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Council hears on TIF housing proposal

Discussion on the possibility of developing an area in the southeast portion of Wayne highlighted Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

Kelby Herman spoke to the council on a plan to use TIF financing to provide water, sewer and streets to an area that was formerly Mert Marshall property and extending into the former Lage Auction property.

Herman presented to the council drawings of his plans for the area and explained that at least two structures in the area would be removed before new homes would be built.

"The community needs a variety of homes and these homes would be in the \$119,000 price range. They would not have a basement, but would have a garage.

I have done some research on FEMA specifications for tornado shelters and am working on providing some type of shelter for these homes," Herman said.

City Administrator Lowell Johnson said the area in question has already been designated as blight and substandard and eligible for TIF funding. A minimal amount of the land is currently in the flood plain and that issue has been addressed in the plans.

Council member Matt Eischeid, noting that he is "not a big TIF fan," questioned how the bonds would be paid back and what happens as the valuation of the property changes over the 15-year life of the bonds.

Mayor Ken Chamberlain told the council he was in favor of the project.

"Kelby is asking the Council to let him use his money and take the risk to build these homes. The project has to go through the Community Redevelopment

Agency (CRA) before it comes back to us for council approval," Chamberlain said.

Council members approved a plan to add 58 parking stalls at the Wayne Community Activity Center.

Joel Hansen, city planner and building inspector, presented several options for parking at the facility and the plan approved by the council will be "an exact mirror of what is there."

Estimated cost of the project is \$233,770.

In other action, the council gave first reading approval to an ordinance that would amend the city zoning map to rezone property along East 14th Street from R-1 (Residential) to B-3 (Neighborhood Commercial).

Virgil Kardell, who owns a portion of the property to be re-zoned said there is a possibility he would be developing the property, although exactly what would be built there has not been finalized. Council members

were told that with a B-3 zoning designation, the area could include single family dwellings, two-family units or apartments.

Hansen told the council that the plan has already been brought before the Planning Commission, which gave unanimous approval for the plan. They felt the change in zoning designation would provide "a good buffer between the agricultural land to the north and light industrial area to the south."

Council members also approved a resolution supporting an Eagle Scout project being completed at Roosevelt Park by James Simpson.

The project will be funded in part by a Natural Resources District grant and the city, with much of the work being done by volunteers.

The Wayne City Council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, April 19 at 5:30 p.m.

Inauguration for WSC president set for Friday, April 29

When Dr. Marysz P. Rames takes the stage for her inauguration as the 13th president of Wayne State College on April 29, she will do so as a direct product of her passion, her family, and the support of mentors, colleagues, and close friends over the years.

"I was drawn to a career in education at an early age, properly inspired by the classic work on child therapy, Dibs in Search of Self, and an even more influential older sister. While my passion changed from teaching to student affairs, I knew from my first job until now that I had found a profession that fit my passion to support students in reaching their goal of attending college and completing their degree in an area that feeds their passion."

Rames began her work as president of Wayne State in July 2015 after approval by the Nebraska State College System Board of Trustees at its June meeting. She came to Wayne State from Dakota State University in Madison, S.D., where she had served as interim president since Aug. 15, 2014.

Much like many Wayne State students and graduates, Rames was a first-generation college student. She earned her educa-

ium on Saturday and take part in the seventh-annual Trivia Night fundraiser hosted by the Wayne State College women's soccer team.

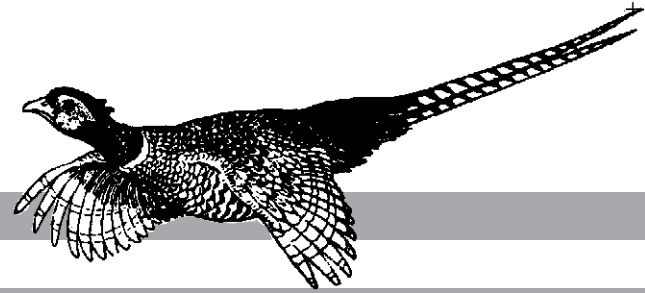

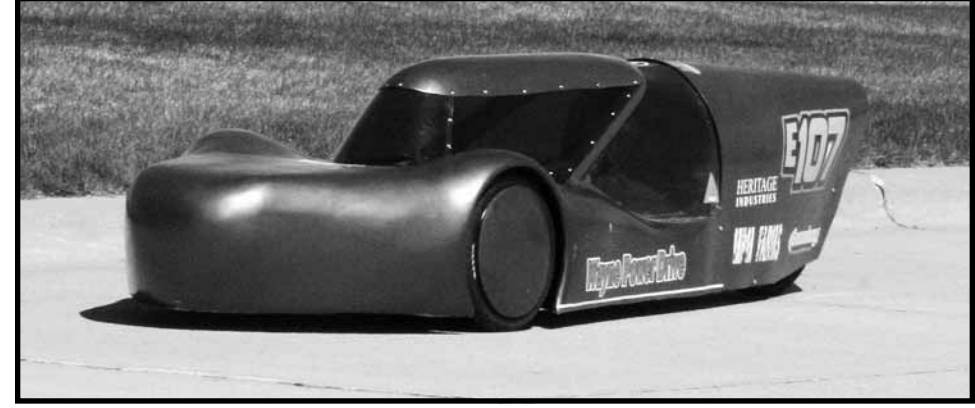
Power drivers show their skills

"I have spent nearly nine months listening to Wayne State students, staff, faculty, alumni, and friends," Rames said. "I have come to know firsthand that Wayne State provides a personalized, quality educational experience while remaining affordable and accessible. We have an opportunity to expand this gateway of opportunity for more students."

Her plans for the future of Wayne State build on what she sees as the foundation of the college.

"Our regional focus positions us to strengthen partnerships with the community colleges, area school districts, and businesses and industry; increase our engagement with alumni and friends of the institution; and engage additional partners in our effort to serve Northeast Nebraska workforce and economic development," Rames said.

Achieving these goals, she said, requires resources and the willingness to make tough decisions.

"I lead by the principles of mutual respect and support," Rames said. "I empower staff to be creative, innovative problem solvers who involve stakeholders and are transparent decision-makers. High expectations and honest feedback paired with resources and ideas will absolutely

move us forward. This approach creates a collegial environment that drives collaboration and cooperation to build strong, supportive, and trusting relationships."

In preparation for her inauguration, Rames explored Wayne State's past to gain insights from the college's former leaders and graduates. She found inspiration in the words and life of John G. Neihardt, who graduated from Nebraska Normal College (now WSC) in 1897. Neihardt went on to become a distinguished author and the Poet Laureate of Nebraska, among other literary accomplishments.

"John Neihardt, in a 1925 letter to the Neihardt Club in Wayne, wrote: 'If at any time, in anything that bears my name, you have felt more keenly than usual how human life, for all the hurt and pity of it, is shot through and through with a justifying glory, then you have met the best of me.' In the spirit of his sentiments, which for me express the timeless value of a Wayne State education, I asked for my inauguration to honor Neihardt's legacy as a

tribute to our beginnings, and a nod to the power of what we do as a college," Rames said.

"Education is a justifying glory," Rames continued. "Our movement through the educational process, which Neihardt described beautifully as 'not an end, but rather an endless process, a manner of becoming,' is a cycle repeated thousands of times as we engage students in the transformational process of not just earning a degree but capturing the ability to learn for a lifetime, to constantly improve their understanding of the world, and, by doing so, change the world around them."

Rames drew parallels between Neihardt's time at the college and the lives of many of Wayne State's students and alumni.

"Let us remember, Neihardt came to this college as a young man without the means to fund his education beyond tenacity and the courage to embark upon a journey that proved to be transformational not just for him personally, but for the many people who have since gained powerful insights into the Midwest and

its inhabitants through his poetry and prose," Rames said.

"Neihardt rang the college bell every hour of the school day as payment for his education and repaid Professor James Madison Pile, the founder of our college, by making an indelible mark on the world," Rames continued. "And the beauty of Wayne State College is that each class sends a new generation of bell-ringers out into the world: students who worked their way through school and who have gone on to become business and community leaders, medical professionals, teachers, soldiers, and parents, all of whom serve as powerful examples of knowing what to do with life when, as Neihardt said, we are in possession of the means to live it."

The public is invited to join Wayne State students, faculty and staff for the inauguration of Dr. Rames at 3 p.m. on Friday, April 29 in Ramsey Theatre in the Peterson Fine Arts Building. A public reception will follow the ceremony. To learn more about inauguration, visit wsc.edu/inauguration.

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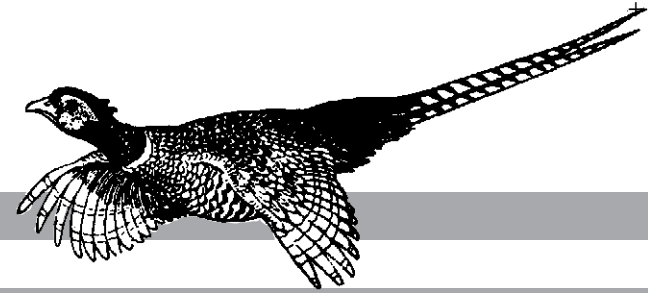

Hammer nails four firsts at home meet

Wayne girls nip Scotus for team title

The Wayne High girls track and field team put up points in just about every event and held off a spirited effort by Columbus Scotus to claim the team title Tuesday at the Blue Devil Invitational.

Wayne High sophomore Kylie Hammer spearheaded the effort for the home team at the Kern Track and Field Complex, winning four events and setting a school record in the triple jump, as her best effort of 35 feet, one-half inch bettered the old mark of 34-6 set in 2002 by Alissa Dunklau.

Hammer did her damage in the field and on the track Tuesday. She won the long jump with a winning effort of 17-4, then took top honors in the 100-meter dash (13.66 seconds) and the 400-meter sprint (1:02.09).

Hammer was one of 10 Wayne High girls who medaled in multiple events on the day, and that depth proved to be enough to offset the effort of the Shamrocks, as Wayne scored a 130-118 win, with Boone Central/Newman Grove finishing a solid third (107) among the 11 girls teams competing.

The 3,200-meter relay team of Gabi Meyer, Kiara Hochstein, Molly Hoskins and Kelsey Boyer was the only other winner for the Blue Devils, as they claimed top honors with a time of 10:33.19. Meyer, Hochstein and Boyer were also successful in other events. Meyer was second in the 800 and joined Boyer and Hochstein on the runner-up 1,600-meter relay team, and Hochstein finished fourth in the 800.

Danica Schaefer claimed three medals on the day, taking second in the shot put, fourth in the discus and running the anchor of the 400-meter relay team that placed third.

Tarah Stegemann also had a three-medal effort on the day, finishing behind Hammer in the long jump, placing fourth in the high jump and helping the 1,600-meter relay team to a second-place finish.

Jenna Trenhaile (discus, 400 relay), Katelyn Grone (long jump, triple jump), Hannah Leonard (3,200,

sprint medley) and Sydney Biggerstaff (100 hurdles, sprint medley) each won two medals to help the home team's cause.

The Wakefield girls scored in seven events and finished fifth on the day, led by multiple-medal efforts from Savannah Nelson, Breanna Chase, Josephine Peitz and Jamie Dolph.

Nelson, Chase and Dolph each



finished with three medals on the day. Nelson was third in the 200 and the 400 and led off the 1,600-meter team's third-place finish. Chase was fourth in the 100 and fifth in the 200 and anchored the 1,600 relay team. Dolph was third in both the 1,600 and 3,200 and also ran a leg on the 1,600 relay team.

Josephine Peitz came away with a pair of medals, taking third in the

800 and fifth in the 1,600, and Jessica Borg was on the 1,600-meter relay team.

In boys action, Wayne High junior Grayson McBride accounted for both of the Blue Devils' first-place finishes in helping the team to a sixth-place finish. He won the high jump with a best effort of 6-2, and also went 40-10 in the triple jump to take first-place honors.

In individual events, Nolan Reynolds won two medals, taking second in the 800 and third in the pole vault. Christian Rogers was fourth in the 100 and Ryan Jaixen earned a sixth-place medal in a tough long jump competition.

In relay action, the 400-meter relay of Rogers, Tyler Pecena, Schuyler Schweers and Beau Bowers

Rugby is on the agenda this week

– Usually, the last weekend in March is when the excitement and chaos of one of the nation's largest rugby tournaments hits Wayne, America.

This year, though, with the Easter holiday falling on the last weekend of the month, the Wayne State College Rugby Club moved its annual Madness and Mayhem rugby tournament to this weekend, and all indications are that it will be a busy weekend of rugby here in town.

Coach Darrin Barner told me that the team count was in the neighborhood of 80 teams, which would be the second-biggest grouping of teams from all across the country in the tournament's history. Teams from Texas to Canada are expected to descend upon Wayne this weekend, and not only is it a fund-raising tournament for the WSC rugby club, but it's also a big economic shot in the arm for the community as well. A study conducted a few years ago found the tournament's economic impact for the community to be in the neighborhood of \$400,000, and since most of that money for food, hotels and other amenities is coming in from out of town, out of state and even out of country, it's a huge boon for those businesses who serve those young men and women competing in the tournament.

I've watched this tournament grow over the years and have always been impressed with how the vast majority of those who come in from all over the country conduct themselves. As tough and physical as the game is, you'd think there would be a lot of chaos on the streets that weekend. In fact, the ruggers are generally pretty well-behaved (aside from a few who get out of line, a very small minority in a group of 2,000 or more) and are just enjoying themselves while playing in a fun tournament that has received a lot of positive reviews from those who are regular participants.

It should be a lot of fun this weekend – I'm looking forward to the action.

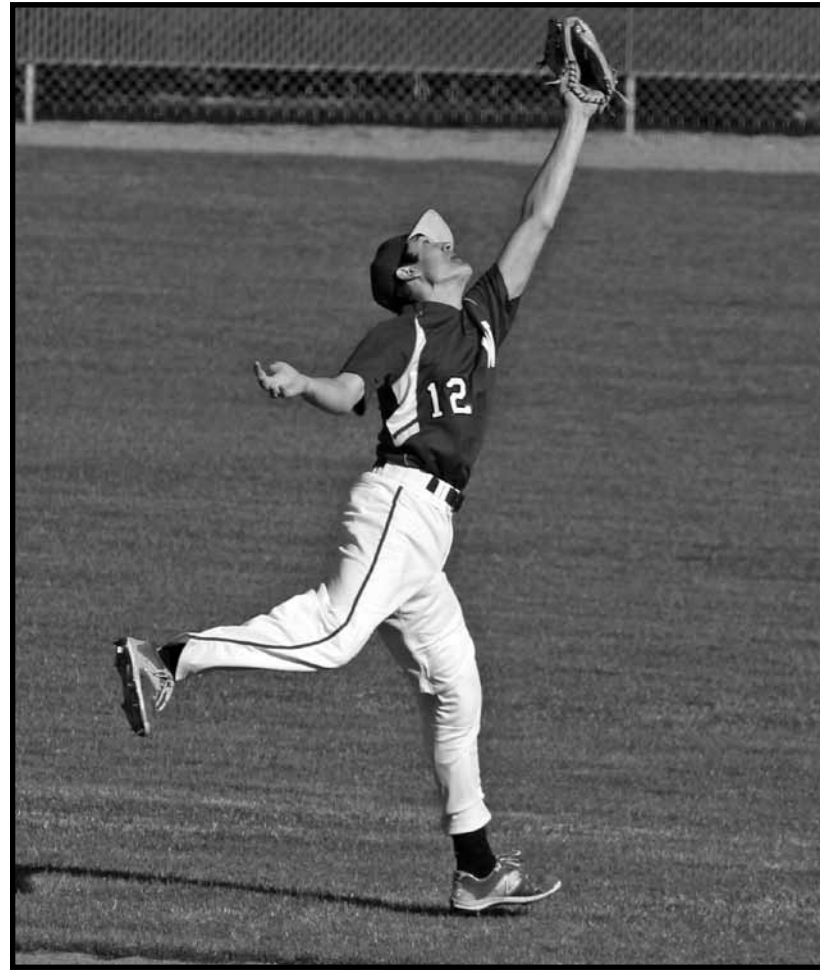
– We've already seen a couple of coaching changes in the area high schools this season, and there are a couple more job openings that have come up.

I talked with Winside superintendent Mike Shoff about the progress on replacing retired wrestling coach Paul Sok, and he said that a replacement has not yet been found.

WSC track ranked 9th, 11th in preseason by NSIC coaches

Wayne State is ranked ninth in the NSIC preseason track and field coaches poll for the men and 11th in the women's poll for 2016.

Minnesota State was tabbed as the team to beat in both the men's and women's polls. The Mavericks were a unanimous pick in the men's poll and edged Augustana by three points in the women's poll. Augustana, MSU Moorhead, Sioux Falls and St. Cloud State round out the men's top five, while Minnesota Duluth, University of Mary and Winona State trail Minnesota State and Augustana in the women's top five.

Listed as athletes to watch from Wayne State are senior thrower Bryan Dunn and sophomore sprinter Braxton Adams from the men's team, along with sophomore hurdler Kelsey Dietrich and senior jumper Ellen

Wulf from the women's team.

Dunn earned All-NSIC honors last year as a junior placing third in the hammer throw at 175 feet, 11 inches. He is coming off a successful indoor season earned All-American honors with a sixth place finish in the weight throw (63-5) while winning the NSIC title in the event. Adams was an All-NSIC performer last year as a redshirt freshman in the 100-meter dash (10.73) and was fourth during the indoor season in the 60-meter dash at the NSIC Championships.

Dietrich is a returning hurdler and sprinter for the Wildcats while Wulf scored points in two events at last year's NSIC Outdoor Championships, placing fourth in the long jump (18-6) and eighth in the heptathlon with 4,195 points.

USDA funding available for rural start-ups

Agriculture Under Secretary Lisa Mensah today announced that \$5.8 million in competitive funding is available to help start, improve or expand cooperative businesses in rural areas.

"Cooperatives have long been a key resource for small and mid-sized producers working together to access new markets or to market val-

ue added products," said Mensah. "This funding helps them continue their crucial role supporting farmers and other businesses that create jobs, provide services and improve the quality of life in rural America."

The Rural Cooperative Development Grant (RCDG) Program provides funding to non-profit cooperative develop centers and insti-

tutions of higher learning. Grants may be awarded for up to \$200,000 and matching funds are required equal to 25 percent of the total project cost.

The USDA has invested more than \$44 million in 228 grants through the RCDG program since 2009. In 2015, for example, the Latino Economic Development Center (LEDC) in Minneapolis received a \$200,000 technical assistance grant to help rural Latino farmers form cooperatives. Through its farm incubation equipment sharing program, LEDC helps Latino farmers move from migrant work to year-round positions and from low-wage farmworkers to farm owners.

for RCDG grants, contact your Rural Development state office or see page 16127 of the March 25 Federal Register. The first round of applications is due June 20, 2016.

Since 2009, USDA Rural Development has invested \$11 billion in more than 103,000 rural businesses to start or expand their operations; helped more than 1 million rural residents buy homes; funded nearly 7,000 community facilities such as schools, public safety and health care facilities; financed 180,000 miles of new and improved electric transmission and distribution lines; and helped bring high-speed Internet access to nearly 6 million rural residents and businesses.

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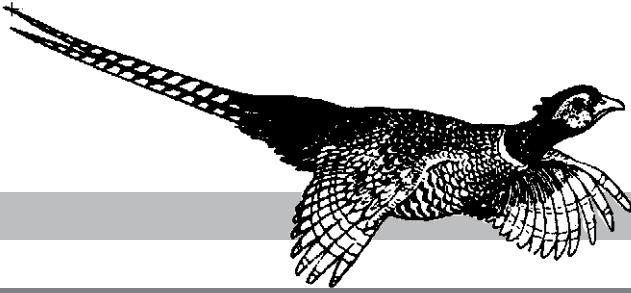

What goes around, comes around



The Farmer's Wife

Many years ago, a good friend told me that her father had one saying, and she had found it to be a correct one, in that "what goes around, comes around." And since then, I've repeated that many times, myself.

For instance, do you think the "experts" will ever agree on what a healthy diet should be? I just finished watching a video by a physician in Texas who claims what Dr. Adkins preached many years ago; that dietary fat is good for us! Doesn't that fly in the face of everything you've heard for decades?

Well, I came to that conclusion myself a long time ago. I'm ashamed to admit that I did serve margarine at the B&B initially, but I just didn't know any better. We use only butter today, on toast, and in baking.

And I remember when everyone

with high cholesterol levels quit eating eggs. That bugged me a lot, because I consider eggs a healthy, inexpensive, versatile food. Guess what? They are now agreeing with me.

I have said for years that cholesterol is not caused by what you eat, but what is eating you! The latest stuff I've been reading concedes that it isn't dietary fat, but what your body has decided to manufacture. Some of us are just lucky that way. And, there are plenty of folks out there with low cholesterol levels who still have heart disease. Go figure!

On the farm, we got our milk from a local dairy, and it was whole milk. We loved it, and drank gallons. When we began buying it in stores, we listened to all the propaganda, and bought low fat milk,

even though a dairy friend told me that even whole milk is only 4 percent fat. I refused to drink skim, it was like blue water, but we did usually have 1 percent. Well, have you heard the latest? They are saying that the butterfat in whole milk is healthy!

Remember when we were told not to drink caffeine? Remember Sanka? Thank goodness, I never believed that malarkey, either, because now we are pretty sure some caffeine is also good for us. And, we can put half and half in it! That makes it really tasty.

Again, that old maxim, moderation in all things, comes into play. It's too confusing to try to keep up with the latest dietary research. I'll do my own!

Winter annuals, basic lawn care discussed

This is the time of the year when things are starting to get serious outside, either in our crop fields or our lawns.

In the last few years roller coaster temperatures make it harder to determine what is going on but we are warming up, so winter annual weeds will be greening up and beginning to grow vigorously. Some crop fields will even turn purple by planting time. What is the impact of winter annual weeds and what should you think about in planning control programs?

Winter annual weeds begin germinating in early fall, and some species (especially marestail) continue to germinate until after planting. Depending on the species, they begin flowering in early to mid-April and most set seed and senesce by mid-June or earlier.

Control of winter annuals is relatively easy in the fall and early spring, but harder once they begin flowering as they are less susceptible to herbicides. In addition, controlling winter annual weeds before mid-April will reduce the risk of weeds going to seed and increasing winter annual weed pressure in subsequent years.

Warm weather brings lawn work but don't be in a hurry to apply fertilizer just yet. It is more important now to clean up the yard and reseed damaged areas. It may be worth it to wait a couple of weeks to see if your stressed areas green back up.

Because winter annual weeds are small and their growth doesn't overlap extensively with crop development, their impact on grain yield is sometimes overlooked. In areas

where dense winter annual weed infestations occurs, we recommend controlling those weeds at least two weeks before planting to protect against yield loss. In addition, controlling winter annual weeds before mid-April will reduce the risk of weeds going to seed and increasing winter annual weed pressure in subsequent years.

Warm weather brings lawn work but don't be in a hurry to apply fertilizer just yet. It is more important now to clean up the yard and reseed damaged areas. It may be worth it to wait a couple of weeks to see if your stressed areas green back up.

Bluegrass is tough and can recover through underground rhizomes. If you think you have to replant or need to plant grass in a new area (such as where trees or buildings were removed), seed as soon as possible. Do not apply any herbicides prior to reseeding or within two or three mowings unless allowed on the label.

It's still too early to apply fertilizer to your lawn now. Heavy spring fertilization should be avoided. Cool-season turf needs little additional encouragement to grow and applying too much fertilizer in late March and April causes excess shoot growth at the expense of root growth and uses up valuable storage products needed for summer performance. Early spring fertilization should be reserved for the professionals, while most homeowners should wait until after the first growth flush to apply fertilizer.

Once emerged, grasses grow from their crown and thus it greens up from the base in the spring. The

end result is that even though the turf looks brown from above, it may be green and growing underneath. Now is the time to check your mower's mowing height, sharpen the blade, and start the mower to guarantee it is ready to go when needed. Lawns eventually should be mowed at 3 to 3.5" throughout the year and ideally often enough to remove no more than 1/3 of the leaf blade. This will keep the lawn at optimum thickness to provide enough height to shade itself in the summer and provide competition for weeds. For the first couple of mowings you can lower the blade a little bit but bring it up to 3-3.5 inches when the lawn begins to grow quickly. It is better to mow too often than not enough and return the clippings unless they are composted or used on the garden.

Weed control can also wait a while, so stay ready but hold off for now. Crabgrass control should not go on until late April at the very earliest.

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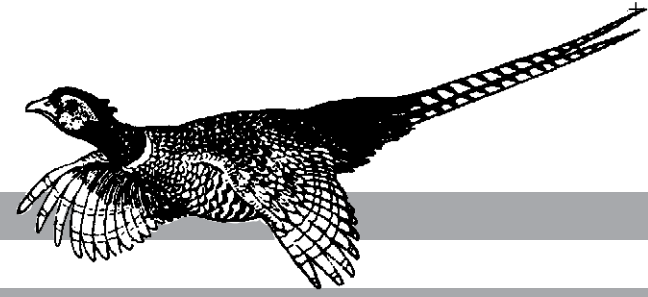

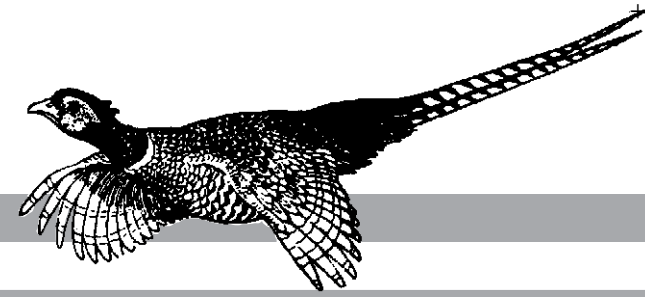
Although Missouri officially voted to remain in the Union rather than join the Confederate States of America, the state contributed army members to both the north and the south. It was a border state.

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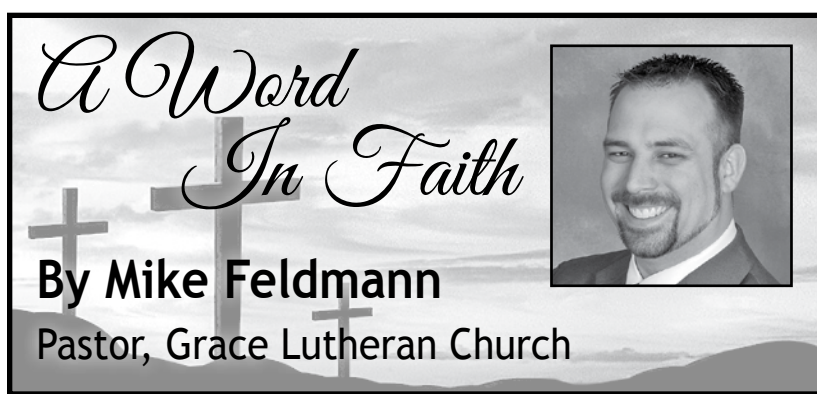
Sometimes, a leap of faith proves to be worth the risk

"Ice Road Truckers" on the History channel is a show where truck drivers haul huge and crazy loads weighing from only a few thousand pounds to 100,000 pounds across the most dangerous roads.

These roads have ridiculous grades, covered in blowing snow, and sometimes are made of ice. The materials they haul are to different communities and oil drill sites which during the summer months are surrounded by water and the only way to get things in to them is by plane.

It is an interesting show which makes my wife and I question, "Why on earth would anyone ever want to do that?" The amount of risk that is involved in driving a semi truck with a top-heavy or super-wide or potentially-dangerous load up and down roads which are literally a sheet of ice, to us, is just crazy. But someone has to do it I guess.

In the episode we watched the other night, one of the truck drivers, Alex, a very devout Christian, was going to be the first person to take his 50,000-pound load across a

frozen river. It was night time so he couldn't see real well. As he walked on parts of the river to see where he could drive his truck, his boot busted through the top layer of ice. The water came up to his calf. After examining everything, he climbed back up into his truck, and as he started to cross the river he began to pray asking for God to grant him safe travel and protection.

The disciple Peter should have been doing the same thing. In Matthew 14, after Jesus feeds the 5,000, he instructs the disciples to go to

the other side of the Sea of Galilee. During their nighttime voyage, Jesus walks on the water to catch up and be with the disciples. The disciples panic, thinking they saw a ghost, and Jesus speaks to them to try to calm their fears. Peter however is not satisfied with this. He says, "Lord, if it is you, tell me to come to you on the water." Jesus says "come" and Peter gets out of the boat and starts walking on water.

Peter is taking a risk because unless the water is frozen, he would fall in and potentially drown. But

Peter walks to Jesus. As Peter gets close to Jesus, he sees the wind and becomes afraid. In becoming afraid, Peter begins to sink and he cries out to Jesus to save him. Jesus' response - he reaches down, grabs Peter and says, "You of little faith, why did you doubt?"

Peter took a risk in trying to walk on the water in the sense that it is not something you and I as humans can do, unless it is frozen. Peter took another risk in the sense that, what if he was wrong about this Jesus guy? If Jesus isn't who he truly says that he is - then I'm going to drown. But Peter's eyes were set on Jesus and his heart followed him. It was only when he looked away that he began to doubt.

And that is the same with you and me. As we live our lives, we take risks. Maybe not the kinds of risk which Alex and other drivers on "Ice Road Truckers" take, but we have risks of our own. And there is nothing wrong with taking risks. Sometimes you and I just need to jump, take that leap of faith. But don't take the risk, the leap of faith,

on your own. Ask God to help you. Ask God to give you discernment and understanding and guidance. God promises to hear our prayers and to show us the way.

Psalm 119:105 says, "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to

my path." Amidst the many voices out there in the world for us to follow, there is only one which will truly lead us and guide us through this life and into the next. And that is the voice of Jesus, our risen and triumphant Savior.

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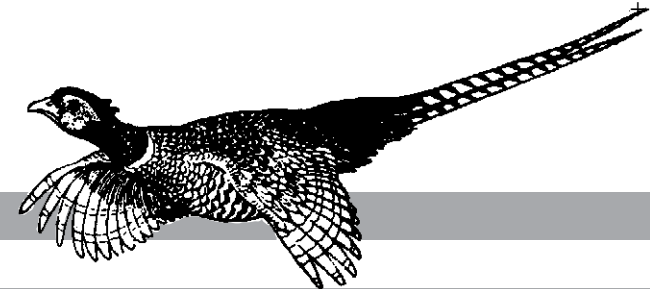
