constructing the second phase of the city's walking

During Tuesday's City Council meeting, Jeffrey Soula, an urban engineer with the Nebraska Department of Roads, was peppered with questions from frustrated city officials regarding Phase 2 of the city's walking trail, which was originally planned in 2004 and has since been in a state of perpetual stall mode with the Department of Roads.

The project had been stalled for a number of years before Mayor Ken Chamberlain said he talked with then-governor Dave Heineman about moving the proj-

dressing, which has further delayed the project and frustrated city officials and those who want to see the walking trail's next phase completed.

"Some of the items that were found to not be sufficient were the right of way where the trail goes right up against the property line," Soula told the board, adding that plans were based on what was presented a decade ago and needed to be updated to note where trees or fencing along the trail line might be at risk. Time limits for some of the easement agreements had also run out as well.

"So what are the odds of seeing construction begin in 2016." Chamberlain asked Soula.

Soula said that he planned on having the revised plans submitted to the Department of Roads by July 17, and once those plans are approved, they can begin work on getting right-of-way easements appraised and ect along. The project was nearly ready for bid letting negotiate with landowners along the trail. While he

That didn't sit well with Councilwoman Jill Brodersen, who questioned the further delays in a project that is already more than 10 years old.

"It's taken us 11 years to get to this point," she said. "Why another 10 months from now when it's been 11 years? What can we do to move this project along?"

Soula explained that the right-of-way easements that were donated by landowners along the route have expired, so they will have to renegotiate with those landowners

The original agreements included some things we wouldn't want to do going forward," Soula said. "Our current policies are telling us that we can't include certain items to get someone to sign off as a donation. That person may not want to donate going forward, and if they get compensation for it, their neighbor might want to get paid, so we have to go back and look at everything again."

Most of those agreements were on a three-year basis Chamberlain noted. Soula said that, at the time, it was reasonable to do that, as typical project development takes about three years.

Soula encouraged city officials to continue talking with the consultants who are involved with the project to make sure it continues to move along.

"I feel we're being neglected," Brodersen later said. "There is bigger and better stuff that the Department of Roads seems to be focused on, but this is a part of the quality of life for our town and something we point to when people ask what Wayne has to offer.'

Chamberlain also noted that a lot of people are passionate about the walking trail and spend a lot of time on the trail, and they would love to see it completed so they can walk the full trail.

"You need to take this all the way up to the boss' boss and let them know we want this done," Councilwoman

# Chickendale Dancers strut their stuff at Chicken Show

The recent Avian Flu outbreak may have forced the removal of live chickens from the 35th annual Wayne Chicken Show – but that doesn't mean there won't be some live "roosters" in town this

One of the highlights of the annual parade is the float carrying the Chickendale Dancers, and the group is celebrating its silver anniversary as part of the Wayne Chicken Show in much the same way they always have:

Anonymously.

The idea for the creation of the 'Dales was conceived on a street of the longtime Chickendale dancers who – of course spoke on condition of total anonymity.

"Two guys were standing there chewing the fat, and one had a revelation and said You know what we should do is to get a bunch of fat guys to dance on a float and we can call them the Chickendales," he said. "Then we decided that it would be good if nobody knew who they were, so the paper bags came about and when that happened, the Chickendales flew the coop and became the legend that they are

The group – which will never be confused with the Chippendales male dance revue – made its first appearance in the Chicken Show parade back in 1991

and became an instant hit for the crowds who lined the streets of downtown Wayne. Prancing and gyrating along to disco music,

they are easy to spot – and almost impossible to recognize. "In the early years, there were rumors that Norman Schwarzkopf may have been one of the founding members," our informant said. "There has been quite a parade of dancers over the years, and some of those alumni are reportedly planning on returning. We may have to perform on a bigger trailer than we have in the past."

In the early years, the 'Dales rotated a number of dance songs corner near the entrance of Wayne State College, according to one as they paraded up the route, but our "rooster on the inside" said that it became difficult to give people the same show

> as they traveled up the parade route. "In the early years, we had a wide variety of music, but nobody ever got to see the same thing," he said. "Macho Man' is the song you want to see the 'Dales with, and so we decided on playing that song over and over, and it's a new audience as you go along the

parade route." A number of roosters have been able to join the brotherhood of Chickendale dancers, and it's even become a family affair for some.

"We have four generations of Chickendale dancers in one family," our rooster crowed. "A great grandpa, grandpa, father and son have all donned the masks over the

And the masks are more than a simple cutting out of holes in a paper bag. The roosters gather a couple of days before the parade and use templates that have been created over the years to cut out the proper eye holes and add extras such as beaks and colorful ties to finish off the Chickendale ensemble.

# County to assist PMC with expansion plans

Providence Medical Center will be able to begin a two-year, \$13.125 million expansion project with the help of the Wayne County Commissioners.

The county board unanimously approved two resolutions that will help the hospital fund the project at no cost to the county. By issuing revenue bonds, the county will be able to assist the hospital with funding for the project, with the hospital responsible for payback of the loan at no cost to county taxpavers.

Christine Klinker, a representative of Gilmore and Bell, which is working with the hospital on the project, told the board that the hospital was asking the county to issue the bonds on its behalf for the renovation project. The county would not spend any funds for repayment of the bonds, as the hospital would be responsible for repayment of the bonds.

The request was being made to take advantage of lower tax-exempt interest rates on the bonds. A nonprofit entity like the hospital needs a government entity to issue the bonds on its behalf, and the county

is authorized under state law to issue the bonds. The issuance of the bonds would be pursuant to a loan agreement between the hospital, the county and the bank that will buy the bonds, she said.

The county can issue up to \$10 million in revenue bonds each year and has already committed \$1.5 million toward county road and bridge improvements. The \$8.5 million in tax-exempt interest bonds would be issued, with the remaining bonds at a higher, taxable interest.


Providence Medical Center chief financial officer Kim Hixson said the hospital hopes to break ground on the hospital expansion project in August. Plans are to expand the emergency room and trauma areas, expand the labor and delivery area, upgrade lab and radiology areas, expand the dining room, renovate existing patient rooms and upgrade major electrical systems.

The project, which is expected to take 24 months to complete, would add about 5,600 square feet to the facility, which was origi-

nally constructed in 1975. In other action, the board:



Iowa. This gave them the opportunity to learn about parking up hills and one-way streets," he said.

He said he felt having three students in a car at a time was a good way for all of the students to get experience, whether they were the driver or a passenger.

Carnes said he felt it was a great responsibility to teach the classes and said his purpose was to save the lives of those students. He said that feeling of responsibility didn't always go away when the students completed the program. "I have always felt that parents

are a big influence in the lives of their kids, especially when it comes to things like using seat belts and speeding. I have really been impressed with the attitude of parents toward driver's ed," he said.

Carnes said that he feels one of the biggest problems for drivers today is texting and driving and hopes laws are enacted to make it illegal.

"In the time it takes to send a text, a car travels the length of a football field and the driver's eyes are off the road for that length of time. That is not safe," he said.

"My wife, Pat, has been a great help to me. She did a lot of the pa-

Throughout the years, Carnes worked to bring in speakers on topics relevant to young drivers. He also worked with Providence Medical Center through a program known as ENCARE in which hospital personnel talked with the students on what happens when medical personnel are called to the scene of an accident.

Carnes said that when it came to the point that he was teaching a third generation of the same family, he decided it was time to pass the torch and let others do the teaching.

"There are capable people to take over the program and I believe it will only get better."

"Everybody gets into harmony the same way the wild chickens used to do it, and it's a consistent manufactured costume that's harder to do today, mainly because there are fewer paper bags around. Seeing a guy dancing in a plastic bag just isn't the same."

While the names of the Chickendale dancers aren't known, their legend has spread the world over, including a photo on the inside cover of the November 1998 edition of National Geographic magazine.

This year's dancers will be incorporating new technology, the rooster said. A GoPro camera will be worn by at least one of the dancers, providing a unique view from the stage of what the 'Dales see in the crowd as they perform.

"It's going to be an epic performance," the anonymous rooster said. "It's an organic swelling of chicken manhood, and we'll have a float full of them.'

#### same-sex marriage ruling Area magistrates to discontinue weddings By MICHAEL CARNES Of The Herald

Area counties to comply with

As of press time late Wednesday morning, the Wayne County Clerk's office has issued three marriage licenses in the last week, but has yet to issue a marriage license to a gay And while county officials say

they will abide by a recent Supreme Court ruling that allows for gay couples to marry one another, they will not be married by any county official at the Wayne County Court-

KimBerly Hansen, clerk magistrate for Wayne County Court and an employee of the State of Nebraska, told The Wayne Herald late Wednesday that she will no longer perform any wedding ceremonies at the courthouse.

Hansen referred to a Nebraska Judicial Ethics Committee opinion to the question as to whether or not a judge or clerk magistrate can refuse to perform marriages for samesex couples based on sincerely-held religious beliefs that marriage is between one man and one woman.

In the summary to the opinion, the committee concluded as follows:

. . . When the Supreme Court's decision in Obergefell (v. Hodges) takes effect, a judge or clerk magistrate may not refuse to perform a same-sex marriage notwithstanding the judge's or clerk's personal or sincerely held religious belief that marriage is between one man and one woman. A refusal to perform the ceremony but providing prejudice based on a couple's sexual orientation and is prohibited. A judge or clerk magistrate may avoid such personal or religious conflicts by refusing to perform all marriages, because the performance of marriage ceremonies is an extra-judicial activity and not a mandatory duty. who chooses to only perform mar-

riage ceremonies for close friends and relatives is not obligated to perform ceremonies for those who are not close friends and relatives, as such a practice is not based on a discriminatory intent, a judge or clerk magistrate who performs marriages only for close friends or relatives may not refuse to perform same-sex marriages for close friends or rela-

Wayne County Commissioner Randy Larson said that the county's clerk magistrate has made a decision independent of the county's stance, which has not been discussed by the three-member board.

"I'm disappointed by the inference in the media that this was a county decision," he said. "We have not talked about it as a county board. It's an individual decision, and I know other counties have decided on the issue but we, as a board, have not discussed it."

Larson said the county courthouse is still available for weddings if couples – gay or straight – choose to get married there. He said that will not change until the county board rules otherwise. The board did not discuss the matter during their regular meeting on Tuesday.

Wayne County Clerk Deb Finn said that the county issues between 70-75 marriage licenses annually, and will issue marriage licenses to all couples. Nothing has changed in the process aside from the documents. their last event of their senior year. Carly Fehringer had an outstanding college career at Wayne State

College, ning numerous All-Amerhonors for her efforts,

The competitive fires still burned in the heart of the 23-year-old Wayne High graduate, though, and it took her about two weeks to decide that she wasn't through com-

"With the success that I had and a great coach (WSC throws coach Brett Suckstorf) who pushed me, I was away for about two weeks," she said. "I took a break after nationals, and Brett said to take a month off and that if I wanted to keep doing it I'd be back, and it was about two weeks later before I started lifting

The year's worth of training paid off, as Fehringer was able to compete in the U.S. National Track and Field Championships this past month in Eugene, Ore. She took part in the women's hammer throw, finishing 13th out of 18 competitors.

To get ready for the event, Fehringer spent the better part of 12 months training and competing as an independent athlete with the Team Nebraska track club, based out of Omaha. The 2014 WSC graduate in criminal justice trained at the college while working part-time in the college's campus security department, then competed in a number of open meets during the indoor season in the winter and the outdoor season in the spring.

"In college, I was involved in multiple events like the shot and discus, but now I just compete in the hammer throw, so the training is a little different," Fehringer said. "I don't need to do a lot of the tricep and shoulder workouts like I did when I competed in other events, so I could concentrate on doing the things that would help me improve in the hammer throw.

Fehringer hit her best mark of 214 feet, 9 inches at the Concordia Invitational in Seward this past spring. The throw wasn't enough to automatically qualify (a minimum throw of 219-9 3/4 was required), but when only 13 throwers reached that mark, the field was filled with the best remaining throwers, and

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
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
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# Juniors fall in division final, get ready for area tourney



# Potato leafhoppers, sprayer calibration discussed

Potato leafhoppers have the potential to hurt alfalfa in Nebraska every year. This is generally a second and third cutting pest and has been common in Nebraska recently. Southerly winds bring this insect into Nebraska, as is does not overwinter here. There have been a lot of strong southerly winds the last couple of weeks, so it is probable we have potato leafhoppers in the state. So, it is time to begin scout-

These small (1/8 inch long), bright green, wedge shaped insects may cause severe damage to alfalfa by injecting a toxin into the plant as they feed. This feeding results in a distinctive yellow or purple triangle shape at the tip of the leaf. First year spring planted alfalfa fields are particularly attractive to and vulnerable to potato leafhoppers, as are fields planted last year. In older fields, these insects are usually a problem on second and third cuttings. Newly developed resistant varieties will protect from potato leafhoppers fairly well, but alfalfa in the seedling stage may still be damaged. All fields should still be scouted, as large numbers of leafhoppers may still cause a problem, even in resistant variety fields.

Uneven pressure throughout the sprayer boom can mean uneven application of pesticides. The first step in sprayer calibration is to determine that the spray pressure is equal throughout the spray boom.

Be sure to check pressure all along the boom because there might be a restriction in the line and uneven pressure. If the pressure is not even through the boom, you'll be wasting your time trying to calibrate the sprayer.

Check and compare the cab pressure with boom pressure. If there is a difference, make note on the cab's pressure gauge how much higher or lower the boom pressure is so you will know the exact operating pressure of the sprayer.

Set up the pressure gauge with quick-attach fittings that can snap in place on the nozzle fitting. Select glycerin-filled stainless steel gauges, as lesser quality gauges won't

nozzle spacing is just as effective if 110-degree nozzles are used. Most new air-induction nozzles are only available in 110 degrees. Another reason for 30-inch nozzle spacing is that most farmers are still planting 30-inch rows. If you want to use drop nozzles, add extensions to have drop nozzles. Thirty-inch nozzle spacing also allows for 50 percent larger nozzles. That, in turn, provides for using lower application rates without going to extremely small nozzles. Avoid nozzles that require less than a 50-mesh nozzle screen because smaller screens tend to plug.

Nozzle Flow Rate: This is determined by the nozzle orifice size, pressure, and solution density. Remember that anything heavier than water will come out more slowly than water and anything lighter than water may come out faster. Adjust the sprayer accordingly.
