## City airs frustrations with trail delay

Mayor Ken Chamberlain and members of the Wayne City Council made their frustrations known with the Nebraska Department of Roads' decade-long delay in constructing the second phase of the city's walking trail.

During Tuesday's City Council meeting, Jeffrey Soula, an urban engineer with the Nebraska Department of Roads, was peppered with questions from frustrated city officials regarding Phase 2 of the city's walking trail, which was originally planned in 2004 and has since been in a state of perpetual stall mode with the Department of Roads.

The project had been stalled for a number of years before Mayor Ken Chamberlain said he talked with then-governor Dave Heineman about moving the project along. The project was nearly ready for bid letting until recently, when an official with the Department of

Roads abruptly noted several issues that needed addressing, which has further delayed the project and frustrated city officials and those who want to see the walking trail's next phase completed.

"Some of the items that were found to not be sufficient were the right of way where the trail goes right up against the property line," Soula told the board, adding that plans were based on what was presented a decade ago and needed to be updated to note where trees or fencing along the trail line might be at risk. Time limits for some of the easement agreements had also run out as well.

"So what are the odds of seeing construction begin in 2016," Chamberlain asked Soula.

Soula said that he planned on having the revised plans submitted to the Department of Roads by July 17, and once those plans are approved, they can begin work on getting right-of-way easements appraised and negotiate with landowners along the trail. While he didn't give an exact date, a best-case scenario would

put construction work at a date sometime in the summer of 2016.

That didn't sit well with Councilwoman Jill Brodersen, who questioned the further delays in a project that is already more than 10 years old.

"It's taken us 11 years to get to this point," she said. "Why another 10 months from now when it's been 11 years? What can we do to move this project along?"

Soula explained that the right-of-way easements that were donated by landowners along the route have expired, so they will have to renegotiate with those landowners.

"The original agreements included some things we wouldn't want to do going forward," Soula said. "Our current policies are telling us that we can't include certain items to get someone to sign off as a donation. That person may not want to donate going forward, and if they get compensation for it, their neighbor might want to get paid, so we have to go back and look at everything again."

Most of those agreements were on a three-year basis, Chamberlain noted. Soula said that, at the time, it was reasonable to do that, as typical project development takes about three years.

Soula encouraged city officials to continue talking with the consultants who are involved with the project to make sure it continues to move along.

"I feel we're being neglected," Brodersen later said. "There is bigger and better stuff that the Department of Roads seems to be focused on, but this is a part of the quality of life for our town and something we point to when people ask what Wayne has to offer."

Chamberlain also noted that a lot of people are passionate about the walking trail and spend a lot of time on the trail, and they would love to see it completed so they can walk the full trail.

"You need to take this all the way up to the boss' boss and let them know we want this done," Councilwoman

## Chickendale Dancers strut their stuff at Chicken Show

The recent Avian Flu outbreak may have forced the removal of live chickens from the 35th annual Wayne Chicken Show – but that doesn't mean there won't be some live "roosters" in town this weekend.

One of the highlights of the annual parade is the float carrying the Chickendale Dancers, and the group is celebrating its silver anniversary as part of the Wayne Chicken Show in much the same way they always have:

Anonymously. The idea for the creation of the 'Dales was conceived on a street corner near the entrance of Wayne State College, according to one of the longtime Chickendale dancers who – of course – spoke on condition of total anonymity.

"Two guys were standing there chewing the fat, and one had a revelation and said 'You know what we should do is to get a bunch of fat guys to dance on a float and we can call them the Chickendales,'" he said. "Then we decided that it would be good if nobody knew who they were, so the paper bags came about and when that happened, the Chickendales flew the coop and became the legend that they are today."

The group – which will never be confused with the Chippendales male dance revue – made its first appearance in the Chicken Show parade back in 1991 and became an instant hit for the crowds who lined the streets of downtown Wayne. Prancing and gyrating along to disco music, they are easy to spot – and almost impossible to recognize.

"In the early years, there were rumors that Norman Schwarzkopf may have been one of the founding members," our informant said. "There has been quite a parade of dancers over the years, and some of those alumni are reportedly planning on returning. We may have to perform on a bigger trailer than we have in the past."

In the early years, the 'Dales rotated a number of dance songs as they paraded up the route, but our "rooster on the inside" said that it became difficult to give people the same show as they traveled up the parade route.

"In the early years, we had a wide variety of music, but nobody ever got to see the same thing," he said. "Macho Man" is the song you want to see the 'Dales with, and so we decided on playing that song over and over, and it's a new audience as you go along the parade route."

A number of roosters have been able to join the brotherhood of Chickendale dancers, and it's even become a family affair for some.

"We have four generations of Chickendale dancers in one family," our rooster crowed. "A great grandpa, grandpa, father and son have all donned the masks over the years."

And the masks are more than a simple cutting out of holes in a paper bag. The roosters gather a couple of days before the parade and use templates that have been created over the years to cut out the proper eye holes and add extras such as beaks and colorful ties to finish off the Chickendale ensemble.

## Cemetery vandal has case waived to district court

A Hoskins man waived his right to a preliminary hearing Monday and will now face felony criminal mischief charges in Wayne County District Court.

Michael Svatos was in Wayne County Court on Monday to waive his right to a preliminary hearing in connection with the destruction of markers at a cemetery near Hoskins last month.

Appearing with his attorney, Svatos, 32, stood before judge Ross A. Stoffer and asked for his case to

be moved to district court, where he will be tried for criminal mischief, a Class IV felony.

Svatos was arrested late last month after surveillance video showed two men damaging headstones and the grounds at Trinity Cemetery, located just northwest of Hoskins. A second man, who was riding an ATV, has yet to be arrested.

Svatos will return to Wayne County District Court on Wednesday, Aug. 5.

## County to assist PMC with expansion plans

Providence Medical Center will be able to begin a two-year, \$13.125 million expansion project with the help of the Wayne County Commissioners.

The county board unanimously approved two resolutions that will help the hospital fund the project at no cost to the county. By issuing revenue bonds, the county will be able to assist the hospital with funding for the project, with the hospital responsible for payback of the loan at no cost to county taxpayers.

Christine Klinker, a representative of Gilmore and Bell, which is working with the hospital on the project, told the board that the hospital was asking the county to issue the bonds on its behalf for the renovation project. The county would not spend any funds for repayment of the bonds, as the hospital would be responsible for repayment of the bonds.

The request was being made to take advantage of lower tax-exempt interest rates on the bonds. A nonprofit entity like the hospital needs a government entity to issue the bonds on its behalf, and the county

is authorized under state law to issue the bonds. The issuance of the bonds would be pursuant to a loan agreement between the hospital, the county and the bank that will buy the bonds, she said.

The county can issue up to \$10 million in revenue bonds each year and has already committed \$1.5 million toward county road and bridge improvements. The \$8.5 million in tax-exempt interest bonds would be issued, with the remaining bonds at a higher, taxable interest.

Providence Medical Center chief financial officer Kim Hixson said the hospital hopes to break ground on the hospital expansion project in August. Plans are to expand the emergency room and trauma areas, expand the labor and delivery area, upgrade lab and radiology areas, expand the dining room, renovate existing patient rooms and upgrade major electrical systems.

The project, which is expected to take 24 months to complete, would add about 5,600 square feet to the facility, which was originally constructed in 1975.

In other action, the board – talked with county road and bridge project manager Mark Casey about ongoing

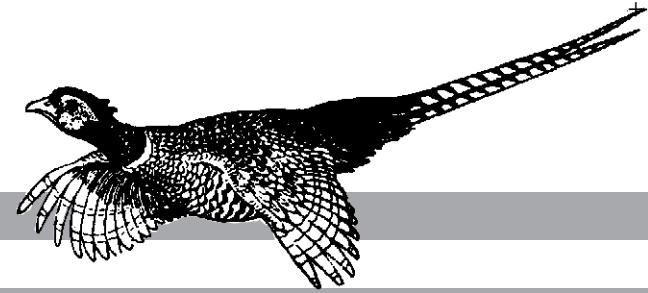

## Fehringer competes with best

WHS, WSC  
grad enjoys  
national meet

Normally, a college athlete's competing days end when they finish their last event of their senior year.

Carly Fehringer had an outstanding college career at Wayne State

College, winning numerous All-American honors for her efforts, both indoors and outdoors, in the throwing events. She capped her senior year in 2014 with a third-place finish in the NCAA

Div. II Outdoor Nationals, finishing with four All-American honors and 12 national qualifying efforts during her career.

The competitive fires still burned in the heart of the 23-year-old Wayne High graduate, though, and it took her about two weeks to decide that she wasn't through competing.

"With the success that I had and a great coach (WSC throws coach Brett Suckstorf) who pushed me, I was away for about two weeks," she said. "I took a break after nationals, and Brett said to take a month off and that if I wanted to keep doing it I'd be back, and it was about two weeks later before I started lifting again."

The year's worth of training paid off, as Fehringer was able to compete in the U.S. National Track and Field Championships this past month in Eugene, Ore. She took part in the women's hammer throw, finishing 13th out of 18 competitors.

To get ready for the event, Fehringer spent the better part of 12 months training and competing as an independent athlete with the Team Nebraska track club, based out of Omaha. The 2014 WSC graduate in criminal justice trained at the college while working part-time in the college's campus security department, then competed in a number of open meets during the indoor season in the winter and the outdoor season in the spring.

"In college, I was involved in multiple events like the shot and discus, but now I just compete in the hammer throw, so the training is a little different," Fehringer said. "I don't need to do a lot of the tricep and shoulder workouts like I did when I competed in other events, so I could concentrate on doing the things that would help me improve in the hammer throw."

Fehringer hit her best mark of 214 feet, 9 inches at the Concordia Invitational in Seward this past spring. The throw wasn't enough to automatically qualify (a minimum throw of 219-9 3/4 was required), but when only 13 throwers reached that mark, the field was filled with the best remaining throwers, and

Fehringer qualified 15th out of the 18-woman field.

Fehringer was able to make the trip to the University of Oregon campus for the national meet, and she said she was overwhelmed by what she saw when she began working out with her fellow competitors.

"It was a great experience," she said. "I've been to some big meets and been to (NCAA Div. II) nationals, but in those meets you're competing with girls who are just as good as you are. Here, these athletes are even better. I never thought I'd see the American record-holder throw in person, and I was right there practicing with and competing with the best in the nation."

Fehringer said she shook off the butterflies in time for the competition on Saturday, June 27, and launched her best throw of 62.4

meters (converted to 204 feet, 8 1/2 inches) on her first attempt. The effort was good for 13th overall, which was two spots better than where she qualified for the event.

"I didn't choke, and that's all I could ask for," she said with a laugh. "I would have loved to do better because the competition is so great, but I was very happy with my performance. I've thrown in that 62-63 meter range every meet, so I was pleased with it."

It marked the end of a year that she never visioned would happen for her.

"If you'd have told me, five years ago when I started at Wayne State, that I'd make the U.S. Nationals five years later, I'd have told you that you were crazy," she said. "I didn't have the hammer throw in high school, but Brett really helped push me and helped me get better,

and I just fell in love with the event over the years."

Fehringer said she planned on taking a few weeks off to rest her body before she resumes training — hopefully for a shot at making the 2016 U.S. Olympic team.

"The Olympic trials are next year, and my goal now is to be able to compete in the trials," she said. "If I could go further than that, that would be the ultimate dream."

How far she goes after that remains to be seen.

"One of the women I competed against is 32 years old and has competed for a long time, so the potential is there," she said. "It's a once in a lifetime thing and not many people get the chance to do it, so I'm going to keep going and see what happens."

## Two finalists named for WSC soccer job

Both making campus visits this week

Two individuals have been tabbed as finalists for the Wayne State College women's soccer job, athletic director Mike Powicki announced late Monday afternoon.

Finalists for the job include

James Lipocky, head coach at Indiana Tech; and Bruce Erickson, former coach at Creighton University.

Lipocky has been at Indiana Tech the past seven seasons and is the school's all-time winningest coach with a career mark of 62-67-5. The team finished 16-4-1 in 2012. He has over 20 years of experience, with past stops at SUNY Institute of Technology in New York, Daniel Webster College in New Hampshire and Felician College in New Jersey. He also coached in high school at Copley (Ohio).

Erickson has 22 years of coaching experience, the past 16 at Creighton, where he guided the Bluejays to an overall mark of 163-125-32. The team was 10-6-2 last season. Creighton has been to five NCAA tournaments, won five Missouri Valley Conference tournament titles and two MVC regular-season titles. Erickson also coached six years at Viterbo University in LaCrosse, Wisc., where he also served as athletic director for four years.

Powicki said he hopes to name a coach soon to replace Tom Cliff, who stepped down earlier this summer after two seasons with the Wayne State program.

Wayne State fans are invited to meet the candidates July 9-10 in Room 108 at Gardner Hall. Lipocky will be on campus Thursday, July 9 at 1:30 p.m., while Erickson will be on campus Friday, July 10 at 1:30 p.m. Both sessions are open to the public.

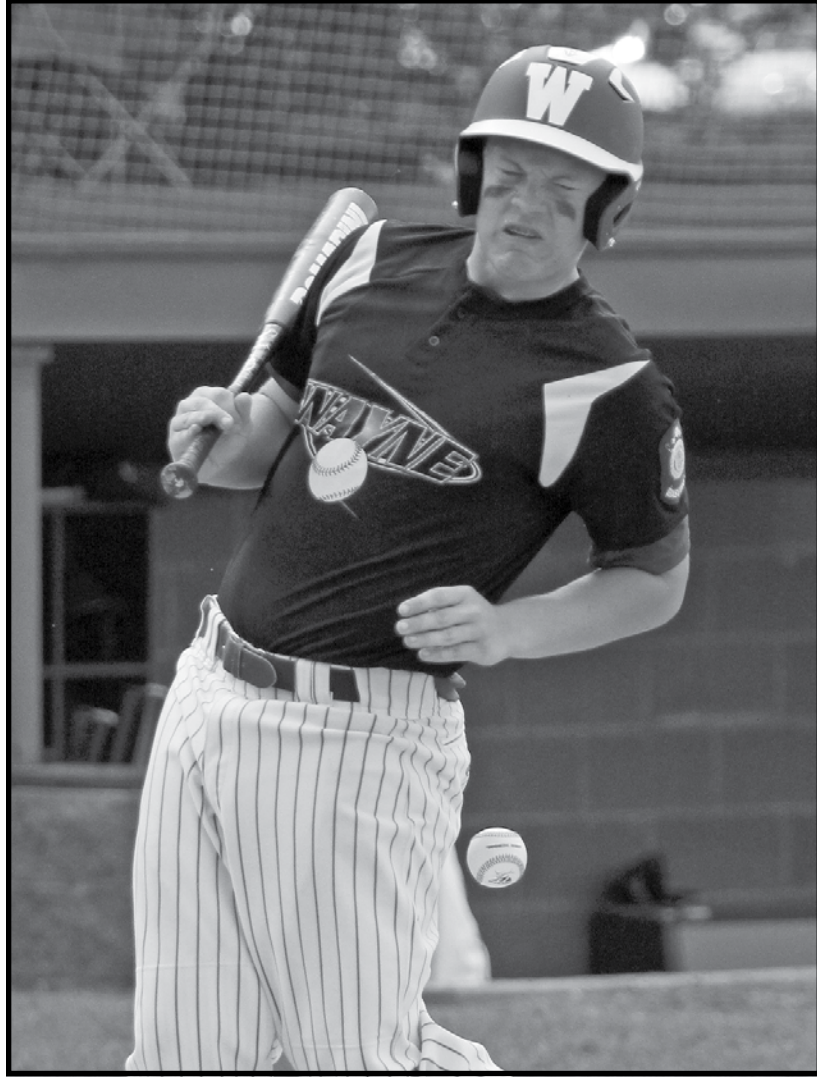

Wayne had a big inning in the second, scoring four runs. They had a chance to bring home a fifth, but had a runner thrown out at home. Another runner was put out at the plate later in the game, which proved to be the difference in the final outcome.

Wayne outhit Battle Creek 14-7 in the losing effort, leaving nine runners stranded. Zane Jackson had three hits for Wayne and Brennan O'Reilly also had three hits. Gamble and Bentjen each had two hits to help the offensive effort.

In the team's regular-season finale on Tuesday, Wayne won at West Point, 10-0 to take a 16-8 record into postseason play.

Bentjen threw three innings of no-hit ball for the locals, striking out three and walking two. Jackson and Lutt each threw an inning, with Jackson giving up one hit and

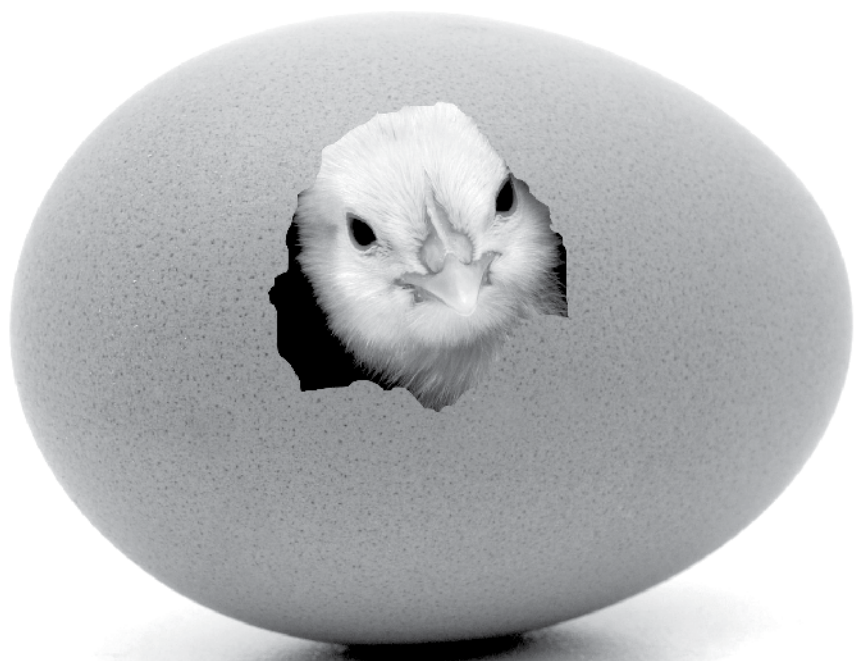

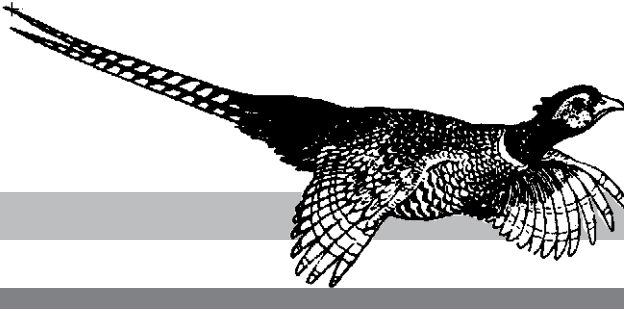

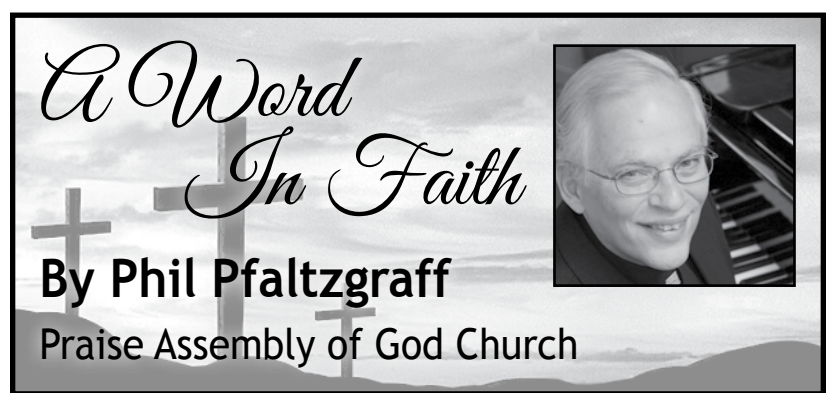




# Always a time to refresh God's word

The Need for Renewal  
Greetings! We have just come past the annual celebration of the Fourth of July – the anniversary of the birthday of the United States of America. It's been an interesting, invigorating, and memorable few weeks as men and women on both sides of the aisle have sought to assimilate Supreme Court rulings into their thoughts about the priorities of life in the US of A. And it's been a time also to thank the Lord for His ongoing mercy toward us as a nation, as families, and as individuals. So much of what we are able to do as our lives turn "God-ward" can only be done here because of a general gracious encouragement to "be religious."

For the reader of this column that knows Jesus, you are – of course – aware that it's way beyond an issue of simple "religiosity" that sets a Christian apart, however. It's the ongoing, daily issue of calling on the Lord for His forgiveness from sin, and then – day by day after that – asking for His guidance and daily cleansing from the things that bog us down. In general these are things that hinder the Light of Jesus from being seen by those around us.  
And in the daily routine of work, worship, relationships, travel, voting, fun as well as solemnity, it is necessary that God's people carry the Light. For some of His disciples – like our young friends from Michigan – they are called to go to Senegal and work with children. However, for most of us it is a call to stay in Wayne or Laurel or Wakefield or Allen or Carroll or Pilger or Concord – and to be a faithful, loving witness for what God can do in lives that are submitted to Him – in and around the 68787 zip code!



Part of my prayer these days is for "revival" to stir deep inside me. And I can only be "revived" after God has first put His life into me. They say that the old-time reflectors that were a part of the lighting mechanism of the kerosene lanterns used to get tarnished and dulled – just by the smoke rising from the lamp.

Christians need to continually come – in prayer – to the Lord and ask to be refreshed so that we accurately show the life of God to a world that needs to see it. This is way beyond political activism and completely different from efforts to redeem culture. Likely culture can't be redeemed – nor can we legislate things that permanently alter the hearts and minds of people. I heard something on the radio the other day – in the midst of the conflict about the Confederate flag in South Carolina: "We've got Republicans and Democrats working together to end hate in South Carolina." A gallant and kind statement; but it's the wrong answer. Politicians debating in a chamber – in any of the 50 states – cannot end hate, bring peace, or calm the raging soul of a deranged individual. Only the Spirit of God can exert that change.  
Consider these words from Micah

7:18: "Who is a God like you, pardoning iniquity and passing over transgression for the remnant of his inheritance? He does not retain his anger forever, because he delights in steadfast love."

I heard of an acronym the other day that was curious to view, but powerful to consider: Call2Fall. My assumption was that it concerned something significant in the fall semester. However, as I checked its roots, I found that it was based on the summons of 2 Chronicles 7:14 – "If my people who are called by my name humble themselves, and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven and will forgive their sin and heal their land."  
The specific time target of the "Call2Fall" was actually a week ago – Sunday, June 28 – and it was a summons for people to "fall on their knees" and "pray" – you can read the rest of the Lord's instructions cited in that verse. However, the Call2Fall also points to the promise of the Lord that He will "hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin and heal their land."  
Our land is desperate for reviving. However, I personally need to be renewed. My wife and I both

need reviving. Our son and his family need God's revitalizing. My mom and my siblings – scattered across the Midwest – need something new from the Lord. Our home church – and all of the local houses of worship in this area – all need a fresh infusion of the presence of God in all of our services and fellowship times. No more "meetings as usual" where God's ways are concerned. No more sermons that are the "same old – same old." No more frail human philosophizing that is not based on the solid foundation of God's Word.  
Hmhmhm. That sounds like "The Word in Faith", doesn't it? The Word of God – daily at work in you and me and across our communities.

# FCC says you can block calls

Do you get annoying calls on your cell phone – you know those calls that want you to support a certain candidate or want to send you on "free" cruise? The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has decided that we can now tell our phone company that we want those calls blocked.  
The FCC decided that AT&T, Verizon, Sprint, and other carriers have no obligation to connect "robotcalls" if you the customer do not want them. Consumers and a few states had asked the FCC to rule on this issue because phone carriers were concerned that they would face ramifications if they did not connect every call – there are rules requiring them to connect every call.  
In the decision, the FCC said that blocking technology should be allowed and even encouraged. Several companies already allow you to "block" individual numbers but this will not solve the problem.  
"Blocking" the number means you will no longer receive calls from that number but the callers often spoof their numbers. Spoofing their numbers means that they will then call you from another number.

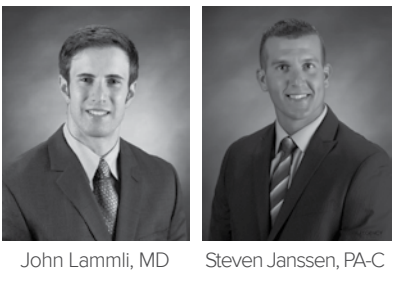
