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

HOSPITAL CONSTRUCTION PROGRESSES

Providence Medical Center \$13.5 million project keeps moving toward next phase

The sounds of progress are muffled by temporary walls, but the work can be seen on the north side of Providence Medical Center (PMC) as the medical center's \$13.5 million expansion project continues.

While the public can see much of the work being done on the new emergency center on the north side of the complex, there has been a lot of work done on the inside, particularly in the west portion of the building where some employees have moved into new office space.

PMC CEO Jim Frank said the student health center and some administrative areas were scheduled to be ready by the end of June, which has allowed some administrative staff to be moved so that the next phase of construction can begin near the hospital's main entrance on

"The Student Health and administrative offices have been turned over, so we're anxious to get furniture and staff moved into those offices,"

Now that the administrative and business offices have moved into their new area, the current business and administrative offices will be reconfigured and remodeled to create space for a nursing education room and a chapel.

The new emergency department was one of the first items on the agenda when construction started last fall, and Frank said he is optimistic that the new emergency room area will be ready by this August.

"Our emergency rooms are in three different locations right now and it's not always the most convenient, so it will be nice to have it all in one location, allowing providers to be available to treat more than one patient at a time," he said.

The current emergency rooms will be remodeled and have new uses once the new emergency center opens. One will be turned into storage, a second will be turned into a wound care room, and the other will be incorporated into the patient room remodeling efforts.

The patient rooms will be remodeled and made bigger, creating fewer rooms with more hospital's trauma areas into space. The patient rooms will include bigger bathroom facilities in each room, which allows for easier access for patients, particularly those who are wheelchair-bound or connected to equipment that may limit their mobility within the bathroom.

Non-point pollution is focus

LENRD establishing water quality plan

Over the last year, the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) has been establishing the Lower Elkhorn River Basin Water Quality Management Plan

The Plan covers the lower portion of the Elkhorn River Basin, which is the watershed that created the boundary for the LENRD. The basin is located in northeast Nebraska and covers over 2.5 million acres including all of Cuming, Pierce, Stanton, and Wayne Counties and portions of Antelope, Burt, Cedar, Colfax, Dakota, Dixon. Dodge, Knox, Madison, Platte, and Thurston Counties. The basin includes 50 communities and has a population of 90,000.

The Plan is focusing on issues with non-

point source pollution and will provide a single coordinated strategy to identify water quality threats and needs, prioritize watershed areas for development of enhanced planning and restoration projects. and identify practices and activities appropriate to address the known water quality deficiencies. LENRD project coordinator, Kristie Olmer, said, "Examples include impaired waters, such as Willow Creek Reservoir near Pierce, and maintaining high quality resources such as Skyview Lake in Norfolk and Maskenthine Lake near Stanton." She added, "Another primary concern is nitrates in groundwater, especially wellhead protection areas for public drinking water suppliers."

The LENRD is now actively seeking public input on water quality concerns and issues from anyone living or working within the basin. The public is encouraged to visit the LENRD website www.lenrd.org for more information on the draft plan.

As portions of the Plan become complete, they will be placed on the website for public review. A draft of the Plan will be made available for review in August, and will also be presented to the public at an Open





"Our bathrooms are small now and wheelchair access is difficult, so it's going to be an improvement that will be good for patients and caregivers as well," Frank said. "We're essentially taking three patient rooms and making two out of them, and the bigger space will allow us to enlarge the bathrooms.'

Another big change for the hospital will be the building's wiring infrastructure, which needs updating after being part of the original building more than 40 years ago. "This building was built in the

early 70's and has been maintained beautifully, but as health care has changed, it has required more and more resources and it's time for an upgrade," Frank said.

A lot of the infrastructure that is being added will help the hospital be better connected throughout the "There were no computers back

then when they originally wired this building, so we're cleaning up the wiring that was previously ran with no consistent strategy in mind," Frank said. "Our IT server room will be in a more dedicated and secure place and will have the proper cooling and ventilation, and we'll be moving that to the main floor so we won't have to worry about flooding issues.

Reconstruction of the parking lot on the north side is set to be finished in a few weeks, which will cut down on disruptions at the clinic on the north side of the complex.

Completion of the project was originally scheduled for the fall of 2017, but Frank said some construction and weather delays could push completion back to early 2018 - but it's not going to stop them from starting to move into their newlyfinished quarters.

"Our site foreman has done a phenomenal job for us, and in the next couple of weeks we'll be relocating a lot of people, so we're looking forward to it," he said.

The construction process continues at Providence Medical Center. but Frank said the inconveniences that might be felt now will be a distant memory when the work is completed.

"The original hospital has been here 40 years, and with this project we're trying to position ourselves to continue providing the same caliber of care for the next 40 years," he



Watching a bunch of young kids progress as they learn a new sport can be a lot of fun, especially if you're used to coaching at a higher level.

Tom Sorensen came to Winside this week to serve as the camp clinician for a local volleyball camp started up by his sister, Chris Shoff, wife of Winside Public Schools superintendent Mike Shoff. Sorensen brought his experience as a player and a coach to Winside, where he's helped out about 25 local girls during a three-day clinic at the school.

"Chris called me and asked if I'd come up and do the camp if she organized it, and I said 'Of course," Sorensen said during a break in the action Tuesday. It's fun to watch that progress come so quickly."







As a 4-H leader and volunteer vou play an important role in helping our youth develop the 5 C's. Here are some ways you can encourage positive youth development:

- Encourage youth input. When youth feel they are being heard and taken seriously they are more likely to engage in programs and reap the youth provide an inviting environbenefits of that program. As a 4-H

leader you can encourage youth to have a voice by listening, responding positively, and frequently using ideas brought to you by your club members.

- Provide guidelines and structure. Structure and guidelines allow youth the freedom to complete tasks in their own way while still allowing for adult guidance. As you monitor activities and provide help when needed ask purposeful questions to encourage youth to think about practical issues and to think critically about the projects they are working on.

 Empower youth. To empower ment where youth are encouraged to take on new leadership roles, express their ideas, and feel support through success and failures. Give youth a chance to share their skills and recognize and praise their work. These environments will inspire youth to reach their full po-

- Be intentional. To promote and support positive youth development and the 4-H mission, you must be intentional in your work with youth. Encourage a mutually caring and respectful relationship with youth, be sure to have your club meetings and activities well planned and organized, and understand your role in supporting the 4-H mission – empowering youth to reach their full potential, working and learning in partnership with caring adults.

Potato leafhoppers, sprayer Nebraska full of local treasures calibration are discussed

Potato leafhoppers have the potential to hurt alfalfa in Nebraska every year. This is generally a second and third cutting pest and has been common in Nebraska recently.

Southerly winds bring this insect into Nebraska, as is does not overwinter here. There have been a lot of strong southerly winds the last couple of weeks, so it is probable we have potato leafhoppers in the state. So, it is time to begin scout-


These small (1/8 inch long), bright green, wedge shaped insects may cause severe damage to alfalfa by injecting a toxin into the plant as they feed. This feeding results in a distinctive yellow or purple triangle shape at the tip of the leaf. First year spring planted alfalfa fields are particularly attractive to and vulnerable to potato leafhoppers, as are fields planted last year. In older fields, these insects are usually a problem on second and third cuttings. Newly developed resistant varieties will protect from potato leafhoppers fairly well, but alfalfa in the seedling stage may still be damaged. All fields should still be scouted, as large numbers of leafhoppers may still cause a problem, even in resistant variety fields.

Treatment decisions are based on numbers captured by sweep net. A sweep net is the only reliable way to scout for potato leafhoppers. There do not have to be many to cause a problem. At today's prices, roughly 1/2 leafhoppers per sweep could justify a treatment, depending on plant height. A large number of insecticides are registered for control, and all with provide good results when applied properly. Commonly used insecticides include Mustang, Warrior, Baythroid, and Lorsban. If possible, refer to the UNL Department of Entomology Web site at http://entomology.unl.edu/instabls/ for a list of suggested insecticides and treatment levels.

Uneven pressure throughout the sprayer boom can mean uneven application of pesticides. The first step in sprayer calibration is to determine that the spray pressure is equal throughout the spray boom.

Three basic things affect the number of gallons applied per acre. These include; Speed: If you run the tractor twice as fast, you'll apply half the rate, if nothing else is

Nozzle Spacing: The typical nozzle spacing is 20 inches, but 30-inch nozzle spacing is just as effective if 110-degree nozzles are used. Most new air-induction nozzles are only available in 110 degrees. Another reason for 30-inch nozzle spacing is that most farmers are still planting 30-inch rows. If you want to use drop nozzles, add extensions to have drop nozzles. Thirty-inch nozzle spacing also allows for 50 percent larger nozzles. That, in turn, provides for using lower application rates without going to extremely small nozzles. Avoid nozzles that require less than a 50-mesh nozzle screen because smaller screens tend to plug.

Nozzle Flow Rate: This is determined by the nozzle orifice size, pressure, and solution density. Remember that anything heavier than water will come out more slowly than water and anything lighter than water may come out faster. Adjust the sprayer accordingly.


