Council hears on TIF housing proposal

Discussion on the possibility of developing an area in the southeast portion of Wayne highlighted Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

Kelby Hermam spoke to the council on a plan to use TIF financing to provide water, sewer and streets to an area that was formerly Mert Marshall property and extending into the former Lage Auction property.

Herman presented to the council drawings of his plans for the area and explained that at least two structures in the area would be removed before new homes would be built

Council members approved a plan to add 58 parking stalls at the Wayne Community Activity Center.

Joel Hansen, city planner and building inspector, presented several options for parking at the facility and the plan approved by the council will be "an exact mirror of what is there."

Estimated cost of the project is \$233,770.

In other action, the council gave first reading approval to an ordinance that would amend the city zoning map to rezone property along East 14th Street from R-1 (Residential) to B-3 (Neighborhood Commercial).

Virgil Kardell, who owns a portion of the property to be re-zoned said there is a possibility he would be developing the property, although exactly what would

were told that with a B-3 zoning designation, the area could include single family dwellings, two-family units or apartments.

Hansen told the council that the plan has already been brought before the Planning Commission, which gave unanimous approval for the plan. They felt the change in zoning designation would provide "a good buffer between the agricultural land to the north and light industrial area to the south."

Council members also approved a resolution supporting an Eagle Scout project being completed at Roosevelt Park by James Simpson.

The project will be funded in part by a Natural Resources District grant and the city, with much of the work being done by volunteers.

The Wayne City Council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, April 19 at 5:30 p.m.

When Dr. Marysz P. Rames takes the stage for her inauguration as the 13th president of Wayne State College on April 29, she will do so as a direct product of her passion, her family, and the support of mentors, colleagues, and close friends over the vears.

"I was drawn to a career in education at an early age, properly inspired by the classic work on child therapy, Dibs in Search of Self, and an even more influential older sister. While my passion changed from teaching to student affairs, I knew from my first job until now that I had found a profession that fit my passion to support students in reaching their goal of attending college and completing their degree in an area that feeds their passion."

Rames began her work as president of Wayne State in July 2015 after approval by the Nebraska State College System Board of Trustees at its June meeting. She came to Wayne State from Dakota State Univer. Dr. Marysz P. Rames took over as sity in Madison, S.D., where she had served as interim president since Aug. 15, 2014. Much like many Wayne State students and graduates, Rames was a first-generation college student. She earned her educa-



tion doctorate in adult and higher education in 1997 from the University of South Dakota in Vermillion. She earned her bachelor of science degree in business administration and communication studies, with a minor in economics, in 1982, and her master's degree in educational administration in 1986, from University of Northern Colorado, in Greeley, Colo.

"Family and friends have taught me the importance of being gracious, thankful, ethical, and committed. I was raised in a military family," Rames said. "My dad was in the U.S. Air Force for 30 years. We were a small family of four (mother, father, sister and myself). My parents believed strongly in the importance of the family and we relied heavily on each other. We have always suplives. My sister and I are both first generation college students, so I understand and appreciate the many obstacles a first generation student faces. I talked with Winside superintendent Mike Shoff about the progress on replacing retired wrestling coach Paul Sok, and he said that a replacement has not yet been found. 

Winter annuals, basic lawn care discussed

This is the time of the year when things are starting to get serious outside, either in our crop fields or our lawns.

In the last few years roller coaster temperatures make it harder to determine what is going on but we are warming up, so winter annual weeds will be greening up and beginning to grow vigorously. Some crop fields will even turn purple by planting time. What is the impact of winter annual weeds and what should you think about in planning control programs?

Winter annual weeds begin germinating in early fall, and some species (especially marestail) continue to germinate until after planting. Depending on the species, they begin flowering in early to mid-April and most set seed and senesce bv mid-June or earlier.

Control of winter annuals is relatively easy in the fall and early spring, but harder once they begin flowering as they are less susceptible to herbicides. In addition, the time between the start of flowering and when they have viable seeds can be relatively brief. Henbit, for example, produces mature seeds within two weeks of flowering. Plants can be flowering and shedding mature seeds at the same

In addition, controlling winter annual weeds before mid-April will reduce the risk of weeds going to seed and increasing winter annual weed pressure in subsequent years.

Do not apply any herbicides prior to reseeding or within two or three mowings unless allowed on the label.

It's still too early to apply fertilizer to your lawn now. Heavy spring fertilization should be avoided. Cool-season turf needs little additional encouragement to grow and applying too much fertilizer in late March and April causes excess shoot growth at the expense of root growth and uses up valuable storage products needed for summer performance. Early spring fertilization should be reserved for the professionals, while most homeowners should wait until after the first growth flush to apply fertilizer.

Once emerged, grasses grow from their crown and thus it greens up from the base in the spring. The earliest.

er through underground rhizomes. turf looks brown from above, it may be green and growing underneath. Now is the time to check your mower's mowing height, sharpen the blade, and start the mower to guarantee it is ready to go when needed. Lawns eventually should be mowed at 3 to 3.5" throughout the year and ideally often enough to remove no more than 1/3 of the leaf blade. This will keep the lawn at optimum thickness to provide enough height to shade itself in the summer and provide competition for weeds. For the first couple of mowings you can lower the blade a little bit but bring it up to 3-3.5 inches when the lawn begins to grow quickly. It is better to mow too often than not enough and return the clippings unless they are composted or used on the garden.






3C + Sometimes, a leap of faith proves to be worth the risk

Peter took a risk in trying to walk on the water in the sense that it is not something you and I as humans can do, unless it is frozen. Peter took another risk in the sense that, what if he was wrong about this Jesus guy? If Jesus isn't who he truly says that he is - then I'm going to drown. But Peter's eyes were set on Jesus and his heart followed him. It was only when he looked away that he began to doubt.

And that is the same with you and me. As we live our lives, we take risks. Maybe not the kinds of risk which Alex and other drivers on "Ice Road Truckers" take, but we have risks of our own. And there is nothing wrong with taking risks. Sometimes you and I just need to jump, take that leap of faith. But

Psalm 119:105 says, "Your word is the voice of Jesus, our risen and is a lamp to my feet and a light to triumphant Savior.


