Nicholson proudly remembers his service

70 years after World War II, memories still fresh

the memories of that moment in our nation's history are still fresh in the mind of a 90-year old Wakefield man who served our country

Bricie Nicholson was drafted soon after graduating from Wakefield High School in 1944 and earned three Purple Hearts during his tour of duty in the Philippines and Japan. The rifleman returned home after serving more than a year overseas, but brought home many memories of his time as a U.S. soldier.

"We went to Little Rock, Ark., for basic training and was there for 17 weeks," he recalled during an interview in the sun room at the Ash Street Apartments in Wakefield recently. "There were some older guys who'd got drafted, and the physical education part of the training was tough on some of them, but I was a young kid and was right at home with the running and other things."

Nicholson recalled a training exercise where soldiers would have to climb up a steel pole.

"You'd have to climb up this pole, and as you were climbing the sergeant would say, 'Hey, I've got a joke for you' and it was hard climbing up that pole without laughing," he said.

Nicholson and his unit traveled by train from Arkansas to Seattle, Wash. He remembered making a stop in North Platte, where

he and his fellow soldiers were greeted by the local ladies who had provided sandwiches for the trip.

"My wife and I went back there for a convention a few years ago, It has been 70 years since the end of World War II, but a lot of and I remember some of the ladies telling stories," he said. "Some of the ladies made popcorn balls, and this one lady talked about how her older sisters had told her not to put her name on the popcorn balls, but she did and she was the only one who got a man out of the deal. The guy went overseas and had her name and they wrote back and forth and eventually got married."

Nicholson rode a boat from Seattle to Hawaii, where they practiced with Browning automatic rifles to prepare for battle in the Philippines, and Nicholson quickly found himself being one of the better riflemen in his unit.

"We'd practice shooting and I couldn't miss from 200 to 300 yards away, and that's what they were looking for," he said. "When we got to the Philippines, the captain called me and another guy in and told us they needed some good riflemen, and so we got into a couple of invasions there.

Nicholson was in the Philippines when then-President Roosevelt reassigned Gen. Douglas McArthur to Australia for six months.

"I remember when McArthur said 'I shall return,' and I was on the beach when he came back six months later," he said.

Nicholson participated in invasions on islands in the Philippines

A Hoskins man who pled no contest to vandalizing a Wayne County

cemetery received 36 months probation in Wayne County District Court on Wednesday.

Michael Svatos, 32, pled no contest on Sept. 19 to felony charges of criminal mischief and reckless damage of property. He was charged in the early-June vandalism of Trinity Cemetery, located northwest of Hoskins, causing more than \$12,000 in damages.



Judge Mark Johnson sentenced Svatos, who had spent 141 days in jail. to 36 months of probation and \$750 in restitution. He was also ordered to undergo drug, alcohol and mental health evaluations.

"Do not fall for this scam," Taylor said in the release. "These calls are from criminals



Looking Ahead in Wayne

What Does Solar Power and Wind Power Cost?

Assume you buy your own solar panels and the invertor to change the solar direct current to alternating current, raise the voltage to 240 volts and synchronize the solar current with that coming in from the power line. Also assume the panels totally run your entire home during the day, and assume they don't need to be repaired, and assume they last ten years. Since there is no operating cost, then the solar cost per kilowatt hour would be the total cost of the solar panel system divided by the total kilowatt hours the system produces over 10 years. With the federal subsidies and the great improvements in the new solar panels, that cost is becoming competitive with public utility rates.

What should be the cost of the power you purchase at night when your solar system isn't running? Public electric utilities have three cost components: 1) The operating cost of the fuel used to generate plus the manpower and maintenance. 2) The fixed cost of the generators and the business overhead of the power company. 3) The transmission lines, transformers and meters to bring the power to your house. Even if you generate all your power usage during the day with solar, someone still has to supply you with power over night.

That means the public utility still has to maintain the total capacity of the generators and the transmission lines to serve your home half the time. If the public utility gets half the revenue from you that it used to get but still has the total fixed costs to maintain the system for when you need it, who should make up the loss in revenue? Right now there are very few solar systems in place and the affect isn't noticeable. Ten years down the road if 30 percent of homes are using solar power, then some electric rate differentiation will need to be made to avoid having the solar homes subsidized by the rest of the rate payers. We don't know if that will happen.

A similar issue is currently going on with wind turbine power but state for the next five years. In 1957, they made Columbus their home. those big systems are utility owned and the power from those wind sys tems is being shared by all the rate payers and the costs of maintaining the big coal and nuclear generator plants for when they are needed is also being shared by all the rate pavers except seasonal groundwater irrigation that is on the NPPD demand waiver program and is charged for only the energy.

As you walk through the home, you will see original features liked stained glass windows on the entire second floor, fireplace surrounds and tile, 'stick and ball' fretwork in the foyer and open staircase.

The carriage house still exists. However, the brick retaining wall along the front of the property and the original curved, wrap-around front porch were dismantled some vears ago after disrepair.

Mark and Lukas are delighted to showcase their home to friends and the community. They would also like to say 'thanks' to those who have lent a helping hand with the renovation over the last two years. The support of the community has been great motivation to keep them moving to complete the project.

gins boat to shore. He remembered spending several nights in foxholes, hiding from enemy forces. "You didn't jump out of the foxhole to use the latrine," he said.

"One corner of the foxhole was for cooking and another was for the latrine, and if you saw anything moving outside the foxhole you shot it." Nicholson got his first Purple

Heart after being hit by mortar fire during an invasion, and he saved a his left arm.

"I grabbed one of the helmets and it was the other guy's, so I went to hand it to him and he reached out and a Jap took a shot at him and hit the helmet," he said. "It left this crease in the helmet and tore up his hand, and I'm sure that made for quite a story for him to tell when he went home."

On another occasion, his unit had some Japanese soldiers cornered and he was hiding behind a tree when an enemy bullet hit the trigger guard of his gun and ricocheted into his hand.

"The trigger guard on my rifle was made of steel, so when the bullet hit, it caught my hand and just about turned it into hamburger," he said. "A couple of inches either way and it would have killed me."

Nicholson's youthful looks made for some good-natured ribbing when he recovered from his injuries at a hospital in Saipan, located just west of Guam in the Pacific Ocean.

"I remember being on a ship going back to the Philippines and they were going to have a ceremony to pin a bunch of us guys with Purple Hearts, and the one captain took one look at me and said, 'You're too young to get one of these' and I said 'Now you tell me," Nicholson said with a laugh. "One of the nurses there asked me if my mother knew I was over there fighting."

On another mission, Nicholson's unit had a Japanese officer surrounded and were trying to disarm him when one of the soldiers was stabbed by the officer with his bayo-

"He could have surrendered and nothing would have happened, but he decided to fight and so we had to shoot him," he said.

Nicholson got news of the end of World War II while walking back to base one day, thanks to a random truck driver who had heard the news on the radio. He stayed overseas and helped with the post-war effort, serving as a cook on a base





County looks for answers on communication network

The Wayne County Commissioners will send one of their members to a Nebraska Regional Interoperability Network meeting later this month to get questions answered regarding a new communication network that the county may have to help foot the bill for.

At Tuesday's meeting in the Wayne County Courthouse, Wayne County Emergency Manager Nic Kemnitz told the board that a meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, Nov. 18 at the Lifelong Learning Center in Norfolk to discus a new secure communication network that would connect dispatch centers across Nebraska on a private network that would be set up using microwave dishes.

The state has plans to install the network, but is asking counties to pay for any maintenance costs. Kemnitz said that 12 counties in Northeast Nebraska have yet to sign on to the agreement, and the meeting in Norfolk is being held to address questions other county boards

"We're the last 12 counties to have the system put in place, and they want us (the counties) to sustain it," Kemintz said. "But if we're not going to use the system here, why waste the money to put it up?"

County Attorney Mike Pieper, who was at Tuesday's meeting, questioned what exactly the county was being asked to commit to regarding the regional network, and how long that commitment would run.

The board also discussed the possible relocation of

the Health and Human Services office, which is currently in the Dearborn Mall in Wayne.

Board chair Randy Larsen said the office has had problems with roof leaking that has created water issues in the office. The county has a lease with Woehler Trailer Court LLC on the space and is paying \$700 in

monthly rent. Larsen said that county officials have had difficulty in contacting the landlord regarding the issues at the office, and the board asked Pieper to look into the lease agreement.



Don't get me started

Time to decide on all gambling here

In the game of no-limit Texas Hold 'Em poker, you're sometimes forced nto deciding whether or not to go "all in."

Once again, we are looking at the possibility of being asked to decide whether or not to allow casino gambling within our borders. Three gambling-related petitions are being taken around the state by Keep the Money in Nebraska, a group that is hoping to get a question on the ballot that, if approved, would allow casinos at licensed horse racing tracks in the

Now if you know me well enough, you know that I'm pro-gambling and pro-casino. I believe that the state has no right to tell me how to spend my entertainment dollar, whether I decide to spend that dollar on a movie, a rock concert or a night at the blackjack table.

That being said, I think the casino question is the wrong question we should be asking. The question that should be put before voters is this are we "all in" with ALL forms of gambling, or should we fold and get out of the game completely?

Let's be serious – both sides of the gambling fight are being propped up by outside interests. The greed-driven pro-gambling folks will be propped up by big-money casino interests who would like to expand their operations, while the morally-dubious anti-gambling nutjobs like Pat Loontjer and Gambling With the Good Life are being backed by interests outside the state who are very happy with the fact that HUNDREDS of millions of dollars are leaving Nebraska and being put to good use to address our neighbors' social, educational and infrastructure issues (all areas where, not coincidentally, Nebraska is quickly falling behind in).

We already have gambling options here in Nebraska, and have had them for many years. From Bingo at the local church to pull tabs in the local bars, legalized gambling has been prevalent within our borders for decades. The addition of keno in many communities, along with the Nebraska Lottery-sponsored scratch cards and mega-jackpot games like Powerball and Nebraska Pick 5 makes the fact that there is even a question as to whether or not we should risk all the social problems that come with gambling an ironically insane question to even be asking.

According to a recent Associated Press article in the Norfolk Daily News, the Iowa Racing and Gaming Commission reported that Nebraska residents crossed the Missouri River and spent \$327 million in Iowa casinos in 2013. Assuming that number didn't change last year or in 2015, we're talking about close to a BILLION dollars leaving Nebraska and being deposited in Iowa's coffers – a billion dollars that could have been used to improve some of our more pathetic highways, improved the quality of education and provided sorely-needed tax relief to the state's taxpayers. $Legislative\ Update$ (Don't get me started on how much goes to South Dakota, Colorado or the

But what about the social problems that casino gambling brings, you ask? People who gamble beyond their means or commit gambling-related crimes would create more issues for the state.

Welcome to reality, boys and girls - those problems are ALREADY prevalent within our state's borders, and guess what? They are created in casinos OUTSIDE our state's borders, and the money that leaves the state isn't coming back to take care of those issues that we are left with on this side of the river. Why should we let one-third of a BILLION dollars leave the state every year and be stuck with the byproduct that results from people making bad decisions with their entertainment dollar, when we can have that revenue for ourselves AND address the issues that come with it?

I find it hilariously hypocritical that the anti-gambling community has their collective panties in such a tight wad over the issue of casino gambling while, at the same time, paying not one second's worth of lip service to the gambling that IS legal in the state. All this effort that is being made to kill casino gambling is taking place and telling us how bad and evil casinos are, and yet they don't spend a second talking about the gambling that IS available within our borders and the problems those games of chance

Rather than spend all this time and effort in the struggle to allow casinos to be built within our state, both Keep the Money in Nebraska and Gambling With the Good Life should bring the end-all of decisions to the table for Nebraskans to vote on - either allow ALL gambling (including sports betting and online poker) to be legal within our borders, or make ALL gambling (including pickle cards, Powerball, scratch cards, keno, etc.)

Future of rural is discussed


As a youngster I remember trips to Colorado to visit relatives in Greelev. We always drove through Nunn, Colo., and would comment on the water tower that proudly displayed the slogan "Watch Nunn Grow." I recently drove through Nunn, a community of 437 people between Cheyenne and Greeley. The water tower and the slogan are still there. The town looks more like it is holding on than growing. There is a new golf-ball shaped water tower in a housing development a few miles east of town that simply sports the town's name. It is obvious the town has become a bedroom community based on its proximity to places such as Greeley and even Estes

Small towns. Rural communities struggling to hold their own in a mostly agricultural environment. Not just a Colorado problem, or a Nebraska problem. It's a national concern. It is not a problem that is solved by finding one more large employer to locate in or nearby the community. Smokestack chasing doesn't work anymore.

Written plans help, but only if they are implemented. A University of Nebraska official admits that the past is littered with what he called "the road kill of good ideas" for rural America that never panned out. The good news, says NU vice president for Agriculture and Natural Resources Ronnie Green, is the time is right for a sustained partnership between communities and higher education to address the challenges.

That's the goal of the Nebraska Rural Futures Institute, which recently completed its annual Conference on the University's Lincoln Innovation Campus, the former Nebraska State Fairgrounds. The conference theme: Hope Inspires Vision. The opening speakers, Howard G. Buffett and son Howard W. Buffett, co-authors of the book "40 Chances: Finding Hope in a Hungry

Yes. Howard is the son of well-



Buffett. They spoke about the importance of rural communities and agricultural security. Howard G. Buffett said he makes \$10 million decisions in 30 seconds sometimes. That's part of the risk of philanthropic work, which he does through the Howard G. Buffett Foundation. Howard W. Buffett lives in Omaha and farms family-owned property near Tekamah. He has worked for his father's foundation and is a lecturer at the University of Nebraska Lincoln.

The two Buffetts have worked in countries with political and economic strife, but Howard W. told conference attendees that while he and his father have spent countless days talking to farmers around the world, he appreciates the sense of community he feels when returning to his own farm. One of the greatest strengths of rural towns is that

is a founding principle of the United States

The Buffetts say that one of their goals has been to develop solutions and empower people to implement long-term solutions, giving them the resources they need to pull the leadership out of them. That's one of the reasons they support the goals of the Rural Futures Institute, which was established in 2012 to partner with rural communities around Nebraska and beyond to develop ideas that strengthen those communities and provide opportunities for NU students to implement those ideas.

Green says the Rural Futures Institute grew out of an earlier NU effort, the Rural Initiative, which was a good start but not ambitious or sweeping enough. That, Schroeder says, will take a

ral lifestyle. A rural lifestyle should

not be a lifestyle of last resort, but

est and best young people who are emerging from universities today. I like his thoughts. Let's move be-

yond slogans on water towers and written plans that have long been gathering dust on the shelves of public officials in every rural community in Nebraska. Let's work together to ensure a future for rural.



The ACLU of Nebraska has also contacted the board, according to news releases, giving them examples of policies found in neighboring states. Those examples range from allowing participation based on their expressed gender, to the gender affirmed by their parents/guardians, or being allowed to participate based on a gender determined by a "confidential evaluation" (whatever that means) conducted by the student's school.

What would Jesus post on Facebook?


I know that I have written about social media before and perhaps some will think . . . if she has such a love/hate relationship with social media why does she still have a Facebook account?






