Trae VandeBerg hit a 20-footer as time expired to give Wayne State a 77-75 win over University of Mary in action at Bismarck, N.D.

Dream realized for Jorgensen with opening of The Jug Store

Ten years ago, Ken Jorgensen had an idea.

The longtime Wayne businessman had moved back from Chicago in 1977 and bought the bar that is now known as the White Dog Pub in downtown Wayne. Several years later, he bought what was then known as The Varsity and changed the name to The Max, selling the bar across the street a couple of years later.

Jorgensen sold The Max to Jason Miller in the winter of 2003, and came up with an idea to build a new bar and package store along Highway 35.

"I was working for Affiliated at the time and tried putting it together in this exact same spot, but I couldn't swing it money-wise," ne said.

Ten years, thousands of miles and at least one pity party later, that dream became a reality when the first part of his new 13,000-square foot facility, The Jug Store opened its doors just east of McDonald's Thursday afternoon.

The package store offers a wide variety of liquor, craft beers and more than 70 different kinds of wine, and the store probably wouldn't have come to pass were it not for a lonely drive down a dark Missouri highway in the middle of the night.

After Jorgensen sold The Max, he went to work for Affiliated

Foods and was driving a truck for the company, but felt that something was missing.

"I was driving in Missouri about 4 a.m. one night, the radio was off, it was raining like mad and I was having a little pity party. and I asked myself when was the last time I was happy," he said "About 45 minutes later it hit me – it was when I had The Max."

When he got back to town, he walked into his old sports bar and asked Miller – who wanted to move back to his native Illinois – if he'd like to sell the place back to Jorgensen.

"I walked in and asked him, 'Do you want to go home as bad as I want to come home?' and he said he did," Jorgensen said. "Thirty days later, I was back in The Max."

After spending the next few years rebuilding his business and taking care of those financial commitments, Jorgensen started thinking about that idea he'd given up on after selling The Max.

"After I bought The Max back, I was so broke that I couldn't pay attention, but we worked hard at it and things went well, and then I started thinking it would be nice to have a package store," he said.

Jorgensen worked his way east along Highway 35, inquiring about several properties along the highway – and then it hit him. "I thought, why not go back out here and do it, but you can't put





The application for Public Library Accreditation was developed for Nebraska public libraries in order to assist and support improvements in Nebraska public library services. The purpose of the accreditation process is to establish expectations for governance, services, and resources for public libraries. The anticipated outcome is that in public libraries that meet statewide guidelines, Nebraska citizens will have access to accurate, quality library and information services that and information.

Nebraska public libraries may apply for accreditation after providing assurance that they meet twelve minimum qualifications including having a certified library board and library director, local funding, an email address, and other minimum requirements. Accreditation also requires that the library use a community-based planning process to complete a strategic plan, to be approved by the Nebraska Library Commission

The Nebraska Library Commission congratulates public libraries as they move forward toward the realization of this vision for the future: "Affordable, reliable, progressive, and equitable library service for all Nebraskans regardless of their economic status and geographic location." The Wayne Community Schools Board of Education hired Russ Plager of Dawes Middle School in Lincoln as the next elementary principal, replacing the retiring Jill Pickinpaugh.

The design was taking shape for the new grandstand at Hank Overin Field. Local volunteers were working on fundraising for the project. The old grandstand was destroyed when a tree fell on the facility after a summer wind storm.

A plea deal was in the works for a Carroll man regarding child pornography charges. An attorney for Ted Perry asked District Judge James G. Kube for an extension so that a plea could be agreed to.

The Wayne State women's basketball team clinched their fourth NSIC regular-season title in five vears, despite losing at Winona State. The title was clinched when Minnesota State lost that same day to Sioux Falls.







Feel good stories around Christmas time usually add that much more meaning to the season. However, this Christmas story yields a slightly different angle.




Obviously the key word in all of this is "family." Ken was a giant of a man in stature, but that paled in comparison to the size of heart he had.







The good news is that the numbers are up on the basketball court. Fourteen players were in the preseason team photo, and many of those were part of last year's 0-21 team that, while failing to put one in the win column, showed promise for the future. Last year, they nearly got one against Allen at home, leading 28-27 with a minute left before losing 32-28.

This season, those freshmen and sophomores who experienced last year's trial by fire are a little bigger, stronger, faster and more basketball-savvy than a Winside team



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Shrubs with winter berries brighten landscape

Here is a repeat column from last year, a suggested list of shrubs that look good during the winter. The shrubs below can brighten the dull winter landscape with abundant berries, and they are particularly beautiful against a backdrop of soft, white snow. Thanks to Bob Henrickson and Karma Larsen of the Nebraska Forest Service for these suggestions to add to your landscape.

Aronia or black chokeberry is an easy-to-grow shrub with white flowers in spring, glossy green leaves in summer and clusters of black berries that last all winter-if songbirds don't find them first. Winterberry holly foliage drops in fall to reveal bright red berries that last all winter. It requires male and female plants for fruit set and performs best with consistently moist soils.

Meserve hybrid holly is a handsome shrub with lustrous dark green leaves that persist through winter. It performs best in rich, organic soil with consistent moisture and should not be planted in sites exposed to harsh winter winds and bright winter sun.

American cranberrybush viburnum is an excellent large shrub with lustrous, maple-like leaves that turn yellow-red in fall and has loose clusters of bright red berries that last all winter. Plant it in a rich, organic soil and keep it consistently moist for best growth. It makes a good screen or informal hedge. Linden viburnum has flat-topped white flowers in spring that cover the plant in a veil of white. After the handsome foliage drops in fall, bright cherry red clusters of oval berries are revealed. In winter, the fruits look like withered red raisins. It prefers rich, organic soil and



grows 8-10 feet high.

Coralberry is a dense, low-growing shrub with long cascading ange to red rose hips are beautiful branches. It produces brightly colored clusters of pink to red berries shrub. A great drought-tolerant in fall that persist all winter. Lined choice for hot, windy sites in full

along the thin arching branches, the berries are beautiful against a backdrop of snow. It's a tough groundcover for full sun to part shade and well-adapted to a variety of soils. It grows to three feet high and eight feet wide.

Snowberry is a native shrub with snowy white fruit clusters from October into early winter. It has a rounded habit, with fine, twiggy shoots and blue-green leaves that remain on the plant well into fall. This very adaptable plant prospers in heavy clay soil and will grow best in part shade. It works well as a filler or in mass plantings and should be pruned in late winter to bring it back to its summer shape. It grows 3 to 6 feet high and wide.

Rugosa rose is a hardy, durable shrub rose with glossy leaves and abundant rose-to-white flowers late spring through summer. Large orin winter on this three to four foot

Both the native staghorn and smooth sumac tend to form widespreading colonies, but they can be kept in check with a mowed boundary. Crimson red berries in pyramidal clusters top the stems in fall and persist through winter, offering a late winter food source for birds after the berries have gone through several freeze-thaw cycles to make them palatable. Sumacs are very hardy and can tolerate dry, sterile soils.

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Funds available to protect, restore wetlands

The USDA is providing funds to protect and restore agricultural lands, grasslands and wetlands across Nebraska. Applications are due Jan. 15 at USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service Offices.

USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service is now accepting applications for the Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP). This program, created under the 2014 Farm Bill, provides funding for the purchase of conservation easements to help productive farm and ranch land remain in agriculture and protect critical wetlands and grasslands.

Nebraska state conservationist Craig Derickson said, "Conservation easements are a good tool to ensure natural resources are conserved and protected for all Nebraskans. We encourage state and local governments, Indian tribes, non-governmental organizations and private landowners to contact their local NRCS office to apply."

The main goal of ACEP is to prevent productive agriculture land from being converted to nonagricultural uses and protect land devoted to food production and wildlife habitat. Cropland, rangeland, grassland, pastureland and nonindustrial private forestland are eligible.

Applications can be submitted at any time, but to be considered for 2016 funding opportunities, applications in Nebraska must be received by Jan. 15. Applications are currently being accepted for both agricultural land and wetlands reserve easements.

NRCS provides technical and financial assistance directly to private and tribal landowners to restore, protect and enhance wetlands through the purchase of conservation easements. Eligible landowners can choose to enroll in a permanent or 30-year easement. Tribal landowners also have the option of enrolling in 30-year contracts.

A key change under the agricultural land easement component is the new "grasslands of special environmental significance" that will protect high-quality grasslands that are under threat of conversion to cropping, urban development and other non-grazing uses.

All applications will be rated according to the easement's potential for protecting and enhancing habitat for migratory birds, fish and other wildlife. Eligible applicants will be compensated with a payment rate comparable to the local land use value.

Applicants will need to provide accurate records of ownership and ensure they have established a record of ownership with USDA's Farm Service Agency. Application information is available at your local USDA Service Center and at www.nrcs.usda.gov/GetStarted.

"NRCS staff will work with all interested applicants to help them through the application process and provide one-on-one assistance to create the conservation easement that works best for their farming or ranching operation," Derickson said.

> Parents and adults play a significant role in helping children who are dealing with the stressful situations. We can provide an example for children, act as a resource in helping children cope, and give guidance and support in managing emotions. Trying to return to a normal routine after witnessing acts of terrorism can be difficult because some of the resulting problems may parents and other adults need to be attentive to children's needs in helping them overcome fears or rethat will help children cope or remain overly stressed.

> Hold the child and provide physical comfort. Children naturally may seek the comfort and security that comes from being held. Give children extra hugs, smiles and handholding. Set aside time to sit next to a child, put your arm around him or her or hold him or her on your lap and talk with the child about his or her feelings.

> ance. It is important for children to hear messages of support. Remember to tell them often that you love them, that everything will work out and that you are taking care of them.

your feelings. It helps children to know that parents may share some of their feelings. Answer your child's questions in a simple, straightforward way. Share your own thoughts and feelings as appropriate.

thoughts and feelings. Listen. Parents can help children by encouraging their expression of feelings and listening to them carefully. Ask local county or visit the website at them to tell you if they feel scared, child.unl.edu.

angry or frustrated. Help them to realize such feelings are normal and that they can be worked out. Ask them for their ideas on how they might help with family needs.

Establish and maintain consistent routines that provide security and familiarity to children. As much as possible, adults should create and maintain some routines that children can rely on for security. This might include a particular routine at lunch, nap time, dinner or bedtime. It might involve reading stories each night, roughand-tumble play or playing family games. Use these times to build security and reassure children.

Help children express and cope with grief or feelings of loss. It is natural for children to feel a sense of loss. Allow the child to express his or her sadness or frustrations and acknowledge the reality of these feelings.

Involve children in service activities. It can be helpful to give children something to do in responding to stress. Children benefit from feeling that they are making a contribution. Find an appropriate activity that children or youth can do to help contribute to or assist with responding to the events that took place. Perhaps they can perform a service activity for others in need or

Show an example of self-control Children learn how to respond to stress by watching adults. Adults ought to set an example of selfcontrol, maturity and positive resolution in dealing with challenges. This will comfort children and create a secure atmosphere for them.



This might be a concern for a funder depending on how many months of negative cash flow your business plans on incurring compared how long it will take to "break even" of the initial investment of the expansion. I know this may seem like a guess or predicting the future on your part, but this will allow the funder to better understand your expectations as compared to their expectations of funding the expansion.

No, I didn't hail the cab that was driven by the guy with the beard and the turban. And there were a couple other "suspect" looking drivers that I didn't stop. I finally found a guy that looked like me, the poor devil.

says state Sen. Tommy Garrett. Nebraska law prohibits concealed guns in a wide range of places: colleges; churches; schools; sporting events; hospitals; banks and bars. Garrett's staff is drafting legislation that would eliminate most of those gun-free zones, allowing people with concealed-carry permits to take their firearms almost anywhere in the state, while retaining exceptions for police stations, courthouses, jails and prisons.

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln Faculty Senate has approved a resolution supporting a continued ban of weapons on campus. That is seen as a formal response to Garrett's proposal. Faculty Senate President John Bender says they prefer the status quo when it comes to weapons on campus. They want the University of Nebraska-Lincoln to have the authority to restrict weapons on campus.

Garrett says the state already

carry permit holders are responsible, through required background checks and firearms training. He claims that these folks are not criminals, wackos or mentally unstable people. He characterizes them as law-abiding, God-fearing American citizens.

Good for them. But how many criminals, wackos or mentally unstable people have we heard about who still manage to get their hands on guns and wreak havoc on others similarly situated as well as those law-abiding, God-fearing American citizens?
