Hoskins man enters plea in vandalism

No contest entered, sentencing is Oct. 26

A Hoskins man who was caught on surveillance video vandalizing a cemetery southwest of town had pleaded no contest.

Micahel Svatos, 32, entered the plea in Wayne County District Court on Wednesday, Sept. 19, pleading no contest to felony charges of criminal mischief and reckless damage of property.

Damage at Trinity Cemetery near Hoskins had been ongoing for several weeks, and cemetery caretakers installed surveillance cameras in an effort to catch those doing the violence. In early June, vandals returned to the cemetery and Svatos was identified knocking over headstones, causing more

than \$12,000 damage

in the process. He was arrested on a Wayne County warrant in Cedar County on June

Judge Mark Johnson set Svatos' sentencing for Monday, Oct. 26, and ordered a presentence investigation and a restitution hearing. Svatos faces a maximum of five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine, along with possible restitution to the cemetery.



He taught and served as an assistant academic dean at U of I until 1968. After taking a sabbatical in Scotland and England, he returned to the United States in 1970 to take a teaching position at Wayne State

College in Nebraska. Over the course of his 40-year career as a professor, he delighted in engaging thousands of students in the thoughtful study of literature, philosophy, and history. Many of his closest friends and confidantes came through his classes and returned to visit regularly. He received the Balsley-Whitmore Teaching Excellence Award from Wayne State College in 1999. He and his colleague, Gilbert Vaughan, founded a scholarship for English majors at Wayne State College.

Sayre was a committed internationalist and peace advocate who served on the boards of the Nebraska Humanities Council, Nebraskans for Peace, and the U.S.-China Peoples Friendship Association. He and his wife, Bonnie, taught English at Suzhou University in China in 1993-94 and again in 1996. After his retirement in 2000, he traveled extensively in Costa Rica, Guatemala, Ireland, Italy, and Mexico and taught in Wuhan, China in 2004. He was a voracious reader, inveterate punster, lifelong (third generation) fan of the Chicago Cubs, loyal friend, and above all, a loving father, grandfather, and brother who gave selflessly to promote others happiness and well-being.



During my time here, the Wildcats soccer team has had one win- Of The Herald ning season and an overall winning percentage of 39.2 (25-73-12). This year's seniors have been part of a team that has won less than 20 percent of their games (8-42-4, .185 winning percentage) - and they would like to change that.

Change has been a word the senior soccer players have become accustomed to, as they're playing for their third coach in four years. And yet, in talking with some of the returning starters from last year's 3-14-1 team, they're excited about the thought of going from conference doormat to contender for a spot in the NSIC tournament.

Of course, when your new coach is a guy who had a lot of success leading Div. I Creighton to the NCAA tournament and won several Missouri Valley titles, there's reason for having a good feeling about the nature of things.

Bruce Erickson was hired this summer to take over after the abrupt early-summer resignation of Tom Cliff, and with his resume and his way of developing talent, there's every reason to believe Wayne State won't be the low team on the soccer

Trail concerns are addressed

Since approximately 2003, the City of Wayne has been talking about building a fitness trail around

At the preliminary meetings, there was never any intention to route the trail through residents' front yards. it was recently brought to citizens' attention that the trail would make its way behind the apartment buildings north of Wildcat Lanes and through citizens' backyards and front yards in the Westwood neighborhood.

Creating this new section to the trail is not as easy as just laying concrete. Construction of the new section will entail hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of retaining walls, uprooting of sprinkler systems, relocation of power boxes, poles and fire hydrants, tearing up of trees and landscaping, and leveling out of driveways to meet elevation requirements. Much of this includes items that are not on City of Wayne property. You, as a citizen and taxpayer of Wayne, will be funding this directly or indirectly.

The residents of Westwood are very concerned about the devaluation of their property and the replacing of sprinkler systems which must be moved, lawns that must be torn up, trees that must be removed, and trees that must be trimmed. When asked who would replace these items, residents were told that it would be the lowest bidder. If that is the case, what kind of retaining walls will the neighborhood have to look at 365 days a year? The trail requirements include an eight-foot wide path that would run directly in front of residents' kitchens, bedrooms and living room windows. Some of the homes on Westwood Road sit 36 feet from the curb, making the front steps less than 20 feet from the proposed trail. Would you like a trail that close to your front steps? Would you buy a home with a trail in the front yard that is less than 20 feet from your front steps? To add, the trail would run perpendicular to already-existing shortened driveways, creating a dangerous pathway that young kids and large vehicles both cross.

Additional staff will need to be hired and new equipment will need to be purchased to maintain this difficult path. The existing trail has not been maintained to its full potential. how is the reassuring that the new addition will be maintained 2016, will jump to 90 cents. also? Upkeep includes cracks in the concrete, signs that warn of hazards on the trail, trash and graffiti, broken joints, overgrown grass, weeds and trees, and snow drifts. My family and I ride our bikes and mented by 2019. walk on our trail and the trails at Yankton, S.D., and Okoboji, Iowa nearly every year. We have also visited one of the most famous trails in the United States, the San Antonio Riverwalk. I have been to Central Park in New York City also. To gain access to the Riverwalk and Central Park, one must first walk through run-down neighborhoods where people sleep on the streets. Wayne does not have this environment. We have nice, friendly, quiet neighborhoods to connect the trail. Also, not one of these trails runs through peoples' front yards. In the city of Wayne, sidewalk and streets are sufficient to ride bikes and walk on to connect the trail. We do not need to spend money and deface peoples' property in the process. Wayne is not like New York City or San Antonio – we're a whole lot more like Mayberry.

I want to thank the majority of the City Council members who have taken time to come up to the Westwood neighborhood to hear our concerns. If you have any questions, concerns or new creative ideas concerning the trail, please contact me at (402) 369-2032. I will be happy to relay these new ideas to the City Council members and staff. We can find a better solution.

Positive move on roads funding

Kudos to Governor Pete Ricketts for taking a positive step toward roads funding that will perhaps benefit taxpayers and definitely benefit municipalities.

The governor – who says he wants to run government like a business - has been a champion of resisting moves to expand the use of federal dollars (Medicaid expansion). He also bristled at (and vetoed) a measure to increase the gas tax to pay for road improvements. Lawmakers overrode that veto.

But, he recently announced that the state will pay an extra 10 cents on the dollar for federal roads funds it buys from local governments, injecting another \$3 million into the budgets of counties and cities across the state next year. The change affects Nebraska's federal buyback program for roads funding, a plan that allows the state Department of Roads to keep millions of dollars in federal aid in exchange for about \$29.7 million in state funding.

Credit U.S. Senator Deb Fischer with that measure offered in 2011 when she was still a member of the Nebraska Unicameral. The program, started in 2013, allows local governments to have the state funding which has fewer strings attached. That covers Nebraska's 93 counties and 26 mid-size cities outside of Lincoln and Omaha. For the past two years, the state has paid local governments 80 cents on the dollar. The next payout, in March



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classroom lectures at getting youth excited about careers in science, technology, engineering and mathematics. Exhibits will be displayed in more than 40 project areas, including animals, foods, clothing and textiles, robotics, computers, the environment, veterinary science, heritage and leadership.

"Working on projects for the fair gives 4-H youth the opportunity to discover areas they'd like to learn more about and cultivate their skills," said Shane Potter, assistant extension educator in 4-H youth development. "The Nebraska State Fair is the capstone event for 4-H'ers to showcase their educational experiences that have taken place in the past year."

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Insist On The Best

State Fair gets underway this week

I have attended the state fair in Grand Island the last few years and it has been a great experience. It's almost hard to believe that this is the sixth year already for the fair to be held in Grand Island.

This year I will be helping with the Entomology identification contest and the swine show. I hope you will be able to attend sometime this coming week, as the fair runs from Friday, Aug. 28 through Labor Day. The fairgrounds are brand new with large livestock buildings close to each other and with an air conditioned main arena.

The 4-H/FFA exhibit building is on the north end of the grounds; it is large and is air conditioned. There are many more exhibits in the 4-H/FFA building every year, including commercial exhibits. Lots of food stands are available, and a large midway with plenty of rides means there really is something for

I recommend the birthing area to people who don't understand where animals come from; kids will love phytopthora root and stem rot, brown stem rot, and a little bit of sudden death syndrome (SDS).

Many of these diseases have similar symptoms in the beginning. Usually you will see small pockets of dead or dying plants, or dead leaves on some plants that slowly spread. The diseases differentiate a bit and to tell the difference you often need to split or observe the stem at ground level and above. SDS is fairly easy to recognize, the leaf symptoms are fairly dramatic although sometimes it is mistaken for brown stem rot. White mold

eases in the area. The main cul- infested plants usually have black prits are white mold (sclerotinia), sclerotia embedded in the stem. Go to cropwatch.unl.edu for more information on how to diagnose soybean

The best way to manage diseases is to select resistant varieties. These diseases infect plants fairly early in the season and often don't show symptoms until later in the year. This makes it hard to determine if a fungicide is necessary. Once diseases are established in the plant there is rarely a cure. So scout and determine which diseases are present, and use the information when you select your varieties in the future.

Husker Harvest Days to focus on weathering climate change

Agricultural producers and Nebraskans of every stripe can access a wealth of information on planning for climate change when they visit University of Nebraska-Lincoln Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources exhibits at this year's Husker Harvest Days show near Grand Island. Husker Harvest Days is Sept. 15-17.

"Successfully weathering extremes" is the theme for Nebraska Extension exhibits dealing largely with planning for potential weather extremes from climate change on the farm and ranch, as well as climate change-induced challenges and opportunities in everyday life.

"This is such an important topic on so many levels that we will examine it from many angles over both this and next year's Husker Harvest Days shows," said Ronnie Green, NU vice president, IANR Harlan Vice Chancellor and interim senior vice chancellor for academic affairs at UNL. "It's part of our focus on critical and groundbreaking research and initiatives that are important not only to all Nebraskans, but nationally and globally, as we enhance our reputation as a leader in critically important research."

Entering UNL's Husker Red steel building at Lot 321 on the south side of the grounds, showgoers will get the latest information on the challenges and opportunities facing the economics of agriculture, including variability and extremes in planning successful agricultural operations.

From there, they will view exhibits focused on the Nebraska Climate Report's take-home messages; forage alternatives for improving the resiliency of Nebraska beef systems; planning for climate-resilient irrigation systems; designing climate-resilient confined livestock systems; perennial forages for biofuels production; use of cover crops to improve resilience to higher-intensity precipitation; the role seasonal forecasts will play in future agricultural decisions; and the role of corn yield projections based on climate/weather in agricultural decisions.

UNL's adjacent open lots, east of the Husker Red building, will feature living exhibits of demonstration cover crops, plantings of switch grass for ethanol production and other uses, technologies for conserving water use in irrigation, and shade systems for reducing heat stress in feedlots.

"We believe this space has considerable potential for demonstrating the innovation and research of IANR in the form of living exhibits," Green said. "These exhibits tie directly into what showgoers will learn about when they visit the exhibits inside our building."

Also inside the Husker Red building, IANR staff will be available to answer questions on a variety of extension and research-related topics, provide copies of helpful NebGuides and direct those needing further help to extension experts in their local area. Showgoers will also be able to learn about the latest opportunities for students at UNL's Col-

lege of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources, and the Nebraska College of Technical Agriculture at Curtis. College representatives will be available throughout the show to answer questions from potential students. Those interested in the Nebraska LEAD (Leadership Education Action Development) program can also visit with a LEAD representative.

IANR has been part of Husker Harvest Days for nearly 40 years, since the first show in 1978.

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
