## Community ready to 'Cluck And Roll'

36th edition of Wayne Chicken Show is next weekend

Months of planning and scratching for ideas will come to fruition next week as the 36th annual Chicken Show is set for July 8-10.

"Cluck and Roll" is this year's theme with many activities centered around music.

The festivities begin on Henoween, Friday, July 8.

A Flea Market/Sidewalk Sale will take place on Main Street from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. with a variety of items available.

The weekly Chamber Coffee will be held in the alley in the 200 block of Main Street at 10 a.m.

Chicken related stories and crafts will be available at the Wayne Public Library at 4 p.m. and a pie and ice cream so-

cial will be hosted by the Eastern Star Chapter 194 in the North Meeting Room of the Wayne City Auditorium.

Wine tasting will take place at the Diamond Center/Flowers and Wine.

Food of all types, games and inflatables, along with several craft vendors will be scattered throughout the downtown area.

An information booth will be set up under the Chamber gazebo in the downtown area on Friday night and at Bressler Park on Saturday.

Evening activities get underway at 6 p.m. with the World's Largest Chicken Dance, led by the Wayne State College and Wayne High School Cheer Squads.

New this year will be Lip Sync Battles. The 13-year old and younger competitors will battle at 6:30 p.m. and the 14-year and older competitors will take the stage at 8 p.m.

This event is being sponsored by the Wayne Eagles Club and contestants can pre-register by calling (402) 375-9956.

The always-popular Cement Chicken Auction will take place at 7 p.m. for more than 20 decorated chickens, many of which are being decorated to match this year's theme.

Pizza Hut's Saucy Hot Wing Eating Contest will follow the auction with those planning to take part asked to register at Pizza Hut or at their booth in the Food Court.

Free entertainment for the evening will be provided by Headwind, a band from Emerson. They will provide music on the stage at Third and Main Streets beginning at 8:30 p.m. and again after the Light Up the Sky Fireworks Display. The fireworks will be lit from the area near Hank Overin Field.

### HOSPITAL CONSTRUCTION PROGRESSES

## Providence Medical Center \$13.5 million project keeps moving toward next phase

The sounds of progress are muffled by temporary walls, but the work can be seen on the north side of Providence Medical Center (PMC) as the medical center's \$13.5 million expansion project continues.

While the public can see much of the work being done on the new emergency center on the north side of the complex, there has been a lot of work done on the inside, particularly in the west portion of the building where some employees have moved into new office space.

PMC CEO Jim Frank said the student health center and some administrative areas were scheduled to be ready by the end of June, which has allowed some administrative staff to be moved so that the next phase of construction can begin near the hospital's main entrance on the south side.

"The Student Health and administrative offices have been turned over, so we're anxious to get furniture and staff moved into those offices," Frank said.

Now that the administrative and business offices have moved into their new area, the current business and administrative offices will be reconfigured and remodeled to create space for a nursing education room and a chapel.

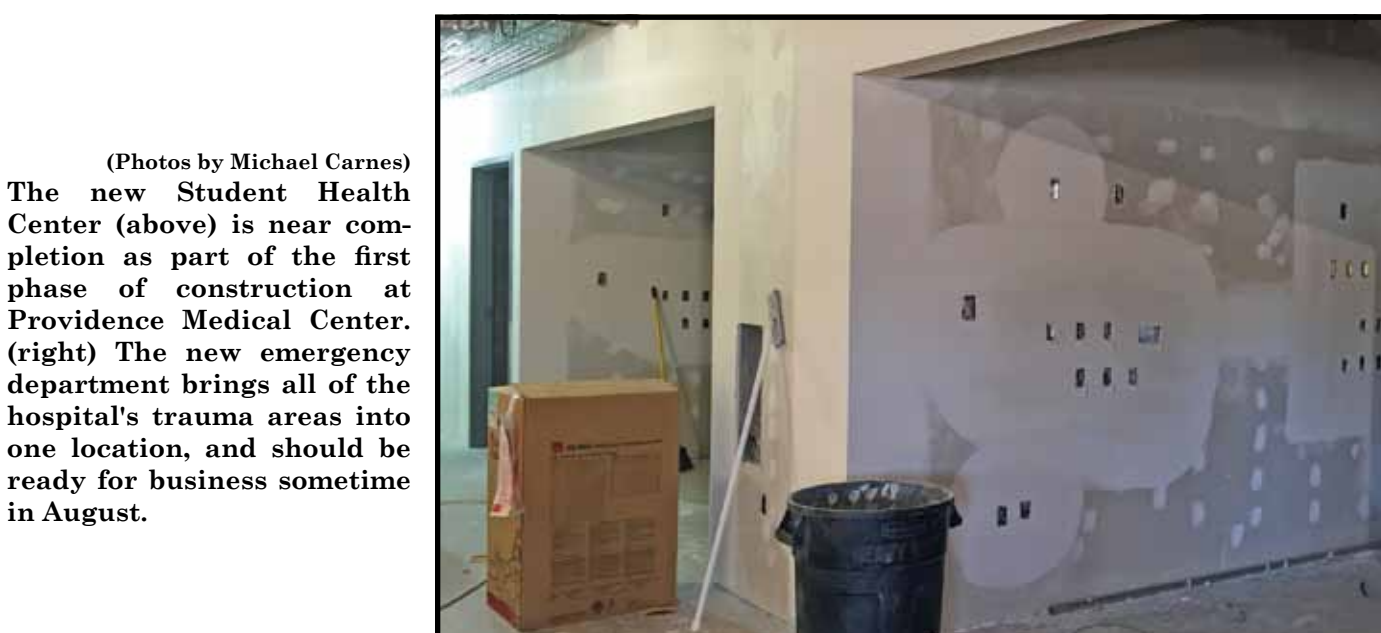
The new emergency department was one of the first items on the agenda when construction started last fall, and Frank said he is optimistic that the new emergency room area will be ready by this August.

"Our emergency rooms are in three different locations right now and it's not always the most convenient, so it will be nice to have it all in one location, allowing providers to be available to treat more than one patient at a time," he said.

The current emergency rooms will be remodeled and have new uses once the new emergency center opens. One will be turned into storage, a second will be turned into a wound care room, and the other will be incorporated into the patient room remodeling efforts.

The patient rooms will be remodeled and made bigger, creating fewer rooms with more space. The patient rooms will include bigger bathroom facilities in each room, which allows for easier access for patients, particularly those who are wheelchair-bound or connected to equipment that may limit their mobility within the bathroom.

## Non-point pollution is focus

LENRD establishing water quality plan

Over the last year, the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) has been establishing the Lower Elkhorn River Basin Water Quality Management Plan (Plan).

The Plan covers the lower portion of the Elkhorn River Basin, which is the watershed that created the boundary for the LENRD. The basin is located in northeast Nebraska and covers over 2.5 million acres including all of Cuming, Pierce, Stanton, and Wayne Counties and portions of Antelope, Burt, Cedar, Colfax, Dakota, Dixon, Dodge, Knox, Madison, Platte, and Thurston Counties. The basin includes 50 communities and has a population of 90,000.

The Plan is focusing on issues with non-point source pollution and will provide a single coordinated strategy to identify water quality threats and needs, prioritize watershed areas for development of enhanced planning and restoration projects, and identify practices and activities appropriate to address the known water quality deficiencies. LENRD project coordinator, Kristie Olmer, said, "Examples include impaired waters, such as Willow Creek Reservoir near Pierce, and maintaining high quality resources such as Skyview Lake in Norfolk and Maskenthine Lake near Stanton." She added, "Another primary concern is nitrates in groundwater, especially well-head protection areas for public drinking water suppliers."

The LENRD is now actively seeking public input on water quality concerns and issues from anyone living or working within the basin. The public is encouraged to visit the LENRD website [www.lenrd.org](http://www.lenrd.org) for more information on the draft plan.

As portions of the Plan become complete, they will be placed on the website for public review. A draft of the Plan will be made available for review in August, and will also be presented to the public at an Open House.

## Winside native helps Husker Equestrian team to honors

Selena Finn, a graduate of Winside High School, played a key role in the success of the University of Nebraska Equestrian team as they competed at the Intercollegiate Horse Show Association (IHSA) National competition, held May 5-8 at the Kentucky Horse Park in Lexington, Ky.

The Huskers had a full team, four individual riders and an AQHA (American Quarter Horse Association) high point rider competitor and their coach, Lori Jaixen, on board for the national competition.

The IHSA has over 400 member colleges and universities across the United States and Canada as well as over 10,000 student athlete members. The IHSA national competition brings in over 450 riders from 25 different teams. After a long season the team's hard work has paid off. Again this year, the UNL Equestrian Western Team won high point team for Zone 8 Region 5, which secured them a spot to compete at the IHSA semifinals at Blackhawk College in Galva, Ill., where they were reserve semifinal

champions. This guaranteed the team a spot to compete as one of only nine teams at the IHSA Nationals. The hunt seat team placed with a very strong third place finish in the region, the highest end for the hunt seat team.

The week started off with Junior Sydney Kinstler representing the Huskers as the only hunt seat rider to qualify for this prestigious event. Sydney was one of 18 very talented riders to ride in the open flat class. Sydney had a great ride earning honorable mention.

For the western team competition, Finn, a sophomore, started off the weekend with a phenomenal ride in the AQHA Reining, with her high score securing a team National Championship and setting the mood for the team to follow. In the AQHA horsemanship divisions, freshman J'Nan Wittler followed suit with a fifth place finish in Novice; freshman Maddy Misfeldt placed ninth in Beginner; freshman Cassidy Curtis placed fifth in Advanced; freshman Sierra Nelson took fourth in Advanced, and Finn

placed fourth in Open. All of these fantastic rides brought the Huskers the reserve national championship in the AQHA Team competition.

It was an unforgettable nationals for sophomore Bailey Peterson as she was named national champion in the Individual Advanced class. She was one of 12 riders who qualified in this division. Senior Melissa Braun, finished her IHSA career with a fantastic ride, finishing fifth in the nation as an individual in the Intermediate Horsemanship class.

Finn rode to defend her title in for the AQHA High Point Rider. She was one of 26 riders who earned the honor, by winning their respective region, to ride for the very prestigious AQHA High Point Western Rider. Finn again placed fifth in the horsemanship phase set her up to be a contender for the high point award. Unfortunately, an extra spin in the reining caused her disqualification in the reining phase. Finn is still in among a small group of elite riders who have earned the honor of the AQHA High Point Rider.

# PMC board members attend WRTS symposium in Arizona

In the mid to late 1990's, pragmatic and inexpensive educational opportunities for hospital trustees were not readily available. There were occasionally national trustee programs, but these were usually expensive, precluding attendance by trustees from smaller hospitals and limiting the number who could attend from other hospitals. Just a few hospital trustees gathered on April 25, 1997, in Santa Fe, N.M., to discuss their concern regarding how the changing face of healthcare was requiring more and more trustee knowledge of its dynamics; yet, meaningful and inexpensive educational opportunities were not readily available to fill the educational void. From that meeting, the WRTS was born to fill that void. A planning committee was formed of two

individuals, one trustee and one association staff member from each state, which has continued to be a successful organizational structure 20 years later. WRTS is comprised of 11 hospital/health care associations from Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, South Dakota, Utah and Wyoming.

Designed for hospital board members and executive leadership, the program broadens the participants' awareness of current health care trends that affect them, and how they serve their boards and communities. Best practices of successful health care governance are shared for practical application in the boardroom. WRTS provides net-

working opportunities for trustees and leaders from hospitals of varying size and scope. This symposium is geared toward rural and Critical Access Hospitals, and aims to challenge conventional thinking with approaches to standard health care governance concerns and business practices.

This year's theme, "Today's Vision . . . Tomorrow's Reality," reminded attendees to begin work collaboratively now to create a healthy future and hospitals that not only survive, but thrive. Hospitals count on their trustees in these challenging times to provide necessary leadership and to make informed decisions to ensure the delivery of quality healthcare in their communities.

The City of Wayne Green Team has partnered with Ripple Glass out of Kansas City, Mo., to pick up and recycle our community's glass for free.

Bring your clean and rinsed glass bottles (including glass food and beverage containers and glassware such as wine and pint glasses) to the metal bins inside the Wayne Transfer Station located at 110 South Windom Street. The station is open Monday and Friday from 9 a.m.-1:30 p.m., Tuesday from 11 a.m.-6 p.m., and Saturday from 8 a.m.-12 p.m.

Once the metal bins are full, Gill Hauling will move the glass to the concrete bunker located next to the Boy Scouts Paper Trailer. Ripple Glass will then pick up the glass for recycling into fiberglass insulation and bottles. Ripple Glass even rewards communities with funds for

achieving goals of year-over-year growth on glass tonnage collected.

"Our bathrooms are small now and wheelchair access is difficult, so it's going to be an improvement that will be good for patients and caregivers as well," Frank said. "We're essentially taking three patient rooms and making two out of them, and the bigger space will allow us to enlarge the bathrooms."

Another big change for the hospital will be the building's wiring infrastructure, which needs updating after being part of the original building more than 40 years ago.

"This building was built in the early 70's and has been maintained beautifully, but as health care has changed, it has required more and more resources and it's time for an upgrade," Frank said.

A lot of the infrastructure that is being added will help the hospital be better connected throughout the building.

"There were no computers back then when they originally wired this building, so we're cleaning up the wiring that was previously ran with no consistent strategy in mind," Frank said. "Our IT server room will be in a more dedicated and secure place and will have the proper cooling and ventilation, and we'll be moving that to the main floor so we won't have to worry about flooding issues."

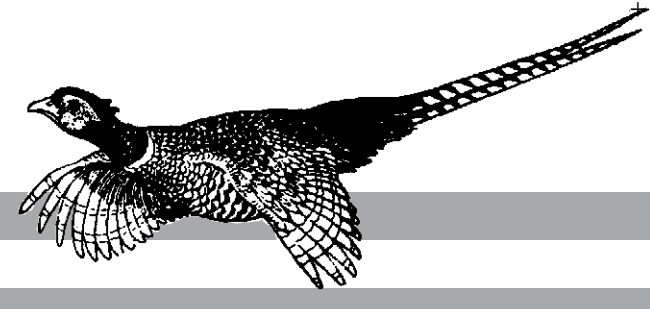
Reconstruction of the parking lot on the north side is set to be finished in a few weeks, which will cut down on disruptions at the clinic on the north side of the complex.

Completion of the project was originally scheduled for the fall of 2017, but Frank said some construction and weather delays could push completion back to early 2018 - but it's not going to stop them from starting to move into their newly-finished quarters.

"Our site foreman has done a phenomenal job for us, and in the next couple of weeks we'll be relocating a lot of people, so we're looking forward to it," he said.

The construction process continues at Providence Medical Center, but Frank said the inconveniences that might be felt now will be a distant memory when the work is completed.

"The original hospital has been here 40 years, and with this project we're trying to position ourselves to continue providing the same caliber of care for the next 40 years," he said.

## Fehringer taking her shot at glory



### Wayne native qualifies for next week's Olympic Trials

There's nothing like making plans for a last-minute trip to Oregon when a potential spot on the U.S. Olympic team is on the line.

Carly Fehringer will be competing next week in Eugene, Ore., for a spot on the United States track and field team. She will compete in the women's hammer throw on Wednesday, July 6 at 3 p.m. Central time.

The 24-year old Wayne High graduate and Wayne State All-American waited until just about the last minute before she found out she was part of the 24-woman field that will battle for the three spots on the team.

On June 17, she went down to the University of Nebraska to throw in

a "throwers open" meet and had a best throw of 66.68 meters (218 feet, 7 inches), just short of the 67-meter threshold that was set as an automatic qualifier for the Olympic Trials.

"We kind of knew beforehand, but we had to wait for the mark to be verified, so we were on the USA Track and Field website refreshing it over and over because we didn't want to jump the gun," Fehringer told The Wayne Herald.

Late Monday night, the final update was posted and Fehringer's name was officially on the list of the 24 competitors who will throw for a spot on the Olympic team that will compete later this summer in Brazil.

Seeing her name on that final list was – pardon the pun – like having

a weight lifted off her shoulders.

"Once my mark was accepted, it was a sense of relief finally knowing that I made it to the list of 24," she said. "I was 99 percent sure, but I didn't want to jump the gun."

Now, with a possible trip to the world's biggest sporting event on the line, she is trying to raise some money to help with travel expenses for her and her parents, Shelly and Dan Fehringer.

State Nebraska Bank and Elkhorn Valley Bank both donated Chamber Bucks for a raffle to be held Friday, and tickets are being sold this week. Dairy Queen, Rainbow World and The Fourth Jug and Wayne Sport and Spine have helped with donations.

Fehringer said the winners for the fundraiser will be announced

Friday at 8 p.m. at The Fourth Jug. She and her family will be there from 6-8 p.m. for those who want to stop by and wish her well on her shot at making the U.S. Olympic team.

She said she's realistic about her chances, knowing it's going to take an amazing mark for her to be among the top three.

Still – one must dare to dream.

"Hopefully, they'll retire soon," she said, laughing. "With the girls I'm competing against, the field is pretty much set and I'd have to get off a monster throw to make it. It's not impossible, but right now I'm just going to go out there and give it my best effort. I'm competing against some future Olympians, so it's a great opportunity that I couldn't pass up."

## Overin's legend is still alive

I never knew Hank Overin. The man who coached here in Wayne for so many years passed away in 1993, more than a decade and a half before I came on board here at The Wayne Herald.

It's been more than two decades now since he passed away – and yet, his memory continues to impact the lives of those who played for him and the younger generations they coach today.

Overin's legend lives on with Hank Overin Field, which has undergone quite the impressive face-lift over the last several months.

The old grandstand at Hank's park was damaged by a tree that was felled by a mid-summer's wind storm two years ago. The tree fell into the grandstand and backstop, rendering the facility unsafe for the Wayne American Legion Juniors to play the rest of its summer baseball season (how the rickety old lighting system survived those 90 mile-per-hour winds, to this day, remains a mystery).

It wasn't long before a group of baseball enthusiasts came together to begin efforts to rebuild the grandstand. The volunteer group worked with the City of Wayne to not only rebuild the grandstand, but add a new storage area and press box above the first base dugout.

And then, this week, one of the final pieces to the puzzle was lowered into place – a new entry way that turns this into one of the more beautiful small-town baseball facilities in Nebraska, if not the entire planet.

Robbie Gamble was one of the many people in this community who played for Hank over the years. Monday morning, he was talking about the sore back he woke up with after spending time at the park planting some new plants around the outer edge of the park.

As city crews lowered the steel entry canopy, made by Heritage Industries, into place, I think you could have slammed Robbie in the back with a steel beam and he wouldn't have noticed it. The smile on his face as he watched the new entry way being placed on the footings at the entry to the park said all that needed to be said.

There were a lot of happy faces – and voices – that were part of the placement of the new canopy. Jill Brodersen, who designed the entry way, was giddy with excitement after the new entry was put into place. Mayor Ken Chamberlain was happy to see the work being completed, and coach Jeff Zeiss said he was thrilled and felt that Hank "was watching" the work being completed.

Gamble and Zeiss both played for Overin at one point in their young lives, and a lot of the people who were on that committee are Overin disciples as well. I participated in some of the committee's planning early in the process, and I know those who were part of the committee were concerned that Overin's memory be preserved at the field and that the new structure should be an ode to the impact he had on many lives here in Wayne over the years.

The new construction is fantastic. Sand Creek Post & Beam provided the lumber for the new grandstand, and city crews did a bang-up job building the storage and press box facility in such short order. I've visited a lot of baseball parks over the years, and I can't think of a facility that looks as beautiful as the reconstructed Hank Overin Field looks right now (and not a moment too soon, since the Class B, Area 5 Juniors tournament begins play here next weekend).

The support for the new project was fantastic. I never knew him, but I'm sure Overin would probably be humbled by all the support his past players gave to rebuilding the facility. The donations and fundraising efforts that were held for

## Clinic a chance for past Olympian to help sister

Watching a bunch of young kids progress as they learn a new sport can be a lot of fun, especially if you're used to coaching at a higher level.

Tom Sorensen came to Winside this week to serve as the camp clinician for a local volleyball camp started up by his sister, Chris Shoff, wife of Winside Public Schools superintendent Mike Shoff. Sorensen brought his experience as a player and a coach to Winside, where he's helped out about 25 local girls during a three-day clinic at the school.

"Chris called me and asked if I'd come up and do the camp if she organized it, and I said 'Of course,'" Sorensen said during a break in the action Tuesday. "We don't get to see each other a lot, and even then it's usually right after a match and you don't get to see them for very long, so I've been able to come up and spend a few days here, and it's fun to see some young kids learn how to play volleyball."

Sorensen has an extensive background in the sport. He spent a number of years playing volleyball. He was a three-time All-American and led Pepperdine to the

NCAA title in 1992, and also spent a number of years on the U.S. National and Olympic teams. He played on the American team in the 1996 Olympics and was an alternate in 2000, and he's also played professionally overseas in Italy and Spain.

Now back in the United States, Sorensen is an assistant coach for the men's and women's volleyball teams at Ottawa (Kan.) University, an NAIA-level school.

While he spends a lot of his time coaching athletes who have played the sport for a number of years, getting the chance to teach some fundamentals to a younger generation is something new that he said he has enjoyed.

"It's really refreshing," he said. "When you coach college kids, they're already at a high level and you'll see progress, but it's not always in leaps and bounds. Here, you'll see kids who can't even serve the ball over the net get better, and by the end of it they're serving it over the net and have built up some confidence. It's fun to watch that progress come so quickly."

Sorensen said it was also a great opportunity to spend time with his sister and her family, and said they'll be getting together soon for some family gatherings this summer.

As a 4-H leader and volunteer you play an important role in helping our youth develop the 5 C's. Here are some ways you can encourage positive youth development:

- Encourage youth input. When youth feel they are being heard and taken seriously they are more likely to engage in programs and reap the benefits of that program. As a 4-H

leader you can encourage youth to have a voice by listening, responding positively, and frequently using ideas brought to you by your club members.

- Provide guidelines and structure. Structure and guidelines allow youth the freedom to complete tasks in their own way while still allowing for adult guidance. As you monitor activities and provide help when needed ask purposeful questions to encourage youth to think about practical issues and to think critically about the projects they are working on.

- Empower youth. To empower youth provide an inviting environment where youth are encouraged

to take on new leadership roles, express their ideas, and feel support through success and failures. Give youth a chance to share their skills and recognize and praise their work. These environments will inspire youth to reach their full potential.

- Be intentional. To promote and support positive youth development and the 4-H mission, you must be intentional in your work with youth. Encourage a mutually caring and respectful relationship with youth, be sure to have your club meetings and activities well planned and organized, and understand your role in supporting the 4-H mission – empowering youth to reach their full potential, working and learning in partnership with caring adults.

NENCAP's Immunization Program provides childhood immunizations to VFC eligible children. Immunizations are needed at ages 2 months, 4 months, 6 months, and 12-15 months. School required immunizations are needed prior to entry into kindergarten (ages 4-6) and seventh grade. Lead screening is also available by appointment only to children ages 12 months to 5 years of age.

Each child should be accompanied by the parent or guardian. Past immunization records are required. Proxy forms are needed when a parent or legal guardian is unable to accompany the child to clinic. Proxy forms may be obtained by contacting the Pender office at (402) 385-6300. No one will be denied immunizations for inability to make a donation. This project is supported in part by Federal Immunization Program Funds awarded to Northeast Nebraska Community Action Partnership by the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services.

Adult vaccine (MMR, Hepatitis A, Hepatitis B, Tdap, Pneumovax, TB testing) is available to the public. We may be able to bill your insurance company. Call the Pender of-

NENCAP's Healthy Families is a parent support program where parents can learn about positive discipline, social emotional development and benefits of good physical and emotional health. 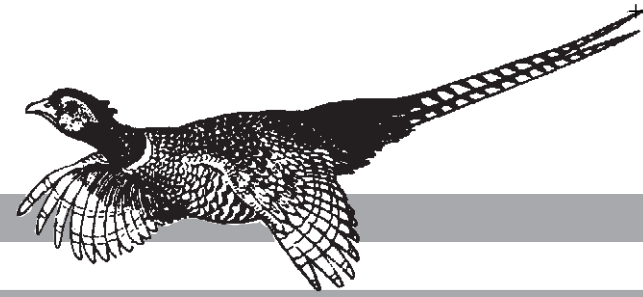

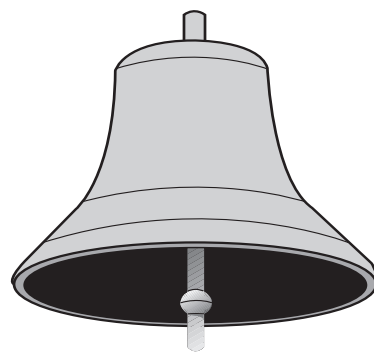

# Helping out those in need here in area

In Matthew 25:35 and 25:40, Jesus says, "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me . . . Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me."

I'll confess that I am very worried for kids in our area come summer vacation and for one reason - hunger. You see, many of our youth get free or reduced meals during the school year and we know that many of them eat pretty much all their meals at school or through the backpack program, which is a program that sends food home for the weekend. And so I worry, no school means less meals -- the backpack program is still available but that only covers just a bit of their hunger, it doesn't alleviate all of it. Are there children in our town suffering in silence from hunger this summer?

What does hunger look like? The odds are that when you think of hunger, if you think about it at all, you envision people from the Great Depression. But that is not what hunger looks like today. Hunger, or food insecurity as it's called today, isn't the complete absence of food. It's a piercing, nagging fear about where you'll get your next meal. Hunger

today means families struggling in silence because they are working but in lower paying jobs; making just enough where they can't qualify for assistance. They aren't below the poverty line rather they are near the poverty line or just above it. Often families don't want anyone to know which is what makes it a silent struggle. Mainly they are quiet because they are ashamed - they're working hard and stick to a budget but if one thing goes wrong like a part for their car or someone gets sick they then need to figure out how to pay the bill and eat. More often than not the food budget gets cut.

That's when WACAM, which stands for Wayne Area Congregations and Ministries, steps up and tries to fill the gap. How WACAM works is really very simple - mon-

ey is pooled between the congregations in town and then is given to those who ask for help. When a person comes to a church looking assistance each is listened to in a respectful way and then screened as to the needs. Is the need real? Is it habitual? If so, how can we help to break the habit? No cash is ever given directly to those in need. Rather, we go with them to purchase groceries, go with them to pay the electric bill, go with them to pick up their prescription. Right now WACAM treasurer George Burcum does most of this. Often it is a very rewarding job - he gets to see the thankfulness on their faces when they receive the help that we are offering. More often than not it is frustrating and sad mainly because of a cash shortage. We just don't have enough awareness of what we do so

that we receive adequate donations. We do get a grant each year from United Way and we THANK them so much for that! However it isn't enough - and that makes it hard. It's very hard thing to see the hope on a person's face turn to despair when the realization hits that we have to tell them no, we can't help. We're out of money too. I just had to do that today and it brought me to tears. When we can help it's wonderful to see their thankfulness! It's wonderful to close the food gap for them. It's wonderful to see the eyes of a child light up because he or she will get to eat that night.

After hearing the stories and seeing the struggles of people in this town and knowing full well that they are the new face of hunger I am asking if you could help. Help us to end the nagging fear about their next meal. Those suffering in silence amongst us need our help.

When you wake up and go about your morning routine tomorrow, know that the routine looks a little different for everyone. Remember that God is calling all of us. And pray. Good morning, God. I love you! How can I help? If you feel moved to help please give a donation to any of the area churches - just let them know it's for WACAM and the money will get to the right place.

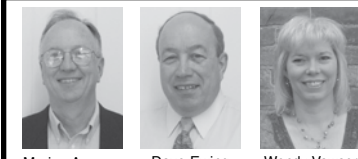

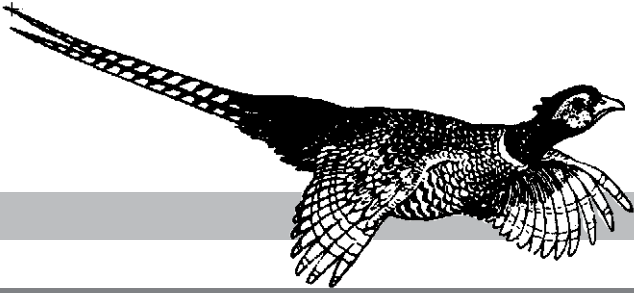

## Potato leafhoppers, sprayer calibration are discussed

Potato leafhoppers have the potential to hurt alfalfa in Nebraska every year. This is generally a second and third cutting pest and has been common in Nebraska recently.

Southerly winds bring this insect into Nebraska, as it does not overwinter here. There have been a lot of strong southerly winds the last couple of weeks, so it is probable we have potato leafhoppers in the state. So, it is time to begin scouting.

These small (1/8 inch long), bright green, wedge shaped insects may cause severe damage to alfalfa by injecting a toxin into the plant as they feed. This feeding results in a distinctive yellow or purple triangle shape at the tip of the leaf. First year spring planted alfalfa fields are particularly attractive to and vulnerable to potato leafhoppers, as are fields planted last year. In older fields, these insects are usually a problem on second and third cuttings. Newly developed resistant varieties will protect from potato leafhoppers fairly well, but alfalfa in the seedling stage may still be damaged. All fields should still be scouted, as large numbers of leafhoppers may still cause a problem, even in resistant variety fields.

Treatment decisions are based on numbers captured by sweep net. A sweep net is the only reliable way to scout for potato leafhoppers. There do not have to be many to cause a problem. At today's prices, roughly 1/2 leafhoppers per sweep could justify a treatment, depending on plant height. A large number of insecticides are registered for control, and all with provide good results when applied properly. Commonly used insecticides include Mustang, Warrior, Baythroid, and Lorsban. If possible, refer to the UNL Department of Entomology Web site at <http://entomology.unl.edu/instabs/> for a list of suggested insecticides and treatment levels.

Uneven pressure throughout the sprayer boom can mean uneven application of pesticides. The first step in sprayer calibration is to determine that the spray pressure is equal throughout the spray boom. Be sure to check pressure all along the boom because there might be a restriction in the line and uneven pressure. If the pressure is not even through the boom, you'll be wasting your time trying to calibrate the sprayer.

Check and compare the cab pressure with boom pressure. If there is a difference, make note on the cab's pressure gauge how much higher or lower the boom pressure is so you will know the exact operating pressure.

## Spot open on LENRD board

The Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) has a vacant seat on their Board of Directors. Chris Carlson of Norfolk announced his resignation at the June 23rd board meeting. Carlson is moving outside of the district boundaries and will no longer be able to represent the people of Sub-district 2.

Carlson, who has served on the board since 2005, encouraged the board and staff to continue their mission of conservation and water management. "Don't be afraid to speak up and say what's on your mind, he said. "The board is better for it, and we can learn the most from people we may disagree with."

The board accepted his resignation and will advertise the vacancy in July.

The LENRD board also voted to replace the generator at Maskenthine Lake. This was one of the last items on the list of equipment to be replaced following the June 16, 2014 tornado. The Stanton tornado,

sure of the sprayer.

Set up the pressure gauge with quick-attach fittings that can snap in place on the nozzle fitting. Select glycerin-filled stainless steel gauges, as lesser quality gauges won't last.

Three basic things affect the number of gallons applied per acre. These include; Speed: If you run the tractor twice as fast, you'll apply half the rate, if nothing else is changed.

Nozzle Spacing: The typical nozzle spacing is 20 inches, but 30-inch nozzle spacing is just as effective if 110-degree nozzles are used. Most new air-induction nozzles are only available in 110 degrees. Another reason for 30-inch nozzle spacing is that most farmers are still planting 30-inch rows. If you want to use drop nozzles, add extensions to have drop nozzles. Thirty-inch nozzle spacing also allows for 50 percent larger nozzles. That, in turn, provides for using lower application rates without going to extremely small nozzles. Avoid nozzles that require less than a 50-mesh nozzle screen because smaller screens tend to plug.

Nozzle Flow Rate: This is determined by the nozzle orifice size, pressure, and solution density. Remember that anything heavier than water will come out more slowly than water and anything lighter than water may come out faster. Adjust the sprayer accordingly.

Sprayer calibration provides the information you need to determine the amount of spray solution (both pesticide and carrier) being applied per acre. For more information see NebGuide G1756, "Fine-Tuning a Sprayer with the 'Ounce' Calibration Method" available at local UNL Extension offices or online at [go.unl.edu/dr3](http://go.unl.edu/dr3).

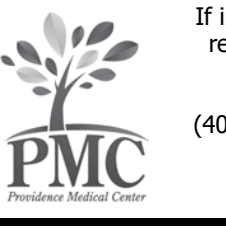

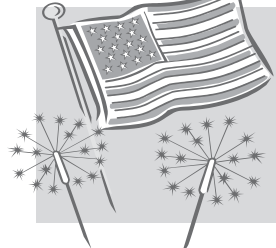
