School board hold monthly meeting Monday

Policies, personnel and finances were among the topics discussed during the regular meeting of the Wayne Community Schools Board of Education on Monday.

Each year, the board is required to review polices dealing with areas such as instruction, assessment, academic content standards, Special Education, community relations, employee and student anti-discrimination, anti-harassment and anti-retaliation.

All the policies received first-reading approval and will be brought back for final discussion at the board's September meeting.

new employees at the school, the majority of which were paraprofessionals. Several new persons have been hired to serve at the new Early Learning Center.

The district will learn on Aug. 20 what the property valuations are within the district. After that, final budget numbers will need to be put together before Sept. 1 when they need to be submitted.

Lenihan said that the district will receive \$1.7 million less in state aid in the coming year and has budgeted accordingly. Money will be used from the district's cash reserves and Lenihan said the budget shows no increase in the general fund spending.

On a related note, Roger Brandt, a Wayne County

Superintendent Mark Lenihan presented a list of resident, spoke to the board on the current taxing situboard at the September meeting. ation in the county.

He asked if the district was going to raise the mil levy to make up for the \$1.7 million shortfall.

"Taxes can't keep going up the way they have," Brandt said.

In other financial issues, the board listened to a presentation from Marc Mumford with Ameritas on the benefits of refinancing the 2010 Build America Bonds.

These bonds will become callable later this year.

He listed several options available to the district, including a 10, 15 and 20-year bond. The general consensus of the board was to move forward with the 15-year option. Additional information will be brought to the budget workshops.

Reports from the principals all indicated appreciation for allowing them to attend Administrative Days,

and all shared information gathered at the meeting. It was noted that the district will host the weekly Chamber Coffee on Friday, Aug. 14 at the new Early Learning Center on Providence Road, and classes begin at the Elementary, Junior and Senior High School on Thursday, Aug. 13.

The board will next meet in regular session on Monday, Sept. 14 at 5 p.m. There will be a special board meeting on Monday, Aug. 24 at 5 p.m. to handle the end of August financial claims, transfer of fund and



Kaiti Williams never missed a game in her four-year career as a softball player at Wayne State College and was named honorary captain of the Omaha World-Herald's Div. II All-Nebraska team in 2014.

Plager said that in the short time he has been on the job, he has been impressed with the school district and the relationships between those

"I feel very comfortable with the people I will be working with, from the administrators to the teachers and everybody else," he said.

Plager said he has three areas he plans to focus on as the new principal, and noted that many parts of these areas are already in place.

"The first thing I would like to do is build relationships with the staff, parents, students and community members. I also want to focus on collaboration. I feel that by working together, we can make the best decisions for the students," he said.

Another area of focus is what is known as Positive Behavior Intervention and Support (PBIS). This is a program of taking a pro-active approach to student behavior.

Plager said his goal is to "be a person the students feel comfortable being around. One of the things I plan to do is lunch duty. I want to get to know and interact with the students.

New rules put limits on practice

After 30-plus years, I don't need preseason conditioning to crank out another eye-catching run through the "Bits and Pieces" file:

- Over the years, this reporter has been quick to criticize some of the dubious decisions that have come down from the administrative office of the Nebraska School Activities Association.

That being said, some new rules that are coming down from the home office in Lincoln are decisions that not only should be commended, but should be applauded in an effort to make high school sports safer for our youngsters.

New rules that went into effect this week for high school football limits practice time and the level of contact taking place as teams gear up for the start of the 2015 fall season in two weeks - rules that address growing safety concerns surrounding the game and how some coaches handle their athletes while "conditioning" them for the tough season ahead.

The big issue, from where I sit, centers around contact. You have to be able to hit and withstand a hit in the game of football. It is a physically demanding, and occasionally violent, sport that requires a good deal of stamina and endurance over the course of the season.

You won't see any contact on the field for the area teams this week, as they will be limited in that area for the first time. Contact won't happen until the sixth day at the earliest, which is something I'm sure a lot of coaches will have to get used to.

Another thing football players and coaches will have to get used to is the number of two-a-day practices that take place in the weeks leading up to the season opener. Two-a-days were an opportunity to see who REALLY wants to play and get those who do in good condition for the demands of the season. Now, teams won't be able to run back-toback two-a-day sessions during the preseason, so the days of back-toback practices each day in 90-degree temperatures are now a thing

During the season, teams will be limited on the amount of contact they can participate in during practice. There is now a four-day maximum (with no consecutive days) on the number of days of contact work. including game day. There is also a 30-minute limit on the amount of contact work done each day.

Another interesting angle to the new rules is that all of this practice must be fully documented, much the same way the coaches file lesson plans when they're teaching during the school day. The practice plan has to indicate how each team will comply with these limitations that are being set forth, which would help protect the school from a potential lawsuit.

These changes will be important in helping to protect kids from injury, but it should be especially helpful for those younger kids who are playing on JV or freshmen teams. If you think about it, some of those kids are playing two (or maybe three) games a week, along with practices, so those lower-level kids who are just getting into the lineup will maybe see some more breaks in the action than they would oth-

While these new rules primarily impact football, they are also in effect for the other outdoor sports (cross country, girls golf, softball, boys tennis) and for those schools who don't have air conditioning in their gymnasiums for their volleyball teams.

For some of us old fogeys who have grown up around the game, some of these new rules, on the surface,

give off the appearance of turning the game into a glorified version of touch football. In the grand scheme of things, though, these young men playing football need to be protected from the long-term effects of concussions that occur during the course of

NSIC coaches put out preseason rankings


Wayne State's football and volleyball teams were picked by Northern Sun Conference coaches for the coming fall sports season.

Federal funding made available for emergency food, shelter program

Northeast Nebraska has been awarded federal program. funds made available through the Department of Homeland Security/Federal Emergency Management Agency under the Emergency Food and Shelter National Board Program.

Northeast Nebraska has been chosen to receive \$27,689 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs in 10 northeast Nebraska counties. The selection was made by a National Board that is chaired by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency and consists of representatives from American Red Cross; Catholic Charities, USA; National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA; The Jewish Federations of North America, The Salvation Army; and,

United Way Worldwide. The Local Board was charged to distribute funds appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in high-need areas around the country. A local board will determine how the funds awarded to Northeast Nebraska are to be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by local service agencies in the area. The local board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these funds and any additional funds made available under this phase of the

Under the terms of the grant from the National Board, local agencies chosen to receive funds must: - be private voluntary non-profits or units of gov-

- ernment,
- be eligible to receive Federal funds, - have an accounting system,
- practice nondiscrimination,
- have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs, and
- if they are a private voluntary organization,

have a voluntary board. Qualifying agencies are urged to apply. Northeast Nebraska has distributed emergency food and shelter funds previously with Northeast Nebraska Community Action Partnership, Salvation Army, Haven House, Bright Horizons, and Care Corps. These agencies were responsible for providing 8,160 meals, 1,135 nights of lodging, and 75 utility and rent pay-

Public or private voluntary agencies interested in applying for Emergency Food and Shelter Program funds must contact Krista Heineman, Northeast Nebraska Community Action Partnership at (402) 385-6300. ext. 276 for an application. Deadline for applications to be received is Friday, Aug. 21.
